HUMBLE OPERATES 1,875 MILES OF LINES FROM OFFICES HERE

Oil Progress Week of 1954 finds Cisco as the hub of a giant pipe line operation which now moves about 3,000,000 barrels of crude oil per month.

This operation, of course, is Humble Pipe Line Company's North Texas Division, with headquarters here in Cisco.

The division's lines stretch beyond Borger on the north, almost to Sweetwater and San Angelo on the west, to the main pumping station at Comyn on the east, and connect with other Humble main

lines at a point near Hamilton on the south.

In all, there are about 875 miles of main trunk lines and more than 1000 miles of gathering lines in the division.

There are some 38 employees in the division office here. But Cisco is also a district headquarters and 69 district employees live here.

The company camp in Cisco now includes the division office building, district office building, 23 houses, two storage garages, machine shop, pipe shop, and warehouse.

Construction on the camp was started by Humble Oil & Refining Company in 1919, during the early oil boom in this section. At that time the camp was North Central Texas division headquarters for both Humble Oil & Refining Company and Humble Pipe Line Company, and both companies also maintained a North Texas division office in Wichita Falls. In 1931, the two divisions were consolidated, with Humble Oil activities being centralized in Wichita Falls and Humble Pipe Line in Cisco.

W. P. Guinn has been superintendent of the North Texas division of Humble Pipe Line Company here since 1943. He started his career in the oil industry as a Diesel engineer at the company's Hearne Station in 1919.

G. N. Irvine is assistant division superintendent. W. C. Hughes is superintendent of the Cisco district, and L. F. Keelan is assistant district superintendent.

Merit Council To Fill State Jobs

AUSTIN, Oct. 9. — Competitive examinations will be given by the Merit System Council for the Texas State Department of Health on November 6 in as many centers throughout the State as the number of candidates may justify.

Special recruitment is being made for these classifications which require or prefer a college degree: health information specialist, junior sanitarian, junior engineer, assistant bacteriologist, and food and drug inspector.

This testing program also will include graduate nurses interested in careers in public health, stenographers, and secretaries.

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The Cisco Community Chest will send workers out this week for the 5th consecutive year to raise budgets for the various organizations that depend on public contributions for support. This year, the sum of \$8,000 is being sought for combined budgets of all the agencies.

The Early-Bird program has resulted in substantial contributions. Good leadership has been secured again, and everyone is optimistic that the budget will be entirely underwritten.

Let's have our checks ready when solicitors call this week. Let's use our dollars to give the various organizations that work for the public good a vote of confidence and an expression of appreciation for a job well done.

The day will end with a dance of Ranger.

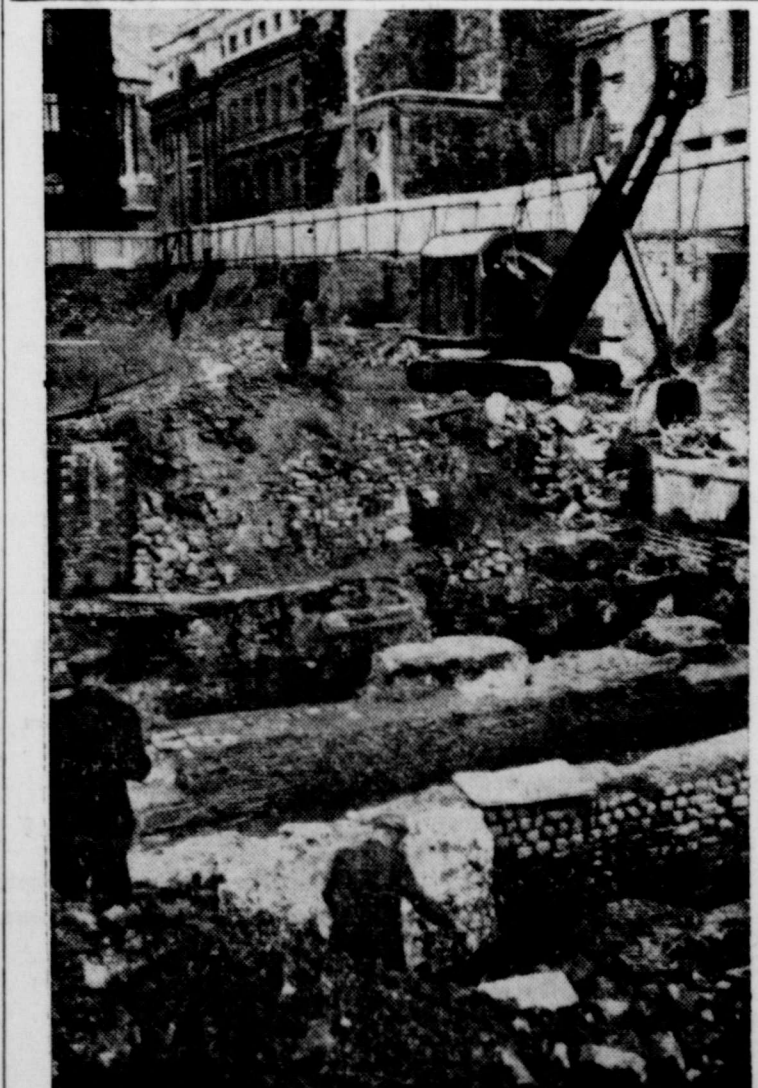

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OIL PROGRESS IN TEXAS

As Texas began to close out its 26th year as the nation's No. 1 crude oil producing state, the figures indicated that it would fall shy some 40 million barrels of the billion-barrel-a-year rates of previous three years, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Productive capacity was still there and possibly growing due to a heavy drilling program, but huge oil stocks in storage over the country were slackening demand for Texas oil, making it necessary for the Railroad Commission to hold back allowances in line with conservation laws.

U. S. crude oil production at mid-year was off some 11 million barrels from the year before, according to recently-released Bureau of Mines statistics. Texas wells at that time had flowed some 21 million barrels less than 1953's similar period.

At the same time, Texas oil men noted that production in the Rocky Mountain states and New Mexico was up nearly 13 million barrels, indicating some shifts in demand patterns.

While Texas production is accounting for some 42 per cent of U. S. crude oil flow (43.4 in 1953), it began the year with 52 per cent of the country's crude oil reserves — estimated at some 15 billion barrels.

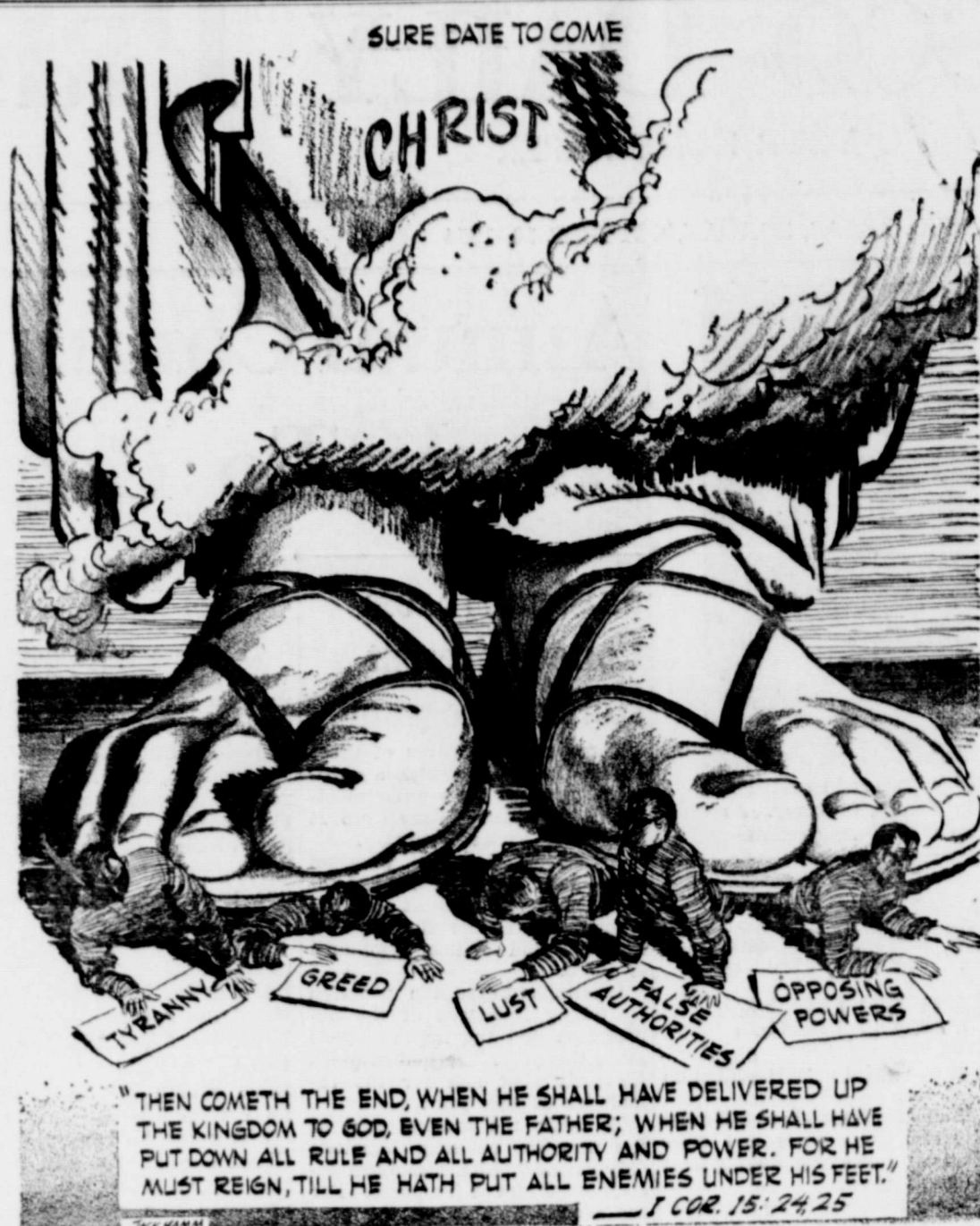
These crude oil reserves, plus another 3.2 billion barrels of liquid hydrocarbons to be extracted from natural gas, are a foundation block in the state's economy, its property values and business prospects, for many years to come. Texas now has 191 counties which produce oil and five which produce only gas. In 1953 Cullbertson, Dickens, and Ellis were added to the production schedule.

Texas has 15 fields which produced more than 10 million barrels in 1953 and 184 fields which produced more than a million barrels. There are 63 large fields which are expected to produce 100 million or more barrels during their lifetime. Output from these fields accounts for 40 per cent of the state's production.

West Texas is the state's top crude oil production area. The region produces 32.8 per cent of the state total, followed by the upper Gulf Coast with 16.1 per cent.

The more than 59,000 Texas employed in the production phase of oil and gas represent the state's highest paid industrial group. Their average weekly earnings for July 1954 amounted to \$98.11. Income from oil and gas operations means a "second crop" to many farmers, ranchers, and other landowners. Last year these Texans received more than a half-billion dollars in lease money and royalties.

Sales of Texas crude oil in 1953 were estimated to be about \$2.8 billion, topping Texas crop and livestock sales by about \$1 billion. Crude oil production is the state's largest single source of tax revenue. In 1953 Texas oil and gas producers paid the state \$146.4 million in production taxes, in addition to other state levies.



Improved Cancer Control Program Will Be Studied

WICHITA FALLS, Oct. 8.—American Cancer Society volunteers from 21 counties will meet here Wednesday, October 13, to work out plans for an improved cancer control program in West Texas.

Delegates from each of the Cancer Society's county units in District 13 of the Society's Texas Division will attend the meeting, beginning at 9 a. m. in the Kemp Hotel.

Prime aim of the meeting will be to find better methods of fighting cancer in West Texas. The delegates hope to reduce the number of cancer deaths in the 21-county area by getting the cancer message across to more West Texans this year.

Besides discussions of various ways to increase the amount of cancer education in the area, the meeting also will feature the showing of a special film on re-

cent developments in cancer research.

Included among those planning to attend the meeting are the Cancer Society's volunteer district directors for the area. They are E. R. Marchman of Graham, Mrs. A. Foy Curry of Fort Worth and Porter Brown, M. D., of Ft. Worth. Charles M. Crosswell is chairman of the Wichita County Executive Committee, host group for the meeting.

Counties in the district are Tarrant, Parker, Wise, Montague, Clay, Jack, Palo Pinto, Wichita Archer, Young, Stephens, Eastland, Callahan, Shackelford, Throckmorton, Baylor, Wilbarger, Knox, Haskell, Jones and Taylor.

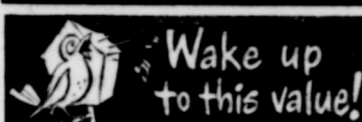

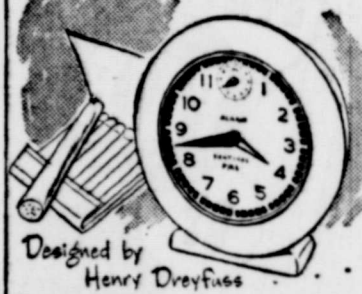

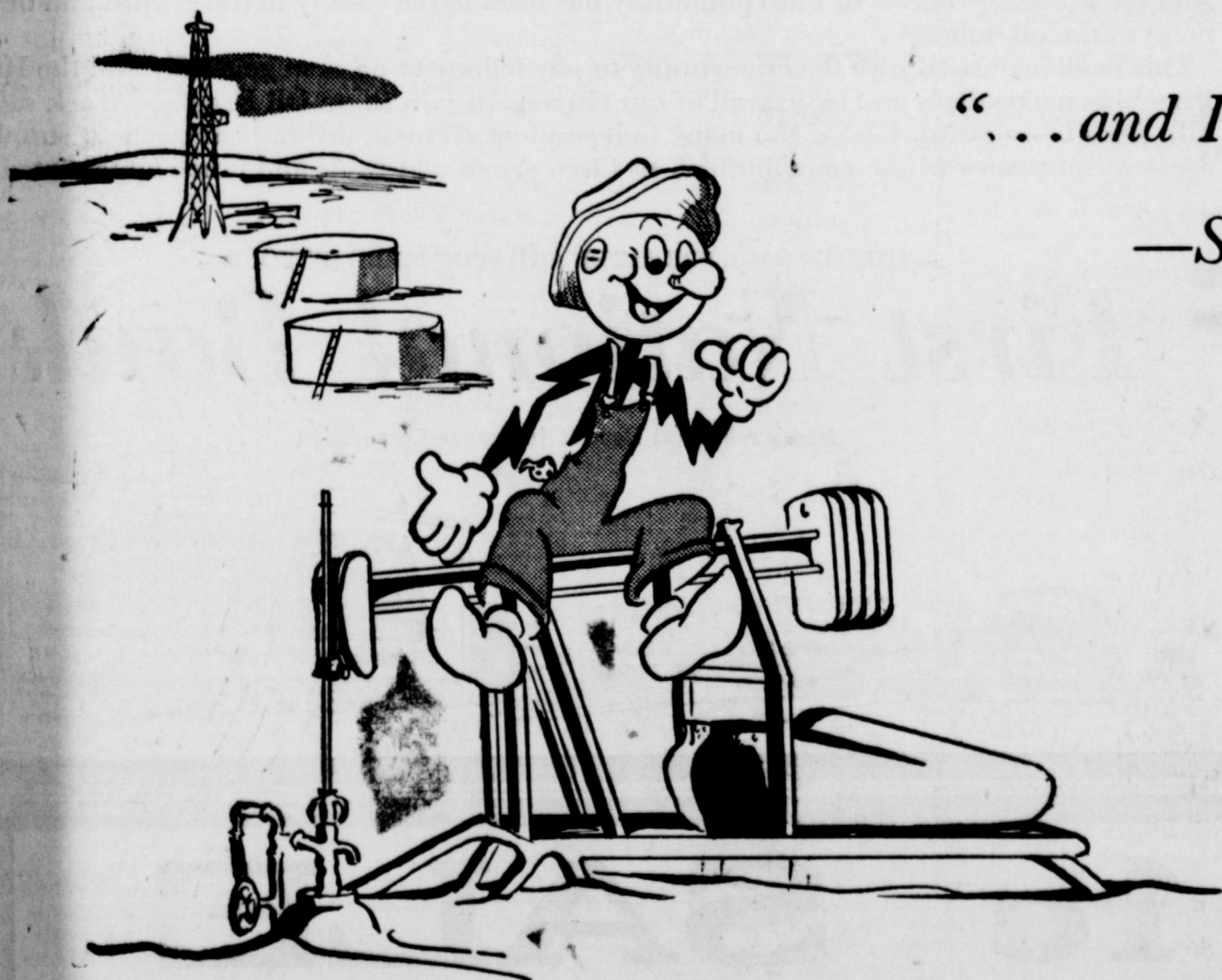

DETAILS OF FIRST PUBLIC DEER HARVEST ARE EXPECTED SOON

AUSTIN, Oct. 9. — The Assistant Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said details of Texas first free public lands deer hunt this fall cannot be announced for the time being. One of the principal reasons, he said, is that it has NOT been determined yet whether one hundred or fifty head of whitetails will be harvested. The Commission, at its recent meeting in Austin, decided that fifty bucks and fifty antlers

deer should be taken to control the big game population on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area in Kerr County.

The Commission has partial authority to regulate hunting in Kerr, Gillespie, Llano and Mason Counties under recent state legislation but its decisions are subject to approval or disapproval of local county commissioners.

Thus final plans, including the date, cannot be made for the Kerr area shoot until the Kerr

county commissioners act on whether both bucks and does may be taken.

The Kerr area comprises 6,493 acres and now has an estimated deer population of 650, about one deer per 9.7 acres. The area is on the north fork of the Guadalupe River about thirty miles west of Kerrville.

The Assistant Executive Secretary said the limited hunt had to be placed on a permit basis, similar to the drawings for antelope licenses, to fairly handle the harvest.

The shoot will be supervised by Commission personnel so that the hunting will be confined to pastures opened up for the harvest, and to reduce ordinary

hazards. The legal shooting period will be spread over sufficient time to avoid congestion. Permits will be on an individual basis without regard to group arrangements permitted under the antelope permit system.

The Kerr area, scene of the historic hunt, is one of several wildlife management areas created in key Texas regions. Thus it becomes the first to attain a game population surplus deemed to be greater than the area acreage can support.

Two primary purposes of the management area program are:

1. To provide facilities for research and adequately controlled experimental management;
2. To demonstrate to private land owners the feasibility of tested management practices. This is considered vital since Texas, traditionally lacking state lands for public hunting, maintains its big game resources mainly on a land ownership-game management basis.

Hunter harvest, therefore, is a by-product of special interest.
