Much Money Loaned In Eastland County

SAN ANTONIO, April 21—Home owners in Eastland county have received loans, for refinancing purposes, from the Home Owners Loan Corporation, amounting to \$203,179, as of January 2, 1936, according to an announcement made by H. P. Drought, state director of the National Emergency Council for Texas. This total represents 125 individual loans to home owners.

The total amount of loans closed in Texas by the Home Owners Loan Corporation, as of January 2, 1936, was \$101,823,418, representing 43,741 individual loans. Six hundred and fifty-nine applications were pending on the above date.

As of March 26, 1936, 1,000,749 loans, amounting to \$3,031,168,924 had been closed by the Home Owners Loan Corporation, throughout the United States. The average loan amounted to \$3,030. On March 26, 1936, 17,963 loan requests remained on file with the corporation.

Eastland C C Wants 'Rip' Cornerstone

Cornerstone of the Old Eastland county courthouse which Eastland citizens swear was the resting place of Old Rip for 31 years—used now as a cuspidor by tobacco chewers in the courthouse basement—will be asked for as a relic by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce commissioners' court.

A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in Eastland, called for discussion of trade extension, developed Friday night into a discussion how the city may cash in on the hibernated relic.

As citizens' imagination gained fire, suggestions were heard from many, that the relic be made into a large figure to be placed on the courthouse lawn and banner with his likeness spread from buildings that Eastland's Rip be seen by Centennial visitors.

The meeting—held at the Connelley hotel—revived the years-old difference in opinion whether the relic was actually withdrawn from the cornerstone by the late Rev. Singleton or the possibility a slight-of-hand artist fooled a doubting group of spectators.

"I was right there," Ed T. Cox, historian and long-time resident of Eastland county, exclaimed as he arose before President Hamilton McRae.

Earl Harvey, filling station operator, supported Cox's belief by saying he, too, was present and saw Rev. Singleton liberate the long-time sleeper.

Big Relief Map Is Made of Big Bend

ALPINE, Tex., April 21.—A relief map of the 800,000 acres that would be included in the proposed Big Bend National Park of Texas, is to be made by technicians of the National Park Service. This bird's-eye view of the entire area will permit of detailed study in the selection of sites for roads, trails, and other developments that will be undertaken in event of the park's creation, dependent upon lands being ceded by the state to the federal government. It will also serve as a guide for visitors to the various points of interest.

The map will be approximately twenty by thirty feet, and will be of permanent construction. Its making will require the time of four men over a period of about six months. The work will be done in a temporary laboratory-museum building that has been constructed in the Chisos Mountains, near the Civilian Conservation Corps Camp, out of Marathon.

In addition to the map makers, an assistant geologist and other technicians are being assigned to the area to collect, classify, and assemble specimens. These will form the nucleus of a collection for a permanent museum building, which would be a part of the park development.

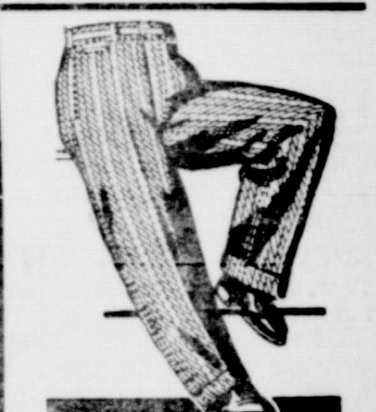

The Danger Speed

If the automobile industry wins its case for motor cars capable of speeds from 80 to 100 miles an hour, it will apparently do so without the support of more than two-thirds of the people of the United States.

The Automobile Manufacturers' Association, in its report to Secretary of Commerce Daniel Roper, contends that 90 per cent of all accidents occur at speeds of less than 50 miles an hour. But a recent poll conducted by the magazine Fortune reports that 70.3 per cent of the public favors limitation of the speed of the automobile, to say, 50 miles an hour.

In the final analysis, it would appear that the great majority of the public is justified in scenting danger in the ultra-speedy motor car. For one thing, the problem of the intoxicated driver is more and more to be reckoned with. And, in any event, the human equation is too highly uncertain to justify unlimited speed.

The Professor Now Wins

With the advent of the "brain trust" under the new deal and the consequent ridicule and criticism that followed, the dignity of the college professor suffered a severe drubbing.

But now the picture has changed appreciably—so much, in fact, that the republican opposition has hired a brain trust of its own. The best minds of many colleges now are being enlisted by the G. O. P. to get on the trail of government problems, with a view to finding just how the machine runs and how it can be improved.

Now, whether you ascribe this latest triumph of the professors to politics or just sheer force of knowledge, it at least ought to stop the jokes about brain trusters. And, after all, isn't it logical to assume that these college heads can fill useful public roles.

Each has devoted years to the study of taxation, economics, social sciences, and political economy. It is significant that both parties now are asking their aid.

Dryest Year on Record in Southwest

A weather bureau survey on April 15 said that Kansas, from January to April 15 has been the driest on record with only about 30 per cent of normal rainfall for the three and one-half months. In Oklahoma rainfall has been only approximately one-fifth of normal while Texas has had only 37 per cent of normal rainfall for the three and one-half months. In Missouri the first three months were reported the driest since 1918. What has become of the ancient rainmakers and what has become of their more modern brethren? If there is money in the rain-making game, a vast territory threatened with drought invites the coming of messiahs of moisture.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON—The impeachment trial of a federal district judge by the Senate calls attention to the judicial process and the way it sometimes operates in the lower reaches of the federal courts.

Appointments to the district bench are political ones and the appointees usually have political backgrounds. Senators of the party in power have the most important voice in those appointments.

While District Judge Halsted L. Ritter of Florida was trying to explain to the Senate why he received money from a lawyer to whom he had assigned a receivership, Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes of the U. S. Supreme Court stepped into a cockeyed situation in Detroit, where several other district judges play important roles.

THE government went to the circuit court of appeals, charging more than 30 prejudicial errors in O'Brien's charge to the jury. It also alleged that O'Brien was personally involved, because his wife was in debt to one of the banks and facing suit by its receiver because she had recovered collateral on certain loans without paying off certain other loans in the bank.

15 000 Wells To Be Drilled, Test Flow

Approximately 15,000 water wells will be mapped and tested in 18 counties in this section in order to determine the depth at which water can be obtained as well as the quantity of water. Samuel F. Turner, statewide technical director of

the underground water survey, announces. The project is made possible by WPA funds and is sponsored by the Texas board of water engineers in co-operation with the United States geological survey.

"The depth and size of the well, the thickness of the water-bearing sands it penetrates the depth of the water tract when the well has not been pumped for a considerable time and the amount of the pumping draft, will be thoroughly investigated," Turner stated.

"We have arranged with Dr. E. P. Schoch of the University of Texas to analyze the water of each well with regard to its suitability for domestic, stock, irrigation and industrial use."

In addition to charting existing wells, Turner said, numerous test pits will be made to determine the permeability of soils and sub-soils to ascertain their capacity to absorb water from rainfall.

MUCH INTEREST IN TEXAS NAVY IS MANIFESTED

Facts concerning the actual existence and movements of a Texas navy have until recently been the secret of a handful of Texas historians. Plans for the celebration of the Texas Centennial, however, have caused lay minds to develop a historical inquisitiveness about the early incidents that molded the Texas of today. Also encouraging this desire to ferret out long-forgotten Lone Star tales is a current newspaper contest based on nine mementous questions dealing with important events in Texas history. Details of this contest are outlined in weekly advertisements published in Texas newspapers. Advertisements announcing subsequent contests in the series of nine will appear regularly in this paper. A current contest question deals with the Texas navy and in particular with the famous "sloop of war Austin."

Back in 1835, when the wrecking upheaval of revolution was cutting deep into Texas life and property, the provisional government employed a strategic move to acquire the so-called Texas navy. Realizing the efficacy of a small armed fleet for scouting and disciplinary purposes in southern waters, but lacking the necessary funds to put such a fleet into action, the government issued letters of marque and reprisal to private ship owners, giving them the legal right to "pervent invasion by sea" and to "blockade the Mexican ports and destroy her commerce." Activities of such ships, invaluable to the successful completion of the war, included breaking up a blockade of the Texas ports and averting an attempt to close the New Orleans boat lines.

Purchase by the republic of two brigs, three schooners, a sloop and a steamer in 1840 appreciably swelled the small but effective navy, lent in that year to the Mexican states of Yucatan and Tabasco, which were revolting against the central government. This expedition to undermine the Mexican government, by allying insubordinate states with Texas, proved so profitable that for nearly three years the fleet operated in this way on a free-lance basis. The famous sloop of war Austin, about which legendary tales of great battles and heroic service are told, was one of the most gallant performers in this fleet.

In 1843 President Houston ordered the navy to return to home port, but Commodore Moore, leader of the fleet, having promised assistance to his friends in Yucatan, disobeyed the governmental command and sailed once more into tropical waters. The enraged President officially suspended Moore from command and issued a proclamation requesting all navies afloat to look out for the runaway fleet and seize the "post Captain Moore and bring him and the ships into Galveston so that the culprits could be adequate, ly punished." Commodore Moore, after paying his debt to his friends, returned home voluntarily. Texans acclaimed him a hero, and, and, though court martialled, he was acquitted.

This incident witnessed the virtual end of the Texas navy's active service. Its vessels were beached and suffered from dry rot and decay. Those that were still on hand were turned over to the United States at the time of the annexation three years later.

Pensions For Aged Are Sadly Neglected

DALLAS, April 21.—Tom F. Hunter of Wichita Falls, twice a strong candidate for governor and runner-up in the close campaign two years ago, entered the race for the governorship a third time in a formal announcement of his candidacy issued here.

Hunter, an aggressive campaigner, launched his campaign with a sharp arraignment of what he characterized as Governor James V. Allred's "callous neglect of the old people of Texas" with reference to the old age pension law. Terms Hunter applied were "shameful" and "outrageous."

The formal statement of announcement confined itself largely to a caustic review of Governor Allred's record. Hunter explaining that a forthcoming statement would take up specifically the principles and policies he will champion in his forthcoming campaign.

The announcement of his candidacy follows:
"A lead horse that never presses the collar can't guide the string, and by that old saying, I am reminded of young Governor Jimmie. As an economic leader Jimmie Allred is a social laugh—except to the old folks. To them he is a heart-ache."

"This is not my opinion alone. Five weeks on the road checking sentiment from both those that supported me, and many who did not, conclusively shows that today the majority believes the election of Jaunty Jimmie was a mistake. It takes more than a personable young fellow forever off on some jaunt or other to guide the business of state government."

"From all sections I am told that the people now realize that the spending of an enormous slush fund in behalf of Allred during the closing days of the campaign two years ago took away from the friends of my program a victory they had won. The knowledge of that fact alone will, this time, galvanize my supporters' into a statewide determined organization reinforced by recruits from former Allred voters who realize their error. I am,

therefore, a candidate for governor.

"My position on public questions and the social welfare of the people is well known. I am instinctively in sympathy with the plain people and the unprivileged, and from time to time as the campaign progresses I shall discuss the urgent issues on which Jaunty Jimmie has proved so vacillating. And I shall insist that it is the governor's obligation to be a governor at the seat of government, not a glorified drum major leading a tournament of roses."

"An executive in Austin only two days or so a week is only a week-end governor—and pretty weak at that. He can hardly be expected to know what it is all about. The first office of Texas entails constantly weighty duties and one should be on the job in person for a study and a performance of those duties. As governor I will stay in the state and on the job except when duties require my service elsewhere."

I shall be generous and divide honors when ribbons are to be cut at bridge openings, school parades are to be led, and when some of our thousands of beautiful queens are to be crowned. I will not be a galling, galling governor."

"In the last campaign I was the target for a tremendous barrage of false propaganda and personal abuse unleashed through the use of great sums of money. This bludge was spread by hired calumniators, was circulated in tons of printed matter and broadcast over expensive statewide networks. Yet I bear no rancor, nurse no grudge, although I was hurt. A blow below the belt is a shock to a man's sense of what is just, and my good wife and our children suffered this hurt with me. It has been my experience that one will mistake facts in order to gain your confidence will misuse you while he has that confidence. I feel certain a great many voters made that discovery too late. There is only gall in fat promises unkept."

"Within a few days I shall discuss the old age pension amendment. I think it is about time that somebody recalls that the people demanded it in the most widely popular constitutional poll on record. But sometimes young fellows have short memories and need a little

jogging up, and I shall have something to do about that. It is shameful that one in high office should make a political football of depleted lives and poverty in the twilight of life. Every person with a gleam of conscience should receive this social insurance, or such it is, rather than a pension. Allred's callous neglect of the old people of Texas is outrageous! He should shudder to be alone with his conscience."

"When the occasion warrants I shall make myself plain and understood on other public issues of current importance. You may be sure I will not equivocate. I never have and I am too set in my ways to change a lifelong habit of candor."

"It will be impossible for me to make a campaign with all the hoopla and tub thumping characteristic of the kind of circus maximus conducted by Jaunty Jimmie and his troupe. I have no such source of money, but neither have I any 'obligations' in hamstringing me or cramping my style in doing so far as in my ability—the most good for the greatest number."

"To study and solve problems of interest and benefit to my government and my people have always been my greatest pleasure, and I hope that it will be afforded me hereafter in larger measure than possible to me as a private citizen. As governor I shall seek sound counsel when in doubt, and I shall never turn my back on sincere suggestions or views opposed to my own. I shall probably make mistakes, but they will be mistakes of commission, not omission, for I shall never be guilty of inaction and procrastination nor will I evade expressing my views on all matters of state."

"The place for a governor is in the governor's office, and his first duty is application to the business and best interests which he is under oath to serve, namely, Texas and its people. Nothing could be more appealing to a governor with the welfare of the people as a whole at heart. It may be depended upon, therefore, that I shall stay in the governor's office with the doors propped wide so that the people interested in state government may find me ever at their service."

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, April 21.—(AP)—One
of the Texas' biggest experiments
in government will be at a close to-
day hence, with only a few wind-
up phases and the paying off of
about \$18,000,000 state debt it
created left for the future. This
is the direct relief program. Federal
money as such has been termi-
nated. The state back odds and
ends of its own money, and will
grant some small subsidies for spe-
cial purposes during the final
close-out. Relief

was made possible by changing the
Texas constitution, to permit the
issuance of bonds and the spending
of money for relief, or giving it
for food and clothing bought with it,
to individuals. Then a \$20,000,000
relief bond issue was voted, and the
money made available along with
federal funds, to meet the acute
emergency of unemployment.

Cover 1,000,000, or one-sixth of the
Texas population, were receiving
direct relief at the peak.

But the state spent only about
one-fifth of the total relief outlay
in Texas, which ran close to \$10-
000,000. The federal government
chipped in about \$4 for every dol-
lar contributed by the state setting
its money back by taxing Texans
as well as the rest of the American
people.

The remarkable thing about this
most exceptional departure in Texas
history was that the state was
able to turn back. The legislature
of 1935 refused to submit any fur-
ther bond issue amendment, and the
state, along with the federal govern-
ment, resolutely set about the
program that is now being attain-
ed, of closing the books and end-
ing the direct relief grants.
