GERMANY TO BE PERMANENTLY QUARANTINED

US. SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT TO BE RETAINED

WACO, Dec. 2.—Americans are fighting in many parts of the world for the same principles for which Masonry stands, United States Senator Tom Connally told the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas at its 108th grand communication last night.

"In America, Masonry and liberty have been comrades in the erection and maintenance of the institutions of freedom," said Connally in an address before representatives of the 112,000 Texas Masons in the grand lodge temple.

"Just as America is the hope of the world for the maintenance of constitutional government and security of liberty to the people of the earth, so is Masonry in the United States the hope of our brothers in foreign lands."

Connally, chairman of the important senate foreign relations committee, declared that in the peace settlements this nation must acquire permanent air and naval bases in the Pacific and the Atlantic for adequate defenses. He said there is no danger of domestic measures taken during wartime bringing about a change in the nation's system of government.

"War regulations are irritating and annoying, but fears that this country will go Socialistic or get away from fundamental principles are erroneous," Connally said. "When the war is over we will get back on rock-bottom constitutional government."

DON'T FORGET SCARRED VETS OF LAST WAR

Continuing, the chairman said: "Among the many incapacitated veterans there are men who do not have money to purchase small remembrances for their families. It gives them great happiness and peace of mind to be able to remember their loved ones with Christmas presents. Hence, the gift shop came into being. Each member of the Legion and Auxiliary is asked to bring gifts suitable for the families of the veterans. The men who need these gifts usually have four to eight children. Please do not wrap the gifts. The men are allowed to select and wrap presents for their families themselves. Members who cannot come to the party are urged to send gifts."

"In the stress of the present great conflict, let us not forget the men who are the wrecks of the last great war."

OBSCENE LETTER WRITER GOES TO JAIL

FT. WORTH, Dec. 2.—Herbert W. Talliaferro, 65-year-old Riverside sand pit operator, today being serving a 30-day jail sentence imposed in federal district court after he pleaded not guilty to a charge of sending lewd, obscene and lascivious letters through the mail.

Federal Judge James C. Wilson sentenced the man to 30 days, and placed him on three-year probation after the jury found him guilty of writing the letters to Miss Octavia Cunningham of Co-manche. The man admitted writing the letters, but protested that they were not obscene.

SOCIAL SECURITY PLANNING

Lion M. D. Fox had charge of the program at the Lions luncheon Wednesday, introducing J. B. Calvert of the Social Security office at Abilene, who spoke on proposed amendments to be acted on at the next congress session.

Mrs. Edward Lee spoke briefly for the Reg Cross, asking that Lions aid in buying Christmas presents for soldiers in Camp Bowie hospital. The club voted to sponsor this move instead of the usual custom of Lions giving each other Christmas presents. President R. W. McCauley announced that C. B. Shaw, Geo. W. Downie and G. P. Mitcham, of the military affairs committee would have charge of the funds.

Charles W. Thomas of the Cisco Egg and Poultry company was introduced as a guest by Jack Anderson.

It was announced that a group of members had visited Lion Charles S. Sandler who is confined to his bed by illness, thus taking the club to him since he was not able to attend. It will be remembered that Lion Sandler was recently awarded a 10-year pin by Lions International for a perfect attendance for that period of time.

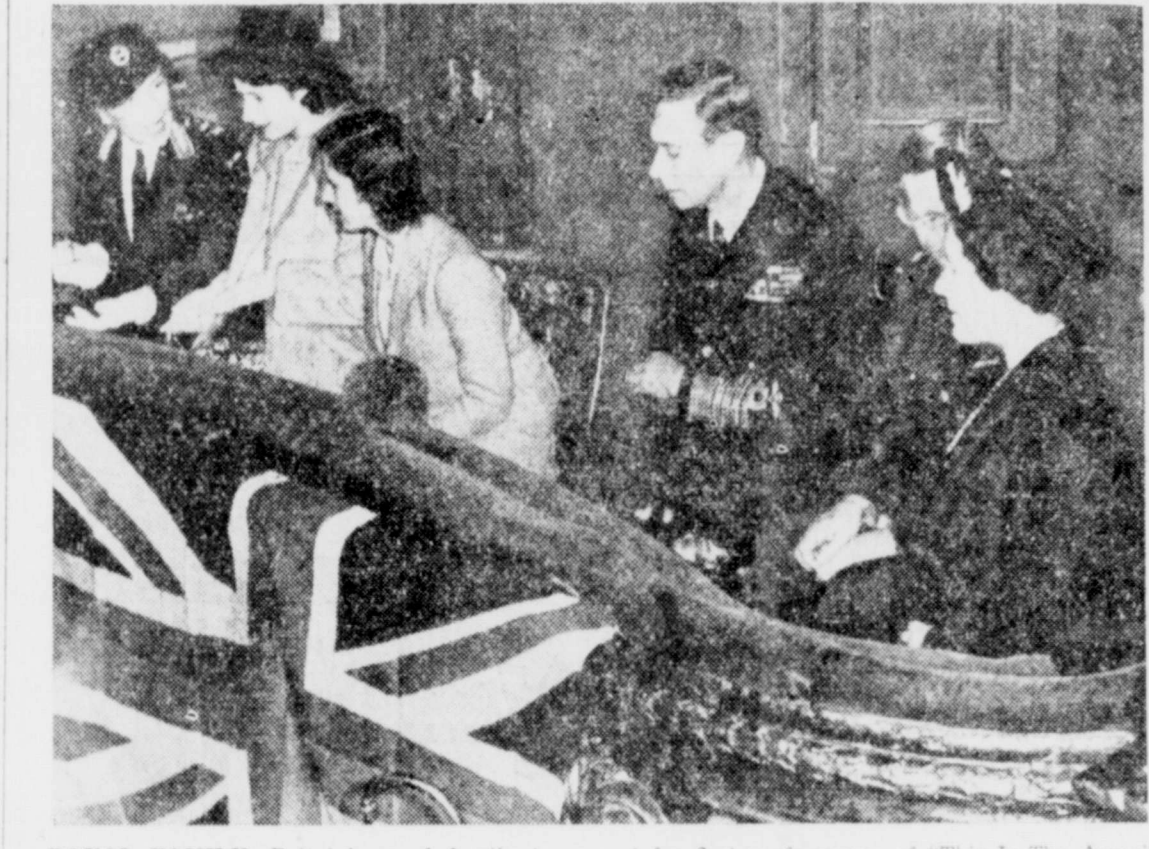
Socialized medicine is being planned and discussed, Calvert said, but since the medical association and a large portion of the public is opposed to the plan, it was doubtful if it would be accepted.

TO HASTEN THE WAR ON ALL FRONTS

LONDON, Dec. 2.—President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, while charting a plan with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek to beat down Japan, apparently have synchronized their global strategy to hasten the war on all fronts.

An agreement with Premier Stalin on co-ordinated blows to knock out Germany first is expected to follow the Cairo announcement before long. There is a feeling that the much-predicted psychological offensive aimed at "softening" the Germans will be launched within a few days.

Gratification was expressed in Chinese and various European quarters in London at the declared determination to strip Japan of all the territories she has seized as the first approach to post-war planning for the Far East.

HOGS POUR IN TO MARKET AS NEVER BEFORE

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Pork glutted the livestock marketing centers of the nation at their opening today as additional animals poured in on a holdover of nearly 100,000 hogs for which there was no sale Wednesday.

The congestion developed as winter marketing of hogs reached its peak and was the greatest in the history of the packing industry.

The holdover of about 15,000 hogs on the Chicago market alone was worth nearly \$500,000, with the aggregate value of those still to be sold before today's run started estimated at about \$3,000,000.

ROUTE TO RA-BAUL IS NOW UNDR CONTROL

SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, Dec. 2.—American warships bombarded Madang, New Guinea, and Gasimata, New Britain, for the first time Monday night, serving notice on the Japanese that the Allies now control the southwestern invasion route toward Rabaul, a message revealed today.

In their deepest penetration of waters once controlled by the Japanese in the Southwest Pacific, the vessels steamed through the seas between the two islands to carry out the attacks which, in effect, cut vital enemy supply lines.

ENJOYED TURKEY DINNER.

Roy Byron Boyd, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sebe Boyd of Cisco, writes to his parents from the naval receiving barracks at Shafter, Calif., that he is getting along nicely. As evidence, the Cisco boy enclosed a copy of the Thanksgiving dinner menu at the barracks, which included roast young turkey and all the fixings. Boyd, who attended the Cisco schools, has been in the navy about sixteen months.

ROOSEVELT, STALIN, CHURCHILL ARE AT TEHERAN, PERSIA, ARRANGING FINAL NAZI OBSEQUIES

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Premier Josef Stalin, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Franklin D. Roosevelt are conferring in Teheran today and observers believe they are mapping a post-war program to quarantine Germany and saddle her manpower, raw materials and production for rebuilding stricken Europe.

Through such a program, observers were convinced, the "Big Three" Allied western powers plan to punish Germany and smash her ability to make future wars as completely as Mr. Roosevelt, Churchill and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek plotted the crushing of Japan at Cairo.

There was no official confirmation of the whereabouts of Mr. Roosevelt and Churchill since their departure from Cairo for an "unknown destination" following the Anglo-American-Chinese conference, but a dispatch published in a Lisbon newspaper reported they already had begun conversations with Stalin in Teheran, capital of Iran (Persia).

American congressional circles accepted reports of a Roosevelt-Churchill conference with Stalin as completely factual.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and Madame Chiang also have arrived in Teheran from Cairo, a German DNB dispatch received in Lisbon said, but there was considerable doubt that the Chinese president would participate in any conference involving Russia, since the Soviets still maintain relations with Japan.

Laurence Steinhardt, U. S. ambassador to Turkey, was reported by Lisbon also to have flown to Teheran. There has been widespread speculation that the Allies may prevail upon Turkey to grant them bases for an Anglo-American invasion to liberate the Balkans in conjunction with a Soviet drive from the southern Ukraine.

If later developments confirm Stalin's presence at a conference with Roosevelt and Churchill, it will be the first time in 31 years that the Soviet leader has left the borders of Russia.

"Second front" considerations were expected to play little part in any Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin meeting, since it can be assumed that Anglo-American plans for an invasion of western Europe at the earliest possible moment already are well advanced. The approximate date of the invasion presumably was conveyed to Russia by U. S. Secretary of State Cordell Hull and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden during the tri-power conference at Moscow.

Instead, the three heads of state probably will fix the approximate terms for Germany's unconditional surrender and post-war treatment so that the Allies will not be caught without adequate plans in the event of Germany's sudden and unexpected collapse from within, as they were when Italy surrendered.

NAZI RETREAT O'DANIEL ASKS FROM WINTER 50-CENT CRUDE LINE IN ITALY OIL INCREASE

ALGIERS, Dec. 2.—Driven from the Adriatic end of their heavily fortified winter line the Germans were in retreat before the British 8th Army today, abandoning great quantities of equipment after suffering heavy casualties and losing more than 1,000 prisoners.

"On the 8th Army front our troops have broken through the enemy positions. The Germans are in full retreat," said a report from Allied headquarters.

"Reinforcements are being brought up by the Germans from Northern Italy," the communique added, "in an effort to halt the break through."

The town of Rocca San Giovanni, two miles inland from the Adriatic and more than four miles beyond the Sangro, was overrun in Montgomery's "colossal crack" at the Nazis across battlefields littered with Nazi guns and great quantities of smashed equipment.

FIVE IN A WEEK.

WACO, Dec. 2.—The bodies of Pvt. Boyd G. Collins, his wife and their small son were found in their apartment here, bringing to five the number of asphyxiation deaths in Waco this week. Two Camp Hood soldiers were asphyxiated in a tourist camp.

TOTAL CASUALTIES.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Secretary of War Stimson said today that U. S. Army casualties from the beginning of the war to Nov. 15 were 94,918, bringing the total announced casualties for all branches of the armed forces to 126,969.

MAKING GENERALS PAY.

In punishing German war criminals, if the future is anything like the past, the generals will escape scot free. Many generals have died in battle, and perhaps still more in bed. Hardly any have been executed for misdeeds in time of war.

Almost the only general who was executed for any reason was Ney, the brilliant marshal of Napoleon, who called him "the bravest of the brave." He was shot by the Bourbon king of France for leading an uprising in behalf of Napoleon—in other words, for treason.

Presumably the reason why generals have enjoyed this immunity is that they have been considered mere agents, not responsible for the orders they carried out. Nevertheless, it would be a healthy thing if some of the Nazi commanders who have been particularly cruel to the peoples at their mercy should be made to pay the penalty. Even if he is a general, there are limits beyond which an honorable man cannot go.

REAL ESTATE TAXES.

Real estate taxes throughout this country need overhauling, according to Myers Y. Cooper, former governor of Ohio and president of the national council of real estate taxpayers. A fairer and sounder system is necessary if Americans are to continue as a home-owning nation.

"The property tax has become the burden bearer of the entire system," he explains. "Real estate carries anywhere from 60 to 90 per cent of the cost of local government today. A fair real estate tax system is important to our whole economy. Property undergirds all true values. Every financial institution in the land is dependent directly or indirectly on the credit of sound property values."

He urges the adoption of corrective legislation now before congress, in the form of the Coffee resolution and the Angell bill. He believes in taxation of government-owned property on the same basis as private property, thus eliminating inequalities, and an over-all limitation on property taxes in states not possessing this safeguard.

There is something in these proposals. Far too much property today goes tax-free merely because it is used in public service to some extent, and is thus allowed to impose an unfair burden on competitive private property. This tendency grows rapidly with the extension of government ownership to so many kinds of enterprise that were formerly private.

WAR-TIME DRIVING.

Recent estimates are discouraging for people who have been hoping to buy new automobiles next year. For quite a while yet the factories will be turning out planes instead of cars. The experts are not expecting a wave of new cars until year after next.

When this fact is digested, a few million citizens may decide to make the best of things and keep the old car in commission, or restore it to use if it has been laid up. The car, like its owner, is apt to deteriorate more rapidly in idleness than when it's working. There is no good reason why most cars should not be driven for really useful purposes. If people generally will practice such a policy, instead of letting cars rust and rot, it may amount to a saving of two or three billion dollars a year, not to mention the incidental convenience.

No joy-riding, though, and no lawless speeding! And for the tires' sake, no jerky starting and stopping, and no whirling around corners.

CHRISTMAS SHOPPING.

Many people did the overseas shopping and mailing in time to get the gifts to the boys and girls by Christmas, then sat down and drew a long breath with the feeling that the rest could wait. But the waiting time is now over. Never did the shopping need early doing so much, because deliveries and mails are so over-burdened. Salespeople are scarce as well as mailmen, delivery trucks and drivers. So—the sooner the better.

There are always bonds and stamps. But even those need early buying, for the lines at bank and postoffice are already lengthening. No one need be ashamed to give so small a gift as a book with a few small stamps starting the first page. That's especially fine for children or for young people earning early and just beginning to save. It gives them the start of a good habit, which is worth as much or more than the present itself. And any gift which helps the nation as well as the recipient is a gift worth while.

Of course, if you have more money than you need for a few stamps, there's nothing like the crackle of a crisp fat bond in the Christmas stocking.

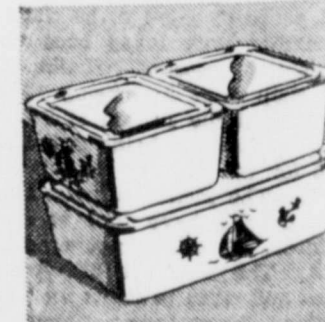

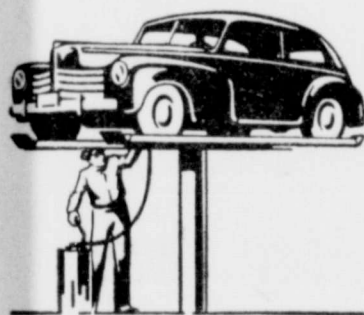

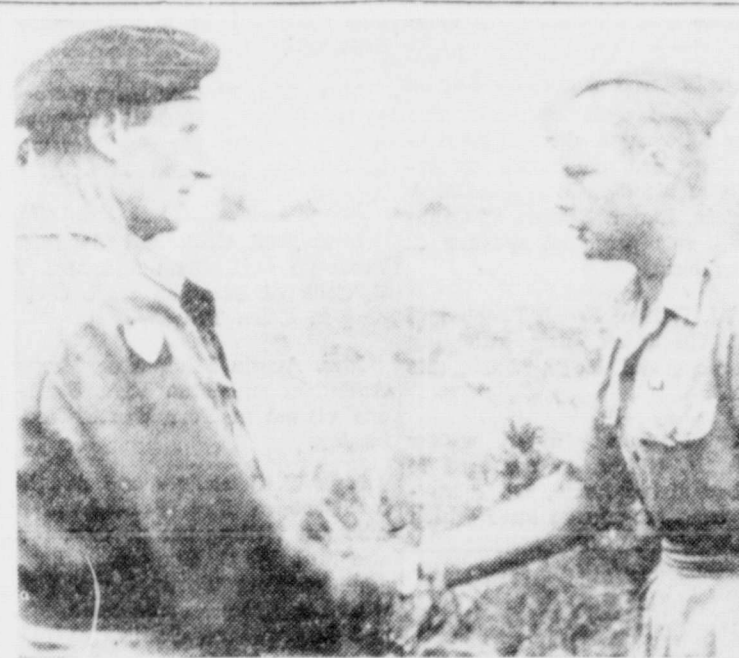

The bride wore a white two-piece suit with black accessories and a camelia corsage.

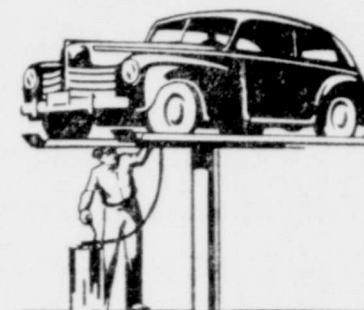

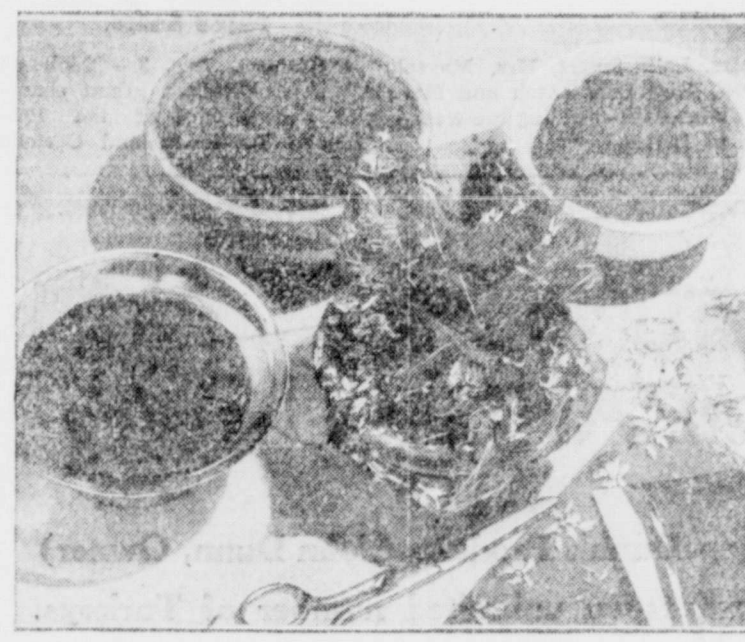

Coffee Fig Pudding

- 3 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 2 teaspoons alfalfa
- 1 cup molasses
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 cup cut figs
- 1 cup seedless raisins
- 1 cup ground nut
- 1/2 cups coffee
- 1 cup molasses

Mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Add fruit. Add molasses and coffee to suit, mix well and stir in flour-fruit mixture. Place in 5 or 6 small greased bowls or molds, cover tightly and steam 2 1/2 hours. Remove covers and cool. Recover until ready to steam for use. If puddings are to be kept for more than a few days, they should be placed in the refrigerator. Yield: About 20 servings.
