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Dove Hunters

Farmers and stockmen in this area are making it hard on the dove hunters. In other years watering places for doves were scarce and all one had to do to get his lawful limit was to sit down at one of those too few water holes.

Now there are so many good stock tanks with plenty of water, despite the most terrible drought old timers ever remember, that dove hunters have to get out and walk 'em up.

A stockman friend, who shall go unnamed here, planted and grazed oats last year, and the broom weeds were knee high. It was a dove hunter's paradise. Doves could not see the hunter until he got close, and then they would flush like quail, giving him a chance to kill one, two or three on the rise, depending upon his shooting ability.

But that stockman friend cut those broom weeds a few weeks ago and ruined the best dove-hunting spot in the county. Now the doves get up out of gun range and one gets an occasional shot at a cross country flier.

Do you know how fast a dove flies? Between 50 and 60 miles an hour. Aside from a Blue-winged Teal duck, he is about the fastest thing in the air. If it is a cross shot you lead him 12 to 15 feet and keep swinging as you pull the trigger if you expect to hit.

Some people don't like the idea of killing doves. Some call them mourning doves, due to their mournful song. Others say turtle doves. They are a species of the pigeon family. In Christian symbolism they represent the Holy Spirit and if memory serves well, it was Noah who sent out a pair of doves that brought back evidence that the flood was over and that water had receded. The dove is also a symbol of peace, along with the olive branch.

We didn't intend to write a thesis on doves, when we started this, along with a little humor that was supposed to point up better stock raising conditions, but we will print what has been written.

Red River County
Ag Leaders Seek
Drought Help

Red River County agricultural leaders Friday counted a heavy drought toll and forwarded an urgent request to have the county designated a drought stricken area.

If approved, the county would become eligible to participate in federal assistance on livestock and dairy feeds.

The request was initiated by the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee and signed by representatives of farm agencies.

Statements from bankers and dairy association officials also were included with the application to point up the critical situation in Red River County due to the summer drought.

There were hopes action would come before the Department of Agriculture releases another list of counties eligible for drought relief programs.

County Agent Herman Lynch explained the county had received no effective rainfall since late May. Bogata, Rugby, Box Elder, Whitetown and Davenport, representing a complete cross section of Red River County, report insufficient moisture over the three months period.

Brown, Donna, grandfather of the bride.

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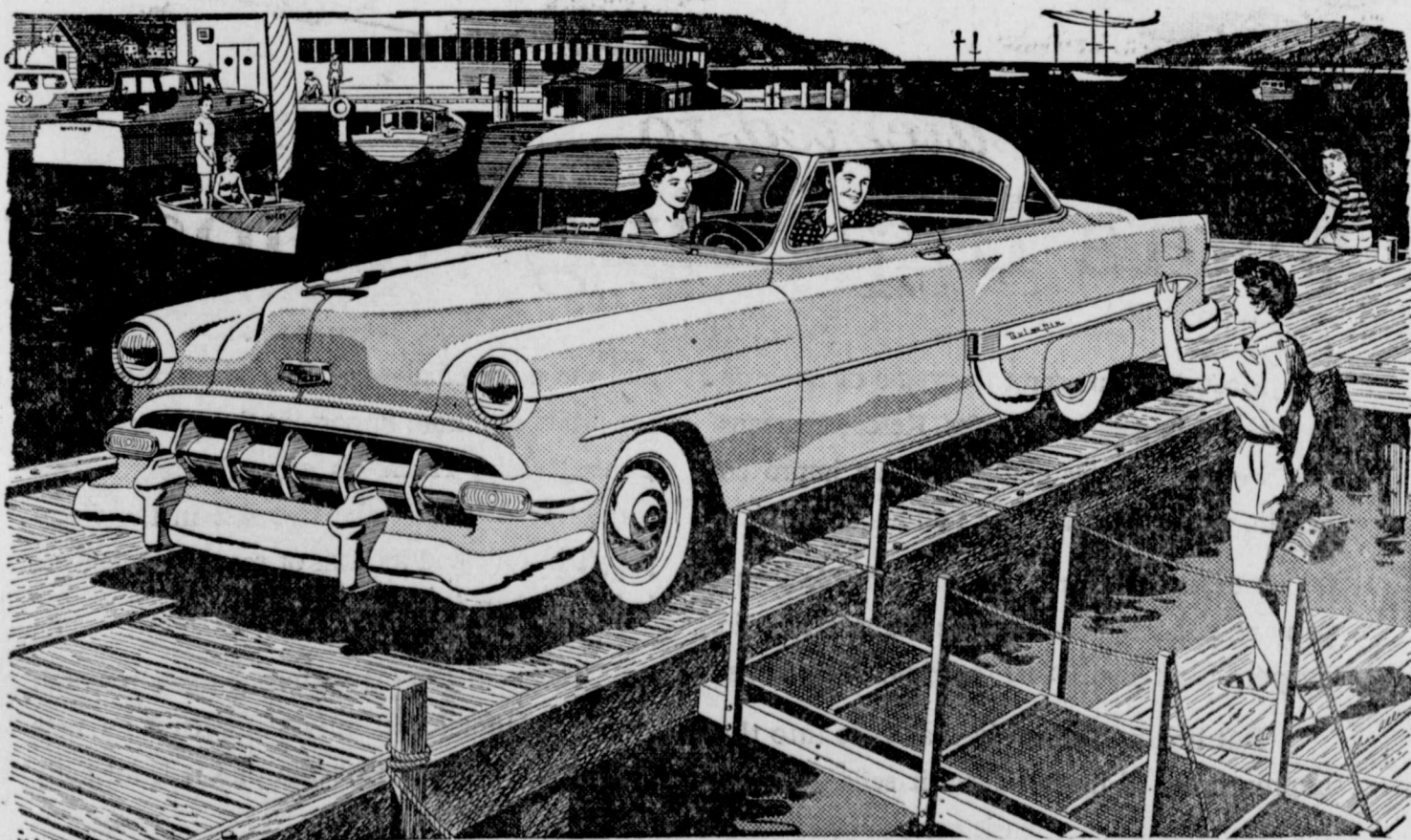
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Wants Government to Gain Diplomatic Victory Over Him European Style

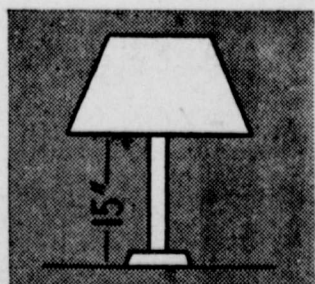

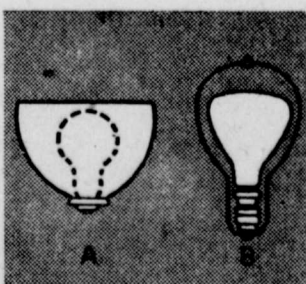

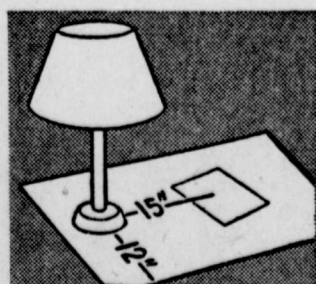
Homework is finished faster and more accurately when the study light is right. Give your children the advantage of good light for home study this easy three-step way. Then watch their grades improve!

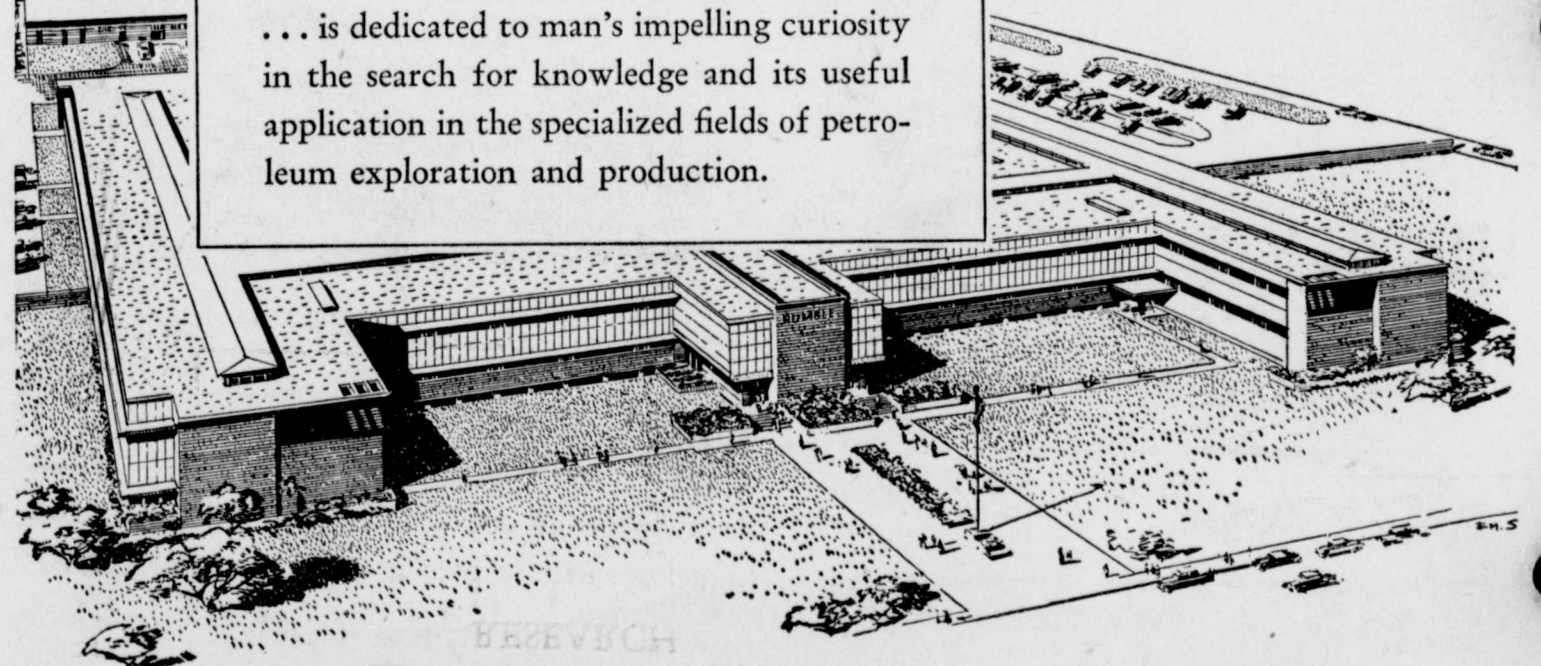
3 Place the lamp 12" from front of desk or table and 15" to left of work center. For a left-handed student place lamp at right.
