Talco State Loans Deposits, Profits, Resources Up

Talco State Bank experienced one of the best years in the history of the bank, according to comparison of financial statements published in this newspaper. Deposits, loans, resources and undivided profits all increased in 1965 over that of 1964.

Talco State went over the one and one-half million mark in deposits during the year 1965. The statement of condition of the bank published as of December 31, 1965 reflected deposits totaling \$1,545,715.11.

Deposits now are \$1,545,715.11 compared to \$1,096,203.39 at end of 1964, an increase of \$449,511.72.

Loans increased \$96,303.57 the past year, being \$697,821.94 last year compared to \$601,518.37 in 1964.

Resources climbed \$456,890.07 during the year. In 1964 they were \$1,238,824.83 and now are \$1,695,714.90.

Undivided profits are also up, being \$63,713.10 at year's end compared to \$51,935.48 at end of 1964, an increase of \$11,777.62.

One of the best girls basketball games ever witnessed in these parts was a star attraction Monday night, when the Deport Tigerettes and Rivercrest Rebelettes fought it out for the fourth time in Deport gym before a packed house. Deport had won out in close game the three previous performances but Rivercrest came to try to even the odds on Monday night and handed Deport their first loss of the season—game No. 25—by a score of 51-50.

Deport pulled out to a 12-3 lead in the first quarter and had slight edge most of the first half but Rivercrest pulled even at 28-28 at half-time. Not more than three points separated the team most of the remainder of the game and Deport had a three point lead near the end of the game, but with seconds left on the clock Rivercrest had a 51-50 lead. Deport got possession with about four seconds remaining and Rhonda Allen tried one of her famous game-winning pre-buzzer shots which bounced off, giving Rivercrest the one-point margin of victory, 51-50.

It was a great defensive battle between two of the best girls teams in this area and both teams and their coaches are to be commended for a well played and most enjoyable ball game.

Area Banks Show Deposit Increases

According to bank statements published in this newspaper the past two weeks, this area is in good financial condition. Deposits in banks have shown a substantial increase the past year.

Total deposits in Lamar County's five banks, three in Paris—Citizens State, The Liberty National and The First National—the First National Bank of Roston and the First National in Deport, were up over the previous year.

Total deposits in the five banks at the close of business at the end of last year were \$35,479,436.56 compared to \$31,101,747.49 at the end of 1964.

Also showing increases in deposits were the First National Bank at Bogata, and the Talco State Bank in Talco.

At Bogata's First National deposits increased \$264,580.77, being \$2,016,915.36 at end of 1965 compared to \$1,752,334.59 at the same time in 1964.

Talco State Bank showed an increase of \$449,511.72 over the figure of 1964, according to comparative statements. At the end of 1964 deposits were \$1,096,203.39 compared to \$1,545,715.11 at close of 1965.

All banks report better business conditions as an explanation for the increase in the economy.

Information On Social Security

There is good news in the New Year for those over age of 65 who are still working, according to Vernon Daniel, district manager of the Paris social security office. Social security benefits may be paid in full in 1966 to anyone who does not earn more than \$1500 for the year—an increase from the \$1200 amount in prior years. Anyone earning more than \$1500 in 1965 still has a good chance of receiving a substantial part of their social security payments, explained as follows:

For earnings of more than \$1500 and up to \$2700, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 earned. Earnings above \$2700 are withheld from social security benefits at the rate of \$1 for each \$1 earned. Daniel pointed out, however, that regardless of how much a person earns, he would still be entitled to his benefit check for any month earnings did not exceed \$125 in wages, and he did not engage in self-employment activities.

The social security office in Paris is located at 1220 Clarksville Street, and is now open to the public on Saturdays until noon in order that applications for benefits and coverage under the new medicare provisions may be filed. Everyone over 65 is reminded that the deadline for coverage of the Supplemental Health Insurance Benefits is March 31. Those who do not file by that time will have to wait about two years before they may elect coverage.

Austin.—Most comprehensive and best-financial study ever undertaken of the Texas school system is about to get under way.

Gov. John Connally has appointed a 15-member committee to make an intensive three-year study of Texas schools.

Committee will draw up guidelines to aid the Legislature in drafting new laws to strengthen the traditional system of education in the state. It has \$250,000 (plus federal funds) with which to make the study.

By August 31, 1968, it must prepare a long-range plan "that will enable Texas to emerge as a national leader in educational aspiration, commitment and achievement."

Committee will study buildings, books, equipment, teachers, teaching methods and teaching aids. It also will propose ways to strengthen our public schools.

This Public School Study Committee, authorized by the Legislature, is composed of school and college educators, employers and employees, farmers and businessmen.

Members are Leon Jaworski, Houston; Joe E. Chapa, San Manuel; Kermit Dyche, Alvin; and Paul Haas, Corpus Christi. Also M. K. Hage, Austin; Mrs. George Hawn, Corpus Christi; and Harold Hitt of Midland.

Others are Frank W. Hubert of College Station, June Hyer of Houston, Morgan Jones Jr., Abilene; Mrs. Savannah Cross Lockey, Troup; James McCrocklin, San Marcos; Loyd Turner, Fort Worth; Dick West, Dallas; and Mrs. Helen A. Wright of Nacogdoches.

ROAD NOW CLEARED—State Board of Education has paved the way for private schools to obtain federal funds for training students under the manpower training program. This was done with the adoption of a 15-point plan applicable to non-public school participants.

Included in the plan were seven recommendations by the federal government and eight dealing with state policies.

Board also approved plans to add international flavor to public schools and to promote fuller understanding of education. They set up a public information committee to distribute articles on the educational program.

Texas Education Agency staff will be enlarged to handle the increased work load.

James L. Slider Asks For Re-Election As Representative

I, James L. Slider, wish to take this means of announcing my candidacy for re-election as your State Representative from District 2.

Before the last Session of the Legislature, District 2 comprised only the Counties of Cass, Marion and Morris. Under the new redistricting bill, Titus County was added, and I am asking for the opportunity of serving the citizens from this four County area for another two years.

I have served as State Representative for three two-year terms. My desire to represent the District for another two years is the same as any other County Official desiring a second term, since all County Officials, except State Representatives, are elected for a four-year term of office.

I am 41 years old, married and a native of this area, being born and reared on a farm. My wife is the former Orene Fleming of Naples, and we have one daughter, Sherri, 14 years old. My family and I are members of the Methodist Church where I have served as Sunday School Superintendent and a member of the Board of Stewards.

During World War II, and immediately after graduation from High School, I volunteered for military service and served in the United States Navy from February, 1943, until honorably discharged in April, 1946.

As a citizen, home owner and taxpayer, I know the needs and problems of our District and your views concerning them. From my knowledge of your views, plus my own experience, I know that the economy of our District depends on full utilization and production of our human and natural resources, our farmers and ranchers, our small businessmen and the preservation of our present industrial plants and recreational facilities and attractions.

Because constructive legislation is vital for the well-being of our citizens and the continued advancement of our District's economic growth, I have sponsored and supported legislation to improve our public school system, increased benefits for our elder citizens, the elimination of inequities in the sales tax, preservation and conservation of our natural resources, economy measures in government, improvements in our recreational facilities and attractions, and the further development and maintenance of our farm to market road program.

As State Representative, I have served on such committees as Education, Agriculture, Congressional and Legislative Districts, Insurance, and Revenue and Taxation. During this past Session, I was again appointed Chairman of the Game and Fish Committee, the selection being made on the basis of my experience and seniority as a member of the House of Representatives. No first and very few second term members were appointed as Chairman of a Committee. Also, because of my seniority, I have been appointed to serve as a member of the Legislative Council to study various ways and means to improve our State Government and make recommendations to the next Legislature.

In the months ahead, I intend to conduct a vigorous and aggressive campaign for another two-year term of office. I shall make every effort to see and visit with as many of you as is humanly possible, and I would deeply appreciate your vote, support and influence

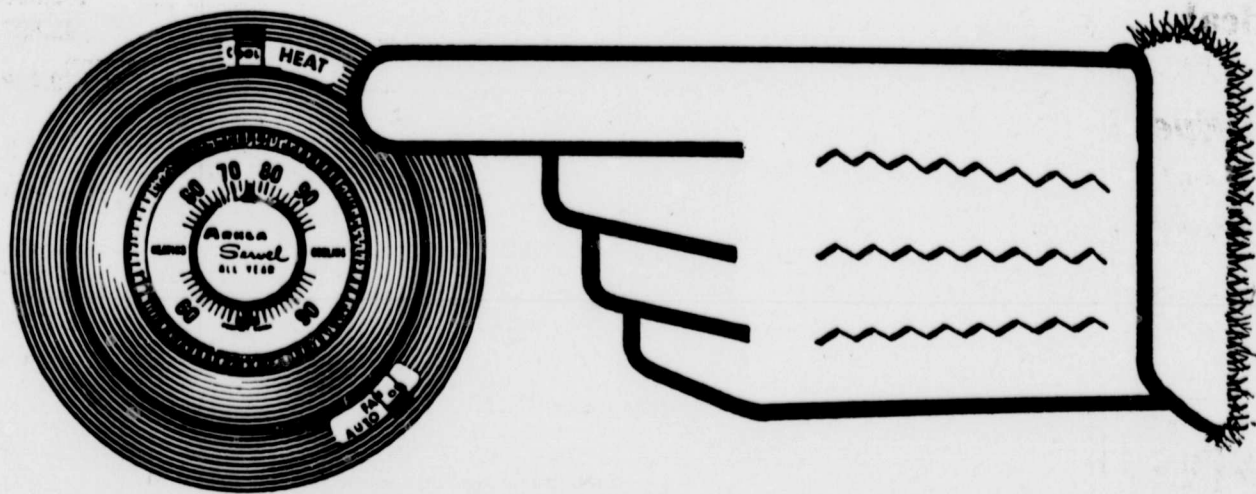

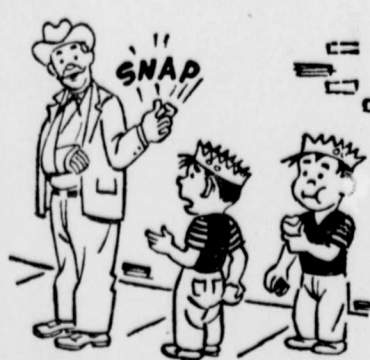
