## Reagan Dispuesto A Permitir La Libre Inmigración de Mexicanos

Washington - El presidente Ronald Reagan dijo estar "enrígado" ante una propuesta para permitir el libre paso a través de la cadena televisiva mexicano-estadounidense, como posible solución al espinoso problema de los inmigrantes ilegales.

Reagan, tras destacar que muchos mexicanos cruzan la frontera ilegalmente para escapar del alto desempleo y miseria que enfrentan en su patria, pese a su reciente riqueza petrolera, indicó el martes que la libre inmigración aliviaría el desempleo azteca. La resultante estabilidad económica, añadió, serviría a los intereses de ambos países.

Los mexicanos "...tienen un índice de desempleo que va más allá de todo", aseguró el mandatario. "Su válvula de seguridad tiene que ser parte de lo que ahora llamamos inmigración ilegal".

El presidente, durante una entrevista que concedió el martes por la noche en la oficina oval a un reportero de la cadena televisiva CBS, señaló que desea poder discutir el hecho de la inmigración ilegal - y sus posibles soluciones - durante una reunión que celebrará el próximo mes con su colega mexicano José López Portillo.

Reagan dijo estar interesado en seguir el consejo de los gobernadores de los estados fronterizos, que se entrevistaron con funcionarios mexicanos y propusieron el permitir que los ciudadanos aztecas crucen libremente la frontera para buscar trabajo en Estados Unidos.

"Lo que estos gobernadores sugirieron, y estoy muy intrigado con ello, es una propuesta para que tanto nosotros como el gobierno mexicano nos reunamos y legalicemos éstos, y concedamos visados, porque redunda

además en nuestro interés el que la válvula de seguridad no sea cerrada, sino rota quizá así la estabilidad al sur de la frontera" estadounidense, recaló el mandatario.

Los obreros mexicanos pagarían impuestos sobre sus ganancias estadounidenses, dijo Reagan. Y con su status legalizado, añadió, "un patrón no podrá aprovecharse de ellos y hacer que trabajen por salarios míseros a cambio de no denunciarlos."

"Podrán regresar legalmente al otro lado de la frontera, si lo desean, y venir nuevamente", resaltó, "pero la frontera se transformaría en una vía de doble circulación para nuestro pueblo".

Un grupo de trabajo especial sobre política de inmigración recomendó la semana pasada el legalizar el status de la mayoría de los inmigrantes ilegales, pero no llegó a abogar por el establecimiento de una frontera abierta entre ambos países.

#### Brown Berets Viajean A Austin Para Marcha

Miembros de los Brown Berets de Lubbock viajarán a la ciudad de Austin para participar en una marcha organizada por diferentes organizaciones activistas. Dicha marcha se ha nombrado la Marcha para justicia y unidad y tomarán parte mas de 50 organizaciones incluyendo los Brown Berets de Lubbock.

Gilberto Herrera, presidente de los Berets de Lubbock dijo que iban ir una buena delegación de aquí de West Texas y que esperaban representar a toda la gente de West Texas. "La razón porque vamos a marchar son por las muchas injusticias que han sufrido nuestra gente a manos de autoridades de Texas," dijo Herrera.

La Marcha se llevara cabo los días 28 y 29 del presente y tomara una ruta de aproximadamente 15 millas. Se espera que mas de 5,000 personas participen en la Marcha.

## Se Confirman 120 en Iglesia Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe

Mas de 100 personas celebraron su confirmación este pasado miércoles día 25 del presente en la Iglesia Nuestra Sra. de Guadalupe aquí en la Ciudad de Lubbock.

El Obispo de la Diócesis estuvo presente para hacer las confirmaciones a los candidatos. Las confirmaciones se llevaron a cabo después de que los candidatos lograron

terminar un curso oficial para calificar para la confirmación. También tomaron parte mas de 240 padrinos.



#### Brown Berets Travel To Austin For March

Lubbock Brown Berets will travel to Austin this weekend to participate in the March for Justice and Unity Rally sponsored by the Texas Brown Berets.

More than 5,000 persons are expected to participate in the March.

Gilberto Herrera, president of the Brown Berets in Lubbock said that about 20 persons will travel to Austin for the March and that the purpose of the march will be to protest the injustices and killings which chicanos have suffered at the hands of authorities.

More than 50 organizations including Chicano, Black and Native American groups will participate in the March and demonstration.

## Reagan Y Lopez Portillo Deben Reconocer El Destino Comun de Los Estados Unidos y Mexico

# Una Propuesta Para Una Zona de Libre Comercio

Cuando los presidentes Reagan y López Portillo se reúnan en San Diego y Tijuana, a fines de Abril, se hallarán sentando una pauta para reuniones futuras en la frontera de 2,000 millas que comparten los Estados Unidos y México. Es una situación ventajosa, que permitirá a ambos dirigentes ver claramente la relación complicada que existe entre las dos naciones.

En un sentido muy verdadero, esta gran frontera enlaza a ambos países en una red sin costura de relaciones económicas, políticas y de pueblo a pueblo, una red que mantiene a ambas partes en un destino común. Es una frontera entre historias distintas, aunque esperanzas semejantes; entre la oportunidad y la desilusión; entre la sospecha y el respeto de ambas partes; entre vecinos orgullosos y buenos.

La frontera abarca una mezcla de personas y problemas que no conoce división precisa. En Houston, San Antonio, Phoenix y Los Angeles, los lazos culturales y humanos son demasiado íntimos, demasiado entretejidos como para que los interrumpa una línea sobre un mapa. El dinero va y viene, desde pequeñas remesas hasta inversiones cuantiosas; las familias están de ambos lados; y toda la gama de intereses y relaciones entre los dos países ya ha comenzado a hacer borrosa la distinción convencional entre la política extranjera y la interior. En esencia, nuestra política hacia México no es extranjera del todo; es una política hacia nosotros mismos.

Espero que será ésta la perspectiva que los dos presidentes elevarán desde su posición ventajosa en la frontera. Y que verán que la frontera no sólo plantea dificultades críticas, sino también grandes oportunidades para la cooperación entre sus dos

naciones - y el resto del Hemisferio Occidental.

Un campo que promete oportunidades tales es el del comercio. México es ya el tercer país en importancia en lo tocante al comercio con los Estados Unidos, y la América Latina representa ahora aproximadamente el 50% de todas las exportaciones estadounidenses al mundo en vías de desarrollo. El año pasado, el comercio entre los Estados Unidos y la América Latina sobrepasó los 75 billones de dólares, de los cuales México absorbió 27.7 billones. Estas cifras confirman que tenemos problemas tanto como oportunidades para con nuestros vecinos del sur, y especialmente para con México.

Es en este contexto que propuse recientemente que los Estados Unidos y México debieran apoyar la creación de una Zona de Libre Comercio a lo largo de la frontera. Mi propuesta, presentada en una audiencia del Comité Consultivo Estadounidense sobre Comercio, establecería dicha zona, que se extendería 200 millas dentro del territorio de cada país, desde Brownsville, Tejas, hasta San Diego, California. En esencia, constituiría un mercado común en miniatura; es decir, cualquier lado de la frontera, podría moverse libre de derechos por todos el territorio de la zona.

Después de un período de prueba de diez años, podría ampliarse para comprender una porción mayor del territorio de cada país, o la totalidad de ambos países, mi esperanza es que la Zona, con el tiempo, pueda extenderse para que comprenda, no solamente los Estados Unidos y México, sino también el Canadá y los demás países de la América Latina y el Caribe.

Esta Zona podría ser la clave para el aumento del comercio libre y la cooperación económica con el resto

de la América Latina y el Caribe. Los desafíos económicos que plantea la duplicación de la población de la América Latina dentro de los 25 años próximos, la pobreza actual de la mitad de su población y la creciente inestabilidad política y económica de muchas de las naciones de la América Latina y del Caribe, exigen que adoptemos iniciativas audaces y prácticas para resolver esos problemas con eficacia.

Mi propuesta es una iniciativa de esa índole y puede llegar a tener dimensiones hemisféricas, en la forma de un Mercado Común del Hemisferio Occidental.

Varios beneficios podrían derivarse de esta Zona de Libre Comercio:

• El proyecto se convertiría en un punto focal para la cooperación económica mutua entre los Estados Unidos y México;

• Se crearían nuevos empleos en ambos lados de la frontera, para los desempleados y sub-empleados crónicos. Debíamos reconocer que uno de los mercados de empleos más deprimidos de toda nuestra economía se halla situado en nuestro lado de la frontera entre los Estados y México;

• Se desarrollarían nuevas oportunidades para empresas conjuntas entre los Estados Unidos y México, utilizando las mejores habilidades estadounidenses y mexicanas, sus recursos y tecnologías para atacar la tradicional inactividad económica;

• La Zona proporcionaría atractivos para industrias nuevas y estimularía enfoques nuevos de mercado. Además de aumentar el comercio dentro de la Zona, puedo prever una elevación astronómica de la posición de competencia de las firmas que funcionarían dentro de la Zona, con respecto al comercio mundial. El músculo y el ingenio de los dos

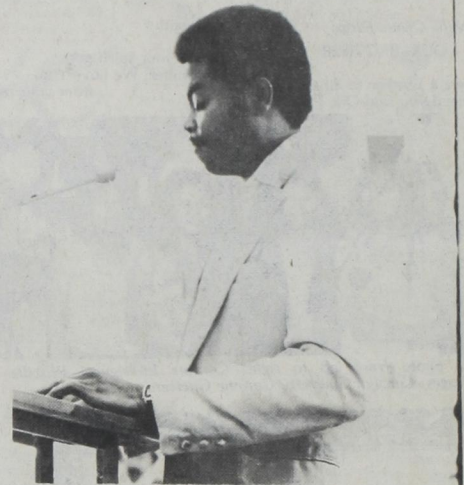
pueblos podrían combinarse para producir bienes y servicios que serían de mayor competencia aún en el mercado mundial.

Hay varias razones que apoyan el establecimiento de esa clase de zona en esta época y en esta ubicación geográfica.

Primera, ha habido un programa industrial de plantas gemelas en funcionamiento a lo largo de la frontera durante los últimos 15 años. Este programa permite a las firmas estadounidenses exportar productos sin terminar al lado mexicano de la frontera, libres de derechos, para efectuar allí el trabajo de ensamblaje y terminación. Al regreso al lado estadounidense para propósito de mercadeo, se cobra a estos productos una tarifa solamente sobre la porción de valor añadido que resulte del trabajo hecho en México. Este ha sido un programa de mucho éxito y mutuamente beneficioso. Ha resultado en el aumento de la creación de empleos en ambos lados de la frontera, y en precios más reducidos para los productos elaborados o manufacturados al amparo del programa.

Segunda, la gente que vive en la región que abarca la propuesta ha tenido una experiencia comercial histórica y una relación cultural. Muchos de los residentes de la zona son bilingües y biculturales.

Tercero, la superficie comprendida en la Zona incluye algunos de los centros industriales y agrícolas más importantes de ambos países. En el lado mexicano, la Zona comprendería a Monterrey, Saltillo, Chihuahua y Torreón. En el lado estadounidense, abarcaría a Corpus Christi, San Antonio, Midland-Odessa, El Paso, Albuquerque, Tucson, Phoenix, San Diego y Los Angeles. Esto hace que la superficie de la Zona sea adecuada para un experimento de libre comercio.

### We want to feel like somebody

"We want to feel like somebody too," was the feeling expressed by members of the United Political Action League as they expressed their feeling about the change of name of Quirt Avenue to Martin Luther King Blvd.

UPAL had submitted over 5,000 signatures for verification to City Fathers. The petitions asked for the street to be renamed. According to the City Secretary, the petitions fell 161 short of the required number in order for the City Council to consider action on the petition. Since the petitions fell short of the required number, the Council could take no action.

Members of UPAL urged the City Fathers to change the name voluntarily saying that it was a matter of pride inside the Chicano

community. "The name Quirt is offense. One of my relatives was almost beaten to death with a quirt," said Eric Strong, one of the petitioners.

Expressing that he wished for the questioned to be resolved, Mayor Bill McAlister, appointed a 4 person committee composed of himself, Joan Baker, and two of the petitioners. The Mayor expressed concern about the name Quirt and said that perhaps one of the main objectives of the committee was to examine if the street name had to be changed to something.

In other action the City Fathers approved a new taxi and limosine ordinance. The ordinance had gained attention when it was thought that an antique limosine service would be driven out of business by regulations.

## Una Propuesta Para Una Zona de Libre Comercio

También, el movimiento histórico de personas, bienes y servicios por toda esta zona refuerza la posibilidad de que el concepto de la Zona de Libre Comercio proporcione beneficios mutuos a los dos lados de la frontera.

Es indispensable que ambas naciones reconozcan los beneficios mutuos de la propuesta. Solamente si ambas están convencidas de que se beneficiarán mutuamente, será posible que consideren la participación en el establecimiento de dicha Zona. Las necesidades de desarrollo de ambos países a lo largo de sus respectivas porciones de la Zona son un argumento fuerte a favor de su establecimiento. En ambos lados de la frontera hay necesidades tremendas de aumentar la creación de empleos y el desarrollo de la infraestructura (transporte, salud, instrucción y desarrollo urbano). También contribuiría en gran medida a la solución del problema de inmigración.

La zona propuesta es un primer paso de fácil administración y esto es importante porque las anteriores propuestas de un Mercado Común para la América del Norte, especialmente las efectuadas durante las campañas presidenciales, se han percibido en México a modo de calles de una sola dirección - como que los Estados Unidos estaban tratando de monopolizar las reservas petroleras mexicanas o de apoderarse de su industria. Este experimento, sin embargo, puede ser beneficioso mutuamente para ambos países. También se halla limitado por el tiempo, la geografía y/o los sectores económicos, de modo que cualesquiera consecuencia adversas podrían ser fáciles de manejar.

La Zona de Libre Comercio podría ser el primer paso encaminado a la creación de un equivalente interamericano del Mercado Común Europeo. Durante los últimos 20

años, los Estados Unidos han apoyado varias iniciativas para la integración económica latinoamericana - la Asociación Latinoamericana de Libre Comercio (ALALC); el Mercado Común Centroamericano y el Mercado Común Andino - pero los Estados Unidos nunca se han unido a ellas como socio.

Ha llegado la época de que los Estados Unidos consideren adherirse a estas gestiones de libre comercio y, con la participación del Canadá, reclutar con el tiempo a todos los países del Hemisferio Occidental para crear un mercado común. Esta propuesta no es un plano definitivo para el establecimiento de una Zona de Libre Comercio entre los Estados Unidos y México, ni tampoco un análisis definitivo de sus posibilidades para ambos países. Es mas bien una declaración de interés y una llamada a la acción para satisfacer las necesidades económicas críticas de los Estados Unidos y México de modo eficaz; y, quizás, una forma de convertir los problemas observados en oportunidades estimulantes para todos los pueblos de las Américas.

Cuando se reúnan próximamente, los presidentes de México y los Estados Unidos no podrían prestar un servicio mayor que el de reconocer y fomentar las oportunidades tremendas para la cooperación económica que existen a lo largo de esa gran frontera, que une a nuestras dos naciones, en mayor medida que lo que las separa.

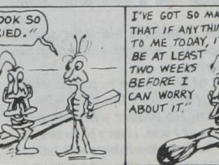
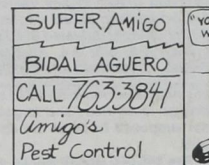
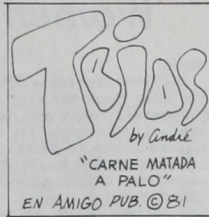

Texas Tech returns to the road and to Southwest Conference play this weekend when the Red Raiders travel to Waco to play the Baylor Bears in an important three-game league series. The two teams will square off in a single game on Friday starting at 3 p.m. and will meet in a doubleheader on Saturday beginning at 12 p.m.

Texas Tech will go into Central Texas with a 16-10 season record with a 0-3 record in SWC play. Baylor is 11-11 for the year and 1-5 in league play.

Texas Tech broke a three-game losing streak by beating NAIA powerhouse Southeastern Oklahoma State by a 21-15 score. The Red Raiders only out-hit the Savages by one as every S.E. Okla. St. starter hit safely. Offensive leaders for Texas Tech were Keven Rucker, Bobby

Kohler and Jimmy Zachry. Rucker came two RBIs shy of the school record for runs batted in when he drove home seven with a grand slam homer, a two-run double and a RBI producing groundout. Kohler went three for four at the plate including his team leadin fourth homer and drove in four runs. Zachry was four for six with three RBIs.

A pair of SWC baseball legends meet everytime Texas Tech and Baylor square off. The Red Raiders are led by Kal Segrist who starred in the 1950s at the University of Texas while Baylor is led by Mickey Sullivan who was a star for Baylor also in the 1950s. Segrist in his 14th year as coach of the Red Raiders is assisted by Rick Lindell. Sullivan, in his eighth year at Baylor, is assisted by Sonny Bowers.

Texas Tech outfielder - designated hitter Bobby Kohler is very much on schedule to repeating as an All-American. The 2nd team All-American of last season has already collected nine doubles, three triples and four home runs. He goes into the Baylor series hitting .388.

Designated hitter Gene Segrest and third baseman Jimmy Zachry have joined Kohler four outstanding starts this season. Segrest is hitting .467 going into the Raiders' second conference series of the season while Zachry is hitting .395 through Tech's first 26 games.

The Red Raiders one-two punch pitching duo of Kyle Fahrenthold and David Carroll are prime reasons Tech is off to such an outstanding start this season. Between them, they are 10-2, with Fahrenthold chipping in a 6-1 record while Carroll is 4-1.

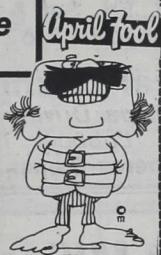

## Leonard For WBC Title

Syracuse, N.Y. (AP) - When Sugar Ray Leonard defends his World Boxing Council welterweight title Saturday night, the "other man" in the ring will be Larry Bonds, a garbage collector from Denver whose boxing career has been plagued by problems getting fights.

"It really doesn't bother me that much to be the 'other guy' in the fight," Bonds said Wednesday as he prepared for his first world championship fight. "I'm just happy to have the opportunity to be the other guy."

Bonds has not fought since he knocked out a fighter by the name of Costello King in Puerto Rico nearly a year ago. He was contemplating retiring from the ring when the offer to challenge Leonard came through. "I was frustrated," Bonds said Wednesday. "I told my wife in January that if something did not come in the next six months I would seriously think of quitting."

Bonds blames his troubles getting fights on what he called a lack of connections in the fight business, the fact that he is not well known and the general unpopularity of left-handed fighters. In order to stay active, Bonds said he has fought out of his weight class several times.

Bonds says he still does not know how he ended up fighting for Leonard's title.

"I think things just fell into place. I don't know how it happened," he said.

In spite of his inactivity in the last year, Bonds goes into Saturday night's fight in Syracuse University's Carrier Dome ranked fifth in the world by the WBC. Bonds won two national Golden Gloves titles as an amateur. As a professional, he won the Nevada state championship in both the welterweight and junior middleweight classes. The 29-year old fighter has a 29-3 professional record.

Bonds is hoping his fight against the popular Leonard will bring him more fights.

"First of all, I have to prove myself worthy of being in the ring with the champion. No matter what happens, if he wins or I win, I have to prove I am worthy and maybe things will fall into place for me so I can get some more fights."

The hoopla surrounding the title fight may be routine for Leonard, but Bonds is not accustomed to being a celebrity.

"This is the first time I've encountered so many people paying

Mrs. Carner, second on the all-time LPGA money-winning list, missed the 36-hole cut in his event last year, the only time that's happened to the long hitting veteran in her 12-year pro career.

Mrs. Lopez-Melton, the LPGA's Player of the Year in 1978 and 1979, had several problems in the final two rounds of last week's \$200,000 Desert Inn Pro-Am at Las Vegas, as she faded to rounds of 77 and 76 while finishing in a tie for fourth place.

Mrs. Carner and Mrs. Lopez-Melton are among 127 pros entered in the 72-hole Women's Kemper Open, scheduled to begin Thursday on the 6, 134-yard, par 71 Mesa Verde Country Club. Three amateurs also will play in the event, which runs through Sunday.

Mrs. Carner won the inaugural tournament here two years ago,

surviving a five-way, sudden death playoff. But last year, she missed the cut after a pair of 78s.

"I think all the time I spent on extra television shows and interviews, plus the mental pressure just wore me out," said Mrs. Carner, recalling what happened last year. "I was just worn out."

Mrs. Lopez-Melton, who won here last year and went on to finish as the fourth-leading money winner on the 1980 tour, opened with rounds of 67 and 72 in the Desert Inn event and led by two shots through three rounds. But she wound up six strokes behind Donna Caponi, who won for the second straight year.

When asked if she might be mentally down this week because of what happened at Las Vegas, she said: "Oh, no. I still have confidence. And I love the course, it's kind of suited for my game."

Mrs. Lopez-Melton finished second to Mrs. Caponi in the Desert Inn Pro-Am last year before winning the Kemper event with a score of 284. It was her first victory of 1980. Her second - round score of 66 is the course and tournament record.

Also entered in the Kemper Open are Mrs. Caponi, Beth Daniel, Jan Stephenson, Sally Little, Jane Blalock, Laura Baugh Cole, Sandra Post, Amy Alcott, Jo Ann Washam, Pat Bradley and Debbie Massey.

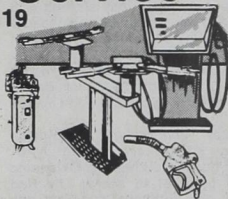
Among the big names not playing are Sandra Palmer and Kathy Whitworth.

Even though the Raiders were layoff for four months since the 1980 season, head coach Jerry Moore was satisfied that his staff had put the Raiders through a tough workout. Moore was pleased by the overall effort and the response of the Raiders.

Tech's spring training ends April 25 with the annual Red-Black game.

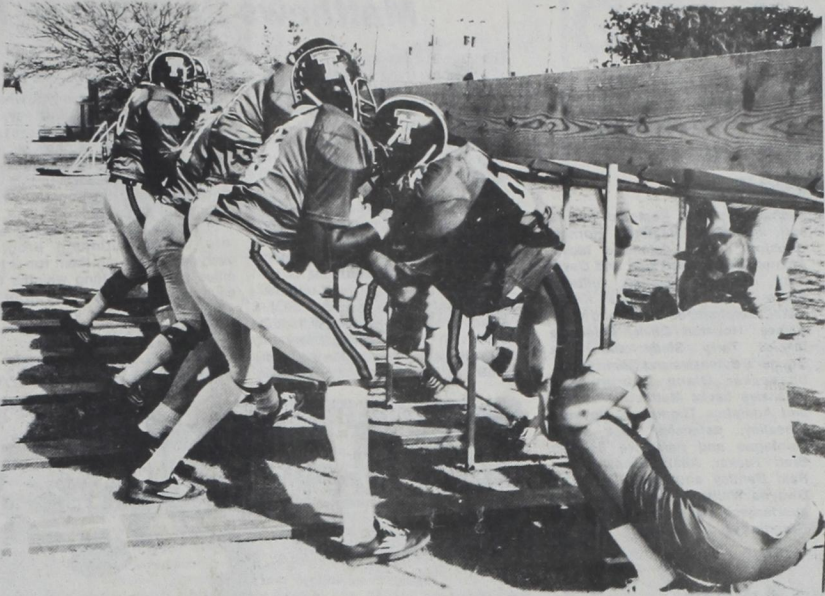
Even though a number of changes probably will be made during spring training, one thing appears certain—the Red Raiders have quality and experience returning in 1981. Of the 36 returning lettermen, 23 have started at one point during their varsity careers. Plus, running back Dale Brown and offensive lineman George Smitherman started during the 1979 season, but did not play last year. The passing combination of Ron Reeves to Renie Baker should be one of the most prolific in the Southwest Conference and massive Gabriel Rivera appears ready to establish himself as one of the top defensive linemen in the country. Should some holes get plugged in both interior lines, the Red Raiders could be a definit title contender in 1981.

Quarterbacks - Senior Ron Reeves appears unchallenged. A three year starter, Reeves should be more at home in the new I-information. Since he came off the bench in the second game of his freshman year, Reeves

has seen constant duty except for missing three games his sophomore season with a shoulder separation. Battling for the backup job will be senior Richy Ethridge, sophomore Perry Morren and sophomore Layne Walker, a transfer from SMU.

Running backs - the most experienced Raider group since 1977. Six strong candidates return from 1980, and with the change in offensive thinking, the race for starting spots is wide open. Fullback Wes Hightower led the club last season with 515 yards, and the junior had two games over 100 yards. Junior Anthony Hutchison supplied outside speed, rushing for 407 yards, and started most of the year. Sophomore fullback Freddie Walls came on strong at the end of last season, rushing for 191 yards. His 54-yard TD scamper against TCU was the Raiders' longest run from scrimmage last year. Sophomore Jesse Kimbrough played sparingly in 1980, but at 6-3, 210, he has the physical credentials to strongly contend. Another is 6-2, 200-pound sophomore Norman Hill, who may be the fastest Raider of all. He switched from the secondary to running back last year, and spring training likely will determine where he will be next season. Sophomore redshirt Dale Brown was a late-season starter in 1979, but a summer foot injury sidelined him last year. Junior Darryl Green had 131 yards rushing for the junior varsity last year and junior Mark Williams, he started his freshman and sophomore seasons at New Mexico, also will be in the hunt.

The receivers - another area where

the Raiders appear in good shape. Senior Renie Baker was Co-Newcomer of the Year in the SWC last season and he should be one of the frontrunning All-SWC candidates this year. He was second in the league in receptions per game (4.0) and receiving yardage (625) in '80. Sophomore Jamie Harris adds explosiveness at flanker. Harris tied for fifth in the SWC as a freshman with 2.7 catches per game and 368 yards and three TDs through the airways. Senior Mike Jackson supplies good depth at both positions and redshirt sophomore Bryan Williamson will contend with sophomores Stan David and William Wagoner for playing time. At tight end, L.M. Cummings, Kevin Kolbye and Curt Cole split playing time last season but Cummings has graduated and Kolbye left the squad for personal reasons. Cole, a junior two-letterman, will be challenged by sophomore Roderick Smith and sophomore Rufus Johnson.

The offensive line - Some front line experience but untested depth. Two bona fide starters return in junior guard Matt Harlien, who bench presses 550, and senior Jeff Crombie at center. Junior David Joekel has seen spot starting duty at the other guard spot as has junior Vic White at one of the tackles. Robert Caughlin, who joined Harlien on Tech's strong side last year, has left the squad due to a back injury. Filling the gap could

be sophomore Kelly Grammer, who started last year's Arkansas game at guard. Another possibility is senior George Smitherman, who started throughout the '79 season at guard but left school last season. Senior Denny Harris should offer good support for Crombie at center. Talented but untested are sophomores Danny Buzzard, Joel Dumas, Tim Hendrix and Harland Maisel, and sophomore redshirt Herb Pearce.

Defensive line - a study in contrasts. At one end is junior Gabriel Rivera, who has All-America potential. At the other is a group of untried underclassmen. Rivera is the only returnee in the interior line but a switch from a 5-2 to an even front will help the newcomers. Squadsman contending at the other tackle will be Brad White, Ronald Byers, Kenneth Sternes and Steve Ford, all sophomores. Sophomore Rene Reyes injured a knee in a JV game last fall and will not get through the spring. Another possibility is redshirt freshman Jim McIntire, also hurt last year. There appear to be at least three good defensive end candidates. Junior Jeff McCowan is a returning starter. Redshirt sophomore Van Hughes physically looks the part but JUCO transfer Hasson Arubakkr can't be counted out.

Linebacker - lots of experience and depth. Some probably will be moved to defensive end. Returning starters inside are senior Terry Baer, who led the team in tackles last year, and last blooming junior Stan Williams. Williams took over at mid-season and was impressive by season's end. Sophomore Dwayne Jilles is just coming of age and may be hard to beat out. Others are sophomores Keith Porter and Bryan Lambert. Outside, seniors Lewis Washington and C.M. came on late to win punt snapping duties last season, is another possibility, as is redshirt sophomore Greg Chafin.

Secondary - Another area with experience and depth. Three starters return but two of the backups have starting experience. Senior Tate Randle was All-SWC at safety last year, but his All-American running mate, Ted Watts, has graduated. Lettermen Craig Caudle (senior) and Jerry Hatchett (junior) may get a shot at filling the void, as will junior Dennis Veals and sophomore Kenneth Storey. At cornerback, juniors Jim

Hart and Greg Iseral are returning starters, but junior Ricky Sanders and sophomore Clay Renfro saw much playing time last season. Junior Paul Rodgers will add depth.

Kicking game - should be at least good. Senior Maury Buford has averaged 42.7 yards for his 215 career punts at Tech during his three years to start. He led the nation as a freshman with a 44.1 yard average and finished in the Top 20 the past two years. He is a strong All-SWC possibility. Backing him up probably will be sophomore wide receiver Stan David, who averaged 44 yards a kick in high school. A fight looms for the placement duties. Junior Jesse Garcia started last season out as No. 1 but senior John Greve wound up beating him out. Sophomore walk on Ricky Gann of Arlington should add more confusion to the picture.

New York (AP) - Danny Ainge played hooky from the Toronto Blue Jays' baseball training camp Tuesday to accept the Eastman Award as college basketball's "Player of the Year."

"I wish I could have been to camp earlier," said the slender high-scoring forward who paced Brigham Young to the Eastern Regional final of the NCAA playoffs before bowing to Virginia.

"I was supposed to be in Dunedin (the Blue Jays-Florida training quarters) on Monday if we lost. But I got permission to delay it so I could receive this trophy and play in the all-star game Sunday during the NCAA finals in Philadelphia."

A rare athlete who starred in three sports - baseball, basketball and football - in his Eugene, Ore., high school, the 6-foot-4 Ainge said after much deliberation he decided on the baseball course as a career although pro basketball probably offered a quicker early reward.

"It was a decision I made with my wife, Michelle," he added. "I enjoy basketball but I prefer the leisurely pace of baseball. There is not all that

pounding up and down the floor as in basketball.

"I have to think my knees will last longer and I will have a longer career."

"Besides, my wife said she wanted me to be able to play with my children when I get older." The Ainges, who were college sweethearts, have a 15-month-old daughter, Ashlee.

The versatile, 22-year old athlete signed with the Blue Jays right out of high school in 1977 but continued his college basketball career under more relaxed rules governing college eligibility. While continuing his college studies and basketball, he spent summers playing spottily with the Blue Jays and their AAA farm club, Syracuse.

He has signed a 3-year baseball contract for a reported \$500,000. Although he has played second, shortstop and third base plus all positions in the outfield, he is being ticketed for a third base slot.

"He will be another Brooks Robinson," said Pat Gillick, the Toronto general manager, referring to the Baltimore Orioles' great third baseman.

• No need to be home when your check arrives. The money is available in an account even if the person is out of town.

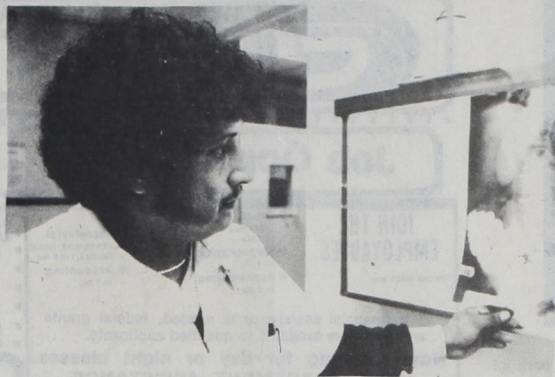

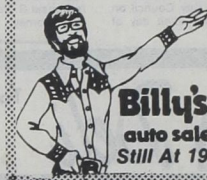
