



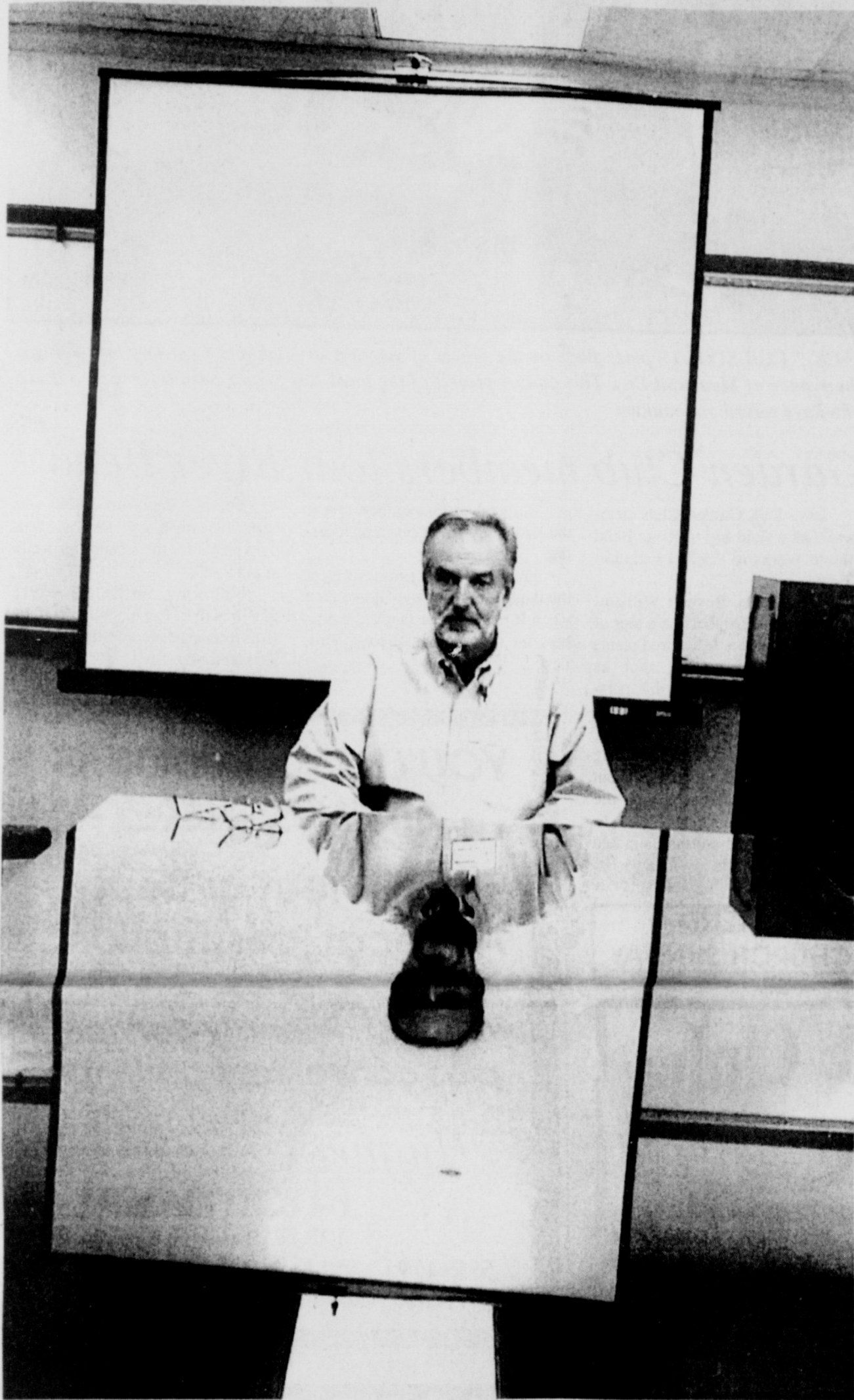

Cryovac plant earns awards

The Iowa Park Cryovac plant has been recognized as having the most outstanding safety record for the past year of all 109 Sealed Air Corporation locations world wide.

Plant personnel celebrated the event recently with an open house for all employees and their guests.

The President's Safety Award was the result of achieving a 61 percent improvement in safety performance, and also the Sealed Air Corporation's Gold Key for Success Award for its safety performance.

Kevin Biggs, a film operator and 13-year employee of the plant, represented the facility in New York City to receive the award.

Employee awareness is the result of regular safety meetings, which are held monthly, in addition to meetings quarterly and annually.

Such meetings last between 30 minutes and an hour, which is atop the 12-hour shifts employees work. For that time, employees are paid overtime, Biggs said.

The training resulted in 38 fewer lost work days by employees during 1999, as compared with the previous year.

ADDITIONAL AWARDS

The local plant also received two additional Silver Key awards, due to

suggestions made by employees to improve efficiency and reduce production costs.

Teams of employees put their heads together to develop the recommendations. Their individual awards varied, from \$300 gift certificates to Swiss Army watches and personalized shirts.

Silver Key awards were earned by Michael McKnight, Scott McShan, James Boswell, Nelson Rivera and Eric Olds.

Their recommendation enlarging reels on which materials are wound improved the winding capacity by four times, reduced 75 percent of the number of bubble inflations, and saving an average of 12 pounds of scrap each setting.

Estimated savings included \$540,000 per year, in addition to \$13,000 in landfill costs, and a \$650 in savings per operator.

Total labor savings and yield improvements from that project is estimated to be \$1,270,800 annually.

The second Silver Key Award was the result of a suggestion by David Bell and Rudy Rodriguez.

Their "D-Ring" resulted after installation of large capacity reels, the method of using leaders was no longer applicable.

Old leader used adhesive tape on the end of the leader and would not come apart during the unwinding process, leaving usable material on the reel that was thrown away as scrap.

The change is estimated to produce a savings of \$77,237 annually.

One of the two Silver Key Awards was the "CF-18" improvement, which improved production by 20 percent. Doug Fisher, Dan York and Ray Mize came up with that idea.

Cost of the change was about \$1,000 per machine, but is estimated to produce the capacity of half a machine, increasing capacity from 200 bags to 240 per minute.

Total estimated savings for the year was set at \$429,200.

Reflectix, headquartered in Markleville, Inc., manufactures and markets foil-faced air cellular insulation.

Water-use cutback by city is expected

A change in restrictions on use of city water is apparently to be made when the city council meets in a called session Monday.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

An ordinance is listed on the agenda "declaring an emergency and adopting immediate restrictions which limit the irrigation of land-

scaped areas and the filling of privately-owned swimming, wading or jacuzzi-type pools to one time per week."

If adopted, the ordinance would be put into action immediately, due to the limited amount of lake water available to the city.

The city administrator is to discuss with aldermen possible changes

to construction plans for the South Texowa drainage project.

Monday is not a regular meeting date for the council, but has been scheduled for a budget workshop.

Department budgets on the schedule are those for the police department, library, city hall, Recreational Activities Center and Friendly Door.

Police report arrests

Five of the persons taken into custody during the past week by Iowa Park police were wanted for warrants issued with the Wichita County

sheriff's department, according to the police blotter.

James Russell Sims, 26, was picked up Thursday afternoon in the 300 block of West Park, because he has a warrant for burglary of a building.

He was transported to the county jail.

Two days later, Melvin Wayne Correll, 37, was taken into custody after it was determined county had a warrant for deadly conduct. He was taken to jail under a \$613 bond.

Less than an hour later, William Harold Lowery, 36, was arrested in the 400 block of West Park on a warrant for driving while intoxicated, with a bond of \$603.25.

At the time Lowery was picked up, he had been operating a steam cleaner in a parking lot, using city water. Prior to his being transported to jail, he was issued a local citation for violation of city ordinance because he was using city water, according to the police blotter.

Two other people who were picked up on county warrants were taken into custody Sunday morning.

The first, Jeremy Waine Case, 24, was wanted for bond forfeiture, \$3,000, after having been charged

with driving while his license was suspended.

Then, Kristy Lee Robison, 23, was arrested after determining her attorney was off bond on a possession of cocaine charge, as well as driving while license was suspended.

Both Case and Robison were transported to the county jail.

Cherri Lynn Delago, 39, was arrested Thursday morning in the 300 block of West Lafayette, because she was driving after her license had been suspended. She was transported to the county jail.

When officers responded at 9:53 p.m. Saturday to a reported domestic disturbance in the 300 block of East Lafayette, Bruno Torrez, 21, was charged with Class C family violence. He was released at 1:15 a.m. after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Also in the 300 block of East Lafayette, a resident reported Saturday afternoon that the residence had been burglarized.

While investigating the case, a 14-year-old male who lived next door was found in possession of most of the items that had been taken.

The youth was transported to the county juvenile detention center.

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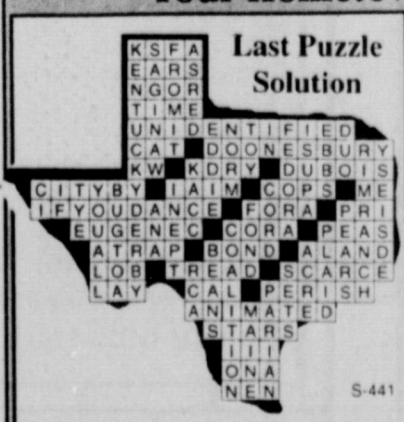
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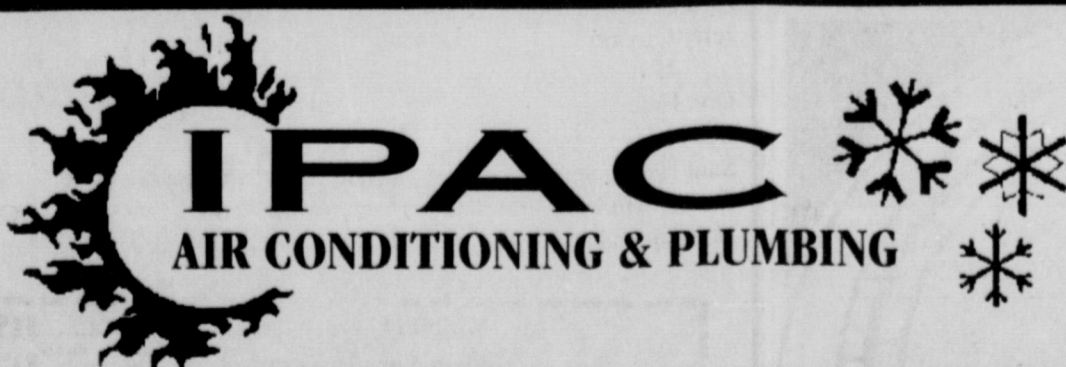


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As I See It...By Bob Hamilton

That was to ban all outdoor burning.

The action was obviously taken because of the drought conditions, which has affected not only the vegetation, but also the water supply in the county.

Farmers will not be allowed to burn off wheat stubble, or burn old piles of lumber and rubbish, because controlling such blazes are next to impossible when it's as dry and windy as it is.

Actually, those who wanted to burn the stubble aren't saving anything except possibly plowing. It's so dry that they couldn't plant back to a second crop, as is normally the purpose.

We've had some stubble burning

that got out of hand, and a couple of those required more than one volunteer fire department to expend an awful lot of members' time.

And in each case, firemen also had to utilize an awful lot of water to battle the blazes.

Also, I'm not too sure we don't have a bunch of rural fires that haven't been set on purpose. They've been very suspicious, such as half a dozen that cropped up along a certain country road a week or so ago.

Heck, someone was even successful in setting afire the trunk of a tree at the junior high school Tuesday afternoon. That was discovered and extinguished before any real damage was inflicted, thank goodness.

Water required to fight fires, whether in town or in the rural areas is too precious these days for anything else but domestic needs.

So, thanks to the commissioners court for taking the action.

City-mandated water restrictions

* Watering of lawns is limited to Sundays and Thursdays for all customers with an even-numbered address, and Saturdays and Wednesdays for all customers with odd-numbered addresses. Irrigation shall be limited to the hours between midnight and 10:00 a.m. and between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and midnight.

* Washing of sidewalks, driveways and parking lots is prohibited.

* Using of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer or other vehicle is prohibited at all times, except for commercial and service station facilities.

* Filling, refilling and adding of water to privately owned swimming, wading or jacuzzi-type pools is limited to the hours between 12:00 midnight and 9:00 a.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays.

* Use of water for architectural features is prohibited

* Wholesale water customers of the city are required to reduce their purchase of water by 15% over the previous month's usage.
