I do not blame the person and I would think that everyone would have more respect than to carry their trash and dump it near another lot. I am sure they wouldn't appreciate it if someone dumped their trash near their lot.

Letter To A Wise Guy

This is an open letter to a boy, about 18, who forced me off the road while cutting in sharply and passing me on a hill yesterday afternoon:

"Dear Son: You may think you are a good driver, and perhaps you are. But I'd like you to keep in mind that most of your 'skillful' driving is due to other motorists.

Anybody can whip along the road as fast and as carelessly as you were going. There's no trick to that—the new cars are loaded with power and pickup—too much so, I'm afraid.

Just remember that it was my alertness that prevented an accident on the hill, not yours. And the driver who was approaching us also had to brake suddenly and swerve in order to save your life and his.

It is not your courage or dexterity that has kept you alive as long as this, but the prudence and politeness of other motorists. You have been trading on our good will and sense of self-preservation.

I wish it were possible to point out to you that your kind of driving is nothing but bad manners—it is not heroic, or adventurous, or manly.

Suppose you ran down a crowded street, pushing people out of the way, knocking packages out of ladies' hands and kicking children into the gutter. What would be so heroic or manly about that?

Nothing, of course. Then why do you suppose that having 2,000 pounds of steel under you makes it any better? There's nothing to be proud of in driving fast—any fool can do that. It's a form of cowardice to threaten other drivers, not courage.

Suppose you beat me at the getaway, or up the hill? What does that prove? Nothing except that the car you bought is faster. You didn't make it; it's a commercial product. Anybody can drive with a maniacal disregard for safety.

Don't take any pride in your deadly accomplishment. A real man is considerate and polite—and takes chances only when it counts, when his honor and conscience call out for it. On the highway, most of all, it's easy to tell the men from the boys—the men have to save the boys from the consequences of their foolish and needless bravado.

Bulldogs Go To Robert Lee Friday

The score board read 20 to 0 in favor of the Hermleigh Cardinals at the end of the game here last Friday night but it really should have been 13 to 0 as one of the Cardinals touchdowns was made on a pass to an illegal receiver.

The game was hard fought all the way through. The first quarter was scoreless. In the second quarter Hermleigh's quarterback took a pass and raced to the goal line for the touchdown that should not have been counted as the quarterback is an ineligible pass receiver. In fact the first half was scoreless.

The Cardinals scored once each in the third and fourth period and converted for the extra point on one.

Though the Bulldogs played their best game of the season they lacked the punch to put over a score.

First downs favored the Bulldogs 8 to 6; the Bulldogs attempted 7 passes, completed 1 and had 2 intercepted; the Cardinals attempted 10 passes, completed 2 and had 2 intercepted; each team punted 3 times each; the Bulldogs drew 5 penalties for 45 yards and the Cardinals 3 for 45; the Bulldogs fumbled 1 time and lost the ball; the Cardinals 2, recovered 1 and lost 1.

This week end the Bulldogs go to Robert Lee for the final game of the season and in all probability will end the season in the cellar.

Perry Bowles Is New Supervisor

Perry Bowles of the Looney Community is a new Supervisor of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District. He replaces W. A. Taylor of Loraine who served on the board for 12 years.

Bowles moved to Mitchell County in the fall of 1941. His first year he worked for T. Y. Hammonds of Buford for wages. Then he started farming on the halves which he did for a few years. He now operates approximately 1,300 acres. Of the 1,300 acres he owns 230 acres at Looney and has just bought half interest in a 100 acre irrigated farm North of Loraine. Bowles

main crops are cotton and feed. Bowles is a big believer in good terraces and stubble mulching of crop residues on the surface. He has mulched 200 acres of crop residues this fall and plans to do about 150 more acres under ACP plans. He is probably prouder of the terracing work on the Radford estate than any other conservation work. Working with W. M. Harrison, who is a Trustee of the estate, over 40 miles of terraces have been constructed. All of the 840 acres is in terraces at the present.

New work on the irrigated acreage North of Loraine has been the construction of an irrigation reservoir which will hold 3 to 4 acre ft. of water. This will enable a larger head of water to be used on the sprinkler lines.

Bowles is not settled on any one measure to conserve soil and production but is always on the look out for new ideas.

Frost also came earlier this year than usual. The first frost that killed cotton in lowlands came Monday morning, October 24. Since then we have had a light freeze or two that finished killing cotton leaves and other vegetation.

Gene (Chick) Baird was introduced in the Senior news.

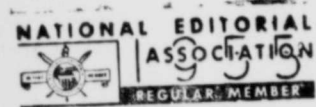

TEXAS BAPTIST TRAINING UNION CONVENTION

From one corner of Texas to the other, 5,000 Baptist directors and workers, with scores of students, musicians and singers, are expected to gather in Abilene this month for the 67th annual meeting of the Texas Baptist Training Union Convention.

The three-day series of meetings from Nov. 24-26 will be held in five churches of different faiths, all at the same time.

A downtown parade led by cowboys and six white horses, a concert by the Hardin Simmons Cowboy Band and special renditions by a 100-voice choir and the other choirs of six Texas colleges and universities are included on the schedule of events.

Training Union programs planned by the pastors and members of 19 Texas churches will be presented and explained before the messengers. The programs will be used in churches throughout the state during the early part of next year.

Dr. Edwin A. Skiles and the First Baptist Church of Abilene will be hosts to the convention. Dr. T. C. Gardner, director of the Training Union Department for the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will be in charge of the meeting and will give a review of state-wide work.

Others who will speak include Dr. Baker James Cauthen, executive secretary for the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention; Dr. Forrest C. Feezor, executive secretary for the BGCT; Dr. Ralph Langley, pastor of the Wilshire Park Church in Dallas; Dr. Harlan Harris, pastor of the First Church in Plainview; Dr. Winfred Moore, pastor of the First Church in Borger; Dr. Fred Swank, pastor of the Sagamore Hill Church in Fort Worth, and Dr. James L. Sullivan, former pastor of the First Church in Abilene and now executive secretary for the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The convention proceedings will start in the First Church on Thanksgiving morning. The messengers will then divide into 14 separate groups and spread out to also the First Christian Church, the First Presbyterian Church, the Saint Paul's Methodist Church and the University Baptist Church.

Special music for the main sessions will be provided by the large choir and other groups from these Baptist colleges and universities: Hardin-Simmons, Baylor, Mary Hardin Baylor, Wayland, Howard Payne, East Texas Baptist and Decatur. C. L. Martin, educational director at the Second Baptist Church in Houston, will direct. The Junior Choir from the Ross Avenue Baptist Church in Dallas will also present a special program of music.

Dr. W. Landon Miller, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Sherman and president of the convention, has extended an invitation for all the Baptists of Abilene and the surrounding area to make the convention's special Thanksgiving service their own also. Dr. Feezor will preach the Thanksgiving sermon.

Safe Driving Day
December 1

December 1 has been designated as S-D Day (Safe Driving Day), nationally, by President Eisenhower. In an effort to increase public awareness of the possibility of making reductions in traffic accidents.

In support of the program, Governor Shivers has issued a similar state-wide proclamation and has called upon the citizens of Texas to join in a cooperative effort for greater traffic safety both on December 1 and throughout each day of the year.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, joined in the Governor's appeal and emphasized that S-D Day, of itself, "is not an end, but a means to an end."

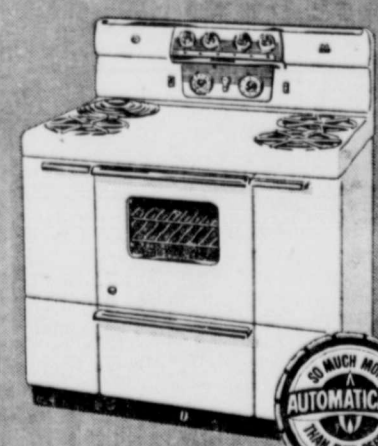

A MOUNTING FIGHT AGAINST THE PINK BOLLWORM

More Texas farmers than ever before are rallying against the worst of all cotton insect pests—the pink bollworm.

The Plant Quarantine Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture has had excellent cooperation with growers during this season.

In areas of the state where infestation has not been sufficient to force stalk destruction deadlines, many people have asked for voluntary plow-up dates.

In the control zones of extreme southern and southeastern Texas where infestation is most serious, stalk destruction deadlines have all been met with very little dissension, and good cultural practices are being followed.

Valley Escrow Program Set Up In four Rio Grande Valley counties where the pink bollworm menace is a serious threat, cotton farmers recently voted 2 to 1 in favor of an escrow program designed to assure compliance with stalk destruction rules.

Under terms of the program to become effective during the 1956 season, cotton farmers in Hidalgo, Willacy, Cameron and Starr counties will post \$7.50 for each bale of cotton ginned to be put in the escrow fund. Growers who fail to meet the cotton stalk destruction deadline will be required to pay for plow-up of their fields from their escrow fund, in addition to penalties previously prescribed by law.

The First National Bank of McAllen, successful bidder to hold the multi-million dollar escrow fund, will return all money remaining in escrow to the growers 30 days after the plow-up deadline. The only deduction will be 6 cents per bale to the bank for salary, material and service costs.

I am personally very pleased to see this exerted effort being put forth by our Valley farmers to make their cotton insect-free.

New Insecticide Developments. Experiments with a new chemical which promises to be even more effective than DDT in combating the pink bollworm are being held on test plots over the state. The new chemical, Bayer No. 17147, is also believed to be effective against the boll weevil, whereas DDT is successful against pink bollworm only. It is also probable that fewer applications of the Bayer phosphorus compound would be necessary with the periodic treatments required when DDT is used.

With such intensive research on insecticides, compliance with our vital pink bollworm control regulations, and—most important—the full cooperation of Texas farmers, this threat to a major Texas cash crop will eventually be ended.

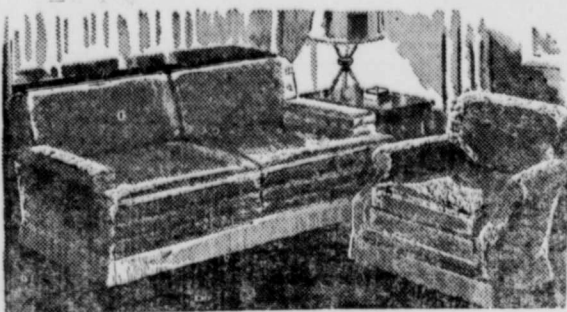

Veterans' News

Questions and Answers

Q. I am planning to take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. How many hours a week is considered to be full-time training?

A. Full-time training is considered to be the standard work-week of the firm where you are taking your training, but it generally may not be less than 36 hours a week.

Q. I applied for Korean GI Bill schooling shortly before my three-year starting deadline. Before I actually could begin class, I became ill. My deadline passed while I still was in bed, unable to go to school. Now that I am well again, will I be allowed to start under the Korean GI Bill?

A. No. The law requires that you actually must have started your GI training within three years from the date of your separation from service. There are no exceptions to this provision of the law.

Q. I am a Korea veteran with a service-connected disability. I want to get a GI insurance policy available to disabled Korea veterans. What is my deadline—one year from discharge, or one year from the date VA rated my disability?

A. Your deadline is one year from the date VA has determined your disability to be service-connected.

Q. I am a World War II veteran with a service-connected disability. I am in need of outpatient medical treatment for my ailment. Can I just go to my own doctor and ask him to send the bill to VA?

A. No. You must get prior authorization from VA, in order to obtain outpatient medical care. Also, you must go to a doctor authorized to provide this treatment at Government expense.

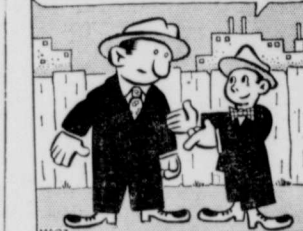
