FEEDERS DAY PROGRAM TO BE HELD AT BIG SPRING

Big Spring.—The second Annual Feeders Day program will be held at the Big Spring Experiment Station Friday May 26, when four pens of Herford calves that have been on feed for the past 180 days will be weighed, graded, sold and shipped for market for slaughter according to report of Fred Keathing, Supt. of Experiment Station. These experiments have been designed for the purpose of determining the most economical rations or combination of feeds to use in feeding out West Texas bred calves on West Texas grown feeds.

Four rations have been used in which milo heads were supplemented with cotton seed meal, red top cane fodder and lime stone flour. Pen No. 1, was given ground milo heads; pen No. 2, heads underground; pen No. 3, heads thrashed and ground, each pen was followed by hogs.

The agricultural and live stock committee of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce is arranging to serve lunch to the guests at the program on the 26. Representatives from A & M College and the Fort Worth Stock Yards will participate in the program which begins at ten o'clock. The calves will be shipped to the Fort Worth market in order to get the shrinkage and butchering percent.

PROMENT CHAMPION CITIZEN CALLED BY DEATH

Funeral services for D. J. McLeod, school trustee and prominent citizen of the Champion community for the past 20 years, were held in Roscoe last Saturday May 13 at 3 p. m. with interment following in the Roscoe cemetery. Services were at the church of Christ with the Rev. Luther Vaughan, of Abilene, officiating. Mr. McLeod died suddenly at 4:30 Friday morning at his home the result of a heart attack. He had plowed all day Thursday and was apparently in good health. He was unable to rest Thursday night however, and was stricken early the next morning. He died in the arms of his wife, after springing from his bed as the attack began.

Mr. McLeod came to Nolan County in 1911, and moved to the Champion community in 1913. For more than 15 years he was a trustee on the Champion School board, and was a leader in civic undertaking of the community.

Mr. McLeod was born on January 2, 1875, in Fort Bend County, Texas. He was married to Miss Mattie Bryce in Williamson County in 1899. Mrs. Sheron Adams of Roscoe, is the only surviving child of this union. Other survivors include two brothers, J. H. and S. B. McLeod, both of whom live in Lordsburg, N. M. A third brother, J. C. McLeod was buried in Williamson County only three days before Mr. McLeod's death.

NATIONAL WEALTH FELL OFF 115 BILLION IN 4 YEARS; PEAK REACHED IN 1920

New York, May 23.—The national wealth of the United States fell \$115,000,000,000 from 1920 to 1933, according to the appraisal of the National Industrial Conference board, made public today.

The national wealth in 1932 was \$247,000,000,000; in 1929 it was \$362,000,000,000. Dollar value means the dollar value of the country's physical assets—and factories, and other tangible goods.

The national wealth reached its peak in 1920 at \$488,700,000,000, or \$4,587 per capita. In 1931, it fell to \$280,300,000,000.

Year to year fluctuations do not accurately measure the wealth of the nation in terms of its physical units, but give instead the estimated dollar value of these units according to the prices for which they might theoretically have been sold in the different years.

Texas People Buying Beer At Home Now

Beer, easily available in most cities of bone-dry Texas, Saturday aroused wet and dry forces of the state to new antagonism. Meanwhile, federal, state and local authorities express conflicting views as to the responsibility for enforcing the Texas prohibition law.

Dry forces appealed to President Roosevelt and Senator Morris Sheppard, co-author of the Eighteenth Amendment, in an effort to stem a wet tide manifested by a flood of applications for federal licenses to retail the new 3.2 brew.

Indications from the state capital were that the rangers would not be employed against sellers of 3.2 beer and that enforcement of the Texas Dean law would be left to local authorities.

Local authorities, however, adopted differing policies. San Antonio anticipated "wide open" sale of beer when county and city officers said they would not bring and prosecute charges against beer vendors.

Meanwhile, reports of open sale of 3.2 beer came from various cities. Wichita Falls reported beer brewed in New Orleans was selling freely for 50 cents a bottle. At El Paso, beer brewed at St. Joseph, Mo., was offering strong competition to the Mexican beer sold across the border at Juarez.

Perraps the most liberal attitude prevailed in Galveston. There the distribution system reached such efficiency that hotel guests could telephone "Room Service" and have beer sent to their rooms.

Leading the dry forces against the widespread sale of beer was Mrs. J. M. Glass, president of the San Antonio chapter of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Both sides Saturday prepared for the battle of ballots, to be fought out August 26, when the voters will express their will on 3.2 beer in Texas and ratification of the federal prohibition repeal amendment.—Sweetwater Reporter.

Inch Rain Fell Wednesday Nite

One and one-sixteenth inches of rain fell in Loraine Wednesday night of this week, the first general rain of any consequence for more than two months. The ground was getting dry and many farmers where no showers had been received had begun to dry-plant.

The first shower fell about 8 o'clock and they continued for more than two hours. Reports from practically all of the territory are to the effect that rain of about the same proportions visited every section. No exceedingly heavy rain or hail has been reported. Light showers were continuing early Thursday morning.

The rain extended as far west as Big Spring where less than a half inch was reported, and east to Abilene where nearly three inches fell. Stamford reported four inches and other points in this section were visited by heavy rains.

Coming on top of showers of last week as it did the rain will probably afford plenty of moisture for planting. Where crops were dry planted they will come right up and go to growing.

The wet elements in some sections of Texas, notably the larger cities, are openly defying the Texas liquor laws by selling the new 3.2 beer. Such defiance of existing laws will not help the wet cause any when it comes before the voters on August 26.

Officers who fail and refuse to prosecute violations of existing laws because sentiment seems to favor the wet side just now are not doing their duty they swore the oath of office. Officers who will not do their duty along this line will shirk it in any other way that is convenient.

The farm mortgage moratorium law recently enacted by the Texas legislature has been declared unconstitutional by a judge of a district court. Such action is no more than the majority of us thought would happen to it.

Current Comment
From Washington

President Roosevelt was born January 30, 1882. He is, therefore, not old enough to remember the ancient greenback discussion, to say nothing of having had a hand in it. Profiting by the experience of others, he does not propose to be set down in history as a "greenbacker." Strictly speaking, a greenback is a United States note, backed by a Treasury reserve. Popularly and loosely regarded, a greenback may not have so firm a foundation. It is the President's view that the plans of the government for putting business on its feet should not rest on a greenback basis. Bond issues are preferred, with new taxes to take care of them. The federal sales tax has a strong backing. One wonders

who is going to have the say as to the form which new taxes will take. If Mr. Roosevelt cares to assume responsibility, the matter will be disposed of promptly. If the decision is left to Congress, there will be plenty of debate and deliberation, and specialists on money will have something to write about for some time to come.

The idea that someone ought to be kicked out of a Washington job, in order to give the other fellow a chance, has gained considerable headway of late. One of its ramifications was a provision in the independent offices supply bill to the effect that federal workers from states having more than their quota, were to be released. The Senate has stricken that provision from the measure, after the House had approved it, and the House will have to go over the matter again. What will happen there is a matter of conjecture. Without going into the merits of the case, laying off government employees was a popular notion at the start. It did not sit so well when it turned out that those to be discharged were sure to be "folks back home" to the legislators.

The President's proposal for the ending of War is his most important document having a distinctly world-wide significance. It has been looked upon favorably, in principle by many nations, and has received warm commendation by a few. For some time to come, the tendering of good offices in the direction of averting war will continue to be casting pearls before swine, but the discredit for the incomplete success such moves will be chargeable to the swine, and not to the pearls, or to the person who casts them. Geographically, the United States has few foreign contacts, and oceans separate that country from most of those who might become its enemies. War seems less of a necessity here than abroad. The countries of Europe have exposed land margins. Armies are within easy walking distance of each other. Proximity produces continual fear and toe-treading. Peace suggestions come naturally from America. They are not accepted naturally in many other quarters.

MISFORTUNE—AND THE
MAIL ORDER HOUSES

Misfortune has tramped thru Scurry County many times this year. Farm homes have been burned to the ground, sickness and death have visited old and young alike. Legs have been broken, costly operations have been frequent.

Had you stopped to think how much Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck and other mail order houses have contributed toward alleviating these Scurry County misfortunes?

They contributed nothing, as you know. They will contribute nothing tomorrow, nor the next day, nor next year. Neither do they contribute taxes, insurance, and other things worth while that make a community happy and prosperous.

The mail order houses are not

concerned with misfortune in Scurry County, unless it be that misfortune will deprive them of a few mail order dollars.

But there is a group of people in this county that is vitally and intensely and humanly interested in burned homes, in suffering children, in the death of neighbors.

That group is composed of the merchants who live in Snyder and the other Scurry County towns. This spring has been unusually hard on their pocketbooks, as far as donations to care for the misfortunes of their neighbors are concerned. But they continue to give and give and give, until it hurts more than they will ever let it be known.

Is a few cases, the very folks who have been helped with donations from Snyder merchants continue to send their money to mail order houses. They do not pause to think that a bulky catalog with vivid pictures is no substitute for friends who stick closer than brothers in a time of need.

Scurry County merchants are your friends, folks. They are not Indian givers, but they quite naturally don't have a very high opinion of the man who accepts gifts from them one day and then orders tires, drugs, clothing and other supplies from the mail order house the next day.

MOSQUITOS AND FLIES
ARE MAKING APPEARANCE

Austin, Texas, May 22.—Word has just been received by the State Department of Health that Mr. and Mrs. Mosquito and Mr. and Mrs. Fly, with their kinfolks are planning to take up their summer residence in the State. They state that, although many had died since last summer, they would soon have large families. Mrs. Mosquito raises from fifty to three hundred children at one time and only takes two weeks to have full grown children. Mrs. Fly bragged that she and her husband could be ancestors to a million flies in one season.

Mosquitoes are responsible for the spread of malaria, dengue, and yellow fever. Malaria is spread by the bite of the Anopheles or malaria mosquito. Dengue fever and yellow fever are transmitted by the Aedes aegypti or Tiger mosquito. The best way to prevent these diseases is to destroy the breeding places of the mosquito. They breed in any standing water, therefore, you should drain, ditch or fill such places, spray oil on water each week, too, or stock the water with surface minnows as they will eat the wiggle-tails. Houses should be screened.

Flies help spread typhoid fever, dysentery, diarrhoea, tuberculosis, anthrax, and cholera. They breed, live and feed in filth. To prevent their increase all refuse should be disposed of at once, garbage kept in covered containers, privies made sanitary and houses screened. Every neighborhood raises its own flies so that their number is an excellent index to the sanitary conditions. The State Health Department, County and City Health Officers are only too glad to assist in banishing this source of disease.

ON TEXAS FARMS

One ton of grass and clover seed has been ordered by 30 Anderson county farmers for sowing in pastures they are improving as demonstrations. The county agent says there were only two farmers last year improving permanent pastures.

Clearing away all underbrush, thinning out trees to an average of 40 to 50 feet apart, working soil under trees, and finally topworking the native pecan trees to improved varieties are steps being taken by many Wise county farmers this year in improving their native pecan bottoms in cooperation with the county agent.

Good results in the use of red squill in killing rats is reported by the county agent of Cameron county from San Benito where a campaign has been waged by a local civic organization in cooperation with the U. S. Biological Survey. Red squill is relatively harmless to humans and domestic animals, yet a good raticide, authorities say.

Using state certified seed, 4-H club boys of Bosque county made yields of grain sorghums 25% greater than the average last year. Seed they produced has been scattered over the county by the county agent who reports

50 boys again growing certified seed crops on plots ranging from one to 15 acres.

Twenty hogs worth \$43.26 on the market were butchered and cured the A. & M. Way last winter by D. O. Williams of Lubbock county. He has sold \$61.85 worth of cured meat and has plenty left to supply his family one year.

Buffalo grass, ordinarily very attractive to livestock, couldn't compete last fall with ensilage when Henry Christ, Jr., of Lavaca county opened his trench silo, built and filled in cooperation with the county agent. Stock had to be driven to the field to graze and finally the feeding ensilage was stopped entirely to force the cattle to clean up the grass in the corn patch.

FROM ZERO TO \$650

The month of May has brought activity in more lines than one, but P. M. Bolin, building inspector, rejoices most in the new song of hammer and saw.

For more than two years Snyder's building permits have been so low that they couldn't even speak in a whisper. It's really news therefore, to announce that two permits totaling \$650 were recorded by Mr. Bolin from May 1 to May 15. Maybe, he hopes, the figure will reach past \$1,000 before the month is past.

A \$650 permit for an addition to the Stinson Camp Ground accounts for the major portion of the total. The \$50 permit was taken out by the Texas Public Utilities Corporation for an ice loading rack.

SOME DAMAGE
DONE BY HAIL

The first rain for several weeks fell over Lynn County Wednesday afternoon and night, the precipitation ranging from very light showers in many localities to almost an inch in and around Tahoka.

The rain in Tahoka was accompanied by heavy hail, which stripped trees, rose bushes and shrubbery of much of their foliage, ruined a few automobile tops, and did slight damage to roofs. Light showers fell in the afternoon, registering .34 of an inch in Tahoka, but the heavy rainfall and hail came about sunset and for thirty minutes thereafter. It is possible that the total precipitation here was a little heavier than that indicated by the rain gage, since it is doubtful if the hail could be accurately measured. The total precipitation here measured .96 of an inch.
