6 Planes Racing Across U. S. In Non-Stop Derby Five Seamen Killed When Tanker Explodes At Sea

Others Wounded In Tragedy; 29 Survivors Rescued

Tanker Shreveport Enroute To Gulf Ports Explodes Off North Carolina; Was In Ballast.

BODIES BLOWN TO BITS BY EXPLOSION

Spanish Steamer Aldecoa Makes Rescue; Tanker Is Property of Cities Oil Company, of New York.

(By Associated Press)

SOUTHPORT, N. C., Sept. 12.—Five seamen were killed and four others injured in an explosion at sea on the tanker Shreveport, enroute to Gulf ports, off Frying Pan Shoals near here. Twenty-nine survivors were rescued by the Spanish steamer Aldecoa and brought to the quarantine station here.

The dead: A. Bergman, chief mate; Harold Hopkins, second mate; D. M. Dagora, pumpman; Sven Persson, machinist. The boatman, unidentified.

The injured are: Capt. E. A. Simons, of Baltimore, master of the ship; M. Goldberg, of Philadelphia, seaman; R. S. Churchill, Cliftondale, Mass., steward; Fred Lindberger, address unknown.

Ship Still Floating. The ship was demolished by the explosion but at latest reports tonight had not sunk. The coast guard Modoc had been ordered to stand by.

According to word from the survivors, the first explosion came with the ship on fire.

Month's Building Passes \$100,000

Five Permits Issued Yesterday For \$20,000 Sends Year's Total to \$2,568,264; Set Record.

Building permits for the month of September yesterday soared above the \$100,000 mark as five permits totaling \$20,000 were issued from the city offices here.

The rapid issuance of building permits for the past few days give indication that the month's total will be among the highest of the year.

Four for Brick Residences. Four of the permits granted yesterday were for brick residences, and the fourth for a frame store building.

The year's total now stands at the new high mark of \$2,568,264 for 501 permits. Twenty-eight permits have been granted this month to aggregate \$114,570.

Permits Issued. Permits issued yesterday include: \$8,000 for the construction of a residence at 1924 Avenue G; a residence at 3423 23rd Street, at a cost of \$4,000 for S. E. Holt, contractor; and G. E. Ewing, owner; \$5,000 to C. A. Ginn, contractor, and O. C. Graves, for the construction of a residence at 1908 16th Street, and \$1,500 to J. C. Dean for the construction of a store building to be made of frame and stucco.

SENDS GREETINGS OF TEXAS DEMOS

CORRICANA, Sept. 12. (P)—Complying with instructions in a resolution adopted yesterday at the state Democratic convention in Dallas, W. A. Tarver, permanent chairman, today sent the following telegram to Governor Alfred E. Smith and Senator Joseph T. Robinson:

"The Democratic convention sends you greetings of confidence and esteem, and the assurance from the Texas Democracy of a magnificent majority for the national ticket in November. All outstanding leaders, including Governor Dan Moody, are loyally supporting the ticket. Men and women delegates at the convention were enthusiastic for both the ticket and platform."

Coolidge Worried Over \$94,000,000 Treasury Deficit

Calls Cabinet Members Into Conference As Soon As He Returns to White House; No Plans Made.

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Having the secretary of "doing something" about the \$94,000,000 treasury deficit expected next June 30 uppermost in his mind, President Coolidge discussed reduction of federal expenditures with his cabinet officers immediately upon returning to Washington today from a three-month vacation in Wisconsin.

The Chief Executive indicated at the station that he desired to confer with a number of cabinet officers as soon as possible. Upon reaching the White House he hurried to his office and had Brigadier General H. M. Lord, director of the budget, summoned.

Reductions Likely

After his conference General Lord said that he had discussed budget matters with the President and that they had both given some consideration to the treasury deficit. The director said that no definite plans for reduction of expenditures had been worked out.

Secretary Kellogg of the state department was the first cabinet member to visit the executive offices where he remained for over one hour. At the end of the conference the Secretary of State said that he had not made any formal report concerning his recent trip to Europe to sign the anti-war treaty.

PIONEERS GATHER

Record Attendance Expected In Annual Picnic

The picnic will open in the afternoon with a short business session of the association in which the election of officers will be held. After that a varied program of entertainment is to be offered until 5 o'clock when an old-fashioned basket supper picnic will be spread.

MUST TAKE EXAMS

Students Here Requested to Report for Physical Exam

Making another effort to relieve as much as possible the congestion of the opening days of the college, Registrar E. L. Dohoney, of Texas Technological college, yesterday, issued a statement in which he requested all prospective freshmen and new students who are now in Lubbock and planning to re-enter school this fall to report at the Lubbock Sanitarium this week for their physical examinations.

Former students must show their record books and new students should present their entrance cards. "A great deal of the congestion of registration is due to the tardy physical examinations," Mr. Dohoney said. "By having all the Lubbock students examined early, we hope to relieve this situation."

Every student is required to take one of the examinations before he is allowed to register.

Demo Choice Brands Statement that He Was Drunk At Fair As Lie; Calls for Investigation.

"DISGUSTINGLY DRUNK" THE STATEMENT SAID

Mrs. Sanford, Syracuse Woman Is Implicated; Says She Will Make Denial Of Writing Letter.

(By Associated Press)

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 12.—In a statement entitled "Nailing A Lie In The Whispering Campaign," Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York took his first official cognizance of the campaign of slander which democratic party leaders charge is being waged against him from "lip to ear."

The statement consists chiefly of a series of letters and telegrams concerning a charge that he was "disgustingly drunk" at the state fair at Syracuse, which is alleged to have been made in a letter from Mrs. Florence Sanford of Syracuse to a friend in Parkersburg, W. Va.

Read to Social Gathering

The first letter quoted in the statement is from W. A. Keenan of Parkersburg to democratic headquarters in Syracuse, and tells of the alleged letter and the fact that it was read to a social gathering. The letter requests democratic headquarters to obtain a statement from someone living in Syracuse and a member of some other political party with which to refute the charges alleged to have been made in the letter read at the gathering.

William H. Kelley, democratic leader in Syracuse referred the matter to Governor Smith by telephone, the governor's statement continues, and obtained a statement from State Senator George R. Pearson of New York member of the advisory board of the state fair and an escort for the governor during his visit to the fair. Senator Pearson denied that the governor had read the letter.

3 DIE IN PLANE CRASH

Police said Berry, amateur flier, took off from the Oakland airport, evidently to give the girl and her brother a pleasure trip. Cause of the accident was undetermined.

Plot to Overthrow Spain's Government is Uncovered

2,000 Arrests Are Made; Political Leaders Sought

(By Associated Press)

BORDEAUX, France, Sept. 12.—Overthrow of the Spanish government and arrest of all its high officials for immediate trial and deportation were vowed, aims of the plot against the rule of Primo de Rivera, according to news trickling across the Spanish frontier.

The minister of the Interior, "Clonardo," one of the leading newspapers of this border city, was thwarted by the dictator's police.

The newspaper states the frontier towns of Hendaye and Bayonne have been made in various parts of Spain. The prisoners are said to include all the leading plotters and it is added that the Archbishop of Saragossa, the Rev. Vidal Y Veraguera, has been invited to retire to a convent to save himself from going to prison.

The police say the Spanish liberal and republican elements, together with communists, decided to strike a blow which had been scheduled for later in the autumn. Because King Alfonso was away, Martinez Anido, minister of the interior, was the target of the plot.

They drew up a list of persons to be arrested and taxis scoured Madrid early Tuesday. More than a score of arrests were made in the capital, including that of Alexander Lerroux, leader of the liberal republican party.

The arrest of Francisco A. Camba, leader of the Catalan separatist party, and Sanchez Guerra, a former prime minister of Spain is understood to be sought.

Is Found Murdered

FULTON, Mo., Sept. 12. (P)—Curtis Sutermeister, 20 years old, son of Paul A. Sutermeister, former telegraph editor of the Kansas City Star, was found dead with a bullet hole in the temple, near here late today. He had been dead at least 12 hours.

BURGLAR GETS \$5 MORE

Pants Thief Makes Another Haul In Lubbock

Although most of Lubbock took extra precaution Tuesday night, the financial status of one local man is \$5 below what it was the first of the week as a result of the activities of the "pants" burglar, who Monday night pilfered the contents of about a dozen trouser pockets in the city.

When the Lubbock man started to put on his trousers yesterday they failed to be on the chair where they had left them. A search discovered them hanging partly out of the window with the contents of the pockets missing. The home entered is on East Broadway near the fair grounds. Chicago Mother of Nine Shoots To Kill; Former Constable Is Slain In Bed

Walks Into Police Station With Gun and Tells Story Of Crime; Victim Has Threatened Her With Arrest And Extorted Money from Her for Silence

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—A shabbily dressed woman, who at 30 is the mother and sole support of nine children and who expects another baby in two months walked into a police station and quietly laid a pistol on the sergeant's desk.

"I just killed a man," she told him. "I shot him at his home while he slept. Look me up."

The woman was Mrs. Ada Johnson, a widow who appeared old beyond her 30 years and her victim was Dominick Finn, 22, married and a former constable. Mrs. Johnson, whose oldest child is 15, told the police she sold her house to support her family and that Finn found it out and extorted money from her in return for his silence when she had no more money, she said, he forced her to submit to his attentions on a threat he would have her arrested. "My two boys, eight months old, are his," she told the police, "and the baby to be born in two months is his. A baby was born to his wife in a hospital Monday. Yesterday I asked him for money for my baby. He told me he would bring some but never came so I went to his home, climbed in a window and shot him while he slept." Her oldest son accompanied her to the police station. The eight other children were found at home asleep. Mrs. Johnson was held without bail on a charge of murder.

Funeral Is Delayed

3 Youths Held In Connection With Double Slaying

Farmer Boys Who Live Near Where Bodies Were Found Are Jailed; Further Investigations Made.

17-YEAR-OLD MAKES PARTIAL CONFESSION

Robbery Is Thought To Have Been Motive for the Murder of Shook Brothers; Took Place Friday.

(By Associated Press)

BRECKENRIDGE, Sept. 12.—Three farmer youths who live near where searchers yesterday found the bodies of Lucius and Leon Shook, brothers, who resided 18 miles south of here, today were held in Eastland jail pending further investigation.

Sheriff John Hart, of Eastland county asserted that a 17-year-old boy had confessed orally to a part in the crime.

The double slaying, believed motivated by robbery, occurred Friday night, officers said after questioning the suspects.

The bodies were found on an oil lease about 400 yards from a hut in which the brothers lived. One had been shot through the heart and both bodies indicated the men had been beaten before their death.

A hunt for the two Shooks was started when a sister, living in Chicago, became fearful after they had failed to keep an engagement with her Sunday.

Home Double Blow

Father Succumbs When the News of Son's Sudden Death Is Given Him; Mother Prostrated.

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Sept. 12.—Death struck twice in a Dallas home today. Frank Erwin, Jr., 14, falling victim to a huge boulder which crashed him while he was playing with two companions under a cliff ledge, and his father dying from shock two hours after he had learned of the fate of his son.

The boy's mother is under the care of physicians.

Were Playing Pirates

For more than a month the boy and his chums had been playing "pirates" of high cliffs surrounding a creek. Accompanied by Gwynn Bailey and Ross Bedell, the boy went to the cliff to complete work on a cave. A boulder described as big as an automobile struck young Erwin and he rolled into a creek bottom.

Though the Bailey had was slightly injured, he ran to summon aid while the companion tugged at the huge rock.

BOY BURIED IN CAVE

8-Year-Old Dies In Small Cave Near Mexia

Colorful Aerial Maneuvers Mark National Air Fete

Thrills Aplenty for Aviation Fans As 3 Trans-Continental Caravans End Races At Field.

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12.—Three transcontinental caravans of aircraft today swooped down on Mines Field, completing feature races of the 1928 national air races, while another group of planes dropped in from Oakland in a 450-mile California race.

The fifth great day of the national aviation meet also saw Colonel Lindbergh, taking part in the air extravaganza, filling a gap made by Monday's fatal crash of a crack army pilot.

Lindbergh Takes Part. Piloting an army bomber, Lindbergh took the air as the leader of the army's stunt trio. "The Three Continentals" in the first place, the trio's leader, Lieutenant J. J. Williams, who died Monday night after crashing his plane to earth while he and his teammates were doing a difficult outside loop.

The international feature event, which started at Windsor, Ont., was declared by the air meet announcer to have been won by William H. Drury, who flashed his Waco plane over the Mines Field finish line at 3:05 o'clock. The final dash was started at Las Vegas, Nev., at noon Drury last night had a lead of six hours over his remaining competitor, Kennedy Whyte.

Balough Wins In Class B. The transcontinental Class B race, which started at New York, was completed at mid-afternoon with the arrival of 15 remaining contestants on the final spur, from San Diego. E. E. Balough of Chicago, whose Laird plane had led much of the way, flashed over the line first, John P. Wood, of Waukegan, Wis., arrived second in a Waco and another Waco plane, piloted by John Livingston of Aurora, Ill., landed third.

Balough crossed the finish line at the unofficial time of 2:37 p. m. Wood at 2:39 and Livingston at 2:40 p. m. The other transcontinental Class B finishing in the order of their arrival here.

In absence of any official announcement of the winner of the transcontinental Class B race, which will not be made until time has been taken to compute the elapsed time of the 14 planes in the long grind, pilots of the planes expressed belief that Don Livingston

9 Make Start In 1st Air Marathon Across Continent

Two Are Forced Down Due To Trouble While One Plane Returns to Field; Big Purse Offered.

ART GOEBEL IS BIG FAVORITE TO WIN

Take-offs Occupy Entire Day; 10,000 Look On As Giant Ships Soar Westward; Levine Entered.

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 12.—One of the greatest air races in history was underway tonight. Roaring across the continent in huge ships built to cover thousands of miles without a halt, a corps of veteran fliers was at the controls of the non-stop racers in the Trans-Continental Air Derby.

With Mines Field, Los Angeles, as their goal, the big planes took off at long intervals today.

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Nine planes took to the air today in a mighty non-stop marathon to Los Angeles, but before many hours two ships had been forced down en route and another had given up the attempt and returned to the starting point.

The first to come to grief was the Stinson piloted by Clifford McMillin, Syracuse. It landed on a Pennsylvania mountain top after leading the field into the air.

Stiffman Plane Returns. Another Stinson, the only other one in the race, got a clogged gas line tonight and also made a forced landing in Pennsylvania. The second was piloted by Randolph Page of Northville, Mich. The plane that came back was Mrs. James A. Still-

YOUR CHILDREN

by Olive Roberts Barton

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Fall is coming — the time of coughs and colds.

Colds are contagious in spite of the common belief to the contrary. If any one in the family has a cold, he should keep away from the children as much as possible, doing all his coughing, sneezing and blowing into a handkerchief, and the handkerchiefs kept by themselves until wash day, and then thoroughly boiled to kill the germs.

Every member of a family should have his own towel and wash cloth at all times, but this is particularly necessary if he has a cold.

He should not go to a movie where his breath is spreading germs into the air for children to breathe. Children in school get colds from other children. That is why the air should be changed frequently and the rooms flushed often. The teacher should insist on all children having clean handkerchiefs and coughing and sneezing into them.

But, of course, children do catch cold. The minimum is not here. Some small children are particularly susceptible to croup. There are two kinds: catarrhal croup is common; diphtheritic croup is more dangerous, but fortunately much less prevalent.

Catarrhal or common croup comes suddenly in the night with a dry, hoarse, barking cough. Diphtheritic croup does not come so suddenly. It usually gets warning. The child gets hoarse gradually and is not well. He does not respond to home treatment and his difficulty in breathing grows.

A physician should be called the minute a mother has any suspicion of it. Common or catarrhal croup often causes worry and excitement in the night because it comes so suddenly to an apparently well child.

There is no mistaking croup. It has a sound all its own. Don't get excited—but see that the child is made warm at once. Steam is effective. Get a tea-kettle and set it boiling near him so that he may breathe the steam. Be careful not to burn or scald him and don't leave him alone with the kettle. A cloth over the kettle, carried to the child, tent-like, is a help.

Cold compresses around his throat and neck are good—cloths wrung out in cold water. Hot compresses are equally effective, but be careful not to scald him.

Try to make him vomit by giving him one-half teaspoonful of ipecac. This may be repeated in 15 minutes if the first dose does not get results.

Some people keep on hand regular croup medicine provided by their doctors for such emergencies. It is a wise precaution. Let the child rest in bed the next day and give him very light food. Children with chronic croup outgrow it in time.

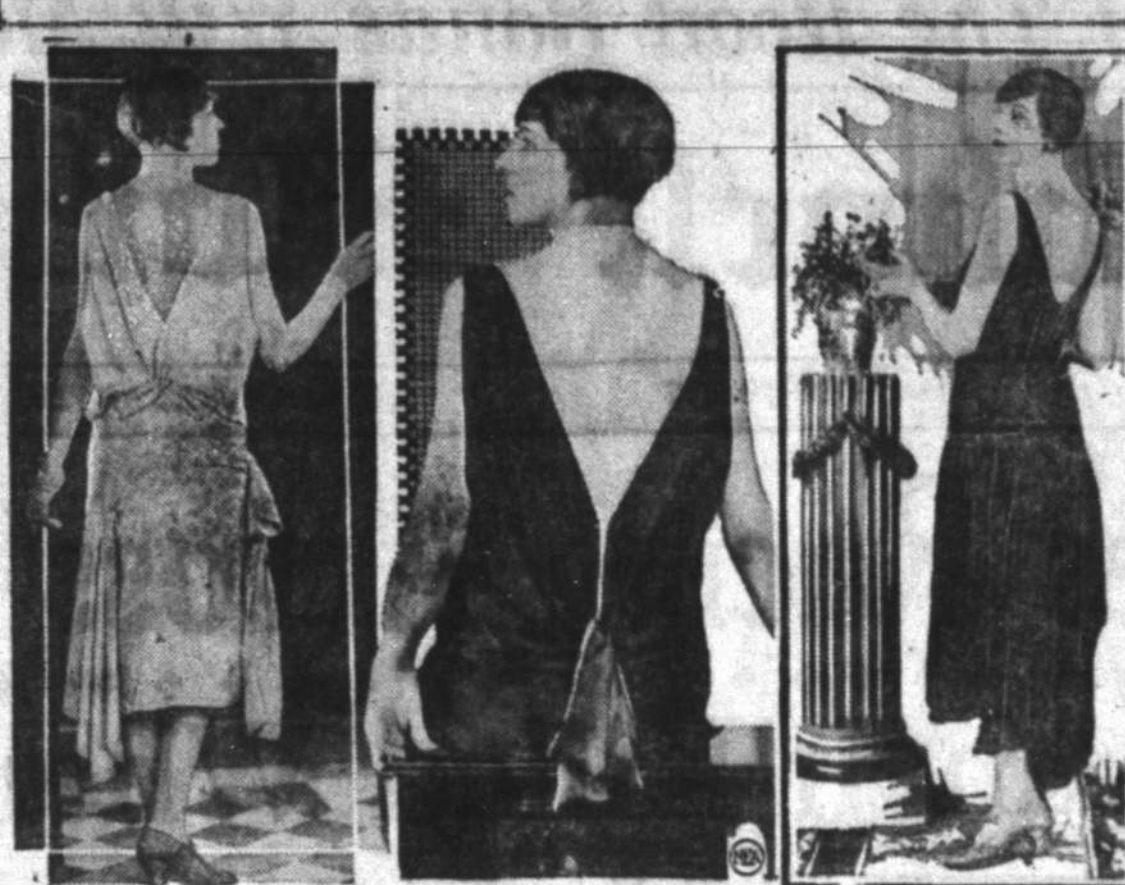

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Floydada Schools Have 901 Enrolled

Increase Necessitates Employment of Two Extra Teachers; Classes Are Overflowing.

(Special To The Avalanche.) FLOYDADA, Sept. 12.—With practically every class in the three schools in Floydada showing a decided increase in enrollment over the past year it will be necessary for the two additional instructors to be employed at once, according to W. E. Patten, superintendent. Latin and English as well as General Science and Math. classes are crowded to overflowing and instructors for these departments must be selected at once.

Have Increase of 127. Showing an increase of 127 students in the three schools the Floydada schools now have an enrollment of 901 compared to the enrollment of 774 at the close of September, 1927. Of this number there was an increase of 39 in the high school, 52 in the East Ward and 36 in the West Ward school. Shortly after the opening of school it became necessary to divide the primary department and assign a

new teacher for those grades. Although the vocational agricultural department was inaugurated in the local high school only last year, and the enrollment at that time was less than forty students, the interest in this department has created an enrollment this season of more than double the previous enrollment. The same has proven true in the Home Economics classes, and an additional instructor was secured for that department.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. (AP)—The cotton market was less active today. While advances were not fully maintained, a steeper undertone was reported. After selling up to 17.99 early, December broke to 17.82, but steadied up again in later trading and closed at 17.90. The general market closed steady, at net advances of 4 to 7 points.

The opening was quiet, but steady at advances of 4 to 13 points. Active months showed net gains of 10 to 16 points in early trading on covering or rebuying by recent sellers, together with some trade and local buying promoted by relatively steady cables, continued unfavorable crop advices, and more optimistic views of the situation in the goods market encouraged by reports of larger sales of print cloths at declines yesterday.

October sold up to 18.14 and March to 17.98 but demand was supplied by southern selling or renewed liquidation, and the forenoon market turning easier. Another little spurt of buying on bullish features in the weekly report of the weather bureau, subsided quickly enough to indicate that this factor had been pretty well discounted, and the market worked back to about or a little below yesterday's closing figures during the afternoon.

October contracts sold off to 17.91 and March to 17.74, net declines of 2 to 4 points. There appeared to be liquidation by earlier buyers who were disappointed by the failure of the weekly report to stimulate demand more importantly. Some southern selling was also in evidence but on the whole offerings were much less active than earlier in the week. Last prices showed rallies of 3 to 10 points from the lowest on renewed coverings.

It was reported some authorities estimated deterioration in crop prospects since Sept. 1, at about 250,000 bales, and a private report estimated consumption in this country for August at 505,000 bales, against 439,000 for July. These figures may have helped the tone on the market. A private crop report estimating the yield of 14,132,000 bales, also attracted bullish comment.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 12. (AP)—Despite the stimulus of a bullishly construed weekly weather and crop summary trading in the cotton market today was rather slack with price fluctuations two-sided. After advancing about 78 cents a bale on the crop report prices sagged back to new lows for the day under hedge sellings.

December contracts sold off from 17.44 to 17.27. A slight rally in final trading carried the option up to 17.34 where it closed, net 3 points up for the day. The general mar-

ket closed steady at a net advance of 2 to 4 points.
The market opened steady at an advance of 10 to 13 points in response to relatively higher Liverpool cables. The early demand was not aggressive, however, and was quickly absorbed by ring selling probably induced by fears of a bearish weekly summary and the dry weather map. October eased back to 17.22, December 17.29 and January 17.30, or 13 to 15 points under the opening prices. When the report was issued it proved less favorable than the trade expected and a moderate demand developed. October made a new high at 17.37, while later positions duplicated their earlier highs at 17.44 for December and 17.43 for January, or 13 to 15 points up from the lows and 10 to 15 points above the previous close.

The bulge attracted hedge selling and in the period after mid-session prices made new lows for the day at 17.20 for October 17.26 for December and 17.23 for January, or 15 to 18 points under the highs. In final trading shorts covered and the market rallied 7 to 9 points, October closing at 17.26 and January 17.35, or 2 to 6 points net up.

700 were 4700 less than a week ago but 5,000 larger than the same day last year.

HANDS OFF THE MONROE DOCTRINE

The council of the League of Nations displayed excellent judgment in refusing the request of Costa Rica that it fix a definition of our Monroe Doctrine. Its suggestion that the countries of the western continent fix their own interpretation of that famous policy maintain the status quo and leaves the United States the privilege and duty of protecting the western hemisphere against European aggression. Any definition by the league council would have resulted in a maze of conflicting interpretations which could not fail to react to the disadvantage of the United States and the Latin-American countries.

Most of the protests against the Monroe Doctrine emanate from European sources or are inaugurated by European influences. For almost a century European exploiters have been handicapped by the vigilance of the United States. They have sought every possible avenue to discredit the policy; to bring pressure from European as well as Latin-American nations to bear in their efforts to induce the United States to "back down." The would-be exploiters have found ready sympathy among certain political elements in Latin-America, but those conservatives who oppose the Monroe Doctrine are far from numerous.

The effort to inject the Monroe Doctrine into the deliberations of the League of Nations was doubtless inaugurated by the same sinister influences that have sought other avenues to effect modification of the policy. The appeal to the league council had all the earmarks of former attempts, the Costa Rica representative being classed with those radicals who for several years have been a disturbing factor in Central American politics.

Among the conservative elements of Latin-America, representing the great majority of property owners, the Monroe Doctrine is looked upon as a safeguard that must be maintained. They realize that any modification of the policy would be construed as a signal for the political adventurers and European exploiters to carry out their designs, but so long as the Monroe Doctrine remains in effect it will serve as a deterrent to those whose ambition it is to loot those Latin-American republics incapable of defending themselves.

WHAT ABOUT INTERNATIONAL SPORTS?

Because of disturbances, verbal and otherwise, that have taken place between players and officials in international sports contests in general, the question is being asked in some quarters: "Are sporting engagements with an international flavor accomplishing all that has been expected of them toward promoting friendly intercourse between nations?" In all fairness to these exchanges of sporting relations, as a whole, including the annual tours of Japanese and American baseball nines, the answer must be emphatically in the affirmative. The hesitancy apparent in certain directions in giving athletics due credit in this respect can be traced, for the most part, to the disposition to place too much emphasis upon certain specific instances where good sportsmanship has failed to receive proper consideration in the regulation of the contests.

Sending sports teams from one country to another is not a new departure, by any means, although in the last few years this practice has been carried on more extensively than ever before. International competition is the highest rung in the ladder of athletics. Each previous, progressive step has not been without its struggles, and hence, when this latest and greatest one is challenged, why should not the ardor of conquest inspired by the confidence inspired by past victories? Can there be a finer goal for sports to aim at than that of helping to maintain cordial relations between nations?

In justice to those who have arranged sports engagements between the different

nationalities, it must be said that the inharmonious phases have been greatly exaggerated in many instances. Even though this were not the case, however, and conditions were as bad as painted, the remedy would seem to rest not in halting these worth-while proceedings, as some claim, but rather in reverting more closely than in the past to the code of ethics which underlies all true sports activities.

MOVING DAY

"Moving Day" has come to be regarded as a bugbear. And yet, although no statistics are available on the subject, it is certainly reasonable to assume that at least as many people should welcome "moving day" as rail against it. One basis for this conclusion is that the removal of not infrequently takes place because it has been found possible to better the family position. When people are going to move they naturally seek to move to a better place, not a poorer one, nor even to one "just as good." Removals do not necessarily indicate progress, but frequently they do indicate opportunities taken advantage of, steps upward in the scale of human welfare and happiness. As such they are landmarks of advancement.

Among the advantages of "moving day" must be noted the excellent opportunity which it affords for taking stock of one's situation, and for eliminating the accumulation of unnecessary possessions which so often accrue to the householder without his being aware of the process. Even though the move be only the annual migration from country to town, what a welcome occasion it offers for getting rid of barnacles! It keeps us "traveling light," which is frequently synonymous with "traveling right."

Besides, this change of base has within it all the elements of high romance, even though the new homestead be only in the next street. There will be new scenes outside the windows, new neighbors on either side of us—and who can know what blessings may not arise out of these new associations? And lives there a man who does not thrill at seeing a grand piano taken out of a fourth-story window?

COMBATING THE CRIMINAL

"French criminologists, proposing a revival of the ancient custom of branding criminals, reflect the seriousness with which nations other than ours take the problem of suppressing crime," says the San Francisco Chronicle. "On the ratio of homicides in France and the United States, our crime rate is about six and one-half times that of France. The idea of branding, even by painless chemical means, is not likely to be revived. But the mere fact that it has been proposed by responsible criminologists shows an attitude of mind on the part of the French that partially explains their low criminal rate as compared with ours. The habitual criminal is an enemy of society and is treated as such. As soon as the American public has that feeling in the matter the criminal rate in the United States will show a rapid decline without resorting to any such drastic methods as is now being discussed in Paris." Unquestionably there is a need for a more active public consciousness in the matter of crime. Changes in our legal and judicial system, sorely needed in many instances, must result from public demand that understand the seriousness of the problem and the necessity for sterner justice and expedited trials and convictions. In comparison with Europe, our American crime situation is nothing short of disgraceful. Misplaced, maudlin sympathy has created parole, pardon and good conduct systems that often turn the most case-hardened of felons out to prey again on society. Anti-crime activity has been deflected from its proper channels into proposals for useless and restrictive small-arms laws and the like. Criminals in sensational cases have been made to appear as martyrs. In New York which has laws that give life imprisonment automatically when a criminal is convicted for four felonies, crime is decreasing. An aroused public consciousness is needed to combat the criminal, not more laws which restrict the law abiding citizen.

THE VALUE OF OPTIMISM

Here is a challenge: for every satirist, critic and pessimist who has done a constructive job for civilization we will produce the names of 10 equally substantial optimists.

It is the believers in their fellowmen, the leaders who dream dreams and then strive to make their dreams come true, the seekers after the good in mankind in order that it may be nourished and caused to grow—it is these and these alone who have built the House of Happiness and led the race to higher levels.

The Reverend William P. Merrill, D. D., pastor of the Brick Presbyterian church, New York, said the other day: "We may be thankful that there are thousands of optimists for one cynic." We will not travel so far with the philosophy of Schopenhauer as we will with the philosophy of hope. The booster attitude may distress some of our intelligent as an exaggerated defense erected by a fatuous mankind against the evils of life. But the point is that it boosts. Fault-finding doesn't; it merely strips one of all inspiration to help his fellows by accentuating the existence of every possible depressing fact.

When Christian, in Pilgrim's Progress, could not glimpse the wicket gate, Evangelist asked him if he could see a distant light. "I think I can," said Christian. And eventually, in that thought, he arrived at the gate. Keeping one's eye on the light is far more likely to get one forward than studying scientifically the mud in the Slough of Despond.

PRESS COMMENTS

A NEW KIND OF PEACE
Fourteen nations have set their signatures to the Kellogg-Briand anti-war treaty and 46 others have been invited to do likewise. There is rejoicing on every hand in many different nations. There is strong belief and hope that this treaty really does "strike at the roots of war," as Mr. Briand has said. There have been other "peace pacts," but this one seems to convey a new meaning to the peoples of the world. In his address of welcome to the other signatories, Briand explained what the difference is.

For the first time, on general plans accessible to all nations, a congress of peace does something else than settle, politically, the immediate conditions of a particular peace. For the first time, on a comprehensive and absolute scale, a treaty is truly devoted to the establishment of peace, initiating a new law and freed from all political considerations. Such a treaty is a beginning and not an end in itself.

He quoted from the treaty itself: "For the first time in the face of the whole world, through a solemn covenant involving the honor of great nations... war is renounced unreservedly as an instrument of national policy."

It is a fit subject for rejoicing and thanksgiving. It is now up to the peoples of the earth, and their leaders, to see that the "beginning" so auspiciously made be courage-

ously and honorably followed to its planned end.—Corpus Christi Times.

As one travels over a good-surfaced road today where there was only a poor piece of dirt road a few years ago, and consider the savings effected in fuel consumption and tires, to say nothing of the saving in time and the greater comfort and convenience of the good road, one wonders why we tolerate the poor road when it is such an expensive luxury. But the reasons are plain. It takes money to build roads, and that money can be provided only by taxes or borrowing. General property taxes are already too heavy, and certainly no one should borrow unless he have the incoming revenue to repay. Make the gas tax big enough to pay for the roads, distribute it equitably among all roads, and we would have the money, and would also be justified in borrowing to a limited extent against anticipated revenues.

As nearly as the editor of this paper can figure out, it will take a gas tax of 5 cents to provide this state with an adequate system of roads. If we had that gas tax we could have the surfaced roads almost everywhere, and if we had the surfaced roads we would save the gas tax. In other words, an adequate gas tax would cost us nothing, and we would have the good roads thrown in for nothing.—Morris (Minn.) Tribune.

YOUR HEALTH

How Man's Brain Is Different From Ape's

By DR. MORRIS FISHER
Editor, Journal of the American Medical Ass'n and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine

The weight of the average man's brain is from 1300 to 1500 grams, or about three pounds. A woman's brain averages from 1150 to 1350 grams, which is a little less.

For a while it was thought that brain weight was a definite indication of mental capacity, but the evidence in this direction is not sufficient to establish the point. Brains vary in weight according to the time of life, the greatest weights being from 30 to 50 years of age.

Heavier Brains
The average weight of the brains in 100 distinguished men was 1469.65 grams, which is about 3 1/4 pounds above the average weight of European brains. Chinese brains, a little less in weight than those of Americans, are also those of the natives of Africa and Australia and the Hindus.

Intelligence
All everyone knows, the brain is full of complex convolutions, wrinkles and fissures. The human brain is much more intricate in its arrangement than is that of the ape or of the lower animals.

This complexity is therefore definitely associated with intelligence. The expansion and development of certain portions of the brain is associated with increased ability in certain activities.

Enlargement of the temporal lobe, that portion of the brain on the sides and toward the front, extends the sphere of ability to hear, and the associated activities of skilled performance depending on hearing.

What Education Really Is

BY M. H. DUNCAN

Tapping the Resources of Children.
In poetry and song, the writers of different periods have pointed out the dialkies of children for the average school where, under a crabbed, sour-faced teacher with a birch rod in hand, they are forced to learn their lessons. Even in our day we know the rejoicing of children when a holiday is announced and we know how glad they are when the school term is over and vacation begins. Even today we know how reluctantly the boy leaves his fishing rod and the swimming pool in September and turns his face towards the school room. It is well known in the past that children had rather be out of school than in it because the great major-book program that they were driven to was just the thing they most needed.

William James once said that the average man used not more than 10 per cent of his resources. If that be true of men in the world of affairs up against the vital problems of living, how much more is it true of boys and girls in school where they are largely driven to their tasks. Children feel that many of the things they are required to do in school do not really satisfy any of the vital needs of their lives and they refuse to give themselves to their tasks. The poor attendance, the large school mortality, and the low grades made in the average American public school are but a reflection of such an attitude towards their work. During the past 25 years we have thought that we have made wonderful progress in education and we have done many things to improve the mechanical side of our work, but we have not seen, as we should have seen, the necessity of getting more of the child into his work. We have been so busy with teacher talk that we have found little place for pupil activity. We have been so interested in having the children reproduce what others have said that

we have had little time for their producing the things needed in their own lives.

In the Lubbock public schools we are making an effort to avoid, as much as we can, the weakness of the average school. We are trying to enlist the pupil by making the work meet his real needs. We are endeavoring to tap the child's resources, to loosen him up, and to get him to put himself into his work by making the school program such as will help him to solve the vital problems of his own life. We are seeking to get more than the meager one-tenth of the child's resources, to make the school a place of activity where the children learn the things we want them to learn by doing them. We are trying to build an atmosphere in the schools and to create a spirit that will cause the children to be happy in their work and enter it with the enthusiasm necessary to getting the most from it. We think of the teacher, not as a driver, a task master, but as a sympathetic friend and helper who inspires the children to do their best. We think of the teacher, not as a lecturer, a giver of information, but as a leader, a guide who leads the children to engage in the tasks in school and out that will mean most to them in meeting the needs of their everyday lives. We are trying to make the school a work shop, a laboratory, where the children have the tools in the way of books and apparatus to make their work count for most and where, in their normal living, they will build the knowledge, skills, ideals, attitudes, and interests necessary to a complete and wholesome living. We are not satisfied with the child's putting only one-tenth of himself into his work, and are seeking to give him a task and to create around him an environment that will enlist of his resources and cause him to give himself unreservedly to his work.

Public Opinion

THE MAIN ISSUE

We have the farmers received and enjoyed more of the prosperity they have abundantly supplied to all others. There is only one answer to this very serious question and that is they have not enjoyed the right to price the products of their field. We want to say they should be first of all other occupations, as they are the foundation of all prosperity for all other occupations, then why should they be least esteemed of all and denied the right to price their labor and their goods. Even the boot-black is not denied the right but when the farmers ask for that privilege, the world seems astounded. Now we say the farmers problem is the greatest in this campaign, and we want to say that Governor Smith has made the best presentation of the farmers problem of any that has spoken in it.

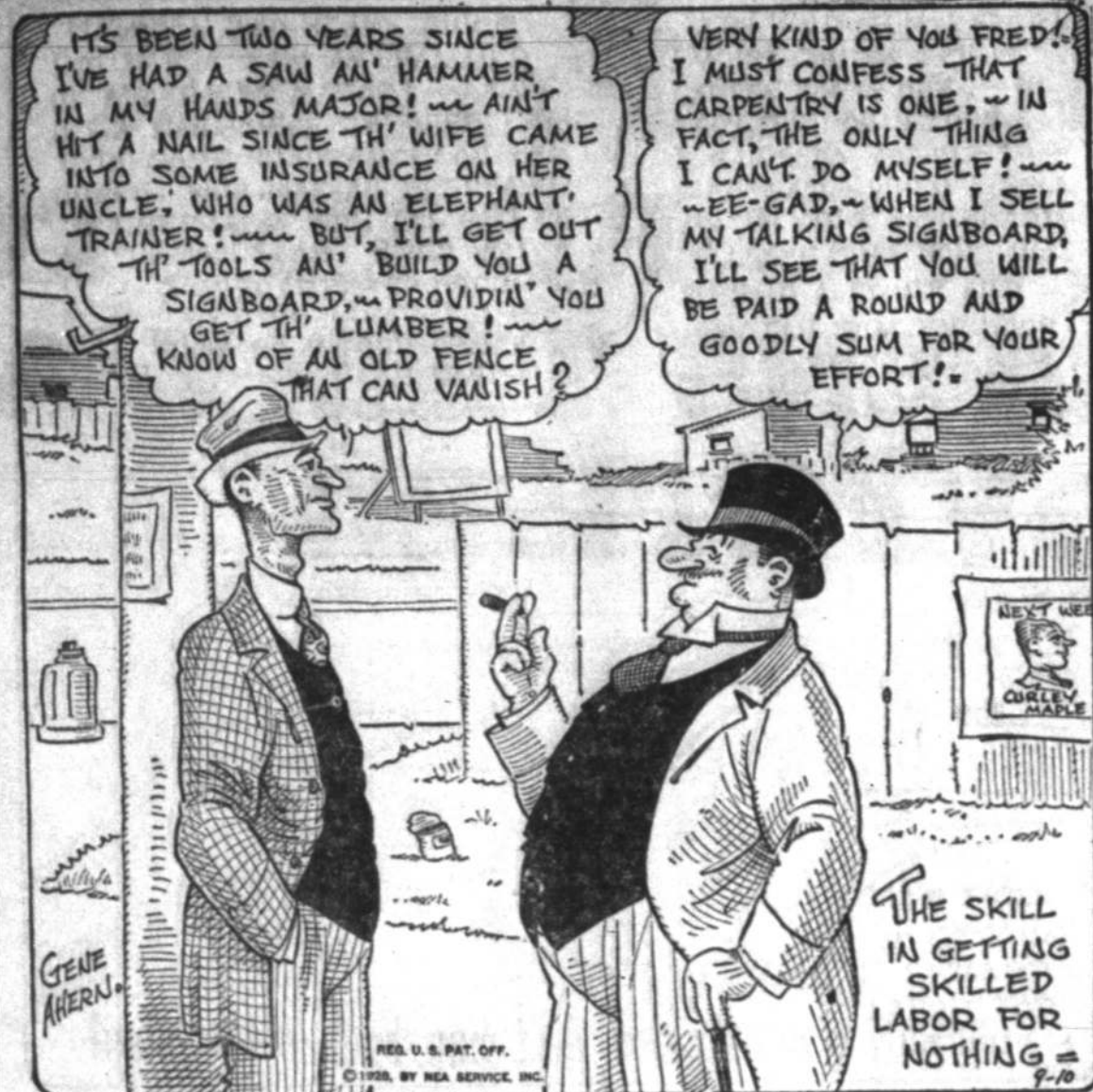

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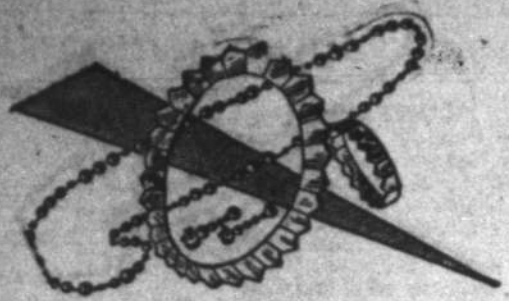

terrifying suddenness, tore away the bridge deck and midship housing and rendered the wireless useless. The ship almost immediately was enveloped in flames, they said, and before the crew could take to the boats, three more explosions occurred.

Captain Simmons advanced immediately under the bridge.

4 Bodies Blown to Bits.

The bodies of Bergman, Dagaro, Person and the boatswain were not recovered and the census among survivors was that they had been blown to bits by the first explosion.

All were known to have been amidst about the time of this explosion. Hopkins was taken from the ship in a diving condition and was dead when the Aldecoa reached the scene 45 minutes after the first explosion.

The four injured were not thought to be seriously hurt.

Captain Simmons said he had no time to send even a wireless call for help and that Aldecoa was attracted to the scene by the smoke arising from the burning tanker.

The crew had taken to small boats when the rescue ship arrived.

The "Shreveport" was a 4000-ton tanker operated by the Cities Service company of New York. She was traveling in ballast from Philadelphia where she had just finished discharging and was enroute to Gulf ports to pick up another cargo of oil.

All Records Are Lost.

All records of the vessel, including the articles carrying the names and addresses of the crew, were lost in the explosion. The unidentified boatswain came aboard in Philadelphia, but members of the crew could not give his name or the addresses of the other dead.

Governor Smith's statement then describes a visit which Mr. Kelley made to Mrs. Sandford during which she admitted writing a letter to a Mrs. Bauer in Parkersburg but denied making the statements quoted in Keenan's letter. The upshot of the interview, according to Governor Smith's statement, was a promise from Mrs. Sandford that she would write to the governor and deny writing the letter and deny that she attended the fair on the day in question.

Governor Smith then describes efforts which he said Mr. Keenan made to obtain the letter from Mrs. Bauer and quotes a telegram from Keenan to him (Governor Smith), in which the latter said:

Letter Is Lost

"Impossible to get Sandford letter, party here says same is lost or destroyed, believe she must have got instructions from Syracuse to destroy or not disclose. However she does not deny statement in letter but has quit talking."

"It will be noted, Governor Smith's statement concludes, that Mrs. Sandford promised Mr. Kelley that she would write to me and make a denial of the letter attributed to her by Mrs. Bauer. Up to 2 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, September 11th I received no letter from Mrs. Sandford.

"If Mrs. Bauer made the statement attributed to her by Mr. Kelley both can be telling the truth. Which of the two women involved is guilty of the slander I do not know."

Take-Off Occupies Day

The take-offs occupied the whole day and gave several thrills to a crowd estimated at about 10,000.

The first thrill of the day came when Namer, second to take off, was unable to get into the air on his first try. He cut his switch and came to a safe stop just short of that steep declivity at the bottom of which Renee Fonck's plane burned on a trans-Atlantic take-off two years ago.

The next excitement came when five other planes had followed Namer into the air and Levine's Columbia looped and seemed about to turn over. It righted itself, however, and after hasty repairs got into the air.

Between these two near catastrophes the crowd gave much attention to Col. Thaw's Lockheed Vega, which race officials were bound to refer to as a death trap.

The great monoplane with its barrel body was so constructed that Thaw's seat, back of the pilot, placed him so that he could have practically any chance to jump clear in case of accident.

Thaw, biggest man in the race, seemed little concerned himself.
