All passenger car owners in Dawson County will register at their respective school buildings Thursday, Friday and Saturday, November 19, 20 and 21 for their gasoline books.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

What papers should be presented by the applicant to the school site registrar in order to obtain a Basic Ration?

No. 1—The applicant should present the REGISTRATION RECEIPT showing that the vehicle is licensed to operate on the highways for the CURRENT YEAR OF 1942.

No. 2 — The application signed by the LEGAL OWNER.

No. 3 — And the certificate of TITLE, or an application therefor substantiating such ownership.

May a pickup or commercial vehicle be registered as a PASSENGER AUTOMOBILE?

YES. Provided that the applicant produce a STATEMENT from the office of DEFENSE TRANSPORTATION to the effect that the vehicle will not qualify for a certificate of war necessity.

Primary School Building from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m., all three days. School teachers will handle all applications. Car owners must call at the War Price and Rationing Board Office in the basement of the Post Office for their application blanks, these must be filled out before going to the school house on Thursday.

It will be well for the owner to have the receipt for payment for State Car License for verification purposes. The form calls for the serial numbers of all tires mounted and any other passenger car tires owned as a prerequisite to receiving mileage rationing book and car sticker.

Car owners over the county will each register at the school house in his district. County school officials state that the rural schools will turn out on Friday for the registration, and ask that all rural citizens go to their school houses on that day.

BEHIND THE WAR NEWS

Mounting evidence that the developing Anglo-American squeeze play in Africa has already shattered both prongs of Hitler's most ambitious "pincer" attack of the war comes from many sources even before full fruits of Allied strategy can be assessed.

Certainly the southern jaw of the Axis vise is wrecked. Nothing remains of Rommel's African corps in Egypt except its casualties in man and machines. The Suez canal and the eastern Mediterranean are again secure.

In Russia, the northern jaw of that made-in-Berlin device designed to throttle the Soviets into submission and to isolate and immobilize Turkey is no less stalled. German retreat before an on-rushing Russian winter, perhaps soon to be fanged with a massive Soviet offensive seems all but inevitable. Moscow and Ankara reports indicate it is already in the making.

Air Attacks Abated

Significant abatement of the weight and fury of Nazi air attack on Stalingrad and in the Caucasus is noted by the Russians. That German air power is winging west and south to meet the rising Allied threat across the Mediterranean is the logical explanation. It is the first definite symptom of relaxation of enemy pressure on Russia due to the Allied offensive in Africa.

Turkish observation posts cap that with otherwise unconfirmed but plausible reports that Nazi troops from Russia also are being shuttled westward into the Balkans to man a new potential Axis defense front in the south that reaches from the Pyrenees to the Dardanelles, from Spain to Turkey. Nor can Hitler be certain at what moment Turkey might forsake her neutrality to join the tightening Allied Mediterranean cordon.

The hour of enemy "demoralization to invite new Allied attacks which Prime Minister Churchill foresaw is not yet arrived. The first crux of the American - steered offensive in the Mediterranean theater is brewing in Tunisia with domination of the central Mediterranean narrows as its prime objective.

First air blows of that clash have been exchanged in the little French protectorate. Just how near the American or Anglo-American armored columns hastening eastward may be to complete Allied investment of French African outposts is not clear. The odds seem heavily in Allied favor.

Heavy Troop Movements

Turkish accounts of heavy Nazi troop movements from Russia to the Balkans are of special interest. If true, they indicate Hitler's apprehension over the security of the Greek-Balkan sector of his southern front as well as over its French or Italian sectors.

His concern is justified. His most vital war asset, the oil to keep his planes, tanks and war industries going, is in the Balkans. Could Allied major strategists freely pick the place at which they could strike the most deadly blow at the Axis, without question the Rumanian oil flow would take first place in their calculations.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 14

With the fall of Tobruk to the British in eastern Libya and indicated American - British advance from the west into Tunisia the original 1,500-mile gap between the jaws of the Allied trap closing on Marshal Erwin Rommel's shattered and fleeing Axis desert army in Africa has shriveled to 900 miles.

Against that dual threat, driving in upon him from both sides at a pace unmatched in any previous phase of the give-and-take British-Axis campaign in Africa, Rommel's chances of escaping annihilation are dwindling every hour. There are strong indications that Berlin already has abandoned hope of salvaging what it can from Africa by sea and air evacuation.

Tobruk is of extreme practical as well as psychological value to the

British. It pushed forward a British advance supply base, fed by sea as well as land, to sustain and speed up the pursuit of the Axis Army to its ultimate annihilation. It enormously strengthens British control of the vitally important eastern Mediterranean.

Where Is Nazi Air Power?

The westbound British have encountered for days virtually no Axis air opposition. Rommel's men are running almost unsheltered from air strafing.

What has become of German-Italian air power in Africa is a puzzle. It may have been massed westward to meet the American occupation of French Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia. Insistent but unconfirmed Axis reports of damage inflicted on a British - American warcraft and shipping suggest that.

If so, however, Adolf Hitler sent a small boy to do a man-size job. It signally failed to halt or even slow up the American thrust. Berlin was obviously guilty of the same fault this time that has so frequently plagued Britain and its allies. It was the Axis which was too late with too little, and reports that Hitler has removed his air commander there sound plausible.

Lt. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's coastal column of British-American armored forces under a British commander was estimated to have thrust into Tunisia. The degree of opposition it has met or will meet remained uncertain but the chances were it would prove negligible.

Look Like Flight

Nazi withdrawal of air - borne troops flown into the French protectorate before they even came to grips with the Allies is significant. It looks like flight from possible Fighting French seizure before the allied column arrives.

The battle of Tunisia seems ending before it began. If that is the fact, the next allied objective from the West must be Tripoli before Rommel can get there. The Anglo-British advance guard is closer than the fleeing Axis Army. It has some 400 miles to go against Rommel's 500 by the shortest inshore route by-passing the Libyan hump and Bengasi to the south.

In his last retreat Rommel halted at the coastal narrows west of the hump on the Gulf of Sirte. There, as in Egypt, an impassable inland salt marsh comes close to the coast at El Anghella. Anglo-American forces in Tunisia are within air striking distance of El Anghella now. They could reach it with tanks and guns before Rommel gets there and seal his doom.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 15

November has shown a bleak face to German conquest hopes in other years and this November is no exception.

November saw the Kaiser's glory dreams burst like a soap bubble in 1918. His strutting successor as a war lord has admitted that in 1941 the vision of a Nazi-dominated world was close to utter disaster in Russia and saved, not by Hitler but by Providence.

It was a slightly humbled Hitler who gave credit only a few weeks ago to some more potent force than his own intuitive military genius for that 1941 escape. He capped the admission, however, with assurances to his German listeners that he, not Providence, had seen to it that there would be no repetition of that dread Winter of 1941 for Nazi Germany.

Yet this November Winter is again upon Hitler's dangerously far-spread armies in an unconquered Russia. Moreover, Anglo - American forces of ever-expanding size and power are confronting him across the Mediterranean. A complete Axis rout in Africa is in the making. Italy, the soft underbelly of the Axis dragon, is exposed to Allied attack.

Hitler's vaunted air power so far has failed him, failed even to protect German cities from a terrible and continuous air drubbing. His U-boats have fought mightily at sea but not mightily enough. The persistence in French Africa of a great and growing American - British army sufficiently shows who still rules the Atlantic.

To meet an emergency the scope of which he has not yet measured, Axis armies are again on the march in France and the Balkans, not to offensive but to defensive assign-

ments. Axis collaborationism in France is dead of dying and colonial France is back in the war as an Allied recruit.

What this may mean to further re-shuffling of the war odds in the Mediterranean still is unclear.

Pacific repercussions of the changed war scene in Europe and the Near and Middle East also are yet to be fully assessed. The effect on India to ease Allied tension can not yet be appraised, but the hope that the hour for reconquest of Burma from the Japanese has been brought a long stride closer is justified.

The one outstanding fact in the Pacific war theater traceable to the new and ominous developments for the Axis in Russia and the Mediterranean this November is that Hitler's Japanese accomplice also has failed him. At the moment when he most needs a Far Eastern diversion—a Japanese assault on Russia in Siberia of a Japanese power thrust at Australia of its ocean life lines—Japan has appeared up to now, too busy with defense herself to answer his pleas. The weekend, however, brought an announcement from Berlin that heads of all Japanese missions to Europe had been assembled in the German capital since November 10. Such a parley at this time suggested Hitler might be renewing pressure on his Japanese ally.

Just what all the swift developments of this November will add up to is beyond conjecture. The war is not over, but it has turned a significant corner. Allied hopes

WASHINGTON (AP) — We're getting down to one dally cup of coffee because coffee beans, light and bulky, take up too much space for their weight in shipping.

The average cargo vessel can carry only about 70,000 bags of coffee, 132 pounds to the bag. The rest of the cargo must be in heavier goods for ballast. Our imports of coffee from Central and South America from July, 1941, to July, 1942, required about 2,000 cargo trips of freighters, according to the Office of War Information — and we haven't got all the freighters we had a year ago.

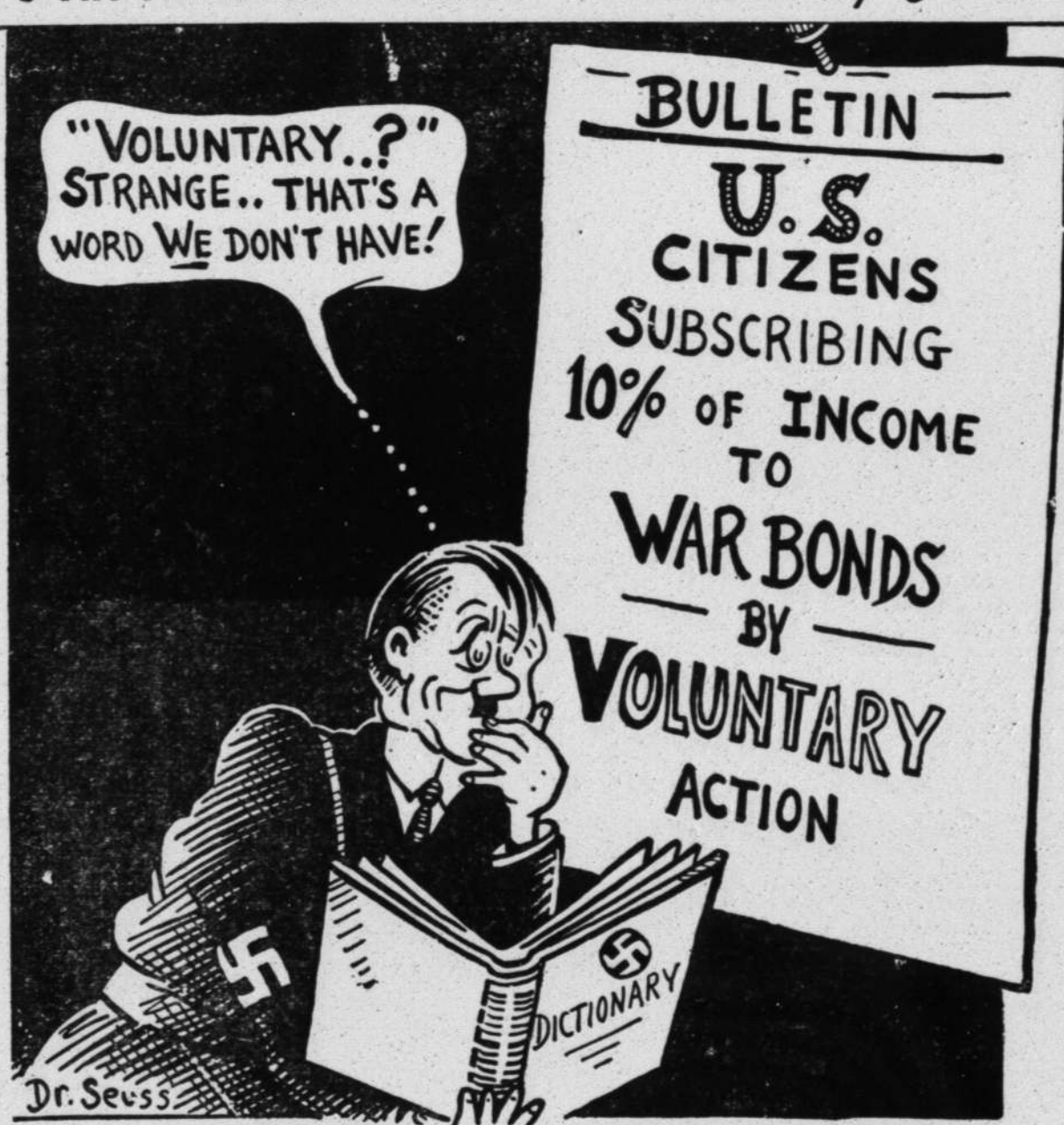

Two Ways To Aid War Effort With Self-Sacrificing

Two program that civilians can use as weapons to help win the war at home were announced for the Eight Region of Civilian Defense today by R. E. Smith, Regional Director. Government experts estimate that these two programs, if fully sponsored by the people, will be as effective in the fight against the Axis on the home front as Airacobras over Africa. They include voluntary meat rationing, and a new plan for all-out civilian war services, called the Block Plan.

In every city block or similar small geographical unit in this country, civilian war services under the Block Plan will be reorganized on the basis of all-out neighborhood participation. Thus, programs like meat rationing will be carried out by the simple process of neighbors working together. "Block Leaders" will be appointed, as their name implies, for qualities of leadership, to head unit organizations which will carry out civilian war services. These leaders will see to it that every family in their respective neighborhoods is enlisted in the bigger, more effective army that is planned.

James M. Landis, National Director of Office of Civilian Defense, today issued a statement showing how the Block Plan and meat ra-

tioning will be used together:

"Block Leaders will contribute directly to our national war program when they win the cooperation of their neighbors in the voluntary conservation of meat.

"Voluntary meat rationing should be clearly understood for exactly what it is — an immediate as well as a longer range plan to fulfill the needs of our armed forces, and, under lend-lease contract, those of our fighting Allies.

"It should be made clear that there is no shortage of meat in this country. More meat is being produced this year than ever before in our history, but the demands of war far exceed the demands of peace. We must supply our civilian population, our army, and, to a large extent the armies of our Allies. We are asked to limit ourselves voluntarily to two and one-half pounds of meat each week for each adult; not much less than the average American eats at present, but representing enough of a saving to assure full strength to the battalions of liberty and to help in some measure the hungry, uprooted millions of the earth.

"If one thing is sure in this war it is that food is going to count as a weapon for victory.

"We have got to have an economy of food. I ask most urgently that every Defense Council and every Block Leader get squarely behind the voluntary meat rationing campaign, so that every housewife will know the importance it holds for our success in the bitter struggle ahead. Bring the war into the American kitchen and take the kitchen straight into the war so that by planning, saving, and serving, every American can make this direct contribution to the winning of the war. This is a challenge that every Block Leader can accept, a job in which prompt action will bring an immediate response from every community in the nation."

RAILROAD'S BUFFALO BECOMES EXTINCT

OMAHA (AP) — For 65 years the Union Pacific railroad bridge over the Missouri river was adorned on the western end by a giant buffalo head to symbolize the west, and on the eastern end by a large bas relief, whose design of a plow, an anchor and steam hammer symbolized eastern industry.

But no more, for the historical pieces, cast in 1887 by Etienne Favq of New York City, are to be salvaged for their high copper bronze content. The buffalo head, 7 1-2 feet high, is estimated to contain 2,400 pounds of bronze, the bas relief 1,000 pounds.

Plan To Draft Teen-Agers Is Signed By FDR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt Friday signed the teen-age draft bill, and in a statement said he had ordered a study with a view to enabling the 18- and 19-year-olds called to service to resume their schooling and training after the war.

The president also promised to announce in the near future a plan to utilize during the war the facilities of certain colleges and universities for the training of a limited number of men for "highly specialized duties" in the armed forces.

No Strings Attached

"These men," the president said, "will be selected solely on the basis of their ability and without regard to whether or not they are now in college or whether they could otherwise afford to go to college."

In signing the bill, final action on which was taken yesterday by the Senate, the president said:

"The time has now come when the successful prosecution of the

war requires that we call to the colors the men of 18 and 19. Many have already volunteered. Others have been eagerly awaiting the call. All are ready and anxious to serve.

Suggest Study

"The civilian careers of these men will be interrupted, as have the careers of most of their seniors." Large numbers about to enter the armed services will come from schools and colleges. The vocational and technical training which the armed services now offer to many will stand them in good stead.

"I am causing a study to be made by a committee of educators, under the auspices of the War and Navy departments, for the taking of steps to enable the young men whose education has been interrupted to resume their schooling and afford equal opportunity for the training and education of other young men of ability after their services in the armed services has come to an end."

"Some useful action along this line was improvised at the end of the last war," the President said. "This time we are planning in advance."

Plan To Use Colleges

"Finally, we are announcing in the near future a plan providing for the utilization during the war of the facilities of certain colleges and universities for the training of a limited number of men of the armed forces for highly specialized duties. These men will be selected solely on the basis of their ability and without regard to whether or not they are now in college or whether they could otherwise afford to go to college."

The drafting of the new age group, it has been estimated, might supply more than 2,000,000 of the 4,500,000 additional men needed in all the armed forces by January 1, 1944.

Inductions from the 18-19 year old group were expected to begin within 30 to 40 days. This, however, will vary to some extent, depending upon preparations made by local boards to meet draft calls with older men and also on how rapidly the boards can classify the new group for service.

Some For Reclassification

Scheduled for classification first are estimated 800,000 to 900,000 physically fit youths among some 1,200,000 to 1,500,000 left over after enlistments and inductions from the 2,400,000 youths who registered last June 30 for induction at 20 years.

Another pool of 1,755,000 will exist at the end of 1943 from those who have reached 18 since the June 30 registration or who will reach that age during 1943, but this group—expected to yield a net of some 1,275,000 physically fit—can not be classified immediately.

Regulations for their classification are to be issued by the President, and may provide specific registration dates or provide that each youth shall register within a designated time after he becomes 18.

Meanwhile drafting of older groups, including childless married men, will continue as needed to fill out draft calls for another 750,000 this year and 2,000,000 more next year as the Army's total strength mounts to 7,500,000 by Jan. 1, 1944.

WAR WORKERS HOP ON THE BANDWAGON

GARY, Ind. (AP)—Once the bandwagon for a dance orchestra, a bus of ancient vintage that has stood four years on a used-car lot is now a victory chariot.

Four women and six employees at the huge Kingsbury ordnance plant saved, begged and borrowed \$686 for the "victory cooperatives special," as they dubbed it. Its owners estimate that 45 war workers a day may be transported to and from the ordnance plant in their "special."

NIGHT LIFE BORES THIS CEREUS

BEDFORD, Ind. (AP)—A night-blooming cereus of Mrs. T. D. Meglemre got tired of the same old routine.

Instead of blooming at nightfall and closing at dawn, the plant blushes forth at 6 a. m., then folds up at dark.

Protect Children Against Winter Complaints

In discussing seasonal health hazards for young children today, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, stated that babies and young children need as careful protection now against winter complaints as they do in hot summer weather against "summer complaint."

Influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, and asthma are included among those diseases which may be dangerous winter illnesses among young children since they affect the respiratory or breathing system. Such diseases as pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold. They may follow as an after-effect of measles or whopping cough, or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. These diseases of the respiratory system are more prevalent in winter than in summer and are much more difficult to combat than digestive ailments such as summer complaint.

"These winter diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread through the secretions from the nose and mouth. Children not in vigor-

ous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense," Dr. Cox cautioned, "is to strengthen the powers of resistance against disease; the second is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure they avoid contact with others who have coughs, colds, or fevers."

DRAFTING OF GUARDS IS PRISON PROBLEM

CHINO, Calif. (AP)—California's prison directors have posed a problem to draft boards. Induction of prison guards presents a "grave situation" in keeping convicts safely confined, they said, in appealing for deferment in the interest of public safety.

HELL HATH NO FURY LIKE A WOMAN'S SHEARS

SUSANVILLE, Calif. (AP)—Police Chief W. O. Long answered a call reporting that an unidentified woman was jabbing the tires of a parked car with a pair of shears. When he arrived he found two flat tires and a note on the driver's seat reading: "You can repair a punctured tire but you can't repair a punctured heart."

Texas 4-H Girls Aiding War Effort In Many Ways

Texas 4-H Club girls have collected enough scrap rubber for seven battleships, seventy-two 28-ton tanks, with a tire for a bomber thrown in, Onah Jacks, state girls' club agent of the A. and M. College Extension Service, has announced.

In addition, 4-H members salvaged enough steel for 738 light tanks and enough waste paper to make more than 391,000 cartons for anti-aircraft shells. "With bonds and stamps they have bought, Uncle Sam can buy more than 700 machine guns with 10 rounds of ammunition each," Miss Jacks said.

The state girls' club leader said that 4-H girls comprise a land army over 26,000 strong, and they are "on the job today—plowing, gathering crops, caring for chickens or livestock, or doing other extra farm work." In their ranks are about eight and a half thousand fire fighters and 600 air raid wardens and plane spotters.

Besides growing food for home use all through the year, 4-H Club girls have preserved enough food to supply 1,700 soldiers for a whole year. And there are enough 4-H Club girls who have studied first aid and home nursing to supply each of those soldiers with two nurses each... and there would be "more than 400 nurses left over," Miss Jacks said.

Drive For Old Silk Hose Being Made

Mrs. M. C. Lindsey of Lamesa was appointed chairman of the Dawson County silk salvage drive, by county salvage chairman C. M. Burton.

Silk and nylon hose, or hose that contain parts of either silk or nylon, are to be collected all over the county and used in the war effort. Silk is used in making powder bags . . . the containers that hold the explosive used in firing high calibre guns. It is the only material that burns without leaving a residue and causes a minimum of heat.

Persons wishing to donate discarded hose should be sure the stockings are clean, then deposit them with any store that sells hosiery. When 100 pound lots are accumulated they will be sent to government salvage stations.

In other communities of the county members of the Home Demonstration Clubs under the direction of Miss Mattie Phenix will assist in the collection of hose. Mr. Burton wishes to stress that this drive is county wide and will be continuous until the wars end.

Hoarded Coffee Must Be Used

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (AP)—Coffee hoarders will have no advantage over other persons after rationing starts Nov. 28, under regulations issued Saturday by the OPA.

Any coffee in the cupboard in excess of one pound per person on that date should be consumed thereafter at the ration rate of one pound per person every five weeks, the OPA directed, and no more should be purchased until the supply on hand is used.

This ruling will be enforced through a registration to be conducted later when a new universal ration book is issued. For the start of coffee rationing, stamps at the back of the sugar ration book will be used and no immediate registration will be entailed.

But when registration is held later for the new ration book, householders will be required to report the amount of coffee they had on hand Nov. 28 and to produce stamps from the sugar ration book to cover it. Thus hoarders will be prevented from using the sugar ration stamps to buy coffee for consumption in excess of the ration rate.

The OPA warned that "appropriate action," which it did not specify, would be taken against persons unable to produce stamps from their sugar ration book to cover their excess coffee supplies, and also in cases where the coffee stamps are missing from the sugar ration books of children under 15 not entitled to coffee rations.

Gas Rationing Don't Make Sense

Gasoline rationing just doesn't make sense in this state, according to J. J. Dempsey, governor elect of New Mexico, who declared that it is time to ration stupidity, not gasoline.

Surplus gasoline in New Mexico, he said, was being poured back into the wells. Then he continued:

"They're trying to hang the need of rationing on rubber conservation. I've had surveys made on the rubber situation. The life of tires on automobiles can be extended 18 months to two years by sane driving and it is my opinion that by then the war will be over. If it isn't then we've run out of tires. That makes sense."

Gasoline rationing, he asserted, would isolate every town from every other town, asserting that many persons on the Pacific coast would go to New Mexico for the duration if they could get there, to be safe from the danger of bombing and raids.

Dempsey called upon public officials to lead and not have box seats

if gasoline rationing were to require any parade of sacrifice. In the east where rationing was instituted because of an actual gasoline shortage, Dempsey said he had had a ration card while he was under secretary of the interior.

Federal cars should get all the gasoline they wanted," he added. "I was ashamed to use a federal car and instead got the minimum ration and an A card." — The Lovington Leader, New Mexico.

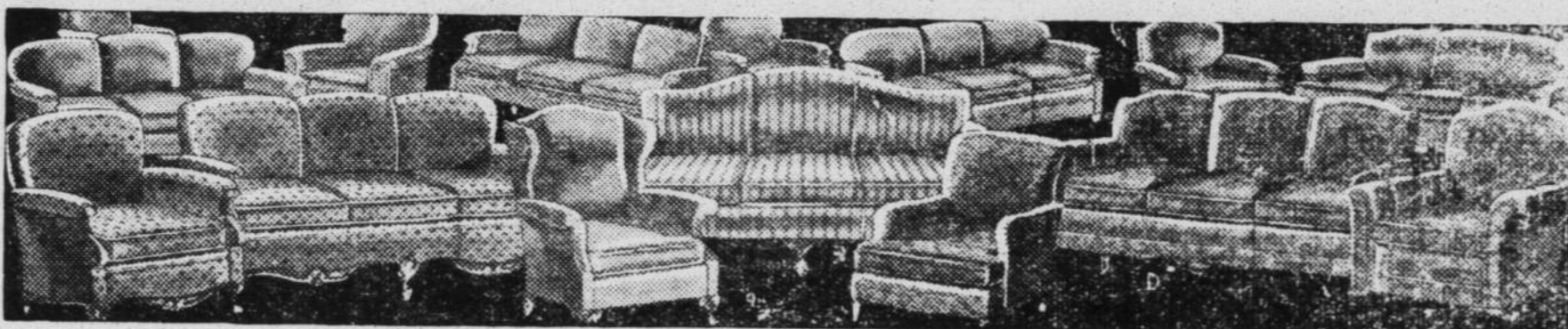

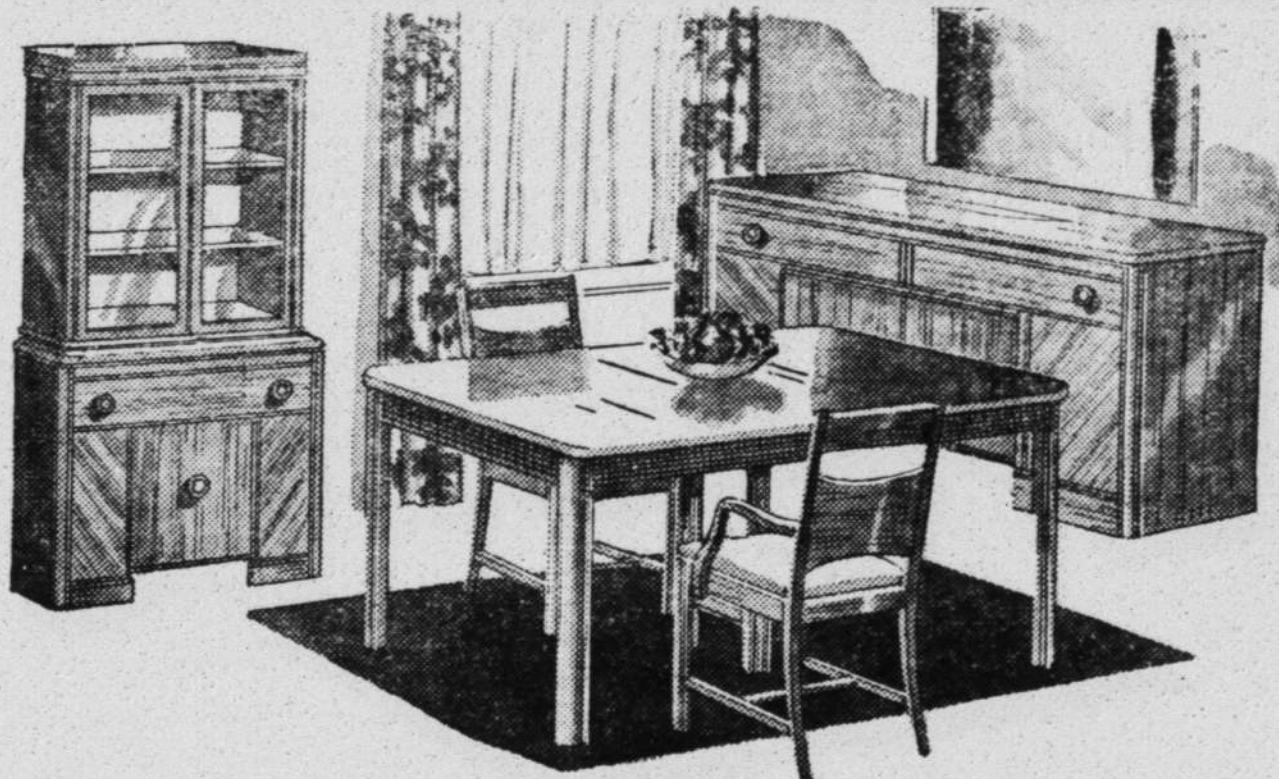

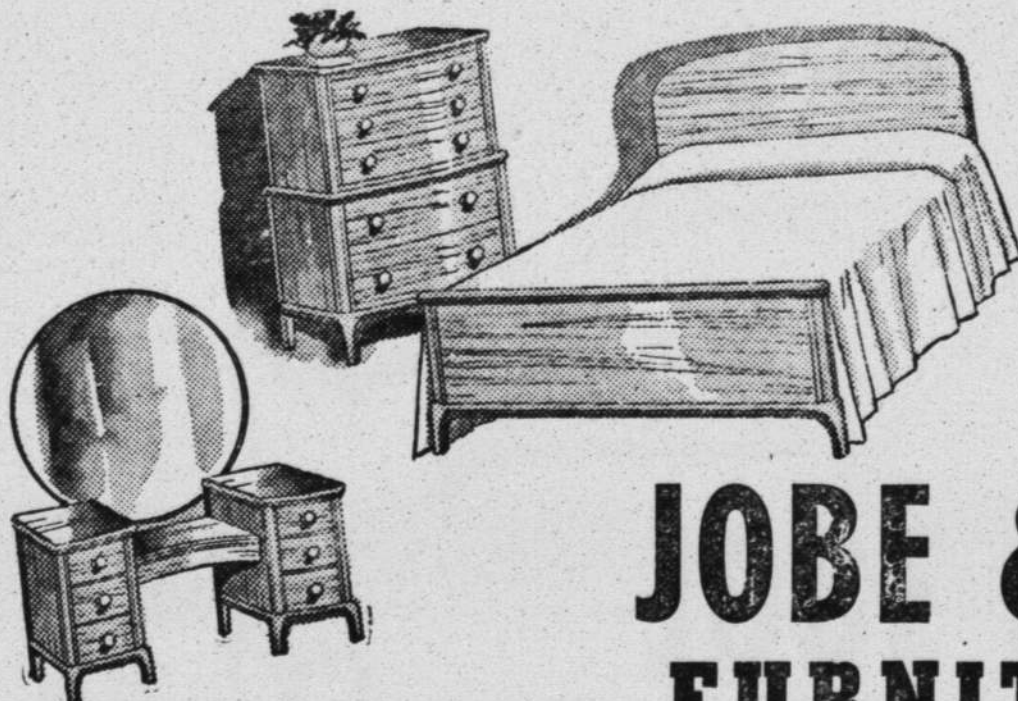
