United Way campaign tops \$90,000 mark

The United Way of Deaf Smith County 1987 campaign has topped the \$90,000 point on its way to a goal of \$120,000.

UW officials, at Tuesday's weekly report luncheon at Sirlin Stockade in Hereford, were still optimistic the goal could be reached, with a considerable number of cards still not turned in and with many of those belonging to persons who have pledged contributions in the past.

"We are still getting cards coming in," said UW President Howard Birdwell. "However, we still need to get those cards worked this week."

"Any volunteers that need help need to let us know," said UW official Wayne Amstutz. "We have plenty of people willing to help anyone who needs help."

16 local firms now make up the United Way Honor Roll of firms who have made their "Fair Share"

pledge or who have all of their employees making UW pledges this year.

Amstutz also singled out the Hereford public schools, who increased their contributions from \$4,000 last year to over \$6,000 this year, and the Hereford post office, where employees made contributions this year compared to no contributions last year.

The Agriculture Division has exceeded its \$3,500 goal, picking up \$3,672, "and they said they're not going to quit there," Amstutz said.

Also surpassing its goal is the Pacesetters Division, going \$847 over its goal of \$22,000. The division has several accounts yet to report.

The Golden Age Division has picked up \$7,994 of its \$8,000 goal. Also nearing its goal is the Special Division, with a goal of \$11,500.

DOE transition nears completion

The transition phase for the Department of Energy's Salt Repository Project office in Hereford is nearing completion, according to Deputy Manager Robert Wunderlich.

Seventy-seven percent of the 342 employees who will be officed in Hereford are now on board, Wunderlich announced during an early morning briefing today.

The majority of the remaining project personnel who will work out of the Hereford office will be reporting this week and in November, he said.

As the transition operation winds down statistics show Hereford is behind Amarillo on both housing additions and procurement expenditures.

Of the 265 project personnel now in Texas only 65 reside in Hereford. 32 of those are transfers to the area and 33 are local hires. Amarillo tops the residency chart with 123 project personnel choosing to make their home in the city, and 93 of those are transfers.

Canyon is the residence choice for 46 of the project personnel, and 36 of those are transfers. Vega is the home of three, all local hires, and 28 of the project personnel are living in rural areas or are undecided about where they will live at this point.

Transfers to the area total 185 with 113 school age children. 19 of those are enrolled in the Hereford Independent School System.

Stone and Webster, one of the major DOE contractors, will office out of Amarillo with employment expected at over 700 during the peak. "They will have 107 employees during fiscal year 1988 but they have only seven at this time," Wunderlich said.

Procurement commitments for the

project have totaled \$4.9 million since February. Amarillo businesses have gleaned \$27,000 and Hereford contracts are tabulated at \$12,000.

Major procurement awards issued last week include \$40,000 to Com Group, Inc., a Seattle, Wash.-based firm, for managing the installation of wiring and telephones in the renovated Lo-Mart building which will provide office space for 230 project personnel.

United Energy Service of Atlanta, Ga., was awarded a \$14,820 bid for contracts support services and Ryder Truck Rental of Hereford was awarded a contract of \$3,000 for truck rental through December.

Amarillo-based firms receiving contract awards include \$7,315 to L & L Enterprises for data communication lines and \$6,000 to Network Security for security services through December 10.

Outstanding procurements include two high-volume copiers, text processing services, Xerox text processing equipment and two more contracts for office space.

Wunderlich noted that Nov. 6 remains the deadline for commenting on the Land Acquisition Planning Report and no decision has been made regarding a two-to-four week delay request from the state.

He said work is continuing on the Consultative Draft, due in January, which will be a precursor to the formal document required in the Nuclear Waste Policy Act under which the program operates.

Wunderlich stated that next Wednesday's briefing will be the last of the formal weekly briefings which were designed to provide information during the transition period. He said his office will provide weekly press releases and that they are seeking suggestions concerning scheduling future public meetings.

Poll says voters want elected SBOE

DALLAS (AP) — A survey published in two newspapers today shows a solid majority of Texas voters want to elect their State Board of Education rather than have the panel remain appointed by the governor.

Of 1,017 Texas voters surveyed, 61 percent reported that they want to elect the 15-member board, 18 percent said they would prefer to keep an appointed panel and 21 percent were undecided.

The telephone survey, conducted for The Dallas Morning News and The Houston Chronicle, was conducted between Oct. 11 through Oct. 20. The results were reported by both newspapers in copyright stories.

State voters will decide Nov. 3 whether to keep the board members appointed in 1984 and cancel next year's scheduled elections. Current members were appointed to a four-year term in 1984, and will be leaving office in January 1989 unless the proposal passes.

Proponents are waging a media

blitz in an attempt to sway voters in the final weeks before ballots are cast.

Texans For Quality Education, funded largely by Dallas billionaire H. Ross Perot, is spending nearly \$1 million to campaign for the Nov. 3 referendum calling for an appointed board.

The group's campaign finance report released Tuesday listed total expenditures of \$932,341, with the majority of the money concentrated on television advertisements and mass mailings.

On Tuesday, Perot discounted the results of the poll, saying the voters are only now realizing the issue.

"The poll reflects the lack of knowledge about the issue," Perot said. "Since the poll was taken we have been trying to fully educate the people."

Perot says an appointed board will insure a great public school system. (See SBOE, Page 2)

Americans slain in Philippines attacks

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Unidentified gunmen shot and killed two American soldiers and a retired U.S. serviceman in separate attacks today near the giant U.S.-run Clark Air Base, U.S. officials said.

A Filipino bystander also was slain in one of the four shooting incidents near the base, said Maj. Gen. Donald Snyder, 13th Air Force commander. Snyder said the identities of the assailants and their motives were not known.

The names of the victims were not released.

In Manila, meanwhile, suspected Communist rebels shot and killed two policemen and wounded a colonel in separate attacks in different sections of the capital, officials said.

And, the U.S. Embassy said an army attaché linked to military mutineers was leaving the country in a controversy over U.S. "meddling" in Philippine politics. A statement by the U.T. Embassy said Lt. Col. Victor Raphael, an assistant army attaché, would leave this week for vacation and "temporary duty" in the United States. Embassy sources

said Raphael had about eight months left on his tour and would not be returning.

Snyder, appearing on the military Far East Network, said he ordered the 26,000 U.S. servicemen, their dependents and civilians stationed at Clark to avoid non-essential travel. The base is about 50 miles north of Manila.

Communist rebels operate in the area, but in the past have generally refrained from targeting Americans. Recently, however, the rebels have (See PHILIPPINES, Page 2)

Iraq claims bombing

KUWAIT (AP) — Iraq said today its warplanes attacked three tankers in Iranian waters overnight as part of a campaign to destroy the oil exports of its enemy, but shipping sources said they could not confirm any of the attacks.

Iran, meanwhile, claimed that three of its warplanes challenged the U.S. Navy in the Sea of Oman on Friday.

The 13th U.S.-escorted convoy was moving up the gulf today toward Kuwait's port, which has been hit by three Iranian Silkworm missiles in the past two weeks.

The official Iraqi News Agency,

monitored in Nicosia, said warplanes raided vessels off Iran at 7:10 p.m. Tuesday, then at 1 a.m. and 5:10 a.m. today.

The agency quoted an unidentified military spokesman as saying all three raids "were aimed at destroying Iran's oil exports." It said the ships were off the Iranian coast, but did not give their exact location.

Iraq raids Iranian oil targets to cut off the exports that finance its enemy's war effort. The two nations have been at war for seven years.

Marine executives in Kuwait, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said they could not confirm any of

the three raids. It sometimes takes up to 48 hours to confirm Iraqi strikes, since many vessels maintain radio silence in order to avoid a second attack.

Since Oct. 14, Iraq has claimed its warplanes have attacked four other tankers off Iran. Only one of the raids has been confirmed, an Oct. 14 strike on an Iranian-chartered supertanker.

Earlier Tuesday, Iraq said its air force raided the Agha Jari oil field in southwestern Iran. Iran said one plane was shot down.

GOP debate is tonight

HOUSTON (AP) — Staging a televised debate among Republican presidential candidates will cost roughly 30 percent more than an earlier debate featuring Democrats, officials say.

Tonight's debate among the Republicans on the program "Firing Line" will be held in the newly opened George R. Brown Convention Center. A July 1 debate on the same program featuring Democrats was held at the city's Wortham Center.

Kevin Burnette, president of Southern Political Consultants, said the Democrats' two-hour appearance public television this summer cost \$230,000 to air from the Wortham Center, a performing arts complex that opened earlier in the year.

He put the price tag for tonight's affair at \$300,000, with additional costs blamed on television production necessities for the Brown Center auditorium.

"Wortham is an incredible facility. They (production crews) love it," said Burnette, a political consultant. "The lights are in place. The camera plugs are in place. It's there and ready to roll."

"Here, it's exactly the opposite. It's not built for TV."

Burnette spoke Tuesday as crews for the "Firing Line" program, hosted by conservative commentator William F. Buckley Jr., were setting up the stage at the Brown Convention Center.

The program's special segment will be the first debate among the six 1988 Republican presidential contenders. It is to be aired between 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. CST.

Candidates scheduled to appear are Vice President George Bush, Sen. Robert Dole of Kansas, Rep. Jack Kemp of New York, former Secretary of State Alexander Haig, former TV evangelist Pat Robertson and former Delaware Gov. Pierre S. "Pete" Du Pont.

WDIC to meet Thursday

The Waste Deposit Impact Committee will meet Thursday at 7:30 p.m. at the WDIC offices at Park and Ave. A in Hereford.

The agenda includes a summary of a meeting that was scheduled today between the WDIC board and members of Gov. Bill Clements staff concerning further funding for WDIC after the state program was moved from the Division of Emergency Management to the governor's office. All state contracts were cancelled, effective next month, subject to review by the governor's staff.

The agenda also includes a status report on negotiations to achieve an agreement on principles and procedures for interaction between WDIC and the Department of Energy; approval of formal comments on the DOE draft Land Acquisition Plan; and election of officers for the next operating year, effective at the end of Thursday's meeting.

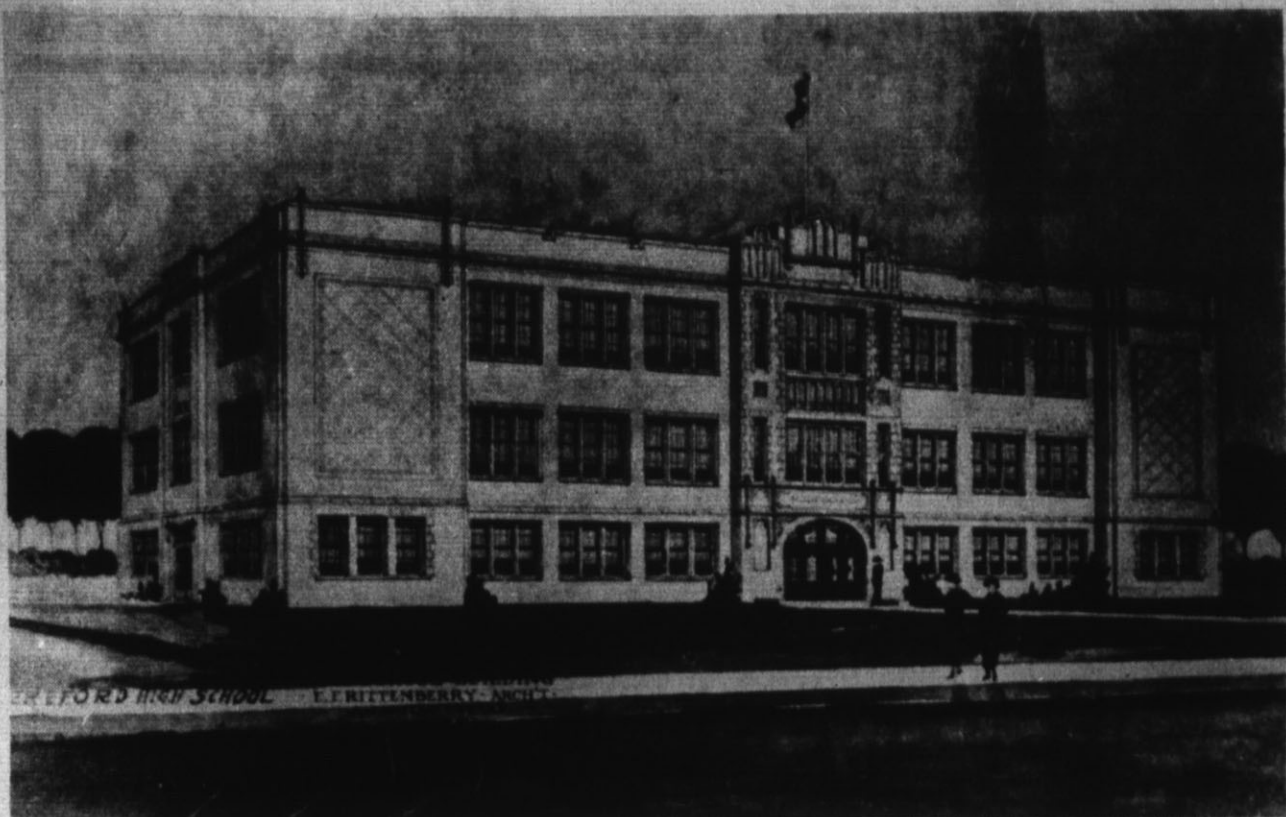

AIDS infected meat inspectors can still work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal meat and poultry inspectors who get AIDS can remain on the job as long as they are able to work satisfactorily and do not come down with an additional contagious disease, the Agriculture Department says.

"If all they had was AIDS, they would not be removed from the plant situation just because they had the disease ... unless it was determined they couldn't do their job," Karen Stuck, a spokeswoman for the department's Food Safety and Inspection Service, said Tuesday.

Ms. Stuck said it has been the agency's policy all along to remove inspectors from duties in cases of contagious disease. Thus, if an inspector developed a contagious disease in addition to AIDS, the worker would be ordered off the job.

News stories circulated about six weeks ago that a new USDA proposal

would mean the firing of inspectors who developed AIDS. The policy was drafted after one of the department's 7,200 inspectors employed nationwide was diagnosed as having AIDS.

But Ms. Stuck said in an interview that the proposal was only one of several options under consideration by a task force at the time and was not adopted. The final decision was cleared by a White House coordinating committee on AIDS, she said.

Last month, a senior official of USDA's inspection agency, Lester M. Crawford, said the department had no reason to believe AIDS can be transmitted through food, but meat-packing industry officials had expressed fear that the disease could be transmitted through blood from knife cuts and other injuries common among plant workers.

Crawford said the agency had been

working with the federal Centers for Disease Control since 1985 about any actions that should be taken on AIDS among food workers. The CDC said AIDS is not spread through food.

The task force studying the problem decided it was unnecessary to conduct mandatory testing for AIDS antibodies because having the virus alone — human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV — "posed no risk to the individual or his/her performance, co-workers or product wholesomeness."

Crawford, who since has been promoted to head of the department's Food Safety and Inspection Service, concurred in the task force's recommendations:

— "Since there is no data indicating a risk to employee safety or product wholesomeness based upon the presence of an individual who tests positive for the HIV virus, no changes or precautions need to be initiated at the workplace.

— "Since federal personnel regulations already address medical disabilities, an employee diagnosed as having AIDS will be treated no differently than any other employee with a medical disability.

— "The agency should develop an educational program for its employees. The program could be used to address the nature of the disease, its transmissibility, and types of medical counseling and support resources."

The "Firing Line" program is the first television production staged inside the Brown Center auditorium, which seats about 4,000 people. The Wortham Center was not available for the Republicans because of another event.

Nuclear missile malfunction disclosed

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — In 1984, a malfunctioning Minuteman 3 nuclear missile gave every indication of imminently launching itself, so the Air Force hurriedly parked an armored vehicle atop its silo, a spokesman said.

"If the launcher closure door opened up, the security police vehicle would have fallen on top of the missile and prevented it from going any place," Capt. Bill Kalton, a public affairs officer at Warren Air Force Base, said Tuesday.

"It was not a major incident," Walton said in response to a news account of the Jan. 10, 1984, incident in today's Casper Star Tribune.

"There was no chance of a missile

News Agency said today that three Iranian warplanes flew to within 10 miles of U.S. Navy ships in the Gulf of Oman Friday in defiance of a warning.

IRNA, which also is monitored in Cyprus, said the Iranian warplanes "ignored warnings and a threat of attack" radioed by a Navy warship. The three Iranian jets were 20, 22 and 27 miles from the U.S. ship when they received the warning, IRNA said.

"The Iranian pilots radioed back saying they would fly within the range prescribed (by the Iranian command)," IRNA said. It claimed the warplanes flew to within 10 miles of the U.S. ships, then returned to their bases without incident.

There was no immediate comment from U.S. officials.

Air Force officials did not report the incident to the Strategic Air Command, which controls the base, or to Congress, state and local officials, or the public, Kalton said. "Nobody has ever inquired about it," he said.

Kalton said a subsequent investigation showed that guidance system of the missile, which carried three nuclear warheads, sent false signals that should have been diagnosed as such by the missile's monitoring system.

Instead, the monitoring system erroneously indicated the missile had entered a launch sequence.

"When a missile is sitting on alert, there's a light that says it is on alert," he said. "If the president gave the command to launch, it would go through different light changes: 'launch in progress,' 'missile launched,' 'missile has left the silo.'"

In the 1984 incident, the light sequence followed this pattern, he said, and the missile crew followed procedure and called the Alarm Response Team as a precaution.

The team rushed to the missile site and parked a "peacekeeper vehicle" on top of the silo, and a maintenance team sent to the silo determined the missile was not in a launch sequence, Kalton said.

He said the maintenance followed procedures for "safing" the missile and installed a new guidance system.

Kalton said the three nuclear warheads on the missile were not armed, but become armed automatically after the launch.

A commemorative yearbook for Stanton Junior High School is planned this year and the yearbook staff is taking orders for the special 1987-88 Dogie Yearbook.

With school district plans calling for the seventh and eighth grades to be combined at La Plata next year, this could be the last yearbook at Stanton. Carolyn Waters, yearbook adviser, said the yearbook will have pictures from 1925 to the present and will highlight "62 years of growing."

The Stanton yearbook staff extends an invitation to persons who attended Stanton, either as a high school student or junior high student, during these 62 years to purchase a commemorative issue. Orders must be placed by Nov. 20 and the price is \$12.50 each.

Stanton Junior High was originally the "magnificent new brick building" that was to house Hereford High School students. In 1925, a bond issue for \$125,000 was passed to build this three-story building which served as high school until the present high school building was occupied in 1954. Stanton was named for H.V. Stanton who had coached football in high school and was the first principal of the junior high.

The 1925-1926 school year might well be considered the beginning of

the full sports program that we are still enjoying today. The football team had five wins and two losses that season; girls' basketball had a 2-4 record; boys' basketball had a 3-6 record. Baseball and tennis were also active that year.

Hereford had one of the first high school bands in the area and was the only one to participate in the Amarillo Music Festival in 1926.

At least 30 of the county schools had closed or had consolidated by the end of the 1926 school year. At that time, there were 25 teachers in charge of 700 students at Hereford High School (Stanton) and by 1930, there were 30 teachers and 876 students.

Today there are approximately 510 students in the Stanton building with 49 staff members.

For Medicare recipients

Bill to cut medical costs

WASHINGTON (AP) — America's elderly will be protected from the financial ruin of serious illness under a historic expansion of the Medicare program now being negotiated in a House and Senate conference committee.

The Senate voted 86-11 to pass the catastrophic health legislation Tuesday evening after the administration agreed to support a compromise worked out in weeks of negotiations.

While the Senate measure differs on a number of fine points from the House version passed 302-127 on July 23, both bills build on the fundamental goals expressed by President Reagan last spring.

Whereas Medicare now pays full hospital bills for only 60 days a year — after a one-day deductible of \$544 in 1988 — the catastrophic health expansion provides 365-day-a-year coverage after a one-day deductible.

And whereas Medicare now pays only 80 percent of doctor bills, no matter how high they rise, the new program will cap out-of-pocket doctor bills at somewhere between \$1,043 and \$1,850 a year — depending on details worked out by a House-Senate conference committee.

In addition to those fundamental expansions, the legislation also provides for a Medicare benefit for outpatient prescription drugs. Details of this benefit will be determined in the conference committee. The House bill would pay 80 percent of drug bills after a \$500 annual deductible and the Senate bill 80 percent after a \$600 deductible.

The main difference, however, and the provision that prompted the administration to drop a veto threatened over the House version, is that the Senate bill would phase in the drug benefit over a six-year period. It also

would give the secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services authority to scale back the benefit in future years if additional premiums fed into a special trust fund are not sufficient to pay for full coverage.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, the Senate Finance Committee chairman who guided the Senate bill to passage, predicted relatively easy agreement with House conferees.

The new bill also puts an element of progressive financing into the Medicare program for the first time.

While all 31 million Medicare beneficiaries will be required to pay an additional flat monthly premium for the catastrophic coverage, a major share of the additional costs will be paid by so-called supplemental premiums tied to the income tax.

About 60 percent of the nation's elderly do not have enough income to have to pay any income taxes. They would pay only the relatively modest flat premium — about \$6 month additional under the Senate bill — for the catastrophic coverage.

But for the 40 percent who now pay income tax, the additional supplemental premium under the Senate version would increase based on income. The top premium would be \$800 a year each in 1988 for a couple with annual income of about \$100,000.

The House version also contains a sliding scale supplemental premium based on income, but it would fall somewhat heavier on middle-income Medicare beneficiaries.

Budget conference harmonious — so far

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deficit-reduction talks between the White House and Congress are starting on a positive note but it may be tough to keep both sides singing in harmony when they start deciding on taxes and spending.

A team of White House aides met with leading members of Congress at the Capitol on Tuesday in the first major budget talks of the year, touching on topics that included the size of the deficit cut.

Lawmakers called the session a success, but said the substance of legislation was discussed only in broad terms Tuesday.

Part of the two-hour meeting was spent discussing different conceptions of a broad spending "freeze" on domestic and military programs, sources said. Freezing agency budgets, instead of allowing them to increase with inflation, could trim more than \$10 billion from the fiscal 1988 deficit, according to some estimates.

Some lawmakers and White House officials have pointed to a freeze as something that could be enacted quickly, with the political plus of simplicity. However, the details of such a plan can favor some programs over others and a final plan could require difficult compromise.

House Majority Leader Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., was named Tuesday as chairman of the working group. He said there was "good progress" and the group went beyond purely procedural matters. But he said the lawmakers and White House officials agreed not to divulge specifics for fear of poisoning the atmosphere.

"We owe it to the nation to get the job done," said the president, warning that failure could hurt the economy.

The session began under some pressure to go beyond the \$23 billion in deficit reduction mandated for fiscal 1988 by the Gramm-Rudman budget balancing law to reassure the markets. Lawmakers, however, said they need to focus first on the basics.

PHILIPINES

issued warnings that they would target Americans if the United States became deeply involved in counter-insurgency operations in the Philippines.

The government of President Corazon Aquino is fighting both Communist and Moslem rebels.

Snyder said the attacks took place in widely separated areas within about an hour.

He said one serviceman was shot dead in front of a McDonald's restaurant in Angeles City, adjacent to the base. Another was shot and killed on a highway near the base, and a Filipino who stopped to investigate also was slain, he added.

Snyder said a retired American was shot and killed while driving across a bridge near the base. Gunmen fired on the car of another American, but that person was not injured, he said.

There were no reports of incidents around other U.S. facilities, including the Subic Bay naval station some 50 miles west of Clark. But Navy officials restricted travel between the two installations.

Now You're Cooking

Carol Kelley of 140 Pecan readily admits that cooking has not always been her forte.

"When Mark and I were newlyweds, I knew nothing about housework, much less cooking. When I put a firestone bowl on the burner to heat canned soup, I knew something was wrong when the container broke. I thought 'firestone' meant it could take a direct flame," she laughed.

Such a fiasco encouraged her to buy cookbooks and, with her husband's help, she became quite proficient in the kitchen. "Mark never follows a recipe, but he can throw anything together and it tastes great. My meals work if I follow a recipe closely," she said.

The Kelleys are parents of three children, Gabe, age eight; Colleen, age five; and Christopher, age two. The family has lived in Hereford for the past few years.

"Mark and I grew up in Temple. I attended Temple Junior College so I could take my laundry home to Mother since I didn't know how to wash clothes," Kelley said. "After attending Temple Junior College, I went to Texas A&M University where I had a double major of health/physical education and a minor in psychology.

"Mark also graduated from there, majoring in journalism and minoring in political science, history, and English. He then returned to A&M and got his masters degree in horticulture while I was a substitute teacher."

Upon marriage, Mark considered joining the military, an idea quickly vetoed by Carol. "I felt we'd move around too much, possibly every three years. But now we've been married for 10 years and have moved nine times, so maybe the military wasn't such a bad idea!"

The Kelleys, who have lived three different places in Hereford, moved here from McAllen as his job-selling boxes for American Packaging—led them here. "We loved Hereford; the climate was good and everyone was so friendly. I wasn't prepared for all the snow, though," she said. "We had no closed-toed shoes for the kids since socks and sandals were suffi-

cient in McAllen. Gabe loved the snow but Colleen was terrified of it for some time."

Yet Kelley has adapted to Hereford as she is quite busy in various organizations. She is president of the Sweet 'N Fancy Cake Decorating Club, serves as advisor for a Beta Sigma Phi Sorority chapter in Friona while remaining a member of the local Alpha Iota Mu chapter, is chairman of the blood drive, and is a former member of Newcomers.

She maintains an interest in children, derived in part from serving as state officer for Rainbow Girls. Kelley helps with vacation Bible schools at the Presbyterian Church and St. Anthony's Catholic Church, where she is also a library volunteer. She is also a substitute teacher, qualified to teach grades K-12.

As for hobbies, the busy lady likes to cross stitch, sew, do yardwork, and ride bicycles with her children. Kelley has even formed a partnership with Beckie Fry to run a catering business. "We've cooked together for about three years, making sweets for the public. Last May we decided to try our hands at catering and we love it!"

Indeed, Kelley has come a long way in mastering the culinary arts. She credits her husband, who is staff horticulturist at Back to Earth Resources, with critiquing her cooking throughout the years. "Mark often commented on my cooking efforts, saying 'It won't hurt my feelings if you don't cook this again!'"

Following are some of the Kelleys' favorite recipes:

CARROT CAKE

2 c. sugar
1 1/4 c. oil
4 eggs
2 c. flour
2 tsp. cinnamon
2 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. soda
3 c. carrots, finely grated
1 1/2 c. pecans, chopped

Cream sugar and oil. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with carrots and pecans. Pour into ungreased Bundt pan; bake at 300 degrees for one hour and

10 minutes. Cool, then remove from pan and ice with frosting below. (Note: Cake can be baked in three layers for 20-25 minutes at 350 degrees.)

FROSTING

1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1/2 stick butter (softened)
1 tsp. vanilla
1 box powdered sugar, sifted

Beat together cream cheese and butter. Add vanilla and continue beating while adding sifted powdered sugar.

CHICKEN OR TURKEY TETRAZINI

8 oz. spaghetti, broken in 2" pieces
3/4 c. sliced mushrooms
4 Tbsp. butter
3 Tbsp. chopped onions
1/2 tsp. celery salt or 1/2 c. chopped celery
pinch of cayenne pepper
1/4 tsp. marjoram (optional)
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 tall can evaporated milk (1 2/3 c.)
2 Tbsp. chopped pimientos (optional)
2 c. cooked turkey or chicken
1/2 c. sharp cheddar cheese, grated
1/2 c. sherry (optional)

In salted water, cook spaghetti until tender. Drain and rinse with hot water; drain mushrooms and save liquid.

Melt butter and saute onion; add seasonings and mushroom liquid. Blend in soup and stir until smooth. Gradually add evaporated milk, stirring constantly until smooth and thick.

In casserole or loaf pan, mix spaghetti, mushrooms, pimientos, and turkey or chicken. Pour in sauce and mix. Top with cheddar cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven until mixture bubbles—about 30 minutes.

NOTE: This is a good dish to make up a day or so ahead of time and keep in refrigerator. Take it out about 30 minutes before needed and bake as directed. Can be doubled or quadrupled and frozen.

TEXAS PECAN CAKE

1 lb. butter
1 lb. brown sugar
6 eggs, separated
1 1/3 c. flour
1 tsp baking powder
1 1/2 oz. pure lemon extract
4 c. shelled pecans
8 oz. chopped candied cherries
8 oz. chopped candied pineapples
2 c. flour

Cream butter and brown sugar. Separate eggs. Combine flour and baking soda by adding two yolks and one-third of the flour at a time until all combined. Beat egg whites to soft peak and mix into batter; add extract and mix well.

Take pecans, cherries, and pineapples and place in a brown paper sack with 2 cups flour and shake well. Mix

into batter. Set bowl in cool place overnight. Bake at the very low temperature of 215 degrees for three hours in an angel food pan.

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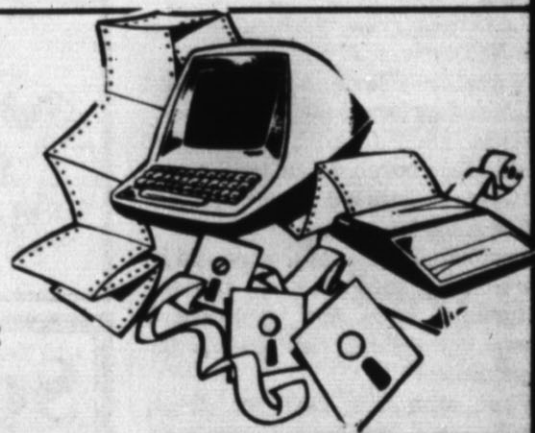

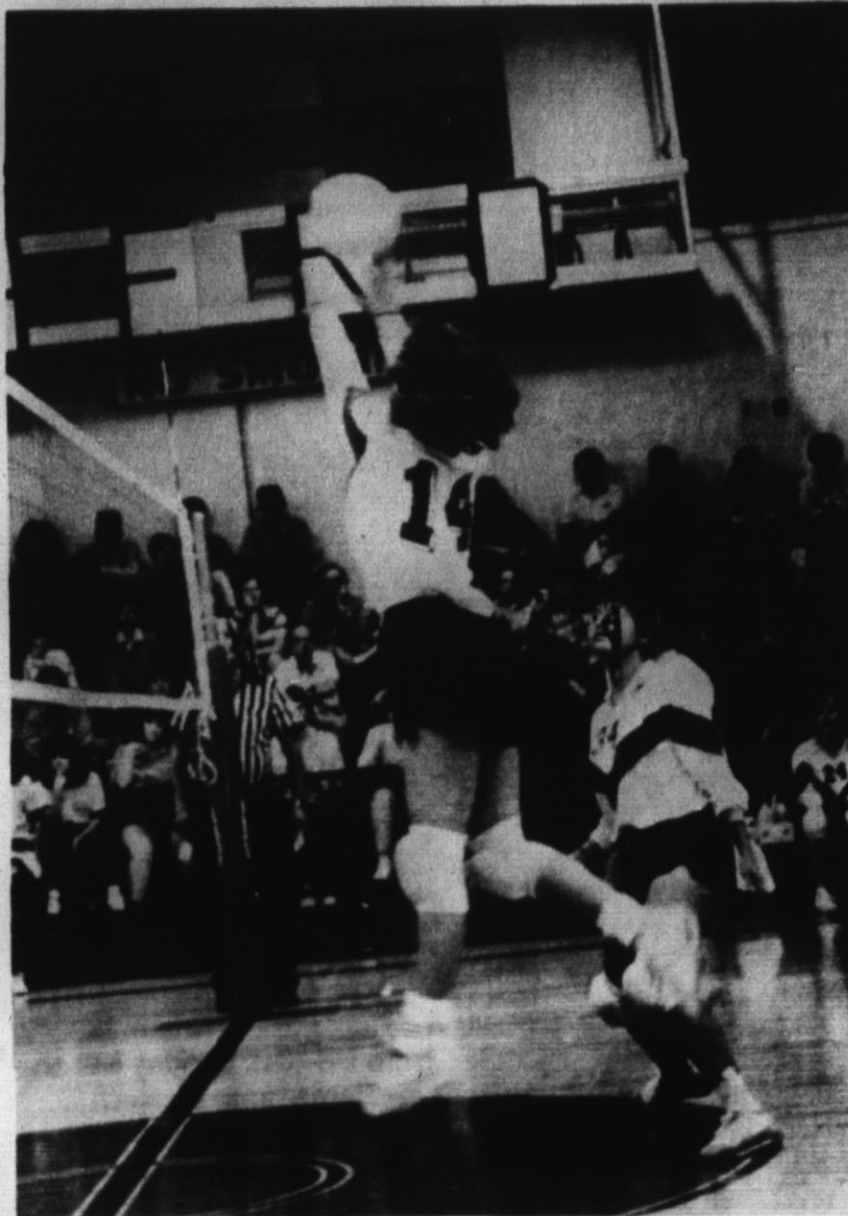
Also in the first quarter, Colvin scored with a 56-yard run. Stanton held a 14-6 lead at the end of the first quarter.

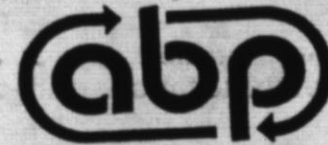
Dinking The Ball Over The Net

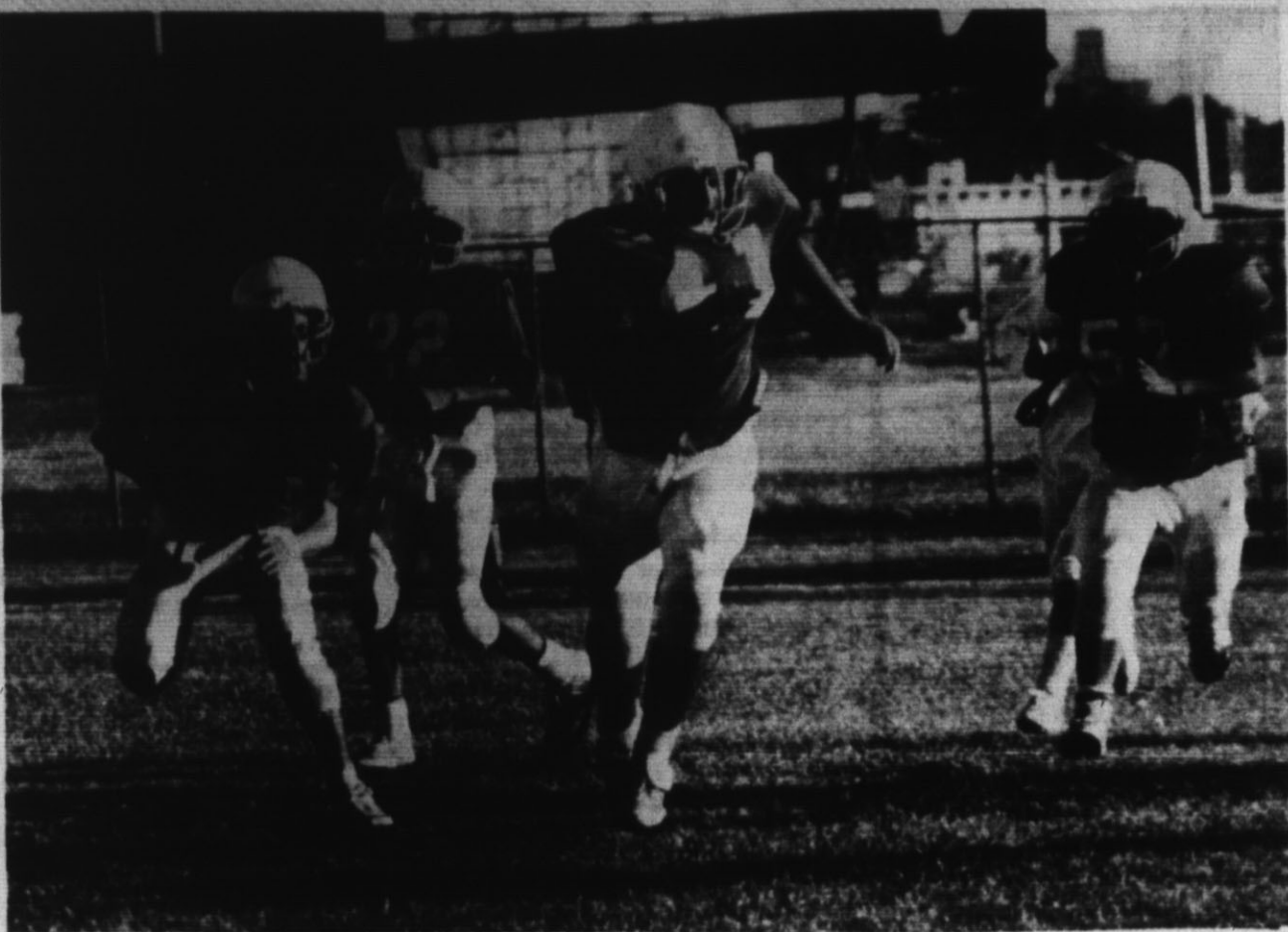
