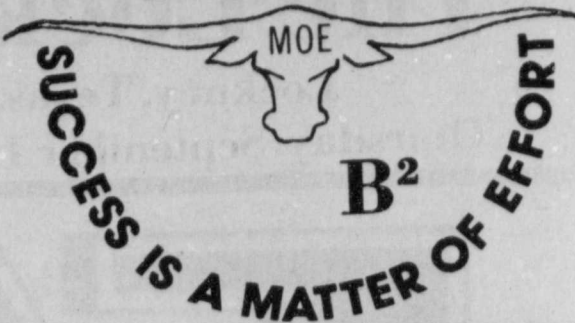

1985 parade includes several special guests

The parade for this year's Floyd County Fair promises to be one of the best parades in recent years.

The parade will begin at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, September 14 at the north end of Main Street and will continue down to the Main Street Church of Christ on South Main. All those entering in the parade are asked to be in place no later than 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning as the preliminary judging will take place at that time.

This year's parade will include seven floats from the Lockney 4-H Club, the Whirlers Square Dance Club, The Lockney Care Center, both Athena and Il Penseroso Study Clubs, and the Floyd County Museum.

The parade will also include special guests Ronald McDonald and Winnie The Pooh as well as State Representative Foster Whaley. Also the Pioneer Couple and the Pioneer Woman of the Year will be riding in the parade. Lockney Mayor J.D. Copeland will also be included in the parade. After the parade Ronald McDonald will be presenting a magic show at the entertainment building at the fair grounds and there will be many door prizes given away during the show. For more details on the magic show see the separate article in this paper. Winnie The Pooh will be throwing out candy at the parade donated by local merchants, Byrd Pharmacy, Mize Pharmacy and Consumers Fuel Association of Lockney.

Also included in the parade will be

the San Angelo and the West Texas Raiders Saddle Clubs, the Reese Air Force Base Color Guard, the Plainsmen Muzzleloaders, The High Plains Bagpipe Band of Amarillo and the Khiva Kart Patrol, the Khiva three wheelers and the Khiva Clowns.

KKYN Radio in Plainview, the voice of the Floyd County Fair for 1985, will also be bringing their Little Red House for the parade. KKYN will also be doing live broadcasts from the fair on all three days. The Lockney junior high and junior varsity cheerleaders will be riding in the parade as will the following queens and misses from this area: the ABC Rodeo Queen, Misses Wayland Baptist College, Floydada, South Plains Maid of Cotton, Mackenzie, and South Plains Honey Bee Queen, and Wresha Rhodrock, the 1984 Floyd County Fair Queen.

In addition there will be kids on decorated bicycles, and dressed as clowns. Also new cars from City Auto in Floydada, and many horses and antique cars. For those wishing to enter any antique cars in the parade call Cindy Cotham or Gary Terrell.

There will be some cash prizes, many trophies, and many ribbons given away during the parade so make plans to enter now. Chairman of the parade is Gay Terrell and she may be reached at 652-2750 after six or call Cindy Cotham at 652-2758 or 652-2774. These ladies will have any information needed about entering the parade.

Floyd County Fair kicks off today

This year's Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair promises to hold fun and entertainment for all members of the family. It will kick off today.

Thursday
Events planned for today at the fair include judging of the community exhibits at 1:00 p.m., judging of the women's department at 2:00 p.m., judging in the agriculture department at 3:00 p.m., a talent show featuring youth from ages five to eighteen at 5:30, and a square dance sponsored by the Whirlers at 8:00 p.m. All items to be entered for judging are to be in place no later than 12:00 noon today.

The talent show was added to the fair lineup this past week and all those interested in participating were to have contacted Reeda Cay Smith by Wednesday.

Closing out Thursday night will be the square dance sponsored by the Whirlers Club. There will be a \$2.00 admission charge for all dancers. There is no charge for spectators but those wishing to make donations may do so. All proceeds from the square dance will be given to the Floyd County Fair Association.

Friday will hold several facets of entertainment for the family. This is Ladies Day and that segment will include four programs and many door prizes. Also on Friday will be a 5:30 p.m. free concert featuring the Younger Brothers. The gospel singing will be at 7:00 p.m. and at 9:00 p.m. there will be a dance with the Younger Brothers performing.

The Ladies Day programs will feature Kay Roach with a stenciling presentation, Linda Smith will discuss quilting, a

style show after noon which will feature fall fashions from Brown's Department Store and The City Connection in Lockney and Anne's Sewing Basket and Hale's Department Store, both in Floydada.

Those merchants participating in the style show will have also donated many of the door prizes that will be given away throughout the day.

The final program will be presented by International Tours of Plainview, and Ken Seracy and Ellen Brown of Delta Airlines.

Postal changes enacted

Beginning Monday, September 16 the postal customers served by the Lockney Post Office will have a new afternoon deadline for outgoing afternoon mail.

Mail that is to go out in the afternoons must be deposited either inside the post office or in the outside box no later than 4:00 p.m. Mail received after 4:00 p.m. will not be processed until the next business day and will not leave Lockney until the day it is processed.

Incoming mail will also be coming in to Lockney at a different time, some 30 minutes later than at the present. Due to this later time those postal customers on rural routes can expect their carriers to deliver mail about 30 minutes later than usual.

These changes are being implemented due to a change in the route that serves Lockney and other area post offices. Also this is due to the reactivation of the Childress mail processing center.

Also going into effect on Monday, September 16, all mail deposited in the local and out-of-town drops in Lockney will receive the Lockney, Texas postmark before going to the Childress processing center.

Added will be a new drop at the post office. This drop box will be for mail going to other towns with the 792 prefix zip code. All mail going to the following towns should be placed in this box. Towns included in the 792 zip code area include Childress, Afton, Aiken, Carey, CeeVee, Chalk, Chillicothe, Clarendon, Crowell, Dickens, Dodson, Dougherty, Dumont, Estelline, Flomot, Floydada, Guthrie, Hedley, Kirkland, and Lakeview.

Also Lelia Lake, McAdoo, Matador, Memphis, Northfield, Odell, Paducah, Petersburg, Quail, Quannah, Quitaque, Roaring Springs, Silvertown, South Plains, Tell, Truscott, and Turkey.

taking donations for chances to win items.

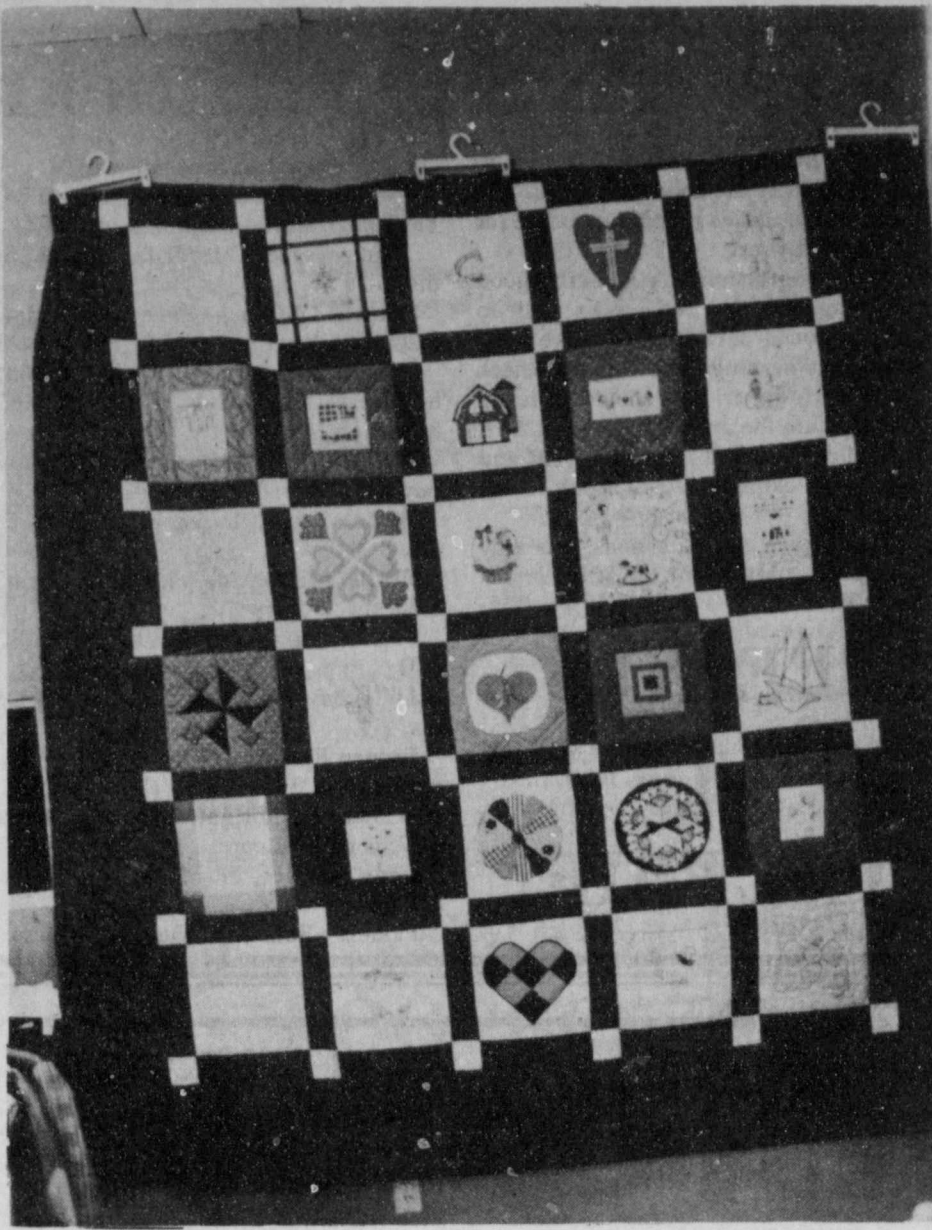
The Lockney Quarterback Club will take donations on chances to win a shotgun to be given away on September 20 at the Lockney, Floydada football game.

Ranch Day set at Tech

Ranching as it was lived in the old days will come to life September 21 during annual Ranch Day activities at the Ranching Heritage Center of The Museum of Texas Tech University.

The theme of "A Family Reunion will tie together the day's events when descendants of several pioneer families represented through structures restored at the center gather with the public for special activities.

Ranch Day is sponsored by the Ranching Heritage Association (RHA) in conjunction with the National Golden Spur Award to be presented Sept. 20 to Marie Tyler of Bismarck, N.D., for a lifetime of achievement in the livestock industry.

The industry's colorful past is celebrated each year during Ranch Day when working cowboys, story tellers, crafts workers and volunteers re-live ranching for the public. Activities will begin with a flag-raising ceremony at 8:30 a.m. The exhibit site will open at 10 a.m. with ranch demonstrations and musical programs scheduled until 4:30 p.m.

All events are free except for the barbecue luncheon which costs \$6 for adults and \$3 for children's or small portions.

Samplers will be offered by the Crosby County Prairie Drama Association of "Aunt Hank and the Postal Inspector" and "Cowboy Getting Ready for the Dance." The musical samplers are from the six-episode musical drama "God's Country" being produced in conjunction with the Texas Sesquicentennial and Crosby County's centennial next year.

First Floyd County Fair opened in 1905

The Floyd County Fair will open its doors this Thursday marking the eightieth year since its inception. The first fair opened October 10, 1905, in Floydada by committee members W.M. Massie, Dr. V. Andrews, I.D. Gamble, Homer Steen and C. Surginer. 1905 was proclaimed a "banner year" for the fair because products of all kinds were unusually good that year in all parts of the country. Following the Floyd County Fair E.C. Henry was chosen by the executive committee to take the agricultural exhibits to the State Fair in Dallas.

The early fair focused on agricultural exhibits and culinary items produced by "Floyd Countians." Produce shown included celery, cauliflower, sweet potatoes, cabbage, onions, radishes, apples, peaches, pears, and watermelons.

Livestock exhibited included draft stallions, jack colts, Wyandotte cocks and hens, mules, and turkeys.

The parade must have been an unorthodox sight compared to the milder parades of modern time. A.D. White, in 1905, urged everyone to be in the parade in Floydada. According to White, "Everyone in Floyd County should get together and have the biggest 'blow-out' we've ever had. Every person who has a business or profession ought to get up a float."

The 1985 Floyd County Fair promises to be one of the best with events that will appeal to everyone of all ages. Citizens in Floyd County have pulled together once again and have exemplified this year's theme. "Together we can."

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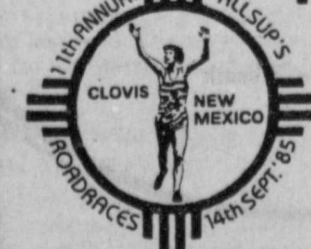

Social Security Report

Social Security beneficiaries often become confused with the retirement test, the rule which determines how earnings will affect checks. The retirement or earnings test is that provision referred to when the questions is asked "How much can I make and still get my checks?" It is true that there are sometimes complications that arise concerning the types of income that count in the earnings test or in applying certain exclusions. Still, the basic concept of the retirement test is simple. First, there are exempt amounts established each year, one for persons under age 65, and a larger amount for individuals age 65 and over. For 1985, the figures are \$5400 for those under age 65 and \$7320 for those 65 and over. If a persons' earnings do not go over the exempt amount, then all checks will be payable for the year. If the earnings are over the exempt amount, one-half of the extra is withheld from payments due for the year. For example, a person age 63 whose earnings for the year are

\$6400.00 would have \$500.00 of his benefits withheld, ($6400 - 5400 = 1000 \div 2 = 500$).

The retirement test is enforced through the annual report process. An individual first gives an estimate of expected earnings for the year either on the initial application of benefits or by way of the annual report. This is the basis for which payments are made for the year. Here is another example: A beneficiary who is age 67 estimates \$9,000.00 is entitled to a social security check or \$400.00 per month. The "excess" earnings would be \$840 ($9000 - 7320 = 1680 \div 2 = 840$). Since the beneficiary benefit amount is \$400.00, no checks would be payable for January or February. Although \$360.00 would be due for March, partial checks are not paid until the annual report is filed after the close of the year.

An annual report is normally sent to each working beneficiary in the first quarter of the year. At that time, the individual can use the figures from the W-2 forms of the previous year (or tax

returns, if self-employed) to report to Social Security the actual earnings. The person then makes another estimate for the current year.

A working beneficiary is taking good advantage of the retirement test to receive social security and have only part of the earnings affecting the check amount. However, care should be taken to make sure the annual report with SSA is filed before April 15 of each year and to make estimates as accurate as possible.

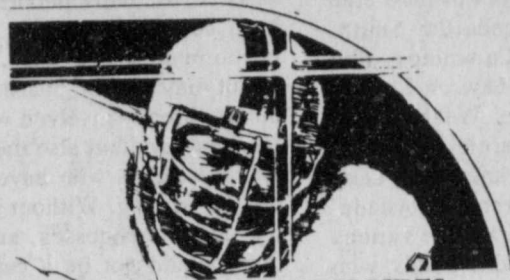

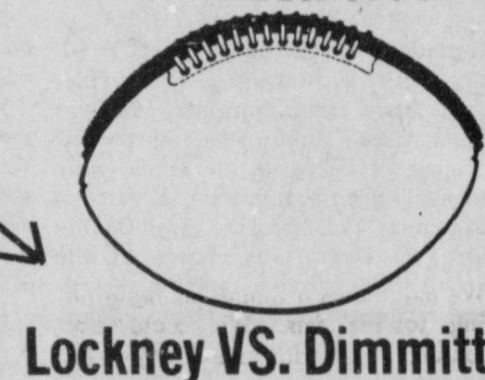

The National Arbor Day Foundation is giving ten free shade trees to people who become Foundation members during September, 1985.

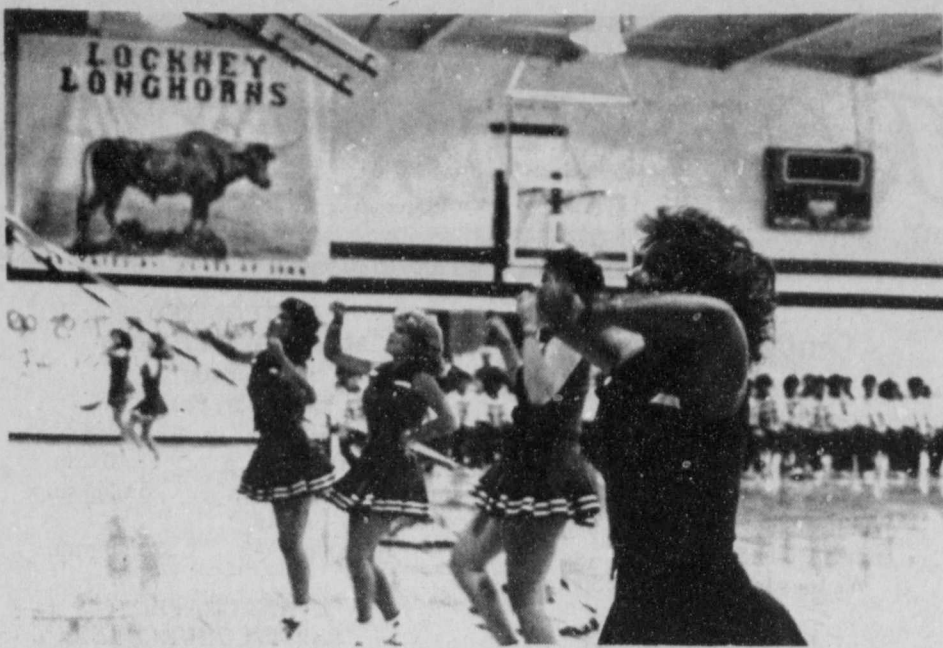
The free trees are part of the Foundation's effort to promote fall tree planting throughout America.

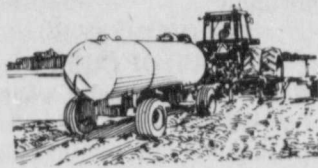

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1985

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing assistance program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

proprations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment.

The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for:

(1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;

(2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

Plans were made for the club members to operate once again the homemade ice cream booth at the Floyd

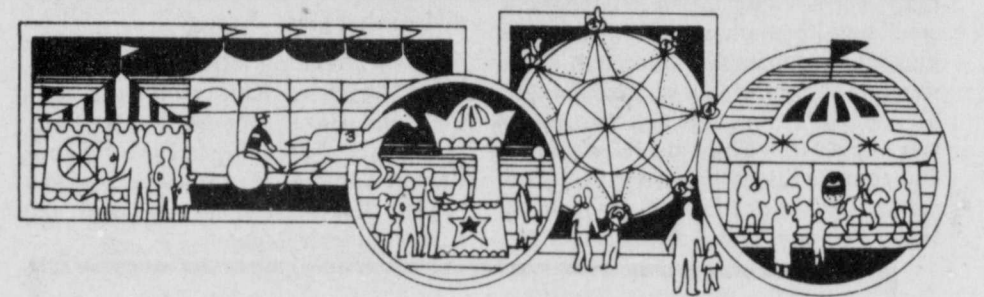
County Fair September 12-14. Each member is to provide three gallons of homemade ice cream. Worksheets were distributed.

Tulia defeats Horns 35 - 7

Last Friday night the Lockney Longhorns, as well as many Lockney citizens journeyed to Tulia to see the Horns in their season opener against Tulia. As in the 1984 season opener, the Horns lost the game by a score of 35 to 7.

The Longhorns problem was in trying to keep running back Steven Powell contained. Coach Bob Purser said, "The determining factor was Powell. He is a very good back and we knew we would have to contain him to win the game. We got back in the game during the second quarter and scored but the mistakes we made during the third quarter were the turning point of the game. We turned over the ball and they had good field positions and scored."

Purser also said, "We are pleased with the effort of the team. We have a young team this year and we did not

expect to start this year where we left off last year. The team is improving and will get better each week."

The Lockney Longhorns only scoring drive in Fridays game came in the second quarter. With 9:19 left in the first half Johnny Torrez intercepted a Tulia pass and the Horns had the ball on their own 30 yard line. Eight plays later a Steven Cates pass to Johnny Torrez put the Horns inside the Hornet 45 yard line. It took 22 plays and two fourth down conversions for the Horns to reach the Tulia four yard line in a fourth and goal situation. Quarterback Steven Cates took the snap and rolled left and took aim for Johnny Torrez in the end zone but the pass fell short.

On the next play Lockney got the ball back as the Hornets fumbled on the snap. With 1:28 left in the half the

Horns took the ball on the Tulia six yard line. Three plays lost the Horns six yards and on the fourth and 12 play quarterback Cates took the snap and faked the play action and shot the ball to Javier Bernal in the end zone. Tony Banda made the extra point and at the half Lockney trailed 14 to 7.

Outstanding players of the Tulia game include Johnny Torrez as the offensive back or receiver, the defensive back, and the horn of the week. Randy Race was the offensive lineman of the week and Trent Gant took offensive lineman honors.

Commissioner announces unemployment seminar

In Austin, Texas Employment Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers published the schedule for the first of a series of half-day seminars to be conducted statewide in the coming months. The seminars, announced by Gov. Mark White and Commissioner Nabers, are aimed at helping Texas employers control unemployment tax costs.

Commissioner Nabers, the Employer Representative at T.E.C., said the project was a result of the numerous employer inquiries she has received since her recent appointment. "As a former employer, I am well aware of the concern over rising tax costs. There are ways to reduce these costs. Employers have been asking for help and these seminars are our way of responding to the requests," she said.

Gov. White, who appointed Nabers to the T.E.C. in December 1984, said, "Texas employers are the foundation of this state's economic vitality." He urged employers to take advantage of the seminars designed to cut the cost of doing business in Texas saying, "We can create an even more desirable business climate in this great state."

During the half-day seminars, Employment Commission representatives will discuss the laws and procedures concerning unemployment compensation taxes, ideas for immediate cost reduction, the appeals process and fraud control.

Dealers offering seat belt repair

Many Texas franchised new car and truck dealers will be offering repair and replacement of safety belts at cost during September and October and most can supply oversize motorists with belt extensions at no cost.

"Texas will be the second largest state to have a mandatory safety belt law in effect," said Gene Fondren, president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association. "It is important that we make it as easy as possible for Texans to comply with the law, so we have joined with the manufacturers in offering this program."

The cost for parts and labor varies from dealer to dealer and manufacturer to manufacturer, but Fondren said an example of the commitment by the factories is the cost reduction made by Volkswagen, which cut its cost for replacement belts almost 75 percent. Meanwhile, the General Motors Corp., which has accumulated over the years about 6400 part numbers for safety belts, designed a "universal" lap belt, lap-shoulder belt and retractable lap-shoulder belt, and the cost is relatively low.

"While most dealers do not normally stock safety belt replacement units, the manufacturers have assured us that in most cases the part can be shipped to the dealerships in 24 to 72 hours," Fondren said. "We want to make this as simple and as inexpensive as possible."

Also to help those motorists who might be too large for a safety belt, most manufacturers provide safety belt extenders either at a low cost or at no charge.

Some dealers may have safety belt extenders in stock while others may need to order the part because of the varying policies of the different manufacturers, Fondren said. In those cases where the part must be ordered, the

extender can be shipped in a day to a week, he said.

"We believe strongly in the life-saving aspects of safety belts and we want to see the law succeed in Texas. That is why we are doing all that we can to encourage drivers and passenger to comply with the law," Fondren said. "Wearing a safety belt is a habit we can all get into, and it's a habit that could save our lives some day."

Fondren urged car and truck owners to check the condition of their belts. Some motorists suspect that their belts do not work because they are able to move freely.

"That is not necessarily true," Fondren said. "The safety belts in many of the newer models operate on a pendulum system. They are car sensitive, which means the belts lock when the car slows too quickly."

"But don't leave anything to chance," Fondren continued. "Look at the webbing. Test the lock. Check the retractors. If everything does not seem perfect, go by a dealership and have the safety belt checked. You never know when you might need them."

Congressman Beau Boulter Reports from Washington



BACK TO THE BUDGET BATTLE

Summer is almost over, and after a month long stay in the 13th District, I am headed back to Washington to begin the final four months of the 1985 legislative session. This past month — through eleven town meetings, over 30 speeches, and stops in almost every one of our 37 counties — I have gotten a very clear picture of your concerns. I am now well prepared to return to the Capitol and again, represent those opinions.

You have told me, without a doubt, that the number one concern of my constituency is our national deficit. I was honored to have been chosen as part of the 26 member House/Senate Budget Conference Committee, and found that my position on the conference offered me a unique opportunity to represent the people of the 13th District. And I have enjoyed talking with you about that process, sharing some of the frustrations that were involved with trying to reform the way our government spends your money, and discussing the final outcome. That outcome — a budget that does reduce our deficit by about \$40 billion — is at least a beginning in our fight to balance the books.

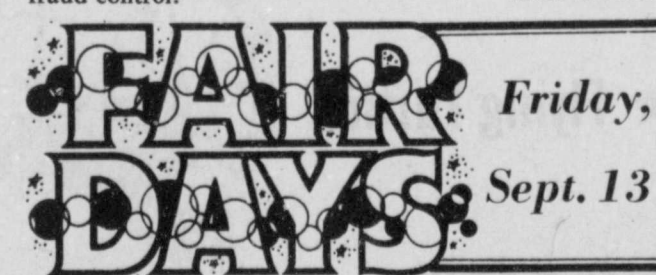
As always, there is more to be done. My chief objectives, once back in Washington, will be to push for the kinds of structural reforms in our federal government that will eliminate waste, fraud, and inefficiency. Approximately two years ago, the President commissioned a group of efficiency experts from private enterprise to look at the government, and determine where there was waste, and how it could be eliminated. This group — known as the Grace Commission — came up with 2,478 recommendations that could save up to \$424 billion over three years, which they presented to

the President. When I got to Washington last January, I fully expected to find a group of Congressmen working to implement many of those recommendations. I was disappointed to find that there was no such organized group, and decided to found one myself. The Grace Caucus, which is a bipartisan group of over 80 Congressmen, is designed to study the Grace Commission suggestions, determine which ones are practical, and develop legislative initiatives to enact them. Now, I must always make very clear that we do not agree across-the-board with all of the 2,478 recommendations made. But, considering possible savings in the billions of dollars, we feel that these recommendations should at least be looked at carefully.

Another strong tool in the fight against waste and inefficiency would be the Presidential line item veto. If our President had the ability to go through spending bills, line-by-line, and determine what was fat and what was muscle, we would be winning more battles in our deficit war. I am an original cosponsor of legislation that would give the President that power, and in a survey I did of the 13th District, over 75 percent of you agreed with me.

Finally, another major initiative that I will be working for as we return to session, is the passage of a balanced budget constitutional amendment. Again, I have cosponsored legislation seeking passage of this amendment, which has the support of over 80% of the voters in the 13th District.

I plan to come back to the district as often as possible during the next four months. In the meantime, however, I hope that you will keep me informed, through letters and phone calls, of your views and opinions on the issues of importance to all of us.

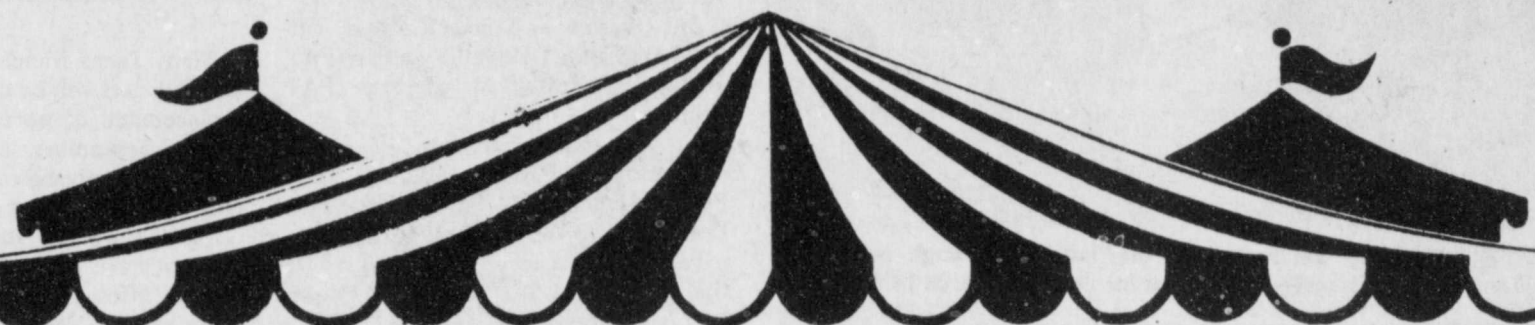
