Colorado City to get new doctor

Dr. Royce McAnally will be moving to Colorado City to practice medicine within the next few weeks, according to Wendell Alford, Mitchell County Hospital administrator.

In a closed session of the hospital's board of directors on Thursday night, January 31, members settled the last details of the arrangement, whereby Dr. McAnally would be asked to come to Mitchell County for at least a two year period.

On Friday morning, Dr. McAnally agreed to that arrangement, as presented by Alford, and will arrive in town on February 15 with his wife, Sharan, and their daughter Audra, who is a high school freshman.

Alford says that Dr. McAnally, who is looking forward to the move and to working with Dr. Dee Roach and the medical community, should be able to see patients shortly after arrival.

Dr. McAnally will do family

practice and obstetrics, and will set up operations in the Medical Clinic at 505 Chestnut in Colorado City.

He presently is negotiating to lease or purchase a home near the clinic, and has future plans to build a home in the vicinity of the hospital, according to Alford.

At Thursday night's meeting the board of directors also approved hospital policy regarding patients' rights to refuse treatment, and voted to make insurance payments to a

doctor who had treated some employees of the hospital.

A questionnaire which a patient had filled out upon being discharged provided board members with a warm glow.

The patient had said, in part, that she would highly recommend the hospital, that the personnel provided the "best care," and that Mitchell County Hospital was 100% better than a certain hospital in a nearby county, which she named.

Board members discussed an interesting statistic from a survey conducted by an independent statistical firm.

The survey found that in hospitals with under 50 beds, of which Mitchell County Hospital is one, the average revenue generated per year per family practice physician is \$414,000.

Alford brought to the attention of the board the fact that Dr. Roach has been generating approximately five times that amount.

C-City Police
have busy night

The Colorado City Police Department responded to a call regarding a disturbance at the Great Western Motel on Wednesday night, January 30, and found more than expected.

According to Police Chief Bobby Sparks, at approximately 9 p.m. that evening Patrolman George Oliver arrested a 22 year old white male and a 16 year old white male juvenile for public intoxication at the motel.

Upon further investigation it was learned that the individuals were brothers, and that they were reported to have taken a vehicle without authorization in Maricopa, Arizona.

The pair was arrested for unauthorized use of a vehicle. The younger brother was turned over to juvenile authorities and the older brother was placed in the Mitchell County Jail.

Later on that same shift, Sparks said, at 3:04 a.m. Thursday morning, Oliver received a teletype from Abilene law enforcement officials.

The teletype described a vehicle in which two white males suspected of assault with a deadly weapon, a shotgun, were headed toward this area.

According to Sparks, the teletype contained the information that the two suspects had fled arrest in Eastland at speeds exceeding 100 miles an hour.

At 3:49 a.m. Officers Oliver and Mike Cayce spotted the vehicle and apprehended the suspects without incident on Interstate Highway 20 within the city limits of Colorado City.

The suspects, a 27 year old white male from Riverside, California, and a 23 year old white male from Mareno, California, were taken into custody. Added to the original charge of assault with a deadly weapon were the charges of fleeing to avoid arrest and speeding over 100 miles per hour.

The vehicle in which the suspects were riding was impounded, and shotgun shells were found in its interior, but no shotgun was found.

"Jaws of Life" used
to extricate driver

On Tuesday night, January 29, members of the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department used the "jaws of life" to extricate Bobby Cawthorn, 32, from the cab of an overturned street sweeper.

According to Rufino Martinez Jr., one of the members of the fire department who was on the scene, Cawthorn's vehicle had overturned, probably due to icy conditions, on Interstate Highway 20 just east of Loraine.

Martinez said that the department, the only one in the county which has the "jaws of life," received notification of the accident from Reserve Sheriff Deputy Jimmy Browne at 10:10 p.m. Tuesday night. He said that 20 members of the fire department arrived in three fire trucks to find Cawthorn trapped in his vehicle.

Cawthorn, from Huntsville, Alabama, was travelling to Van Horn when the accident occurred, and was conscious throughout the rescue operation, according to Martinez.

"The first thing he asked about when we got him out was the condition of his truck," said Martinez, who also said that he believed the fact that Cawthorn was wearing his seat belt at the time of the accident was probably a factor in his survival.

Cawthorn was taken by the Mitchell County Ambulance Service to Mitchell County Hospital complaining of numbness in his left hand.

He arrived at 11:30 p.m., was admitted to the hospital, and was released on Friday morning, February 1.

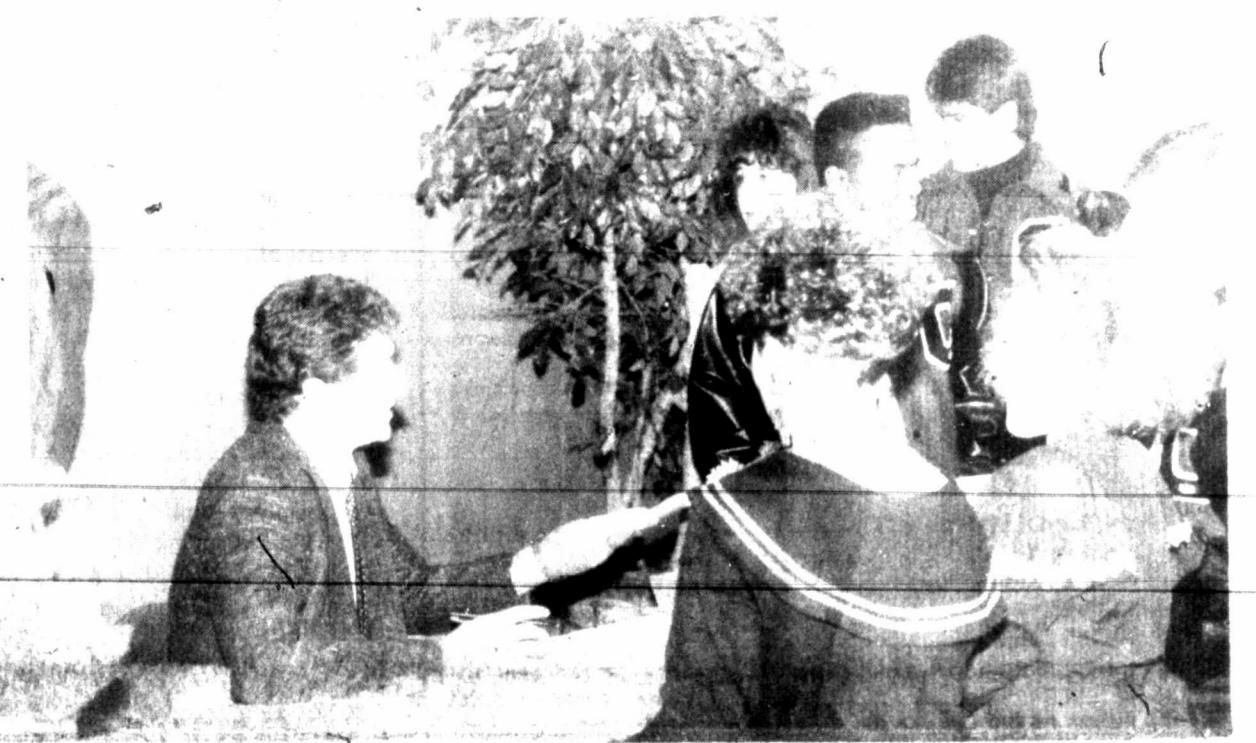
Smith presents
statistic report
to committee

At the regular meeting of the Mitchell County Economic Development Committee on Friday morning, members received the statistical report they had commissioned earlier from Gary Smith, a private consultant from Abilene.

The report was requested after the committee approached the firm of Private Database, Inc., which supplied a questionnaire detailing the information it needed.

Private Database, Inc., is an Oklahoma City-based firm which matches communities with industries and business which are seeking areas to locate new

Gossett speaks of goals
at CHS Football Banquet

Ever since He was a young teenager, Jeff Gossett, who is the current punter for the Los Angeles Raiders, believed in setting high goals, and on January 31, he spoke of his experiences at the Colorado High School Football Banquet.

After graduating from high school, Gossett earned an athletic scholarship, but it was not in football but rather baseball. Although playing and competing in football for two years, Gossett was drafted by the New York Mets to play baseball in 1978.

After a couple of years in the minors, Gossett and the team's manager got into a dispute. The misunderstanding grew, and Jeff dropped his baseball career and began punting on the side.

Gossett's first big break was unexpected in which "America's team," the Dallas Cowboys, gave him a buzz. Already having a quarterback and a punter in athlete Danny White, Gossett was released after the pre-season games. The next football season, Jeff was released by the San Diego Chargers

right after pre-season for the second time.

Never giving up his hopes of becoming a professional athlete, Kansas City signed Gossett and his "foot" for two seasons. Gaining two punting seasons under his belt, the Cleveland Browns was his next stop where he punted for three and a half years until the 1987 football strike.

The Oilers from Houston gave him another years experience before

Recycling project begins

The Mitchell County group Texas Against Pollution, is starting a recycling drive. A local Brownie troop will be working in conjunction with the group.

The group will be collecting recyclable items, beginning February 19, on the third Thursday of each month, from 5 until 7 p.m., in the parking lot of City National Bank.

People who wish to participate should begin saving aluminum cans, cardboard, glass, tin cans, plastic bottles, white paper and computer paper.

Newspapers are not acceptable at this time, according to TAP President Peggy Maddox, but plans are in the works to provide a class in composting. Newspapers, according to Ms. Maddox, are very good for composting.

"It only takes a small amount of time to separate our trash," Ms. Maddox said, "and the benefits will go a long way. We hope to help raise awareness and to generate community civic pride in meeting a growing national problem."

There are some restrictions on the types of items which can be recycled, according to Ms. Maddox. Those who wish to recycle should pay close attention to the restrictions as here stated.

Acceptable glass items: soda bottles, beer bottles, juice containers, catsup bottles, wine and liquor bottles, food containers (separate clear, brown, and green glass) (no ceramic tops on beer bottles, no

stone, gravel, rock or dirt, no tv tubes, no incinerated or burned glass)

Unacceptable glass items: no mirrors, no ceramic cups and plates, no clay flower pots, no crystal

no picture tubes or light bulbs, no automobile or window glass, no heat resistant ovenware, no drinking glasses

Acceptable paper items: white paper: ads, bond paper, carbon copies, computer print sheets, copy paper, envelopes (no plastic windows), letterhead

Appeal will be filed in TU case

In the matter of the suit against Texas Utilities Electric by the parents of Jaime Baldwin Jr., the motion for a new trial on the summary judgment in favor of TU Electric has been denied.

Baldwin drowned in May of 1988 at the Morgan Creek Power Plant hot-water discharge area on

the east side of Lake Colorado City. His parents, Jaime and Mary Baldwin Sr., represented by Marc May, an Odessa attorney, subsequently filed suit against TU Electric.

State District Judge Robert Moore, in Big Spring, rendered a summary judgment in favor of TU Electric, and May filed a motion

with the court for a new trial in that matter.

According to Dallas attorney Travis Vanderpool, who represents TU Electric, the motion for that new trial was recently denied. He says that May is now in the process of filing an appeal with the State District Court of Appeals in Eastland.

AUSTIN -- Robert Lemons of Colorado City joined the staff of Representative Robert Junell today, February 1, 1991. discussed State Representative Robert Junell's plans to hire Robert Lemons as a liaison from Mitchell County.

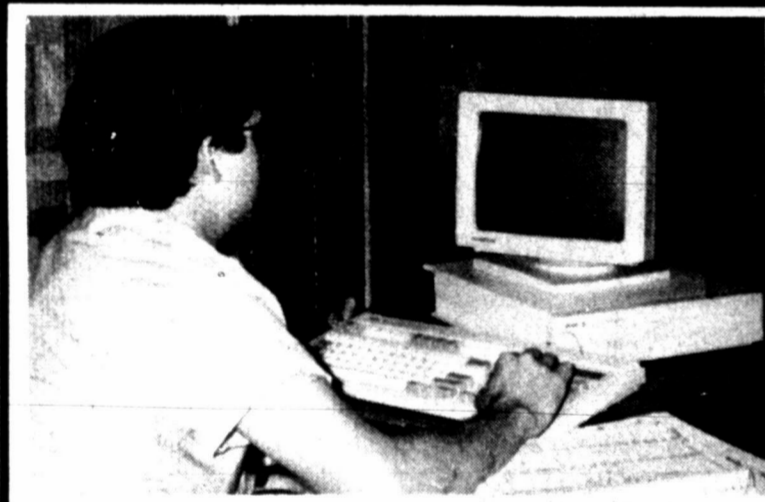
This liaison will relay information from Austin which is pertinent to Mitchell County.

Mission donations help local families

In the month of October, 1990, First United Methodist Church, Calvary Baptist Church, the Christian Temple, Dorn Chapel United Methodist, and Oak Street Baptist Church contributed \$297.42 to the Colorado City Community Mission. Private individuals contributed \$42, for a total of \$339.42.

Costs to operate the organizations, however, and to provide food, medication, and lodging for those in need, were \$349.54.

Among those helped in October were eight low income families, who encountered difficulties while travelling through the area, and who were provided lodging and a total of

39 hot meals. Eight local families were also helped, with food from the food bank; transportation was provided to doctor or hospital for five local individuals; and medication was provided for one local individual.

In the month of November, 1990, the Mission received donations of \$235, and disbursed \$297.95.

The Mission provided 28 hot meals to seven families.

In December, 1990, the Mission received \$581 and disbursed \$546.62.

Eleven families were provided 65 hot meals, six families were assisted with clothing, and eight families were provided food baskets.

Consignments sought for annual farm auction

Consignments of farm implements are now being accepted for the Ninth Annual Kiwanis Club Farm Equipment Auction which will be held on Saturday, March 16 at the Mitchell County Fair Grounds.

This annual event has raised over \$20,000 for the youth of Mitchell County. Last year's

auction proceeds went to pay for playground equipment at Ruddick Park.

Buyers from throughout West Texas traditionally come to the auction, an event well worth attending even for those who do not plan to purchase anything.

As he does each year, Kiwanian Grady Morris will donate his services as auctioneer. All of the other work required to make the auction a success will be performed by volunteer Kiwanians and Kiwanians as well.

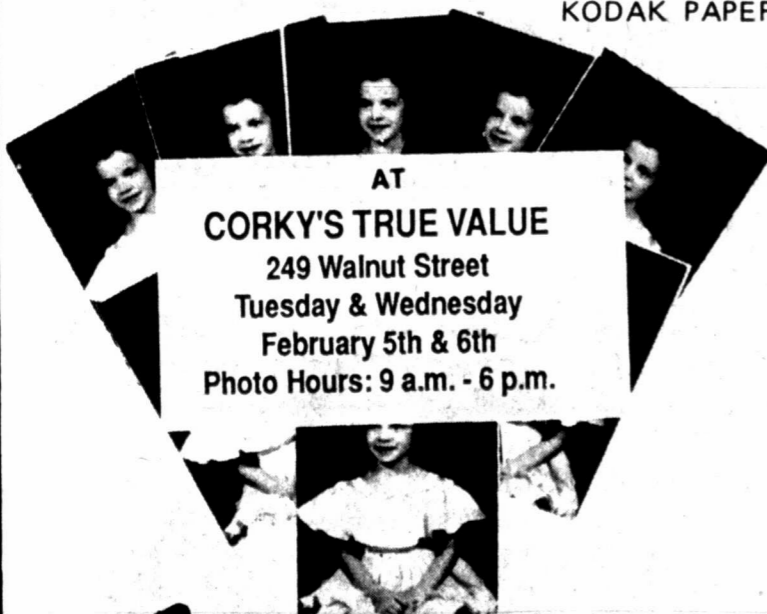
