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## DUTY OF THE COMMERCIAL ORGANIZATION

Why should a city have a commercial organization? Because if it is up to its duties, it will be the most potent force in the community progress. Its duties are to do everything and everything necessary and incident to the upbuilding of the better building of the city and its environs. Its duty is not only to make a city grow, but also to make it a better, a more sanitary, a more enjoyable place in which to live.

The province or field of work reaches into every branch and takes in every phase of the life of the community. The commercial organization, wholesale, retail and manufacturing, the professional interests, the government of city, county and state, the social side of the city's life, where it touches the question of morals and health; all of these and in fact every channel of activity comes under its practical

The commercial organization has the duty in that it must bring all the elements of the entire community, county as well as city, together into one compact body working for the uplift of the community.

It must teach the individuals composing these elements the lesson of movement thru co-operation. It must arouse the citizenry from the time lethargy to a quickened interest, and always and everywhere the gospel of sane, and safe, self-interest and civic pride. Its motto must be, "If it's good for the community then let us have it". It helps the city as a whole, has a beneficial effect upon every individual within its boundaries.

Not only the business and professional men make good "boosters," but also the young men, the clerks, the stores, the women both in the home and in the office or store and children in the children in the schools. It is the duty of the commercial organization to so spread its propaganda of development as to obtain the efficient aid of all these forces. Many organizations secure the aid of their force and power from the women's auxiliaries. In campaigns for sanitation and beauty work help is invaluable.

The commercial organization has the duty toward the city government which it cannot afford to overlook. It is the duty of the politician to know his power is on the decline when the business interests and their microscopic eyes of investigation upon his maneuvers. Every politician should be made to work with administration in an amicable way, but if this is not possible, it is the duty of the commercial organization to continue to interest itself in the affairs of the city government.

The civic body has this right because its members are the heavy payers, its business men make the city habitable. No city could run without them. They are vital and being vital, they have the first right to speak in the control and management of the city affairs.

It is the civic body's duty to interfere in all legislative matters which may have an effect upon the city. The astute ability and acumen of the business mind is necessary for successful handling of such questions as taxation. It needs a business head to work out the intricacies of financing great public improvements. The unselfish democracy of the commercial organization is needed to keep its finger on the pulse of the whole body politic.

It is the duty of the commercial organization to conduct its affairs on a business basis. Whether in the location of industries or in an effort to secure new and larger plants, there should be a business method adopted.

It is the duty of the civic body to interest itself in educational matters. Upon the schools depend the future ability and activity of the city's people. The civic body can and should exert its most wholesome influence for the continual development of the school system.

It is the duty of the commercial organization to give sound publicity to the city's advantages and to do everything in its power to eliminate forms of detrimental publicity.

## MUCH BROOMCORN BEING MARKETING HERE

The broomcorn rush is now on and many tons of this paying crop is being hauled into Perryton for shipment every day. The sunshine of the past few days has dried up the roads so that the farmers are able to bring their brush to market. A representative of this paper overheard one of the largest broomcorn buyers in this section of the country deploring the fact that Perryton did not have a broomcorn warehouse. He estimated that with the present loading and unloading facilities for handling broomcorn, which are practically nil, over one hundred car loads of broomcorn will be shipped from this station during the present season. He also stated that in his opinion double this amount of broomcorn would have been marketed here if we had a suitable warehouse. The merchants, banks and business men of Perryton need an awakening on this proposition. It seems as though they do not realize the vast amount of business that they are losing every year. Thousands of dollars are paid out to broomcorn raisers in this trade territory who market their product at towns on the Rock Island that appreciate this business sufficiently to erect warehouses to take care of the corn.

During the past week eleven cars of corn have been shipped from Perryton. On account of damage by rain the price has ranged from \$50.00 up, but a fair average would be about \$120.00 per ton. Members of the broomcorn association are receiving more money for their brush than that paid by local buyers.

Shipments of cattle, hogs and other farm products have been heavier than usual. On last Saturday Harrison & Stevens shipped five cars of cattle from Wawaka to Kansas City. The Perryton Hog Company shipped on the same day one car of hogs from Farnsworth to Los Angeles, and a car of hogs from Perryton to Los Angeles. On Saturday H. M. Small shipped two cars of cattle from Perryton to Kansas City; and Gus B. Coots a car of cattle from this station to Kansas City. Jake Thompson loaded a car of calves on Saturday, which went to his farm at Slater, Missouri. On last Friday the Perryton Hog Company shipped two cars of hogs from this place to Los Angeles and one to Kansas City. The Shearer Produce Company shipped a car of eggs on Monday to Chicago, and a car of live poultry to San Francisco on Tuesday. In addition to the above shipments a number of cars of grain have gone out. Local shippers had in orders for forty-five cattle and box cars for last Saturday's shipments, but on account of the car shortage several were unable to ship.

## DISTRICT COURT IN SESSION THIS WEEK

The regular fall term of the Ochiltree County District Court convened in this city on Monday afternoon of this week. Judge Ewing, District Attorney Holmes, and a number of out of town attorneys were unable to drive through on account of Sunday's rain, consequently Court did not open until after Monday's train came in. Immediately after arriving in Perryton the Judge set the wheels of the law in motion. The Grand Jury was impaneled and they started their work at 4:00 o'clock Monday afternoon. ## TEXAS COUNTY BANK AT GUYMON FAILS

The doors of the Texas County National Bank of Guymon were closed on Thursday morning of last week by order of the board of directors. A national bank examiner had been at work on the books of the bank for several days before the close and we understand that a number of irregularities were found which the cashier, Homer Salter, acknowledged. At last reports the shortage was only about \$40,000.00 but in all probability this figure will be raised. The Texas County National was considered one of the strongest banks in Texas county and numbered among its officers and directors some of the best men in the Guymon community.

Cashier Salter accepts all blame for the conditions, and exonerates the directors as having no knowledge of the situation. No doubt some plan of re-organization will be worked out for the failed bank. If not this failure will be a serious blow to Guymon and the many patrons of the bank.

## LOCAL COTTON GROWERS MAKING GOOD MONEY

The farmers in this locality who planted cotton this year are realizing a handsome profit on their crop.

The first bale was marketed here last week and brought 54c. This was snap cotton and was raised by Mr. Randolph, who also received a premium of \$44.00 which was given by the business men of Perryton. This crop of cotton will make about one-third of a bale to the acre. On Monday of this week, K. August Schade, who lives 6 miles due north of town, brought in a load of cotton which brought him \$208.70 plus the \$25.00 premium which made a total of \$233.70 for one load of seed cotton weighing 2421 pounds. Mr. Schade planted 28 acres and he estimates that it will easily make a third of a bale to the acre. Allen W. Wilbanks, Jr., President of the Farmers & Stockmens State Bank, has been buying all the cotton brought to Perryton this fall. He is doing this as an accommodation to the farmers in order that a market may be established here.

We have heard of several men in the Spearman vicinity who are doing fine with their cotton. D. B. Kirk, ten miles southwest of Spearman, reports 60 acres that will make one-half bale to acre. E. E. Burrows of that locality, has 100 acres from which he expects to pick 40 bales.

These and many other good cotton crops are causing many of our farmers to open their eyes to the cotton proposition. We have heard of a number of farmers who say they are sure going to raise some cotton next year. Those that raised a crop this year say that they are going to double. If you are interested in cotton see some of those that have raised cotton this year. Now is the time to order your seed and sign up for acreage. The Perryton Mercantile Co. is taking orders for the long staple May Beam seed. If sufficient acreage is put out, we can get a gin here next year. All cotton now being bought here will be hauled to Canadian for ginning.

## NOURISHING CREAM SOUP

Cream soups, or bisques, are very appetizing in autumn and help out when the housewife suddenly finds her projected meal is not as substantial as she expected it to be. With an enameled ware double boiler these soups, with fresh vegetable flavoring, are easily prepared. Green peas, spinach and lettuce all make pretty green bisques. Prepared in an enameled ware double boiler their delicate coloring will not be affected. Corn and tomato are also favorite bisques.

Put the milk into the enameled ware double boiler, and a half teaspoonful of salt; let it heat until near boiling, then stir in the vegetables mashed to a smooth puree. Peas, spinach, etc., may be left-overs from the day before's dinners. If lettuce is used it should be cooked as is spinach and then rubbed through a sieve. Serve as soon as cooked.

## THE MAN YOU WORK FOR

By H. ADDINGTON BRUCE

They tell me, friend, that you are not feeling any too well, disposed toward the man you work for; that you habitually make slurring remarks regarding him, and otherwise show an attitude almost amounting to animosity.

This is very foolish on your part. For no man can do good work when sentiments of hatred, envy and the like possess him.

If you cannot conquer your dislike for your employer it will be to your best interest to find work with some one else. Consider first, however, if your attitude of hostility is justified.

What chiefly troubles you, I am told, is that you have to do hard labor for comparatively low pay, while he takes things easily and draws big profits from the business.

Is it so certain that he takes things easily? Do you actually imagine that the business which he owns and in which you are engaged as an employee runs itself?

Do the goods you help to make for him find buyers of their own accord? Do they never have to be sold at a loss? And do the raw material of which those goods are composed make their way to the factory without effort and risk on somebody's part?

In a word, has it never occurred to you that the man for whom you work may, after all, be about the most important cog in the industrial machine in which you are a constituent part?

He has weighing upon him by night as by day the problem of keeping the factory going.

Worries of a sort unknown to you, but vitally affecting your own welfare, persistently beset him. Any "let-down" by him means a "shut-down" for you. That you may work at all he must in the long run work far harder than you.

No real cause for unrest or discontent exists. Industry is thriving at peak load and payrolls are being steadily maintained. Labor and capital in America are nearly at balance.

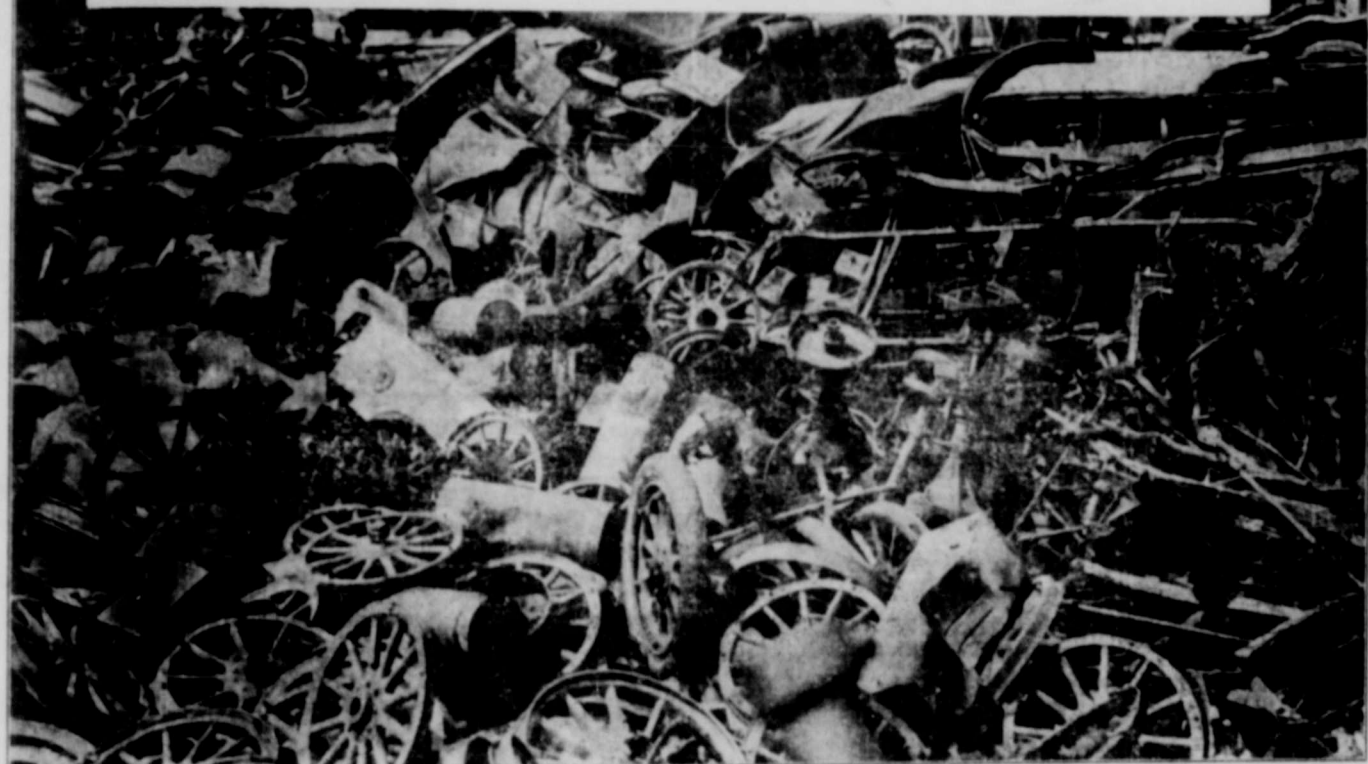

ties. Uniformity in attainment of  
skill and therefore in earnings lead  
not to joy in work but to discontent  
and unhappiness in the worker. Fixed  
standards of labor, in study, in  
modes of family life or of community  
life, are downright enemies of pro-  
gress for the body, mind and soul of  
man."

If our country should get a rest for  
a few years from lawless law-mak-  
ing and over-regulation, the ship of  
state would right up and sail along  
without much burden to the individ-  
ual from state or federal government.  
But it seems the cheaper grade of  
politicians forced on the people by  
direct primaries and direct legislation

carry. Where will this end? The  
poor dumb producer will finally re-  
volt and overthrow the system of  
privileges and taskmasters and office-  
brokers and get back to a simpler  
form of government outlined by the  
Declaration and the good old constitu-  
tion.

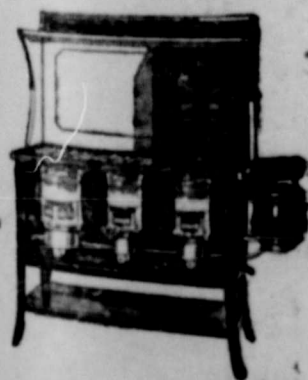
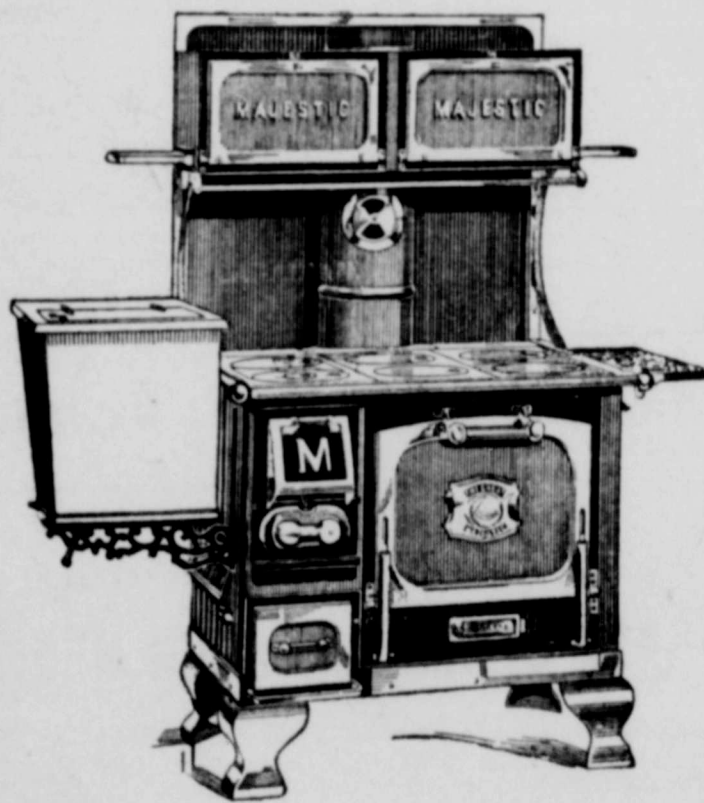

## RED CROSS ADVANCING IN HEALTH CAMPAIGN

Extends Service to New Fields  
and Brings Healing Hope to  
Remote Sections.

"The supreme opportunity for leadership" for the American Red Cross is its health service. Thus a committee made up of prominent physicians, sanitarians and public health experts, after months of exhaustive study, reported and urged that not only should the Red Cross continue its present service, but should undertake a comprehensive educational campaign along public health lines. The annual report of the American Red Cross, just issued, discloses that it has grasped this opportunity in the fields of public health nursing, instruction in home hygiene and care of the sick, nutrition work, first aid to the injured and in water life-saving.

Health service is fundamentally, historically and practically an important function of the Red Cross, and each year marks its extension into new fields and along broader lines. In the Red Cross Nursing Service there are enrolled nearly 40,000 nurses, 29,000 of whom served during the World War. The past year Red Cross nurses were assigned to duty in isolated sections of Alaska and North Carolina and to work among the fishermen of Penobscot Bay, Me.

The Public Health Nursing Service, inaugurated by the American Red Cross in 1912, which operates chiefly in rural sections untouched by other public health agencies, has 1,038 Red Cross nurses working under the direction of Chapters. This work has won so high a regard that many of the nurses are taken over by the local authorities to maintain health services for their communities. Instruction in Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick is noting a steady advance. Since 1914 certificates of proficiency have been given 304,427 women who completed the Red Cross course. In the last year 26,595 certificates were awarded and 65,901 students were under the instruction of 1,054 Red Cross nurses.

The benefits derived from meals balanced to meet each person's peculiar needs is winning widespread recognition through the work of the Red Cross Nutrition Service, particularly in the schools. During the school year 2,855 carried on regular instruction in nutrition, reached more than 150,000 children and adults. More than 2,250 volunteers assisted in this work. Throughout the country 35,283 health meetings were held under Red Cross auspices, attended by approximately 254,500 persons.

## Annual Summons to Red Cross Banner On Armistice Day

America's great humanitarian effort in behalf of stricken Japan early in September gave the answer to the question, "What is there for the Red Cross to do in time of peace?" What the American Red Cross did at once when this crushing earthquake disaster came without warning showed that it was ready on the instant with country-wide team work to carry out quickly and effectively the request of the President to lead the national effort for the relief of the many thousands of sufferers. Preparedness to take the field when relief is needed is a charter duty of the Red Cross. Without a membership enrolled in every community in the land this readiness would be impossible. That is why your dollar membership is most important.

It is imperative that the structure of the American Red Cross be made up of millions of individual units. Opening Armistice Day, November 11, and closing with Thanksgiving Day, November 29, the Roll Call this year will penetrate to the ends of the earth and to the ships sailing the seven seas. The 3,600 Red Cross Chapters in the United States will have their busy volunteers enrolling members during this period imbued with renewed enthusiasm due to the recent revival of effort when the call came from Japan.

## RED CROSS PLANS FOR COMING YEAR

Over \$2,000,000 in Fund for War  
Sufferers—National Budget  
Is \$5,543,077.

### AID TO VETERANS STANDS FIRST

Expended \$9,738,448 in Services  
to Mankind Last Year at  
Home and Abroad.

Washington.—With a budget of \$5,543,077.81 for carrying out the program of service during the current fiscal year, beginning July 1, the American Red Cross announces that this amount was \$4,195,370.41 less than was expended during the fiscal year ended last June 30. During that year expenditures reached a total of \$9,738,448.22, of which amount \$2,605,696.09 was devoted to relief of refugees in Greece who had been driven out of Asia Minor. In announcing the budget for the year, the statement from National Headquarters emphasized the fact that its extensive work at home and abroad depends almost wholly upon the nation-wide support of the organization through enrollment of membership in large numbers during the annual roll call, which will be in progress from November 11 to November 29 under the auspices of the 3,600 Chapters in the United States and throughout the world. These Chapters, it is pointed out, during the last fiscal year expended of their own funds approximately \$3,920,000 in work for the men who wore the United States uniform during the World War, so that the estimate of some \$15,000,000 expended during twelve months by the American Red Cross as a whole is considered conservative.

**Soldier Service Stands First**  
From July 1, 1917, to June 30, 1923, the American Red Cross spent nationally and through its Chapters close to \$164,000,000 in behalf of American soldiers who served in the war and their families. During last year the figure alone mounted to more than \$5,866,255, and for the current fiscal year National Headquarters has set aside under the heading, "Assistance to Disabled ex-Servicemen and Women," \$2,065,834.20. The Chapters will continue to do their part, so that it may be predicted with confidence that again more than \$5,500,000 will be disbursed in the large variety of services to the disabled men and women and their families—services for which the Government cannot provide and which reach the individual case with the sympathy and understanding only actual contact can insure. This work of the American Red Cross approaches the fifth anniversary of the Armistice, which ended the World War with only slight decrease in calls for service in the interest of the welfare and rehabilitation of those who suffered physical disability in the service of their country.

In the interest of the enlisted men serving in the Army and the Navy the budget provides \$309,020 for the current year. This is obligatory under the Red Cross charter, for the organization must act in matters of voluntary relief and as a medium of communication between the people and their Army and Navy.

**Domestic Program Extensive**  
The domestic operations of the American Red Cross comprise an accurate indicator of the continuing calls for expansion in all the established and authorized services. The budget aggregates \$4,636,449.70, as against expenditures during the last year of \$4,452,066.20. The abnormal demands in the foreign field in the last several years, however, have largely subsided, and in consequence \$906,628.11 has been set for the 1923-24 budget under foreign operations. On this amount \$394,303.91 is set aside for engagements which will close the work for the refugees in Greece, for whose amelioration \$2,605,696.09 was expended up to June 30, when the American Red Cross withdrew, and the work was taken over under the control of the Greek government. For liquidation and completion of general relief in Europe the budget provides \$100,000, and for American Junior Red Cross projects, foreign and insular, and assistance to Chapters listed under foreign operations.

**Ready for Emergency Calls**  
The readiness of the American Red Cross to answer immediately with effective service in cases of emergency is an outstanding feature of its program that is universally recognized. During last year \$525,000 was spent for relief in 110 disasters, which was \$207,500 in excess of budget provisions. This year \$400,000 has been appropriated for this service. Since 1881 the Red Cross has administered more than \$20,000,000 in relief work following disasters.

Other budget items in the schedule for domestic operations include \$1,282,524.20 for service and assistance to the 3,600 Chapters and their Branches; \$80,000 for assistance to other organizations, particularly stressing child health activities; \$194,600 for Junior Red Cross projects and service; \$10,824.20 for assistance to Nurses' Training Schools, and for other activities \$111,456.80. For supervision of service activities and general management of the entire American Red Cross less than \$225,000 is allotted.

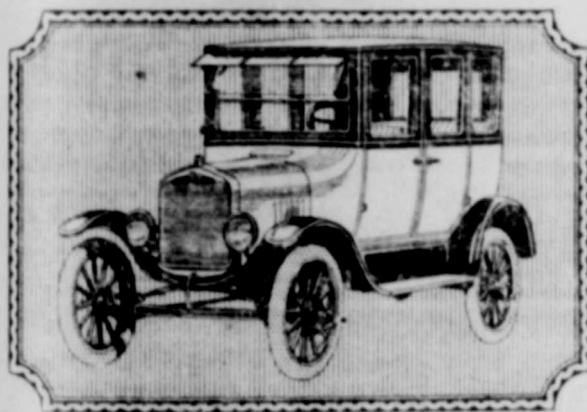

### INSULATORS AS TARGETS

Now that the hunting season is at  
hand it is observed that glass and  
porcelain insulators on transmission  
and telephone lines are used by some  
for practice targets. This is an ex-  
tremely dangerous and expensive  
thing to do.

Insulators are vital in preventing  
short circuiting of electric current.  
If one is broken, a slight moisture  
is sufficient to cause electricity at  
high voltage to travel downward and  
burn a wooden pole, or put an entire  
transmission line out of service.  
When this happens, homes and fac-  
tories and stores being served per-  
haps hundreds of miles away must  
suffer. It often takes days for the  
linemen to locate the trouble and re-  
place the broken insulators. This  
work is frequently done in the most  
severe weather and under working  
conditions of the greatest danger to  
human life. All the electric main-  
tenance man knows is that the line  
is not working well and he must  
usually travel many miles to locate  
the damage.

### "HELLO"

By degrees, usage of the familiar

phone users are appreciating the fact  
that an effective "telephone person-  
ality" with its influence for better  
service, is not only a business but a  
social asset.

Alexander Graham Bell, according  
to Thomas A. Watson, who assisted  
him, used the word "Ahoy" in mak-  
ing his experiments but "Hello"  
superseded it when the telephone got  
into practical use. The probable  
origin of the word "Hello" was in-  
terestingly described as follows in a  
recent issue of the "Telephone En-  
gineer."

"Long, long ago wolves were num-

pecially England. Wolf hunting was

to kill wolves was regarded as the  
sacred duty of all Englishmen.  
French was the language of the court  
at that time, so the burly old English

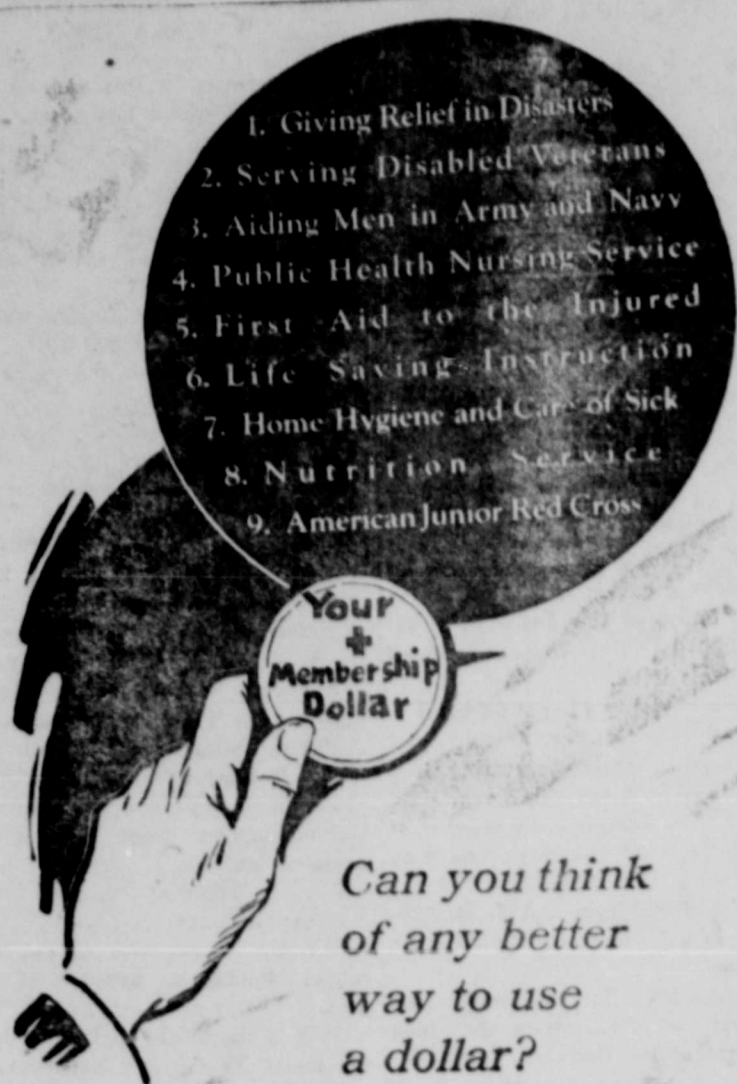

### RED CROSS MET TEST IN JAPAN FUND DRIVE

Spirit of Service Demonstrated in Readiness for Nationwide Activity.

When President Coolidge by proclamation designated the American Red Cross as the medium through which contributions for relief of the Japanese earthquake sufferers should flow, the President's desire came as an order to the Red Cross. Immediately the entire machinery of the organization was put in motion and within 24 hours the fund campaign was moving with vigor in every part of the country.

This emergency test demonstrated the peacetime readiness of the Red Cross to cope with stupendous tasks in behalf of humanity. Within a month it had collected upwards of \$10,250,000 in contributions, landed ten cargoes of supplies at Japanese ports and was keeping pace with relief requirements—all without a single dollar of the fund being spent for administration.

President Coolidge, in expressing his thanks to the people, said: "When the news of the tragedy in Japan first reached us, the American Red Cross, pursuant to a proclamation, asked the country for \$5,000,000 to meet the great emergency. The answer to this appeal was prompt and generous; in less than two weeks a sum far in excess of the original goal was given."

The work of the Red Cross for Japan is expected to influence a very large enrollment of new recruits during the Roll Call, which starts Armistice Day.

### Red Cross First Aid Standards Adopted In Great Industries

First aid in an emergency which assures the injured competent attention until the doctor arrives is making marked headway through the work of the Chapters of the American Red Cross. In populous centers 314 chapters conduct first aid classes and last year awarded 9,500 certificates to students. Eight big telephone companies have enlisted their workers in first aid classes, police and fire departments in large cities are making the course compulsory in their training schools, and through colleges and high schools large groups of students receive instruction. The Red Cross also gives this course through Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Y. M. C. A. and similar organizations, and its standard methods have been adopted by railroads, electric and gas companies, mines and in the metal industries. The aim of this Red Cross service is to cut down radically the average of 60,000 accidental deaths per year in the United States.

### Junior Red Cross Spreads Good Will Throughout World

Nearly 5,000,000 pupils in the schools of America are following the standard of unselfish service as members of the American Junior Red Cross, the annual report of the American Red Cross discloses. This valiant host is represented in 125,972 school rooms of 24,289 schools throughout the United States. With a service program that is local, national and international in scope, the American Junior Red Cross is working unflinchingly for health and happiness and in the promotion of activities among boys and girls wherever there is opportunity for usefulness.

Increased activity on the part of the schools enrolled and deeper recognition by school authorities of the educational values of Junior Red Cross have been significant features of the last year. Carrying on educational and relief work in France, Poland, Austria, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Albania, Bulgaria and Rumania, the American Juniors have influenced the forming of Junior departments in the Red Cross organizations of these countries. American boys and girls wearing the "I Serve" button of the Juniors are proving apt messengers of the spirit of good will and mutual understanding through correspondence with pupils in schools scattered throughout the world. At the close of the school year in June 2,009 schools were engaged in correspondence with a like number of schools in Europe; 284 schools in our insular possessions and Alaska territory carried on an exchange of letters with schools in the United States and South Africa. In fact, nearly 2,700 schools with probably 100,000 pupils were busy in this fine act of cheerful communication while 8,347 articles passed through National Headquarters of the Red Cross in exchanges between the interested pupils here and overseas. An incident of the year's advance was the beginning of activity which will eventually install Junior Red Cross in the Indian schools of the United States.

From every section of the country reports of the tour of the unit of crippled children with their chorus which came from the Bakule school in Prague, Czechoslovakia, to show gratitude to the American Juniors for their assistance declare that nothing since the World War has done so much to awaken the Red Cross spirit in the communities visited by the unit.

The work of the American Juniors in foreign fields is emphasized in the advancement of playgrounds, scholarships in farm, trade and other schools, community and school garden work, and donations of cash and equipment to children's organizations. In these projects \$112,669.17 was spent during the last year in ten European countries, in China and in the Virginia Islands.

"It is inconceivable that the Red Cross could have come thus far only to retreat; that it could have succeeded up to the present time only to fail." —President Coolidge.

Over \$1,000 was expended by each of the 3,600 American Red Cross Chapters in the past year in behalf of disabled ex-service men. The actual total spent was \$3,540,000.
