## Wyatt Outstanding In All-Star Game

Jimmy Wyatt of New Home was named the Most Valuable Player on defense in the Six-Man All-Star football game between top players from the East and West portions of the state Saturday night in Stephenville.

Wyatt recovered four fumbles in the game — including one for a touchdown — as he led his West teammates to a 37-20 win in the annual contest.

The East led after the first period, but the West went ahead 10-8 when Wyatt recovered a fumble in the end zone shortly before halftime. After the East scored to take the lead again in the third, Wyatt grabbed a fumble at the East 25 to set up another West score, making it 24-14 going into the last quarter.

The West team scored twice more in the last period to give them the sixth straight win over the East and lead the series 7-3.

### \$1000 Reward ...

## Church Windows Broken At Wilson

Damage to five windows at St. John Lutheran Church in Wilson was estimated at a total of \$300 this week after it was discovered that someone had broken the windows, apparently with pieces of rock. The criminal mischief was done between last Thursday and Saturday. Crime Line is offering a \$200 reward in the case.

Crime Line, 998-5145, also is continuing a \$1000 reward offered in the murder of Elida

Moreno Valdez, whose body was found July 8 beside U.S. 87 south of Tahoka. Officers this week reported no new developments in the case and said they still were awaiting some laboratory test results.

Callers to Crime Line do not have to identify themselves; they are assigned a number which is used to pay any reward which may result.

Two persons who pleaded guilty of felony charges before 106th District Judge George Hansard were sentenced last week. Pedro Rodriguez, 20, of Tahoka, was given a 5-year probated prison sentence for theft of a .22 rifle from a pickup in April, pleading guilty of burglary of a motor vehicle. Gilbert P. Garcia, 34, of Lamesa, was sentenced to four years in prison on a charge of felon in possession of a firearm.

Tahoka police received a report from a local resident that early Monday morning she was awakened by an intruder who had climbed through a window and was hiding in her closet. The subject ran from the premises after the woman's husband got up to see what was going on. Police report that this same man has been identified in similar incidents and charges are pending.

Police served several warrants during the past week including two for revocation of probation, two traffic warrants and two warrants were served for Lubbock County. Police arrested one person for DWI during the past week.

In county jail during the last week were three persons for DWI and one each for burglary of a vehicle, felon in possession of a firearm, aggravated assault on a peace officer, theft by check, public intoxication, failure to identify as a witness and one for no drivers license and no liability insurance.

## State Sales Tax Rebate Listed

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks recently totaling \$53.6 million in sales tax rebates to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down 6-5 percent compared to payments made in the same period last year.

July checks represent taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by June 20.

O'Donnell received \$633.66 net payment this period compared to \$.00 the same period last year; \$5,984.83 has been received in 1987 compared to \$6,978.48 received by the same date last year.

Tahoka received \$3,466.01 this period compared to \$3,602.76 for the same period last year; \$32,120.64 has been received to date compared to \$33,822.89 for the same period last year.

Wilson has received \$3,310.93 for the year compared to \$2,449.31 for the same period last year.

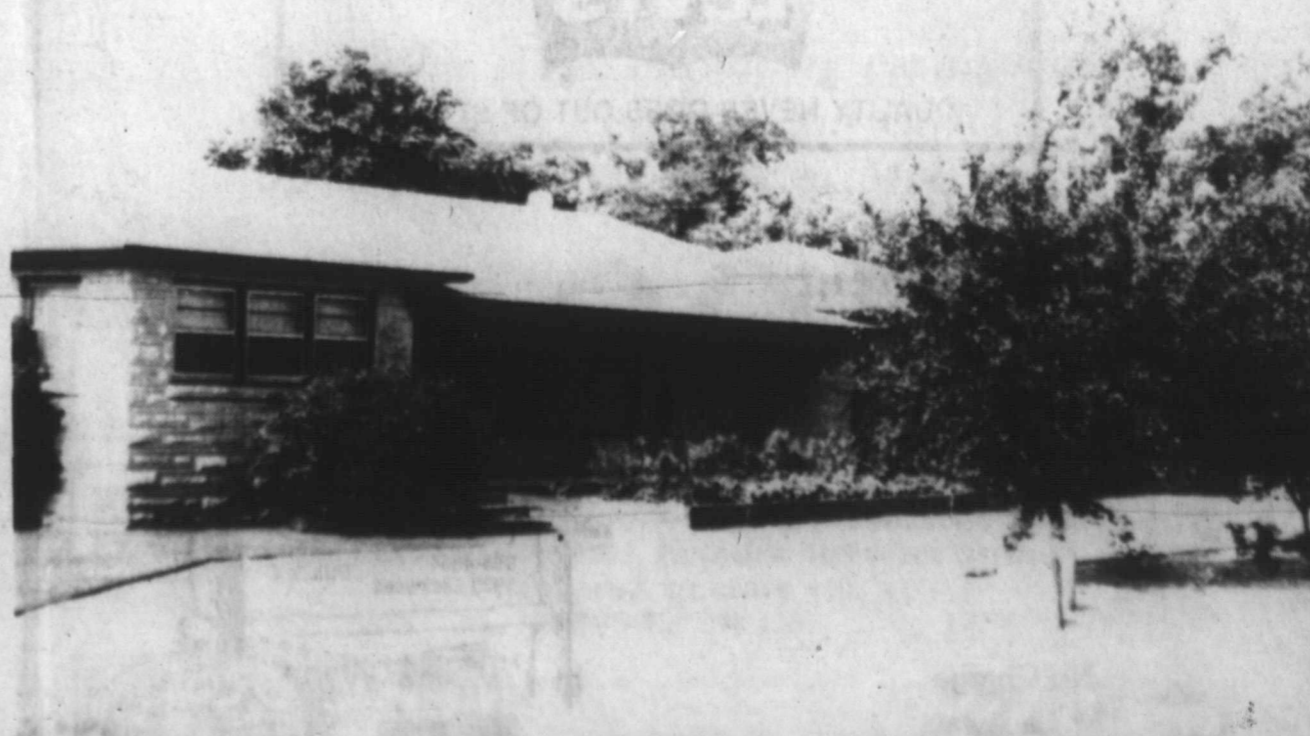
A place called the Dixie House in Dallas cooks corn on the cob in the usual way and then fries it in a batter, like chicken fried steak. Tastes good, too.

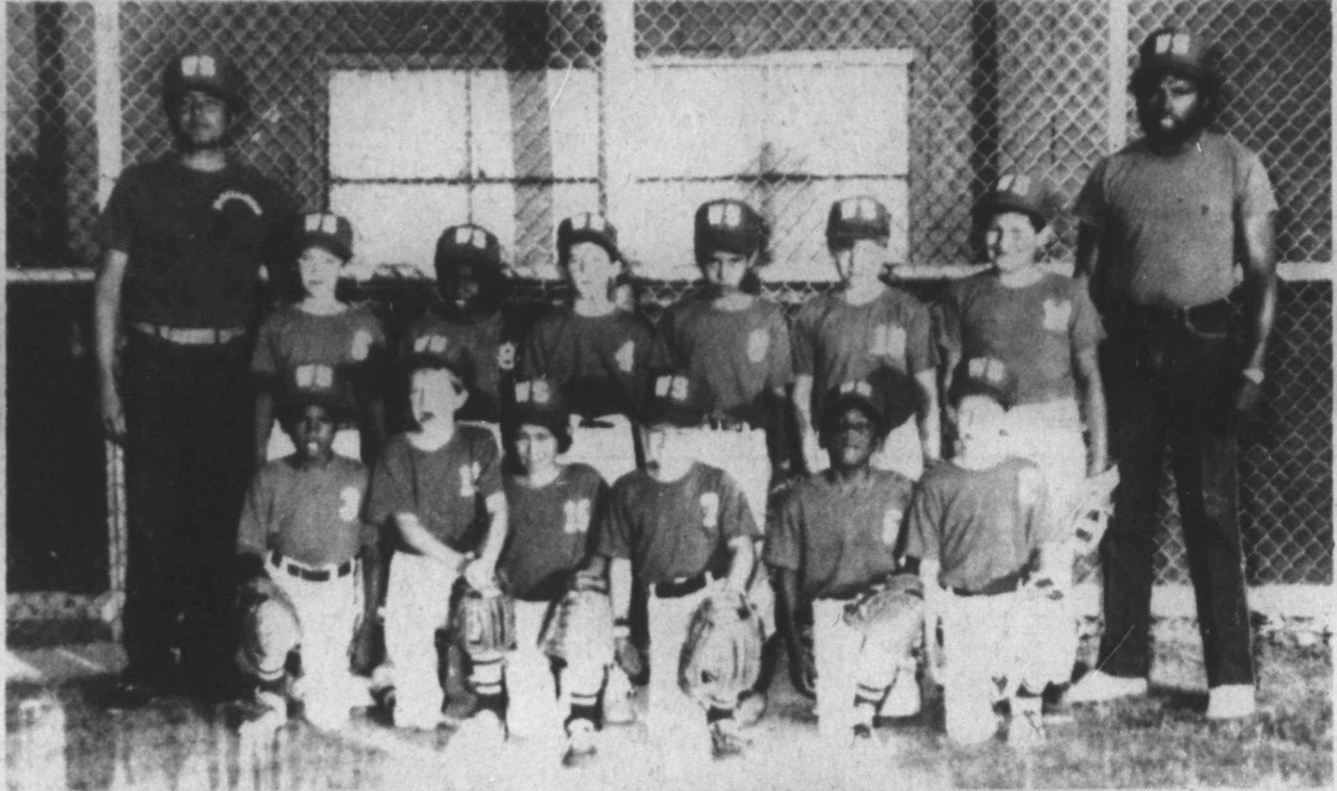

You've all heard the expression "The sky is falling" at one point or another and, in fact, it really is falling in Antarctica according to NASA scientists who claim that the ozone shield--a sparse layer of deep-blue gas cast into the stratosphere, the upper region of the atmosphere--has sprung a leak. This mysterious hole, discovered about two years ago, is growing and scientists say the Antarctic loses half of its ozone every September and an equally sharp decline above Texas would make sunbathing a death-defying act. "Ozone is the only thing protecting Earth from the ultraviolet rays of the sun and without it, Earth dwellers stand about as much chance of survival as lobsters at a clambake", says Brian Toon, a scientist at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and added "we'd all have to go back to living under the water."

According to the magazine Omni, NASA plans to send a team of pilots into the ozone hole in late summer and early fall going up on 12 flights over a two-month period to take samples of the hole to help experts on the ground determine how much ozone has vanished and what chemical process is

involved. It seems that scientists believe that tiny amounts of chloroflourocarbons, or CFC's have floated to the ozone layer and were then exposed to ultraviolet rays which zapped them into their components of carbon, flourine and chlorine and was chewing through ozone the way a hungry dog goes through hamburger. CFC's are chemicals now used in aerosol sprays, foam insulation, and in the manufacture of microchips, air conditioners, and fast-food containers.

Back in the early 1970's scientists and environmental groups got into the act and demanded an immediate ban on the use of CFC's in spray cans and word of the ozone layer's precarious state trickled down to the general public through people like country music songwriter Sam Adams with lyrics of his 1974 tune "Aerosols" saying "Oh, gee, oh gee, let's keep the O3 for it shields the ultraviolet rays from our skin". If you have to spray your hair, leave this Earth, and go somewhere, cause it's known the ozone layer's getting thin."

So in 1978 the EPA and the FDA banned CFC's for use in aerosol sprays. Since then public pressure has all but

ceased, but the ban was only in the United States, not in other countries like Canada, Sweden, Japan and highly industrialized nations of Europe.

So NASA's findings in the fall will help determine the future, according to Robert Watson, acting program director of NASA's atmospheric research program and the administrator behind the Antarctic experiment. Watson claimed that "if we find that ozone is decreasing in Antarctica and that it is an indication to global ozone depletion, then we will have to find a way to get rid of CFCs for all but the most essential applications, such as refrigeration."

"The Antarctic mission is special," says senior pilot Ronald Williams, who regularly spends six to eight hours flying miles above the earth and is "more dangerous than anything any of us ever flew over Vietnam." Williams was one of the pilots that advised NASA not to waste money on a search-and-rescue mission if a pilot had to pull the ejector seat trigger if the plane chokes. Because there is no room in the ejector seat for cold-weather gear, and after a several-minute descent through the coldest spot in the atmosphere, he'd greet the antarctic sea or ice with nothing but a suit of nylon, rubber, and mesh--about as useful as a bikini against the polar winds and cold.

The nation's preachers may be the cause of all this trouble, encouraging people to pollute the atmosphere. Recently I heard one of those TV preachers ask a huge crowd to bow their heads, and just as I moved on to another channel, I heard him say "Let us spray..."

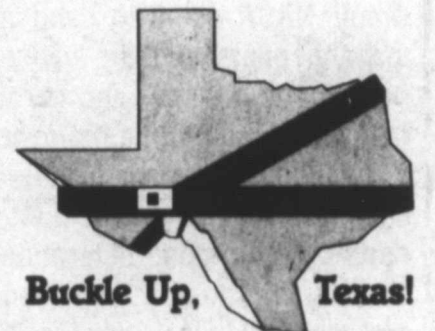

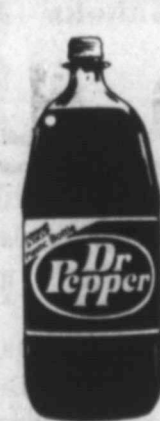

The church was nearly filled to capacity as the crowd enjoyed the remembrances of two pastors who grew up in the Draw community and attended the small Methodist Church.

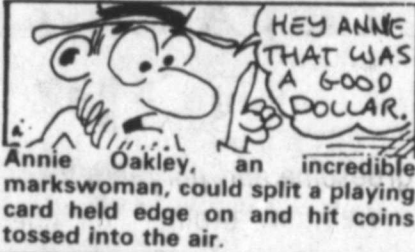

## Ex-Farmer Retraining Program Is Available

A program of retraining farmers who have been forced out of farming because of economic hardship is now available to former Lynn County farmers through the South Plains Community Action Assn. in Levelland.

Interested persons should contact James Martin, Farmer Assistant Program coordinator, at 894-6104.

"We feel this is a program that's going to be very beneficial to some folks," said Martin. "Our goal is to retrain the

(former) farmer... and get them started in another occupation."

The farmer assistance program, part of the Job Training Partnership Act which receives federal and state funds, became fully operational on July 1 after a 1986 pilot program was evaluated.

Martin said the program - with offices in Levelland, Plainview and Crosbyton - has \$100,000 for a three month period after which another assessment will determine whether more funding is needed.

To qualify, Martin said, a farmer must provide proof that the producer no longer will be in the farming business. The document may be from a bankruptcy proceeding, foreclosure, or a bank stating that credit no longer will be extended, Martin explained. Either spouse from the defunct farm may qualify under the program, Martin pointed out, and there is no limit on age or income level. Anyone who had to quit farming since Jan. 1, 1985, may apply.

Once the criteria are met, Martin said, the program can provide life coping skills, employment skills assessment, interest assessment, career counseling and classroom training. Services also include on-the-job training, job referral, job search assistance, job development and job placement.

"About 50 percent of the

applicants in the pilot program last year chose to go through on-the-job training," said Martin, himself a farmer from Wellman in Terry County. "We try to counsel them and place them in a business that fits them and the company."

Martin said a benefit for the training company is that half of the applicant's salary for six months can be paid with the program funds.

If the person instead chooses to attend a vocational or trade school in the region or elsewhere in Texas, Martin added, program funds will pay for books, fees and tuition. In some cases, if a person had attended but not completed college, the program may assist that person in completion he said.

Martin said during last year's pilot program, 82 farmers or farm wives were assisted. Forty of those opted for classroom training and 41 chose on the job training.

We had a 90 percent employment rate and a \$6.35 average placement wage," said Martin.

Martin said some who have farmed all their lives or who were nearing retirement age when the farm failed do not believe that they are capable of other occupations.

"It is a devastating feeling for these people, and depression can set in when they feel down on their luck and think there's no hope," Martin said. "They have more experience than they realize. All we need to do is get with them to show them. I feel that our association gives them hope."

**Dear John:**

John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes

### Fuchsia Fervor

**Dear John:** If I got a vote, fuchsias would take first place in a flower beauty pageant. How can I keep them blooming all summer long?

**Dear Fuchsia Fancier:** Fuchsias are indeed top contenders among the best-loved, most beautiful of summer flowering plants. Like beauty queens, however, fuchsias need a basic care regimen to look like winners all season long.

Shade is particularly important for a fuchsia's delicate petals. The petals can tolerate full sun through May, but after that they will burn in light that is not filtered.

Water is also important. Fuchsias need moist soil or leaves will yellow and wither. The plants also need regular feedings with a standard houseplant fertilizer. They should have their seed berries removed and branches trimmed occasionally throughout the summer.

Because of their preference for a spot that's shady, moist and cool, fuchsias make excellent porch plants. With a little pampering, fuchsias will produce beautiful flowers in great number and add a nice touch of beauty to your home.

**Dear John:** I heard that even the most well-tended garden can

have yucky bugs, like aphids. As a neatness freak, I shudder at the thought. How can I tell if my garden has aphids and what can I do to make them go away?

**Dear Mrs. Clean:** Aphids or "plant lice" are an inevitable part of gardening, so don't be embarrassed if your garden has them. Look for aphids at the most tender part of a plant—the new growth at the tip or the underside of young leaves—where they suck strength from plants and promote disease.

A weekly shower is enough to keep aphid damage at a minimum. The insects will be knocked off the plants each time you spray. If a good bath each week isn't doing the job, you can use a rotenone-pyrethrum spray. Ask a county extension agent for advice on which chemical control to use.

**Dear John:** It rains a lot where I live. Can I mow the lawn when it's wet?

**Dear Slick Sam:** Remember, patience is a virtue. Wait until your lawn is dry before mowing. Mowing wet grass can compact moist soil and spread fungus disease. You'll also reduce the risk of slipping on wet grass if you wait for the sun to shine before mowing.

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## NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this Notice: July 9, 1987.

- Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.
- The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license. The initial license was issued on December 18, 1974, and was renewed in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986.
- The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.
- The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.
- The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence, west-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.
- The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumulonimbus clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air at cloud base.
- Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather & Climate Section of the Commission.
- A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. More information on calling a hearing can be obtained through the Legal Division of the Commission.


