Biplane "Angeleno" Soars Into Tenth Night Aloft

Fliers Complete 230 Hours In Air But Remain Aloft

Some Cruises More Than 18,000 Miles In Sustained Flight; Noise Heard In Motor On Thursday

Fliers Are Tired

Endell and Reinhart Drop Note Asking That Plane Be Kept Intact; They Want Rest, Not Ovation

(By Associated Press) LUBBOCK, July 11.—Having cruised their biplane "Angeleno" approximately 18,000 miles, or almost the distance around the earth, during nearly 10 full days of sustained flight, pilots L. W. Endell and R. B. Reinhart soared into their tenth night aloft with the indication that their thoughts were turned toward a landing. But how many hours away from the earth was, remained undetermined.

The 230th hour of sustained flying was passed at 9:29:30 p. m. The plane was expected to be up about 100 miles more, but want you all to get down safely so please don't rush out and mob us when we land.

Florida Banks Go To Wall Thursday

Five Institutions Fail And Are Placed In Hands Of Liquidators; President and Officials Arrested

(By Associated Press) MIAMI, Fla., July 11.—Five Florida banks, two at Deland and three at Miami, were placed in the hands of the liquidators today and Thursday. President and directors of the central Florida banks which failed May 15, were arrested in connection with the failure of these institutions.

First National Bank and the Commercial Bank and Trust Company at Deland, only two banks in the state, and the Colonial Bank at Miami, were closed.

Information filed against the banks alleged that they looted \$50,000 of the Barton bank's funds without the consent of the board, and that they altered the minutes of the board to make it appear that the bank was liquidated.

Motive In Double Killing Unknown

HOUSTON, July 11.—(AP)—An undetermined motive early today led to the arrest of a man accused of killing a woman and her husband.

The bodies were found side by side in a barn on the Smith farm. Nearly 100 neighbors had engaged in a search for Elmore, 11, and Virgil, 18, sons of the couple, had fled to their grandfather's nearby home, screaming that "father's running after mother with a gun."

In one of Smith's hands was the hair of his dead wife and the other held a pistol from which four shells had been discharged.

End In Sight For Third Session Of State Legislature

Senate Works Speedily To Pass Last Money Measure As House Faces Only Claim And Refund Bills

Totals Lopped Off

Adjournment Now Depends On Ability Of Free Conference Committee To Iron Out Differences

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, July 11.—The end of the third special legislative session, convened at the demand of Governor Moody to reduce appropriations which he declared were in excess of the State's expected revenue, was in sight tonight.

Working speedily, the senate late today passed its last money measure and in the house only the claims bill and a measure calling for refunds on illegally assessed seat taxes remained to be disposed of. On the ability of free conference committee to iron out differences in the educational and departmental bills hinged final adjournment of the session.

Agree on Bills. During the day conference committees agreed on the \$5,000,000 Rural Aid bill, representing a deduction by \$500,000 of that blue pending by the governor, and the eleemosynary measure, creating a slash of \$10,000 under the bill which met with executive disapproval.

Nine Boys Meet Death In Fire Brigade Display

(By Associated Press) LONDON, July 11.—Nine boys were burned to death tonight in the collapse of a house during a fire brigade display at Gillingham Park, Kent. The boys were spectators of the fire drill about the house, a structure just up for the display.

The boys were within the building where they represented the occupants to be rescued by firemen from an imaginary fire. It is not known how the structure caught fire, but spectators saw it suddenly blaze and fall in flames on the youths before they could be rescued.

Eight-Year Hunt For Fugitive Is Brought To Close

W. M. Donahoo, Sought By Federal Officers Since 1921 On Fraud Charges, Is Arrested At Post

A wary search of eight long years was ended yesterday at Post in the arrest of W. M. Donahoo by United States Deputy Marshal Oscar Brothers of this city.

Donahoo had been a fugitive from justice since December 22, 1921, when he is alleged to have used the United States mails to defraud the Pipe Grain Company of Oklahoma City and the Anchor Grain Company of Wichita, Kansas, of \$1,300.

In jail here he was brought to the Lubbock county jail yesterday afternoon by Deputy Marshal Brothers and will be held here until decision can be made on his extradition. Mr. Brothers said he has allowed Donahoo until today to decide whether he will fight his extradition to Oklahoma or not. Should he decide to waive extradition papers, he will likely be returned within a few days, otherwise he will be kept here until Governor Moody acts on his plea.

Donahoo's trail has been traced by federal authorities practically all over the nation and clear to South America where he spent some time. He then returned to California where he remained until fifteen days ago when officers again became hot on his trail and he fled to Texas.

His apprehension yesterday came through notification of Deputy Brothers of his presence in Post.

President Hoover Asks Adequate Tariff Protection

Senate Republican Leaders Confer Concerning Proposed Rate Revisions; President Gives Views

Auto Men Testify

Car Manufacturers Willing For Reduction Of Present Duty On Passenger Cars; Ford Asks Free Trade

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 11.—Tariff was discussed by President Hoover today with senate republican leaders who subsequently asserted that "adequate protection" should be the measure applied to rate revisions.

This development shared interest with later expression before a senate finance subcommittee by leading automobile manufacturers of willingness for a reduction to 10 per cent of the existing 25 per cent duty on passenger cars, providing the present countervailing or retaliatory tariff allowance provision is retained. A Ford company representative said Edsel Ford was for free trade in all his products—cars, truck and tractors.

Breakfast With Hoover. Senators Watson of Indiana and Reed of Pennsylvania, ranking republicans of the finance committee were breakfast guests of the president. The White House described the tariff discussion as general, and Mr. Hoover's views on the house bill remained undisclosed.

The Indiana senator asserted after the conference that the yardstick of "adequate protection" was the rule to be used in adjusting rates. No definition of "adequate protection" was made, but Watson said he believed Mr. Hoover was against

New Grip On Life Offered To Leahy

Convicted Slayer, Facing Death Penalty, Is Given Stay Of Execution And Granted Sanity Hearing

(By Associated Press) GEORGETOWN, July 11.—Harry J. Leahy, under a death penalty for the slaying of Dr. J. A. Ramsey, Mathis, physician, regained a new grip on life today Judge Harry Dorn in district court here ordered a stay of execution and granted Leahy a sanity trial for July 22. The condemned man was to have died early tomorrow.

The judge's edict was based on an affidavit of Miss Amanda Davidson of Taylor, which said "That she has good reason to believe and does believe that since the conviction of Leahy that he has become insane and that he is now insane."

Order Special Verdict. The judge also ordered a special verdict of 100 from which a jury will be selected to hear the sanity case.

Leahy was given the death penalty here in February, 1928, after he had appealed the verdict of a jury—a 50-year penitentiary sentence—in his first trial at Georgetown. He was arrested shortly after the body of the physician was found in a shallow grave in the chapparel near his home.

Settlement Seen As Possibility In Strike Riot

Government And Civic Negotiators Are Optimistic Following Conferences On Ten-Day Tie Up

(By Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, July 11.—Optimism over the outlook for government and civic negotiations moved from conference to conference today in the hope of effecting a settlement of the 10-day street car strike.

They renewed their efforts for an early compromise between the union and the company after United States Marshal Victor Loeis announced he would advise the New Orleans Public Service, Inc., to attempt to resume car service either Saturday or Sunday. Some negotiators fear further violence if the cars are started before some agreement is reached.

Will Guard Cars.

The marshal said he would guard the cars with federal deputies, with the aid of the police, and though he did not believe there would be any attacks on the cars, he would be prepared to protect the company's property as directed by the federal injunction.

Five offenders against the injunction were brought before Judge Wayne G. Borah of United States district court, who issued the injunction.

Purchase Of Land Is Authorized By City Commission

Section Twenty-Eight Of B.M. Jones Estate Bought For Consideration Of \$62.50 Per Acre

Bonds Are Voted

Immediate Development Of Modern Landing Field Is Expected; Airport Committee Makes Report

FOLLOWING a report by the committee, the city commission at its meeting held yesterday afternoon unanimously accepted the report and authorized the purchase of section 28, block A, of the B. M. Jones estate for a consideration of \$62.50 per acre or a total cost for the 640 acres of \$40,000. This land will be used for a site for a modern municipal airport, bonds for which already have been voted.

These bonds were provided in a recent airport bond issue and will be accepted by the owners of the property at par value bearing 5 per cent interest.

Site Near Town

The committee, consisting of George E. Benson, T. B. Duggan and Dr. E. F. George, presented several angles which the commission considered in its decision. The main points considered were: the distance from town, proximity to an established highway and accessibility to the necessary utilities. This site was selected from a group of several proposals as being the most satisfactory offered.

It is understood that immediate development will be started and definite plans announced at an early date.

Poincare States French Debt Good

Premier Tells Views On Value Of Indebtedness Before Debate Starts On Ratification Thursday

(By Associated Press) PARIS, July 11.—The French debt to the United States has the same value as a French treasury bond, Premier Poincare told the chamber of deputies today in opening debate on ratification of the war debt settlements.

The premier declared categorically that there was no other issue than simple ratification.

Plunges Into Problem. In his analysis the premier, plunging into the problem which will have a vast effect on the fate of his government, gave a synopsis of the events that led up to the issuance of liberty bonds which enabled the United States to lend immense sums to allied powers.

Louis Marin leader of the conservative group, demanded of the premier why no effort had been made to distribute the burden of the war equally among all the allies and associates.

To this Poincare replied that as far as France is concerned, he now was occupied with money borrowed

Old Feud Between China And Russia Breaks Out Anew

Control Of The Manchurian Unit Of Trans-Siberian Railway System As Steps Taken Against Russia

TOKYO, July 11. (AP)—The long standing feud between northeastern China and Soviet Russia over control of the Manchurian unit of the Trans-Siberian railway system has broken forth anew with what is regarded here as a definite Chinese move against the Russians.

Rango News Agency dispatches from Harbin, Manchuria, said General Chang Ching Hui, governor of the Harbin district, yesterday arrested 174 Soviet officials and employees of the Chinese eastern railway. Thirty-seven of the prisoners were started under guard for the Siberian border for deportation.

Coup Interrupted
The dispatches interpreted the coup as having made a virtually unbridgeable breach between China and the Soviet. Chinese directors were appointed to replace the arrested Russians. The Chinese seizing every opening to undermine the Russian influence.

Among those arrested were the Russian vice-director of railways and the director of the trading commission. All Russian banking and trading operations in Harbin were closed. Managing director of the Chinese Eastern Railway and other highest officials among the Russians still were free but threatened with arrest.

Telephones Seized
The coup began Wednesday morning at 7 a. m. Chinese police seizing the telephone and telegraph systems of the Chinese Eastern Railway and ordering all branches of "Dormon," or the Union of Russian Railway employees, abolished. The Russians thereupon declared a general strike and the Chinese countered with wholesale arrests in Harbin and other stations on the road.

Chinese police headquarters issued a communique in which it was stated the raid May 27, on the Russian consulate general at Harbin had uncovered evidence that Russian agents and other Soviet agencies in northern Manchuria were spreading concerted communist propaganda aimed at disruption of Chinese unity.

Estimates Asked
By Budget Bureau
WASHINGTON, July 11. (AP)—Preparation of the 1931 budget estimates asked for by the budget bureau from various departments this month began today at the treasury when preliminary figures prepared by the customs and coast guard services were sent to Acting Secretary Hills.

Estimates for the prohibition bureau also have been submitted and are understood to be the same as contained in the 1930 budget and deficiency appropriation bill which totaled \$15,325,000. The coast guard appropriation for 1930 amounted to \$2,676,000 and the customs appropriations was \$43,180,500.

The figures submitted as preliminary estimates were understood to be slightly higher for the coast guard and customs for 1931 and the treasury was scrutinizing them with a view to following President Hoover's request that all appropriations for 1931 be kept within the amounts appropriated for 1930 and where possible be decreased so that more funds would be available for expansion in other lines of activity.

PEACE RESTORED
Mexican Aviator Commended For Bravery In Fight

MEXICO CITY, July 11. (AP)—Though reports from most military zones where rebels had been operating for the last three years indicate peace has been restored, a telegram to the war department in the commander at Colima, Colima, Colima, Commander Col. Robert Fierro, aviator, for his daring in the battle with insurgents at Borbollon, near there, July 5. The telegram said the rebel positions would have been virtually impossible had it not been for Fierro and his squadron. Fierro personally led the aerial attack, almost touching the tree tops as he strafed the insurgents. No mention was made in the telegram of casualties.

Tourist Rules At Laredo Unchanged

LAREDO, July 11. (AP)—A continuation of regulations regarding tourists will remain unchanged from the present method after July 25, Felipe Canales, assistant secretary of interior at Mexico City, telegraphed the Laredo chamber of commerce today. His order cancelled a new regulation that was to have become effective on that date stopping tourists' facilities by chambers of commerce. Both Mexican and American business men along the border were jubilant over the notification.

REBELS SURRENDER

Various Bands Give Up To Federals In Mexico

MEXICO CITY, July 11. (AP)—Reports to the war department from the military commander of the state of Jalisco today said rebel bands in various parts of the state totaling 1,000, had surrendered to the federals in the past few days.

Dispatches to Mexico City newspapers from Guadalajara said 150 rebels had attacked the town of Cocula, Jalisco, and had been repulsed by the police and volunteers, leaving several dead and prisoners.

Suicide Attempt Halted By Police

172 Tanks Of Oxygen Are Used To Revive Man Who Tried To Kill Self By Gas Inhalation

NEW YORK, July 11. (AP)—After a 37-hour battle by a police rescue squad in which 172 tanks of oxygen costing \$115.20 were used, a man who tried to die by gas inhalation was on the road to recovery today. When Paul Brignetti, 46-year-old Italian world war veteran, was found Tuesday morning in a gas filled room at Coney Island he was unconscious and the ambulance surgeon at first believed he was dead. The surgeon asked several policemen to get in the ambulance and artificial respiration was employed on the way to the hospital.

Regain Consciousness
Three rescue squads of eight men each took up the fight with an inhalator and yesterday afternoon the patient regained consciousness. He was unable to speak but physicians whispered to him that a battle was being waged to save his life and asked him to help. From then on his recovery was rapid and last night he fell into a natural sleep. Four tanks of oxygen were used every hour, each containing 120 cubic feet and costing \$1.60. Members of the rescue crew lost two to six pounds in weight during their ordeal. Police said that Brignetti had been worried because a doctor told him he was seriously ill. Physicians said that unless pneumonia should develop he would recover.

Cashier Is Shot By Bank Bandits

KENDRICK, Okla., July 11. (AP)—E. L. Blakely, assistant cashier of the Bank of Kendrick, was shot in the leg today by one of two bandits who robbed the bank of between \$500 and \$600.

A posse was close on the heels of the robbers, one of whom was believed to have been wounded in the fight.

Sulphur Property Hearing Continues

Testimony Not Completed In Attempt To Raise Values Of Properties For Taxing Purposes

WHARTON, July 11. (P)—Taking of testimony in the hearing here on the valuation of sulphur properties in Wharton county continued today.

A citizens committee is attempting to raise the values placed on the properties by owners for taxing purposes.

Affidavit Read
An affidavit by Dr. W. O. Hutchins, Madison, Wis., one of the independent engineers selected to estimate the percentage of recoverable commercial sulphur in Boling Dom of Wharton and Fort Bend counties, was read into the records.

Dr. Hutchins placed his estimates at 45,769,529 long tons in Wharton county and 424,238 long tons in Fort Bend county.

Hutchins On Stand
After the introduction of Dr. Hutchins' affidavit the records of the Pierce estate were called for by J. F. Hutchins, manager, was

placed on the stand and questioned by F. F. Montgomery's attorney for the Texas Gulf Sulphur company, relative to land values. Hutchins testified the estate produced a net earning of \$144,000 in 1927.

The introduction of this testimony was looked upon as an effort by the Sulphur company, whose valuation the citizens committee wants changed from \$4,000,000 to \$120,000,000, to show that tax values are discriminatory in Wharton county and giving grounds for carry the case to higher courts should the commissioners' court rule against the company in the present hearing.

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Production Shown In Floyd Poultry

County Club Women Prove Good Pay Plan; Accurate Records Of Production Of Flocks Are Kept

(Special To The Avalanche)

FLOYDADA, July 11.—Floyd county club women, acting as poultry demonstrators, have shown that good practices pay in poultry production, and accurate records of the production of their flocks for the month of May show that from an average of 200 hens 518 dozen eggs were produced at an average cost of less than five cents per dozen.

Besting the standard of nineteen eggs per hen set by the A. and M. Extension service, the poultry flock belonging to Mrs. F. L. Marble averaged twenty-two eggs. Five other demonstrators reached and exceeded the standard set by the Extension service. All others were close to the average and the lowest average was thirteen eggs.

Home grown products were used for feed. Skim milk being used with a ration made up by mixing 100 pounds each of wheat bran, wheat shorts, ground corn or milo, ground oats, and meat scrap of fifty percent protein content fed as a mash kept before the flock in hoppers.

Two demonstrators, Mrs. David Barry of Harmony and Mrs. Olin Pry of Pleasant Valley, wormed their flocks, using tobacco dust in the mash and the daily production of eggs increased about twenty-five percent in each case within two weeks of treatment.

Alvan MacAuley, president of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce and the Packard Motor company, told a senate finance subcommittee today that most automobile manufacturers were willing for the tariff on passenger cars to be reduced from 25 to 10 percent on condition existing countervailing provisions are retained.

MacAuley was one of a group of automobile magnates called by Chairman Reed of the subcommittee to give their views on the feasibility of lowering the motor vehicle tariff.

He said the manufacturers were unwilling to accept a reduction in the duty on trucks and buses, now dutiable the same as passenger cars, because this was not a "mass production" industry to the same extent and consequently they have not the same advantage in competition.

The countervailing clause which he would have retained provides that the United States may levy a duty to equal any rate levied against American cars and trucks exceeding the American tariff, but not exceeding 50 percent.

Speed Of Modern Life Blamed For Various Ailments

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11. (AP)—

The speed and pressure of modern life were blamed by speakers before the American medical association congress here for many physical ailments.

Dr. Joseph Eckel, Buffalo, N. Y., psychiatrist, declared daily excitement not only affected the mind but that mental disorders due to the pressure of environment "may actually produce deafness, blindness or serious gastric symptoms."

Studies at the Cornell university clinic of patients suffering from ailments of the digestive system brought on by emotional strain were presented by Dr. George S. Stevenson of New York.

The pace of modern educational methods was deplored by Dr. Lloyd Mills of Los Angeles, who declared its speed was not only conducive to ill health but also made accurate thinking impossible.

Dr. Lovell Sanborn of San Francisco told the congress that while most Americans had advanced beyond the fried-potatoes, sweet desserts and pie breakfast diet, the liking for menus conducive to degenerative diseases remained.

Famous J. A. Ranch Records Given To Panhandle-Plains Historical Society

(Special To The Avalanche)

CANYON, July 11.—The records of the J. A. Ranch, the immense pastoral enterprise that has become known throughout America and Britain for its gigantic scope and the personnel of its management, have been deposited with the Panhandle-Plains Historical society.

These records come as a loan through the executors of the Cornelia Adair estate, in America, Henry C. Coke of Dallas, and T. D. Hobart of Panama, and the manager of the ranch, Clinton Henry. All the old records, some 30 volumes, go to make up this collection of J. A. files.

Started by Goodnight. In 1876 Charles Goodnight laid the basis for the J. A. Ranch of Texas by pioneering the way into the Panhandle-Plains country. In 1877 with John George Adair of Ireland, he formed at Denver, the Goodnight-Adair partnership whereby Adair was to furnish the money for the development of the great partnership enterprise. From Adair's initials the J. A. brand was conceived and under the genius of economic management and efficient development of Charles Goodnight, became known throughout the new and in the old country.

Besides the original herd of Goodnight, the original purchases of cattle of 1870 amounted to \$121,000. Land purchases, in spite of the fact that such were not necessary at that early day in the Panhandle amounted to \$15,000 the first year.

Partnership Dissolved. In 1886 Goodnight gave Mrs. Adair

who then held the ranch after Adair's death, notice of dissolution of the ranch as provided by contract. By that time during the nine years since the beginning of the partnership, over half a million dollars had been expended for cattle, nearly a quarter of a million for land, and over a quarter of a million had been spent upon the operation of the ranch, or a total investment of over one million seventy-one thousand dollars. Besides 10 per cent interest on all this money Goodnight had made the ranch pay in profits practically one and a half million dollars.

These facts and more, pertaining to the administration not only of Goodnight but of Richard Walsh, Senator James Wadsworth and other managers, and something of the careers of many other capable and high-class men, is to be found in these records made up of letter files, books, ranch statements, "time" books, and ledgers detailing the range business. To the students of the history not only of Northwest Texas but of the entire cattle frontier, these records constitute an invaluable source. With the records of the T. Anchor, the X. I. T., the Rocking Chair, and the Two-Buckle ranches, they place the depository of the Panhandle-Plains Historical society among the foremost libraries of literature upon the cattle industry.

Ochiltree Orders Highway Election

(Special To The Avalanche)

PERRYTON, July 11.—A \$700,000 road bond issue will be launched in Ochiltree county. The commissioners voted Monday, July 8, to call an election for the project but did not set a definite date. The election will probably be held early in September. Judge Geo. M. Perry, pioneer farmer and business man, and the man for whom Perryton was named, presented the petition, which was signed by a representative group of voters.

The purpose of the bond issue is for the hard surfacing of state highway No. 4, running from the Oklahoma-Texas state line through Perryton to the Lipscomb county line in the southeast corner of Ochiltree county; and the Booker to Spearman highway running through Perryton and paralleling the Santa Fe railroad. State and Federal aid will be sought on these highways.

Bond issues are being planned in Hansford and Hutchinson counties and if the above carry, it will give Perryton a paved highway to Amarillo, as the road is already hard-surfaced or is in process, from Stinson to Amarillo. Judge Perry predicts very little opposition to the bond issue in Ochiltree county, and says the people of Hansford and Hutchinson are fairly certain on their projects.

DEPOSITS INCREASE

Perryton Banks Hold Near Million And Half

(Special To The Avalanche)

PERRYTON, July 11.—Individual deposits in the two banks of Perryton lacked only \$15,000 of reaching the half million mark for one single day, Monday, July 8, and in six days business, from June 29, they jumped from \$805,000 to \$1,546,000, on July 8. The stupendous increase is due to the big wheat crop of the Perryton country.

Last year the peak in bank deposits was not reached until July 18, when the two banks showed a combined deposit of \$1,500,000. Predictions are that the two million mark will be reached by the time the peak is here this year. Not more than half of the big wheat crop of the Perryton country has been marketed at this time, it is estimated.

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
