TWICHELL ELEVATOR DESTROYED BY FIRE TUESDAY MAY BUILD BRIDGE AND DAM CANADIAN RIVER SOUTH OF PERRYTON

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS SELECT SITE FOR DAM, ROBERTS COUNTY

WOULD CURB FLOOD WATERS FOR IRRIGATION PURPOSES—FIND ROCK BOTTOM THREE FOURTHS WAY ACROSS RIVER

The starting of what may be the first irrigation system in the Panhandle was made recently when government engineers selected a site on the Canadian river in north Roberts county, approximately twenty-five miles south of Perryton, for a dam.

The location is in the north part of the county, a little west of the center of Roberts county, where the Tallahone creek runs into the Canadian.

A sounding was made and rock bottom was found nearly three fourths of the way across the river.

The proposed dam site was selected recently following an inspection trip made by the United States government flood control and agricultural engineer in company with A. S. Stinnett, state water engineer. Mr. Stinnett, promoter of the town in Hutchinson county bearing his name is also the promoter for the dam across the Canadian river to curb the waters of the stream for irrigation purposes.

At the point of the proposed dam, the river is one and a half to one and three-fourths miles wide. A dam would back up the water for a distance of twelve miles it is said.

The state of Oklahoma, which the Canadian river also traverses has offered to bear one-third of the expense of building the dams in the states of Texas and Oklahoma, and it is expected that the state of Texas will bear one third and the United States government the remaining third.

A meeting will be held in Amarillo early in March to enter further into the matter of conserving the waters of the Canadian river for irrigation purposes, when it is thought this matter will be thoroughly worked out.

The building of a dam on the proposed site would also mean a bridge across the Canadian at that point and no doubt a well graded highway.

FIRE LOSS REACHES \$10,000 ALL COVERED BY BLANKET INSURANCE

ELEVATOR IS OLD LAND MARK IN OCHILTREE COUNTY—EQUITY WILL PROBABLY REBUILD LATER IN SPRING

Fire starting in the dumping pit completely destroyed the elevator belonging to the Perryton Equity exchange, at Twichell, Tuesday afternoon, the loss probably reaching the \$10,000 mark, all of which was covered by insurance.

The fire alarm was turned in at Perryton and the fire truck left at 3:25 in the afternoon, taking just eight

minutes to make the five mile run to Twichell. However the entire elevator was in flames by the time the truck arrived and with no water, except the chemical tanks, nothing could be done to check the flames.

A large crowd which gathered at the blaze assisted in removing property from around the elevator and fighting against the spreading of the flames to nearby buildings. Only the elevator and office were destroyed.

At the time the elevator burned, it is estimated there were 5,000 bushels of grain in it, some barley and kafir, and the rest wheat. Both the contents and the building were fully insured and the Equity exchange suffered no loss.

No particulars as to how the fire started could be learned, but it is thought that it might have been started either from a dust explosion or from damp and sweating grain in the pit.

Is Old Landmark
The Twichell elevator is one of the old landmarks of Ochiltree county. The elevator was built at old Ochiltree when it was thought that the railroad would be built there. Later it was moved to Perryton and it was standing on the site now occupied by the Perryton Equity elevator when the Equity organized.

The elevator proved too small for Perryton and was moved to Twichell when the Equity built the present elevator.

Will Probably Rebuild
Although no definite plans will be made until the Equity board meets Monday, it is thought that the Twichell elevator will probably be rebuilt a little later in the spring.

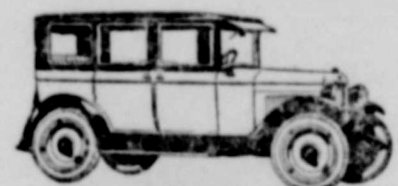

BOY SCOUT ANNIVERSARY WEEK

Starting Monday, February 7, the Boy Scouts of America will arrange for a nation-wide celebration in honor of the seventeenth anniversary of the Boy Scout movement, according to Leroy Hartman, Perryton scout official.

That the Boy Scout movement is a worthwhile enterprise is easily understood by reading the following boy facts in the United States.

There are approximately 10,000,000 boys between the ages of 10 and 20.

Eighty-two per cent of our people are born physically sound; 17 per cent reach 21 years physically sound.

The movies are attended by 20,000,000 people each day, and 5,000,000 of these are boys and young men.

While our high schools have an enrollment of 3,000,000, 13.3 percent of our 14-year-olds and 27.1 per cent of our 15-year-olds are not in school; 35 per cent of our youth drop out to work for a living.

Church membership, according to the International Church World survey includes less than one-third of our youth under 21 years of age; two-thirds of our youth have no connection with the church or church school; 58,000,000, or one-half, of our people, are unchurched.

Commitments of juveniles has decreased 14.4 per cent in proportion to population from 1910, the date of the founding of the Boy Scout movement.

The high peak of Sunday school attendance is in the twelfth year, which is the scout age.

The peak crime age is 19 years. Boys who go wrong at 19 are reaping the whirlwind of wild oats sown in their early teens.

One of our great American cities spends six times as much on crime as it spends on its school system. It spends nine cents per boy on free time guidance and \$450 per boy on juvenile crime.

60,000 murders were committed in America in a seven-year period, which exceeds by 10,000 the number of American soldiers killed in all battles of the World war.

A down-town section of a large American city having 7,000 boy population and one boys' club has ready access to 445 dance halls, 432 pool-rooms, 337 picture shows. A recent investigation revealed 69 violations of the law among 102 pool-rooms visited.

Jane Adams says, "America will never be safe until her pleasures are made more attractive than her vices."

Eighty-two per cent of our city children play in the street.

Every fourth mother in America is employed. The average parent has a sixth grade education. Recreation has left the home. 75 per cent of delinquency is directly traceable

to unwholesome home life.

The school boy has 45 per cent of his life for leisure time; the employed boy has 36 per cent. One-half the children observed at leisure in 19 cities were doing nothing. An investigation of six cities shows 45 per cent of the boys loafing by walking the streets; public dances in three cities, totaling 3,000,000 population are attended by 125,000 daily.

Three-fourths of delinquent cases are traceable to the "group" or "gang." 1,250 gangs studied in one large city list 90 per cent of the delinquents of that city.

3,000,000 boys have been Boy Scouts since 1910, which is one-seventh of the total boy population in that period.

Two-fifths of our college students in 30 colleges studied are former scouts.

The majority of scout troops are in churches; 53 per cent of our scout troops are denominational; nearly 5,000 community troops, are, for the most part, located in churches, approximately 90 per cent of the strength of the Boy Scout movement is traceable to the interest, support and leadership of men affiliated with the churches of America.

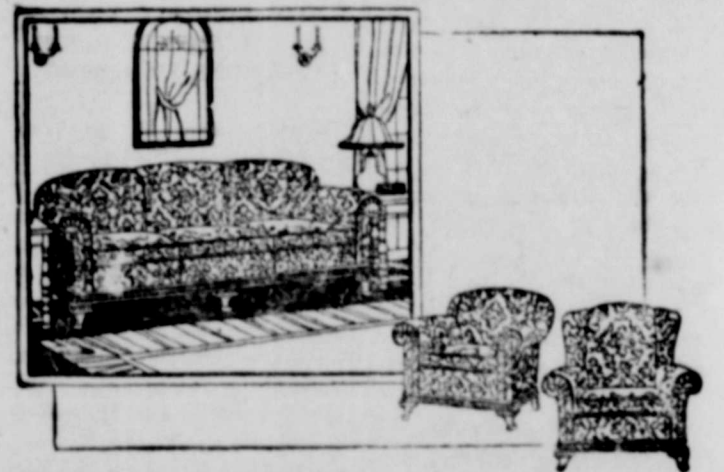

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International Sunday School Lesson

by KEITH L. BROOKS

(Managing Editor "The King's Business," Secretary Correspondence Courses of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles.)

February 6, 1927

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

Matt. 25:14-30

Heart of the Lesson

Key thought of the first section of this chapter (vs. 1-13), "WATCH." Key thought of vs. 14-30—"WORK." The Virgin's Parable teaches the possibility of Christ's coming any time, and hence the necessity of constant readiness on the believer's part, lest coming suddenly He find us sleeping" (Mk. 14:36). We are to "live soberly, righteously, godly, looking for the blessed hope" (Tit. 2:12). But not only are we to be as vir-

gins, watching; we are to be as SERVANTS WORKING.

Some have said that belief in Christ's coming "cuts the nerve of Christian activity." They picture those who hold this hope as men who fold their hands and wait.

This lesson shows us, however, that this hope affects not only the inner spiritual life but the external activity. Christians are here represented as spiritual investors, linking their small abilities with the larger abilities of others, thus working more effectively for the advancement of His Kingdom in view of His imminent coming.

This is a parable of the Absent Master—Christ. (v. 14.)

All of His followers do not have the same ability, but all serve the same Lord, and all are individually responsible to do what He has given them power to do.

He does not empower all alike. Variety is characteristic of His method (v. 15.)

Each one must do his own task, not another's. "To every man his work."

The five-talent man "traded" ("did business with"). The busy people are the happy ones. Work for Christ is the salt of life (v. 16.)

A man of one talent—yet one talent is enough—to do something with. Why should a man go and bury it? (v. 18.)

Despise not small things. You may count the apples on a tree, but you can't count the trees in an apple.

The clock that won't strike one is not likely to strike twelve.

The fellow who wants to do a great deal at once will probably not do anything in the end.

"After a long time" (v. 19)—Here's a hint that Christ's coming might be deferred for some time.

Though He seems to wait long, He will surely come and "reckon." Our privileges in heaven will certainly be in proportion to our service for Him on earth.

"Well done" (v. 21). This is a "degree" that can be won by the weakest of His servants by doing what they can. He asks no more.

It's goodness and faithfulness He requires—not greatness and success.

The reward of this faithful investing of ourselves for Him will be not an eternity of rest but an eternity of enlarged activities.

There shall be new spheres of action beyond all our dreams, if we have "turned many to righteousness" here, and served Him faithfully.

"Enter into joy." In this life, the joy of the Lord enters into the heart as the earnest of the Spirit. In the next life, we shall enter into joy, as the very element in which we shall serve Him to all eternity. There, as here, our joy will be in WORK.

The two-talent man now comes (v. 22). He gets the same commendation as the man with five. He was faithful with what had been committed to him.

He rewards not simply actions,

but graces made visible in actions. These can be seen by Him in the smallest as well as the greatest deeds.

Now for the one-talent man (v. 24). Strange that an example should be made of him! He is pronounced the worst defaulter of all.

Some thing so little has been committed to them, it matters not whether they do anything.

You who are entrusted with the least number of talents—LOOK OUT!

We are accountable for the least advantages as well as the greatest.

Those who seem not so gifted as others are exposed to a peculiar temptation of saying: So little can I do, I will not try to do anything.

How could Christ more forcibly impress us with our accountability for one talent than to make an example of this man who was full of excuses for his failure to use the little he had?

"Thou art a hard man." His talk almost brands him as a man who was not really born of God.

"False notions of God lie at the bottom of careless, frightened and unsuccessful service," says Dr. Torrey.

"Wicked and slothful," not "good and faithful" (v. 26). It will be a poor excuse at the Judgment Seat to say that we had but one talent.

"Every one that hath shall be given" (v. 29). In plain words—the disuse of a faculty will lead to its entire loss.

The due use of it will lead to its development and increase.

Conclusion: The virgins (vs. 1-13) erred through overconfidence. The one-talent man erred through underconfidence. Some count it an easy thing to be a Christian. Some think it too hard.

A Christian is a spiritual tradesman.

Use or lose.

Those who do not use their God-given talents for Him are guilty of embezzling trust funds.

Talent is that which it within a man's power.

W. D.—"Well Done"—grandest degree in the universe.

Whom the Lord employs He empowers.

Even a Timothy had to be told to dig up his gift (2 Tim. 1:6).

Work well done is rewarded by

more and greater work.

Golden Text Illustration

"Well done, thou good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things. I will make thee ruler over many things; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Matt. 25:21.

There is a legend that the emperor Justinian built the Byzantine Church with a view to his own glory. On the dedication day, he looked in vain for his name on the memorial stone. Instead, an angel's hand had obliterated his name and substituted "Euphrasia," a poor widow living near, who had strewn straw in the path of the beasts that drew the heavy trucks. Her motive was so pure that she received credit for the whole. Justinian's motive was so selfish that his gift was ignored.

Let us therefore learn that it is quality, not quantity which appeals to God (1 Cor. 3:13). The reward will not be based so much upon the greatness of the investment as upon the graciousness of it.

Services for W. G. Butler
Resident of County for Twenty-Two Years is Buried at Ochiltree Friday

Funeral services were held at the Christian church, Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, by Rev. E. G. Pennington, for William Green Butler, age 72, probably the oldest man in the county, and for twenty-two years a resident of Ochiltree county.

The body was laid to rest at Ochiltree cemetery, the masonic lodge conducting the services at the cemetery.

Memoir of William Green Butler

The subject of this sketch was born September 21, 1844, in Breckenridge county, Kentucky. He was the second child of John and Amanda Ann Butler.

On December 2, 1872, he was married to Mary Elizabeth Terry who

preceded him to the great beyond March 28, 1925. To this union eight children were born. The children are: Oved J. Lee, Fred, Mrs. Addie Livingston, Lockney, Texas; Mrs. Ida Kelley, Eldorado, Oklahoma; Mrs. Betty Forbes and Grover, all of whom survive him except the oldest son, Oved J. He is also survived by one brother and one sister.

Brother Butler and the family moved from Kentucky in 1898 and settled in Collin county, Texas where he resided until about 1900 when he moved to Eldorado, Oklahoma. From Eldorado the family moved to Ochiltree county and settled out west of Perryton. This was his home until his death 3:30 p. m. January 26, 1927, having lived 82 years, 4 months and 5 days.

Early in life Brother Butler professed faith in Christ and joined the Presbyterian church but later in life he united with a Baptist church. At the time of his death he was a member of the Eldorado Baptist church.

Soon after reaching his majority he was made a mason. He was a charter member of the masonic lodge at Eldorado, Oklahoma and of the Ochiltree Lodge No. 910 Perryton.

This sturdy soul who had passed more than eighty milestones in his earthly pilgrimage, like many of our ancestors was somewhat of a pioneer. His labors are ended. His soul is marching on while the house in which he dwelt slumbers in death.

He had borne adversity bravely and enjoyed prosperity quietly. He had filled the various relations of life, as son, husband, father, brother, friend, and filled them well. Who can do more?

There is a balm for wounded hearts and it is supplied only by Him who died that we all might live and to Him we commend you.

Therefore Resolved, that in the death of Brother Butler we have sustained a loss that has brought the bitter cup of sorrow to our lips which will be fully recognized. Let us so live and perform our duties here as to insure a joyful reunion with those who have gone before. And may we be able, at the close of day, as he was, when we hear him say:

"Tired! Ah yes! So tired dear, I shall soundly sleep tonight With never a dream and never a fear,

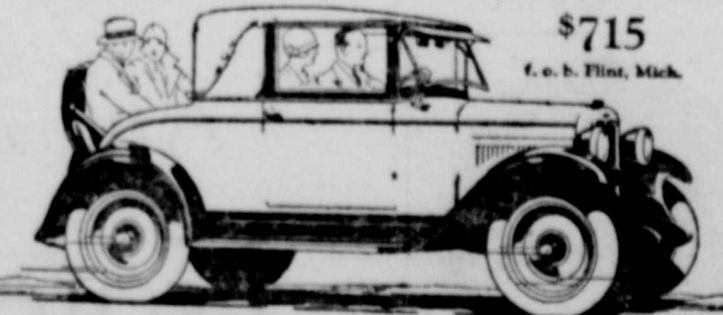

TENTH BIRTHDAY TODAY

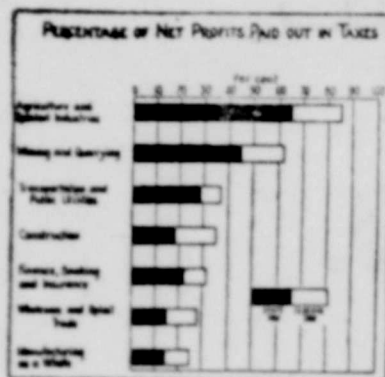
With this issue, the Ochiltree County Herald starts on its tenth year of existence, with plans for a bigger, better, and more interesting paper than ever before.

DESTROYING PROSPERITY



The burden of this unscientific taxation falls upon all classes but most heavily upon the farmer.

Consider carefully the diagram reproduced here. It was published by Roger Babson, the leading business analyst and statistician in this country.

It shows the farmer is paying out 33 per cent of his net profits in taxes. And Mr. Babson emphasizes that taxes are paid, not out of gross income, but out of net profits.

These staggering taxes paid by the farmer react upon the business of the country. While there are only about six million farmers in the United States, their families and those dependent upon farm trade swell the number of people in the group representing the farm purchasing power to about forty million.

While this group of forty million is hit the hardest, it is vital also to the industries which need the farmer's trade.

The politicians are responsible for this drain on the farmer's purse. They are doing nothing to correct it. They will act only when they are forced to, and then there is the usual amount of red tape to be unwound before anything can be accomplished.

But it is time the farmer is beginning to prod and prod hard.

Calles, Mexican president, accused Catholic bishops of ordering Mexican uprisings that killed seventy-five protesting Catholics and twenty-four Mexican soldiers. He accuses the bishops of urging the faithful to march against the Government, under a banner inscribed "Long Live Christ, the King."

That banner has traveled a long way in the past and won many fights.

Young gentlemen, it pays to save. Even a little may be worth while. Mr. Couzens, asked to pay nine million dollars more income tax, had saved \$900 when he met Ford. That gave him his chance. By and by he sold his interest to Ford for thirty million dollars. If he hadn't saved the nine hundred dollars, he could not have the Government suing him for nine million dollars.

Governor Smith, of New York, is now a candidate for the Democratic nomination in 1928. He intimated semi-humorously in a recent address. His followers in New York City announced it vociferously at an enthusiastic banquet.

Other Democrats that would like the 1928 Democratic Presidential nomination will find in Governor Smith an opponent that understands politics and the American people.

Dispatches from Boston describe triple judicial killing in Charlestown State Prison, just after midnight yesterday. Three young men passed from the electric chair to another destination for clubbing an old night watchman to death.

Edward H. Heinlein was first to go. As he walked to the electric chair, repeating the words of a prayer by the Reverend Father Michael J. Murphy, great crowds gathered outside, automobile horns were booming, photographers' flash-lights lighted up the crowd. And at the rear exit from the prison another crowd was waiting to see the bodies carried out. A special police force was obliged to fight the deeply interested crowd.

Crowds that howled around the French guillotine, or that tilted up their gin bottles as they shouted encouragement to murderers on the British gallows, were not entirely different from human beings of today.

Authorities in Braunschweig province learn that when religion in-

volves extra taxes many Germans get along without religion.

Registering as the member of any church in Germany, you must pay taxes to the State, and the money then goes to the churches. Braunschweig has been obliged to employ clerks who register those that wish to be put down as "without religious faith."

About Your Health

Things You Should Know



THE SEWER

The large bowel, the colon, is the principal sewer of the human body. If the main sewer of a city becomes obstructed for long, its tributaries are soon overloaded with impurities, stagnation results, and the health of the town is seriously endangered. So it is with the human body; the health and vigor of the entire being are undermined when the main sewer is not functioning. We call such a condition constipation; I wish I could think of a term that conveyed more of a warning to the victim of his own inattention.

I believe I am safe in saying that if the colon be kept in proper condition, eighty per cent of our chronic ailments would never appear; isn't that sort of a reward big enough to be worth contending for? Isn't such a prize worth the effort? The chief cause of constipation is neglect. What species of neglect is fraught with more danger? Where is the profit, if we gain a fortune and lose the health.

Do you drink at least six to eight glasses of water daily? Do you take the necessary active exercise? Do you drink two or three glasses of water as soon as you leave your bed each morning? Do you eat plenty of fruits, green vegetables, coarse breads and cereals? If you

1926 WEATHER

The weather fluctuations of 1926 in general differed in no important particular from normals established by more than 50 years of record, with the tendency to slightly warmer conditions than usual, says the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture. In most of the country the growing season was also slightly longer than usual.

Such variations, however, are expected by meteorologists, and during the period since the Weather Bureau records began many years could be selected showing greater variations than were observed in 1926.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Egg yolk is rich in iron. It is very valuable as a food for anemic children.

Green oysters are perfectly wholesome. The greenish color is due to little green plants the oyster eats.

Tomatoes are rich in all three vitamins—A, B, and C. Tomatoes keep the C vitamin even when cooked or canned.

Give the children a variety of flavors in their foods early in life. In many cases the foods people think they do not like are foods they have never tasted.

Curtains of unbleached muslin are practical for the bathroom as they do not look limp or sleazy when dampened by steamy air, and as they may be frequently laundered. Brighten them up with a border of appliques of colored checked gingham, cretonne, or plain chambray.

Before washing a sweater, measure it and write down the dimensions. After it is washed and rinsed, spread it, back side down, with sleeves outstretched, on several flat thicknesses of clean soft material.

Shape it according to its original dimensions. Turn occasionally until dry.

For light sandwiches to serve with tea at a club meeting or sewing circle, chop or grind watercress fine, cream it with butter and spread on graham bread. Or use minced parsley flavored with a few drops of lemon juice. Fancy cookie cutters will trim the sandwiches into attractive shapes.

A deposit of lime in a tea kettle can be removed if not too heavy by using a hot solution of vinegar or commercial muriatic acid, one part to five parts of water. Handle the acid solution carefully, as it is corrosive.

What Modern, Efficient Evangelism Contributes

DOES THE MODERN CHURCH HAVE AN ADEQUATE AND COMPLETE PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM?

Is it a fact that old-time revival methods are not wanted?

Has the time come for a more up-to-date method of conducting revivals?

Cannot the ministry of rescue be co-ordinated with the ministry of conservation?

The Rev. R. L. Flowers, now holding a revival at the Methodist church, has reduced his work in the vineyard of the Master down to a scientific basis, according to a lecture delivered recently at Nashville, Tenn., before the General Evangelists there.

After rehearsing all the complaints sweeping them away as negligible, Mr. Flowers said:

"The problem as I have faced it is this: What can I do during the revival campaign that will co-ordinate my work of rescue with the pastor's work of conservation? When I have been able to do this I will have, in a large measure, eliminated the causes for criticism of my work as an evangelist. Not only so but I will have enlarged my usefulness to the church. In this paper I am to offer you my plans for an adequate program for evangelism. In doing so it is my conviction that these general plans are workable in any well-planned campaign.

The Sunday School the Chief Agency for Conservation

"I came to the conclusion that if the results of a revival meeting were conserved it would be done largely through the women's work, the young people's work, but principally through the Sunday school. To be sure the pastor will be at the very heart and center of all this. All these years I have been boosting all these organizations of the church but in a hit and miss way. I had been boosting without building. There must be a closer co-ordination and co-operation of all the activities of the church if there should be an adequate program of conservation. In my boosting these organizations in the past I was working under a distinct disadvantage. My knowledge of the various organizations was general, but special. For instance, in this day of highly organized Sunday schools to do a constructive work one must be a specially trained Sunday school teacher. Furthermore, had I such qualifications I could not do this work myself in addition to my other work of conducting a revival.

"So at the beginning of 1924, I secured a layman who not only is trained but is experienced in every phase of church work. He was employed for a number of years by a large down town church, as educational director, having already had ten years experience in distinctive religious work. He took a small Sunday school with an enrollment of 400 and in five years built it up to an enrollment of 2500.

What the Special Worker Does

"He goes in advance to the new field. He makes a careful survey of the existing organization, studying its needs and its program, with the idea of meeting the standard of efficiency as manned out by the representative Sunday school boards. He also makes a careful survey of the field and classifies the information as to the possibilities for the revival, the church and the Sunday school etc. He meets with the workers and discusses:

How to build a great Sunday school.

Making the Sunday school social program effective.

Financing the Sunday school and church.

Plans and programs for weekly teachers' meetings.

The use of special days in the building of a great Sunday school.

The soul-winning Sunday school.

The monthly visitation day and how to plan for it.

Surveys and how to follow them up.

How to get Sunday school pupils to attend preaching services.

How to get results in an unorganized class.

How to enlarge the present organization, and such subjects as the local conditions may require.

"In addition to this he makes all preliminary arrangements and pushes the publicity for the revival. His work enables me to outline a

very definite program for the revival. For example, I have estimated: number of men in church out of Sunday school; number of women in church out of Sunday school; number of young people in the church not in Sunday school; number of lost people in the Sunday school; number of people with church letters elsewhere.

A Special Message to Every One in This Community

All this week preliminary arrangements are being made for what we pray and hope may be one of the greatest revivals in the history of this community. This newspaper is coming to you in this unusual way seeking to enlist you, your prayers, your faith, your time and your all in this great work. We want you to feel that we need you. We will not have all that we ought to have back of this great enterprise unless we have you. Unless you help us, there will be some one that might have been reached that will not be touched at all. There are some waiting for you. "Let no man take thy crown."

Will you join me in these prayers uttered a long time ago, but never more appropriate than now: "Wilt thou not revive us again, that Thy people may rejoice in Thee. Show us Thy loving kindness, O Jehovah." "O Jehovah, revive Thy work in the midst of the years; in the midst of the years make it known; in wrath remember mercy."

Do you feel unworthy, have you been absenting yourself from the church services; have you been neglecting prayer and the reading of the Word; have you been "wounded in the house of your friends;" do you feel that you have been neglected? Is your heart sick and sore through suffering and sorrow? Brother, sister, we need you in this meeting and in giving yourself to it your hurt may be healed. One supreme effort for others, on our part, and most of the things that trouble us will be gone. We need you in this meeting.

Let's make next Sunday in our revival campaign, a home-coming day. Of course everybody is invited to attend all these services, but we are especially urging our own folks to come and line up for the campaign. We ought to have the greatest gathering of Methodist folks ever brought together in Perryton at one time. Let's do it.

We invite the members of all the churches and the citizenship of Perryton to co-operate in the revival services at the Methodist church. Though the services are under the auspices of the Methodist church, we want every individual in the town and community to get the greatest possible good from the services. We want all who are interested in soul winning to come and sing, pray and work for a great revival in Perryton. We give all singers a special invitation to come to the choir and help with music.—Rev. J. S. Huckabee, pastor Methodist church.

The 1926 football team played an exceptional successful season, and much credit is due Coach Holderman for their accomplishments. Starting with practically a green team in the fall, Holderman worked up a winning combination that succeeded in taking the district championship and winning many intersectional games with other schools.

Out of the schedule of eleven games, the Rangers won five, tied two, and lost four. Of the 4 games lost, one of them was on September 17, the opening game of the season when the team went to Canyon playing a 16 to 0 game. This was the first game that many of the Ranger teams had ever taken part in, and was played after only a few days of practice. However, the only scoring that was done was in the first four minutes of play after which the Perryton players held the experienced Eagle team.

The second game played was a 12 to 12 tie with Gate, Okla., played on the local field on September 24. On October 1, the Rangers lost to Liberal by a 50 to 0 score, playing against a team much heavier and with several years of experience. The Liberal team won the championship of western Kansas during the 1926 season.

On October 6 the Rangers played the Goodwell college team, losing by a 27 to 0 score, holding the heavy college players to a small score and threatening to score against them on several instances.

The Rangers then took three straight wins, from Miami on October 15 with a 7 to 3 score, from Can-

adian October 22 with a 25 to 0 final, and from Shattuck on October 28 in a 10 to 0 game.

On November 5, Perryton played a scoreless tie with Beaver, handicapped with four regular players out of the lineup. On November 11, a game with the town team brought another defeat to the high school boys with a 16 to 0 score. Thanksgiving day added another victory to the list when a return game was played with Beaver, the score being 25 to 0. A post-season game on December 3 with Follett added a 14 to 0 victory and closed the season.

Although some criticism was given Coach Holderman for starting the season by playing a number of games with teams from schools and colleges much larger than Perryton. However by the close of the season his wisdom in so arranging the schedule was self evident.

According to Coach Holderman if a team can be trained to play good football against team much heavier and with more experience it is certain they will be successful when playing schools of a like class.

By starting the new team out against hard schools it meant the losing of several games, but they were all lost to school's of such a size that no discredit was brought on the Perryton team, and at all times the Rangers made a very worthy showing when scheduled against such teams as Miami, Canadian, Shattuck, Beaver and Follett, the Rangers easily showed themselves superior.

Coach Holderman came to Perryton and brought with him a new system of football. That his system was successful is easily determined from the showing made. Holderman has won much praise from his coaching ability as demonstrated from the loyal support given the football team and interest taken in the sport.

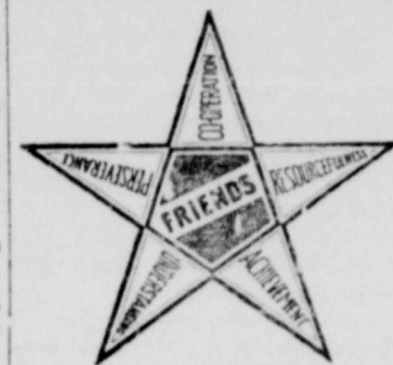

PRESERVE COPY EAGLE PRINTED AT OCHILTREE

OLD NEWSPAPER OF MAY 1908
TELLS STORY OF EFFORT
TO GET RAIL-
ROAD

An old copy of the Ochiltree Eagle published at old Ochiltree on May 1, 1908, was brought to the Herald office this week by Mrs. Clayton Hartman.

The old newspaper was published and edited by W. L. Stewart, now editor and publisher of the Mission (Texas) Enterprise, father of the present editor of the Herald. J. W. Payne was business manager.

A streamer across the four column fourteen inch page bore the message, "MUST HAVE RAILROAD," while a subhead reads, "Ochiltree County Formulates Plans and are Going After a Railroad in Earnest—Enthusiastic Meetings Held Over County—\$40,000 in Stock First Day."

The following is the text of the story contained on the front page.

"A few weeks ago J. L. Dodson of the west part of the county, got in correspondence with the railroad commissioners of the State of Texas, relative to some reliable promoter or company who would investigate railroad needs in this section of the Panhandle. They referred him to the American Engineering Co., at Indianapolis, Ind., who recommended Mr. A. E. Wiest of that city, who is first vice president and general manager of the Wawasee Route. For his expenses only he agreed to come and look over the proposition and if he found it a feasible one, to start the ball rolling at once.

"Mr. Wiest arrived in Ochiltree Friday evening, held an informal meeting that night and outlined his plans and stated his price for his part of the work, should it be undertaken. A mass meeting was called for Monday afternoon at the court house. There was a good representation present and the entire matter was gone over carefully. Mr. Wiest explained what our citizens had to do in order to get the proposition started, what laws would have to be complied with, cost of charter, surveys, profiles, blue prints, amount to be raised in stock before bonds can be floated to finance the road.

"At this meeting no subscriptions were called for, but a thorough understanding was had as to what must be done and how to do it. A committee, was named to prepare the stock subscription agreement and report to the meeting called for Wednesday afternoon.

"The meeting called Wednesday was the 'cup shaf' so far, enthusiasm was rampant and when subscriptions were called for there was something doing. Nearly \$40,000 was pledged and soliciting committees are hard at work throughout the county securing additional amounts. A mass meeting will be held at Black school house Saturday night and one at Blue Mound school house in Beaver county, Okla., Monday night. Other meetings in this and adjoining counties will be held within the next week or ten days."

The following is a copy of the subscription agreement contained in the paper.

"Whereas, it is contemplated to organize a corporation under the laws of the State of Texas to be known as the Enid, Ochiltree & Western Railroad Co., or by such other name as the subscribing stockholders may, by a majority vote of all capital stock select,

"1st—The capital stock is to be \$500,000, divided into 5,000 shares of \$100 each.

"2nd—The object of said corporation is to promote, construct, maintain and operate a line of railroad, to be operated by steam or other mechanical power, between and connecting some point on the Santa Fe or Fort Worth & Denver on the west. Let's do something!"

An article on the editorial page gives a touch of the national affairs of twenty years ago.

"President Roosevelt has signed the widows' pension bill which adds 13 millions to the annual pension rolls. The bill grants a pension of twelve dollars a month to about 190,000 widows of the Civil War veter-

ans. The law becomes effective at once for the widows who were married prior to June 1890. The senate committee on pensions has completed consideration of the pension appropriation bill which will carry \$162,000,000.

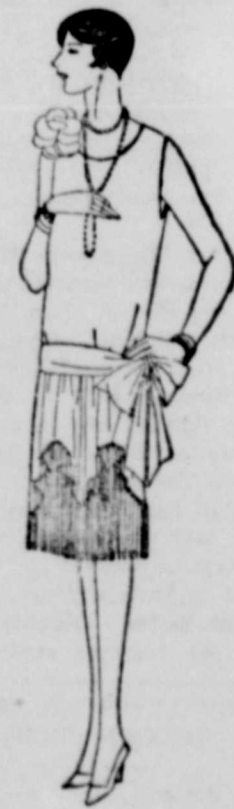
