Millard Shaw Is Drowned Sunday In Bay At Corpus

Was Former Lamesa Citizen Many Years

Funeral services were held in Abilene Tuesday afternoon from the First Baptist Church for Millard Shaw, 30, who was drowned in the bay at Corpus Christi, Sunday afternoon.

Millard will be remembered by many people in Lamesa, having been practically reared here. He was prominently associated with band and orchestra work in Lamesa, and was a member of the first orchestra in Lamesa.

Shaw was sailing on the bay in a small boat accompanied by a friend, Ruby Caesar. He dived into the bay to retrieve the rudder of the boat when it dislodged. A sudden gust of wind carried the boat away from him and he was unable to overtake the rudderless vessel.

Miss Caesar threw a life preserver and a rope to him but both drifted out of reach before he could reach them. Unable to steer the craft, she drifted in the bay for two hours before the boat drifted ashore.

After notifying lifeguards, Miss Caesar called her drowned companions parents.

Young Shaw had been in Corpus Christi since early June. He was sent there from Dallas as manager of the Stewart Title Guaranty company. He had been with the same firm in Dallas since 1936.

Born October 20, 1908, at Chanter, Texas, Shaw was graduated from Lamesa High School in 1925 (Continued on Back Page)

4-H Club Trip Is Awarded Stanley Applegate Here

Will Make Trip To San Francisco Fair

Stanley Applegate, outstanding 4-H Club boy of Dawson County, has been selected as the representative for the county to attend the San Francisco Exposition. Stanley is in his fifth years work as a 4-H Club boy, and has two milk-fed calves, two dry-lot calves, a brood sow and cotton as his 1939 club work.

Stanley will join twenty-one 4-H Club boys of Extension District 6 at El Paso on August 5 and will travel by automobile to San Francisco and return. Three days will be spent in going, three days returning and four to six days at the Exposition.

The group will carry its own "chuck box", mounted on a trailer, and cook. Meals will be prepared three times per day, and each boy will sleep out "under the stars" each night.

Wells Loveless New Doctor With Local Hospital

Latest reports from the Stanolind Oil test, directly east of Cedar Lake, is that a strong gas pressure was encountered Tuesday at 3723 feet and that difficulty was experienced all day Wednesday attempting to get the tools back in the hole.

Reports from Midland stated that it was likely that new casing would have to be set after the well was cemented to shut off the pressure.

This is the third pressure this well has hit. A strong air pressure was encountered at 2700 feet with a small show of gas.

This well is attracting more attention among oil men of the state than any wildcat in recent months. Although the well is located about two miles over the Gaines County line, it is nearer Lamesa than any other town, and citizens here are intensely interested in the outcome of the test.

Applications are now being received at Mr. Collins' office in the court house for the farm tenant loans. Closing date for the taking of applications has been set for September 1st, and those desiring to avail themselves of this opportunity are urged to do so immediately.

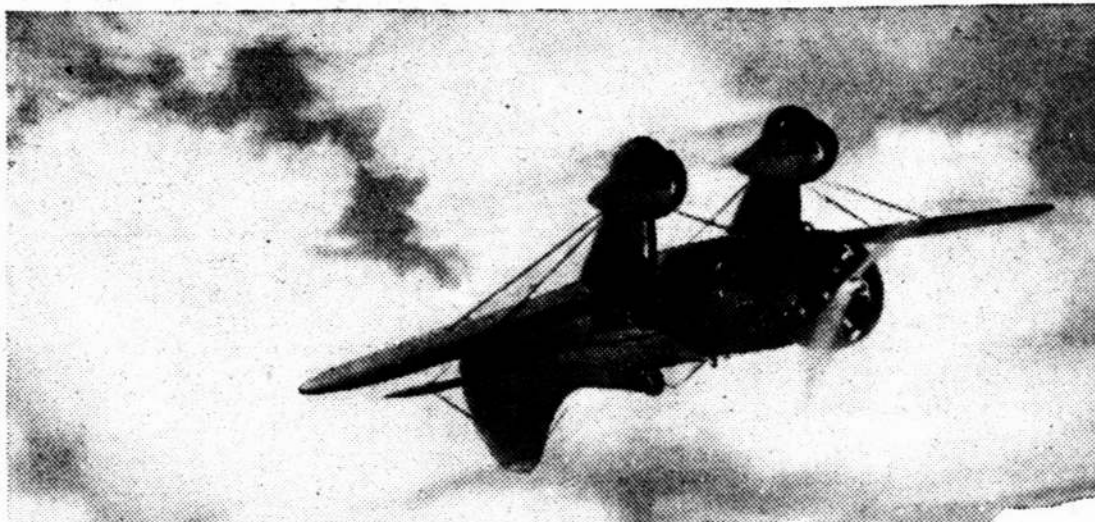

Students Will Not

The attention of all parents who have a child who expects to transfer from the district in which he resides to another district, that August 1st is the last day for such transfers. This item must be attended to otherwise the parent and school officials of the district will be put to extra expense and trouble.

If there is a question as whether the child should be transferred, the local trustee or county superintendent should be consulted.

In some of the school districts plans have been slow in taking form because of the fact that the schools have been trying to work out definite plans for transportation for the high school students.

All schools will have these plans worked out by Saturday, July 29th.

No such delay will be occasioned in the future.

To Pay Teachers
In Installments
Covering Year

Equal Monthly Pay
For Twelve
Months

Plans have been completed for the payment of teachers of the county to receive their pay for the coming year in twelve equal payments. An agreement was reached by the teachers and trustees last year before the close of school that this arrangement should be made.

This does not mean that the yearly salary of the teacher is affected. It only means that the annual pay is divided into twelve parts rather than eight or nine parts as the case may be. This plan is an advantage to both teachers and to the school district. To the teacher it means that she will have a regular check each month in the year so long as she is employed in this county. To the district it means that the burden of the pay is distributed over a longer period of time and therefore less money will be needed early in the year before taxpaying time comes. In this way less discount will be required making the loss to the teachers and the district less.

This plan is not new to the teachers of the county since many have worked in other parts of the state where the plan is in operation and all agree it has proved satisfactory.

11th In Lubbock

Announcement was made this week to all former Arkansawyers of the Annual Picnic and Reunion which will be held at McKenzie Park in Lubbock, August 11th.

R. R. Townsend, former State Senator of Arkansas, now in business in Lamesa, stated this week that a concerted effort would be made by local Arkansawyers to bring the 1940 meeting to Lamesa.

DAWSON RURAL HIGH SCHOOL REPORT GIVEN

We feel sure that there is a great deal of speculation in the district concerning the plans for school building. There have been some unfounded rumors to the effect that there would be no school in the district this coming term. Such is not the case. School is to begin in the early part of September, a definite date will be set soon, and a detailed plan as to the arrangements of the school will be forthcoming in this paper.

The School Board has been unable as yet to have work started on

the building due to the fact that application has been made for a W. P. A. grant, and as yet they have had no action on this because Congress has been slow in making an appropriation of this kind. If such a grant does not materialize soon, a building will be constructed with the funds now on hand. Mr. O'Brien, Mr. Norris, and Mr. Chiles have just returned from Austin and report that upon investigation of school plants, costs, etc., a very satisfactory building can be constructed with present funds. So we feel sure that some definite plans toward the erection of a building will be made soon.

Our school has been classified by the County Board as a four year High School with eleven grades. So we shall be able to take care of any child in the district desiring to finish his high school education.

We wish to build the best school possible, and one of which the district can justly be proud, so we urge the patrons to cooperate with us in this endeavor by not transferring to other districts. We are making our school as strong as possible. We feel sure that we shall do as well, if not better, by our boys and girls than the much larger schools because of the fact that the teachers can give more individual work, and be in closer contact with the pupils. Our curriculum shall be as broad and practical as it is possible for us to make it. We shall offer all the required subjects toward graduation and in addition various elective subjects. Our teachers have been carefully selected and have specialized in the subjects which they shall teach.

The school is purchasing four new buses with which to transport the children to and from school, and it is our aim to place the bus lines as convenient as possible to every child in the district. If any child in nearby districts whose grade is not taught in your home district desires to come to our school we shall be glad to take care of you, and shall make transportation as convenient as possible. See the Board or Mr. Chiles concerning this. If more convenient Mr. Norris can give you the desired information. If you have any problem to discuss, please bring it to the Board, as they are more than glad to discuss any matter with you. Regular Board meetings are held on the first and third Monday evenings of each month, eight o'clock.

AUTO SALES UP FROM 1938

Texas Automotive sales for the first half of 1939 were sharply above those for the corresponding period a year ago. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported here today.

For the first six months of the year, passenger car registrations were up 35 per cent, and commercial car registrations showed a gain of 20.6 per cent over the period from January to June last year.

Automotive sales for June showed a decline from those of May of only eight-tenths of 1 per cent, increasing 56.6 per cent over June 1938. Commercial car registrations lagged 6.5 per cent behind May, but 22 per cent above June of last year.

ONE-ACT PLAY GROUPS WILL BE DIVIDED

Attention, Hollywood! Look to the Texas farm and village for tomorrow's stars.

To make room for would-be contestants in the annual state-wide one-act play tournament, The University of Texas Interscholastic League last week moved to split almost 700 contesting casts into two groups.

"Heretofore, the little school has had to tackle the Big Texas high school if it wants to get into one-act play competition," said F. L. Winship, league dramatics director, in explaining the change. "As a result, many of them haven't competed."

Next spring's tournaments will find one-act play contestants competing in "A" and "B" groups, Mr. Winship added. "B" group schools will compete through county elimination, while "A" group schools will continue to a state title. He pointed out, however, that all class "B" schools may elect to enter class "A" competition.

Mr. Winship forecast an increase of more than 100 contesting one-act groups under the "competition equalizing" revision. A total of 668 Texas schools enrolled last year for competition on the one-act play front, largest statewide "acting bee" in the nation.

STAR GAZING POPULAR AT UNIVERSITY

Star gazing was popular at The University of Texas even before the construction of the McDonald Observatory.

Some two hundred students enroll each year in the beginners' course taught by Professor E. G. Keller, director of the Student Observatory on the University Physics Building; and approximately sixty people visit the observatory on Tuesday nights, when it is open to the public, Dr. Keller said today.

Only six students were enrolled for astronomy when Dr. Keller came to the University in 1934, but the enrollment skyrocketed to 140 the following year and reached a peak of 255 three years later. The largest number of visitors to the observatory on any one Tuesday night was 1,500.

NYA Employment For Texas Studies

Part-time NYA employment will be offered University of Texas students again next year, V. I. Moore, dean of men, disclosed at Austin last week.

Earmarked on the \$100,000,000 rational bill approved recently by congress, the University's exact quota of available jobs will not be apportioned until about mid-August, Dean Moore added. Last year 713 NYA jobs were assigned at the University.

A recent report by the University student employment bureau revealed that "spare time" student earnings last year tripled that of the year before to reach a peak of \$121,000. Approximately 55 per cent of the student body earned all or part of their school expenses, he said.

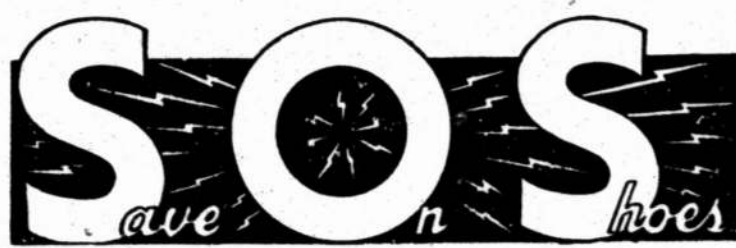
