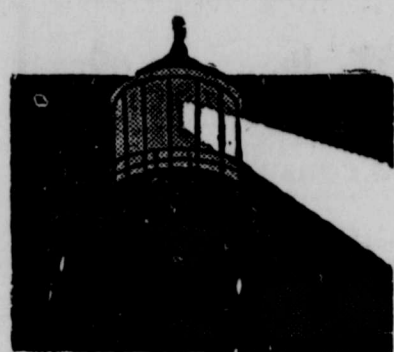

She kept house until last May when she fell and broke her hip. She goes in a wheel chair but can walk with a little help.

She and her husband raised two sons, four daughters and a granddaughter, whose mother was killed in a car wreck. The older son, Jack, died in 1958 of a heart attack. The others are V. W. of Monahans, Effie Vowell of Lovington, N. M., Leona Linam, Opal Channess of Loraine, Bonnie Miller of Lake Jackson, and the granddaughter, Lanette Smallwood of Lamesa.

She has 15 grandchildren and 21 great grandchildren. She keeps tabs on the offspring, watches T.V. in spite of a cataract removal for because of it, he has 20-20 vision and is an avid reader. She chats with the residents and loves company. She is a Democrat, a member of the Methodist Church, but will tell you she is as much a Baptist as she is a Methodist, so I guess that makes her a Diplomat.

Louis Rose Named On All-District Team

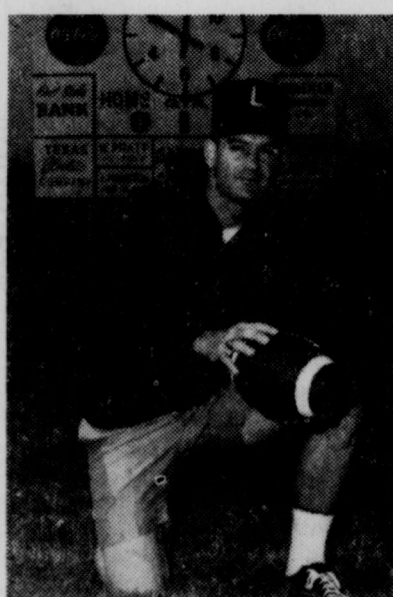
Louis Rose was named to the first defensive team on the All-District team as middle guard. Louis well deserved the honor as he finished the season with an average of 14 tackles per game.

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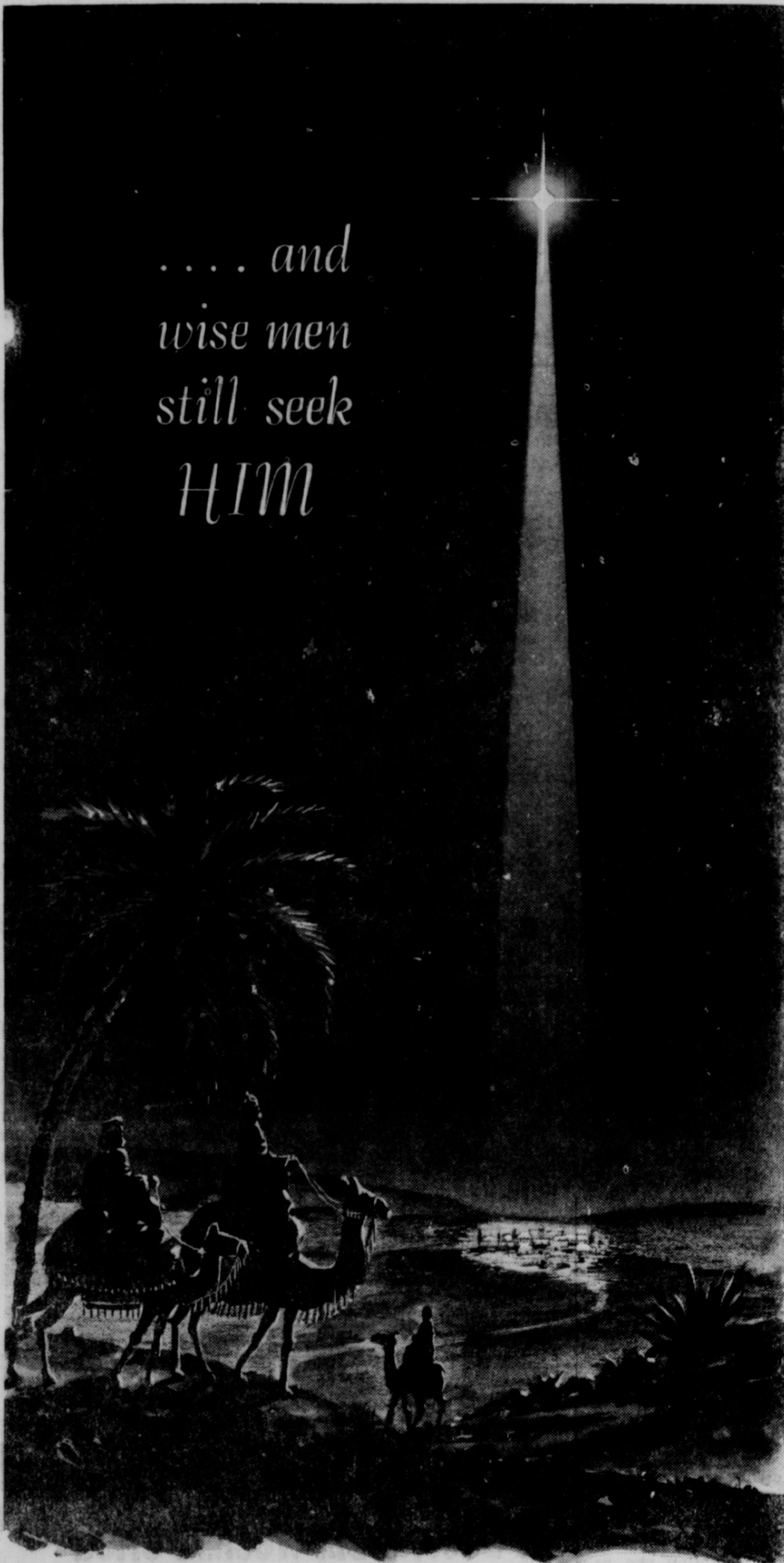
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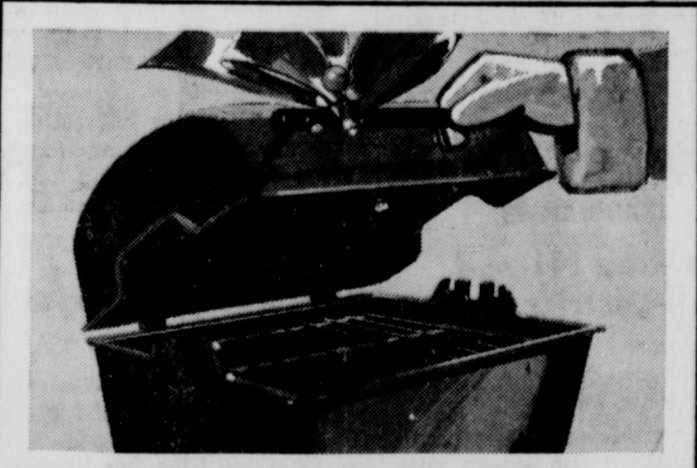
