"The disease can be controlled," the Ohio specialists say, "by sanitation and by liberal feeding of milk. The milk helps by producing acidity in the ceca and by stimulating rapid growth. The mash recommended by the University of California is this: Forty pounds of dry skim milk, 10 pounds of wheat bran, 30 pounds of yellow corn meal, 20 pounds of ground oats or barley.

"Start feeding this mash as soon as the presence of the disease is determined. Keep the mash constantly before the chicks in hoppers. The essential thing is to get sufficient milk into the chick and to keep the house and surroundings absolutely clean.

"Sick chicks should immediately be separated from healthy ones. Burn the dead ones."

More Than One Culling Is Essential in Year

Culling hens is the process of removing from the flock the undesirable, the object being to increase the average production of the flock and to retain for breeding purposes those which possess superior qualities. While the term culling is usually applied to hens during their laying period, successful poultrymen are constantly employing a system of culling, including the eggs selected for incubation, the young stock at broiler stage, the pullets just before they go into their winter laying quarters, and the males used as breeders. The greatest emphasis in the past has been placed on the laying flock on the basis that the best producers in the past will naturally be the best producers in the future.

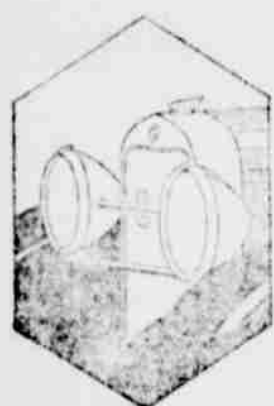

made it very late. He came from Mississippi last year. He likes Texas fine. Mr. Colvin is a fine man.

John A. Fulbright one of the pioneer farmers of the Vernon community was hauling his cotton to the gin. He has a large force of hands pulling bolls which keeps him very busy hauling the cotton from the field to the gin. Mrs.

Fulbright is very successful raising chickens and turkeys and she makes a nice profit each year from them.

D. L. Sandlin has been living in Haskell county the past two years. He is a progressive farmer with a large force cultivating a large farm in cotton. He has a fine milch cow and two good hogs. A number of chickens and turkeys were on the poultry yard looking fine. Walter Ellis of Hermit Valley Calif was visiting the Sandlin family.

H. Dominey came from Comanche

county last year. They are cultivating 250 acres in cotton. Worms and hot winds damaged the crop very badly. Mrs. Dominey has 150 hens which she says has almost paid their grocery bill this year.

J. W. Pritchett, Rhode Island Red Breeder and farmer had gone to the gin with a bale of cotton. He has some of the best Reds in the State. His birds took many prizes in the Haskell county fair and Judge C. P. Van Winkle of Dallas says his birds will take prizes in the state and national shows. He has spared no pains nor expense to get the best, knowing that you cannot raise good birds from poor ancestors. He knows the game.

Herbert Dippel is one of the leading farmers whose home we had never visited before but we were impressed with his nice home bred well-kept farm. He was pulling bolls when we called. He has cows, hogs and more than 100 red chickens. He will make plenty of feed to feed his stock another year.

O. A. Morgan a good farmer who will make feed to feed his stock next year is like most of the farmers in that his cotton crop is very short. They have a small flock of chickens which help out with the expenses.

W. W. Newton an old friend of ours had gone to Haskell. He is farming and has made a success at his vocation. He has a nice home and a good farm. He will make plenty of feed for his stock next year. He always plants a large acreage to row crop feed every year. He has some good cows, 5 good hogs and a flock of Plymouth Rock chickens.

Mrs. M. A. Schluter with her children is farming. She has a fair crop for the year. She will make enough feed for the ensuing year she has two good hogs and a fine flock of chickens.

Here we thought best to return to our home as it was getting late. The reason we have mentioned in our letter so much about the feed, hogs, cows and chickens is to give our readers first hand of what our friends are doing. We find that most of the farmers on Sagerton Route One will have enough feed to do them. This is better than more cotton and less feed.

We stopped a few moments with A. H. Kelley on our return. He was snatching the fleecy staple from the stalk.

This is his first year farming in Haskell county. He came from Erath county but likes Haskell county fine. He will be short some feed to make next years crop but is in fine spirits and is working hard to gather his crop.

Oct. 18, Sagerton Route 1

M. D. Thompson was engaged in gathering his cotton crop which is very good for the year. His crop was damaged badly from worms and hot winds but he will get by very nicely. His feed crop is fair and he will not have to buy any next year. He was reared on the farm he is now cultivating. He has plenty of cows and hogs for the needs of his family and has a nice flock of Red chickens. He gave us his check for the Free Press one year.

A. C. Dyson living on the old Austin Ranch who is cultivating 400 acres of ground will make 44 tons of maize besides a fine lot of young feed which will be banded later on. They have picked 13 bales of cotton and are waiting for it to open up before they pick any more cotton.

R. J. Weatherby living in the Flat Top community has lived around Sagerton for the past ten years. His crop was hailed out the 20th of June but he replanted his crop and it did nicely considering the year. He is making good feed and his cotton is late but if frost stays off for a few weeks longer he will make lots of cotton. He has White Wyandotte chickens and they are fine birds. He gave us his check for the Free Press for the year.

Fred Spitzer had gone to the gin with a bale of cotton. Fred always makes feed for his stock if any one makes it. He is feeding his stock with feed grown two years ago. He plants a large acreage to feed every year. Mrs. Spitzer has 47 fine Bronze Turkeys, lots of chickens. Fred has hogs and cows and always tries to make his living and sell the surplus.

Gus Mueller was away from home but we note a good poultry house which looks fine on the farm and we know that poultry well housed and fed will pay the bills.

M. E. Ross a good farmer had gone in the north part of the county. Mrs. Ross said they were about up with their picking for the present. They are cultivating 250 acres of land and have out 8 bales.

Claude Bland was away from home when we called at his home.

W. J. Earnest is now living on his farm south of Sagerton. He moved from Sagerton the first of the year and this is his first crop. He will make 30 tons of maize from 35 acres of ground and his cotton will make a fair crop for the year. He will make 15 bales from 55 acres. He fancies the game chickens and says they are best for the purpose. He has quite a number of fine Brown Leghorn hens. Mr. Earnest studies farming closely and is careful to use the best methods in cultivating.

R. Romm is a progressive young farmer living at home and boarding at the same place. His maize will make almost a ton to the acre this year. He says that his success in growing maize is having it thin on the ground which makes large well filled heads. There is good logic in this expression. He says that his cows and chickens pay his grocery bill and some times leaves him a nice little profit. He is milking three cows, selling cream and he has 200 White Wyandotte hens from which he sells eggs, the year round. He also has a nice bunch of turkeys and of course he raises his meat and lard.

Herman Nauert living near Flat Top is a thrifty farmer who is striving to earn a livelihood and is making good. This year his crop is very short but he says he will make enough feed to get by. He says the wolves are very destructive to his chickens and turkeys.

August Stremel a regular reader of the Free Press says this crop is the shortest crop since 1918 but that he will not have to buy any feed. He had some maize which will make three fourths of a ton to the acre. He has 6 fat hogs for his meat and 11 small ones which he will sell on the market later on. He has more than 300 laying

hens which contribute daily to the family till. He makes money on his cows and chickens. August will get by any way. He knows the game.

Emil Kainer is the next farmer on the route. We noticed a fine flock of Red Chickens. His boys said he had five good hogs and five good cows. He makes his living and cotton is sold as a surplus.

Albert Stremel the next farmer had gone to look after another one of his

farms and his daughters were house. They said Albert would all the feed he will need for next. His cotton will make a fair crop. are milking 3 good cows and a flock of laying hens. J. W. Clark was pulling bolls field beside the road in the best we had seen on Route One. The

patch of soil cotton which he dry planted early in the spring and the worms did not injure it so much. Mr. Clark is picking his own crop this fall. He has picked three bales and will soon have out the fourth one. He has more than 100 hens in his poultry yard. We closed our days work and set out for home.

This was a very profitable day with us, visiting some part of Haskell county we had never been over before. We enjoyed the work and found the people all in good spirits and more courteous class of farmers can not be found than live in Haskell county.

Friday October 19

Paul Klas has lived on his farm near Sagerton since the year 1921, coming from Hamilton to Sagerton. He is a good farmer who believes in making his living on the farm. He planted enough of his crop to feed to make enough to run his place next year. He has 3 good hogs and is milking 2 good cows and has a fine flock of Plymouth Rock chickens. He was helping his family pick his cotton crop.

O. E. Wendeborn a young farmer living on the Klas farm is through heading maize and will soon be through picking cotton. He expects to move near Old Glory next year.

Tom Beene living near Flat Top school house on Sagerton Route 1 was called on. His crop was hauled out in June and he replanted his cotton which makes it very late. He has not picked any cotton yet. His father W. M. Beene of Bunker Hill was visiting him.

A. Hagerman a progressive farmer was our next stop. He is interested in poultry. He has lived in Haskell county eight years and has been farming all the while. He has five head of

hogs, three cows and will make eight bales of cotton. His crop was hauled out in June and it was planted over which makes it a little late.

H. Lehrman was busy picking cotton and we met his young son Herbert who is a fine little man. Mr. Lehrman owns more than 400 acres of fine land which he farms. He has lived in Haskell county 23 years. He provides well for his home has a good residence, barn and out buildings with a number of hogs and cows and more than 100 laying hens. Herbert and his sister Miss Lydia have 10 fine turkeys which they call their own and will sell them on the market later on.

J. W. Burrow is living on his farm south of Sagerton in a new residence he built this year. But he expects to move back to Sagerton this winter. He has lived in this city before and he is going back home. Mrs. Burrow gave us a good dinner which we enjoyed very much. Also Mr. Burrow gave us his check for his renewal to the Free Press. He is a habitual reader of our paper. We appreciate the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Burrow while in their home.

P. Havermen had returned from the gin and was pulling bolls. He has lived in Haskell county 20 years and is a progressive farmer. He also has his land terraced which he believes helped him in the production of cotton and feed. He has out 5 bales of cotton but will have to buy some feed.

Mrs. Louise Holle with the help of her son is farming and she has been fairly successful. She will make plenty of feed and is now picking her cotton. She has two good hogs and a good milch cow and plenty of work stock. She will move near Rule next year where she will farm.

A. C. Teigleman was repairing a house on his farm. He is progressive and keeps his farm and buildings neat and

up-to-date. He has his cotton crop he raised last year still unsold and he will make a fine feed crop this year.

Edwin Kruger owns a good farm south of Sagerton and he is a fine worker. He has out six bales of cotton and he and the family have picked all of it themselves. He has some maize he grew last year and with that he will have enough feed to run his farm next year. He has 150 hens which with some good cows pays the grocery bill.

B. Ruppert has lived on the farm where he now resides for the past six years. He is a up-to-date farmer and is making good. He has lots of feed about 150 Red hens and some good milk cows selling eggs and cream to help with the family expenses. He has out 6 bales of cotton and has quite a number of hands in his field pulling bolls. He has put up lots of bundle feed for his stock. He gave us his check for the Free Press for a year.

F. Nierdieck had gone to Stamford and his wife had accompanied him and the children were at home. Mr. Nierdieck owns quite a lot of good land and his crops are as good as the average of his neighbors. He has five good hogs, 4 cows and 150 hens which will help pay the family expenses. Misses Alma and Clara, their two daughters are attending high school at Sagerton. This family reads the Free Press.

A. C. Knipping was busy pulling bolls and we did not disturb him. He is one of our energetic young farmers and is working hard to make his mark in the world as a good farmer. Mrs. Knipping says that her fine Rhode Island hens are dying from some cause, she sells lots of eggs and has 2 good cows from which they sell some cream part of the year. They have hogs for their meat and lard another year.

R. C. Sanderson a good farmer living near the city of Sagerton was away from home when we called at his place. We noticed a lot of fine Rhode Island Red chickens some turkeys and a good hog. Clarence is a good worker.

This closed our visits to the homes of Sagerton Route One which took us almost a week to work out. There lives on this Route many of Haskell county's best farmers. They are lucky as most of them have enough feed to feed their teams to make the 1929 crop.

There is a vast lot of difference in the farmers of Haskell county now and 13 years ago when we first began to make our visits for the Free Press to the Rural communities. The farmers are looking to diversification much more at this time and they do not depend so much on cotton. The hens and the cows are making the farmer independent. They are the means of support with many families and they have other crops for profit. Watch Haskell county farmers go forward in the next ten years. Yes, more than they have in the past twelve.

THE VOICE OF BRYAN

This is William Jennings Bryan speaking. It is Madison Square Garden in 1924, with the "religion" plank of the platform under debate—his "last word" to a convention of his party. Mr. Bryan said:

"In this country it is not necessary to protect any church. I have such confidence in the Catholic Church, which was 1500 years my mother church as well as yours, that I deny it needs political aid. It was the Catholic Church that took our religion from its founders and preserved it—it was the only custodian for over 15 centuries. When it did this for Catholics it did it for me and every protestant. The Catholic Church, with its legacy of martyr's blood and with the testimony of its long line of missionaries who went into every land, does not need a great party to protect it from a million Klansmen."

"The Jews do not need this resolution. They have Elijah, and they have Elisha, who drew back the curtain and revealed upon the mountain tops an unveiled host greater than a thousand Ku Klux Klans. The Catholic Church and House of Israel have their great characters today who plead for respect for them whose pleading is not in vain."

"I am not willing to bring discord into my party. The Democratic party is united on all the economic issues. We have never been so united since I have known politics, and nobody has had more reason than I to regret past discord. Now, when we are united and face our political foes with dauntless courage, and with enthusiasm never excelled, these people tell us that we must turn aside from this titanic task, divide our party on a religious issue and cease to be a great political force."

"The Democratic party has never taken the side of one church against the other; the Democratic party must remain true to its traditions; it cannot surrender its rights to exist; it cannot be false to the mission that it had in the days of Jefferson, to which it remained true in the days of Jackson and to which it was still loyal in the days of Woodrow Wilson."

"My last objection is that I am not willing to divide the Christian Church, because if it is destroyed there is nothing to take its place. We must stand together to fight our battles of religion against materialism."

"There is only one who can bring peace to the world, that is the Prince of Peace—the One at whose coming the Angels sang, 'On earth peace, good will toward men.'"

"Jew and Gentile, Catholic and Protestant stand for God, on whom all religion rests, and Protestant and Catholic stand for the Christ. It is possible that now, when Jesus—the hope of the world—is more needed than ever before—is it possible that at this time, in this great land, we are to have religious warfare? Are you willing to start a blaze that may cost innumerable lives, sacrificed on the altar of religious prejudice? I cannot believe it; God forbid; I call you back in the name of our party. I call you back in the name of the Son of God and Savior of the world. Christians, stop fighting, let us get together and save the world from the materialism that robs life of its spiritual values. Banish the 'Hymns of Hate'; our song must be 'Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love.'"

We print this portion of Mr. Bryan's notable speech on that memorable occasion, solely for the reason that many of those Democrats who are now opposing the Democratic nominee for President are citing Mr. Bryan as the inspiration of their opposition, invoking his memory as counsel and guide in bolting the ticket."

Never was there a more eloquent and fervent denunciation of religious prejudice in politics than that which William Jennings Bryan delivered in Madison Square Garden. Never was there heard a more impressive warning than was conveyed in his words on that occasion: 'Divide our party on a religious issue and cease to be a great political force. And it applies with 1928 than it did in 1924.'

We commend to those misguided Democrats who profess adherence to the principles of the dead Democratic leader and who now summon his spirit to sustain their mistaken course, a reading of Mr. Bryan's declaration, as above quoted. Those who have not read it need the enlightenment it conveys; those who have need to be reminded of its undeniable truth.—Jackson, Miss. News

The evening shadows were gathering and we turned our journey toward home. Wednesday Oct. 17, 1923

We began the day at the home of J. J. Jeter of Center Point, a pioneer farmer of that section who always makes a living farming. He is doing jury service in Haskell this week. He will make plenty of feed for the next year. He always plants enough of his land in feed to supply the farm. He has a force picking cotton and his cotton is as good as any in the county. Mr. Jeter reads the Free Press and sends it to his daughter who lives in Lamar county, Texas.

Joe W. Davis was busy cutting feed with a row binder. Joe likes to hear machinery hum. His crop is very short this year, because of boll worms and hot winds.

W. C. Storrs and his family were busy pulling bolls. His crop is as good as that of his neighbors but they are all short. He believes he has enough feed to get by for next year. He has three good cows, five hogs, some chickens and turkeys. His son has some fine White Leghorns in a pen from which he is going to raise a fine flock next year.

J. F. Jeter of Center Point on whose farm the Jeter oil well is located was at the well when we reached his home. The promoters of the well are planning to begin work again on this well and were expecting the casing every moment while we were there. They have overhauled all the rigs and will set new casing this week. Mr. Jeter owns a good farm. He has his ground planted to cotton and row crop feed. He will make enough feed to fatten his hogs and run the farm another year.

T. H. Briden owns a good farm where he and one of his sons are farming. Mrs. Briden says she has two milk cows which makes them a living and she fancies the old Plymouth Rock chickens and she has a nice flock.

R. T. Jeter was in the field pulling bolls, he is reported to have 500 Leghorn hens, which if well looked after will make a nice profit after keeping the family up through egg production.

W. C. Parson living near Center Point is a young farmer busily engaged in gathering his cotton and feed. He does not think he will make quite enough feed to feed his teams next year. He has two good cows and a nice flock of Buff Orpington chickens.

C. L. Tidrow a good farmer is helping J. M. Tyler gather his cotton and was not at home when we called.

A Trip to California

(Continued From Last Week)

Friday night of September the 7th found us in Long Beach as our last week's letter stated. Here we spent the night in a good hotel getting a good night's rest. The only disturbance was J. O. Jackson and Charlie Davis trying to see which could tell the biggest yarn.

Saturday morning we found a street car going toward the beach and we loaded on having in mind a trip to the Catalina Island. This island is 28 miles out from the shore at Long Beach and we took passage on the small steamer, Catalina (named for the island) and were soon on our way.

The water was smooth that morning and the sun was shining brightly and we glided over the surface so nicely that we hardly knew we were moving. It was not long until we were out of sight of land which makes a boat look mighty small compared to the plains of Texas.

On this trip we got to see the flying fish which are quite numerous. They pop up out of the water when disturbed by the boat and fly about fifty yards and then duck back into the water. They look to be about three feet long with two wings on either side with a long thin body. They do not resemble a fish very much. But that's what they called them.

We arrived at the island about 12 o'clock and it was the first time in our life that we were ever off the mainland. It was also the case with many of our party. Some of the boys were a little seasick coming over, but personally we felt fine.

This island which is called Catalina is 22 miles long and from one-fourth to seven and one-half miles wide. It is extremely mountainous. In fact it is nothing but the top of a mountain sticking up out of the Pacific Ocean. Its highest peak is Mount Orizaba which is 2111 feet above sea level. This entire island is owned by Wm. Wrigley the Cheung Kong Manufacturer and it is he that plies the steamers Catalina and Avalon from Long Beach to this island. This is a great place of resorts, bathing, boating, fishing, golf, tennis, mountain climbing, horse back riding, excursion by water to many points of interest. Also they have a scenic drive up the mountain side by auto which is thrilling and a great sight seeing trip.

On the hillside between St. Catherine Hotel and the town is a Spanish tower containing the Catalina Cathedral Chimes, which ring every quarter-hour and are also played every time a steamer comes in. This was erected by Mrs. Wm. Wrigley.

We took the trip through the submarine gardens on the glass bottomed boat looking into the depth of more than 100 feet in the clear blue water of the great Pacific. Here we saw shell incrustated rocks, fishes of red green and gold. Great trees of sea kelp with long branches waving as on land by a tempest. (from this potash is made.) A lecturer on the boat described the things we were passing over and viewing in the depths of the ocean. A native of the island gave an exhibition of diving which we saw through the glass bottom of the boat and it was said of him that he could stay under water for three minutes. He had his eyes open as we could see every feature of his face at considerable depth and all the party enjoyed this very much. There is a base ball diamond on the island where the Chicago Cubs train for the season each year.

Big game fishing is the greatest sport

with many people who frequent the island. The leaping Tuna weighing from 80 to 250 pounds is said to be the hardest fighting fish known which is caught by rod and reel and is only found in these waters in season from May to October.

The sword fish weighing from 100 to 350 pounds is another fish that makes the line and reel sing. The season for these fish is from June to December. There are hundreds of all kinds of fish which we will not here take time to mention which can be found ready to take the bait at all seasons of the year and the fellow who likes to fish can enjoy a trip and a stay on this noted island.

This island was discovered in 1542 when Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo a Portuguese navigator sailing under the Spanish flag anchored in the Avalon Bay. He named the island after one of his small ships La Victoria. In 1602 Sebastian Viscaino retraced Cabrillo's steps and dropped anchor in the same spot just off the shore of Santa Catalina and the island acquired the name by which it is now known. This island was purchased by Wm. Wrigley in 1919 and since that time Wrigley has made it a beautiful resort.

Wm. Wrigley has a beautiful home on the island and also Lane Grey the novelist has a home on the island. Both of these buildings are in sight of the boat landing.

We will not take any more time in the description and history, but will say that our trip to the island was one of much joy and inspiration. At noon lunch we called for fish thinking in the midst of the ocean that fish would be the diet we should eat. They proved to be boiled fish. I had read one in the old Blue-Back Speller about boiled fish, but never tried to eat any before. And I don't think I will tackle it any more. I do not like them. J. O. Jackson who had been eating White Leghorn eggs for several years did not relish boiled fish either. We never did learn what C. O. Davis ate he never would say.

After watching the bathing beauties from the cradle to 75 years of age until we tired and walked the town from one end to the other and that was not very far, we sat down and waited our return to the mainland with patience. At last the gong sounded and then the return trip was announced, so we boarded the small steamer and were soon on the way to the main land.

The sea which was very smooth that morning had changed to one of most choppy seas in twenty-five years according to one of the pilots. The under tow was something fierce and this trip on the rough sea made us sick and with such severity that it looked like we might feed the fish every few moments, but at last we ran into smooth water when we got near the shore and we began to feel better and by the time we had taken the car ride from the beach to the hotel in Long Beach where we spent the night before we were feeling fine. We engaged our same bed for the night and had a good night's rest.

Next week we will give the trip up the coast line to Petaluma, which is known as the Egg Basket of the world. We will tell about Petaluma in our itinerary before very long. The Sunday trip up the coast line was very interesting journey and we will tell of the sights along the way in next week's paper. We passed through San Francisco on our way to Petaluma.

E. C. Watson of Post was in the city Saturday and stated that their school began last Monday, but that the attendance is light because of the cotton picking. The other two teachers are Miss Veda Newcomb of the Rockdale community and Miss Vada Cole of Tye, Texas, which is in Taylor county near Merkel. These teachers will make a good team and they are going forward with greater anticipation than ever before. Mr. Watson has taught at Post for 12 years.

Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Button of Rule were in the city Saturday shopping. Mrs. Button says that she has a fine flock of Leghorn hens, but they are not laying as much as they should. This is doubtless because of the scarcity of green feed which is not very plentiful during the dry hot days. If the hens are kept free from insects and given plenty of good feed and some leaf scraps with some kind of green feed they should pay their keeps with profit. Mr. Button gave his check for renewal to the Free Press for a year.

G. S. Medford of Howard was in the city Saturday. He stated that he was tired from chasing the little cotton on his farm. He says the cotton crop is very short down his way.

DOSING FAILS TO DESTROY VERMIN

Reported by the United States Department of Agriculture

Many farmers and poultrymen have believed it possible that certain chemicals administered as medicine or mixed with feed or water may protect their animals from external parasites, insects and unsavory dealers, particularly in the poultry business, have played on this belief. The prevailing idea is that the material is taken up by the blood and then excreted on the surface. Many believe that the parasites are either poisoned in this way, or else that a condition is induced which makes the fowl disgusting to its parasites and causes them to leave. Vendors of nostrums have sold liquids, tablets and powders for use in this way. The insecticide authorities in the United States Department of Agriculture have issued warnings against these remedies, and in many cases have forced the makers to cease advertising and selling the frauds.

In Technical Bulletin 90-T, "Ineffectiveness of Internal Medication of Poultry for the Control of External Parasites," just off the press, departmental investigators give the results of experiments on which they based their opinion to this effect. In approximately 50 tests of the preparation advertised none showed any indications of value against the common external parasites with which the fowls were infested. Lice and mites survived and multiplied as they might have been expected to do if the "medication" had not been administered. These tests were the basis of the campaign against the frauds.

In addition, the department carried out tests with a considerable number of other chemicals in addition to those mentioned by analysis of these "vermin eradicators." Chemicals tested included magnesium sulphate or epsom salt, sodium carbonate, naphthalene, calcium dihydrophosphate, calcium sulphide, magnesium oxide, sodium sulphate, potassium nitrate, ferrous oxide, ferrous sulphate, ferrous sulphate, potassium telluride, diethyl disulfide, sodium nitrate, tartar emetic, potassium iodide, sulphur flowers, capsicum, gentian, ginger, fennel, garlic, camphor, powdered tobacco, quinine, nux vomica, and others.

In no case was there conclusive evidence of any benefit from dosage. The ticks, lice, mites, and fleas were not eradicated. Furthermore, there is grave danger in giving certain internal medicines to healthy fowls, as their vitality may be decreased to such an extent that the parasites find them an easier prey than they would have been had no doses been administered.

The conclusion of the investigators is that "the use of internal medicines against external parasites is detrimental to the poultry industry in that it not only involves useless expenditures but allows the parasites to continue their ravages when they might be destroyed by recognized methods."

Fowl raisers who desire to review for themselves the evidence against the nostrums may obtain Technical Bulletin 90-T free, with the supply of eggs, by replying to the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

Poultry Hints

Keep the pullets growing if they are to produce winter eggs. This means keeping the mash hoppers filled.

More profitable summer egg production will be obtained in flocks that are given continual access to grain and mash rations.

If shade is provided for the poultry a mash hopper should be placed within easy reach. The birds will range during the morning and late afternoon.

When new oats and wheat arrive from the threshing machine there is always a temptation to overfeed the birds on the new grains before getting them used to them. This practice often results in heavy losses.

Chickens appreciate good shade and fresh water this time of the year.

Sweet or sour skim milk brings big returns when fed to either young or old poultry.

Feed mash to hens right through the summer. It will increase the egg production and profit.

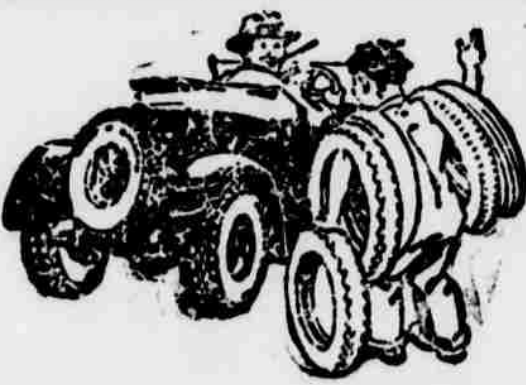

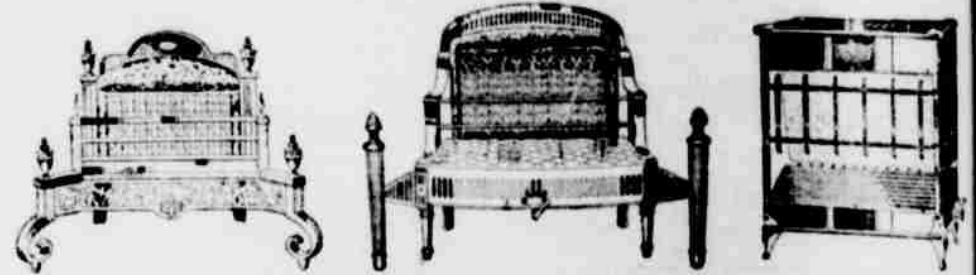

An indictment charging assault with intent to murder was returned by the Grand Jury last week against Geo. C. Calvert alias Blackie McGowan.

The indictment was returned in connection with a shooting affray on the highway north of Weinert on the afternoon of July 25th, when Edward Smith of San Benito was wounded when occupants of a passing car fired into the car in which Smith was riding.

An indictment charging the same offense had been previously returned against Calvert under the alias of McGowan, and he has been held in the county jail for several months awaiting trial on the charge.

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR O'BRIEN PIONEER

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church at O'Brien Sunday for G. Rader, 82, pioneer citizen of this section.

Mr. Rader had lived in Haskell county for more than 30 years and owned farm property adjoining the city of O'Brien. He is survived by his widow and 10 children and has more than 70 relatives in this section. The Masonic order of which he had been a member for many years, was in charge of the burial service.

GRAND JURY INDICTS NEGRO FOR MURDER

Jack Bradley, negro, was charged with murder in an indictment returned by the Grand Jury last week, in connection with the killing of Sam Jackson, negro, on the night of Oct. 9th. The killing occurred on the Tom Price farm near Weinert, and Bradley is alleged to have beaten Jackson to death with an axe following a quarrel started while they were gambling. Bradley was arrested the next day by Sheriff Al Cousins, and is being held in the county jail awaiting trial on the charge of murder.

FATHER AND SON KILLED IN SHOOTING AT ROCHESTER

POSSE 150 MEN SEARCHING FOR WILL FRITZ CONNECTION WITH DOUBLE CRIME

D. W. Hamilton and his son Earle, living 1 1/2 miles southeast of Rochester were shot to death at their home Wednesday night about 10:30 o'clock. Will Fritz of Rochester is being sought by officers in connection with the double killing.

Mrs. Hamilton reported that a man called her son out of the house and engaged him in a conversation relating to a liquor case in which Fritz figures in District Court. She heard her son say, "I told them I got it from you" and then a shot rang out, she says.

The father then ran to the door and also was shot down, one bullet from a revolver piercing his heart. Both men were killed instantly.

The Hamilton family were asleep when someone came to the front of the place and called. Mrs. Hamilton answered the visitor, who replied, "I want to see Earle Hamilton."

"Who are you?" Mrs. Hamilton asked. The visitor then is said to have given the name of Will Fritz. The father and son got up and after a short conversation with the man two shots were fired. Each man was killed instantly, the father falling on the porch and the son a few steps away in the yard.

Sheriff Al Cousins was notified and a posse of 150 men, headed by Haskell, Rochester and Rule officers, was immediately organized and spent the night searching for the fugitive. No trace of him had been reported Thursday morning. He is said to have left the scene of the killing in an Overland automobile, and officers throughout this section have been notified of the crime and furnished with a description of the killer.

Fritz is charged in District court with the sale of intoxicating liquor, his case having been called Monday of this week, but was continued. Young Earle Hamilton is said to be a witness against him in this case. Both the men slain, as well as Fritz, were here Monday
