NEW CONCERNS NOW OPEN FOR BUSINESS.

Elsewhere in this issue is found the advertisements of the Borden Ice Company, and the O.S.T. Cafe, announcing the opening of their respective lines of business.

While E. R. Borden, owner of the new ice plant has been here several months in active charge of the construction of the plant, it was not until last Saturday that ice made in the new plant was offered the public, although ice has been kept on hand for sale practically all the time, some being made by the old plant, later the ice was brought in by truck to meet the light local demand, after the old plant was dismantled.

The new ice plant is a credit to a town of 5,000 inhabitants. Its total capacity for one freezing is twenty tons, which gives the plant a daily capacity of ten tons, which can be "pulled" every day without interruption.

A large storage vault is provided in order that the peak demands can be taken care of and also for storage for light demand, when it is not necessary to operate the plant constantly.

Every modern facility for the manufacture of clean, pure ice of the highest quality has been provided. The two large condensers, as well as all pumps and other machinery are electrically operated.

In as much as the owner invites the concern's customers and prospective customers to visit the plant, it will be well worth while for any one to do so, that they may see the careful attention to every detail in making the highest quality of ice, as well as see the modern equipment in the plant.

C. O. DeLong and wife, formerly of San Marcos, are in Junction to make their home, and Mr. DeLong will operate a cafe business here. The new business will open today, as noted by the ad. appearing elsewhere.

Mr. DeLong states that he has spent several years in the cafe business, and that he thoroughly understands the game.

Mrs. DeLong is a niece of Editor Buckner of the San Marcos Record.

This new enterprise is located in the A. L. Bartley building, the second door east of Mr. Bartley's barber shop.

F. E. Garrett, partner with H. E. Butt of Kerrville, and local manager of the local firm of Butt & Garrett, was in Brady practically all last week where his firm opened a new business under the Piggly Wiggly plan.

Saturday, the opening day, the firm did a business of over \$2,000. Mr. Garrett stated Monday morning just before leaving for Brady for a couple of days, that the sales exceeded their expectations and that from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. the store, which is 30x90 feet, was crowded to capacity.

The very latest regulation Piggly Wiggly fixtures were installed and several operators of this chain store organization and a large number of factory representatives were present, and expressed the opinion that the store was one of the completest and most up-to-date of any in the country and the opening was one of the most successful that had been witnessed.

In addition to various samples in large quantities given away by factory representatives the firm gave a \$1.25 package of merchandise with each \$5 purchase and distributed more than 1,500 balloons among the children as souvenirs.

JUNCTION MAN DIES SATURDAY MORNING.

David Frederick Goben, born at Moorsville, Missouri, December 22, 1852, died at his home in Junction, shortly after 10 o'clock Saturday morning, after an illness of about a week.

In 1871, Mr. Goben came to Texas. On September 4, 1883, he married Miss Elmira Hart, in Lampasas County. In 1904, the family moved to this county where deceased and two of the children have since made their home, while two other children have been living in Ft. Worth for several years.

Deceased was a member of the I.O.O.F. Lodge for more than thirty years, and his fellow members of this fraternal organization had charge of the burial rites Sunday, when the remains were laid to rest in the local cemetery. He was a member of the Baptist Church and was faithful in attendance although far advanced in years and not in good health.

During his many years in Junction he has worked at his trade as a blacksmith and general repair man, and recently changed locations, and has been busy installing an up-to-date machine shop.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Baptist Church, by his pastor, Rev. J. A. Dekle.

He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. A.B. Hodges of Junction, and three sons, D. L. and L. W. of Fort Worth and D. E. of Junction.

NO EXCUSE FOR RECK- LESS AUTO DRIVING.

There is one piece of foolhardy conduct that should be looked after and kept down to the minimum by both officers and citizens so far as is possible. We are referring to reckless driving of automobiles either in town or on the public highways. Just a week or so back Richard Vehle had his car parked along the roadside repairing a casing and a high-powered car dashed into his. The driver was later arrested and charged with the theft of the car in which he was riding. Sunday the writer drove to a local meat market, parked the car at the curb and entered the place of business, and upon turning saw a topless Ford come swerving and swishing down the street with the driver—a Mexican we took it to be—hitting it up like a drunk en Indian. In passing a car he came near bumping into our car that was parked, then cut the other way, forced a Ford roadster carrying two young men to quit the road, jump a ditch and head into a fence, in order to avoid a disastrous wreck with the slop souped highway tornado aforesaid Mexican. If such capers were punished by thirty-days on the public road making little rocks out of larger ones, while the summer sun beams down good and proper, it would tend to eliminate some of it. After a human life has been exacted as a toll for such stunts it is too late. We say stick these human life jeopardizers to the limit and they are not all Mexicans. Neither has this section a monopoly on the specie.—Menard Messenger.

HOMES THAT PRODUCE BIG BUSINESS LEADERS.

In the current Magazine is an article on "The Kind of Parents Our Big Business Men Had." Mr. Roger Babson picked out fifty representative men, bankers, manufacturers, and other business executives and sent them the following six questions: 1. Did you have a praying father, a praying mother, or both? 2. Do you believe there is some Power higher than human power? 3. Do you feel that we need help from it? 5. Do you ever pray? 6. Has this feeling of responsibility influenced your life?

Of the fifty men on the list, thirty definitely answered "yes" to the questions asked them. Mr. Babson himself stated that practically every big business man of his unusually wide acquaintance has had a praying father, a praying mother, or both. He quotes D. Russell H. Conwell, who investigated the percentage of over 4,000 American millionaires and found that all of them except 20 began as poor boys. Mr. Babson refers, too, to a professor in Indiana University who made a study of the names in a recent volume of "Who's Who in America," and found that preachers—in proportion to their numbers—fathered 2,400 as many eminent persons as did the unskilled laborers, who stand at the other end of the scale. The preachers fathered 35 times as many eminent persons as did the farmers; 4 times as many as did the business men; and twice as many as the doctors, lawyers, and other professional men. Ten years ago this same professor investigated 70 leaders in business and found that all of those 70 men had praying fathers and mothers and that 24 of them were sons of preachers, teachers and farmers.

Mr. Babson himself added this very interesting comment: "I have not been able to find a single great and useful institution which has not been founded by either an intensely religious man or by the son of a praying father or a praying mother. I have made this statement before the chambers of commerce of all the largest cities of the country, and have asked them to bring forward a case that is an exception to this rule. Thus far I have not heard of a single one."—Clipped

HITTING MAIL ORDER GENT IN SOFT SPOT.

Ofttimes local dealers advertise their merchandise with their prices compared with mail order house prices in parallel columns. The price, in every instance, of the mail order merchandise, with carriage added, is greater than the delivered price of the local dealers' offering.

Here is the proper method of combatting the mail order gentlemen: meeting them on their own ground and vanquishing their specious arguments and comparative prices.

It has always been the Dublin Progress' belief that no merchant who cared to take the time and trouble to study mail order methods need fear mail order competition. The dealer-by-mail is at every disadvantage, including the chiefest of all—lack of personal contact, the trump card of the local merchant. The great Chicago firms have built their business on two cardinal principles—price and service. As to the service, the utmost stretching of a point in order that a customer may be pleased, there is no doubt; the mail order gentlemen go out of their way to serve.

But the local dealer, with the advantage of personal contact, can if he will, give this same glad and cheerful attention to customer needs and complaints, and do it as if it were a personal favor. In the matter of price, he has nothing at all to fear from the mail merchant providing he takes the trouble to educate his potential customers by the proper sort of advertising, such as the parallel price comparisons mentioned here.

Civic loyalty, of course, should prompt a man to buy in his home town. If that isn't

enough, it is the merchant's task to show him wherein he can serve his own selfish interest best by home buying. Mail order merchandise is not as cheap in the end as the home purchased kind; but the average customer needs to be shown.—Dublin Progress.

LIVESTOCK DEALS

Delivery of 879 yearling steers sold by Harold B. Opp and Ed Roe, Menard County ranchmen, to a Mr. Holland of Fort Worth, was completed in San Angelo Friday night. The cattle were shipped to Fort Worth. Forty dollars a head was paid for the high grade, dehorned, white faced animals.

Ragland Brothers bought 400 top mutton goats from a Mr. Asher of Menard County for \$4.50. Delivery was made last week.

Martin & Co. shipped 500 mutton sheep to Fort Worth for Monday market. Price received was not known here Tuesday when Mr. Martin left for a month's business trip to South Texas, for the Intermediate Credit Bank.

Later a report was received that the muttons averaged 92 pounds and brought \$8.25, while the yearlings averaged 65 lbs. and brought 10 cents. The mutton market was about 50c off the day of the sale.

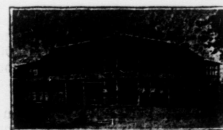

Occasionally some one takes a lot of valuable time to tell us how to run The Eagle, all of which we appreciate, and after they are gone we wonder why they go on year after year in their line of business, when they have such an outstanding ability as a newspaper manager. Salter Brothers, owners of the Mountain Sun, one of the best weekly newspapers in Texas, have secured the services of Bob Bennett, until last week sporting editor of the San Antonio Evening News, who will hereafter be city editor of the Sun. Mr. Bennett is one of the best reporters in the southwest and it is certainly a feather in the caps of the Sun's wide-awake editors to have secured his services. It is often the case that the large papers comb the fields and pick up promising newspaper men from the country weeklies, but it is out of the ordinary for a country weekly to take a high calibre man from one of the larger dailies, and The Eagle congratulates The Sun on its ability to keep ahead of the very rapid growth of their little city.

GRASS HOPPER CONTROL.

Grass hoppers promise to do damage again to cotton and other young crops this season. R. R. Reppert, entomologist of the extension service of Texas A. & M. College, announces the following formula for their control, the quantity being sufficient for five acres:

Wheat bran (avoid shorts), 25 pounds; white Arsenic (or Paris Green) 1 pound; Amyl acetate, 1 ounce; cane molasses, (avoid cane syrup), 2 quarts; water in quantity as suggested below.

Thoroughly mix the poison and bran dry; dilute the molasses and amyl acetate with about two gallons of water and thoroughly mix with the bran; add more water and mix, until a thoroughly wet mash has been obtained, yet not sloppy. It should fall apart easily when sowing, so that it breaks up into particles not larger than the small finger nail at the largest. A good test is to squeeze a handful tightly, if of proper consistency, the water will ooze out between the fingers, but not run out in streams; it is important to thoroughly mix after each addition of water, to secure an even distribution of all the materials.

Only high grade amyl acetate should be used. Avoid bronzing liquids, which contain so great a portion of other substances as to be repellant to hoppers. Where high grade amyl acetate can not be obtained, use six lemons or oranges with the 25 pounds of bran; squeeze the juice into the water, grind the rinds through a fine meat chopper and add to the water also, and then mix; it is important to include the rinds and to chop finely as advised. Merely cutting up with a knife will not do; the quantity named in the formula should cover five acres.

Do not put this in piles; the mash should be sown broadcast like sowing seeds.

The hoppers feed in the morning; make up the mash in the evening, let stand overnight, and sow in the early morning over the places where the hoppers are hatching, or if poisoning has been delayed until damage is done to the crops, the crop area should be sown well beyond the place where damage is being done.

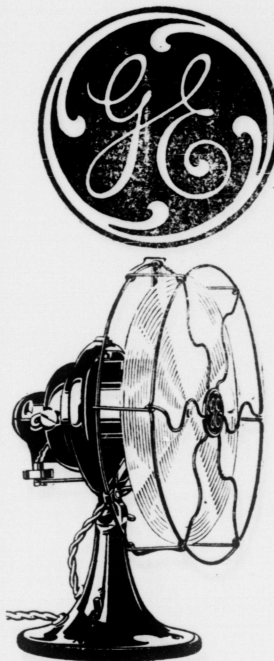

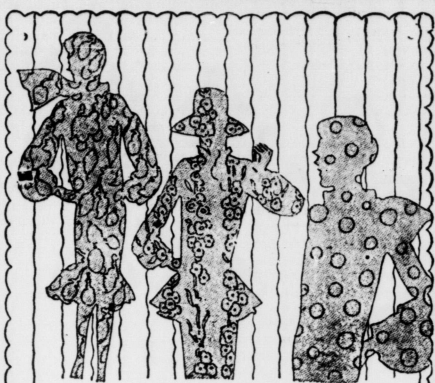

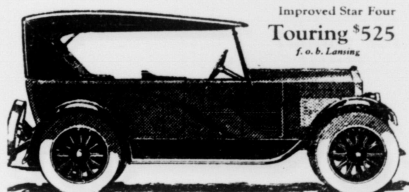

THE SACRED HEARTH

The queen of Roumania recalls a beautiful legend of the sacredness of the hearth among the people of Europe, a legend as old as the history of the primitive people of the north country, "who in the love of nature held communion with her visible forms," as Bryant expresses the thought in Thanatopsis; a legend that persists even to the present day and finds expression in the unwritten laws of hospitality.

It is that the hearth is sacred, and all gathered about the open fire place are safe in times of turbulence. Moreover, it is considered a talisman that gives protection, as long as he remains in the household, even to the bitterest enemy who touches the sacred hearth. By this law, Sigmund the Norseman, took refuge in the house

of his enemy, Hunding, and loved his sister.

The Israelites appointed a city of refuge which, if reached even by a murderer, afforded him protection from the avenger. Among the Bedouins the traveler is safe from harm the moment he has tasted salt in the tent of the Arab, but his host is free to follow and to rob him, when the salt has lost its savor. Christians partake of the broken body of Jesus symbolically.

There are many superstitions centered about the fireplace in all countries and in all times. For example, if salt is cast into the fire the bird of ill omen, the screech owl, will cease her plaint. In the glow of the log fire the householder may indulge his fancy with moving pictures of imps and goblins almost real as they dance in subconscious memories.

The Campfire Girls foster the same spirit.

In the olden days bread was baked on the hearth, and all who broke bread together became everlasting friends. The sacred family altar has gone with the fireplace. Our young people do not like to stay at home after dinner any longer. The "household gods" are offended.

HIGH LINE REACHES MASON WEDNESDAY.

The high line of the West Texas Utilities Company which has been under construction from Menard for the past several months was brought into Mason Wednesday and connected up with the local sub-station erected last week. The sub-station being used at present is only temporary and as soon as the proper transformer can be secured the permanent sub-sta-

tion will be used, the station now being under construction.

The amount of voltage of the present transformer controls twenty-two hundred volts, but later on the high line will carry sixty thousand volts, and even now the public is warned against becoming in contact with it in any manner.

When the current was turned on from the high line Wednesday, it was the beginning of twenty-four hour current for Mason. The current is being transmitted from San Angelo. —Mason County News.

Great Personages of the Bible

By

Miriam

MIRIAM was the sister of Moses. She impresses the reader of her biography as a woman of unusual strength of character, shrewd and brilliant. As a very little girl she first attracted attention by accomplishing what would ordinarily be considered an impossible achievement. The Egyptians were at war with the Israelites. They desired to prevent further enlargement of the population of Israel, and therefore decreed that every male child should be exterminated as soon as he was born. This decree convinced one that Egypt feared the strength of the Israelites. While the scheme of the war lords of Egypt was far-reaching and promised apparent success, all their brutal plans were brought to naught through the shrewdness of one little girl, Miriam. The mother of Moses, rather than part with her son, as commanded by the Egyptians, hid him in an ark of bulrushes. A princess of Egypt, while bathing in the waters of the Nile, saw the floating ark. Upon discovering the babe of rare beauty and strength, she decided to adopt him as her own child. Miriam, who was hiding on the banks of the river, saw the incident and immediately went to the princess with the suggestion that, being of Israelite blood, one of their own race whom she knew could be secured as nurse for the child. The suggestion was immediately accepted by the princess, and Miriam brought as nurse her own mother, the mother of Moses. This act revealed an intellectual shrewdness very unusual in that day.

Throughout her entire life Miriam was known for her songs. The introspective note is very pronounced in all the music she sang. The theme of Miriam's songs was "the past." Her songs are all interpretative of memories of the heart of Israel. She led the Israelites with her songs. When the forces hesitated at crossing the Jordan river, it was the music of Miriam's songs which gave them new vision and hope. Miriam, however, had another side to her versatile nature. Latent energies needed only the torch of national pride to flame them into action. A very unexpected complication of circumstances, which brought this about reveals Miriam as a national leader and a heroine of remarkable power. Moses had married a woman of heathen faith. Miriam felt that she faced two problems because of this marriage, the will influence of her sister-in-law in the career of her brother; and the responsibility she owed to her people. Rather than see Israel suffer defeat in an hour in which the real and plans of Moses were very much misunderstood, she went to the headquarters of the camp of Israel and offered herself as a leader in the place of her brother. Nothing less than a great faith in the future of Israel and a deep and unquenchable love for her race could have given Miriam sufficient strength to prompt her to such an act. This is the earliest record we have of a woman demanding political rights as a citizen of a community.

It is impossible to measure the influence of the music of Miriam's songs. Had it not been for her songs of memory, doubtless courage would have failed the Israelites many times. The influence of her songs in the career of her brother, Moses, is beyond estimate. Had it not been for the songs of Miriam, the influence of the heathen religion of Egypt would perhaps have taken its toll from the brilliant and heroic career of Israel's leader.

No one can estimate the value which music contributes to the moral progress of a nation. If we would only take time to sing, and those who have no voice to sing "heart the tune," we shall make one of the most important contributions toward solving our economic and moral problems. When people sing together they grow to understand each other. Music draws hearts and minds together. It clarifies the vision and motivates the heart.

Burial Mounds Built by Ancient Mongols?

The similarity of the burial mounds in Siberia, north of the Gobi, with those several thousand miles distant on the Black sea, seems to indicate that they were built by the Mongols, perhaps in the age of Genghis Khan, perhaps in the day of Tamerlane (as we call Tim-ur-lang), perhaps in the time of the khanates of central Asia—the Golden Horde, etc.—in the Sixteenth century. No one knows for certain.

There are also found in the steppe curious stone warriors and women that face always to the east. And I think the figure monuments of Siberia are very much like them. The Cossacks relate that when these stone women are carried away, to make gate posts for a house in some Russian village, it takes a half-dozen oxen to drag them to the west, although one can draw them back again.

At any rate most of the Cossacks are extremely unwilling to dig up the burial sites, the kurgans. A hundred years ago the British explorer, Clarke, asked the hetman of the Don Cossacks for some men from the village to help him the next day. The men were ready enough until they found out that he wanted to uncover a near-by kurgan. They refused point-blank—said it was unthinkable unkindly—and Clarke did not get a look at the inside of the mound.—Adventure Magazine.

"Bad Luck" Burgess' Career

JUST why Capt. Samuel South Burgess should have "gone on account" is difficult to understand. A native of New York, he was a man of education, social position and some wealth. But in the school of legalized privateering in the West Indies he first learned his lesson of violence which sent him eventually out under the Jolly Roger. Then, too, his employer, a New York shipbuilder and owner, hired him to trade with the pirates in Madagascar, and in that occupation it was easy enough for him to do some freebooting on his own account.

He disposed of several prize ships in the West Indies and then returned to New York to give an accounting to his employer. At Sandy Hook he purposely wrecked his vessel and landed as an honest shipwrecked man. His employer, Phillips by name, evidently still held him in high regard for Burgess settled down for awhile, married a relative of Phillips, and a short time later was sent out on two more voyages which were conducted honestly enough and profitably to them both.

A later voyage came near proving his undoing. He had been trading with the pirates in Madagascar and was returning home with several of them as passengers when his ship was captured by an East Indianman off of the Cape of Good Hope and taken to Madras. The captain and his companions were put in irons and sent to England for trial. Burgess, however, was freed, but instead of leaving the country he lingered around London. There he fell in with an old pirate comrade who betrayed him and again he was put on trial. He was condemned to death, but at the last moment was pardoned by the queen.

Then he shed a coat of a Scotch vessel, the Neptune, and soon afterwards was a ringleader in a mutiny. The mutineers refitted the Neptune and embarked upon a career of plundering which proved very successful. Finally Burgess decided to retire from piracy and settled in Madagascar.

But he took to the sea again and had fortune persistently followed him until "Burgess' Bad Luck" became almost proverbial. While serving under one pirate captain, he was accused of betraying some of his comrades, and all of his savings taken away from him. On another voyage he was captured by Dutch pirates who in turn were captured by some French corsairs who marooned Burgess and his mates on the east coast of Africa. At Youngoul Burgess shipped as third mate on a vessel bound for the West Indies. Then came the climax of his unfortunate career. He was sent as ambassador to a local king whom he had once offended. So the monarch gave him some poisoned liquor and the gallows was cheated again.

ORDER ESTABLISHING ROOSEVELT ELECTION PRECINCT NO. 16, KIMBLE COUNTY, TEXAS

Beginning at the Southwest corner of the County of Sutton; thence in a north-easterly direction following the division line between this precinct and Commissioners' Precinct No. 1, to where this division line crosses the east boundary line of survey No. 3, Certificate No. 1779, T. C. Ry. Co., thence north following the east boundary line of Survey No. 5, T. C. Ry. Co., Survey No. 4, C. E. Ry. Co., Survey No. 139, Certificate No. 1298, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., Survey No. 12, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., Survey No. 9, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., to the north-east corner of said survey No. 9, thence south to the northeast corner of Survey No. 8, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., thence north to the northeast corner of Survey No. 6, G. H. & S. A. Ry. Co., thence north to the northeast corner of Survey No. 1, Certificate No. 3410, on the north Llano river; thence crossing North Llano river to the southwest corner of Survey No. 541 in the name of Mrs. A. Friesenman; thence in a north-easterly direction following the east boundary line of said Friesenman survey No. 541, to the north-east corner of same; thence in a north-easterly direction crossing survey No. 32, Certificate No. 344, and survey No. 46, Certificate No. 11218, to the southwest corner of survey No. 20, Certificate No. 9134, T. 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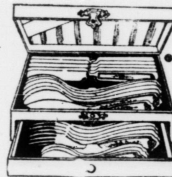
