

R. C. Lott Passes Away Following Brief Illness

The death of R. C. Lott, 57 years of age, last Saturday morning came as a shock to his many friends and relatives. Although Mr. Lott had been in poor health for the past several years since suffering a stroke of paralysis several years ago, his death came unexpectedly. A light stroke of paralysis Friday night resulted in death at 7:30 a. m. Saturday.

Mr. Lott, a retired druggist, had resided in Lamesa for the past thirteen years, during which time he made a host of friends. He was a member of the Baptist church and of the Masonic Lodge.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist church, Sunday, May 17, at 3:30 p. m., with Rev. E. F. Cole officiating. Interment was in the Lamesa cemetery.

Adults Learning Various Subjects

As we think of what adult education does mean and can mean to a community, it is worth one's time to think of just what it is meaning to Dawson County. Dawson County has enrolled more than 200 students and has seven teachers directing the work.

Two classes are in the CCC camp taking a regular literary course and a higher class in bookkeeping and higher mathematics. One class in piano music with an enrollment of forty and a waiting list. Six pupils drive an average of nine miles each in order to obtain lessons.

Two classes of housekeepers and mothers who are striving to improve their methods of serving, canning and beginners rudiments of music. Two classes of young adults studying business mathematics, English, spelling and writing, preparatory to entering business colleges, schools of beauty culture and clerical work.

Along with this, the younger class is taking a study in planning, preparing and serving meals.

On Monday of this week this class met with Mrs. R. R. Townsend at 4:00 p. m., and prepared and served the following menu: Fruit cocktail, veal loaf, new Irish potatoes and English peas in cream sauce, baked carrots, green vegetable salad and hot rolls, spiced loaf and fresh strawberry cream. A host and hostess was chosen from the group and one sister and brother was appointed from the group to assist the mother in serving. One girl directed the work in serving in order that it be done correctly.

Place cards, made by the members, bore individual quotations such as: "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver," "Make the most of yourself for that is all there is of you," and "I give a pupil one corner of a subject, and if he can not find the other three corners, I do not want him for my pupils."

All classes are for the entire public and are conducted daily from various places. Some meet in the Church of God building, one class room is in the basement of the First Methodist church, and one class has part of its meetings in the First Baptist and others in private homes.

E. E. Kerr who is located in Lubbock is district supervisor and is most capable in directing the work urging better work and results at all times, yet ever considerate of the difficulties that arise in the new subject and willing to assist in working them out.

He spoke to the class members and others of the unfinished tasks and the possibilities before them in making worthy contributions to civilization in religion, social affairs, the economic and political world, by continually seeking the truth and by being governed by truth and righteousness rather than by selfishness.

Members of the class numbering about 100 occupied the seats in the center.

Crede Rhea Gives His Position On Important Issues

I am not making the race with the thought of any new and untried schemes or of the merits of any proposed legislation. I am of the opinion that we now have more laws on the statute than we are able to enforce. I am in favor of making many of our present laws more practical and amended to fit present conditions, and when elected it shall be my pleasure to work to this end.

Where the people have spoken in adopting recent constitutional amendments I shall work to have the intent and purpose for which they were voted retained in necessary legislation.

This state is so large that the time consumed and expense involved in visiting the State Capitol is justified only on more important matters. In my opinion the Legislature, in his respective district, is but a hired man and should be subject to the call of his constituents in the matter of calling on the various departments and attending to routine matters. I shall be glad to be of service to the people of my District, in whatever capacity while in Austin.

When you send me to Austin, I shall introduce or champion a bill to abolish the poll tax, which I believe to be undemocratic and at variance with our concepts of the rights of a free citizen.

I would be in favor of the same revision of our present game laws and empower any constable in any precinct to make arrests for violations.

One of the unfair things inherent in our State Government is the small representation of West Texas and is a continuation of conditions from when we had a very limited population. As matters now stand, the 119 District should have three representatives. I shall work for the cause of West Texas in the matter of increased representation.

I am heartily in favor of protecting the independent retailer in all his rights, and not let the Wall Street financed chains run the independents out of our State. I shall also have in mind at all times the welfare of the consuming public.

I am not an advocate of the sales tax, but it has been adopted by adjoining states and the demand here is such that it will no doubt be one of the leading questions in the next legislative session. There are other ways of raising revenue which I would prefer. I believe that I would be able to serve you well in the matter of helping to write a fair Sales Tax Law, should it become evident that such a course will be adopted.

We are all aware of the fact that the farmer is usually compelled to take what is left over and has not been given his rightful dues on legislative matters. I favor more legislation looking to his interest.

When elected I will fully co-operate in the making of laws which will help the National Administration in its recovery program. As a private citizen I have supported whole heartedly the present administration and when elected to office I shall continue to do so.

Without further explanation I will say that I am in favor of a pension which will protect our aged fathers and mothers against privation. I believe that we should meet the conditions of the Federal act and pay a minimum of \$30 per month.

The last legislature failed to meet this issue, and it is likely that funds will not be available before the coming legislature. I favor making it the first major piece of legislation and providing a way to raise the money.

I favor utmost economy in the Pension department. Let the available funds be paid to our aged citizens, and not for an inefficient and expensive administration.

I yield to no man in my loyalty to public education. I am, however, unwilling to place upon our schools the entire burden of training the child for society and citizenship. I am a firm believer in the fact that the home has a responsible place in the child's life and that it is in the home that the See CREDE TEXT on page eight.

Plans for a clean-up drive were discussed and further plans were made for the Yard Beautifying contest the club is sponsoring. The idea of the contest is to promote interest in yard beauty and they urge everyone who is interested to enter the contest.

'Every gardener should have a home control kit' said Miss Mattie Phenix, county home demonstration agent, to the ladies of the Wilson H. D. Club at a meeting last Monday, May 18, at 8 o'clock in the E. L. Craddock home.

The subject for discussion during the afternoon was 'Control and Eradication of Garden Insects and Pests'. Miss Phenix said the kit should contain 1 pound of calcium arsenate, black leaf 40, one box of sulphur, one pound of Bordeaux mixture and one pound of hydrated lime. In eradicating biting insects, such as tomato worms, make a spray using six tablespoonfuls of calcium arsenate to one gallon of water. Black leaf 40 is used as a spray to kill sucking insects such as lice. Mildew is controlled by sprinkling sulphur on the plants when damp. For yellow sports or blights, Miss Phenix told the club to make a mixture using eight tablespoonfuls of Bordeaux mixture to one gallon of water. The entire cost of the home kit is \$1.00.

foundation for character and service should be laid.

I am in favor of the state continuing its program of special aid to the schools to the extent that every child may as nearly as possible, have equal educational advantages.

I believe that the next Equalization Bill should be written for every section of the state.

The Hockley County Commissioners' Court was the first in the State to memorialize the Texas Legislature to locate Tech College at Lubbock. I shall work for every appropriation, not only for its maintenance, but those adding to its equipment and designed to promote its greater importance and usefulness.

I recognize that the building of highways and modern trends have created new conditions in our transportation systems. I shall recognize the rights of the railways and that of the truck and bus lines to exist and do business in this State in their particular spheres. I favor putting them on an equality without either having special and discriminatory privileges. I favor drastic laws controlling traffic on our highways in order that their present dangers to life and limb may be lessened and if possible be completely eliminated.
