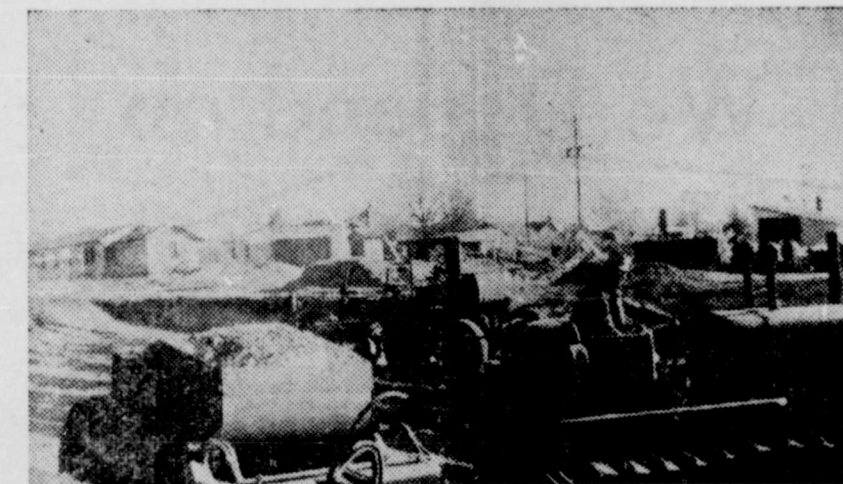

BAKER-FLEMING BEGINS EXPANSION PROGRAM



Shown here is the initial excavation and contract work done at 4th and Columbia Sts., in Plainview, on the BAKER FLASH-O-GAS CO. building to be erected on the site. The caterpillar tractor in the foreground is owned and operated by Jameson Bros. Machinery Co., Matador. Jameson Bros., possibly, have the most modern and best equipped dirt moving equipment in West Texas. The road grader shown in the background is operated under direction of the County Commissioner, Mr. Chas. Howard. It was used to cut the side edge of the excavation, and to level the moved dirt. The excavation shown here is 6 feet deep, 50 feet wide and 120 feet long, and the approximately 1,500 yards of dirt removed was used in leveling off the property preparatory to the installation of two 18,000-gallon Propane and Butane storage tanks to arrive soon.

NEED FOR WORKERS AT PANTEX PLANT TO BE TOLD BY WOUNDED VETERANS HERE FRIDAY

The Veterans Caravan, to be seen here Friday this week from 2 p. m. until 5 p. m., is being brought to this city so local citizens will have a first-hand opportunity to learn from members of the armed forces and others just how important our War Production program is to our fighting forces, and how, we, as civilian volunteers, can help the most, stated H. A. Wells, area manpower director.

Wells says the Pantex Ordnance plant at Amarillo, loading bombs and shells which are so urgently needed on the fighting fronts, is in dire need of additional workers in order to meet the demands of our fighting men. It has always been the experience that once we Texans are advised of an urgent situation—we act; therefore, in arranging for this caravan, the Industrial Services Officer of the Public Relations office of the theatre from 2 to 5 p. m. of Eighth Service Command, Dallas, makes every effort to have veterans who are in a position to tell us of actual combat needs, and what shortages have meant in the past, to enable everyone to have a true picture of the situation. The veterans who will be with this caravan have seen war, been wounded and can tell us about it.

Men now engaged in essential occupations are asked not to quit their jobs as they are needed vitally in their present employment; however, workers now engaged in less essential occupations, and seasonal workers, such as farmers who have completed their harvest, are encouraged to contact hiring the representative, Pantex Ordnance plant, who will accompany the caravan.

New houses are being constructed at the plant site for families who wish to take jobs. Dormitory facilities are available for single men and others who want to work as single men.

Every one is urged to see the caravan during its stay, talk to these veterans, and see the combat action movies to be shown, and then volunteer to take a war job, producing war goods. Additional information can be had at the U. S. Employment office in Plainview.

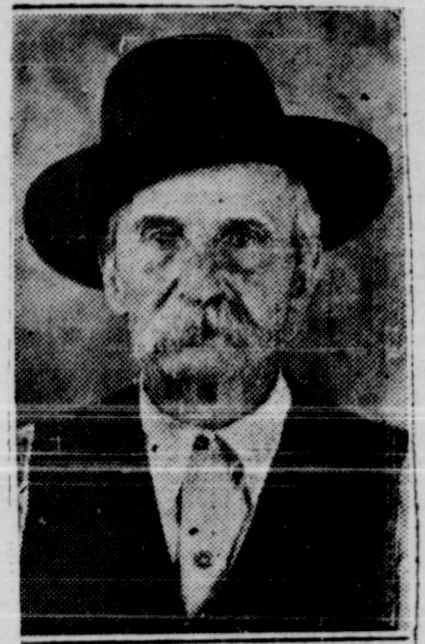

Frank Beauchamp, local pastor, officiated and was assisted by Rev. E. C. Raney, Lakeview Methodist pastor, and Dr. L. N. Lipscomb, superintendent, Lubbock Methodist district. Burial was in Strip cemetery.

Survivors are three sons, R. A., T. E. and J. A. Lutrick and one daughter, Mrs. H. H. Oliver, all of Lakeview community, 13 grandchildren and five great grandchildren, and a brother, Charles Hartford Lutrick, 78, of Athens, Tex.

Two grandsons are overseas, Raymond H. Lutrick, HA2/c, navy, in the Pacific, and 1st Lt. Travis E. Lutrick, Germany or Belgium.

John Henry Lutrick was born in Winston county, Miss., June 24, 1858. He moved to Henderson county, Texas, with his parents, at the age of 11 years. He married Miss Sarah Helen Scott, Dec. 24, 1882. Soon after his marriage, Mr. Lutrick was converted and joined the Methodist church. He moved here with his family in July, 1892.

He was preceded in death by his wife, who died in 1929, and two daughters, Ruby Lutrick and Mrs. Elizabeth Overton.

The following is from the Plainview Herald:

Death of J. H. Lutrick Sunday morning marked the passing of a distinguished Hale county citizen. For more than 52 years he lived on the same plot of ground in Hale county, and he is distinguished by the fine families of sons and daughters who have established homes in this county.

It was in July, 1892, that he brought his family to Hale county and to the land on which he lived at the time of his death. Coming here from Henderson county, the Plains looked desolate and barren, he once told a Herald writer. There was not a stick of timber anywhere and in his old home area, one could get building and fencing material by the wagonload.

Without money or materials he set out to improve the land he "took up" from Bill Scott. "I came to get school land," he once said. "It was all taken up near Plainview and not any was left except in the south part of the county. Judge L. S. Kinder told me that was the best land in the county, anyway," an opinion that the home and community builder in the old Strip community never varied.

A rugged young man, Lutrick made a good home for his family under adversity, and he and his family have made real citizens in their community.

It was at the old Strip cemetery several years ago that his wife was buried. Those who attended her funeral can never forget the tenderness and devotion which prompted the aging Plainman to stand at the open grave of his wife and sing a song of tribute to her.

OPA ANNOUNCES NUMEROUS RATION STAMPS NO LONGER GOOD; SHOULD BE DESTROYED

Housewives have been asked by the OPA to destroy all food ration stamps that were declared invalid last week. The request is made to prevent voided stamps from being used in food purchases either by accident or fraudulently. Red tokens will continue to be good, however, but blue tokens have been of no use for several weeks. Changed point values on fruits will not go into effect until midnight Monday, but the increase of butter points from 20 to 24 went into effect early this week, as did higher point values on canned vegetables.

Ration stamps you are asked to destroy are: Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through P5; blue stamps

A8 through Z8 and A5 through W5; sugar stamps 30, 31, 32, 33 and 40; along with all home canning sugar coupons outstanding.

Stamps continuing to be good are: Red stamps Q5, R5, S5, and after Dec. 31 these are good: T5, U5, V5, W5 and Z5.

Blue stamps, X5, Y5, Z5, A2, B2, and after Dec. 31: C2, D2, E2, F2, and G2, are good.

Sugar stamp 34 now good, and after Feb. 1, another valid one will be announced.

Expiration of certain gasoline coupons on these dates is announced by the OPA: B4 C4 and T marked "Fourth Quarter" are no good after Jan. 1. B5, B6, C5 and C6 remain good until further notice.

Dear Editor: As one of the home town men now serving with the Seabees overseas, I hope you will be interested in printing the little news item here which was prepared by one of our fellows in commemoration of our birthday, Dec. 28. It will give us and our families back home a great deal of satisfaction to know that the Seabees are being remembered. Thanking you for your cooperation, I am, sincerely, Rudolph Struve.

"The third anniversary of the 'workingest' fightingest bunch of men' in the nation's armed forces—the Navy Seabees, will be observed Dec. 28 by 240,000 officers and men who built the network of air and naval bases in the Pacific that pushed the Japs back 3,000 miles; that they developed amphibious equipment and technique that helped carry the day on the African, Sicilian, Italian and French beach-heads.

"Every commissioned Construction Battalion is either currently overseas or has completed a tour of duty—many battalions are on their second tour. Seventy-six percent of the Seabees are now outside the continental limits of the U. S.; only 9,000 essential men have never seen service overseas.

"As General Douglas MacArthur wrote in a letter to Seabee Chief Vice-Admiral Ben Moreell, 'The only trouble with your Seabees is that you don't have enough of them!'"

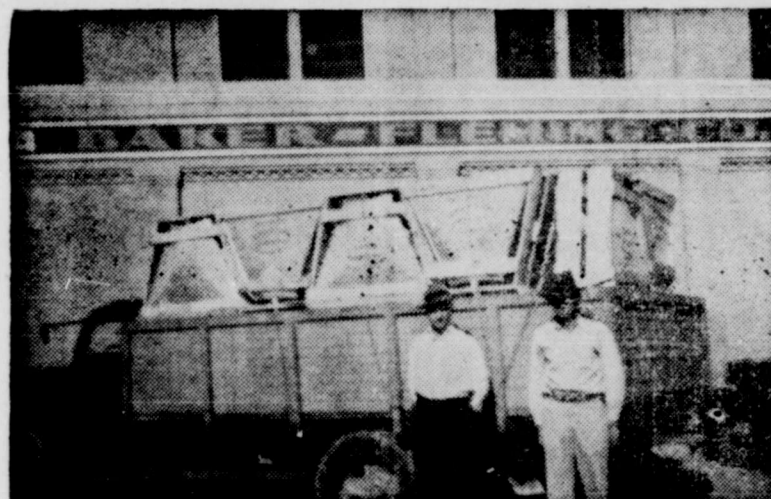

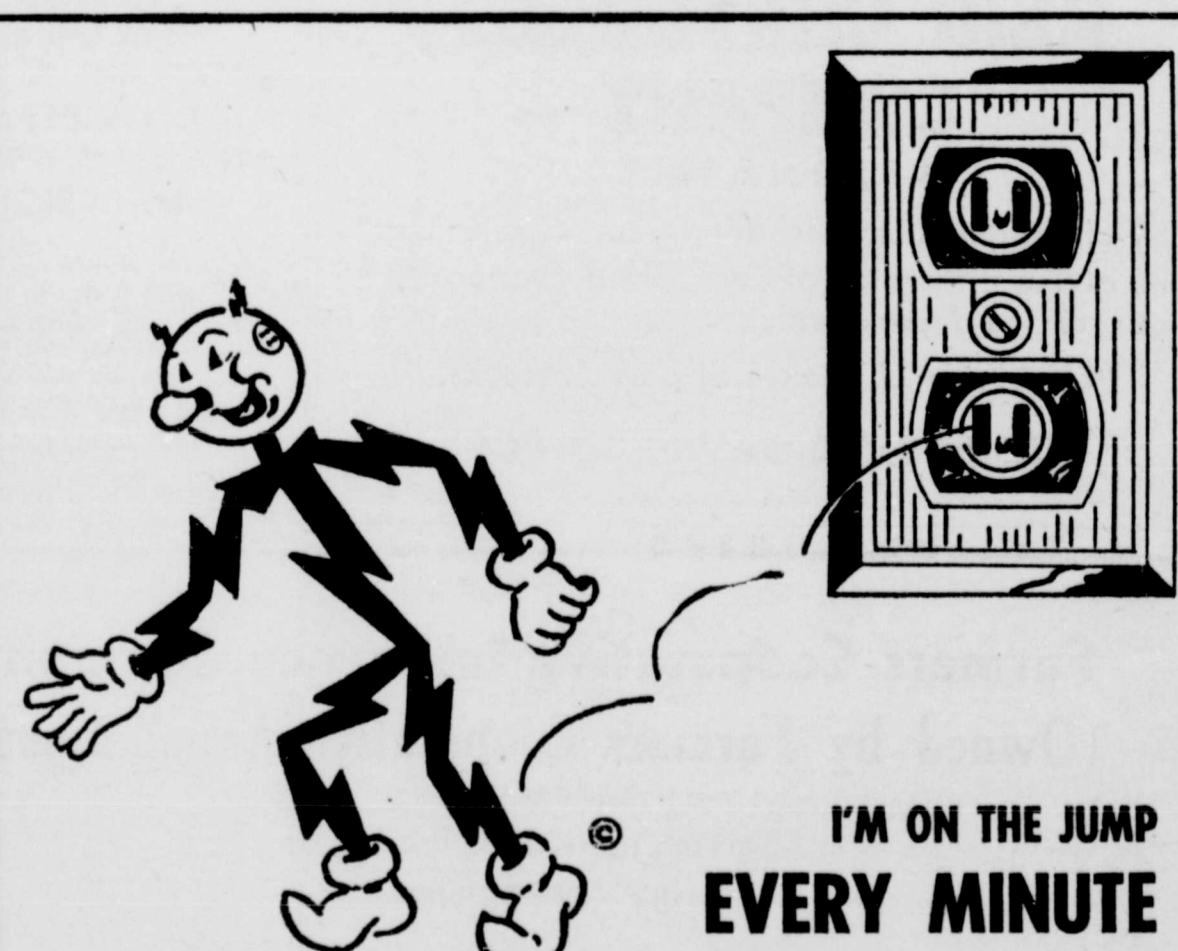
