ANOTHER TAIL-OR SHOP FIRE

EXPLOSION IN CLEANING DEPARTMENT OF PERRYTON CLEANERS CAUSES \$1,500 LOSS

An explosion of unknown origin resulted in a loss of approximately \$1,500.00 for the Perryton Cleaners, on Tuesday afternoon. The explosion and fire practically made a total loss of their cleaning department which is located in a small building at the rear of the store.

W. R. Cayler, manager of the plant, narrowly escaped serious injury and possibly death, for he had just left the building when the explosion occurred. The fire department made a quick run, and had the fire under control a few minutes after arrival.

The loss was covered by insurance. Work has been started on the rebuilding and re-equipping of the plant. They have decided to discontinue the use of gasoline for a cleaning fluid and will use the new Stoddard specification solvent which does the work better and is non-inflammable and non-explosive.

HANSFORD SEAT FIGHT RENEWED

NEW STATE LAW IS TERMED CLASS LEGISLATION BY JUDGE F. M. FISCHER OF WICHITA

Hansford, contested county seat of Hansford county, has filed a new protest along a different angle through its attorney, Judge F. M. Fischer of Wichita Falls, in what it terms "class legislation" to remove the seat to Spearman.

A recent law which Judge Fischer is now seeking to enjoin on two counties states that a two-thirds majority is necessary to remove a county seat except in counties with no less than 1,300 or more than 1,400 population. Hansford county is the only one in Texas affected by this ruling. Spearman received a majority vote but not two-thirds.

The injunction is now pending before the state supreme court on a writ of error. It attacks the new law which permits a county seat election within two years after the

Attend Liberal Banquet

Kansas State Highway Commission Are Guests of Honor Last Saturday Evening

W. B. LaMaster and B. B. Kent of this city were in Liberal on last Saturday evening as guests of the Liberal Chamber of Commerce at a banquet which was given in honor of the visit of the State Highway Commission. Six of the seven members of the commission were making a tour of the state and five of them were present at the banquet. Other members of the party were the state highway engineer and the state fish and game warden.

Mr. LaMaster was called upon for a talk on the route of the Uncle Sam and Great Plains highways across the west part of Beaver County. This is the stretch of road that much time and effort has been expended upon to get the Oklahoma Highway department to make a state road. It would connect Kansas 22 and Texas 4. The chairman of the Kansas commission made the statement that if the Texas commission had been represented at the recent Denver meeting that the entire Great Plains route could have been federalized. Kansas made an application for their part of it which is Kansas 22 and Nebraska has made an application for their section, which is Nebraska 23. The Kansas chairman stated that United States rules require that three states shall join in the application. There is no question but what this will be done at the next meeting.

SANTA FE CHANGES SCHEDULE OF TRAINS ON BRANCH

Effective Monday, October 23, the Santa Fe will change the schedule of the trains on this branch of the Santa Fe, according to information received from the post office department by Postmaster F. M. Black. As a result of this change, Perryton will get a little quicker mail service.

The Santa Fe is cutting off a train. At the present a train leaves both Shattuck and Spearman each morning, each making a one way trip. The new schedule calls for one train to leave Spearman, every day except Sunday, making the round trip.

The east bound train will leave Perryton at 9:30 a. m. and arrive at Shattuck at 12:35 p. m. The west bound train will leave Shattuck at 2:45 and arrive at Perryton at 5:30 p. m.

CAN BUILD SUBSTANTIAL EDIFICE WITHOUT RAISING PRESENT TAXES

WILL ISSUE ADVANCE WARRANTS IN PAYMENT FOR BUILDING; FINAL DECISION AT NEXT MEETING AFTER TAXPAYERS VIEWS

An order was passed at the meeting of the Commissioners' Court on last Monday afternoon favoring the building of a new court house for Ochiltree county and paying for same by the issuance of advance warrants. A \$100,000.00 structure can be put up and paid for in about seven years on the warrant plan without raising the present tax levy for court house

MANY THRILLS IN BIG PARADE

ARE A PART OF LAURENCE STALLINGS' INTIMATE AND AMAZING HUMAN DOCUMENT

With the coming of "The Big Parade" to the American theatre on November 3, 4, and 5, return the combat thrills of 1917-1918 when America joined the war.

The doughboys, the officers, the tremendous mass push through the Argonne, the hand-to-hand fighting that cleaned out enemy trenches and machine gun nests, have been reproduced, not like the war propaganda pictures of that period, but in the intimate realism of the sadder ten years' view. It is the doughboy's story—his, and the story of the girl back of the lines who also drank of war's dread cup. Laurence Stallings wrote it. King Vidor directed it.

John Gilbert as Jim Apperson "mopping up" the German nest shows a frenzy that only those who have lost a "buddy" in battle can know. Bull O'Hara, the other surviving "buddy" cries out: "D—n this cheer us when we leave, and cheer us when we return, but what's it all about?"

AN INCIDENT
Nearing the end of the awful clean-up, Jim sparks a bayonet thrust, and soothes the last moments of his wounded foe by the preferred solace of a cigarette.

Pioneer work through the Forest, skulking from cover to cover, taking it on the run across lees and meadows, meeting the enemy in the open in widely spread formation, putting on the gas masks, deploying in trenches and shell holes just captured, going over the top again and again, the Yanks show the mettle that was embodied in an Argonne commander's famous answer: "We will not go back, and we are ready!"

But King Vidor has sought in "The Big Parade" not only some of the myriad thrills of this colossal field of Mars, but equally the humor and romance. He was aided by the wide experience of Laurence Stallings, author of the story, and by the co-operation of several American Legion posts. The men worked for weeks with John Gilbert, Karl Dane and Tom O'Brien, who played the part of the three buddies. Many of the veterans' comic reminiscences of the life behind the lines were incorporated.

Renee Adoree Assisted
Another extremely able assistant was Renee Adoree, playing the part of Melisande, the French girl. Miss Adoree, who is a native of Northern France, helped suggest the many details of the quaint French farmstead and the manerisms and actions of the natives who came in contact with the doughboys.

The spectacular parts of the picture were carried out under the direction of Brigadier General Paul B. Malone and Colonel Harry Bishop of the Second Division, U. S. A. They were among the officers commanding the Argonne push, and the Second Division units, in the mimic war, re-lived the Argonne experience over again.

"The Big Parade" has been provided with an elaborate score by David Mendoza and William Axt. And along with their original composition they haven't forgotten to bring back many of the catchy war tunes.

and jail use. In years past the funds of the court house and jail have been transferred and used for other purposes. As this transferring is illegal, the present Commissioners' Court has refused to transfer any funds out and there is now a very substantial sum in the court house and jail fund which is available to apply on the new building.

The final decision of the Court will be made at the next regular meeting which will be on Monday, November 14. In the meantime, it is the desire of the Court that the taxpayers of the county familiarize themselves with the proposition and let the Court know their views either for or against the building of the court house. This can be done by appearing before the Court, talking with the commissioner of your precinct or filing a written report either for or against the proposition, with the county clerk.

There is no question as to the urgent need of better court house facilities for Ochiltree County. The commissioners realize that if a new building is not erected by the issuance of warrants, then they will be forced to call an election for the issuance of bonds for the building. A bond-built court house will cost thousands of dollars more to the taxpayers than one built by warrants. The commissioners believe that if a bond election should be called, it would be certain of carrying, hence their action in passing this order. They have taken a very wise step and if it goes through, Ochiltree County will have a court house to which every citizen will point with pride.

New \$75,000 High School Building Is Now In Use

Every patron of the schools of the Perryton Independent School District has just reason to be proud of the many fine buildings that will be found through the district. The latest addition is the beautiful new home of the Perryton High School, which was dedicated on October 10 and is now being used for classes. This fine structure was built by Corlett

& Welchons, general contractors, of Hutchinson, Kans., at a cost of \$75,000.00. It is a model building and has been the cause of much favorable comment by the many prominent educators who have recently inspected it. Mann & Company, Hutchinson, were the architects.

Many Other Buildings
In addition to the new high school building, there is in Perryton a \$120,000 grade school building with a large auditorium with a seating capacity of 1200 people. A large, well equipped gymnasium is also located in this building. Other modern three and four room schools are located at Ochiltree, Wawaka, Farnsworth, Lone Tree and New Hope. The other schools of the district, while not so large, are just as efficient. Outside of the district, in Ochiltree county, will be found a large number of up and going, progressive schools. Two outstanding examples of these are the Black and Huttoon schools. Across the line in Oklahoma will be found a number of large consolidated school plants which rank very high. Among them are Union, Blue Mound, Bethany, Fairview and Camrick.

Junior College Soon
It is the expectation of the people of Perryton and the district that at some time in the very near future, this new building will be the home of the North Panhandle's first Junior College. The new plant has been arranged with this aim in view and the foundations are being laid upon which the college will be built. Additional credits have been granted the school every year and it is certain that a large number of additional credits of affiliation will be made this year. The school now stands in a class by itself in this section and is the means by which hundreds of families are being influenced to come and settle in our midst, both on the farms and in town.

Irvin Deserves Much Credit
Much of the credit for the success of the school is due to the ability and good work of W. B. Irvin, superintendent of the entire district. Since coming to Perryton a few years ago, Superintendent Irvin has raised the school from a very mediocre rating to one of the highest for its size in the entire state. He is an excellent executive, he knows good instructors and he understands how to get the best results out of them. The schools now have an exceptionally high type of instructor. Practically every one has a college degree. Supt. Irvin and R. J. Cook, principal of the high school, have their master degree. There are but twenty instructors in high schools of Texas who have their masters degree—and two of them are in charge of the Perryton schools.

The New H. S. Building
The new building is two full

stories and is in the shape of an ell. It is connected with the old building by a corridor running from the second floor hall to the stair landing between the second and third floors of the old building. Individual steel lockers for pupils' wraps are recessed in the walls of the corridors. There are 137 of these lockers. Recessed drinking fountains and bulletin boards are also located in the halls on both floors. There is no basement, the building being heated by enlarging the furnace in the old school house. The hall floors are of concrete. The floors in the class rooms are laid of beech flooring over concrete. All partitions are of fire proof construction. The outside walls are built of brick.

Superintendent's Offices
The superintendent's offices are located on the right of the main entrance. They consist of two rooms, a large storage closet and a vault. In these offices are located an electrically operated master clock that automatically controls the ringing of all class period, recess, taking up and dismissal bells in both buildings.

Add Commercial Department
The commercial department is a new course of study offered this year. There are two rooms for this department, one for typewriting shorthand and commercial law. A complete set of banking fixtures has been installed in this department for the use of the bookkeeping

Home Economics Department

The Home Economics department offers some of the show rooms of the entire building. There are two large rooms, one for the domestic science and the other for domestic art. In both will be found large wall cases. The floor of the science room is covered with a very high quality inlaid tile design linoleum. The floors of the other rooms are of beech, highly polished and waxed. There is a small room for instruction in ironing and dress fitting. Then there is the model dining, living and bath rooms all of which are beautifully furnished. In the living room will be found a fireplace and built-in bookcases. The light fixtures are of the bracket candle type, silver finish.

Vocational Training Courses
In the manual training and vocational agriculture department will be found machinery and equipment for doing most any kind of wood or steel mechanics. There is a large tool room, a machine shop with forge, anvil and equipment of all kinds for the teaching of auto, tractor and farm shop work. Next is the large manual training room which is equipped with all kinds of wood working machinery and tools including bench saws, bands saws, planer, lathe, benches, vises and hand tools galore. In addition there are two large class rooms for this department.

Study Hall and Library
On the second floor is the large study hall. This hall which seats 300 pupils, has a stage across the west end which can be used for school entertainments. Large lockers for storing text books are located in this room. Adjoining the study hall is the library and reading room. The offices of the high school principal, which consists of two rooms, are also on the second floor.

New Courses in Science
The new science department consists of three rooms: a lecture room, a large class room for teaching physics and general science; and the laboratory which has the very latest type of modern equipment for the teaching of chemistry, physiology and biology.

Other Class Rooms
Other class rooms in the new building are provided for the teach-

WINTER GRAZING CROPS

In a recent address President Coolidge made the statement that the size of the farms in the vicinity of his old home in Vermont was measured by the number of cows they would maintain, that is, some men had eight cow farms, others had twelve cow farms, and others might have farms that would be known as twenty cow farms. On these farms all the crops produced are marketed through the medium of the dairy cow. On other farms in other states we find the crops marketed through beef, sheep, and hogs as well as dairy cows. In Texas unfortunately we market most of our crops in the raw state, and this brings a return which barely covers the cost of production.

In a survey recently made by the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association it was found that dairy cows, after paying for all the expenses for labor, returned 42% above the farm value of the crops fed. Baby beef returned 44% above the farm value of the crops fed. Fattening lambs returned 135% above the cost of labor and feed, and hogs returned 108% above the farm value of the crops fed.

Texas needs more live stock on the farms, but in order to produce live stock economically the farms must produce an abundance of pasture, advises Charles E. Alvord, director of Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas. Native pastures are good so far as they go, but on the farm they do not go very far, and must be supplemented with crops grown for grazing purposes. For summer grazing sudan grass ranks above all other cultivated crops for pasture purposes. For winter grazing we have a great variety of crops from which a selection can be made. All the winter grains—wheat, oats, rye, barley and spelt—will do well in any part of the state, and if sown early in the fall, will produce an abundance of nutritious feed for winter grazing. Sweet clover and alfalfa will furnish pasture twelve months in the year unless the season should become so dry in the summer as to stop the growth.

The Extension Service of the A. & M. College has recently issued a record book for the purpose of enabling farmers to accurately determine the value of winter grazing crops. Anyone interested in keeping a record of the amount of pasture they can obtain from any of these crops will be furnished one of these books free. Application should be made to the County Agent or directly to C. H. Alvord, director of Extension, College Station, Texas. This book not only furnishes the blanks for keeping the records, but gives some valuable information concerning rate of seeding and kind of crops to plant.

Sacks of seed corn may be protected from mice by scattering naphthalene flakes over and around the bags. Mice dislike the odor of the flakes and will usually keep away.

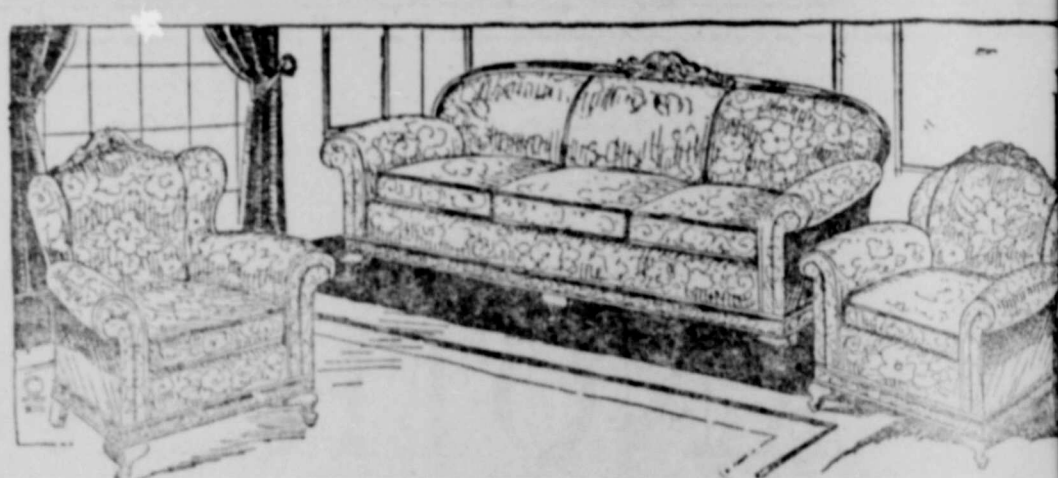

International Sunday School Lesson

by KEITH L. BROOKS

OCTOBER 23, 1927

The Call of the Prophet

Lesson Text—1 Kings 19:19-20;
Amos 7:14-15; Isa. 6:1-8

The lesson for today records briefly the calling of three prophets, namely, Elisha, Isaiah and Amos. It is of interest to notice that Elisha was called directly from the fields where he was plowing and Amos responded to the call when serving as a herdsman. Isaiah seems to have belonged to a family of some rank, and is said to have been a cousin of King Uzziah.

ELISHA

Leaving Mt. Horeb, Elijah (about whom we were last studying) again traversed the great desert and finally went into the Jordan valley. Going up the valley to the north, he came to a field where he saw Elisha plowing with twelve yoke of oxen.

For three and a half years, this was the first springtime that gave promise of a harvest. We may imagine the joyous toil of Elisha as he realized the prospect of raising something. Suddenly Elijah appeared. Apparently without saying a word, Elijah threw his prophet's mantle over the shoulders of this young farmer.

It was a well understood symbolical act. God had evidently been dealing with this farmer's heart, for he uttered no remonstrance and showed no unwillingness to obey the call. He only asked permission to bid his family farewell. "Go and return," said Elijah, "for thou knowest what I have done unto thee."

Elisha went back for a farewell feast, killing the yoke of oxen which he had been driving, as well, perhaps, to indicate his renunciation of his old calling. He then followed Elijah: called from home, friends and comfort, to endure hardships, suffer persecution and bear scorn.

He became, for several years, Elijah's servant. We have but one statement describing their relationship. "He poured water on the hands of Elijah" (2 Kings 3:11). The tie between the two became deep and strong, and Elisha's whole after life shows that he imbibed deeply the teachings and spirit of the older prophet.

We could find no better example of one who had an ear for the call of God; who was ready to obey at all costs; who was willing to become for years a humble student, that in God's own time he might intelligently take up the prophetic office.

AMOS

The call of Amos was somewhat similar. The lesson text informs us how Amos, high priest of calf worship at Bethel, alarmed at the stern predictions of Amos, carried to the king a distorted version of the words of Amos. The king apparently did not interfere, but Amos on his own authority ordered Amos to leave Bethel and go back to his herds at Tekoa. How ready wicked men are to get clear of God's reprovers and to say to them:

In verse 1 we have his Uplook; in verse 5, his In-look; in verse 8, his Out-look. We see profound reverence in worship; profound humility in waiting upon God, and profound devotion to His bidding.

Isaiah begins by telling us that he "saw the Lord sitting upon a throne high and lifted up" (v. 1). Correct theories about God are invaluable, but our first need is some vision of God Himself. The light of God's throne reveals to a man his true condition.

The New Testament makes it

clear that in every such manifestation of God, it was the Son of God who thus revealed Himself (John 12:41). Our great need, then, is to come close to Jesus Christ, the "one Mediator between God and man," and the nearer we come to Him, the more we shall realize the imperfection and insufficiency of the flesh. Until we have felt this, we are unfit to undertake to represent Him before the world.

Isaiah describes the appearance of the seraphim, each of whom had six wings. The term evidently refers to God's attending angels. With two wings, each covered his face; with two his feet; with two

he did fly. Here is suggested meditation, humility and spiritual activity. If God's will is to be done by us on earth as it is done in heaven, there must enter into our lives these elements. Our flying on earth will be an unhalloed flight, if we do not first secretly adore Him in our hearts.

The seraphim cry one to another, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of His glory" (v. 3). This is one of many hints in the Old Testament of the Trinity. Another is seen in the question: "Who shall go for us?" (v. 8). The threefold cry meets man's threefold sinfulness.

For God's holiness, appeals to man's faculties of conscience, affection and reason.

"Woe is me!" cried Isaiah, "I am undone; I am a man of unclean lips . . . mine eyes have seen the King" (v. 5). In the previous chapter, Isaiah had uttered six woes against others, but his seventh is against himself. It will be a great day when, in God's presence, we see our own sinfulness, standing out above the inferiority of others. It is the increasing sense of our own unworthiness that makes the sufficient grace of Christ sweet and that fires our witnessing with unquenchable zeal.

God introduced Isaiah into the divine provisions of the sacrifice, purging the prophetic inspiration, for we were consecrated with the "Who will go?" Isaiah could answer, "I will go" (v. 8). A man from the love of sin and go nimbly to God's word, discouragements and are then nothing.

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Santa Fe

Purchases Promote Prosperity

WHILE the Santa Fe is itself a large employer of labor—its payroll in 1926 totalled \$107,000,000, and its employes number more than 75,000—indirectly as a buyer of materials and supplies it helps to furnish employment to many more. Such purchases last year exceeded \$64,000,000. In addition it bought over \$12,000,000 of new cars and locomotives.

Its largest class of material was fuel, which totalled \$24,360,000. This consisted of about 2,267,000 tons of coal, and 507,800,000 gallons of fuel oil. The use of coal or oil on any division is determined primarily by which is the cheaper fuel in that locality.

The second largest class of purchases was iron and steel products, for which the expenditure was approximately \$19,750,000. This included an expenditure of \$9,500,000 for 152,700 tons of rail, frogs, switches, and fastenings. \$1,500,000 went for wheels, axles, and tires, and \$3,060,000 for flues and tubes for locomotives. Bridges, turntables, structural steel, forgings, and fabricated, unfabricated, and pressed steel took nearly \$3,000,000. Steel and iron are basic necessities in railroading.

Purchases of forest products totalled \$6,412,000, which included over 3,000,000 cross ties, and large quantities of lumber and timbers. The Santa Fe creosotes its ties and much of its timbers, otherwise greater quantities would be needed each year.

Folders, report blanks, notices, tickets, tariffs, and various items in the stationery line required \$1,225,000, electrical materials \$660,000, lubricating oil and grease, illuminating oils, waste, etc., \$1,180,000, and air brake material \$617,600.

These purchases were necessary to maintain the railroad properly and to give satisfactory service to the public. They were covered by 130,000 invoices and were made from 3,347 individuals and firms. Note the wide spread of this buying.

Thus the Santa Fe and all railroads are an important factor in maintaining the prosperity of our country through the employment arising from these large purchases of supplies, as well as the millions directly disbursed among their own employes for services.

When the railroads are doing well, they buy materials and supplies on a larger scale than when net revenues fall off. Money thus spent mainly pays for the labor of many persons, helping merchants, farmers, everybody—your own community included. You therefore are vitally interested.

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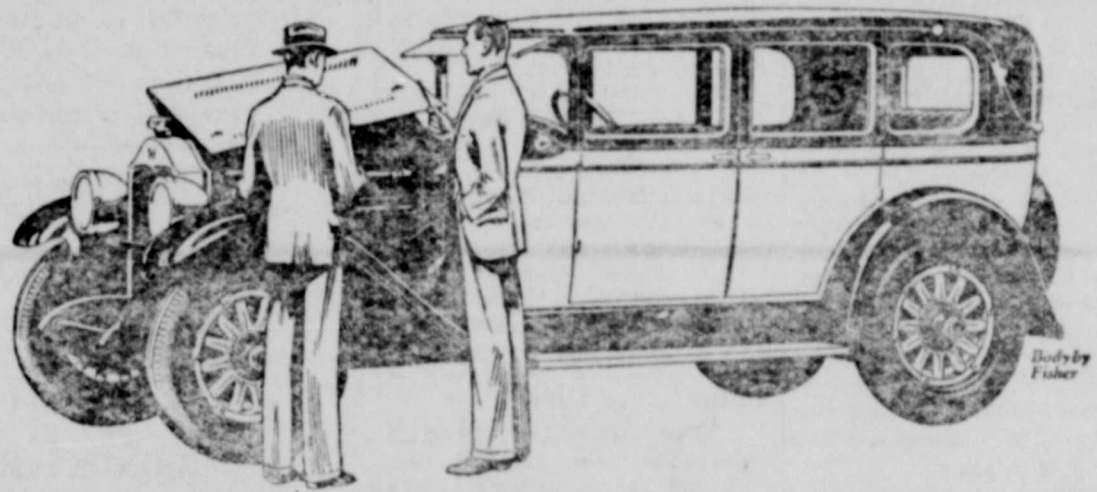

PUBLIC MONIES

In the Royalton State bank vaults was found a note for \$10,000 against the township high school funds. This note was declared to be a forgery by the bank examiners who took over the affairs of the bank when it closed its doors last week.

It appears this note was in existence at the time the Zeigler News was being sued by a former township school treasurer for libel, charging this paper had unduly criticized that official for failure to publish a report of finances passing through his hands.

At that time the News did not charge any irregularities in the school finances but insisted the law governing the publishing of reports of officers who had the handling of public moneys should be complied with, in order to inform the public of where the money collected from taxes was spent.

Instead of complying with this modest request on the part of the officials he entered suit against this paper.

It now appears that at that time there was a note for \$10,000 against this fund which had been illegally drawn and was not discovered until the bank was closed and the accounts checked over by the bank examiners.

This is but another illustration of the needs of the taxpayers being taken into the confidence of those handling public money and their reports being published in detail for a checking up of every account by those interested.—Zeigler (Ill.) News.

In view of the fact that Childress County took judgment just last week against a defaulting county official and his bondsmen as well as other parties, the above news item is quite interesting. Every public official should have his reports published. The law requires it but sets no penalty for disobedience in Texas. It is the people's money that is being handled and the people are entitled to an itemized statement of their own finances. This they fail to get. Childress County came out several thousand dollars the loser. Publicity would have saved that.—Wheeler News-Review.

TRACTOR LUBRICATION

One of the most sadly neglected parts of the tractor is the transmission. While many tractor owners have experienced difficulty in keeping the tractor transmission from trouble and break-down they are unaware of the exact cause.

The average tractor transmission has a capacity of from three to twelve gallons of oil. The gears are usually steel-cut, having a case-hardened shell. During the operation of the transmission, minute flakes of steel are constantly wearing off the gears and falling into the oil. The contamination of the oil by these metal flakes greatly reduces its effectiveness and its ability to lubricate properly. There is a strong likelihood that the particles of metal in the oil will be carried to the transmission bearings where they are certain to bring destruction. If the transmission bearing is destroyed, the misalignment thus caused usually brings about the break-down of some other part along with it before trouble is suspected.

It is recommended that the transmission be completely drained and refilled at regular intervals. The frequency of this operation should be in proportion to the capacity of the transmission case. The replenishment should take place after each 100 working hours for the transmission holding 3 gallons of oil; after 200 working hours for a capacity of 6 to 8 gallons, after 300 working hours for the 10 to 12 gallons capacity.

The use of hard greases in the tractor transmission rarely gives satisfactory service and is to be discouraged. The lubrication salesman should be familiar with the proper grade of oil for use in the tractor transmission and should be guided by the recommendations of the builders.

Do not expect the tractor transmission to thrive or to function properly with the same careless attention that the average automotive transmission receives. The severity of the service demanded of the tractor transmission is far greater than that of the automotive transmission, in that the former is operated in gear a large part of the working period.

In any phase of tractor lubrication, the cost of the oil per working hour is so much greater importance to the consumer than the cost per gallon.
