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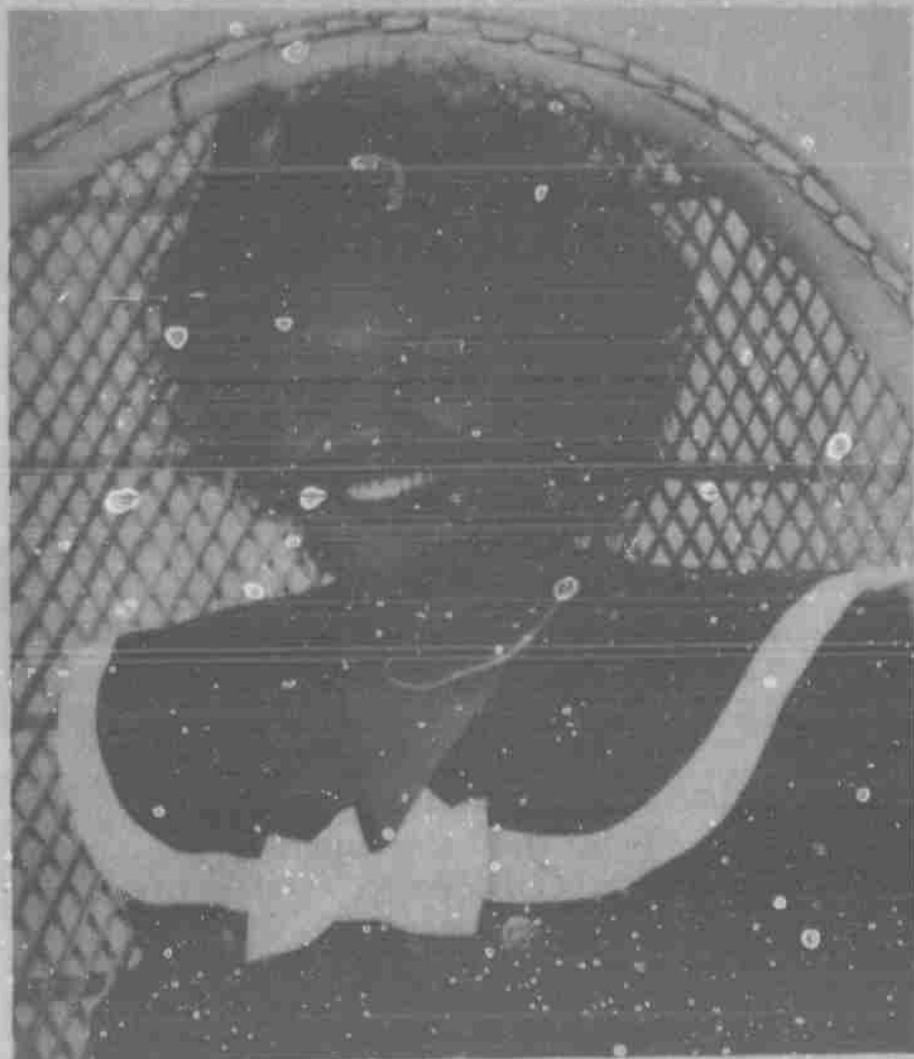

Racial Inclusion Plan Could Work Here

In Dallas, Texas, there is a plan -- sponsored by the Dallas Together Forum, to broaden steps to improve economic opportunities for minorities in that city. The plan would make it known of 36 member companies to go public and make it known of their records on hiring of minorities, advancement and contracting. Not only will these businesses reveal their record on affirmative action, but they will state their goals for opening more economic doors for minorities in 1994.

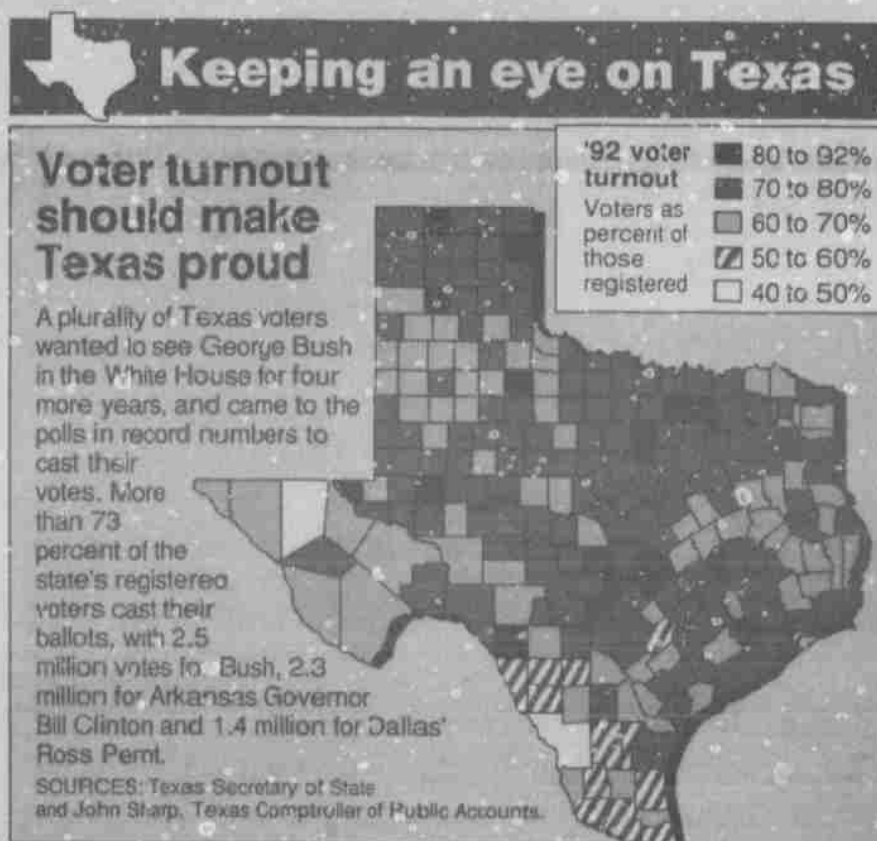
The decision by these members to make themselves available for public scrutiny gives real meaning to the stated goals of the organization. The Dallas Together Forum, which was organized in 1991, has been searching for valid ways to ease racial tensions and make economic inclusion a reality for the minority community. And last week's unprecedented announcement offers solid evidence the civic group has finally found the right path.

This effort will involve the largest financial institutions and corporations in Dallas who will be participating in this private sector covenant for workplace diversity. Among them are: J. C. Penny Co., American Airlines, Electronic Data Services, Texas Instruments, Texas Commerce Bank, Southwestern Bell, NationsBank Texas, PepsiCo Worldwide Foods, TU Electric, Trammell Crow Co., Brinker International, Bank One Texas, ENSERCH Corp., American Petrofina, Austin Industries and A. H. Belo Corp, parent company of the Dallas Morning News and WFAA television.

Not only the private sector has begun, but the public sector, i. e. municipal government and Area Rapid Transit have worked on new contracting goals this year that should increase business for minority companies in the Dallas area. But, as we agreed at the Southwest Digest, if lasting economic change is to occur, it will have to take place within the private sector.

We believe this kind of an effort should be looked for the Lubbock area, because, we too, are need of some kind of partnerships with the private sector. As in Dallas, we must realize that Lubbock's corporate leadership must decide that this city cannot grow and prosper so long as the current imbalance in job opportunities exists.

The City of Lubbock is in the same posture, and the local powers that be must take note. Sure, changing old patterns of exclusion is a slow process that will take years to complete. But we must start today finding if this kind of an effort we need here will work for the future of this city. We must keep in mind that if we, all of us, care about the future of Lubbock, then these kinds of steps must taken.

The folks at the Carrollton-Farmers Branch Independent School District announced last week that they are prepared once again to lead the fight on behalf of the rich school districts to challenge the current plan of the legislature that did something about the discriminatory and ineffective Texas public school system. As I understand it, the school board voted unanimously to send their lawyers back to the courthouse to challenge the current plan. Of course, MALDEF has already filed a challenge claiming the plan did not go far enough to end discrimination against poor districts.

My brothers and I all graduated from ole R. L. Turner High in Carrollton. I have family still attending school in that district and my wife sits on the board of MALDEF. I have heard both sides of the legal issues, read numerous articles and revelant portions of the legal opinion. My family and friends in Farmers Branch are wrong.

The current plan adopted by the legislature does not solve the problem of funding but adopting the position of the rich school districts would just make matters worse. We have a rich state that must provide an equal opportunity for all our children in our public education system. We must reject elitist public schools in rich school districts. We need a state funded education system with state guidelines and standards that is administered by a locally elected school board to insure that local concerns are addressed. In this way, so long as there are public schools in Texas, a child will be able to go anywhere in our state and obtain a quality education.

Lubbock County has four districts and an at-large County Judge. The City of Lubbock has six districts and an at-large Mayor. Yet, the LISD School Board has five districts and two at-large members. The five white guys on the board swear up and down that any other plan would affect the quality of this representation on the board and would turn the school board into some sort of ward system. Gee, what about the county and city system? Are they ward systems?

What is a ward system? Basically, it is a district system of government that is often criticized because of corruption and favoritism by the jobs and contracts that are handed out. The only connection between abusive ward systems and the LISD districts is the fact of geographic voting districts. The comparison ends there. No LISD board member has the power to hire, fire, sign contracts, spend taxpayers' money, etc. On our board, all the board members have to vote and the majority of votes makes the decision just like the city council. Are any of the guys calling the city council a ward system?

If you want to see geographic districts with the power to hire, fire, and make unilateral decisions go down to the courthouse

If you rent property to your children or parents, you may be able to use the 80 percent fair market rent rule to qualify for tax deductions.

IRS rules state that you can rent to family members and still take all the allowable real estate rental property deductions, including depreciation, provided you charge your renter/family member at least 80 percent of the fair market value rent each month.

Fair market value rent is the amount for which a similar property in the same area of town would rent. If the rent in the area for a house or condo similar to yours is \$700 per month and you charge your family member at least \$560 (80 percent x \$700), you will be entitled to all deductions.

To qualify, be certain that the money actually changes hands each month and that you and your family member complete a simple lease.

Strategy: If necessary, subsidize your parents or other family members with a once-a-year, lump-sum gift.

Your parents may not have the money to make all of the rental payments necessary to meet the 80 percent fair market rental test.

In our example, 80 percent is \$560 per month. Let's say your parents have \$340 and you would have to pay the additional \$220.

If you paid the difference yourself or gave the money directly to your parents in monthly installments, you would not be allowed any rental property deductions.

However, there is nothing to prevent you from accomplishing the same objective in unrelated transactions of unrelated amounts of money. You give your parents \$5,000 per year in a lump sum as a Christmas gift.

Your parents have the option of doing anything they wish with the money, including paying the full amount of the \$560 per month rent, thus allowing you to qualify for all the tax deductions. While giving this \$5,000 each year will enable your parents to rent from you, you should check with your estate planning advisor as to the effect of these gifts on your overall plan.

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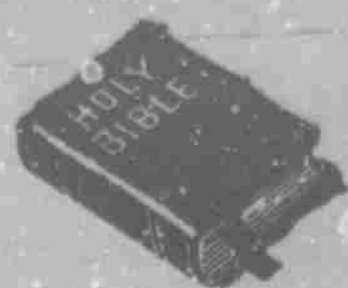
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The Outreach Prayer Breakfast

A daily study of the Word of God will provide us with the instruction that is needed for living a righteous and good life. We need to help us live a godly life is a proper attitude toward our Lord and a proper understanding of life with its opportunities and responsibilities. We need the insight and the encouragement of divine instruction every day of our existence. We need to open our mind and our heart and listen as God seeks to speak to us.

In the 2 chapter of Mark, the Lord seeks to speak to our present social conditions. This chapter reveals the Lord Jesus Christ as being a very busy man sharing the good news of God's kingdom and ministering to the needs of those about Him. He was the center of attention. It was impossible for Him to hide from the people. There was a magnetism about the personality and teachings of Jesus that attracted crowds of people to Him.

Mark 2 reveals our Lord Jesus as a "great healer." There are three different features of the account presented in verses 1-12 that deserve our attention.

1. The helpless man. The man was a paralytic and unable to move from one place to another.
2. The helpers. There were at least four men who were concerned about bringing the helpless man to the great helper and healer. They did so at a great inconvenience and with much persistence.
3. The hinderers. There were some who were very critical of Jesus and they were hinderers. The crowd which swarmed about the Lord Jesus hindered the four from bringing the helpless man to Jesus in the most direct manner.

In our community there are many helpless ones who need the service of helpers who can bring them to Christ the great healers. One thing that we need to be certain of is that we are not among those who are the hinderers.

As we continue to read the chapter 2 of Mark, we discover that Jesus treated each person as a human being. He did not discriminate on the basis of ones race, ethnicity, religion, culture or profession. Matthew was a despised publican in the service of the Roman occupational forces. Jesus loved him and wanted to redeem him. He extended an invitation to Matthew, the tax collector, and he responded affirmatively and became Matthew the apostle. Matthew was eager for the other publicans to learn what he had learned about Jesus and to experience what he had experienced.

Christians can be a tremendous blessing to others by helping them to know Jesus as Savior.

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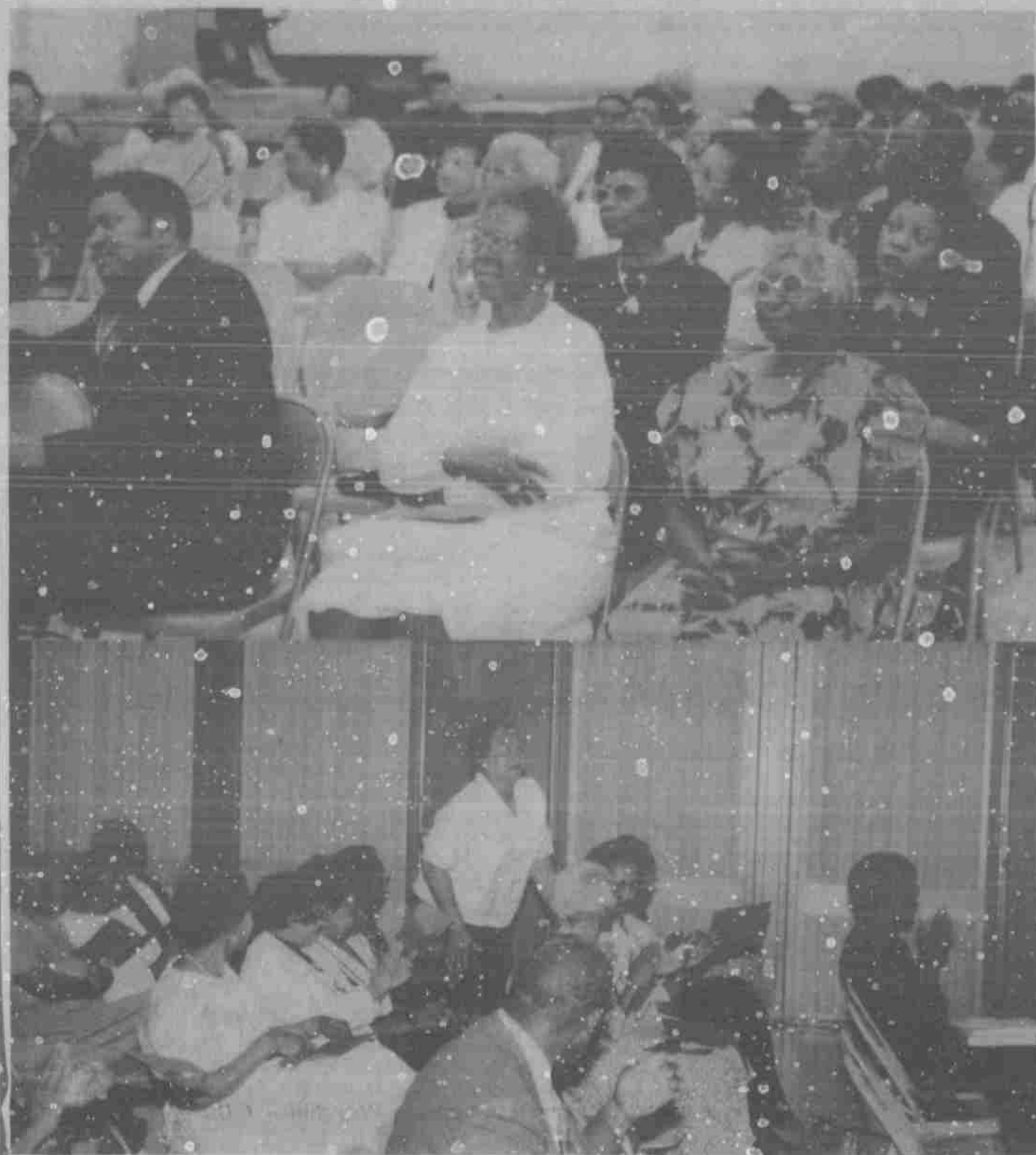

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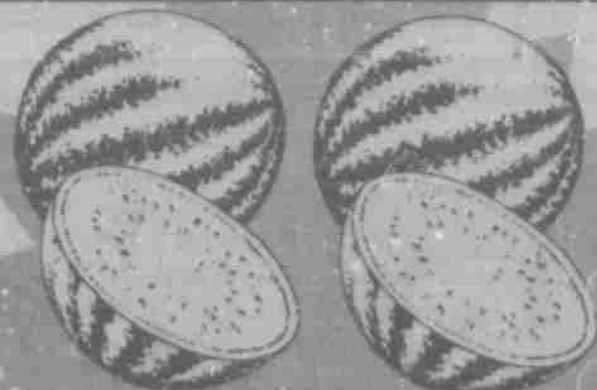
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
