Voters Decide On Nation's Leader At Polls Today

Local Political Groups Hold Final Rallies Last Night

Democrats Rally On Election Eve; Flay Opposition

Democratic Band Wagon Is In Final Appearance In District Court Room; Get Rousing Ovation

Plea For Loyalty

Mullican Presides Over Big Meeting In Which Prominent Men Appear; Score Minister Politicians

Making its first, last and only appearance in its home town, the democratic band wagon Monday night wheeled itself into the district court room at the courthouse for two hours of music and campaign speaking before a crowd of approximately 300 enthusiastic and wildly cheering Lubbock voters.

Prior to the regular campaign speeches, the string band of the Democratic band wagon, in which was featured "The Slide-walks of New York," and "Dixie" to healthy response of yells and hand-clapping from the gathering crowd.

Mullican Presides

Judge Clark M. Mullican, master of ceremonies, as at all appearances of the democratic vote-getting organization upon its many appearances throughout the South Plains, during these past hectic weeks of vehement political campaigns, presided. And Judge Mullican did his share of the speaking, besides. At the opening of the program, he introduced various speakers who have been traveling on the Band Wagon, each one being welcomed by the crowd in earnest and responsive welcome.

"These men," Judge Mullican said "are these at-salon keepers, former bartenders, chicken thieves and hoppers our opponents have been telling us about."

Mystery Shrouds Death of Women

Two Young Married Women Of Dallas Found Brutally Slain In Lonely Spot; One Clue Held

DALLAS, Nov. 5 (AP)—Unless the arrest of a man they were seeking in Oklahoma gave them a solution officers here said today, the manner in which two young married women were clubbed to death at a lonely spot near Dallas at midnight Saturday night might remain a mystery.

All clues, the investigators said, pointed toward this one man who is said to have made threats against the life of Mrs. Beale Lynch, 31, who, with Mrs. Cleo Lieto, 19, was beaten to death shortly after the two young women had been seen.

Damp Weather May Cut Texas Votes; Victories Talked

Primary Election Vote Of 850,000 May Be Surpassed, If Weather Clear; Leaders Confident

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—Rainy weather in some sections of Texas may reduce the size of Tuesday's general election vote, commonly expected to reflect the greatest interest the state ever has taken in a national campaign.

Rain fell intermittently today over central and South Texas areas, including two large voting centers, San Antonio and Austin. The fall was continuing tonight.

Vote May Be Equalled

If Tuesday is a generally clear day and rural roads remain in fair condition, the primary election vote of approximately 850,000 votes may be equalled or surpassed.

Many "Hoover democrats," who stayed out of the primaries to avoid the democratic pledge, will vote as units of the "bolt" from the democratic national ticket.

Farm relief and economic issues, which have ruled foremost in other sections of the nation, will have little effect in Texas' election. The main agitation in this state, usually a paragon of democracy, has revolved around the prohibition issue, religion and Tammany hall affiliations of Governor Smith.

Underestimated thousands of erstwhile straight ticket democrats will vote for Herbert Hoover, republican candidate, because of some or other reason.

Smith Declares He's Ended Campaign Without Commitment To Any One

Democratic Nominee Says He Has Made No Promises To Any Man Or Group Of Men; Is Committed Only To American People; Final Appeal Over Radio

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Turning to radio to carry a final appeal to the voters of the nation, Alfred E. Smith declared tonight that he could "enter upon the duties of the greatest office in the world without commitment to anybody except the American people."

In his campaign valiantly speculatively prepared for delivery through the microphone to an unseen audience, the democratic nominee first reviewed in detail his record in public life and then delivered what he described as "my last spoken word before the American people start in the morning to make their decision."

Dr. White Makes Final Appeal For Hoover In Rally

Smith Support Is Bitterly Assailed by Baptist Minister In Hoover Meeting Last Night

Rap Liquor Stand

Hoover's Qualities As Leader Are Pointed Out; To Give Election Party At Hoover Camp Tonight

Picturing Gov. Alfred E. Smith as a "Jim Ferguson politician, unqualified for the presidency because of his early environment" and branding Hoover as the outstanding statesman of the times because his past record, the Rev. W. R. White, last night made the final appeal for votes for the republican presidential nominee at the final wind-up rally of the anti-Smith organization, at the Hoover headquarters 913 Broadway.

Dr. White, pastor of the First Baptist church here, was given a large ovation by the more than a hundred persons who attended the rally. It was the final appeal of the campaign; the last request for votes, and the last rebuke at an opposing candidate.

Defends Political Rights

Beginning by defending his right as a preacher to enter politics, Dr. White declared that the political preacher is the only one who is not afraid to speak his convictions and that he was using his right as a citizen to express his opinion. He charged that the question of religion was injected into the campaign by the democrats in order to give the leaders of the party an opportunity to make an appeal for a solid Catholic vote.

Opposition of the speaker to Al Smith was based chiefly on what he termed the "atmosphere which swirls about him to uphold the ideal of the American people, and the foreign environment in which Smith spent his early life." Dr. White charged that "Smith stands for that which keeps the slums and underworld going," and that Tammany "is a double faced organization with a slimy trail of corruption that has marked ever decade since its birth."

Electra Men Are Victims Of Crash

ELECTRA, Nov. 5 (AP)—C. L. Spill, jeweler, and J. S. Phillips, commercial pilot operating between here and Amarillo, were burned to death when the gasoline tank of their airplane burst and caught fire as they were landing at the municipal airport here late today. Both were burned beyond recognition, being identified only through the watch-fobs they wore.

The plane was wrecked. An acetone torch was used to cut portions of fuselage which pinned Phillips' body in the debris.

A rough landing is believed to have shattered the gasoline tank, the explosion occurring when the leaking contents ignited. Both men lived here.

Rangers To Guard Hidalgo Election

Local Factions In South Texas Counties Bitterly Oppose Each Other; Request Made To Moody

AUSTIN, Nov. 5.—One company Texas rangers, under the command of Captain Bill Sterling, stationed at Pahrump, and probably two or three men from the Austin headquarters company, were ordered to Hidalgo county today by Adjutant General R. L. Robertson, acting on instructions from Governor Moody.

General Robertson said he decided to send rangers to Hidalgo county where two local factions are contending for county offices, after having been requested to do so by both sides. He said that the rangers merely would be present in order to quell riots or outbreaks, should any occur. He received several telegrams today asking for rangers.

A full ticket of independent candidates for county offices is opposing the regular democratic nominees. It was claimed by the independents that the regular republicans were backing the administration ticket.

WEATHERFORD, Nov. 5 (AP)—Burned badly the body of Mrs. Joe Slickford, 67, was found in the smoking ruins of her home by searchers today.

Wichita Falls Hoover Rally Is Bombed; Heflin Egged

WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 5.—Thirteen persons, including a policeman, were injured, 10,000 marchers were showered with bricks, eggs and refuse, and women were hounded here tonight in disturbances which developed during an "election eve" republican demonstration.

Patrolman Harry Hyde was beaten senseless and several of his teeth were knocked out when he attempted to break up a fight, and Mrs. Lloyd Byrd of this city was taken to the city hospital after a horn she was blowing had been shoved down her throat.

Police Are Helpless

The police were unable to make any arrests as prisoners were torn from their grasp and the officers threatened by hundreds of men.

Most of the action took place in the "Meadows" district of the city, where the demonstration came to a close with a fire-works display. Several stores and houses, windows in the district were shattered by stones during the fighting. Signs were torn from business houses and hurled into the lines of the marchers.

Police reported that most of the injuries were incurred during individual fights at East Park. The authorities had expected disturbances and all policemen were ordered on duty.

Marchers Threatened

The first sign of trouble came at city hall where crowds lining the sidewalks pushed into the street and threatened the marchers. Mrs. Lloyd was in an automobile and was blowing a horn when a youth pushed it into her throat. She was taken to the police surgeon for emergency treatment and then sent to the hospital.

At Washington Square, where both Hoover and Smith were greeted during their recent visits to the city, the marchers were showered with eggs and refuse. They continued their march toward the park through a veritable barrage of bricks and eggs.

"Hoover" signs were torn from the marchers as they entered the park by men who used them as missiles.

Aviators Victims Of Air Currents

PRESCOTT, Ariz., Nov. 5 (AP)—Aviators here today advanced the theory that the airplane Yankee Doodle, which crashed near here Saturday, killing Captain C. R. Collyer and Harry Tucker, was caught in a downward draft of mountain air currents, when it faltered with motor trouble and dashed against the sides of the canyon in which it fell.

Mrs. Tucker, widow of the wealthy passenger-owner of the record breaking monoplane, was due here today from Long Beach, California. Funeral arrangements were being held up pending her arrival. The bodies probably will be sent to Los Angeles.

Hoover Issues Appeal To Electorate To Disregard Sectional Lines

Republican Nominee Declares "There Ought To No Longer Be Any North, South, East Or West, In Our National Thought"; Urges All To Vote

PALO ALTO, Cal., Nov. 5.—Herbert Hoover, in his final utterance of the campaign, tonight appealed to the electorate of the country to disregard sectional lines in balloting at the polls tomorrow.

"It is contrary to our national ideals that any party should represent any section of the country and this election more than any that has gone before gives hope for the breaking down of sectional lines," the republican presidential candidate said.

Ideals Are Matted

"There ought to no longer be any north, south, east or west in our national thought. Our ideals as Americans have been molded and welded under leadership of men

Candidates Rest At Home With Their Pilgrimages At End; Both Are Confident Of Victory

May Be Very Close

Weather Expected To Play Important Part In Vote Turnout; Women To Be Big Factor Also

This is election day, summoning the populace to its civic duty of selecting its governing officers. Once again it must decide whether the helm of national leadership shall be entrusted to republican or democratic.

It has to choose between Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis on the one side and Alfred E. Smith and Joe T. Robinson on the other. By the ballot the electorate also must declare its preference in electing 37 senators, 435 representatives, 34 governors and other state officers.

Evidence Is Weighed

More than forty million strong, the electorate is ready to express its will, amply prepared to write its mandate after months of attentive listening to debate on the issues and of close scrutiny of the candidates themselves. It has weighed the evidence and heard the closing arguments of the standard bearers; there remains to the beleaguered voter only the task of decision.

Appealing to an aroused populace to translate its convictions into ballots at the polls, Mr. Hoover directed his last words of the campaign to the country over the radio last night from his Palo Alto, California, home. Governor Smith spoke twice

Systematic Hunt Made for Convicts

Thirty-one Prisoners Make Their Escape But 10 Are Recaptured; Guitars Silence Escape Alarm

FREETOWN, Nov. 5.—Nineteen of 31 convicts who squeezed singly through a small prison window while their fellow inmates lulled guards with guitars and song were the objects of a vast search which continued unabated tonight in the southeast Texas country.

Twelve of the 31 men who crawled last night through a small window, from which a bar had been cut, at Clemens state prison farm near here, were recaptured. The others, probably still dressed in the striking regulation prison white, presumably were skulking about the bottom and brush of this section.

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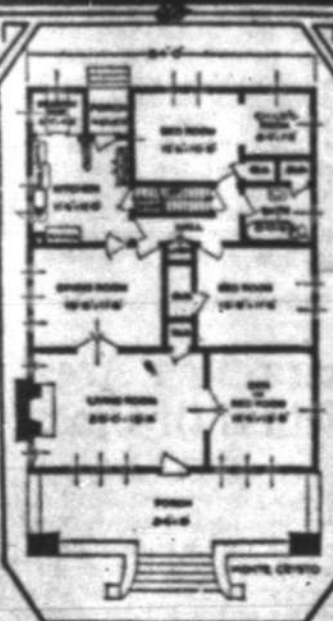

'Huge Election Machine' Will Gather Vote Returns For Associated Press

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP).—Need for prompt returns on every presidential election has been accentuated this year, and for the first time The Associated Press will organize its "election machine" in every state in the union. The "solid south" and some of the "hitherto rock-ribbed republican" states of the north have all been brought into that plan.

Two main considerations apply to the election reports of The Associated Press—accuracy and speed. If accuracy is put first that fast does not imply over-deliberation in the assembling and distribution of the figures. On the contrary, every human possibility for fast work is carefully charted in advance.

But accuracy is of course the sine qua non of such figures. Incalculable harm would result from dissemination of erroneous returns and hence much of the emphasis of the machinery is placed on that important factor.

The system takes care of the result in each precinct or election division of a state. Generally the county is used as the initial unit and special correspondents with intimate knowledge of their home counties are placed in each court house to gather and forward the count from each cross-street polling place, hamlet or city ward in the county.

to be for only one precinct. The next may carry four more, but the county man reports to strategic center the total for all five precincts.

As these progressively more comprehensive figures come from each county into tabulation headquarters, the preceding report is displaced by the later. Thus the tally sheets show the latest totals from each county.

Then all these tabulation sheets, teams and subdivisions are duplicated. They work from the same returns as the first set of figure handlers, but independently of them. Their results are compared only when a total is required. If the two totals do not agree there is instant comparison of entries and a check back if necessary of the original figures. This may go back to the count or the precinct reporters. And that is where the accuracy comes in.

By this system it is possible to tabulate returns from at least part of the precincts in every county of a state within three or four hours after the polls close. Such widely distributed reports usually indicate whether the state has gone democratic or republican. But The Associated Press does not announce that result as a fact until every reasonable shadow of doubt has been dispelled.

printed pages of the newspapers in form the American voter of how his composite mind reacted to the campaign and he knows the result more quickly than the voter of any other land.

He knows it, too, because he has faith in the accuracy of The Associated Press, the unparalleled facilities of which enable it to give the readers of its member newspapers a service which few combined speed and accuracy are not equalled by any other agency in the world.

The 1924 and 1928 elections were sweeping victories for the successful candidates, but the 1916 vote was not. Early in the evening it seemed as though Charles Evans Hughes had swept the election, and even some of the supporters of Woodrow Wilson were willing to concede his defeat. But The Associated Press would not announce a result because the returns were not complete enough to make a mathematical certainty of the situation.

A few hours later it became evident that the outcome would hinge on the California vote, and that state was close. The Associated Press machine there at once started an intensive re-check of every county. Couriers were sent into the mountains to find out how the

scattered ranchers had voted. Special telegraphic circuits were set up and fresh men and women employed to wield pencils and operate adding machines on the long columns of figures.

In Washington President Wilson was waiting aboard the Mayflower to start on a brief vacation after the strain of the campaign. All through Wednesday the revised returns fluctuated. Then finally came the "clash."

"California goes for Wilson."

The Mayflower started down the Potomac, for President Wilson knew that when The Associated Press said he had won there was no room for doubt.

Where Davy was successful in obtaining the democratic gubernatorial nomination in Ohio, "Jim Beag," one of the rising leaders in the house republican ranks, failed to receive the republican nomination, which would have brought him into a contest with his house colleague in November. A second member of the house who failed to obtain a republican gubernatorial nomination was Joseph D. Beck of Wisconsin, one of the LaFollette group of independents, who was defeated by Walter J. Kohler.

Conkie, the youngest member of the house, who now is serving his first term, did not offer for reelection, choosing to resume the practice of law in his home city, but Hersey, a Maine veteran of six sessions, went down to defeat before Donald F. Snow, who was elected in the Pine Tree state last month.

Since the gavel fell last May death has removed two prominent members of the house, Henry R. Rathbone of Illinois and Louis A. Frothingham of Massachusetts. Just before the session ended three other veterans answered the last roll call—Thomas Butler of Pennsylvania, chairman of the naval committee; Martin B. Madden of Illinois, chairman of the appropriations committee; and James A. Callahan of Massachusetts, who was a leader of the wet forces.

All four of the women new members of the house—Florence F. Kahn of California, Edith Nourse Rogers of Massachusetts, and Mrs. Charles McNary of Tennessee—were elected by Senator

Tom Connally of Texas, Theodore E. Burton of Ohio and Charles E. Winter of Wyoming—were successful in their quest for Senatorial nominations, but only one, Martin L. Davy of Ohio, won a place on the gubernatorial ticket.

In addition to Connally, Burton, Winter and Davy, among the outstanding figures who will be missed from the house chamber when the seventy-first congress convenes are Finis J. Garrett of Tennessee, the democratic floor leader; James T. Beag of Ohio, Ira Q. Hersey of Maine, Thomas L. Blanton of Texas, the scrappiest member of the house, and George H. Combs, Jr., the baby member from Kansas City.

Garrett, who probably will be succeeded as democratic leader by John Garner of Texas and who has served in the house for 24 years, failed to realize his ambition to become a senator. He was defeated in the Tennessee primaries by Senator

Kenneth McKellar.

Blanton, too, was unsuccessful in his fight for a senatorial nomination, both he and Senator Earle B. Mayfield going down before the genial Tom Connally in one of the hottest scraps for a senatorship in the Lone Star State has known in many years. Another democrat who sought to unhorse a senator, T. Webster Wilson, was defeated in the Mississippi primaries by Hubert D. Stephens.

BREAKFAST: Omelette fruit juice, cereal, cream, salt codfish and parmesan hash, toasted corn muffins, milk, coffee.

DINNER: Fish steak served in tomato sauce, buttered lima beans, spinach and egg salad, pear spiced cake, milk, coffee.

Marmalade and Nut Rolls
Two cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 scant teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, about 3-4 cup milk, cup orange marmalade, 1-2 cup broken nut meats, 2 tablespoons softened butter.

Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Rub in butter with tips of fingers and cut in milk. Use enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn onto a flour molding board and roll into a rectangular sheet not more than one-half thick. Spread lightly with softened butter, then spread with marmalade and sprinkle with nuts. Roll over and over making a roll about two inches in diameter. Cut in slices three-fourths inch thick. Place cut side down on a well-buttered baking pan and bake 15 minutes in a hot oven.

Radio Makes Campaign Most Personal In Nation's History; Expected To Be Vital Factor In Bringing Out Votes

Smith Uses Approximately 125,000 Words In Talks, While Hoover Is Less Talkative; All Travel

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Thousands upon thousands of American citizens saw the four principles of the major parties in the campaign which closed today, but the radio made it the most personal, man-to-man presidential contest the country has ever known.

In the number of states visited, radio hours consumed an speeches made, Senator Joe T. Robinson, democratic nominee for vice president, had a wide edge on all the others, but because of the extensive radio chains, Herbert Hoover and Governor Smith were heard by the greatest number of persons.

While Governor Smith made nearly twice as many formal speeches as the republican candidate, both he and Mr. Hoover were seen by the residents of more than a score of states.

Exactly 19 1-2 radio hours were used by Mr. Smith to carry his ideas of government to every city and hinterland of the country. Mr. Hoover used only nine, an hour for the nine formal addresses of his campaign. The republican candidate, however, made more informal speeches than Governor Smith, the number running to around 100, but this number includes even the short speeches of welcome Hoover made to visiting delegations at his Washington headquarters and the brief platform utterances he made from the rear of his train.

Smith Uses 125,000 Words
If one has a turn for figures and can visualize the amount of thought expressed by the two presidential candidates by counting words, he finds Smith used approximately 125,000 words to tell the people where he stood on the issues and Hoover used about 75,000.

The campaigns of both Senator

Robinson and Senator Charles Curtis, running mate of Hoover, were extensive, that of Senator Robinson banking with the most ambitious ever made in the political history of the United States.

Robinson spoke in all but fourteen states of the union after his notification. They included all but the six New England states, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Colorado, Montana, Delaware, Michigan and Maryland. He traveled through a tip of Colorado and through Pennsylvania, but made no speeches.

Curtis was seen in approximately thirty states and spoke in about twenty-five of them. He made sixty formal and informal speeches as against 196 by Senator Robinson, and used about twenty-five radio hours. Senator Robinson had the radio at his disposal for approximately sixty hours, a number of them for extensive hookups.

That the radio will be an important factor in bringing out the vote tomorrow is the opinion of Governor Smith who said in a statement today that he considered the radio would be largely responsible for the casting of the largest vote in history.

The presidents and other officials will meet in New York, December 11, and hop off the next day at noon for Chicago to attend the joint meeting of the National and American leagues Thursday.

At both the National and American league meetings relations with the minors will be discussed fully. The major leagues expect to have a proposal from the minors for action on the question of the draft. The minor leagues meet at Toronto the week before the major assembly and they will find an emphatic request from the major which an argument can be built.

Many Trades Likely
At both the National League gathering in New York and that of the American league in Chicago, trades of players seem likely, with more activity indicated in the eastern than the western part.

They Marked The Cards On Rothstein And Won \$280,000 But He Refused To "Squeal" Standing at Death's Door

Underworld's Most Famed Gambler Is Fleeing Of Small Fortune But Stays True to Gang Code

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Arnold Rothstein, who would change thousands on the turn of a card, a stock fluctuation or a running horse, was at death's door tonight because renegades of his own underworld profession.

They marked the cards on Rothstein and won \$280,000, police were informed today. Knowing at last the game was crooked, but knowing also that if he said so then he would never leave the room alive, he turned over what he happened to have in his wallet, a matter of \$180,000 and gave his I. O. U. for the rest.

Welched On His Paper
And then, safely away, he sent word that for the first time in his eventful career, he was going to "squeal" on his paper, and they could whistle up the wind for their money. "Tell them," he said, "they can go bite themselves to death."

He got a bodyguard and was careful about where he went and who went with him. But last night a man who passed as his friend summoned him by telephone to a room in the Park Central hotel and when he went there he was confronted by the trio who had tried to fleece him. They had been drinking and Rothstein must have known that he was close to death.

Muffed Explosion
But he refused to buy his life at the sharpers' terms and told them so in no uncertain words, as police reconstruct the case. There was a muffed explosion recalled later by an elevator operator, a scuttling away of the "creditors," who had called Rothstein to account, and Rothstein himself, shot through the abdomen, walked unsteadily to the hotel entrance and asked weakly for a cab.

The attendant called an ambulance and summoned police. Detective Patrick Flood of the squad that controls the bright light district that was Rothstein's haunt, was first to arrive.

"Who shot you, Rothstein?" he asked, but the gambler only put his finger to his lips and shook his head.

Refused to Squeal
"You know me better than that, Paddy," he said, and so they took him to the hospital, refusing to violate the underworld code that forbids "squealing" even against a mortal enemy.

Rothstein was operated on today and afterwards doctors only reported that the operation was completed. They did not say it was successful. Later they announced the gambler's condition was "desperate," and his wife and intimates were given little hope that he would live.

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Bright Prospects For Varsity Team With Aggie Frosh

Formidable Array Of Potential Varsity Gridsters Result From Seven-Week Weeding Out Process

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 5.—Now that a seven-week weeding-out process has reduced to fifty-eight the squad of 212 freshmen football candidates who reported for training at the A and M college of Texas in September, the result shows a formidable array of potential varsity gridsters for the Texas Aggie line-up in 1929. Freshman Coach Russell Higginbotham and his assistants have had a busy time of it this fall sifting, testing and training the bunch of husky freshmen. Their work promises to pay big dividends next year, however, for the fifty-eight men who have withstood the pruning knife promise to give the 1929 Aggies a stellar assortment of strong, heavy players.

In this group are four former all-state players from Texas high schools, one all-state man from New Mexico, three who won all-city recognition in Dallas and Houston and several others who earned distinction while playing with various junior colleges and high schools.

Promising Lineups
It is in the line that the most imposing array of freshman material is found this year and these candidates for the forward wall are expected to be of great value to Line Coach "Chuck" Bassett in building the varsity line next season. The freshman line is probably the heaviest freshman forward wall in the history of the college, averaging several pounds more to the man than does this year's varsity line.

The center of the line is probably the weakest point with only four candidates for the pivot berth. Out-standing among the candidates is A. R. Abbey, three year man from Del Rio high school. Others who are making competition warm for this berth are L. T. Braxwell, Jasper; P. L. Jones, Decatur; and Gmge Teer, Houston boy and former member of the Sam Houston high school grid team.

Great strength is to be found at guard positions where ten men are putting up a bitterly contested battle for numerals. Among those showing especially good form are Jack Christian, all-state man from Abilene; L. A. Fulerwider, 205-pound guard from Whitesboro; A. A. Golasinski, Houston boy who won an all-city berth playing with the Heights high eleven; L. E. Le-go, stellar guard from Forest Avenue high school at Dallas; and Bentley Murphy, another Dallas boy, for three year as member of the Sunset high school team. Others fighting for the positions are: S. W. Calhoun, Fort Worth; D. W. Sawell, Jr., Dallas; D. S. Hutchings, Houston; R. W. Rowley, Marshall; and S. G. Walker, Groesbeck.

Power at Tackle
The greatest weight and power is found among the candidates for tackle, men tipping the scales for well over 200 pounds. No candidate for tackle weighs less than 170 pounds. Outstanding among these are: J. C. Blewett, former Deatur Baptist college and Decatur high school star; E. L. Froisher, Houston boy who for three years was a member of the Heights high school eleven; O. B. Magrill, all-state gridster from Marshall; Carl Moulden, former Cisco high gridster; E. B. KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

A.—Relatively light cattle receipts around the stock market circuit stimulated demand for most all classes of cattle; Chicago had a liberal run of beef steers and reported weak to 25c lower prices on short fed offerings but at the majority of markets killing classes were firm to slightly higher; stocker and feeder steers were on a strong to 25c higher basis with the supply at Kansas city very light; choice heavy steers at Chicago scored \$18.00 and yearlings realized \$17.75; Omaha and Kansas City had a top of \$17.50 on choice yearlings. Aggregate receipts of around 78,000 were 36,200 short of last Monday and 55,000 less than a year ago.

Hogs were on a firm to 25c higher basis with curtailed receipts and a fairly broad shipping demand were the strengthening factors; packers were "bearish" and failed at several centers to follow the pace set by shippers; the day's top of \$9.85 was paid at St. Louis; total offerings approximated 85,300 against 104,391 a week ago, and 95,566 the same day last year.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 (AP)—Clearing the decks for the election holiday tomorrow, together with smallness of increase of visible supply figures did much today to send wheat prices up. Furthermore, complaints were received of rust and of unusual moisture in northern Argentina.

Closing quotations on wheat were firm, 5-8 to 3-4c to 1c net higher. Corn finished at 3-8c decline to a shade advance, oats a shade to 1-8 to 1-4c up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 30c.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—What Wall Street has fallen into the habit of calling the "Coolidge market" made history on its dying day. There was considerable confusion of opinion as to what sort of a

market Wednesday may bring forth, but commission houses were more inclined to advocate caution on the grounds of the market's technical position rather than on any possible effect of the election the fact that the market is heavily margined was a reassuring factor.

A wide assortment of oils, coppers, utilities, rails and specialties climbed 3 to 12 points in trading of good volume, sales exceeding 3,800,000 shares. A drop in the call money rate from 6 to 6 percent, the lowest rate in nearly a fortnight, gave impetus to buying and wiped out signs of nervousness apparent in the early transactions. Save for two days late in October, call money has not been at 6 percent since September. There was also an easing in time money rates.

Oils were in heavy demand, as further developments in plans of controlling production were announced, accompanied by a varied assortment of unfounded rumors. Standard Oil of New Jersey stepped up 3 points to a new high price for the year. Standards of California and New Jersey also went to new highs, up a point and more. The conversion feature will constitute an 8-year call on the common at 100% 2-3. The stock went ahead about 4 points, followed by gains of about 2 to 4 points in Canadian Pacific, Kansas City Southern, and Pere Marquette.

General Motors jumped about 4 points, missing previous high, but later cancelled most of its gains in a heavy turnover. Adams and American Express shot up 10 to 15 points while National City skyrocketed 25 points to a new peak at 364. Aero shares were strong on reports of rapidly expanding business. Curtiss and Wright shooting up 10 and 12 points.

Simmons and Timken Roller Bearing climbed 8 and 5 points to new peaks, and Kennecott Copper touched a new high price, up more than 5 points.

Merchandising shares displayed group strength. First National Stores touched a new peak and Montgomery Ward, Macy, Groger, and Sears-Roebuck made good gains.

The number of net losses was small. Russia Insurance and Gotham Silk Hosiery preferred falling nearly 6 points, while American Linseed preferred, American Locomotive preferred, American Beet Sugar preferred, Devoe and Reynolds, Industrial Rayon, and U. S. Tobacco, receded about 3 to 5 points.

In the commodity markets, cotton was generally heavy, selling down almost 32 a bale in liquidation in anticipation of the govern-

ments crop report Thursday. Grains held generally steady and transactions were largely of a pre-holiday evening-up nature.

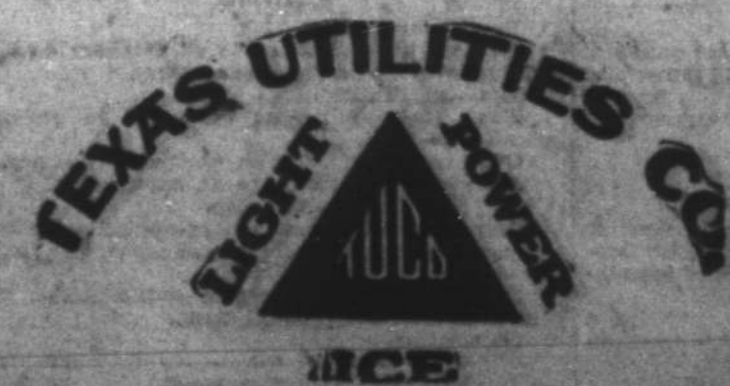

THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE

The approach of the presidential election is certain to present the usual puzzle over the personnel and procedure of the electoral college on the part of those who have a hazy knowledge of its existence. It may seem strange that an effort has not been made to alter this formality and permit the citizens to vote directly for their choice rather than for a group of men who in reality are nothing more than political stalking horses. Perhaps if the national constitution were to be overhauled this procedure would be eliminated. The provision has remained in this basic document since 1787 and may continue indefinitely due to the general objection to tinkering with the fundamental law. It is quite likely that only a very few voters are familiar with the functions and duties of the presidential electors. The constitution provides that each state shall appoint in such manner as the Legislature may direct a "number of electors equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state is entitled in Congress. The electors meet in the capitals of their respective states on the same day and cast their votes for President and Vice President. The ballots are sealed and sent to the president of the Senate at Washington, who opens the sealed envelopes in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives. Ordinarily one of the state electors is chosen as a specially accredited messenger to deliver the vote in person to Washington. This ceremony is nothing but an empty formality comparable to that of officially notifying a candidate that he has been nominated weeks after the national convention has adjourned. It is accepted as axiomatic, of course, that the elector will vote for the candidate on whose behalf he was chosen, but there is nothing to prevent an elector from voting for the rival presidential candidate. Nothing but a moral obligation exists, although no one ever has been fearful that the electoral college might run counter to the mandate of the people. It is a pleasant little farce and enables a group of politically dignified and socially prominent to hawk briefly in the spotlight and to enhance their records in "Who's Who" by reference to the service as a presidential elector.

DRUNK AUTOISTS

We are not inclined to want to be severe on people who are willing to do right, but when they insist on being bad, we believe the punishment should be plenty severe. This thing of driving automobiles while intoxicated is something that should not be tolerated at all. People should be given a chance, but they must also be given to understand that they must not continue to repeat their acts of disobedience to the laws of the land and endanger the lives of people. A few more penitentiary sentences for convictions of driving cars while intoxicated would stamp out this dangerous practice. Press dispatches from day to day tell of people being run down by drunken automobile drivers, and we also learn of many who kill themselves while trying to run a car and be drunk at the same time. A typical example of what should be done more generally is instanced in Kansas City. The driver of a motor car received a four year sentence in the penitentiary when he was drunk and allowed his car to strike a youth. The boy was only slightly injured but might have just as easily been killed instantly. Luck does not always favor people, as it did in this instance. One drunk man driving a car might have a rip-roaring time, and cause death and destruction to many, and even himself, yet another kill children and grown folks.

A Washington Bystander

BY KIRKE L. SIMPSON



WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—It's a tough proposition for a lawyer to undertake consideration of a case which involves technical scientific questions of fact rather than law. Lawyers and judges cannot very well be deeply learned in all the sciences as well as the law. Yet they are constantly being called upon in patent suits, for instance, to cram up in a matter of weeks or months on most abstruse scientific questions sufficiently to present an argument or to decide an issue of fact as to priority of patent rights between claimants.

Stale In Court.
No scientific development of recent times had been more prolific of terminology perplexing to a layman in science than radio. Vast sums of money are involved in patent suits as to radio's evolution and even the distinguished lawyers who compose the United States supreme court cannot escape locking horns at times with problems that involve for them a reasonable degree of understanding of the mysteries of alternating and direct currents, regenerative phenomena, heterodyning effect, high and low frequency circuits and all the rest of it.

The so-called "feed back" circuit patent fight now before the supreme court is a case in point. Incidentally, also, it gave Charles Evans Hughes as counsel for one side an opportunity to exhibit in presenting his argument what seemed to the Bystander an amazing grasp of the general principles and theories of radio.

Hughes Explaining Radio.
It was his role to defend a patent already granted, which is, no doubt, an advantage. His opponent had displayed before the bench on an easel a "hook-up" chart of a feed-back circuit in contending that the idea had originated not with the patent holder but with the scientist from whom his clients drew their rights. His explanation involved a technical description of just what a feed-back circuit is; a description of the tube where it is produced and why it is a fundamental element in modern radio reception. Chief Justice Taft and his colleagues listened with considerable evidence that it was very deep stuff even for them. At one point, counsel was asked from the bench, rather pathetically, if there was not some law question on which the issue could not be decided. The lawyer thought not.

When Mr. Hughes arose, he virtually ignored the chart and spoke from notes rather than from the legal script. His argument dealt rather with the legal record on the case, which involves about a dozen big volumes of testimony, but whenever he had occasion to touch on radio technicalities he did it in an off-hand way, without reference to his notes, that implied he knew exactly what he was talking about.

At one point he volunteered an explanation of "heterodyning effect," the words having occurred in an excerpt of testimony he was reading. Your Health

HERE ARE FORTY HABITS OF GOOD HEALTH

One of the most interesting documents for the average man is the health habit sheet by Drs. J. Mace Andres and I. H. Goldberger in a consideration of the essentials of healthy living.

In tabular form they have listed 40 health habits with special reference to people.

Any person may check up his health routine, and follow its progress from day to day.

These 40 health ideas should be kept in mind by every person interested in good personal hygiene. The list follows:

Posture.
Small pillow used when sleeping.
Stand tall. Sit erect with head up and chest lifted.

Books carried at arm's length and changed from one to the other.
Shoes for school which do not cramp the toes and without high heels.

Food.
Thorough chewing (mastication).
Some raw food or fruit eaten daily.
Some green vegetables eaten daily in addition to other foods.

Exercise.
One pint (at least) of milk, consumed daily.
No candy between meals.
No coffee.
One glass of water upon rising.
Four (at least) additional glasses of water during the day.

Exercise.
Brief setting-up exercises before dressing and before retiring.
No violent exercises immediately after eating.
One half hour (at least) each day of enjoyable recreation out of doors.

Cleanliness.
Soap and water used daily for bodily cleanliness.
Hot bath at least once a week.
Individual towel.

Hands and face washed before breakfast and dinner (also before lunch when possible).
Teeth brushed at least twice a day.
Dental floss used at least once a week.
Finger nails cleaned daily, and not bitten.

Home Environment.
Hair and scalp clean. Shampoo every two weeks.
Room temperature not over 70 degrees during months when controllable. Thermometer consulted.
Bedroom windows opened at night (screened in summer).

Steady and sufficient artificial light, when studying or reading and avoidance of glare.
Quiet room for study.

Relaxation and Rest.
At least eight hours sleep.
Prevention of fatigue, when studying, by short rest periods.

Music (radio, piano, etc.) or games for recreation in the home.
Avoidance in general of movies and parties, during the school week.

Regularity.
Regular toilet habits.
Rising in time to attend to all necessary details and breakfast without excessive hurry.

Meals at regular times.
Home study at regular times and in general not after 10 p. m.

Concentration of mind on work when studying.
Attitude of punctuality to all engagements.

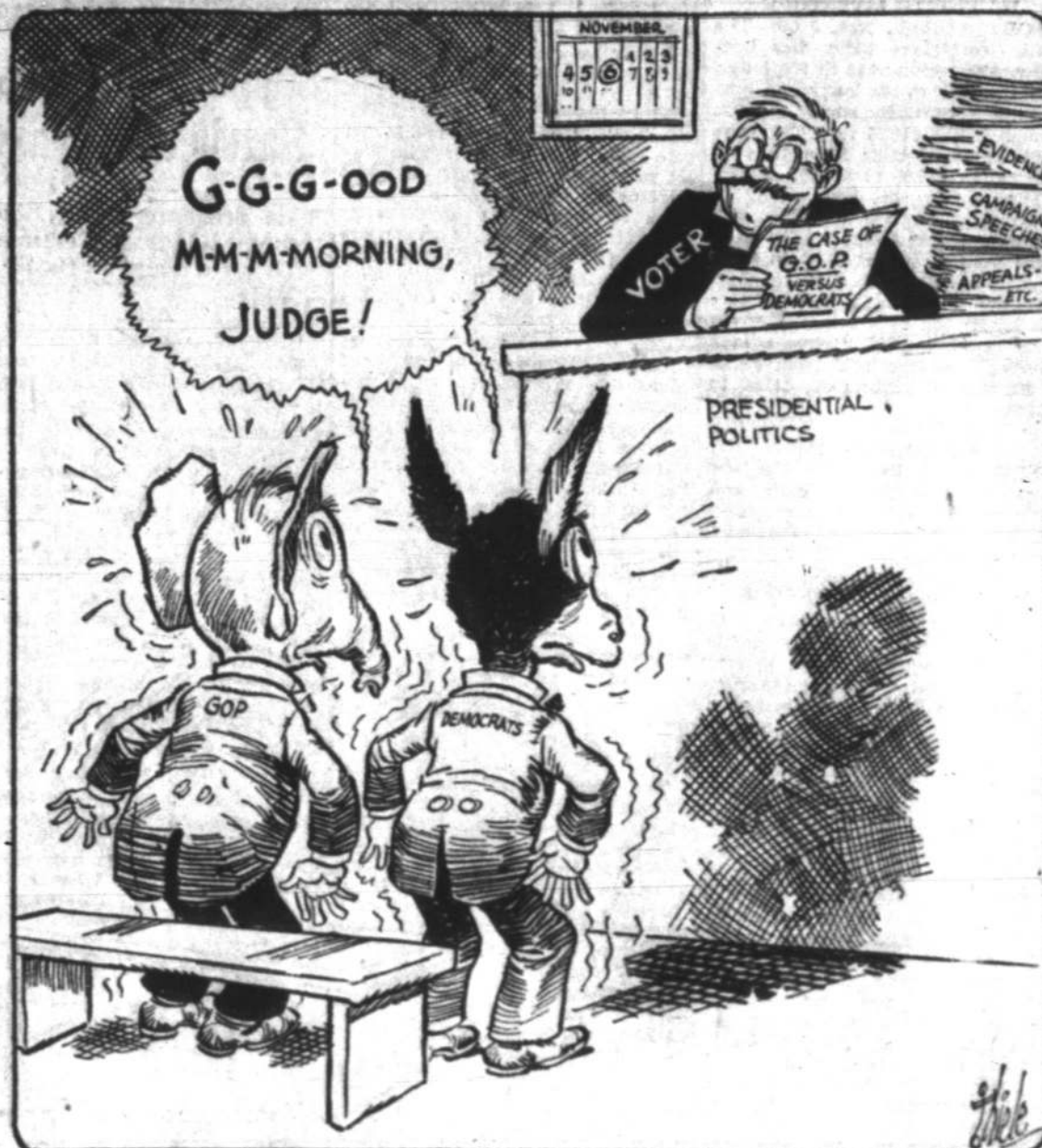
Co-operation.
Annual health examination or medical attention to remediable defects, such as poor vision, flat feet, etc.

Dental examination, cleaning and correction of defects at least every school term.
No smoking.

Who's Who in Timely Views

GAINING IN GERMANY
A. J. Dr. Frederick Wilhelm Von Prittwitz and Graf von Prittwitz Ambassador to the United States

Frederick Wilhelm von Prittwitz and Graf von Prittwitz was born in Germany in 1894. He began his diplomatic career in Washington, D. C. in 1908, serving as third secretary in the German embassy for two years. He was then appointed second secretary at St. Petersburg, Russia, and a year later secured an important position in the German foreign office at Berlin. He fought in the World war and was seriously wounded. After the German revolution Herr von Prittwitz was named first counselor of the German embassy at Rome. He was appointed ambassador to the United States in November, 1927.

The German people trust that the signing of the peace conference war will not merely remain a drawing hope but will lead to further "radical efforts" in developing methods of peaceful settlement of international differences.

The German foreign policy has not changed its line; it stands for peace and justice. Every initiative in this direction will find Germany's support. The result of the last meeting in Geneva opens a hopeful outlook.

As for the relations between Germany and the United States, I noticed everywhere in Germany that the political, economic and personal contact which has developed between the two countries, has led to a growing mutual understanding.

I found the political conditions in Germany very satisfactory. The unrest of the immediate post-war period has completely disappeared and a political stabilization has begun.

Economically the problems to face remain the same; the necessity of increasing our export and "the need of capital to keep the economic machinery going. The general economic situation is favorably influenced by this year's harvest which is quantitatively and qualitatively better than last year. On the other hand, the conditions of business have been somewhat less favorable within the last weeks. The number of unemployed is increasing; against 847,000 unemployed at the beginning of the month of August the number of unemployed reached 900,000 in the month of September.

The trade between Germany and the United States in the first six months of 1928 has considerably increased. The imports from the United States in this period, which amounted to \$38,000,000 marks last year, reached 1,046,000,000 marks this year.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Nobody back in the tiny hamlet of West Branch, Ia., 90 years ago ever dreamed that Bert Hoover, the barefoot little orphan whose father had been the village blacksmith, would ever be nominated president of the United States.

And likewise nobody back in Topeka, Kas., 50 years ago ever dreamed that 18-year-old Charles Curtis, another orphan, who had a good job as a hack driver and was studying law in his spare time, would ever be nominated for vice president of the United States.

Yet today these two orphans who fought their way upward in the world, were nominated for the highest offices within the gift of the American people.

It is a story without parallel, a story of triumph that is possible only in a land where freedom, equality and opportunity prevail—a story that is in keeping with the finest of American traditions.

The careers of Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis have been strangely alike—and strangely dissimilar.

Each was an orphan boy, bereft of both mother and father at a tender age, each fought his own way to fame with little aid; each mastered his opportunities, rose to every occasion, climbed the ladder of success by his own efforts.

Their goal was the same—but their routes thereto were vastly different.

The orphaned Hoover came up by a route that brought him a college education, a world-wide reputation as a mining engineer and wealth almost beyond the dreams

of avarice. The orphaned Curtis struggled way from an Indian reservation through a career as a jockey, a hack driver, a self-educated lawyer, a county prosecutor, a congressman and a senator of slender means.

Curtis has spent almost a lifetime in politics; the first and only office that Hoover ever ran for was that of president.

The curtain rose on the life of Herbert Clark Hoover in a clapboard cabin on a sawing farm in rural Iowa on Aug. 10, 1874. His father—a powerful bear of a man—was Jesse Hoover, a farmer, who also ran a black-smith shop at the village of West Branch. Both of his parents were devout Quakers, sober of mien and stern of speech.

Before young Hoover was 10 years old both his father and his mother had died. For a time he lived with relatives on a nearby farm and then when he was 10 an uncle took him to Oregon. There, young Hoover worked in his uncle's real estate office, for the Oregon land boom was on.

Lured by the tales of a roving mining prospector who chanced that way when he was entering young manhood, Hoover decided to become a mining engineer. His savings were small, but Le and Stanford University was just opening down in California so he went there and worked his way through.

He waited on tables, collected laundry for fellow students, managed a college livery bureau and did almost anything else that would turn an honest penny.

After graduation Hoover worked as a day laborer in California mines to gain experience and then went to

work in the office of Louis Janin, a famous mining engineer. Janin recommended him to a London firm of mining engineers and, in 1897, the latter sent him to Australia to take charge of its gold mines there.

A couple of years later, on one of his brief trips to the United States, he married Miss Lou Henry, who had been a classmate at Leland Stanford. They were the first and only sweethearts each ever had. Entering business for himself, Hoover began developing mining properties in China, India, Burma and other far-away lands. Fortune smiled on his enterprises and he became a man of tremendous wealth.

The outbreak of the World War found Hoover at his office in London. The story of his career from that day on is too well known to need repetition in detail here.

Briefly, it is the story of a genius who organized the Belgian Relief Commission that fed eight million homeless souls through weary years of war; that spent \$17,000,000 a month, employed 50,000 workers, operated its own ships, flew its own flag and issued its own passports.

Briefly, it is the story of the man whom President Wilson called home in 1917 to become food administrator of the United States—who imposed "Meatless Tuesdays," "Wheatless Wednesdays" on a free people and, what is more, made them like it.

It is the story of a man who, in the trying days just after the war, conquered famine in devastated Europe by feeding whole nations and spent more than \$600,000,000 for supplies at an overhead cost of less than one-half of one per cent.

It is the story of a man whom President Coolidge called to take charge of relief operations in the Mississippi Valley in the spring of 1927, when 600,000 were made homeless by floods.

It is the story of a man who, as secretary of commerce, has saved American industry many millions by standardization of manufacture and other economies.

His constructive achievements stand out as among the greatest ever accomplished by one man in all history.

Of less magnitude, but even more colorful, has been the career of Senator Curtis.

Of Indian ancestry on his mother's side, he was born on an Indian reservation in Kansas in 1890. Before he was three his mother died, and his father—Capt. Owen A. Curtis, a trader who had come west from Indiana—died soon after.

For a time young Curtis lived with his father's parents in Topeka, but at the age of five he went back to the Kaw reservation, 60 miles away. There he lived with his Indian grandmother in her tepee, played with the Indian boys and attended an Indian mission school.

He might have been an Indian yet, if one day in 1898, a band of marauding Cheyennes had not attacked the reservation of the friendly Kaws.

Young Curtis, then eight years old, was a fair rider and could speak both English and Indian, so the beleaguered Kaws chose him to gallop to the cavalry post at Topeka for help. He slipped through the Cheyennes lines and summoned the soldiers, who chased the raiders away.

Curtis didn't go back to the Indian reservation. Instead, he made his home with his father's people for a time and then became a jockey, riding at Kansas race tracks before he was 10.

When increasing weight finally ended his days as a jockey, he sold candy and worked in a livery stable. Next, he got a job driving a hack.

It was while he was a hack driver that Curtis studied law, often reading his law books by the light of the oil lamps on his cab as he waited for fares. A sympathetic lawyer finally took the youth into his office.

At 21, Curtis was admitted to the bar and at 25 (in 1885) he got his first political job when he was elected to Congress and served seven terms. In 1897 he was elected to the Senate. In 1913 he was elected and in 1914 he was re-elected and has since served there. He was named Republican floor leader upon the death of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts.

Such is the story of the two orphans, Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis, who have struggled their way upward through lean and bitter years.

It is an epic of personal achievement, proof of the real opportunity that beckons to the young men of every generation in a land where all men are born equal; it is thoroughly in accord with the finest traditions of America.

Here's The Information On Voting

Judge Thinks Ladies Need Information On How To Vote So He Gives A Few Pointers; Read Them

"Women give more trouble in voting than do the men, and there are a great number of women, I'll bet you, that will go to the polls to vote, who do not have their poll tax paid," was the remark of a seasoned election judge here Saturday.

"I have seen women, whom I knew had never paid poll taxes, walk up to the polls, sign their names and affidavits stating they were qualified voters," the election judge continued. "And I'll bet you again they try it this Tuesday right here in Lubbock."

Not a Betting Person
Being not a betting person and, at the moment, feeling not argumentative, the reporter who was listening, did not retort. But, perhaps there is need of a little information, for the benefit of the women—and the men—voters about the general election of next Tuesday.

It will save time for you to take your poll tax receipt with you, when you go to vote.

However, if you do not have the receipt with you, you can vote without it, but you will have to sign a statement before the election judges to the effect that you have paid your poll tax for 1927 and are eligible to cast your ballot this year.

Information Furnished
(With all the primaries held this year, this information might be considered out of place, but you're getting it, nevertheless.)

Continuing: At each election box the judges are supposed to have a list of this year's qualified voters. If you get there without your poll tax receipt, the judges look upon the poll list, check your name. If it's there, and tell you to go ahead and vote.

Here is place for some more detailed information—for the benefit of the ladies, particularly. If you do not have your poll tax receipt with you, it might be that when you give your name to the election judge as, say, "Mrs. John D. Smith," and the judge looks in vain for such a name on his list and tells you that you

do not seem to be a qualified voter—and you know you are—do not argue and presume that he knows you are "Mrs. Susanna Smith," and tell him you forgot which name you gave to the tax collector when you paid the \$1.75, or do not know what your husband told him when he paid it.

Never Argue
No! No! Never argue with the election judge. Calmly say to the gentleman, "Well, perhaps my name is listed as 'Mrs. Susanna Smith,' and tell him you forgot which name you gave to the tax collector when you paid the \$1.75, or do not know what your husband told him when he paid it.

Then the judge will look again, smile and say: "Sure, here it is." And you go ahead and vote and wait expectantly with the other hundreds of thousands of women who believe this election hinges on how you voted.

However, if you should happen, perchance, to go to the polls because you are American born, white and 21, and admit it, but do not know that you can't vote without having paid your poll tax, or without your husband having paid it, just remember you were warned in advance. They won't let you do it.

Judges Tell What To Do
Should you, men or woman reader, have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1927, and before November 6, you do not need a poll tax receipt, nor an exemption certificate. Go to the polls, the judges will tell you what to do.

Should you be of more years, and become 60 years of age, before January 1, 1927, you do not need a poll tax receipt, nor an exemption certificate. The judges at the polling places will take care of you and you can have a say so as to who's who.

A number of sample ballots have been distributed throughout the county showing how to fill out the straight ticket or mark out portions of it. Anyone bringing one of these ballots to the polls will be subject to having their vote thrown out, it was said.

Watchers Guard Polls In Chicago

15,000 Will Guard Over Polls In Gangtown Today In Attempt To Hold Quiet Election

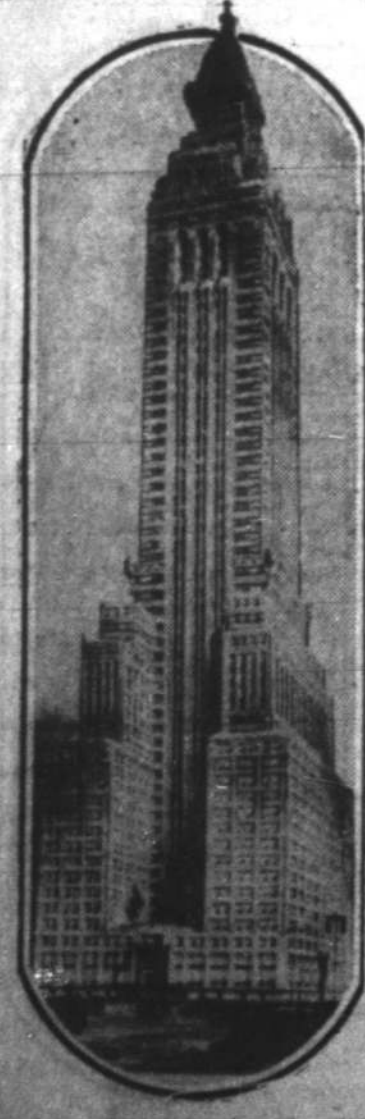
CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—To prevent a repetition of the fraud and terrorism which marked the April primaries, 15,000 poll watchers will guard Chicago's ballot boxes tomorrow.

This, the largest array of election day watchers in the city's history, has been enrolled despite official's confident predictions that the election will be free from disorders.

Ten thousand watchers have been recruited by the citizens non-partisan association. A city policeman will guard each polling place. Detectives, 300 of them, will cruise the streets in automobiles. From the Chicago Bar association there will be 500 watchers. Special policemen and 600 university students will assist wherever needed.

Arrangements For Locating Federal Building Planned

Another problem, that the Lubbock county commissioners' court had not figured on, came up for attention Monday afternoon, when it was discovered that the pipe line, placed across the grounds of the courthouse square for piping gas to the buildings, will have to be moved in order to make room for the new United States federal building at the southeast corner of the square.

The government, in its dealings with the commissioners, lay down as some of their rules that no other building can be within 40 feet of its new federal building. This necessitates removal of the old county jail, which has been agreed to. It will be torn down and a new structure built on the northeast side of the square and will be of modern construction throughout, planning to have a reading room and library on the first floor, criminal court on the next, perhaps, with the jail above. It will be built so it can be added to with additional stories from time to time, as needed.

County To Save
With the government taking over the southeast portion of the courthouse square as the site for its new building, the county commissioners point to the fact that the county will save considerable monthly expense in keeping its grounds in shape, watering lawn and shrubbery, etc. The county's water bill, for instance, now runs around \$140 to \$150 a month, and part of this is to be saved. The pipe line is about a three-inch main and will have to be removed from the north part of the grounds in order to be away from the federal building.

The presidential candidates are men of striking personalities, whose policies, platforms and views have been most ably presented to the American people, in such a manner that each and every woman should be able to determine in her own mind for whom she wishes to vote, regardless of other influences.

ing are supporting Governor Smith. And, in spite of the fact that they have been campaigning for the man whom some of the opposition have referred to as a "wet, yellow dog," and a "dirty, drunken bum," we have carried the democratic campaign to the people by telling of facts and keeping on the issues. We have not made any personal attacks on anybody, but carried the issues to the people on the principles involved."

Wagon Members Present
Among those present as Band Wagon members, were Vaughn Wilson, J. K. West, Senator Pink L. Parrish, Judge Dennis Kemp, Hill Stewart, E. L. Klett and Durwood Bradley.

The newspapers of Lubbock were praised by Judge Mullican, in his statement, "I think we have two of the fairest newspapers in this part of the country, of any I know of anywhere. I compliment and congratulate them." He then referred to one paper in the southern part of the South Plains which had been unfair, saying it had 14 articles for Hoover in one issue and none for Smith.

Judge Mullican scored some of the preachers for statements they had made in the campaign and referred to local ministers taking a call for support of the amendment to the state constitution seeking to exempt all church property from taxation. "Nearly all of our local ministers have asked the people to vote for this amendment. I think it poor grace that our preachers come in at this late hour, after preaching republican doctrines to our people for the last 40 to 50 years. It is inconsistent."

Touching Negro Question

He said he wanted to set right some untrue statements made about Governor Smith, naming first the reference to a negro who is at the head of New York city's civil service.

whose picture with that of a white woman has been spread in this section. "The truth is that Governor Smith never had anything to do with that negro's appointment. Mayor Hylan appointed the negro. It's a Hylan City job and Smith has nothing to do or say about it, because he's governor of New York. Why didn't those fellows tell you that at this same time that picture was taken, just across the street from the democratic national headquarters, in New York, a federal internal revenue collector, a negro, appointed by the president, is working two white women secretaries and several scores of white women in his office?" He touched on other phases of the negro question, saying the charge that Jack Johnson was campaigning for Smith was untrue.

"The truth is that Jack Johnson offered his services to the democratic headquarters, but was refused and he told them he would then support and work for the republicans."

Rape Preacher
The preachers were rapped by the judge for attacks made upon Governor Smith in his statement, "they ought to be ashamed of themselves. How are they going to reconcile their part in this campaign to the season of Christmas, of goodwill toward all mankind, that is approaching?"

"I don't see how any thinking man can believe the republican party ever intends to enforce prohibition," he stated, and said that bootlegging, under-republican administrations during the past seven and one-half years, had become the fifth largest industry of America, exceeding only by that of the steel, telephone, automobile and railroad industries. At his mention of Woodrow Wilson, Senator Morris Shepard and other democratic leaders, he cheered, declaring, "the dirty politics of this campaign has not been done by the Democrats."

Wester Talks

J. K. West, in a short talk, had the crowd worked up several times with his fiery manner of speaking and explained...

democrat.
"I am a democrat and went into the primaries expecting to keep my political pledge, the same as I expect to keep my church pledge, and to support the nominees. I believe Al Smith will enforce the prohibition law. Hoover had to leave Europe and come to this country to find out whether he was a democrat or a republican."

"A vote for Hoover is your approval of the religious issue, and of the republican party has never been a prohibition party and that it does not believe in prohibition. If they believed in it they would not have put an ex-distiller and ex-brewer in charge of enforcing it."

Senator-elect Pink L. Parrish referred to "the hundreds of thousands of dollars of republican cash funds poured into Texas in their attempt to steal this state from the democratic party. I believe grand old Texas will go democratic Tuesday by a handsome majority of more than 100,000 votes."

Negro Second's Nomination
Parrish, in referring to the negro question stated that in all the delegates to the democratic national convention at Houston, "not one negro delegate was present. Yet at Kansas City, at the republican convention, a negro delegate seconded Mr. Hoover's nomination."

In closing the rally, Judge Mullican said that Al Smith is the pro-

Achievements Are Cited
The two greatest achievements of the government were pictured as the division of church and state and the 18th amendment. The speaker charged that Smith would tear down each of these, Smith's campaign tactics were attacked with the statement that he "issues half-baked statements of the type which makes people throw up their hands rather than think."

"If Smith fulfills the promises he has made he will have to be president for at least fifty years," the speaker continued. "Hoover is cautious, saying little and doing more."

A scathing attack was centered at the democratic nominee on the basis that he was attempting to throw down the barriers of immigration so that the Catholics of southern Europe could be imported in connection with a movement to connect church and state.

Touches Pro Question
Touching on the prohibition question, Dr. White stated that Smith's plan for governmental distribution of liquor would not stop drinking among the boys and girls of the land, since it would remain essentially against the law to sell it to youth under age. The present liquor condition in England, Australia and Canada was deplored. "Will we compromise with the lawless crowd and tear the constitution from its foundation," asked the speaker.

"If prohibition makes drunkards, then the Commandments make thieves, murderers, and harlots," Dr. White said. It was charged that nine-tenths of the county candidates who formerly favored prohibition now hide their standing on the question by "whitewashing" Al Smith by pointing out failure of the 18th Amendment. He said that he saw more women selling whisky in London in a short time than he had seen drinking it in Texas in ten years.

Moral Question
"Prohibition does not deal with union of church and state. It is a moral question and one which the ministers of the nation have a right to defend. It is claimed that Smith would enforce prohibition if enforced. His record of enforcement is marked by continued veto of every bill favoring prohibition. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred he voted in favor of the saloon."

Dr. White rebuked Smith for what he termed his grandstand play at the eleventh hour in an effort to show that he favored enforcement of the 18th Amendment.

Hoover Is Great Leader
The speaker pointed out his support of Hoover because the republican candidate had "fed more mouths, clothed more shivering bodies, given more food to starving homes, and displayed the milk of human kindness more than any other national figure. He has gone in to his own fortune in order to help charity."

"He promised his dying mother that he would never touch liquor and he has lived up to that promise always. We want a man in the White House who will not forget his promises, a man who can be a true ideal to American boys and girls both personally and politically."

Dr. White agreed with Hoover's statement that prohibition is a "noble experiment." He pictured the early life that he experienced because of the saloons, and told of his resolve at the age of nine years to fight liquor traffic. His speech he declared, was carrying out that resolve. He stated that the women voters of the nation were at a crucial time, and urged a heavy vote on their part.

Lon A. Woodrum, Nazarene revivalist of Kansas City, made a short address at the end of the rally. He attacked the Catholic church bitterly.

Mr. Neill, chairman of this senatorial district anti-Smith organization, presided at the meeting, introducing the speakers. He predicted an easy win for Hoover stating that the republican candidate would carry this county by 1,000 votes and this section by 15,000 votes. A Hoover victory was predicted in Texas and the nation.

Mr. O'Neill urged a heavy vote tomorrow, requesting all voters to be of service to the nation by voting for the anti-Smith group will hold a political party at the headquarters of the organization tomorrow night from 6 o'clock on. Candidates Rest at Home
Their peregrinations at an end, the two central figures and their vice presidential running mates, Robinson and Curtis, are at their homes resting and waiting for the news of victory or defeat. Each has retired from the stage expressing confidence that he will have a part in the drama's last act, the March 4 inauguration.

With the campaign machinery dismantled for another four years every energy centers now on the processes by which the voter will speak his mind. Scores of thousands of voting booths have been set up in city and hamlet and if the registration figures are any indication each of them will have its day-long queue of humanity. Although the polls will be open generally from dawn to sunset there is a probability that in some congested sections the day will not be long enough for all qualified voters to pass through the booths.

East First to Report
When the polls are closed the great accounting machinery will be accelerated to high speed, and the weary workers held at their tasks throughout the night until the last ballot is counted. The east, of course, will be first to give its returns to the country, the voting places in the other time belts closing in succession with the passing of the sun. California, with its polls remaining open until 8 o'clock, or eleven o'clock eastern time, will be the last to begin the counting.

Simplified in some sections because of the installation of voting machines, the tabulation elsewhere will be a slow and tedious procedure. The ballots generally are long, filled with state and local candidates as well as with referenda awaiting decision. Their complexity will make for slow counting and a definite trend may be long in developing.

Stink Bomb Thrown Into Hoover Rally In Wichita
WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 5. (AP)—A Hoover meeting, at which the Rev. J. Frank Norris of Fort Worth was listed as speaker, was interrupted tonight when a stink bomb was dropped among the crowd of 4,000 people packed into the auditorium.

The Rev. Norris had concluded his address as had the Rev. Dr. H. D. Knickerbocker of Little Rock, Ark. When the interruption occurred, Dr. Paul Henry Packard, former local Christian pastor, was unable to deliver his address in the fume filled hall and moved to radio station KOGO from which the address was broadcast.
