W. T. Black No. 1 Flenniken, south-central Dawson County exploration in section 11, block 36, TP survey, T-4-N, had progressed past 4,317 feet in anhydrite, and was continuing.

BOA CONSTRICTOR PICTURES RECEIVED BY MRS. PETERSON

Coxswain Charles Ray Veasey, also the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Veasey, has been in service since 1942. For a one year period he was stationed at a receiving center in San Diego, after which time he was transferred to the distribution center at Camp Elliott, where he remained one year and where his job was to check the outgoing draft. After that he was assigned to duty on a troop transport ship and left for overseas service, going to the Philippines and other points in the Pacific. His ship was brought in for repairs recently and while it was docked in the States, Coxswain Veasey was hospitalized in San Francisco. The sailor has now returned to sea. He is a Lamesa High School graduate, and prior to entering service farmed here with his father.

A large crowd was present for the bond rally held on the courthouse square Saturday afternoon at 4 p. m.

The rally was a success as the county went over the top on its over-all Seventh War Loan Quota by raising \$162,365 Saturday afternoon alone, and some Saturday bond purchases are still coming in to the local chairman, Ed DuBose, who is spearheading the drive here. He stated that unofficial tabulations credited the county with raising \$776,485, in all denominations of bonds during the entire drive. He reports that though the over-all quota has been surpassed and some \$100,000 needs to be raised here to meet the E bond quota of \$445,000, and states that W. B. Osborn will continue his door knocker campaign through the week in an effort to complete the E bond quota.

DuBose asks the cooperation of everyone in this week's intense drive and reminds Dawson County residents that they must buy their E bonds this week if they are to be counted on the quota as the drive officially ends June 30.

He states that Ackerly, Liberty, McCarty, Munger, Welch, Harmony, and O. K. Communities have already exceeded their bond quotas for the current drive, and reports that Woody, Grandview, and Midway have completed approximately 95 per cent of their assessments. According to Chairman DuBose, Klondike, Key, Lamesa, and Union are still far behind their 'E' bond quotas.

The Saturday afternoon bond rally opened with appropriate remarks by the county chairman.

DuBose then introduced Harley Sadler, who served as master of ceremonies for the event. Sadler asked members of the Lubbock Army Air Field Band to play the Star Spangled Banner, after which the Rev. David J. Murray, local pastor of the First Presbyterian Church delivered a prayer.

Lt. Fred Harris, survivor of the U. S. S. Franklin, was then introduced and delivered his inspiring message.

Lt. Harris told some of the history of the U. S. S. Franklin, which had been at sea 32 months when it was so badly damaged by Jap bombs and which had participated in the battles for Siapan, Guam, Tinian and in many campaigns. The Franklin had joined a fleet just 60 miles off the coast of Japan when it was hit. The mishap occurred March 10, and 20 explosions went off on the ship the day it was hit.

Lt. Harris stated that the wreckage was horrifying and told of seeing bodies blown into the clouds as the explosions occurred.

He said that those remaining in the crew linked hose together and began fighting the fires. "There were no complaints," he said, "from the members of the crew. Some were badly burned from the bomb explosions but they continued to work to save the Franklin."

The lieutenant then told how the Santa Fe drove up by the side of the Franklin, and how the wounded pilots were removed on the improvised gangway to the Santa Fe's decks.

Men of the Franklin's crew re-

maining on the ship bailed water out and continued to put out the fires which burned for 2 1-2 days in many portions of the ship.

The lieutenant stated that the Franklin finally started its homeward trip. Their first stop was at Pearl Harbor, but before they reached their destination, they had to bury the dead—which the lieutenant asserted was a most depressing task.

He stated that they finally got to Pearl Harbor and remnants of the ship's band played as they entered the harbor. There were only six members of the band remaining.

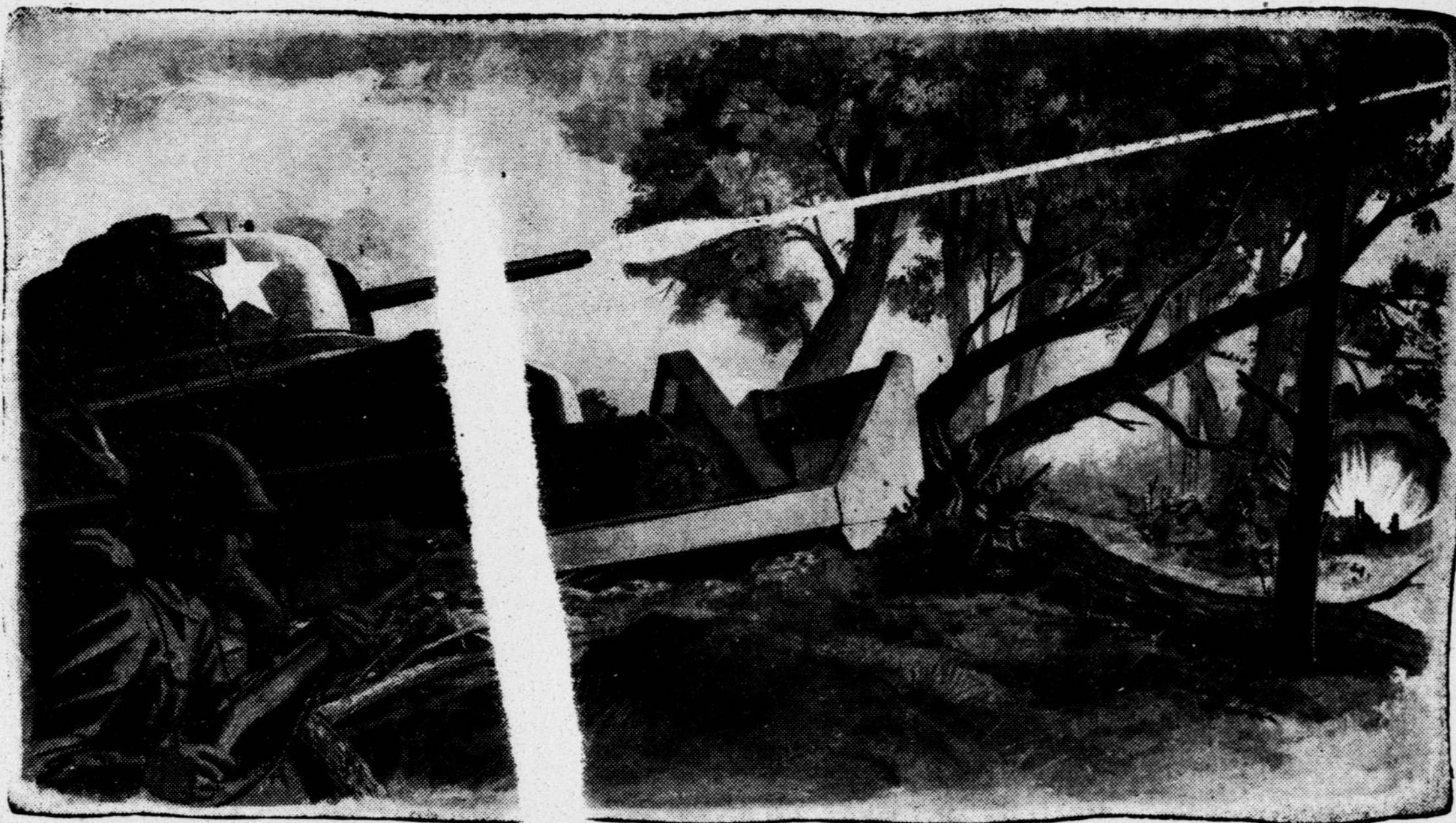
After leaving Pearl Harbor, they headed for Brooklyn Navy Yard, and 53 days after they had been hit they reached their final destination.

The lieutenant stated that the men remaining were surprised at the complacent viewpoint of the people they talked with in the United States, and stressed the importance of buying more and more bonds.

He said that the war must be supported through bond purchases, and said that even after the war's end, money would be needed to get the boys back home.

Following his speech, members of the Lions and Rotary Club, and several Lamesa girls circulated among the crowd selling bonds.

**Support Price
On Cottonseed Has
Been Announced**

Basic support price on cottonseed to Texas farmers this year has been announced at \$55 per ton. Actual returns to growers will vary by producing areas, quality of seed marketed, prices paid by mills and ginners' margin at the time of marketing, according to E. C. Munro, acting district representative WFA's office of supply. Similar to the 1944 program, support price this year will be carried out through an open offer by Commodity Credit to support the market for cottonseed products. Cottonseed crushing mills accept-

ing the offer agree to pay not less than the specified minimum support price, F.O.B., shipping points, basis U. S. Standard grade, for all cottonseed purchased in lots of five tons or more between August 1, 1945 and July 31, 1946. The offer also is subject to rules, regulations and standard methods covering and handling, sampling and analysis of cottonseed for grading purposes established by WFA, Munro said.

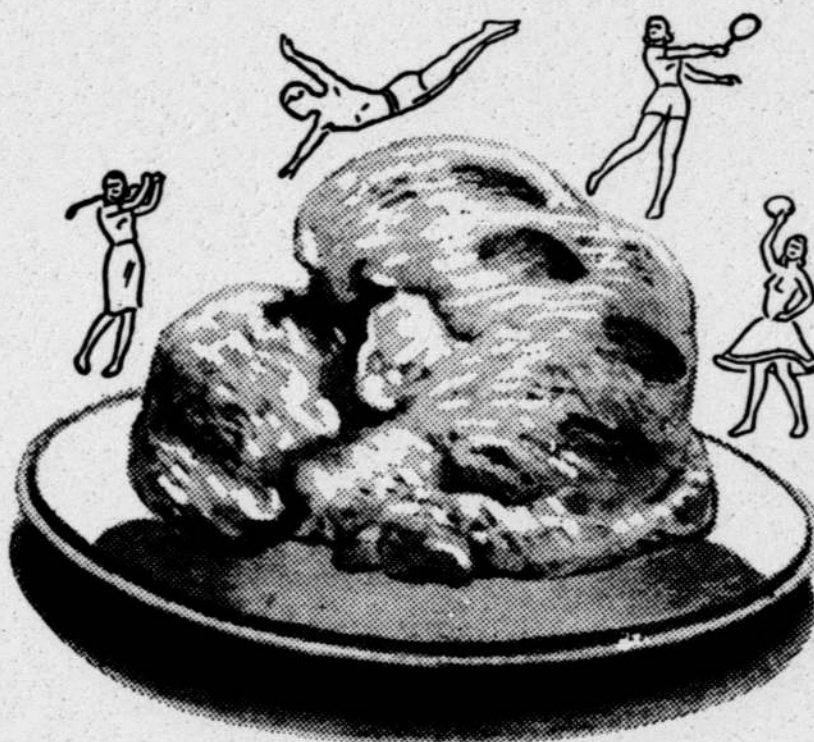
For oil mills accepting the offer, CCC will support prices for cottonseed products through July 31, 1946 by three methods. Included are purchasing cottonseed oil at 1-8 cent per pound below ceiling, purchasing bulk cottonseed meal, 41 per cent protein minimum at \$45 per ton throughout the state and purchasing chemical grade linters at ceiling price.

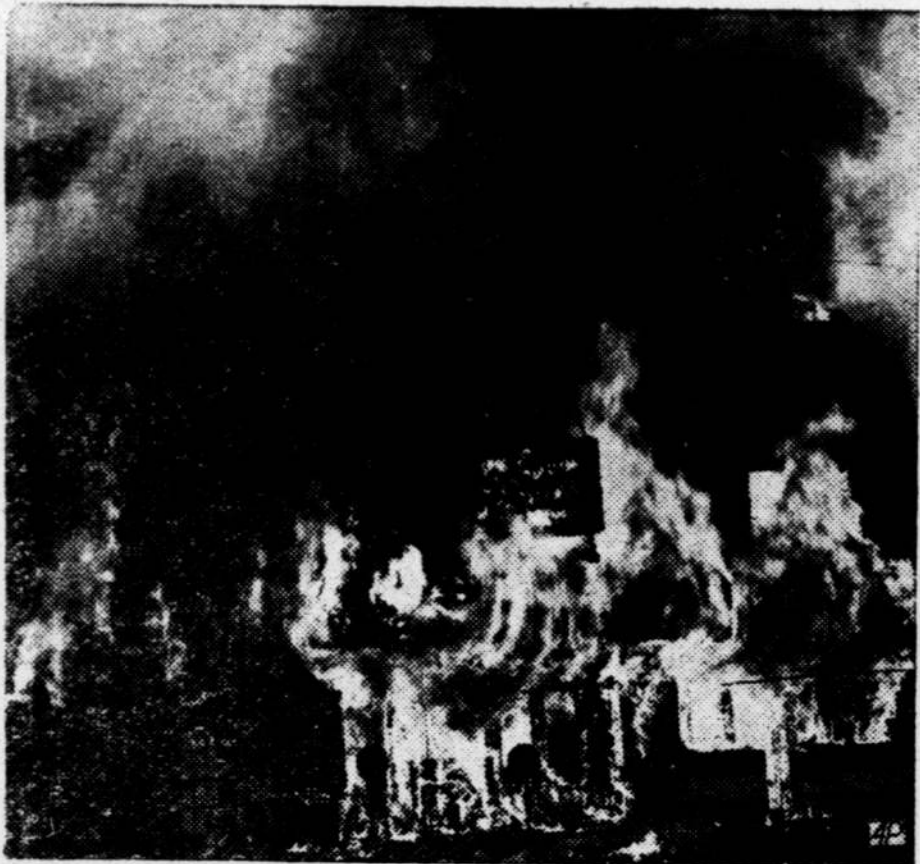

preservation of fruits and vegetables, the War Food Administration announced that it has provided funds for continuing through the current canning season the Community Canning Centers that were started in 1942 under the direction of the United States Office of Education, Federal Security Agency. The program will be carried out through State Boards for vocational education and the local public schools, in accordance with plans mutually agreed upon by the Office of Education and WFA. This action by WFA is in keeping with President Truman's request that American men and women dedicate themselves to the task of growing larger gardens and preserving food at home or in Community Canning Centers—"Wasting not an ounce."

FARMERS TO GET MORE LUMBER TO REPAIR HOMES

An additional 23,000,000 board feet of lumber has been allotted to the War Food Administration for distribution to farmers for emergency maintenance and repair of farm dwellings in the third quarter of 1945, WPB announced. Farmers make application for the lumber to the County Agricultural Conservation Committees, and approved applications are rated AA-3 by Delegation of Authority from WPB to WFA. Emergency cases for which applications will be approved are limited to repair of damage caused by fire, flood or similar disaster, or repair of dwellings that would be uninhabitable or a definite hazard to the health of the occupants if not repaired immediately, WPB said.

WARRANTED VEHICLE DEALERS NEED OPA AUTHORIZATION TO SELL

To protect buyers who pay warranted prices for used passenger automobiles, trucks and motorcycles, OPA announced that only sellers who have adequate reconditioning and service facilities will be permitted to charge warranted prices after August 1. A warranted vehicle is a vehicle in good operating condition and carrying a written guarantee under which the seller

agrees to make stated repairs at 50 per cent of his normal charges during the 30 days following sale or the first 1,000 miles of operation, whichever comes first. Forms upon which sellers may apply to OPA for permission to sell warranted vehicles are now available at War Price and Rationing Boards. On these applications sellers must supply OPA with information about their service facilities. If they show facilities qualifying them to charge warranty prices, they will be sent an "Authorization to Sell" at warranted prices. No seller can charge these prices on and after August 1 unless he has an OPA authorization, which he must display in his place of business. Dealers denied authorization by OPA District Offices may appeal to Regional Administrators, and denied by them, may appeal to the Price Administrator.

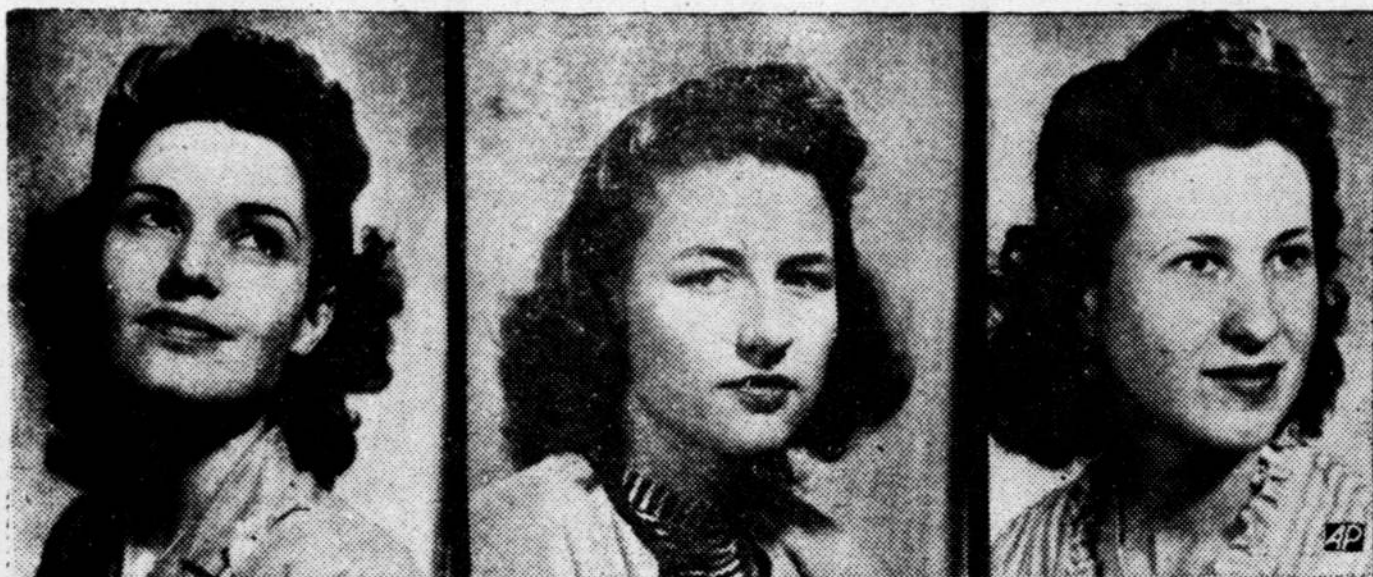

Women of Dawson County Are Urged to Save Waste Fats

Active participation of every woman in Dawson County in the used fats campaign is need now to help deliver the knockout blow to the Japs, E. C. Muro, acting district representative, Amarillo, Texas District Office, announced this week.

National reserves of fats and oils are lower than at any time in two years while the demand for munitions, military medicines, oplates to ease pain, sulfa ointments and many other military items are at an all time high and will get still higher as more soldiers are shifted to the Pacific. Increased civilian needs make the situation more serious, he added.

"Every drop of fat that can be scraped from the bottom of frying, roasting and boiling pans, every teaspoonful lifted from the top of soups or from melted down fats are needed to help off-set a national deficit," Munro emphasized.

This year's goal for used kitchen fats is 250,000,000 pounds. In many instances collections have dropped in larger towns and cities because of meat shortages. To off-set this decrease and go over the top this year, more used fats must come from towns and rural areas where families do their own butchering and have access to more meats.

Used fats should be drained into tin cans and left at country collection points when making trips to town.

Local Farmers Needed In Wheat Harvest Areas

T. A. Barfield, local county agent, received the following letter from J. B. Kidd, farm labor field assistant. Kidd expresses his appreciation to the local farmers in helping with the wheat harvest, and asks the support of others who can be spared from their work.

Plainview, Texas
June 22, 1945

Dear Mr. Barfield:

I wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to the farmers of your county who are assisting with the wheat harvest this year.

These farmers from your county who find it too dry to do any farm work at home can still find a lot of work driving tractors and operating combines in the wheat harvest, and the demand for tractor drivers will continue for some time after wheat harvest has been completed.

These men which you have sent to this area are doing a grand job in that they are farmers themselves, reliable, know how to get the job done, and don't hesitate when it comes time to work. As a result of their coming into the wheat harvest this year and doing such an efficient job, the Panhandle area is completing its harvest with much less labor than is normally needed when it has to de-

pend entirely on transient harvest labor.

We will appreciate your checking through your communities and seeing if there are more farmers who would like to work in this area while it is too dry to farm their own land. This office can place them the nearest distance from their home as we all know they will be anxious to return at the first sign of sufficient rain for them to plant their own crops.

Since the needs for these men change from day to day, we suggest you contact this office as to the best counties for these men to go for work.

Some Livestock Poisoned Here By Eating Weeds

A number of cases of livestock poisoning in the county have been brought to the attention of the local county agent. He states that most of them are a direct result of the drought because native grasses have been consumed, leaving only weeds in the pasture. He asserts that most of the cases are caused either by one of the two poisonous weeds which grow in abundance in Dawson County. These weeds are the perennial bloom weed or terpenine weed and the wooly groundsel.

In pastures which County Agent Barfield has visited, he found that the stock had been grazing on wooly groundsel more than on the terpenine weed.

The poisoning accumulated in the cow can be transmitted through the milk to the individual and in one case a local family stated that they had stomach ailments until they quit using milk of the cows affected.

Symptoms of this type of poisoning are a gradual decline in the condition of the cow, accompanied by staggering or stiffness in their quarters, and sometimes by violent trembling. A cow affected by poisoning usually stands with its feet close together and with an arched back.

"To treat this disorder," reports the agent, "one should remove the cause and feed a good quality of roughage with some grain." He states, "You should clean out the cow's stomach with approximately 1 or 2 pints of castor oil. In order to protect the lining membranes of the digestive tract from the irritating effects of the poison, white of eggs, milk, butter, olive oil or fresh lard can be given the cows. Dextrose may be administered intravenously, or about the same results may be obtained by feeding approximately 2 pounds of molasses each day."

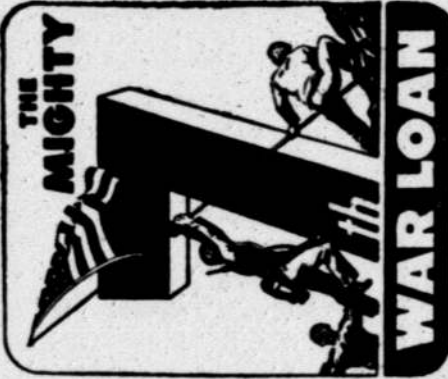

If you have not yet purchased your auto use tax stamp for your vehicle, do so today. It will be necessary that you have one by July 1.

After July 31 Old Stove Permits Become Invalid

All old stove purchase certificates Forms R-901 or R-901 (Rev. 12-43) previously issued by local War Price and Rationing Boards will become invalid for consumer use after July 31, 1945, according to OPA Rationing Executive William G. Williams.

It is necessary to invalidate these certificates because many outstanding certificates are held by persons who no longer need stoves because their circumstances have changed since receiving their certificate. Those persons who have old certificates and do need stoves will have ample time to spend them before August, at which time the certificates will be taken out of circulation to protect stove supplies for current needs.

Stove dealers will have through August 15, 1945, to surrender their old certificates to their suppliers or exchange them at their local boards. Distributors have through August 22 to dispose of their old certificates in the same manner.

Furlough Gas Is To Be Issued To Servicemen

Additional gasoline rations may now be obtained by service men having furlough of more than 30 days, the OPA Rationing Division has announced.

Furlough gasoline will still be issued at the rate of a gallon a day, but the 30-gallon limit is being removed for the benefit of released American prisoners of war who get leave or temporary duty assignments for 60 days in this country, and for those members of the armed forces who return from overseas and get more than 30 days' leave.

The service man applying for furlough gasoline rations should apply at any local War Price and Rationing Board, take along the mileage rationing record for the car to be used, and be ready to show his furlough papers.

Service men on terminal leave before discharge are eligible for furlough gasoline rations at the rate of a gallon a day until the date of discharge, but the maximum of 30 gallons still applies in these cases.

Pvt O. L. Franklin Returns To States To Be Discharged

WITH THE FIFTEENTH U. S. ARMY IN GERMANY — Pvt. Othal L. Franklin, of Rt. A Lamesa, is among the 293 veteran combat soldiers from the 106th (Lion) Division to be returned to the United States for discharge under the War Department Demobilization and Readjustment Plan.

Pvt. Franklin, a member of the 3rd Infantry Regiment, has amassed a large number of "demobilization points" for overseas service and combat decorations, and thus was able to qualify for the first large group to be sent home from the Lion Division.

The 106th (Lion) Division met the full force of the German armor-spearheaded breakthrough into Belgium in December and held so tenaciously to important ground and key road centers — especially at St. Vith — that it threw Nazi plans and timetables completely out of kilter. The 106th was among the first units to strike back—in a ferocious counter-attack at Manhay, Belgium, and drove on relentlessly until the Bulge was liquidated. The Division then took part in the smashing of the Siegfried Line and the pursuit of its defenders toward the Rhine.

Plane Tanks Mark War Path

PEARL HARBOR, T. H. — Once there were mountains of carefully boxed belly and wing tanks here, and Capt. J. W. Boundy, something of a wizard in naval aviation supply, winced every time he saw them.

At a time when carried-based planes jettisoned their auxiliary tanks because it was believed unsafe to land with them, Boundy saw to it that plenty were ordered.

Flying practice changed, and as the turnover on tanks declined the size of stockpiles increased.

Now the mountains have moved — to the Marianas, to Iwo Jima, and perhaps to the Ryukus—for flying and bombing methods have changed again.

With long-range P-51 Mustangs, P-47 Thunderbolts and P-4U Corsairs flying great distances over water, wing and belly tanks are in heavy demand.

Because of their weight and drag they are jettisoned when empty. One hundred fifty Mustangs covering a B-29 mission will drop 300 wing tanks in the ocean.

The largest stacks of anything in the Pacific are boxes of these auxiliary tanks, but if Capt. Boundy walks by a pile of them, he no longer shudders. The Japanese are wincing now.

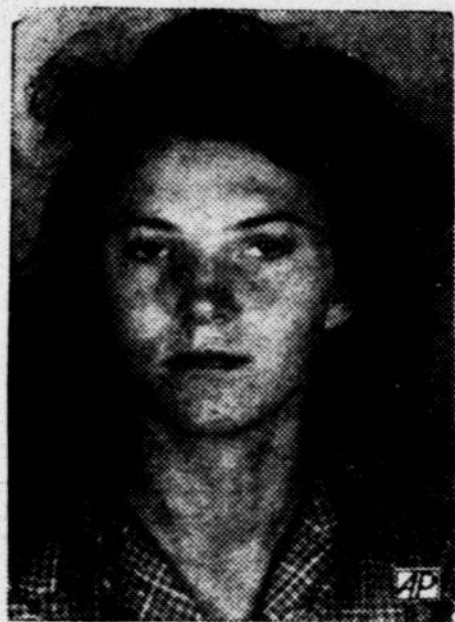

Stretching Sugar In Conserving Food Is Essential

Corn syrup may be substituted for part or all of the sugar used in home canning or freezing of fruits, according to Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Corn sugar may be used for the same purposes, but brown sugar or syrups, such as sorghum, which have a strong flavor are not desirable.

Honey may be used as a substitute for a small part of the sugar, but it affects the flavor of the fruit more than corn syrup. However, it is satisfactory for canning figs and for making fruit pickles, the specialist says. It is not recommended for use with frozen foods.

"Never use saccharin in canning," Mrs. Leverenz warns, "for heat makes it bitter." Saccharin can only be used when the fruit is served, but a doctor should be consulted regarding its use for too much saccharin may be harmful.

In substituting corn syrup for part of the sugar in canning, use one cup of sugar and two cups of corn syrup to six ounces of water.

A Postcard Report On The Galapagos

QUITO, Ecuador (AP) — Puerto Baquerizo, in Ecuador's far-off Galapagos Islands, has 300 inhabitants and no store, but it does have a statue of Charles Darwin, English naturalist whose explorations of the islands in 1835 aroused a curiosity which still draws scientists.

The islands, 600 miles off Ecuador's coast, were named for the fresh-water turtles which are still one of their chief interests. Little noted until the outbreak of the Pacific war, they were then garrisoned by U. S. forces.

Fishing near the islands is reported so excellent that it could go far toward supplying the mainland's sea-food.

Vast herds of wild cattle roam some of the islands. Wild dogs are killing off the cattle and a campaign against them, with gun and poison, would have to precede utilization of the herds.

desirable from a nutritional standpoint. If the syrup is used to replace all the sugar, the proportion should be one-half to three-fourths cups of syrup to one cup of water.

One syrup which is said to be excellent for use in canning is "invert sugar" which can be made at home and is sweeter than natural sugar or syrup. To make it, mix two cups of sugar and one cup of water. Add one-fourth teaspoon of tartaric acid, obtainable at any drug store. Cover this sugar, water, and tartaric acid mixture and simmer gently for 30 minutes. Allow it to cool. The invert sugar made this way is nearly twice as sweet as plain syrup of the same weight. For a thin syrup, use one-fourth cup of invert sugar to one cup of water. This is also good for sweetening fruits, cereals, ice cream, and beverages.

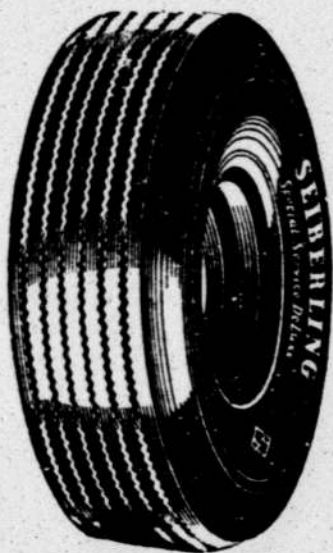

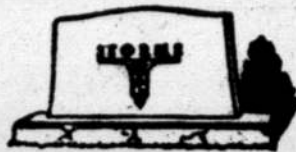

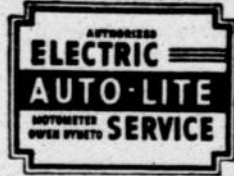

Show Boss Your Card Is Social Security Advice

With many returning servicemen entering the labor market for the first time, and with students getting jobs, Mr. Leifeste, manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Board advised all workers "to show their social security account card to every employer for whom they work.

This is essential to protect the worker's wage record, which is maintained under his name and number for his future monthly insurance benefits. For example, there are approximately 575,000 Smiths on the Social Security Board's records and, therefore, there are approximately 575,000 accounts under the name of Smith. It is important that no two Smiths have the same number.

In stressing this point of one number for a worker's lifetime, it is pointed out that employers are required to report each worker's wages, under both his name and number to the Government every three months. Then these wages are credited by the Social Security Board on each worker's individual ledger sheet, under both his name and number.

For these reasons, all workers in industry and commerce should follow this advice:

1. Show your card to every employer for whom you work.
2. Make sure that he copies both your name and number correctly so that your wages may be credited to your account.
3. Hang on to your card. Don't lose it; but if you do lose it, get a duplicate. Never get a different number. Two numbers may cause some loss of wage credits and consequently of benefits. If you have more than one number, go to the nearest office of the Social Security Board and see which one you should keep.

The War Department discloses that more than 2,000,000 men and 20,000,000 tons of Army cargo have been moved to 50 countries and U. S. island possessions since Pearl Harbor.

Overseas Men Get Extension On Tax Obligations

Secretary Morgenthau announced today that an additional extension has been granted to overseas members of the armed forces on their income tax obligations which were postponed because of overseas service.

The action is intended particularly to help servicemen who stop in the United States for a few months while enroute from the European to the Pacific Theatre of War.

The extension is embodied in an amendment to the income tax regulations and was issued by Commissioner of Internal Revenue Joseph D. Numan, Jr., with the approval of the Secretary.

Specially, the new regulation provides that the postponement granted an overseas serviceman will continue until he has been back in the United States for a continuous period of five and one-half calendar months (not counting the month in which he returns) in other words, an overseas serviceman will not lose his tax postponement if he stays in this country for a short period while enroute to another overseas assignment.

The new time allowance was decided upon after consultation with the War Department regarding the approximate time which may be spent in this country on furloughs and in retaining camps by the servicemen being transferred from Europe to the Pacific. Formerly, the regulations cancelled the tax postponement of an overseas serviceman after he had been back three and one-half calendar months.

The tax laws exempt the first \$1,500 of active service pay of each member of the armed forces, and therefore most enlisted men and women owe no taxes.
