

Visitors' Eyes On Frying-Pan Size Catfish

Japanese View Lake Fish Farm

A Japanese delegation came to West Texas Thursday for a look at cultured catfish in Colorado City.

They also sneaked in glimpses of tumbleweeds, pumping oil wells and horses.

But their official business was with catfish at the farm operated by Colorado City's James Kelley in the discharge canal of Morgan Creek Power Station.

Heading up the 8-member delegation representing Japan Fisheries Resource Conservation Association was Dr. Jiro Tanaka, head of Japan's Tokai Fish Research Laboratory.

The Lake Colorado City catfish farm, which produces catfish commercially, was one of a half dozen study stops by the delegation in the U.S.

From Colorado City, after a west Texas catfish dinner in the home of Mrs. Frank Kelley and a look at race horses being trained at Tom Neff's track east of the city, the group rushed to Big Spring and a plane flight to Miami, Fla., to visit additional fisheries.

With Dr. Tanaka were Yasuhiko Iso of Japan Atomic Energy Research Institute; Ryochi Horiuchi, Japan's National Federation of Fishery Cooperative Association; Yoshiaki Gunji, Okayama Fish Experimental Station; Yoshio Miyake, Okayama Fish Experimental Station; Shioichi Niwa, Fukui Fish Experimental Station; Toshi Shimura, Niigata Fish Experimental Station, and Toru Watanabe, Ibaragi Station.

Before coming to Colorado City to view the catfish grown in the warm water discharge canal of Texas Electric Service Company's Morgan Creek Power Plant, the delegation in their study route visited Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass.; fisheries at Oyster Bay, Long Island, N.Y.; National Laboratory at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Except for brief stops on the West Coast, the delegation's Florida visit will conclude their U.S. tour which began March 13.

The Japanese are far ahead of the U.S. in fisheries and fish cultures because fish is their major source for food.

However, their U.S. tour was to view progress in this country, observe any innovation or progress in that can be utilized to improve Japanese fish industry.

Too, fresh water catfish is unique to them. They have some fresh water fish, but salt water fish is their main supply.

The cultured catfish project here at Colorado City is a pilot program, so to speak, in the U.S. Initiated by TESCO Biologist John Tillman to prove that water discharged from

power plants is useful, not polluted.

"Japan has been developing fish culture at power plants for 7 years," Dr. Tanaka said.

His Rokai Fish Research Laboratory is located at a nuclear power plant.

He predicted that all the world will turn to cultured fish production more and more in the next few years as a means of feeding the world's speedily increasing population.

Data researched by scientists already are pointing to a need to increase fish production drastically before 1980, the 42-year-old Japanese pointed out.

And he quoted scientific papers developed at University of Michigan which specifically cite a tremendous need for increased American catfish production by 1976 for basic food item.

Although advanced in fish science and culture, the Japanese were puzzled by one West Texas measurement.

They gathered closely to view a 1 to 1 1/2 pound catfish grown to "harvest" stage at the Kelley catfish farm.

"This is the size best suited for our commercial market in this area," explained biologist Tillman.

"This is frying pan size. It is what they buy in the food store. . . what they order in a restaurant."

"How many eat this fish?" inquired Tanaka.

"One. . . its about right for one person's catfish meal," answered Tillman.

"Awwwwwwwwww. . . " came the unison of disbelief of the 8 Japanese.

"Two for someone like me," interjected Texas Electric Manager Don Benson, pointing to his middle girth.

And, the Japanese almost lost their Asian dignity and rolled with laughter in the sand beside Lake Colorado City.

So, you can be sure when the delegation returns to Tokyo, they'll have a fish tale all their own.

'Time' On His Hands Area Views Ring Senator's Alarm

West Texans from this area aren't shy when it comes to daylight savings time and their state senator.

They have been telling Senator David W. Ratliff in letter, petitions, telegrams and phone calls to vote against daylight savings time.

The view have been arriving at the senator's Austin office so often and steadily that he wants the citizens of his 24th Senatorial District to know his own views.

"I believe that a vast majority of the people do not want to change their clocks every 6 months," Ratliff informed the Record.

But the senator said he believes it is "in order at this time" for constituents to have a brief "history of why we have daylight savings time in Texas."

"For several years the television networks - NBC, CBS and ABC, and the airlines have been trying to pass a law in Congress to put the nation on daylight savings time," the senator stated, "but they were unable to get the Congress to vote for this."

"I have been told that a few years ago, by the use of lobbying tactics and a great deal of pressure, these people contrived to get Congress to pass such a bill putting this nation on daylight savings time, but in order to get the congressmen to vote for it, they put in a provision that any individual state could be exempt from daylight savings time by an act of the legislature of that state."

Despite this option in the hands of state legislatures, Ratliff said his opinion is that "the Congress of the United States is the body that is re-

sponsible for Texas being on daylight savings time."

"I have supported legislation here in Austin which would exempt Texas from daylight

savings time," the senator explained, "but the majority of the legislators from the cities are for daylight savings time, and it has, so far, been impossible to get Texas off daylight savings time."

"We are making every effort," Parse said, "to be sure the community understands this board is for them. . . to develop the center policy and program, deal with complaints and enlist leaders for the center's program."

Suggestions and recommendations by interested citizens will be considered by the committee for the slate of nominees which will be voted upon at the April 8 meeting.
