Alcoholism Hearing

The South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) will conduct a public hearing in Post Tuesday, February 25 beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the conference room of the Postex Plant Building.

The public hearing is designed to determine the needs of alcohol and drug abuse treatment, intervention and prevention programs for this area.

Input from the public will be used by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse to determine the commission's budget request to the next session of the state legislature.

Commissioners Quiz Sheriff About Fuel

The Garza County Commissioners' Court demanded an answer directly from Sheriff Jim Pippin at the regular meeting last Monday morning concerning the sheriff's use of county fuel for his personal vehicle.

When the sheriff did not appear at the meeting in response to a written request two days earlier, Judge Giles Dalby called the sheriff's department three times.

After suggesting that the commissioners' court would issue a subpoena for his appearance if necessary, Pippin arrived

shortly thereafter.

Commissioner Ted Aten asked the sheriff to explain the use of county gas in the sheriff's personal vehicle, and Pippin replied that he had filled up twice with county gas and he "just did not think" when he filled the car with county fuel.

Commissioner Herb Walls told the sheriff that this could be a problem and "we do not want any more problems," and Pippin agreed.

The sheriff told commissioners it would not happen again.

Judge Dalby asked the

sheriff about the department's telephone bill, which had 36 long distance calls to Southland and two to Wisconsin.

Pippin said he would look into the situation.

In other action, commissioners approved a \$1,000 participation with the Post Economic Development Corp. to help fund an internship in connection with the TEXCEL program, paying \$500 now and the remainder when needed.

The First National Bank bid for depository of

county funds was accepted.

The court appointed Donald Windham to attend the Disaster Preparedness Workshop in Austin Feb 18-20, which provides for the county to maintain its qualification in case a disaster were to strike.

A discussion was held with Bryan Williams III representing Bryan Williams and Son Insurance regarding coverage of vehicles.

The courts voted to cover all automobiles with full coverage for three

years and then reduce to medical and liability after that with self insurance on equipment with fire, theft and vandalism, in an all risk policy.

The court set February 24 for the opening of bids for a three-quarter ton pickup truck, which has been in the budget for three years.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Walls, Aten, T.D. Craft, Tommy Young and Judge Dalby.

Sales Tax Rebate Increase Again

The City of Post again registered a significant increase in the city sales and use tax allocation as reported by state comptroller Bob Bullock this week.

Post received a check for \$26,299.96 for the period ending Jan 31, 1986, up 41 percent from the \$18,696.91 of the same period last year.

The total year-to-date increase is 38.44 percent at \$37,175.27.

Slaton was down this period at \$28,599.98 compared to \$30,218.9, but showing a 5.44 percent increase for the year at \$39,820.57.

Tahoka is also showing a decrease from last year's \$10,661.62 at \$9,730.12 and slightly lower for the year at \$12,586.01.

Post EMS Needs EMT Volunteers

The Post EMT's are trying to get enough people to have a basic EMT course here.

The requirements are you must 18 years old before the end of the course, you must have a high school diploma or equivalent (GED).

The course consist of approximately 120 hours of class room instruction, approximately 40 hours hospital rotation and five ambulance runs.

The cost of this course is \$165.00 plus books and lab jacket.

The tuition can be paid in 3 installments, 1st night of class - \$55; approximately 4 weeks later - \$55 and approximately 4 weeks later the last \$55.

For those who live in Garza County the tuition will be "free" if you sign an agreement to run with our volunteer ambulance

service for one year.

You do not have to run with an ambulance service to take this course - you can take it for your own personal benefit.

This course is taught through TTUHSC and the instructors will be from out of the county, most likely from Lubbock County.

We have to have a minimum of 12 students to hold this course.

After completion of the course you will be tested by the Texas Department of Health and upon passing you will be certified by the state as a Basic EMT for four years.

City Council Supports 'Save the Garza' Drive

The "Save the Garza Building" got a boost Monday afternoon from the Post City Council, as it approved the concept of leasing the old theater building to the Caprock Community Theater for \$1.

The non-profit theater group, formed under the organization of the Caprock Cultural Association, outlined plans for restoring the building through private donations and volunteer work.

Bill McCrary, representing the Caprock Community Theater, showed council members plans for improving the outside of the building and long-range interior restoration.

The lease, which will be prepared by the city attorney, will release the city of any liabilities.

McCrary explained to the council that the theater group chose the old Garza theater building as its target because of its adaptation for stage productions.

"The Tower theater seats 900...and in a town this size, we would rarely if ever get that many people to a production," the theater enthusiast said.

"The Garza is set up with a stage, and with a little work we believe we can get it ready for a summer production," he added.

In the meantime, the group is launching a fix-up campaign which starts this Saturday morning at the building on East Main Street.

The presentation followed a public hearing for a planning grant application to the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Lewis Earl, Post Cham-

Garza Memorial Hospital Gets Good TDH Report

The Texas Department of Health gave Garza Memorial Hospital a "very good report," following the annual Medicare Certification Survey, hospital administrator Maritta Reed told the board of directors at the regular meeting last week.

"We had 12 deficiencies and no out-of-compliance items," Mrs Reed added.

"All medical records were complete and the survey team complimented the doctors on this item, and they added that it is evident from the survey that excellent patient care is being administered here," the hospital administrator reported.

The board was also informed that an October 18, 1985 letter sent to Dr William C Wilson, inviting him to apply for a medical staff position, has not been answered.

In other action, the

board approved delinquent accounts for collection totalling \$5,811.27, approved a fee of \$600 for surgery for an indigent patient.

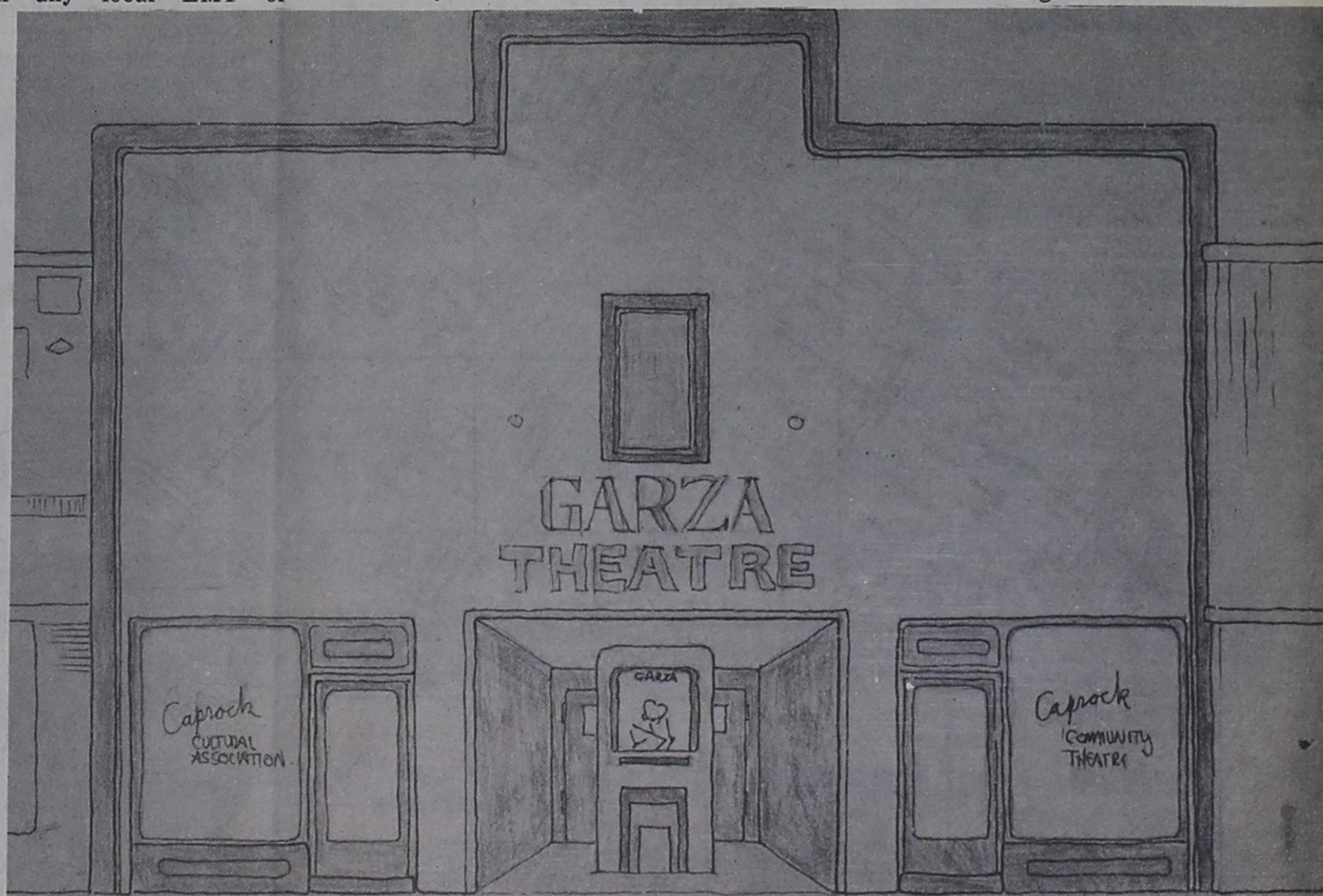
The board also accepted the 1984-85 audit and approved a \$500 participation with the Post Economic Development Corp. for funding of an internship in connection with the TEXCEL program.

A call for the election of two positions on the board was set for April 5 with all precincts to vote at the Community Center.

Mrs C.K. Pierce was appointed as election judge.

Shirley Taylor and Debbie Hood were named as absentee election clerks, with absentee voting to take place in the hospital business office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. March 17 through April 1.

(Continued from Page 1) ber or Commerce manager and board member of the Post Economic Development Corp., is spearheading application procedures and explained that the grant, if approved, would provide the city with \$25,000 from the state to use in planning for the growth of Post.

"We will concentrate our efforts on housing and water distribution, with emphasis also on city wide improvements and unemployment," Earl added.

He told the council that the latest Texas Employment Commission report shows Post with an 8.9 percent unemployment rate.

One of the problems to be addressed in the planning will be site acquisitions for potential industries, "right now we have no idea where property exists that is available for industrial use," he continued.

"Most potential industries we have contacted in the past two years are not interested in existing buildings, if they move here they want to start from the ground up," Earl added.

In other action, Mayor Giles McCrary suggested council members write letters to U.S. congressman Charles Stenholm, Senators Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm to express opposition to tax reform legislation which would cripple municipal bond programs.

Council members agreed. Recurring problems with the Community Center roof and leaks was presented by Lewis Holly, joined by Weaver McKamie.

Both complained that the contractor who recently completed repairs on the roof has refused to accept responsibility for the current leaks.

The recent melting snow resulted in leaks and falling ceiling tiles at the building.

Council members attending the meeting included Mayor McCrary, McKamie, Holly, Charles Wallace and Maxine Earl.

A second public hearing on the planning grant has been set for February 24 at 2 p.m. in City Hall.

I don't know why it is, but gasoline prices seem to be higher out west than back east.

I noticed this particularly this past weekend returning from a visit with my parents in East Texas.

In the Dallas metro area, gas is 89.9 to 99.9 for unleaded generally... and was dropping a penny or two every day.

On Interstate 20 heading west, it was noticeable that the further west, the higher the prices...by the time I got to Abilene (that sounds like the words to a song I once heard), unleaded prices were posted at \$1.17 to \$1.20.

In Post, until Monday at least, unleaded ranges from \$1.15.9 up...

Then Monday Johnnie Johnson's Exxon dropped regular to 99.9 and unleaded to \$1.05.

Hopefully, the drop in world oil prices paid for crude oil will benefit us at the pump.

It escapes me why gas prices in Lubbock can be as much as 10 cents a gallon cheaper than in Post...especially since some of the same gasoline wholesalers service the same area.

Could it be they think they can get away with higher prices here?

I don't fault our local service station managers and owners...they are stuck with wholesale prices charged to them by the distributor...but I do think we ought to be pushing the distributors to sell gas here for the same wholesale price as in Lubbock or Dallas.

Afterall, it's here that the oil is produced...

The efforts of the Caprock Community Theater are inspiring...and the dreams they have for offering us stage productions and fixing up the old Garza Theater building are refreshing.

My, there's lots of things going on in our town...and to quote from Mayor McCrory, "more things and more people are doing more in the past two years than I've seen in my 30 plus years in Post."

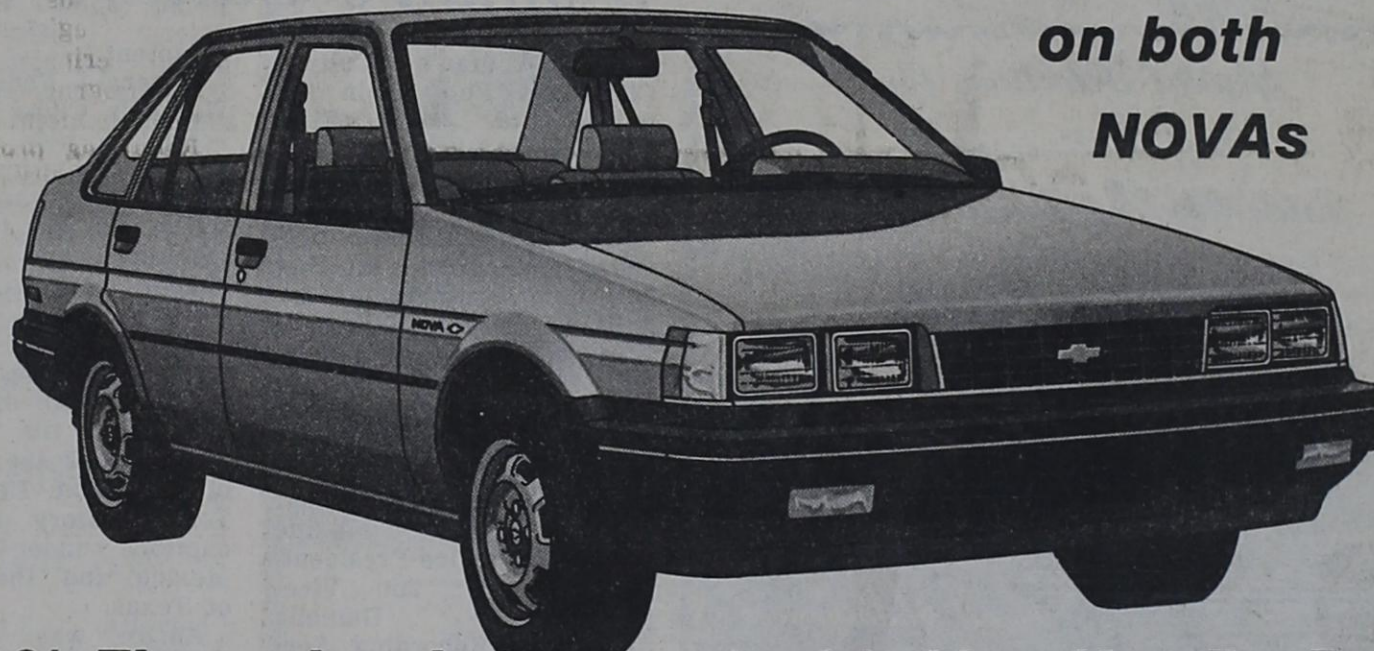

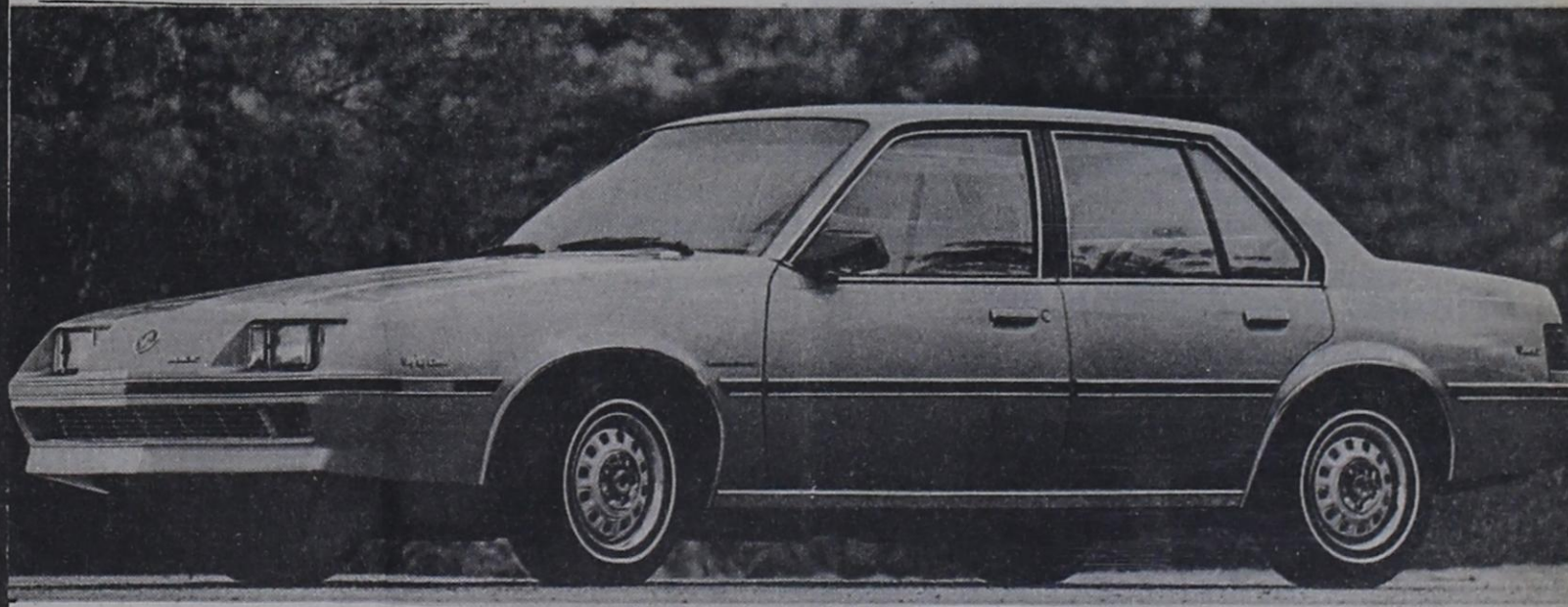

Prior to the annexation of Texas as the 28th State of the Union, Dec 29, 1845, Texas history records 14 capitol under flags of Mexico and the Republic of Texas.

Austin was chosen as the permanent capitol of the Republic of Texas by the Congress in August 1839.

The first capitol building in Austin was erected in the year and served the Republic of Texas.

This building was located at the corner of 8th and Colorado Streets, the site of the present Austin City Hall.

In the original plans, the buildings were to be built of Texas limestone.

Construction was begun Feb 1, 1882.

Following the laying of the corner-stone, March 2, 1885, doubt had arisen concerning the quantity of uniform quality available from the quarries selected.

The owners of the Granite Mountain near Marble Falls in Burnet Co., Texas, tendered to the people of the State of Texas, free of charge, all the granite stone they needed to complete the building.

The present capitol was dedicated May 16, 1888.

Lillian's mother and older brother were able to attend this dedication, as they lived in Austin.

Refreshments were served from a beautiful table, using the Valentine motif, and centered with a cupid container filled with white miniature mums, topped with red hearts saying "I Love You."

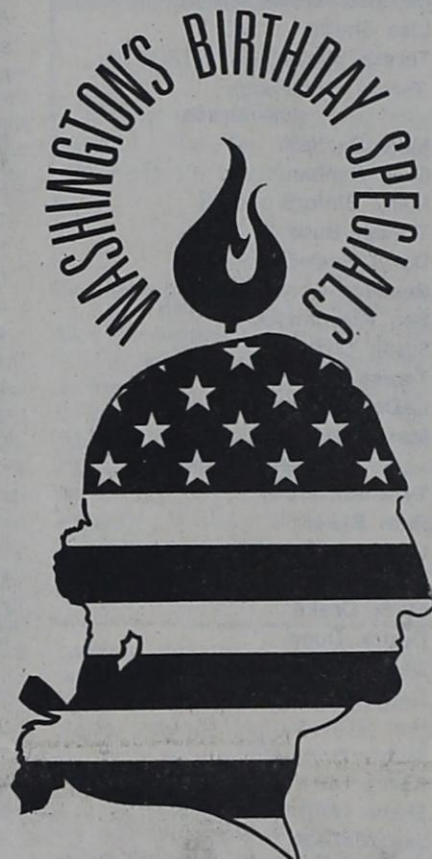

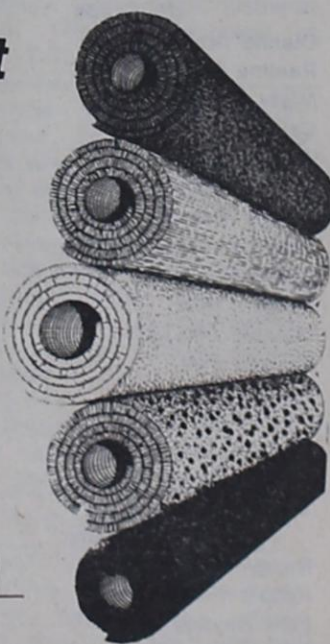
