In addition to the 100 members
signed at Levelland Wednesday,
second day of the membership cam-
paign which opened in Lubbock
Tuesday for district two of the Tex-
as Cotton Cooperative association,
the second day of the drive was
featured by the second branch of-
fice in the district being definitely
located—at Littlefield.

Announcement of the Littlefield
branch being chosen was made
here Wednesday night by Lawrence
Westbrook, organization director of
the association. J. H. Cain, vice-
president, and J. W. Hale, secretary
of the Littlefield chamber of com-
merce, had presented signed con-
tract for the branch to Mr. West-
brook and the association had ac-
cepted it. The first branch office
was located at Lubbock when the
local chamber of commerce under-
wrote the guarantee of \$27,500 ne-
cessary to secure both the district
and branch offices.

Westbrook, before departing
for Dallas Wednesday night, ex-
pressed gratification at the enthusiasm
manifested at the organization
meeting. Tuesday afternoon, the
splendid results obtained at Levelland
and prospects for a successful
drive for membership.

Airmen Saved In Parachutes

Proposed Non-stop Flight to
Buenos Aires from Gotham
Ends in Crash; Fliers to
Make Another Attempt

MONROE, Ga., July 16. (AP)—
The proposed non-stop refueling flight
of the monoplane "K," of New Haven,
Conn., from New York to Buenos Aires
ended near here today when the
ship crashed and the crew of three
leaped to safety in parachutes.

The fliers, Garland Peed, Jimmy
Garlingham and Randy Enslow, were
lost eight hours. With her gasoline
tanks empty, the "K" went out of
control. Peed ordered his men to
leap, and followed them.

They landed without a scratch,
a mile from Bodrick, which is 13
miles from here. The ship plowed
into the ground about one-half mile
away and was demolished. The men
rested at a hotel here tonight,
"lucky to be alive," and determined
to try again. They expect to leave
for New York within two days.

Low visibility and a sticky fog
over Georgia's inland and the fuel
which they hoped would take them
to Havana was wasted as they flew
blindly.

People Of Texas Begin To Name Officers With Absentee Ballots

(By Associated Press)
THE people of Texas began
selecting their office-holders
Wednesday, and seven candi-
dates for governor, perhaps
mindful of that, kept on their
campaign rounds.

Of course, they were not pay-
ing as much attention to the
absentee voting, which began
Wednesday and will last for a
week, as to the first primary
ten days hence. Persons who
will be away from home election
day, July 20, may cast absentee
ballots. If they are at home now,
they may go down to a voting
box and do their "scratching."
If not, they may mail in their
ballot.

Sterling At Dallas
Dallas heard its first speak-
ing on the part of a candidate
for governor when Ross S. Ster-
ling spoke there Wednesday

night. Most, if not all, of the
other active candidates will be
in Dallas during the next nine
days. Candidates usually wait
late to invade the North Texas
city because of its size and the
density of population around it.
They hope to arouse enthusiasm
which will last through election
day.

Thomas B. Love of Dallas took
a night off after speaking before
the Texas Angola Goat Raisers'
convention at Rock Springs
Wednesday morning. Rock Spr-
ings is in Edwards county, which
gave Herbert Hoover a 9 to 1
majority in 1928. Love thanked
the voters for "placing in prin-
ciple above party."

Mayfield Flays Sterling
Former United States Sena-
tor Earle B. Mayfield again

levelled his fire on Sterling and
the proposed state highway bond
issue in an address at Atlanta
Wednesday.

Mayfield said that he, a "lit-
tle business man," would set
aside \$5,000,000 annually out of
current revenues of the state
highway department to pay the
\$70,000,000 of outstanding bonds
voted by the counties to help
build state roads. "A big success-
ful business man" candidate for
governor wants to pay these
\$70,000,000 of bonds by plaster-
ing \$30,000,000 more bonds on
the backs of the people, May-
field said.

Goldsborough Joins Father In Air Crash

Nineteen-Year-Old Holder of
Junior Trans-Continental
Flight Records Dies After
Plane Crashes in Forest

(By Associated Press)
BENNINGTON, Vt., July 16.—
Frank Goldsborough, 19, holder of
junior trans-continental flight re-
cords, tonight joined his father,
Brice Goldsborough, also an aviator,
in death.

Unconscious since being brought
to the Putnam Memorial hospital
here, hours after his plane had
crashed into a fog-hidden tree
Monday, Goldsborough died as his
step-mother hastened to his bed-
side.

"The Dawn" Never Found
"The Dawn," Mrs. Frances Gray-
son's trans-Atlantic plane, carried
his father to death in one of the un-
solved mysteries of attempted trans-
Atlantic flights, only companion
crew member with him.

"The Dawn" never was found after hop-
ping from New York to Newfoundland
in 1927 preparatory to a trans-
Atlantic flight attempt.

The youthful holder of the three
junior trans-continental flight re-
cords died in a coma that had en-
shrouded him 60 hours. Golds-
borough showed no improvement
from the time his unconscious form
had been extricated from the
wreckage of the plane, which had
plunged him down for 18 hours
while an army of men searched for him.

With Donald Mockler, New York,
Goldsborough was on his way to
Keene, N. H., Monday when they
encountered a thick fog. In an ef-
fort to get below the fog, Golds-
borough dropped to a level of 2,500
feet only to crash into the trees of
a mountain 2,500 feet high. Mock-
ler was slightly injured and tried to
extricate his unconscious companion
from the pilot's seat. For an hour
he worked but on falling he set out
in search of aid.

Robber Slain In Messenger Holdup

CANTON, O., July 16. (AP)—Police
tonight were holding James Romeo,
27, on investigation charges, as a
result of the holdup today of two
bank messengers in which one of
a trio of robbers was slain. A bank
messenger was wounded seriously
and \$60,000 stolen currency was
later recovered.

Charles Williams, alias Charles
Kieh, 25, of Cleveland, was shot
to death in a pistol battle with Charles
M. Riblet, 39, former Canton police
chief and chief of the protection
service of the First National bank,
who was wounded by two bullets
from the robber's pistol.

HUTCHINSONS RETURN

Lubbock Physician, Family
Back From Europe

Dr. J. T. Hutchinson, of the Lub-
bock Sanitarium, accompanied by
Mrs. Hutchinson and their son, has
returned from a two months trip
to Europe.

Dr. and Mrs. Hutchinson left
Lubbock May 10 and sailed from
New York May 15. They landed
July 10 and reached Lubbock Sun-
day.

\$12,000,000 To Go To Heirs

NEW YORK, July 16. (AP)—
The estate of Mrs. Ida Flieger,
one of the richest incompetents
in the world, is to be divided
among two nephews and a
niece. It is valued at between
\$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000. Mrs.
Flieger died last Saturday.

The heirs, who will share
equally are William W. Taylor,
a New York lawyer; George W.
Taylor, a contractor and
builder of Los Angeles, Calif.;
and Mrs. Ruth Taylor Pontius,
of Evanston, Ill., wife of a
medical student.

Mrs. Flieger had been legal-
ly insane for 33 years, and left
no will. Under the law her es-
tate must be divided among
her direct descendants or di-
rect descendants of her broth-
ers and sisters. The two
nephews and a niece are the
only such relatives.

Cade Talks on His Candidacy

Amarillo Candidate for Con-
gress Challenges Opponent,
Marvin Jones, to Debate on
Campaign Issues

A free and frank discussion of
some of the issues of the campaign,
as well as a challenge to the in-
cumbent, Marvin Jones of Amarillo, to
meet him in a debate on campaign
issues, was held last night by James
O. Cade, also of Amarillo, his op-
ponent for congress from this dis-
trict.

Mr. Cade declared that on July
3 he was to speak at Turkey and
that Mr. Jones had accepted an in-
vitation to speak there also. He
claimed that when the congressman
found it, he wired the committee
that legislative business was
keeping him busy in Washington.

Only a small crowd heard the
address, given from a truck at the
corner of Broadway and Avenue K,
opposite the Lubbock hotel. The
street had been roped off for the
address.

Mr. Cade discussed farm relief,
prohibition and other subjects now
before the campaign.

ing some difficulties. The dad
of Joseph McDonald, 13, of New
Orleans, thought his son "too
frail to stand a night in a tree,"
and called the lad down from
his perch as an endurance sit-
ter at sundown.

It was conservatively estimat-

ed tonight that 100 El Paso
children were sitting in trees,
all trying for the record, but
with none particularly near it.

Four girls, not to be outdone
by boys, had spent more than
12 hours in trees.

Airport Bonds Are Bought by Citizens Bank

Offer of Par and Accrued In-
terest Accepted by City Com-
mission on \$35,000 in Im-
provement Bonds Here

The Citizens National Bank of
Lubbock offered par and accrued
interest for the \$35,000 airport im-
provement bonds which the city
commission had to sell yesterday.

The offer was accepted, Mayor J. J.
Clements announced.

Representative of three other
bond houses were present when the
bids were opened in the afternoon.
Owing to an announcement by the
commission that no offer of less
than par and accrued interest would
be considered, the three men did
not make definite offers for the
bonds.

Satisfaction was expressed by city
officials at the price brought by the
bonds.

DEMONSTRATION HELD

Bodies of 13 Riot Victims
Carried Through City

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 16. (AP)—
The bodies of 13 victims of yester-
day's rioting in Alexandria were
carried through the streets of the
city today in a great demonstra-
tion by nationalists. During the late
afternoon several thousand Egyp-
tians assembled outside the govern-
ment hospital and began pelting it
with stones. The police, command-
ed by Fitzpatrick Bey, who was
injured in yesterday's rioting, had
great difficulty in restoring order.

The reason for the attack on the
hospital was an announcement that
the procurator-general had refused
to allow the removal of the bodies
of the victims of yesterday's clashes
until post mortems were held. The
bodies finally were handed over to
the crowd after the formalities of
the post mortems had been com-
pleted.

PROTESTS FILED

Between 175 and 180 Lubbock
Citizens Before Board

Between 175 and 180 residents
and taxpayers of Lubbock met yester-
day at the city building and filed
protests with the city equalization
board.

Hearings on the protests over the
valuations fixed by the assessors,
was started.

While the census showed a pretty
even growth over the state, the
Panhandle, West Texas, Rio Gran-
de valley and portions of the
Coastal area registered the most
marked increases. Claims in the
Panhandle, where oil fields were
opened and agricultural develop-
ment begun in recent years, were
especially striking.

Fisherman Is Charged with Two Slayings

J. A. Coleman Says He Has a
"Trick Up His Sleeve"; Is
Held in Arkansas Jail

Begs to Be Slain
Aged Man Held for Murdering
Wife and Step-Daughter for
Refusal to Leave House;
Surrenders to Officers

(By Associated Press)
JULY 16.—A 35-year-old
fisherman who today killed his
wife and step-daughter and fired
the house in which their bodies lay,
tonight told authorities he had "a
trick up his sleeve," to cheat the
electric chair. Following his ar-
rest he begged officers to shoot him
because he feared electrocution.

He was held in jail here charged
with murder for stabbing to death
his 22-year-old stepdaughter, Mrs.
Dolores Breardon, and clubbing to
death his wife. Their refusal to
leave the house when he ordered
them out was said by a surviving
stepdaughter to have sent him into
a rage which resulted in the kil-
ling.

Coleman was found sitting on a
bridge with a butcher knife in his
hand. After persuasion he agreed to
break it and surrendered to offi-
cers.

Youth Who Drowned Boy Studied

Until he outgrows his "abnormal tendencies," juvenile officers of
Compton, Cal., hope to have the court place seven-year-old LaVerne Mc-
Donald in a home or reformatory. He is in the technical custody of the
police since he disclosed to them that he killed James Ellis, three, by

child severely last December, and does not understand the seriousness of

Two Bands of Men Led Away Through Ruse

Jesse Lee Washington, Held for
Slaying of Woman Near
Pampa, Removed to Jail in
Gray County Wednesday

Will Be Protected
Sheriff Disguises as Oil
Worker to Bring Prisoner to
Jail Safely; Rangers Prom-
ise Protection

(By Associated Press)
PAMPA, July 16. (AP)—
Jesse Lee Washington, charged with
the slaying of Mrs. Henry Vaughan
near Pampa last Friday, Sheriff Claude McKinney
of Collingsworth county and
Texas rangers late today had re-
moved the prisoner to the Gray
county jail here.

The men who hoped to deal
summarily with the negro were
following the rangers in belief they
were en route for the negro, while
Sheriff McKinney, disguised as an
oil field worker, sped to Pampa
with the prisoner chained in his
closed automobile.

To Be Protected.
The rangers arrived here with the
independent groups following them
soon after Washington had been
put behind bars. They brought two
machine guns, 10,000 rounds of am-
munition, 175 gas and grenades
and many small arms. Ranger Ser-
geant M. T. Gonzales, in charge,
said the negro would be protected at
"all costs." He declared the jail
would be guarded day and night.
There was no sign of mob violence
early tonight.

Sheriff McKinney did not say
where he had received the negro.
It was generally believed he was
kept in the Oklahoma state reform-
story at Graceland since his arrest
near the scene of the slaying and
rushed away from a mob that was
forming.

Investigation Of Communists Is Under Way

**Reds Charged with Fomenting
Strikes in Attack on Form of
American Government by
Charles G. Wood**

NEW YORK, July 16. (AP)—Communists were charged with fomenting strikes as one link of attack on the form of American government by Charles G. Wood, commissioner of circulation of the Labor Department at Washington, who testified today before the special house investigating committee.

Wood declared communists had centered their activities at Passaic, N. J., New Bedford, Mass., Greater New York and in Gastonia, N. C. He said that they instituted strikes and then made every effort to prevent settlement of disputes over wages, working conditions and hours.

Thousands Affected.
Workers in textile mills where strikes were conducted under communist leadership were often intimidated and thousands driven from employment, he said.

Before the witness took the stand Chairman Hamilton Fish Jr., of the committee announced that representatives of the Amtorg Trading Corporation, official commercial agency of the Soviet Union in the United States, had consented to appear voluntarily next Tuesday and Wednesday. He explained that the committee had decided not to call William Z. Foster, communist leader serving a prison sentence of 30 years for plotting a riot in Union Square, New York, on March 8, because efforts might be made, he said, by communists to effect his escape.

WARSHIPS TO EGYPT

LONDON, July 16. (AP)—Prime Minister MacDonald announced in the House of Commons today that two warships have been sent to Egypt. The ships have been ordered to proceed to Alexandria which was the scene of serious rioting yesterday, resulting in the deaths of 13 natives and one Italian.

GRAND JURY CHIDED
MUSKOGEE, Okla., July 16. (AP)—After being chided by Judge R. L. Williams for failing to return any true bills in the Chickasha mob cases, the federal grand jury returned indictments today and returned indictments. The names of the indicted men were not made public.

Pastures In East Texas Deteriorate

AUSTIN, July 16. (AP)—Rapid deterioration of pasture in East Texas during June because of heavy packing rains earlier in the year and the extremely dry weather of the past month, was noted in the livestock report released here today, by Carl H. Robinson, senior statistician of the United States Department of Agriculture.

The report stated cattle and sheep in all districts, with the exception of East Texas, were holding up well. The report noted that rain was badly needed in the northwest section but that plenty of grass still was available. Trading in all classes of livestock now is at a standstill, Robinson said, with little or no contracting. Cattle and sheep, however, are held in fairly strong hands and range conditions are such that ranchmen do not have to sell now, the report said.

DEATH TOTAL LOW

WASHINGTON, July 16. (AP)—Navy reports showed today that for each death in an airplane accident, naval aviators flew 1,018,000 miles in the last fiscal year. Navy planes flew a total of 260,000 hours and there was one death for each 14,500 hours as compared with 6,773 hours last year.

Gas Furnished 36 Cities by Company Here

Three or Four More Towns in
South Plains, Panhandle
May Be Added by West
Texas Gas Company Here

Three years after its organization, the West Texas Gas company had begun the distribution of natural gas to 36 cities and towns on the South Plains and Panhandle and before the end of 1930 three or four more towns may be added, officials of the company state.

Lubbock is the largest distributing system owned by the company, whose headquarters are now established here. The Lubbock franchise was granted July 7, 1927, to cover a period of 20 years. Gas was turned into the mains October 1, a little less than three months after the franchise was granted.

Was First Customer
R. C. Pierce, 1530 Thirteenth street, was the first customer, his meter connections being completed October 4. Twenty days later the company had 457 meters and at the close of business December 31, 1929 the number of customers was 4,969.

Forty Employed
Approximately 40 employees are used in Lubbock by the company. The average monthly payroll is \$6,200.

Effective September 1, next, the local distribution system will be divided into three districts, with dates for payment of gas bills varying with the district. Meter reading will be done by districts.

Towns now served include: Amarillo, Anton, Alameda, Brownfield, Borina, Canyon, Crosbyton, Dalhart, Kenna, Lamesa, Levelland, Littlefield, Lockney, Lorena, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, O'Donnell, Post, Plainview, Quitaque, Ralls, Silverton, Slaton, Stanton, Southland, Tahoka, Turley, Tulsa and Wilcox.

Serious Riots Are Reported

Four Persons Killed in East Bengal in Fighting Between Moslems and Hindus; Money Lender Is Beaten

LONDON, July 16. (AP)—Sparse Calcutta dispatches, believed to have been blue-pencilled heavily by censors, today told of serious rioting in eastern Bengal between Moslems and Hindus.

The Daily Mail said that four persons were killed and two wounded at Mymensingh, and frantic calls for help were received from Kishoreganj, about 40 miles away. All available troops and police were rushed to both places.

Money Lender Beaten. The fighting was said to have started last Friday at Kishoreganj when a large Moslem mob surrounded the house of a Hindu money lender, and after an unsuccessful parley on a note looted and burned the residence, severely wounding the occupant.

Other Moslems hastened to surrounding villages, stirring up their co-religionists. Riot and incendiarism became general in the district and many outrages were committed on Hindu men, women and children.

Many Hindus tried to escape but were beset by Moslems. Twenty-five Gukha police, led by a British officer, arrived just in time to save them. Earth shocks, occurring during the rioting, added to the general confusion.

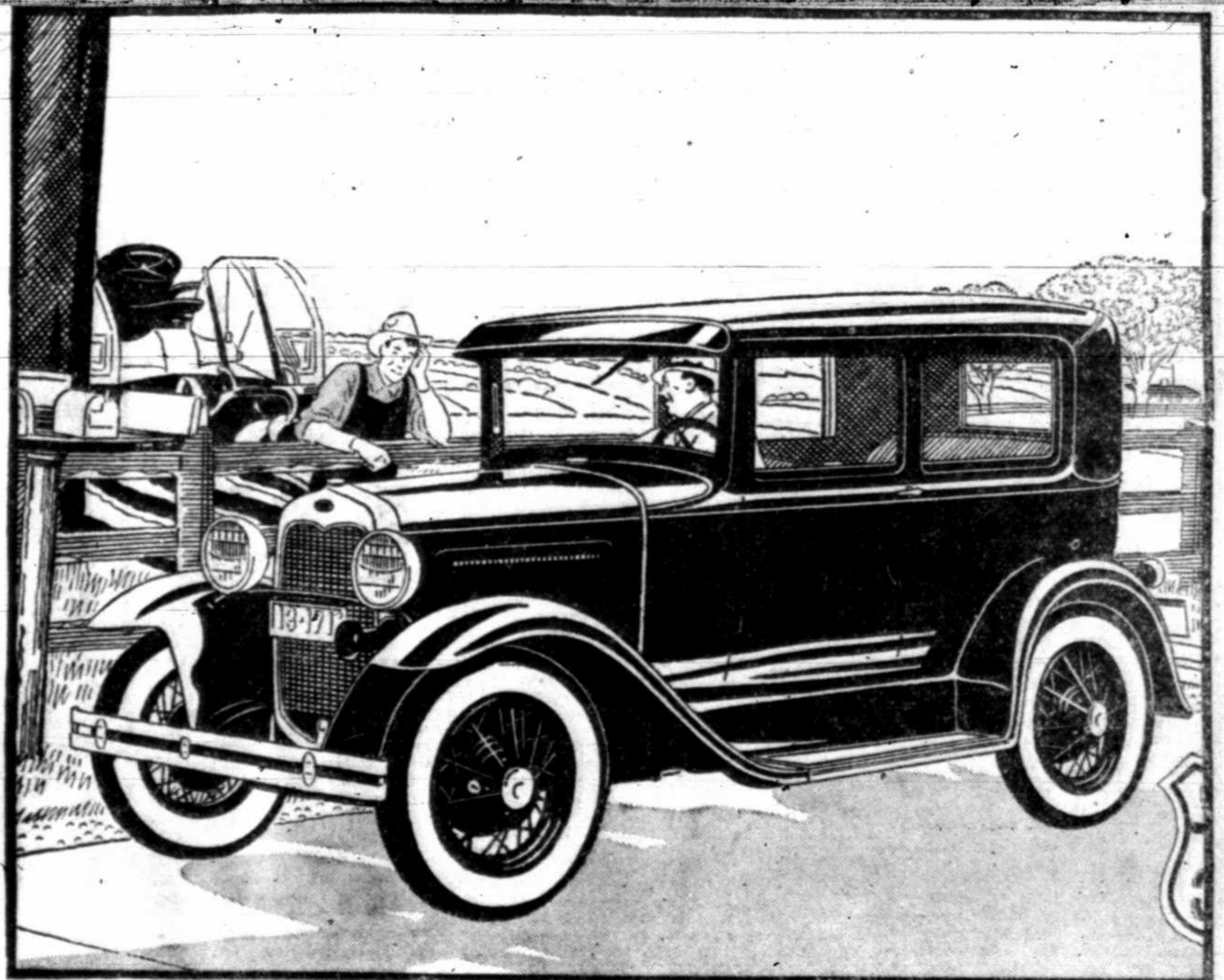

THE GOVERNOR'S RACE

ONLY ten days remain until Texas Democrats will go to the polls to select their nominees for various public offices. Campaigns thus far, while crowded, have stirred up little rumormongering and the middle which surrounded the races upon their beginnings. In the whole, still remains.

Top men and one woman, a 'proxy' for her barred husband, are seeking the nomination as governor and of the eleven only seven may be regarded as 'in the running.' They are, of course, Clint Small, Miriam Ferguson, Ross Sterling, Tom Love, Earle Mayfield, Barry Miller and Jim Young. The others—we can't even list all of their names without referring to the files—are doomed already to be in the also ran' class.

Texas Democrats, therefore, have the names of seven candidates to consider. On the South Plains, in which The Morning Avalanche is primarily interested, we have plenty to think about before casting our ballots.

Let's look over the list. Mrs. Ferguson's one term in the executive's chair marked her indelibly as a cat's paw for her husband. Thinking people realize that should she be elected Jim Ferguson would once again be Texas' governor—but without moral or legal responsibility. That won't do.

Tom Love, stormy petrel, making the race behind a smoke-screen of prejudice and animosities which should be buried, doesn't appear to the careful student of politics as the logical candidate. In his years of public office-holding he has reached the limelight as a fractional leader but constructive accomplishment is foreign to his 'autocrat.' Further than that, it is extremely doubtful if either Love or Mrs. Ferguson could beat an extremely desirable Republican candidate, Dr. George Butte, in the November elections. To nominate either Mrs. Ferguson or Senator Love is an invitation to party disaster.

Earle Mayfield and Barry Miller, professional office-seekers, have behind them years of entangling factors—'swap outs.' If you please with other professional politicians. Both are known quantities and should they be eventually elected could not be expected to reach the heights most Texans would like to see their governor reach.

Now we get to Ross Sterling, ballyhooed as a great business genius and now serving as chairman of the State Highway commission. From the South Plains standpoint, Mr. Sterling's desirability as a candidate can be dismissed with a sentence. If, after considering the highway service this section has received, ten South Plains people can wish for him in the governor's chair, we'll be surprised. Sterling will get some votes out here but were the voters to study his contribution to our highways before voting it is doubtful that he would receive a desired ballot.

As for Jim Young, 'stand pat' and East Texas to whom West Texas is just so much raw acreage. The Morning Avalanche fails to see where he can be seen as a logical candidate in this territory. Our symposium now leaves but one candidate, Senator Clint Small of Wellington.

A new power in state politics, one who comes to the people with clean hands. West Texas' own candidate has a tremendous appeal. He knows this country—he is for this country as well as for the entire state. He is capable, honest and fair. What more could anyone ask?

Vote for Clint Small—and hear him Saturday when all the South Plains will gather in Lubbock, "Small-for-Governor" is our big chance.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

WITH SENATE BALANCE SO DELICATE PROGRESSIVE-ISM BULKS FORMIDABLY IN 1936 CONGRESSIONAL CAMPAIGNS

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Progressive-ism bulks formidably in this year's campaign. Especially is this true of the fight for senate seats, because the senate balance already is so delicate.

Congress' adjournment found the senate progressives badly flattened.

Yet for a while the betting was good that they would tie up the whole stand-pat program. And so they would if a lot of Democrats, with whom they were allied, had not deserted them. What made it worse, all but a mere nucleus of progressives bolted also, when the alliance collapsed.

The stand-pat policy is to follow up their advantage, trouncing all the progressives they can at the polls in the autumn.

On the other hand, the 100 per cent progressives realize that, with a very little more strength, they would have thrown a crimp into the stand-pat-ism. They will try to hang on and gain just this little bit more next November. If they can manage it, they will come back more beligerently than ever.

Stand-pat-ism versus progressivism is not an issue in all the states, but in the states where it is an issue it is the capital one.

Use the term "progressivism" in its today's generally-accepted political sense—in effect as a distinct party label. Otherwise interpreted it becomes confusing.

For example Senator Capper of Kansas, once told me that he considers himself a progressive. Senators to whom I would confine the progressive designation, he calls radicals. It is a question of definitions. My own estimation of the Kansas is that of a tolerant, enlightened conservative—a high type senator. Nevertheless, his re-election in the fall (a foregone conclusion) certainly will not be hailed as a victory by the progressives—though they will be pleased personally, for progressive-ism of Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, who faces the voters this year, is a matter of opinion.

The progressives claim him generally, to be sure, but they never can absolutely count on him. Especially he takes no risks just as he is about to ask regular Republicans to support him for re-election, which may be good judgment but detracts a trifle from the thick-and-thinness of the progressive impression he gives.

Senator Thomas D. Schall is another of the group. Always a whirlwind campaigner, I hear from Minnesota that he is making a particularly energetic progressive affair of his present re-election campaign. Circumstances permitting (as he evidently considers they do this time) I take Schall's sympathies to be truly progressive, but he is a very wily politician, and I have seen him adapt them to temporarily conservative requirements.

Senator James Couzens of Michigan, also of the re-election contingent, has a dual political personality. On some subjects he is so progressive as to justify Senator Capper's contention that the word "progressive" is not strong enough; it amounts to radicalism. But on other subjects he is an ultra-conservative, not to say reactionary, as Senator Smoot—which is going the limit. Anyone who chooses to try classifying him is welcome to the job; I can't do it.

Among the remainder, Senator Pine is asking Oklahoma to send him back to Washington as a progressive. He did have a spell of it last winter, but before that was a perfectly orthodox Republican and reverted to regularity when the progressive-Democratic alliance blew up. For while the progressive bloc members thought he was a sincere convert; they must be skeptical now.

In conclusion we come to two of the current season's candidates whose progressive-ism any bonding company would be willing to guarantee. It seems to me:

Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska and William H. McMaster of South Dakota.

I reckon "Uncle George" Norris will be taken for granted. Senator McMaster is a much younger man, with only six years behind him in Washington. To Uncle George's nearly a third of a century. It may be worth while taking a squint at the South Dakotan's record.

FINDS SECRETIONS FROM GLANDS AFFECT GROWTH OF THE HAIR

Recent investigations have revealed the intimate relationship between the functioning of the glands of the body and the hair.

It has become apparent in the last twenty years that the skin and hair are particularly influenced by glandular secretions. Disturbances of the growth of the hair have been noted in both oversecretion and undersecretion of the thyroid gland.

In cases in which the secretion is less than it should be, the hair is thin, dry and lusterless and may be prematurely gray. If such cases are given proper dosages of thyroid extract, the hair and the skin usually improve. In cases in which the secretion of the thyroid gland is too great, there are, in addition to the usual symptoms, in many instances, thinning of the hair over the scalp and sometimes complete baldness.

Within the skull there is a little gland called the hypophysis or pituitary gland, which is closely related to various disorders of growth and development. In case there is too much secretion of this gland, there is not infrequently pigmentation of the skin in various places and a considerable growth of superfluous hair. One investigator noticed particularly in women heavy growths of hair on the chest, the legs, and sometimes also on the face, associated with overaction of this gland.

Several investigators have noticed this symptom in at least one-fourth of 400 cases and they have added the fact that this additional hair is thick, wavy and oily. On the other hand, should the secretion of this gland be deficient, the skin is likely to be smooth, transparent and free from moisture, and there is a tendency to lack of hair upon the body.

In a recent review of the subject, Dr. Zola K. Cooper points out that in disorders of the suprarenal glands, the small organs above the kidney which have apparently several different types of secretion, various changes may occur in the distribution of hair over the body, associated also with a tendency toward masculinity or femininity in either males or females with some extremely surprising results.

It has long been known that the glands act as an interlocking chain, the secretion of one gland affecting that of another. Overgrowth of hair is found in overfunction of several different glands, and the lack of hair found in underfunction of the same glands. The subject has just begun to be studied, and undoubtedly adequate explanations for superfluous hair and for lack of hair will be found in the majority of cases when more evidence has been accumulated.

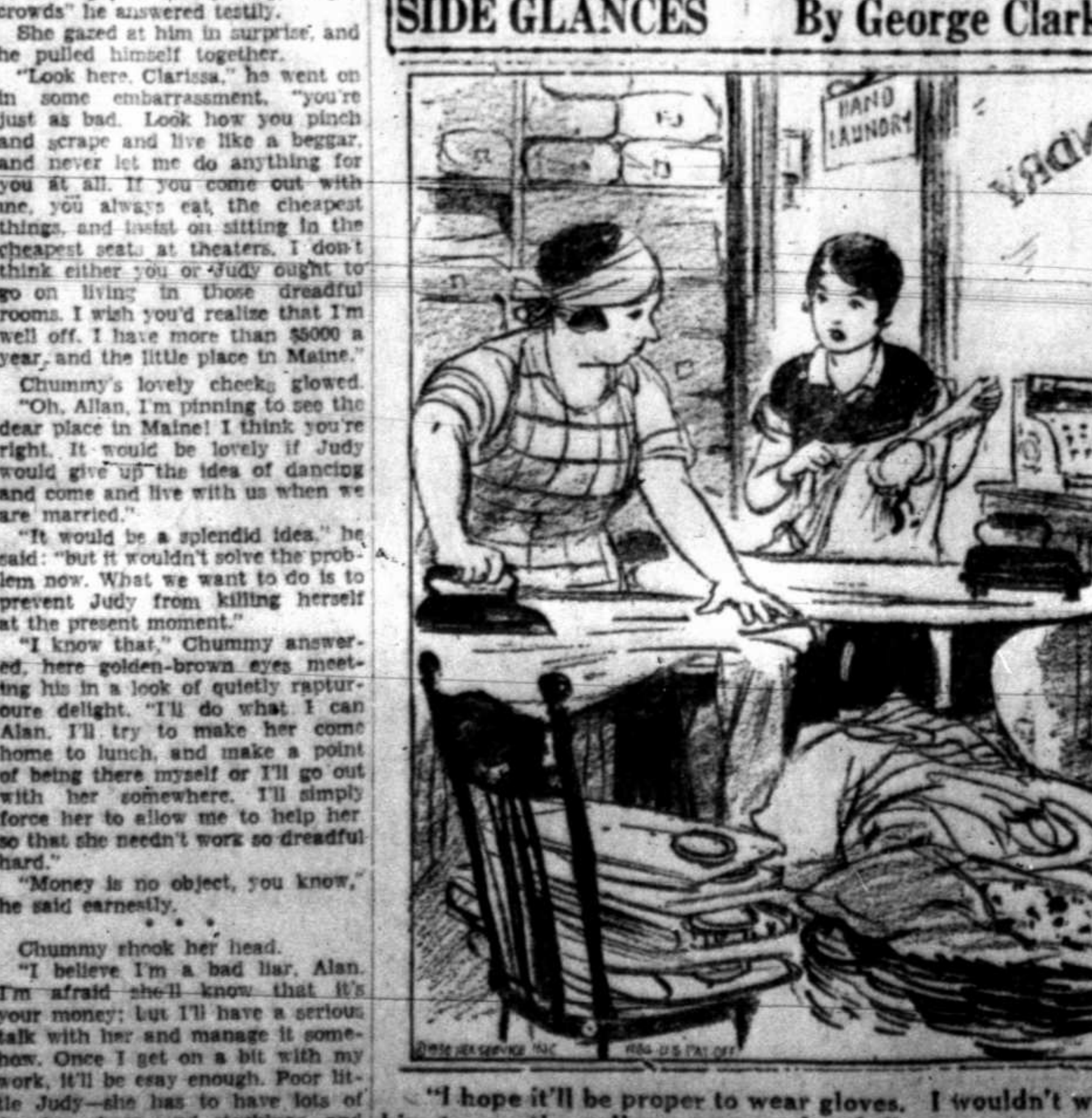

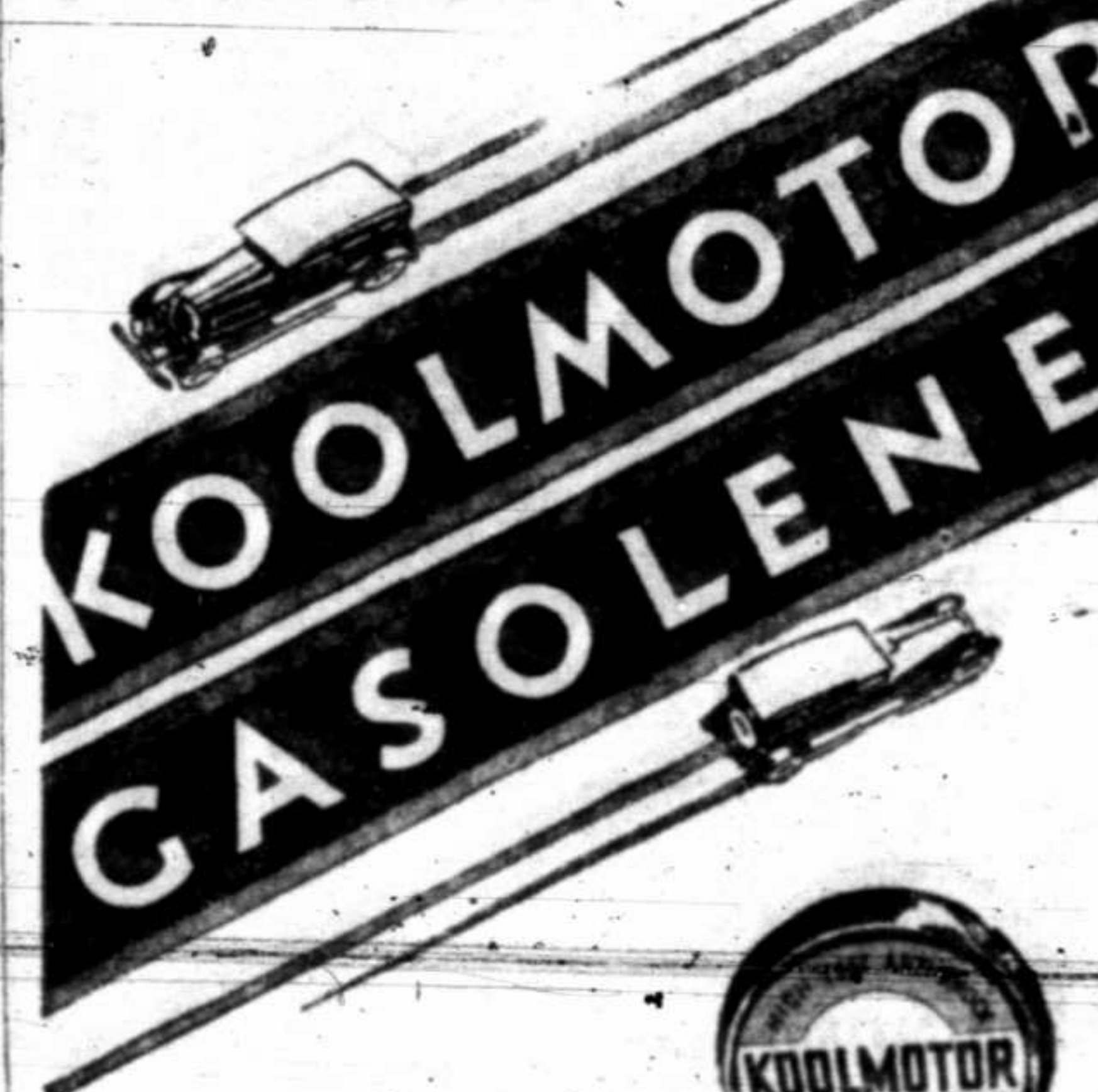

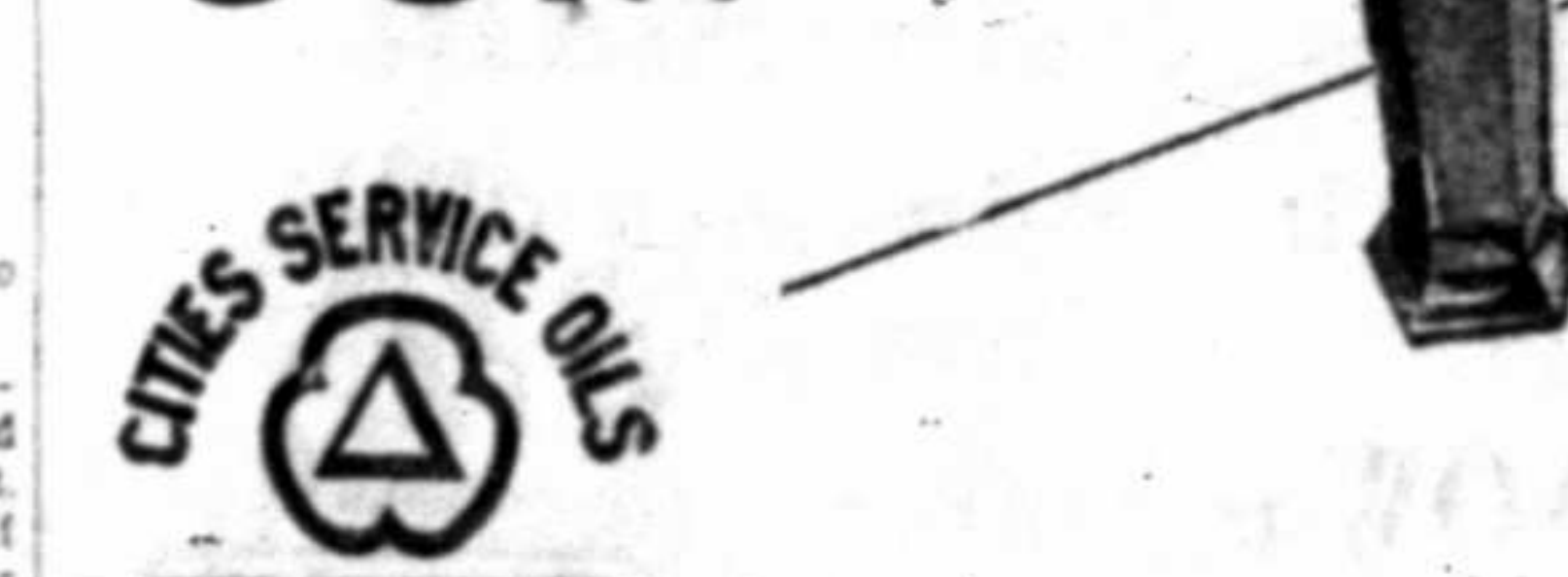

Local Negroes Refused Vote In Primaries

Ban Against Blacks Will Be Continued in Lubbock County According to Action of Executive Committee

Lubbock negroes will not be permitted to vote in the coming democratic primary July 26, even though other counties in Texas do permit them to participate in the primary. J. K. Western, chairman of the democratic county executive committee announced Wednesday.

Under the Texas law, the executive committee has the power to fix qualifications for voters in the primaries. The executive committee of Lubbock county has decided to continue the ban. There are approximately 200 negroes in the county who would be eligible to vote.

Negroes of this county have never been allowed to vote in the primary heretofore, said Mr. Western, "there being a State law barring them from the polls. We do not intend to change the mode of procedure as follows in former years unless forced to do so by decision of the higher courts."

Up To Election Judges "Should the court rule that they will not be barred the decision in this county will be left up to election judges."

"I doubt very seriously whether Lubbock county negroes would be able to meet the qualifications of voters in signing the democratic pledge," stated Mr. Western.

Forty-five discharged Portsmouth, N. H. July 16. (AP)—Forty-five workmen in the industrial department at the Portsmouth navy yard today received notice of their discharge, effective Saturday. The action, according to Yard Manager Captain Louis Shaine, is necessary because of lack of work after the completion of the submarine V-5.

Miss Elizabeth West, Tech Librarian Will Do Photographic Work In Seville

Miss Elizabeth West, librarian at Texas Technological college has been given a two years leave of absence by President Paul W. Horn to accept the offer of a two year trip to Seville, Spain where she will do photographic work in American history for the archives of the Indians for the library of congress. It was announced yesterday.

Dr. J. P. Jameson, chief of the manuscript division of the library of congress, offered Miss West the position and Dr. Horn granted the request for a leave.

To Select Material Miss West's work will consist mainly of selecting historical material to be photographed, supervising the photography and arranging it for transportation after it has been secured.

Research work at Seville has been made possible by a gift from John D. Rockefeller, Jr. who three years ago gave \$700,000 for the enlarging of the collection of the library of congress. The fund was to be distributed over a period of five years. Purpose is to enlarge the library's bibliographic apparatus and collection.

Miss West will work under the direction of Dr. Worthington Chauncey Ford, former chief of the manuscript division of the library of congress. She was formerly associated with him. He now resides in Paris.

Miss West after leaving the federal government service became state librarian and came to Texas Technological college when it was founded.

In his petition Wilson claims permanent injuries to his person as a result of the crash, which occurred several months ago at the corner of Avenue O and Sixth street. One finger had to be amputated as a result of injuries received, the plaintiff claims.

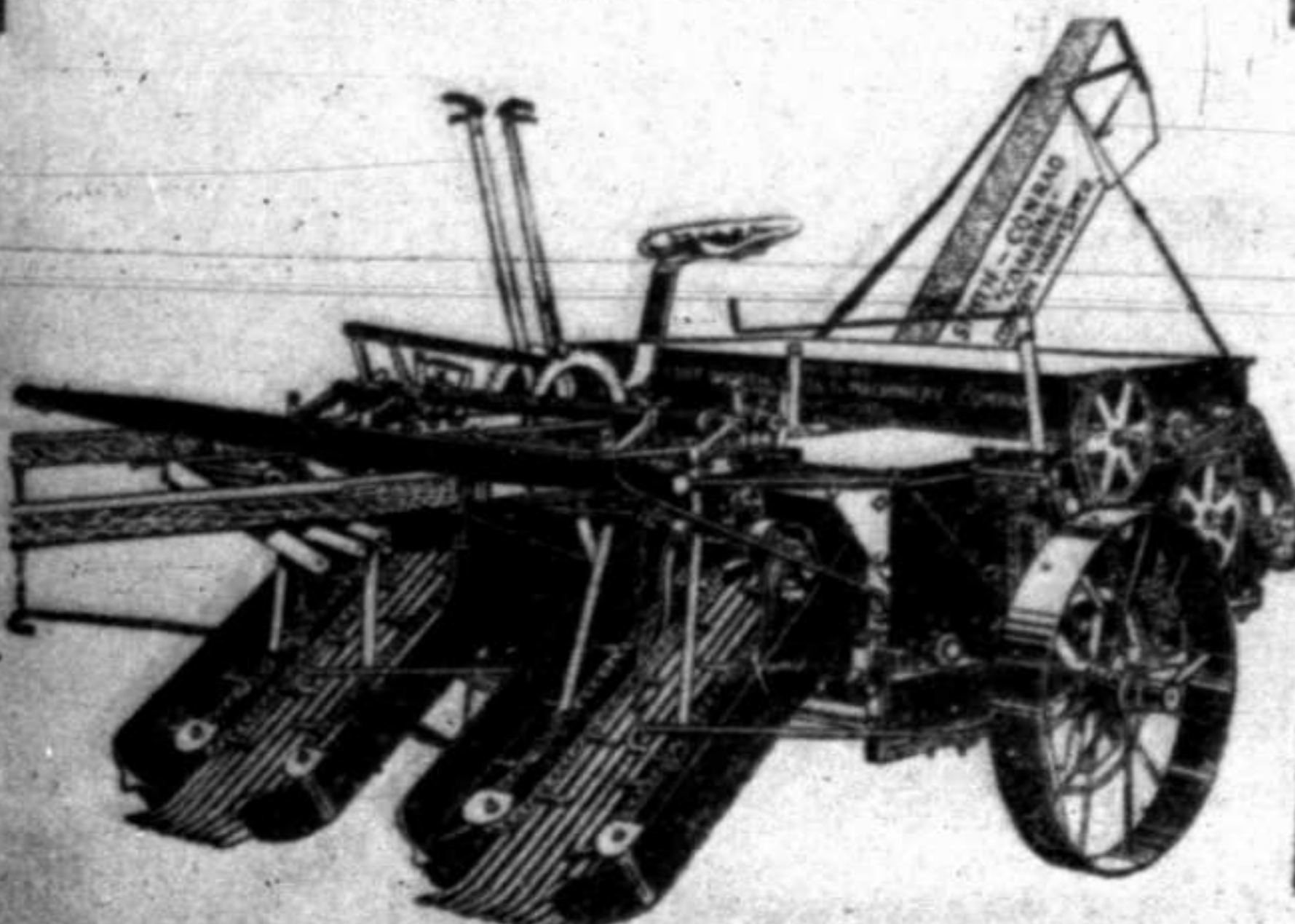
