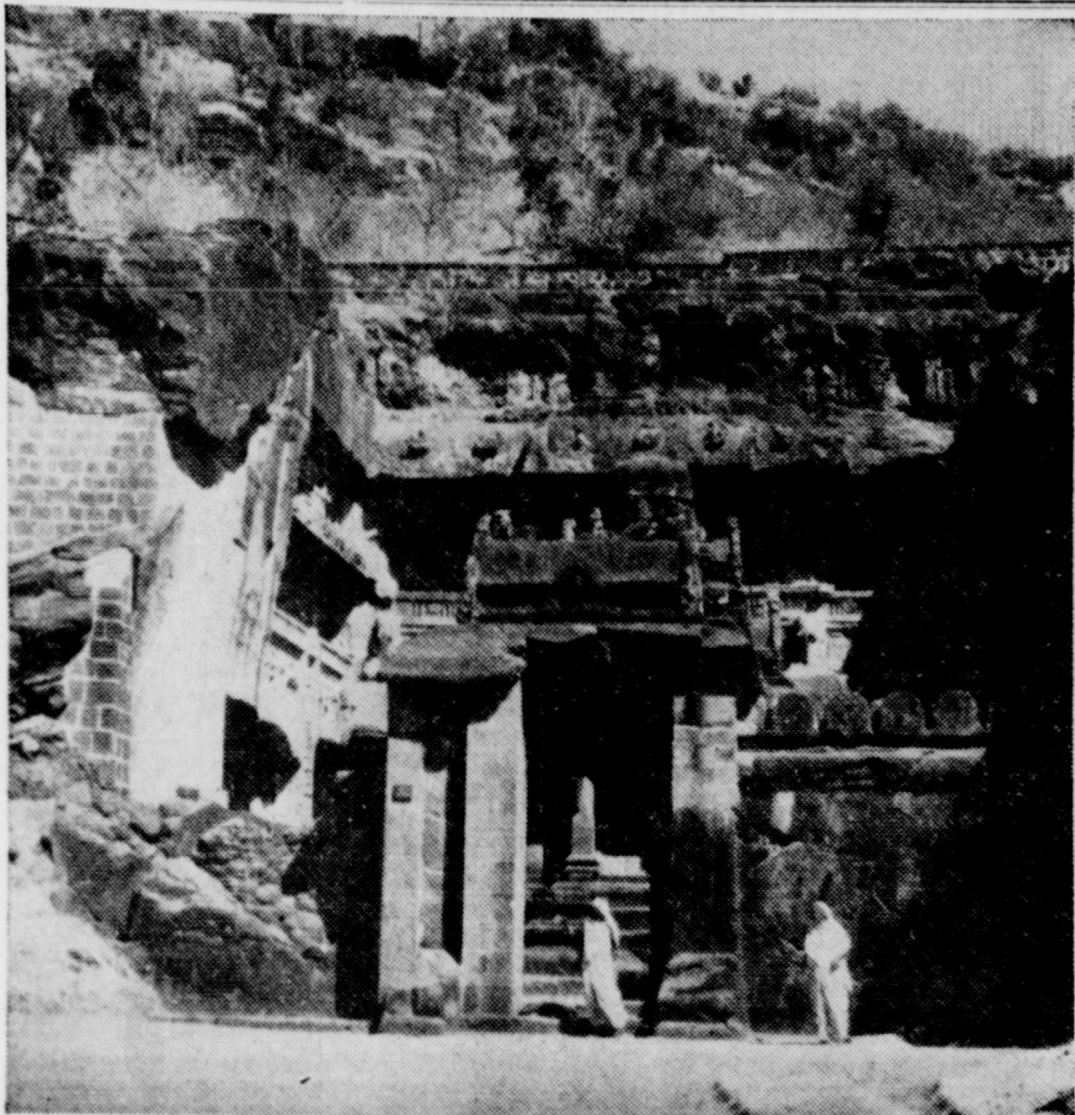

C-C Is Co-Sponsor Of Coming Event

Plans for the first annual Eastland County Pecan Show, which will be held in Cisco from Dec. 5 to 8 at the Crawford Building, were announced today by County Agent J. M. Cooper. Rules and regulations for the show were included in the announcement.

Cash prizes and ribbons will be offered for some 15 varieties of pecans, including Burkett, Mahan, Western Schley, Eastern Schley, Texas Prolific, Stuart, Success, San Saba, Halbert, Ideal Ollison, John Garner, Delmas, Money Maker, Squirrel Delight and Seedlings.

The classes will be judged on size, color and appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality, weight, attractiveness and other factors. Special awards will go to the grand champion and reserve champion entries.

Rules and regulations announced by Mr. Cooper were as follows:

1. All pecans entered must have been grown in 1953.

2. All entries of nuts must be in by 9:30 a. m. on Dec. 5. They may be left at the County agent's office prior to that date.

3. Exhibitors are limited to one entry of each variety. There is no limit on the number of varieties he may enter.

4. Nuts must have been grown by the man entering them.

5. Nuts must be left on display until 3 p. m. on Dec. 8.

6. All first place winners will be invited to send their entries to the state pecan show at College Station.

7. Each entry must consist of enough nuts to weigh at least one pound.

8. Entries will also be accepted from growers in adjoining counties.

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce, co-sponsors of the show, will accept entries prior to Dec. 5, Mr. Cooper said. Prize money is being provided by the Cisco organization, along with assistance in making arrangements.

Judges for the show will be John E. Hutchinson and B. G. Hancock of Texas A. & M. College.

HEALTH TALKS

Another valuable x-ray study consists of replacing the fluid normally found in cavities within the brain (ventricles) with air. This method, known as pneumo-encephalography, causes the ventricles to stand out on the x-ray film in sharp contrast to the rest of the brain. The fluid which is drained to the outside of the body is replaced very quickly by the body; however, the air must be removed immediately after the procedure. Usually pneumo-encephalography is not done unless the physician is fairly sure there is a brain tumor, and the x-ray method serves to locate the growth. During the operation performed to remove the tumor, which as a rule immediately follows pneumo-encephalography, the air can be removed. If surgery is not done, the air must be removed by other means.

The discovery that the brain throws off electric currents has made possible another technique useful in the diagnosis of brain tumors. Special machinery makes possible the recording of these brain waves, a process called electro-encephalography. Certain changes from the normal pattern not only cause the doctor to be suspicious of brain tumor; he can locate the actual area of the brain in which it lies.

The interpretation of these three tests often is more difficult than their technical performance. However, it is only by their skillful use that many advances in the diagnosis and removal of brain tumors have been made possible.

Before the discovery of x-rays in 1897, diagnosis of brain tumors was impossible until they became so large the patient was doomed to death, blindness, or invalidism. Now the majority can be detected while small enough to be safely removed.

One of the most recent methods for studying the brain, first used about 1930 and developed to a fine degree since then, is x-raying the blood vessels of the brain, a technique called "cerebral angiography." A liquid which is shot into an artery and shunted by the blood to the head makes the blood vessels stand out by contrast on x-ray films. X-rays are taken motion picture fashion at close intervals. First, the arteries are seen, then after a short time the veins are outlined. A tumor may be evident if it presses against the blood vessels or if there is an abnormal growth of blood vessels at the site of the tumor.

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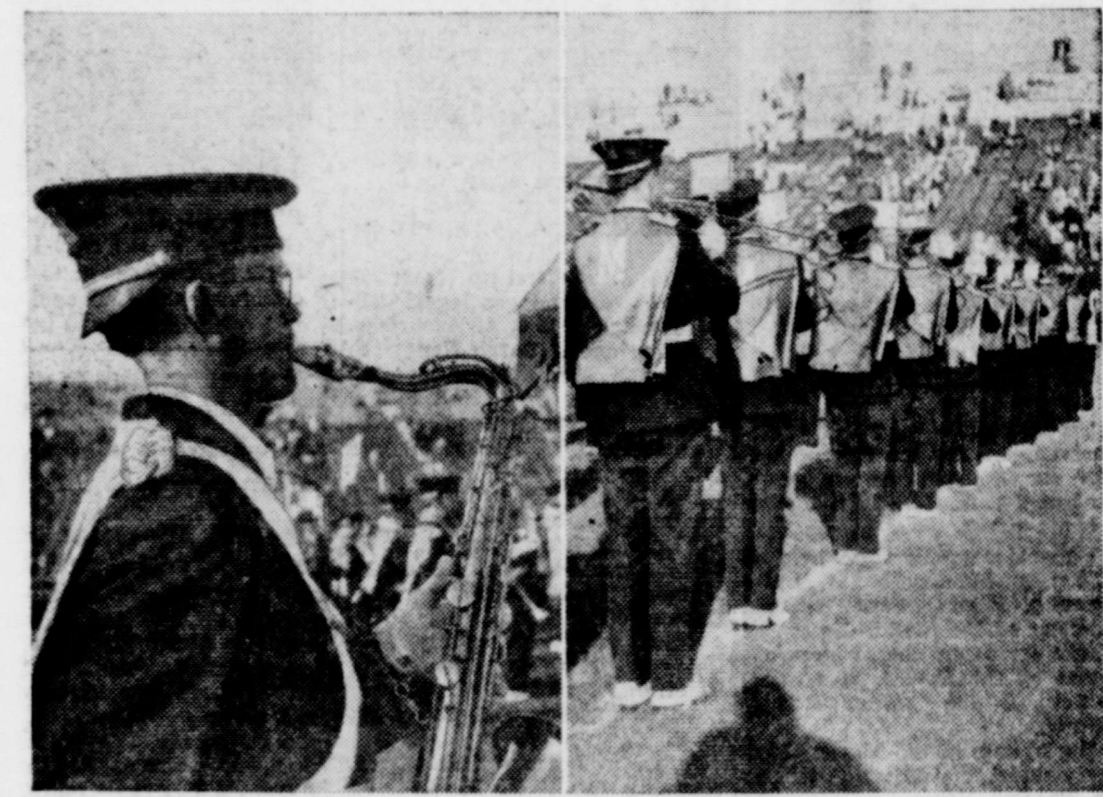

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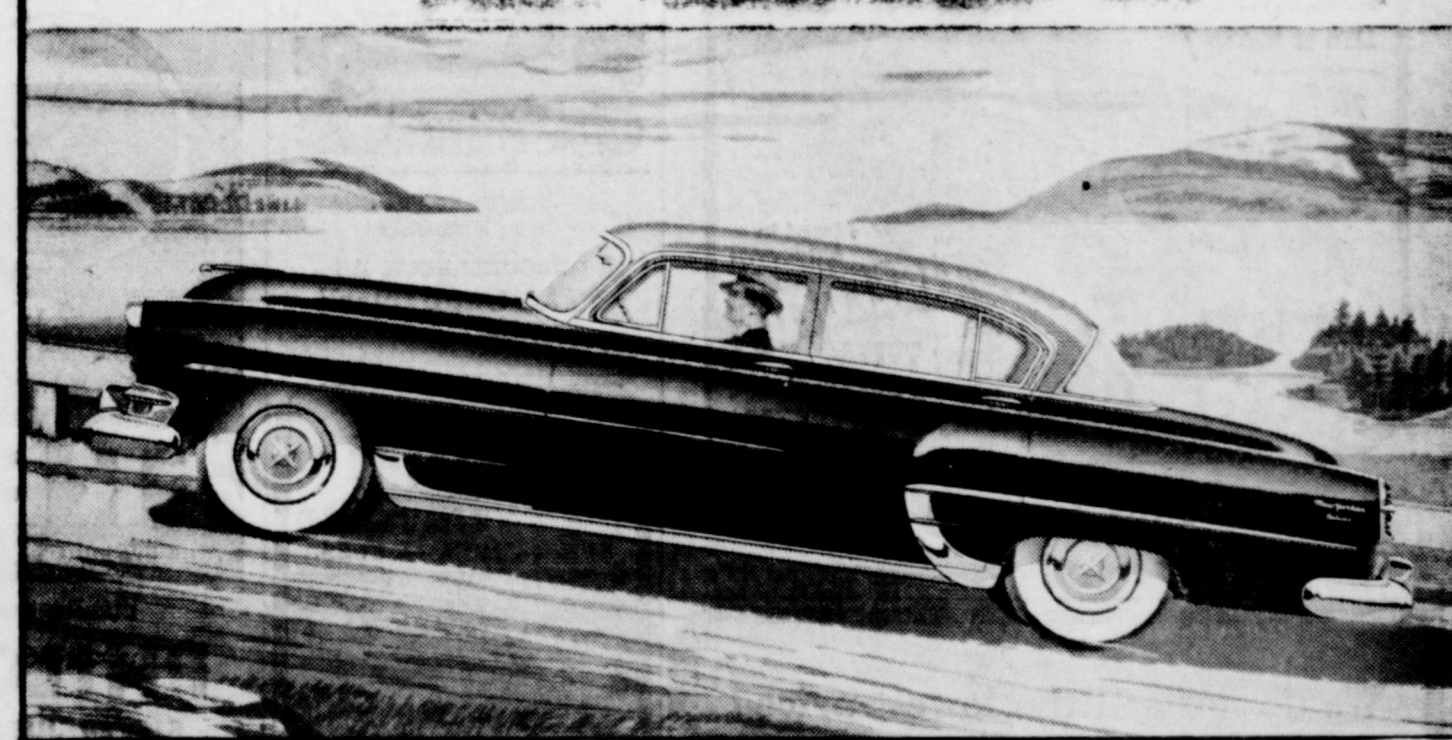

Survey Discloses State Pecan Crop Is Below Average

The Texas pecan crop is now estimated at 32,540,000 pounds by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. This is 18 percent below the large crop of 47,200,000 pounds harvested last year but 34 percent above the 1942-51 average.

Prospects improved slightly (about 2 percent) during the past month. Based on limited movement to November 1, quality of the crop appears to be good. Yields are better than expected in northeast and southeast counties but are spotted over the Edwards Plateau and some central counties.

Production of improved varieties is forecast at 5,780,000 pounds, or 15 percent of the total crop, while production of seedling pecans is placed at 32,760,000 pounds.

The U. S. pecan crop is forecast at 184,962,000 pounds, up 2 percent from prospects a month earlier. The 1952 production was 147,946,000 pounds and the 10-year average is 126,518,000 pounds. Improved varieties account for 85,181,000 pounds this year while seedlings produced 99,781,000 pounds. These are 48 percent and 45 percent, respectively, above the 10-year averages.

All States except Georgia and Texas are harvesting crops larger than last year. Georgia's crop is forecast at 45,500,000 pounds.

Damage from diseases and insects was higher than in recent years. Scab seriously injured most varieties except Stuart and infestation of shuckworm was heavy in all varieties. Quality of the crop is below a year ago with some light filled nuts reported.

In Oklahoma, the crop is light in the northern area but good

crops are reported in the central and southern districts. In Louisiana, dry weather has been favorable for harvest. Nuts are of good quality and well filled. Harvest in Alabama is progressing satisfactorily. An excellent crop is expected in Mobile and Baldwin counties.

In Mississippi, a good crop is being harvested in all producing areas. Weather conditions during October were excellent for harvest and as a whole nuts are well filled. In eastern Arkansas, a good crop is being harvested but in other areas of this State only a fair production is indicated.

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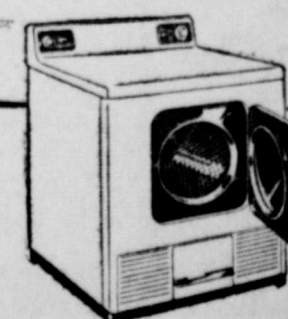
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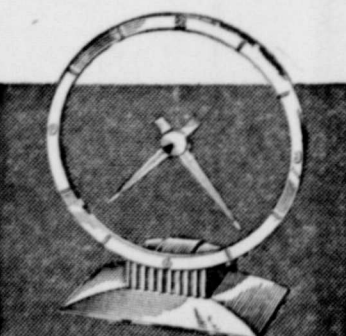
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
