

War-Related Topics Discussed Before Judges, Commissioners

Must Respect The Laws, Says H-SU Prexy

A stirring message calling for a "new reverence for God, a new respect for the law and a new regard for our fellowman" as the essentials to safety and security for the world was brought to West Texas county judges and commissioners Friday night by Dr. W. R. White, president of Hardin-Simmons university.

Dr. White's forceful talk highlighted the annual banquet program staged as a convention for the officials at the Hotel Texas. He outlined three forces which will determine the course of the world when the war is over, and termed these physical, moral and political laws.

Depicting the 20th century's record as the bloodiest in the history of mankind, Dr. White told the crowd that the people had not met their responsibilities to the laws. We have had a false conception of liberty, he said, and have exercised it wrongly.

We must take advantage of our scientific development to meet and observe the laws of nature, the college president said; we must obey the moral laws in applying the basis of human relationships to relationships between nations; and in the realm of political law, we must have a new definition of human rights, and a new application of these rights.

"No one is secure until all are secure," Dr. White continued. "And we must realize it to resume our march to decent civilization." Musical numbers on the banquet program included songs by Wanda Lou Petty and by the Rhythmettes—Wanda, McQuinn, Kathleen Underwood and Clarinda Mary Sanders. Ann Gibson Houser was accompanist.

Frank Day, outgoing president of the West Texas Judges and Commissioners association, presided as toastmaster.

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Sacrifices Must Be Made, Davies Asserts

Only ostrich mentalities hope for an easy victory. There are sacrifices ahead, and unless the American people make up their minds to accept these sacrifices it is not an impossibility that we can lose this war.

This, in effect, was the blunt statement put before West Texas county judges and commissioners gathered in convention here Friday afternoon by Brig. Gen. Isaiah Davies, commanding officer of the Midland army flying school.

General Davies urged the officials to take the message of all out fighting back to their communities because "if the war doesn't become everybody's business we can lose it."

The officer scolded the American attitude of "business as usual."

"The fact is," he said, "that our Allies across the seas are fighting this war with their hearts and full realization of the struggle ahead. We are trying to fight it with our heads. The truth is that the age of reason has been blacked out by total war—the first total war this nation has ever been called upon to fight. Only a few of us have grasped the full significance of this war and what it is going to require of us."

General Davies told the crowd that Americans must expect their entire pattern of life to be rearranged. "Our men in uniform are going to have what they need if civilians are using blankets for

dresses and crusts for a meal," he said. "And don't consider that a fantastic impossibility."

The officer hit at those who criticize the nation's leadership. "Anyone who blocks or hampers our fight must be shoved aside for the duration. We have the word of our commander-in-chief that the United Nations have a definite plan of action. How long it will take that plan to be successful depends upon your decision to quit yelling for some miraculous leadership from some sacred mountain top and get down to this business of winning the war yourselves."

General Davies referred to the period from 1918 to 1941 as the "era of the American ostrich," and said that this nation had refused to accept the responsibilities that had been placed upon it. "We are now faced with the crisis," he said. "We have tried to escape it."

The responsibilities are here now to be faced, he continued, and those who speed to waste rubber or who refuse to contribute scrap metal are those deserving of the wrath of the Almighty. These are the ones who must be cast aside, for our war must be won. The officer concluded:

"We are not fighting to preserve the status quo of any individual. We are fighting first of all for our lives, and second, for all that gives life meaning and dignity—the right to freedom here and everywhere in the world."

State School Sending Boys Into Service

Addressing the annual fall convention of the West Texas judges' and commissioners' association assembled in the Hotel Texas ballroom Friday afternoon, W. N. Winship, Jr., superintendent of the Gatesville State school for boys, asserted that his institution was aiding the national war effort in preparing boys for service in the armed forces of the United States.

"In the last four months," Winship said, "we have sent 60 boys to the armed services of our country."

The Gatesville state school was started in 1888, Supt. Winship explained. Originally it was a reformatory and its first inmates were 68 convicts transferred from the state prison. These inmates consisted of 66 men, one negro woman and one white woman.

The tradition of the school formerly being a reformatory presents one of the biggest problems facing the school, Supt. Winship stated. "We do not have locked cells or brutal punishment," the superintendent said. "We carry on

our school just as you folks do your high school," he continued. "We strive at all times to rehabilitate the boys sent to us and in this effort we have been very fortunate."

The superintendent deplored the fact that some judges sent boys of mature years to the school. "I hate to admit it," he said, "but we have some boys 23 and 24 years old in our school."

He urged judges to make a careful and complete investigation before returning boys to the school who had again found themselves in trouble.

Following Superintendent Winship's address the group was entertained with songs by Leslie Cathey, Big Spring, and Shirley Ann Wheat, Coahoma. Ann Gibson Houser accompanied at the piano.

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John H. Winters, president of the association, spoke on the necessity of cutting county expenses to the bone but warned the gathering against becoming hysterical and doing away with worth while relief projects, etc.

He suggested the maintenance of much used roads and the discontinuance of work on seldom used paths of travel to conserve equipment and cut down expenses.

Lieut. Col. Harold R. Brayton addressed the judges and commissioners on the responsibility placed on these bodies by the present war activities.

He told of the training activities at A. & M. College which, he said, was one of seven set up by the

war department since Pearl Harbor.

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Draft Problems To Be Aired At Oil Convention

DALLAS, Sept. 26—The effect of selective service upon the Texas oil industry will be discussed before the annual convention of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association, to be held in Dallas, October 9 and 10, by Colonel Darnes Burns, chief of the Manpower division, U. S. Selective Service, of Austin, according to an official announcement from headquarters of the association.

Colonel Burns' scheduled appearance on the Mid-Continent convention program is of particular interest to Texas oilmen at this time, since many skilled oil workers have already been inducted into the armed forces, with the result that oil field operations essential to the war effort have been seriously impaired, the announcement reveals.

Since Col. Burns has direct charge of selective service and occupational deferment in this area, Texas oilmen attending the Dallas convention will have a fine opportunity to clear up much of the confusion which has existed concerning deferment from military service of highly skilled workers.

Officials of the Texas Mid-Continent association feel that the colonel's address will not only set forth and clarify many points about selective service and occupational deferment of essential workers but will also afford an opportunity for informal discussion of particular problems with the speaker. In this connection, the announcement states that Col. Burns will devote time after his address to answering pertinent questions from the floor.

Mitchell Taxable Valuations Gain

COLORADO CITY, Sept. 26.—An increase of \$162,980 in taxable valuations in Mitchell county was announced by Bruce Hart, tax assessor-collector, after tax rolls were checked. Total valuation for 1942 is \$2,080,308.00 while the total for the last tax year amounted to \$1,917,328.00. The increase was shown in spite of the fact that an oil company moved a major part of its taxable property out of the county during the last year.

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Argument For Fair Farm Prices Is Presented By Mahon

Says Labor Cost Should Be Put In Parity Formula

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—During the debate in Congress on the over-all price-ceiling bill Representative George H. Mahon made an able and carefully worded speech on the present plight of the farmers of Texas and the nation.

"I resent," declared Mahon, "the efforts that have been made by some to make the farmer appear at this time to be Public Enemy No. 1. The farmer is deeply offended because his patriotism has been called in question and it has been made to appear that he is responsible for all the inflation ills that beset our people. This is so grossly unfair, so grossly untrue, that it is not inappropriate to take a moment to deny it."

Prevention of ruinous inflation is a question worthy of the best efforts of the American people, asserted the Texan. The soft and easy road is out of the window for the duration of the war. The test now is not how little can we do but how much can we do for our country. "All Americans have ample cause to be disturbed about inflation," he declared. "I know of no one who wants wild, runaway inflation in this country. Every one wants some kind of equitable control, a control that will be fair to labor, fair to the farmer, and to industry and the public."

Mahon said the farm population has furnished a greater proportion of the men who fight in the front lines than any other segment of the population. Yet the farmers are producing more than ever before in history and are not asleep to the national crisis. "The farmer is not profiteering, and he must undoubtedly resent the implication that he is rolling in wealth when as a matter of fact he is having the fight of his life to survive and keep up the production goals of the government."

Presents Figures
Mahon offered cold figures to prove that the farmer is not receiving his share of the national income—that the threat of inflation cannot be properly laid at his door. Yes, admitted the Texan, farm prices are now 154 percent of the 1909-1914 base period. But the earnings of factory workers are 400 percent of the same period. "In other words," he asserted, "farm prices have advanced 54 percent during the past 30 years, while the earnings of the factory workers have advanced 300 percent and are now at the highest level in the history of the nation."

Another interesting point made by Mahon is that wages are now 38 percent above what they were in the first World War, while farm prices are 38 percent below what they were then. Not only that, but a smaller percentage of the wages of labor is now required for the purchase of goods than at any time during the past 30 years. "The average farmer does not receive parity prices for his products, and he does not have a

parity of income with the factory worker," continued Mahon. "All the farmer wants is a satisfactory balance between farm prices and industrial wages and a strong inhibition against war profiteering by industry. He does not want to see the inequalities of the past and the present perpetuated by regulation or by law. He knows that sacrifices are required—he wants an equality of sacrifice."

Labor Costs
At this point the Texan yielded additional time to make his point. "Labor is not being attracted to the farm; people are being siphoned out of rural communities and into defense work and industry. If farmers are making so much money and rolling in wealth, how come that people are not leaving the cities and going back to the farm? The answer is obvious. 'I am firmly of the opinion that the cost of hired labor on the farm should be taken in consideration in arriving at a proper price for farm products, in determining parity price so to speak. It sometimes costs a farmer one-third of what his product is worth to hire it harvested, and to say that this cost should not be considered in arriving at a fair price for the product is beyond my comprehension.'"

"Believe me," declared Mahon, "there is a very definite sense in which the cost of hired labor on the farm is affecting farm production. The farmer cannot pay high prices for farm labor without getting a better price for his product. Farm labor is rapidly leaving the farm and entering defense plants where much better wages exist. There are instances where one boy from the farm goes away to work on a defense project and makes more per week than his father and mother and brothers and sisters are able to make per month on the farm."

The Congressman wound up with these words: "Let us never forget that victory on the battlefields will be impossible if laws are passed or regulations made that make it impossible for farmers to carry forward with their production program. The farmer will not strike; he and his family will continue to work in the field under the blazing sun and in the bitter cold to win the battle of production, but a willing spirit is not enough. A sympathetic consideration of the problems of the farmer is important to the farmer, but it is even more important to the nation and to the world."

Texas Solons Talk On Farm Problem

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—A food shortage threatens this country and can be avoided only by allowing farmers to take into consideration labor costs in calculating prices their crops should bring according to views expressed by

three Texas congressmen on a radio program prepared for Sunday broadcast in their state.

Speaking on the Texas Forum of the Air, Representative Mahon of Colorado City expressed resentment that many national commentators had accused farmers and the so-called "farm bloc" in congress of trying to profiteer on the war situation.

Representatives Wright Patman of Texas and Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls shared views with Mahon, all agreeing that big salaries paid workers in war industries were luring hands away from the farms and that unless some means were devised of enabling the farmers to compete in wages they would be without sufficient help to get normal crops planted or harvested next year.



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Gary Grant, Jean Arthur, Ronald Coleman Share Honors In Novel Comedy At The Ritz

Termed one of the novel comedy pieces of the new season is the George Stevens production, "Talk Of The Town," which graces the screen of the Ritz theatre today and Monday. With Gary Grant, Jean Arthur and Ronald Coleman starred in roles of memorable magnitude, the picture takes on importance, and Stevens is credited with bringing forth a new charm in mood and atmosphere as a background to comedy and romance.

It is unusual in motion pictures, for three such stars as Grant, Jean Arthur and Coleman to appear in a film which does not, in some measure, permit the overshadowing of one, or two. But the evenly balanced performances, the thoughtful blending and clash of personalities, is a splendid tribute to Stevens' work as a director, and to the masterful script penned by Irwin Shaw and Sidney Buchman.

"The Talk of the Town" introduces a different Gary Grant than the one known to us; a greater Gary Grant. His is a role filled with humor and with resolution, one calling for the utmost in dramatic purposes. As the most lovable guy ever wanted for murder, Grant moves through whirlwind excitement with deft assurance. Whether he is fleeing the police, arguing fine points of law from a standpoint of personal knowledge

and human sympathy or making love to Miss Arthur, Grant's triumphant performance immensely adds to his already great stature as an actor. Ronald Coleman, similarly, brings to the screen a character not soon to be forgotten, that of a bearded, dignified student of jurisprudence, a man devoted to the letter of the law, who discovers suddenly that there is a human level, in times of crisis, to which one rises, not one to which one descends. Coleman, once awakened to reality, fights for justice on human terms, so that he can

rise to the grandeur and dignity of the United States Supreme Court secure in his own mind as to the meaning of that grandeur and dignity. Miss Arthur's performance, like those of her co-stars, is equally outstanding, a performance both ingratiating and feminine, heroic in its dramatic scenes and soft and winsome in the gentler moments. The nicest girl gossip ever went to town on, Miss Arthur, possesses throughout that faint trace of indiscretion which highlights the climatic sequences of the brilliant film. Coleman, wrapped in the austerity of the judicial robes, looking down from his high place on the Supreme Court Bench, where he sits with eight other equally dignified and equally wise men, sees Miss Arthur impudently, proudly winking at him. What is there for a Justice of the United States Supreme Court to do? He winks back!

Valuable to the complete effect of "The Talk of the Town" are such lesser players as Edgar Buchanan, Glenda Farrell and Tom Tyler.

Social Security Taking Big Burden Off Many Families

Every pay day the bookkeeper looks off a few cents for social security, pennies you never miss or even think about. You're young and healthy, you have a good job and social security is something too far away for you to think about. But there's another side to this picture, one that you may learn about some day.

As a claims clerk in a field office of the Social Security Board, old-age and survivors insurance as provided for in Title II of the Social Security act as amended, Mrs. Jane Haller sees the other side of the story. The old, the widows and the children, those eligible to receive benefits to help the individual adjust himself to a world disrupted by an emergency, whether that emergency be the death of a wage earner or his retirement.

There are the old fellows who come in, past 70. "I don't expect I have very much coming because

it hasn't been very long since social security started," they tell Mrs. Haller. But each is entitled to a monthly benefit which will at least provide the minimum necessities of life.

There are the old men who have been drawing benefits for some time and whose wives reach 65 years and also want to file a claim. These women are entitled to one-half as much as their husbands have been receiving.

Since Pearl Harbor, the war has been close to Mrs. Haller as dry-eyed but grim-faced fathers call for claims based on wages earned by eager young men before they entered the armed forces. "This is the second son I've given in 15 months," one of them once told Mrs. Haller. "I had only the two boys and a girl."

Such cases are heart-rending to hear but there is one phase of the program that to the claims clerk is the most satisfying part of the work. That is when monthly benefits are paid to widows with young children.

In Mrs. Haller's words, "They come into the office bewildered with grief and shock, often incoherent but they leave with the comforting assurance that regardless of all else, their children will be provided with the necessities of life. One young widow with three children sobbed with relief when she found that she would receive between \$50 and \$60 each month

until the oldest child was 18 and slightly less than that until the baby was 18. Her husband had left no other insurance and the future looked black until then.

Again, relatives of the widow of a deceased wage earner called at the office to see if "Bill" had paid in enough so that his widow could draw enough to help pay the funeral expenses." It developed that the widow had two small children and that the benefit each month would amount to almost as much as she had hoped to be able to draw in one lump sum.

The program is designed to help those least able to help themselves during a sudden shift of fortune. An unskilled laborer earning an average of \$75 a month may die and leave a wife and three children.

Based on his monthly wage each child is entitled to about \$10.00 and the mother to about \$15.00 to make a total of \$47.00 each month until the oldest child is 18 when benefits are reduced to \$41 a month. During the first ten year period the family will collect a little more than \$5,000 and approximately \$3,000 will be paid them during the remaining six years before the baby is 18. A total of \$8,000 will be paid the family, and all this comes from the few pennies deducted from the wage earners pay check each pay day.

The pennies are few, yes. But never before have such a few pennies bought so much in terms of human welfare.

Men enlisted for the army Saturday included Claude L. Miller, Big Spring; John H. Rowland Big Spring; Curtis M. Henley, Snyder, and Hintley L. Wolf, Vinnet.

Seven men signed Friday and Saturday by Sgt. Turner were turned over to the Sweetwater recruiting station for credit.

County's Gin Total Jumps To 4,000

Harvest of the 1942 Howard county cotton crop quickened in intensity during the past week, ginnings approximately doubling despite lost time the first of the week while wet fields dried out.

A survey of Big Spring gins (which normally handle little less than half of the county's total ginnings) showed 2,220 bales Saturday, which would reflect around 4,000 or more bales ginned to date.

Picker placements totaled 3,150 Saturday evening, reported O. R. Rodden, manager of the Big Spring district office for United States Employment Service. He anticipated a greater number of crews would arrive the first of this week and believed that the request list for around 1,100 pickers could be whittled.

Saturday's northern slowed picking temporarily, but probably will have the effect of cracking bolls. There is enough cotton open in the county to keep the gins running at capacity for a long time if weather stays fair.

Farmers waited better the past week for their cotton to dry out after rains and after heavy morning dews. Since cotton was being baled strictly on class and grade, more care was given about damaging it. Much of it was pulling out 29-32 although some went to an inch. Average price was from 18 to 18.40 with snaps (comparatively few) off to 16.50.

Seed showed strength during the week and picked up a dollar to amount to \$47 on the ton.

Little of the cotton was being bought on the open market. Ginnings estimated that 30 per cent was already in the loan and possibly 90 to 95 per cent would eventually get there.

COLORADO CITY, Sept. 26. — Clyde P. Findlay, minister of the Church of Christ in Colorado City, will close his work for the congregation here October 25. Mr. Findlay will become minister of the Church of Christ in Anson, succeeding James M. Willeford.

Open air meetings through the summer months for the evening services and young peoples' rallies have also been instituted. Mr. and Mrs. Findlay came here in June 1941 from Winfield, Kansas. They are the parents of two sons, Robert and Donald, who are students in A. C. C.

The campaign has been planned in detail by officials of the Texas and United States health services, and local health authorities. John White, with the U. S. Wildlife Service, Walter Broadlove and William Eason of the Five County Health unit, of which Dawson county is a part, Dr. J. C. Breedlove, city health officer of Lamesa, and B. J. Baskin are cooperating to make the campaign a success in Dawson county. Health officials of Borden county with Frank W. Medley, Borden county

agent, have arranged the campaign there.
Main purpose of the campaign is to rid the counties of rats which carry the dread typhus fever. Poison will be distributed to farmers from 18 key points in the two counties, and it is expected that every farmer in the two counties will work their own farms and premises.

Cardinals Meet Chicago Cubs In A Two-Game Affair Today

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 26 (AP)—The stirring race for the National league championship will wind up in a frenzied finish tomorrow with the pennant-leading St. Louis Cardinals battling the Chicago Cubs in the final two games of the season.

If the Cardinals win one of the games, or the pursuing Brooklyn Dodgers lose to the Phils at Philadelphia, the championship will be decided in favor of the Cardinals.

The doubleheader, made necessary when the weather forced postponement of today's game, will be started at 1 p. m. (Central War Time) to minimize the danger of a tie or an incomplete second contest.

Should tomorrow's games be prevented by weather, the Cardinals would back into the championship regardless of what the Dodgers did in their remaining game. The Beautiful Bums have suffered two more defeats than the Red Birds. The Cardinals have won 104 games, the Dodgers 103, but the Dodgers have lost 50 compared to 48 for the Cards.

There is a chance for the two teams to finish in a tie, making necessary a three-game playoff. Such a tie would result if the Cardinals were defeated twice tomorrow and the Dodgers won their remaining game. In that event the play-off series would open here Monday night, with the second game and the third, if necessary, scheduled for Brooklyn Wednesday and Thursday afternoons.

Today's game was not postponed until after a delay of an hour past the original 2:30 p. m. starting time.

Manager Billy Southworth and his players remained in the warmth of their dressing-room listening to a broadcast of the Dodger-Philadelphia game. After the Dodgers had triumphed, he stood on his tiptoes and yelled to his players:

"We'll get some rest and win it tomorrow. And when I say rest I mean just that. I want all you to go home right now and stay there until time to report to the club house tomorrow morning."

There, Glen Cagle, swift left end, skirted the Cisco line, to cross the double-stripe and account for the Steer's second tally. Stewart kicked the ball squarely between the uprights to add the point after touchdown.

Earnest Bostick accounted for the third Big Spring score late in the second period on an off-tackle slant over Cisco's right side. Bostick's touchdown was made from the Cisco 8 yard line. Stewart made the extra point, and the Steers led 20-0 at half time.

Cisco's lone score came early in the fourth quarter, set up by a barrage of passes from the mits of Mitford Johnson, 125 pound quarterback. Donaly Shirley, Lobo fullback, plunged over his own left tackle from the 7 yard marker, but Johnson missed the attempted conversion.

Johnson, with his accurate passes and broken field runs; Lawrence Johnston, left end; and O. C. Penn, 212 pound tackle, were standouts for the visitors. Glen Cagle, left wingman; Peppy Blount, opposite end; Earnest Bostick, signal-barking halfback; and lumbering Doyle Stewart, fullback, turned in good work.

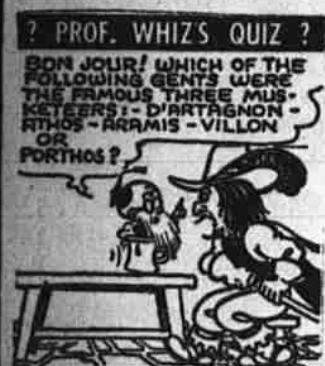

Articles have been written numerous times on the prowess of these mighty mites but it takes a hand to hand combat with one to really appreciate the jeep.

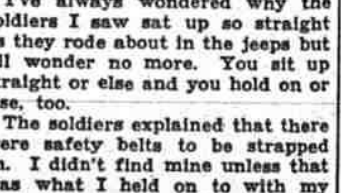

Christmas Is Almost Here---For Men Overseas

Christmas trees, snow, "Silent Night" and endless sound pretty far off don't they? But for your husbands, brothers and sweethearts fighting for you in the far flung outposts of civilization Christmas is nearer than you think.

While this year there will be no sitting around a family tree opening boxes of socks, ties, and cigars, still December 25th will mean even more to those men of yours whether they are in Ireland, Australia or the Belgian Congo.

And to be sure he has a gift on Christmas Day these gifts must be in the mail by November 1st, says Uncle Sam's mailing department, and the sooner the better.

Big Spring's stores are ready and waiting for you to come make your selection and although the choice is limited for you, you'll spend hours mulling over what to send.

A list of don'ts is important, so scratch off your list any in-toxicants, inflammable materials, including matches and lighter fluids, poisons or compositions which may kill or injure another or damage the mails.

And that batch of fudge or cookies you'd like to whip up, you'd better save until he comes marching home again as Uncle Sam advises against sending such packages out of the country.

Also to conserve shipping space needed for war materials,

there is a limit of 11 pounds in weight and 18 inches in length or 43 inches in length and girth combined on Christmas parcels. The public is asked to limit size of parcels to the size of a shoe box and weight to six pounds.

And what does that leave you? Well, don't be discouraged. There are a lot of things left that will fit the requirements and bring a memory of home to your lone-some man.

Tops in suggestions from the soldiers is picture frames. These range in price from 75 cents for small ones on up to the higher brackets and a picture of your smiling face will maybe win a war!

You might combine two ideas by sending the handy leather-bound clock with a place for two pictures, one on each side of the folded flaps that open up to make a stand for the clock. Price range here is \$6 and up.

Handy-and-ys are the leather pocket-size kits with mirrors made of unbreakable steel. They combine shaving equipment, tooth brushes and paste, nail file and tweezers.

If he smokes there are tobacco pouches with zipper tops and metal waterproof pocket match boxes. Cigarette cases begin at \$1 and go on up depending on your pocketbook and come with his branch of the service insignia on top.

If your soldier is the writing kind, there are diaries "My Stretch in the Service," which range from \$1 to \$3 or Huddy books for autographs. If you are

hoping for letters, you might send army and air force insignia stationery costing around \$1.55. Pen and pencil sets, and waterproof and shockproof wrist watches also rate number one with your fighting man. And if giving ties and socks are too strong a habit to break, the local stores have regulation army ties, socks and handkerchiefs to which you'll have to confine your yearnings.

Practical are the identification

bracelets and chains for dog tags or the wool and silk scarves, Billfolds, memorandum books, pocket size Bibles, sewing kits, good sun glasses or small portable radios all come under the o.k. list.

For no extra charge you can write "Merry Christmas" or "Do Not Open Until Christmas" on your box and rest assured whatever you send is going to make your soldier happy.

Isiah Davis, commander of the Midland Army Flying School, says that the army will have what it needs if civilians have blankets for clothes and crusts for food. Press accounts list the public debt at \$7 billions.

It will prove most timely for a rat-killing campaign if we do a good job, County Agent O. P. Griffin thinks. An effective campaign would mean fresh feed stacks and supplies would go down without rat nests being built in them promptly. Too, soon meat will be put away and if rats get their fill of that, they won't eat bait put out for them.

A fine job is being done here in organizing a soldiers center and equipping it. This sort of spirit which disdains talking and leans to action is the sort that gets things done. To all who have had a part, the community owes you thanks.

In the name of freedom, please gather up all scrap around your place—whether it is a house in town or a farm in the country—and see that it gets to a junk dealer. America must have this scrap to keep up production of steel for the war effort. This is your war. This is your responsibility. Don't be a scrap slacker.

**Rat Poisoning
Demonstrations
Are Scheduled**

Two demonstrations are in prospect this week as first of a series of steps in a county-wide rat eradication campaign were to be taken.

Monday, the day when farmers, ranchers and townspeople are supposed to start fixing places for placing poisoned bait, there also will be a rat-killing at the L. M. Bond farm one mile south and one mile west of Coshoma. Tuesday there will be a similar demonstration at the W. E. Mann place at Vincent.

Places for bait should be put out a week in advance of any baiting, said O. P. Griffin, county agent, in order to accustom wary rats to them. Later there will be two days for placing unpoisoned bait to find out where rats are most apt to be, what they like the most, and to get their confidence.

This will be followed quickly by liberal batches of poisoned bait. The poison works slowly and most rats will have a chance to get some before their suspicions are aroused by sick companions.

**51 Referred For
West Coast Work**

Fifty-one persons were given referral cards to the Portland, Ore. office of the United States Employment Service as welders, pipefitters, electricians, carpenters, and other types of skilled workers as the result of conferences here Friday with a representative of the Oregon Shipyard Corp.

C. V. Patterson, representing the corporation together with Kaiser Co., Inc., received 78 applications here during Friday afternoon. More than those who got referral cards may eventually go, local USES officials ventured.

Included in those due to go to Oregon are 12 welders from Big Spring, Odessa, Ackerly and other towns in this area. Ten others were welders helpers while there were six pipefitters and twice as many helpers. There were several electrician helpers, carpenters, steamfitters, cable splicers, boiler maker helper, and rigger helper.

**Incendiaries
Demonstrated**

Explosive and as colorful as an Independence Day fireworks display, the vastly more serious incendiary bomb demonstration given by Lieut. Col. Henry R. Brayton attracted a few hundred people to the city park Friday evening.

For three-quarters of an hour, Col. Brayton talked while his helpers set off bombs, burned holes through plate steel, and shook the softball field—where the show took place—with realistic sound-effects.

There were three types of basic bombs that Col. Brayton's force demonstrated so that control methods also could be shown.

First was the magnesium type, which burns at a temperature of 3,500 degrees Fahrenheit and lasts from 12 to 15 minutes unless extinguished or accelerated. A jet played on the bomb will quickly control the bomb whereas the spray method takes several minutes, as the demonstration proved. These bombs also were controlled by covering with dirt and then being scooped into a pail and carried off. Others were doused in barrels of water, but Col. Brayton warned against this procedure with less than five gallons of water. Tossing on a bucket or dishpan of water will be disastrous, he showed.

As for the thermite incendiary, which burns at a 1,000 degrees hotter than the magnesium, the rule is to watch it burn out in a minute or so. There is nothing which will extinguish it and liquids played on the molten iron in the compound exploded violently. These incendiaries burned through steel plate as if it were paper and went through 50 gallons of water and the bottom of the barrel seemingly without ever stopping.

Dropped into a barrel of crude oil, the thermite burned through quickly and sent up billows of black smoke.

Phosphorus type incendiaries also were demonstrated, together with oil and gasoline bombs—containers of petroleum which burst in a blanket of flames over large areas when exploded.

To get the effect of exploding bombs during an attack, Col. Brayton had touched off some material that looked like regular ash cord. But it shook the earth round about and could be heard miles away. A flare went up and a smoke screen crawled along the field, and from then on Col. Brayton's realistic show had the audience—composed of scores of county officials and the general public—listening and watching intently.
