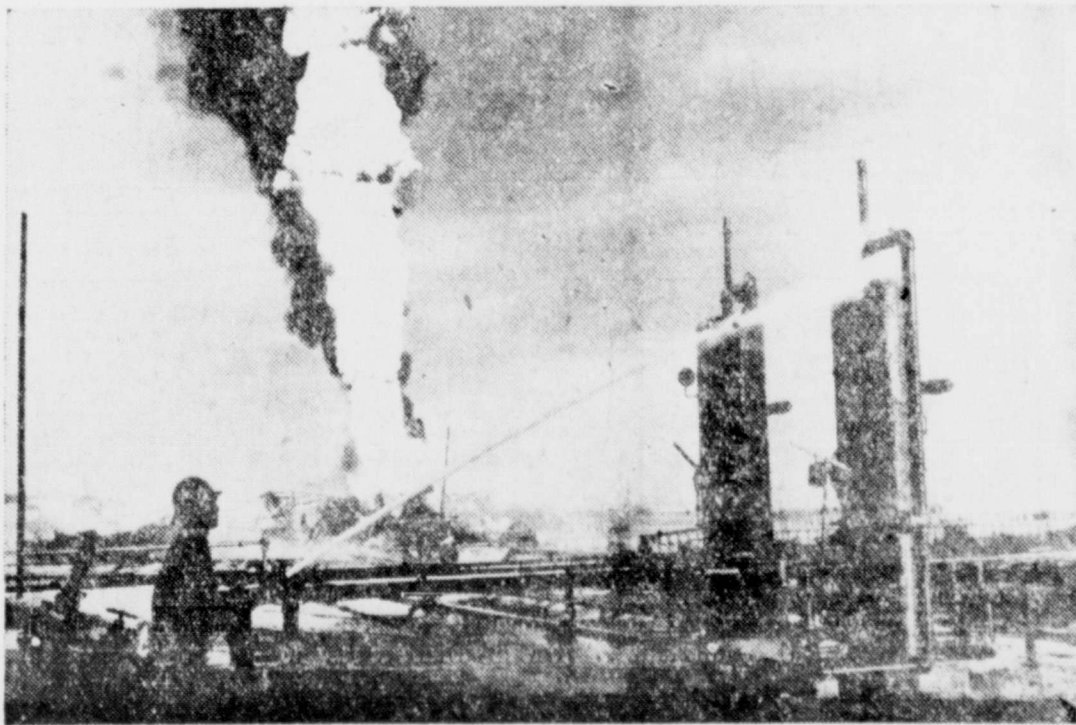

Rationing Board Sounds Canning Sugar Warning

"The last date for acceptance of applications for home canning sugar is November 23," says the County War Price and Rationing Board.

Continuing, the board said: "Those who may be worried about fruit which will be available after the 23d should bear in mind that all sugar coupons issued for home canning remain valid until February 28.

"This means that although the issuance of canning sugar is not continued, those who receive their coupons are in position to use them as late as February 28, 1945.

"Also, sugar stamp No. 40 in ration book 4 will remain valid until February 24."

Hogue Treated Rotary to South Pacific Picture

A picture of war activities in the South Pacific and at Normandy, and a short business session at which some important ideas were discussed, forming the program at the Rotary luncheon Thursday, when Vice-President Bill Fewell presided in the absence of President J. W. Slaughter, who was forced to leave immediately following the meal.

Secretary Pete Nance read from a communication from Rotary International regarding suggestions for a Rotary institute to be held in Cisco in the near future, following which a motion prevailed to refer the matter to the board of directors.

J. E. Hays announced that the Cisco club was fourth in the upper-ten in attendance for the last month, while Secretary Nance introduced the following guests: J. P. Morris, Ranger; Charley Peyton, Cleburne; J. W. Babb, Abilene; E. T. Thomas and S. H. Nance, Cisco.

The movie-talkie picture presented by Rotarian Bill Hogue had to do with activities in the combat area in the South Pacific and in Normandy, showing navy-air cooperation, Jap prison, salvaging of materials taken from fights with the Japs and methods of transporting these materials to points where they could be converted into war materials for our use. Scenes of strafing and care of the wounded were interesting incidents in the showing, which was highly interesting.

ARTILLERY POUNDING ON BOTH SIDES OF THE MAAS IN HOLLAND; ENEMY PLAINLY NERVOUS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's Third army surged forward in full offensive today, capturing Chateau-Salms along with dozens of other towns and villages. A total advance of 19 miles was made at places in the three-day drive along a 55-mile arc around Metz.

Artillery pounded on both sides of the Maas in Holland as the enemy displayed nervousness at the possibility of a new offensive into northern Holland.

Lt. Gen. Courtney Hodges' U. S. First army to the north protected the Germans with local attacks in the Hertogen and Schmet areas southeast of Aachen.

Gen. Patton's attack, swinging like a barn door from a hinge at a point nine miles south of Metz, moved across sudden forests, hills and valleys in a northeasterly direction toward Germany's industrial Saar border 25 miles away and threatened to cut across the rear communications of Metz.

North of Metz an enveloping movement was in progress at points 18 to 22 miles north of the city where bridgeheads across the Moselle were deepened by three miles. Here the Germans put in their first sizeable counter-attack against Patton's drive now in its third day. But the enemy infantry and two tanks which tried to halt the 90th infantry division were rocked back on their heels, despite German claims to the recapture of Koenigsacker in this area just below the Luxembourg border. Haute-Haut, only 11 miles from the Saar basin, was captured by the Americans.

A trail-blazing onslaught yesterday by 1,300 U. S. heavy bombers and hundreds of divebombers which smashed at German front line gun positions and strong points, as well as rail and road bottlenecks immediately to the rear, apparently had largely succeeded in sealing off the battle zone.

South of Metz and northeast of Nancy Patton's slashing attack was reminiscent of the initial stages of his whirlwind sweep through Normandy and Brittany to the Moselle last July and August.

Here German resistance continued light to moderate, with the Germans apparently withdrawing behind a screen of road blocks and mines and endeavoring to retrieve most of their artillery for emplacement farther back in parts of the old French Maginot line.

In Holland an artillery duel was in progress across the Maas as the enemy appeared worried over an impending Allied attempt to cross the river.

Russian troops drove a wedge across the Nazis' last direct rail communications between battered, besieged Budapest and northeast Hungary, shattering German west bank defenses along the upper Tisza river.

An infantry and armored salient 70 miles east northeast of the Hungarian capital bulged toward the rear of German armored forces which have been counter-attacking against the threat of a Soviet outflanking movement. Such a Russian move might open an invasion path to Austria.

torrential rains slowed U. S. tank movements, but American forces apparently still have the initiative in ground fighting as well as a considerable degree of air superiority.

Meanwhile, American artillery, heavier and in far greater quantity than anything the Japanese have yet been able to bring to the island in their do-or-die attempt to halt the Americans' invasion of the Philippines, ceaselessly pounded the corridor and the port city.

There were no indications late today that the Japanese had ceased bringing in reinforcements estimated at 25,000 in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communique.

However, almost constant major American air activity indicated Japanese vessels in and near Ormoc harbor were being pounded roughly.

MORE THAN MILLION

DALLAS, Nov. 10.—Votes cast in Tuesday's general election in Texas had passed the 1,000,000 mark today and were expected to reach 1,125,000 before the final tabulation. Latest unofficial returns give Roosevelt 759,118; Dewey, 173,549 and Texas Regulars 129,248.

POPULAR VOTE

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Noon returns today from 122,229 of America's 130,789 voting units showed the following popular vote: Roosevelt, 24,221,690; Dewey, 21,155,667; Total, 45,377,357.

Rupe of Cisco Joins Live-Wire Air Group, Italy

FIFTEENTH AIR FORCE IN ITALY—Staff Sgt. Jay G. Rupe, son of Mr. and Mrs. John G. Rupe, 716 west Thirteenth street, Cisco, Texas, recently arrived at an advanced B-24 Liberator base in Italy and will fly as a radio operator gunner.

"He joins a veteran group that has flown more than 150 missions against Nazi industrial and communications targets in the Balkans, northern Italy, France and southern Germany. The group assisted in wearing down German air strength by striking at such key aircraft production centers as Regensburg, Steyr, Munich, Wiener Neustadt and Vienna. It took an active part in attacks on the enemy's vital oil resources, including the Ploesti Roumanian oil fields and refineries and synthetic oil plants in Germany.

"Sergeant Rupe is a graduate of Cisco high school and attended Randolph Junior college and Draughon's Business College. He was employed as chief clerk for Mid-Continent Petroleum Co. prior to entering the armed forces in October, 1941. He received his radio training at Scott Field, Illinois, and gunnery instruction at Yuma, Ariz., gunnery school, winning his wings in May, 1944."

Flight Officer Charles E. Yates writes the Daily Press from Italy to furnish his latest address, that the home town paper may reach him more regularly. ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Philippines.—Fierce fighting raged today in the northern stretches of the narrow Ormoc corridor where at least 35,000 fresh Japanese troops battled frantically against hard-battled 24th Division infantrymen and dismounted troops of the First Cavalry Division.

LIVING MEMORIALS

As V-Day draws nearer — and casualty lists lengthen — towns are including in their postwar programs memorials to the local men whose names are on the lists. This is not new, but the form which many current plans are taking is new. For, instead of marble monuments which, however beautiful, are not of much living value, these towns are establishing memorial libraries.

A library seems strikingly suitable as a memorial to men who have fought against the burners of books and potential destroyers of civilization. For books are both containers of the knowledge of former ages and pointers toward a new and better future. Books bought with money thus spent can help the returning soldier to prepare for a new job, his wife to run a comfortable home, and his children to learn to be citizens of the new world-civilization. They can provide recreation and new skills for all of the family, and so enrich the life of the town.

And where there is not enough money for a whole library, people are even now giving single books to local institutions, in memory of individual soldiers or sailors. It

is an idea worth serious consideration everywhere.

TESTING TIME

When an American election is ended, it's over, just as surely as if it were a ball game. It is the American practice, of course, to act on this same principle in politics, accepting the decision of the umpire—who is no less than Uncle Sam himself. And the more disappointed the loser may be, the more honor comes to him by accepting defeat in this spirit.

A bad cause tends to defeat itself. But for a good cause if it loses, there will always be another year. For good causes in a free country have a way of surviving and persisting until, in the fullness of time, they triumph.

We Americans have what we might call a "formula" for that, written long ago by the American poet, William Cullen Bryant.

Truth, crushed to earth, shall rise again;
The eternal years of God are hers;
But Error, wounded, writhes in pain,
And dies among his worshippers."

RUSHES AND LULLS

Modern war proceeds by

fits and starts, from the civilian viewpoint. There will be a sudden dramatic rush, like the bursting of the Normandy pocket or the invasion of Leyte, and then, after a short time, an apparent lull, with enemy counterattacks. This is usually because of the limitations of supply. Not even our vast number of ships can carry everything everywhere at once. There

are just so many tankers for fuel, for instance.

Such lulls are no time for discouragement on the home front, any more than a period of victorious advance should be a signal for slackening of civilian effort. News that workers are leaving war plants for civilian jobs, or that bloodbanks can't make their quotas because people don't bother to keep appointments, are as bad for fighting morale as in their effect on stock-piles of needed material. General Eisenhower, in an interview with Anne O'Hare McCormick of the New York Times, was particularly urgent about this.

"Tell the people at home

that the slightest let-down on their part communicates itself at once to the men," he said. "This phase of the war is like climbing the last and hardest ascent of a high mountain in a thick fog. You can't see where the top is,

and you won't until you suddenly reach the turn and begin to go down on the other side. This is the year of decision, and to hasten the end we can't relax for a breath on the front or behind the front."

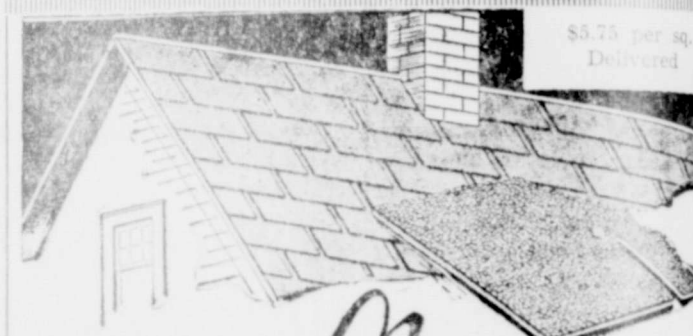

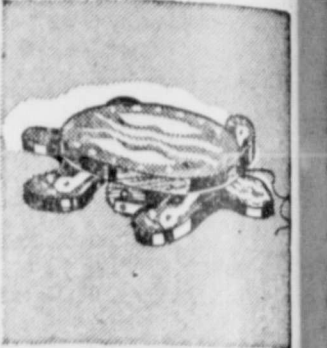

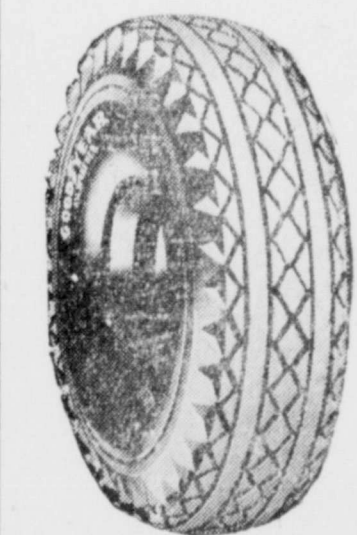
