CLAUDE POLLARD RESIGNS AS ATTORNEY-GENERAL

STATE LEGAL ADVISOR WILL PRACTICE LAW

ATTORNEY-GENERAL TO ENTER AUSTIN FIELD FOR HIMSELF

AUSTIN, Sept. 13.—Attorney General Claude Pollard today sent his resignation to Governor Dan Moody. He said he would enter the private practice of law in Austin.

The resignation is effective next Tuesday.

Governor Dan Moody indicated he would appoint Pollard's successor not later than tomorrow.

"While I sincerely regret to retire from the public service, the obligation to properly meet personal responsibilities impels me to re-enter the general practice of my profession in order to do so," General Pollard wrote Governor Moody.

Practices Office

"This is a great office and one through the proper administration of which a wonderful service to the people may be rendered. It presents a most fascinating aspect to my desire to serve the people of Texas. I have striven during my administration of it to render impartial, prompt, and courteous service to all of the people, and I regret that I cannot continue to do so."

"I have always been in the study of practice of my profession."

WALL STREET STOCKS FALL

FEDERAL RESERVE SAID RESPONSIBLE; LOANS ARE INCREASED

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Another huge increase in federal reserve brokers' loans cast a pall of gloom over Wall Street today, and prices tumbled sharply on the stock exchange. By early afternoon dozens of leading issues had fallen 4 to 10 points below last night's closing quotations.

The action of the market was in sharp contrast to the non-chalance with which it has accepted sharply rising brokerage loan totals recently.

FORT WORTH, Sept. 13 (AP).—Two youths were held today for investigation of a fatal stabbing a week ago of Lawrence Moore, 26, two sisters-in-law of the deceased, Mrs. Juanita Cook and Mrs. Lawrence Kennedy, were arrested yesterday on murder charges.

Moore was injured in an affray and died the following day. He stated he knew nothing of the affray, but he refused to reveal the name.

One Dies, Another Injured By Flames

DALLAS, Sept. 13 (AP).—J. S. Atinsworth, 46, former Waco newspaperman, died today of injuries received in a hotel fire here last night. He was carried unconscious from the burning building.

D. L. Cates, 38, also was injured, but was expected to recover. A number of other guests had narrow escapes. The fire, believed to have originated in a water explosion, damaged badly upper floors of the three-story structure.

Confederate Chieftain Deplores Action Of Union Vets

Commander Sneed Believes Mason-Dixon Line Should Not Be Barrier To United Front Of Men Who Wore Blue And Gray In '61

"Characteristically un-American," the action of the northern veterans at their encampment in Portland, Me., in disapproving reunion of the Southern Confederates and the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic delivers a message which intensifies the Mason-Dixon line as an imaginary division marker between two distinctly separate armies in peace," said Richard A. Sneed here today.

Mr. Sneed, who is treasurer

of the State of Oklahoma, is also Commander-in-Chief of the United Veterans of the Confederacy and is visiting here in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Fred Snyder, on West Nineteenth street.

Harmony Sealed At Peace

"Our conclusive gesture in signifying national harmony was sealed with Lee's surrender at Appomattox Court House."

"We have never proposed a resolution for reunion; our action was an endorsement of the plan designed in the North."

We fought for what we thought was right. We have no apology to make, and ask no apology.

Wants Peace Symbolized

"Our gray hairs should be white banners symbolizing unity of peace in the ranks of a Nation. Within a few years there will not be a survivor of the great conflict, and our hope should be to give to our children the heritage of a loyalty which is not sectionalized."

"In the South we cherish the flag of our country. It flies

from every school house to give a symbol of unity to our children. Under its banners all inner strife should be forgotten."

President Hoover, in commenting the proposed grand reunion, wrote to Edwin H. Pitcher, commander of the department of Maryland, sons of Union veterans of the Civil War, the following brief message: "It would mark a greater unity of spirit in our nation."

Later, Mr. Pitcher, in submitting the proposal, said: "The spirit that prompted this movement is purely patriotic in nature and unselfish in its intent and purpose. A careful survey of our government's attitude toward the memory of the soldiers who fought under General Lee will establish very clearly that there is a very strong trend to forgive and forget, and it behooves every member of these two organizations, their several auxiliaries and friends, to show a willingness to cooperate toward this most

worthy cause."

LEHMAN WELL WORK HALTED

PREPARATIONS BEING MADE TO SHOOT WILDCAT

LEITMAN, Sept. 13.—According to information received here early this afternoon, drilling operations have been suspended on the Marland Oil company's No. 1 shaft near five miles southwest of this city in Cochran county, while plans have been unofficially announced for plugging back to the first pay to shoot.

No direct communication could be had from the well.

A report from the test location stated that preparations are being made to shoot the well within the next three days. The hole is to be plugged back to about 4,900 feet and shot at the first pay strike between 4,870 and 4,875 feet.

A plug is due to arrive from either Big Spring or Jai, N. M.

Sooner Road Board To Inspect Bridges

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 13 (AP).—A tour of inspection, to be made next week by the Oklahoma highway commission, is expected to add considerable information to statistics already compiled in connection with toll bridges between Oklahoma and Texas, along the Red river.

Four bridges at Durant, Preston, Gainesville and Terra—are to be inspected, according to present plans of the commission, with a view to ascertaining their size and their value to the state. Later, the commissioners expect to confer with the Texas highway board, with reference to whether the present Red river toll bridges should be purchased, or whether construction of new bridges would be advisable.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13 (AP).—The Chicago Tribune said today that "in all probability" headquarters of the \$200,000,000 Farmers' National Grain corporation would be located here. The newspaper quoted "responsible farm leaders."

Organization plans for the cooperative will be completed next week when the committee of 16 farmers' cooperative representatives meets here.

They were leisurely, affable and talkative. When the Ex jewels had become ex-jewels, the robbers put the Exes in a cedar closet.

"You will not suffocate," said one of them. "Give us the phone number of a friend, and in ten minutes we will call him so that you may be released."

That was how the Exes exited from the closet.

"If they hadn't telephoned," said Ex, "I fear that Ex would have marked the spot."

MILK PRAISED AFTER SURVEY

HEALTH CONDITIONS IN LUBBOCK GOOD, SAYS U. S. OFFICIAL

Concluding Thursday a two-day survey of milk and water conditions in Lubbock, M. M. Miller, milk specialist of the United States Public Health Service, commended health authorities in this city for their work and praised the "existing sanitary conditions."

"The milk supply in Lubbock is far above the average in quality," he said, "due to untiring efforts of local health officers and the support of the public."

Should Be Grateful
"Lubbock citizens should be grateful for the present conditions, and show their appreciation by increased consumption."

"The health of any city is proportionate to the quality of the quality of the milk supply."

Mr. Miller also said that the water is in splendid condition and shows no contamination.

The city laboratory, under direction of Dr. Y. J. Aiken, is well equipped and I am gratified with the manner in which it is operated," he said.

Mr. Miller was assisted here by H. E. Hargis, state sanitary engineer.

Forest Fires Take Lives Of Two Men

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 13 (AP).—Forest fires continued to spread in Western Oregon after they had directly or indirectly claimed two lives and caused injury to seven others in the state.

J. H. McCubbin, of Eugene, was killed and four others were injured last night when a tree fell upon them while fighting flames near Maple.

James W. Fowler, vice president of the Eastern and Western Lumber company here, died last Saturday from heart disease said to have been aggravated by a tour of the fire lines near his company's mill at Molalla.

BERLIN, Sept. 13 (AP).—Two officials and three workmen were killed today in a dynamite factory at Grevenbroich belonging to the German dye trust.

INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE AT WORK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP).—A committee of three members of the Senate prepared today to go to the bottom of the flaunted charges of interference by private parties in the unsuccessful Geneva Naval limitations conference of 1927. Senator Shortridge, republican, California, chairman of the investigating committee, expected to begin public hearings about the middle of next week.

U. S. AND GREAT BRITAIN READY NOW FOR NAVAL PARLEY, STIMSON STATES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Secretary Stimson announced today that Great Britain and the United States were now prepared for a naval conference.

Negotiations between Ambassador Dawes and Prime Minister MacDonald have reached the point he said, where a conference can be called.

Is Not Restricted
It can deal with any matters, he said, which have not yet been settled in the direct conversations.

The discussions, he continued, were centered around a few thousand tons of ships in a single class, meaning cruisers.

It is probably, he added, that even this point will become a discussion on the way in which these ships shall be constructed or the guns with which they carry will be man-

BANKER ADMITS AID IN COUP

NEWCASTLE, Wyo., Sept. 13 (AP).—Two young women who he said he "paid liberally" for their services sent eight fake code messages, purporting to come from Denver financial institutions and which enabled him to establish \$500,000 credit with six New York banks, C. D. Waggoner, president of the Bank of Telluride, Colo., told the Associated Press today from his jail cell here.

This was the first interview he has granted explaining this phase of his half million dollar manipulation.

Waggoner said the two girls acted unwittingly, that the eight messages were placed in sealed envelopes and numbered and that the fake messages were sent in the order they were numbered.

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WORLD TARIFF CONFAB URGED

ENGLAND AND FRANCE WOULD LOWER ALL BARRIERS

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Sept. 13.—Great Britain and France today took a joint step to bring about a world conference on lowering tariff barriers. This move was made in the spirit developed by comments of European statesmen while discussing last week Premier Briand's project for a "United States of Europe."

One of the two nations recommended in the economic committee of the League of Nations that negotiations be begun between members of the league, and non-members as well, to promote a meeting at the earliest possible date.

To Frame Agreement
Purpose of the meeting would be to frame "the first collective agreement for diminishing hindrances to trade and developing and facilitating economic relations by all practicable means."

The resolution of England and France also called on the states of the world not to increase their protective tariffs above the present level for a period of two years, or to impose new protective duties or create new "tariff" barriers to trade during this period.

Pending the convening of the world conference on economic questions, the other nations were thus requested to hold down their tariffs.

Two Die In Chair Of Kentucky Jail

EDDYVILLE, Ky., Sept. 13 (AP).—Carl Ford, 21, Louisville, and Ivan Russell, 27, Oldham county, convicted of murder, were executed today in the electric chair at the Kentucky state penitentiary here.

Russell went to his death at 12:1 and Ford followed 19 minutes afterward.

"Diamond Dick's" Author Is Dead

AUBURN, N. Y., Sept. 13 (AP).—George Charles Jenki, the man whose stories of Diamond Dick and Nick Carter thrilled youngsters of another generation, died at his home at Owassaw Lake last night after an illness of two weeks. He was 79 years old.

ROGERS TO GO ON STAND AND DEFEND BECKY

PELLAGRA HURTS MIND OF GIRL, CLAIM OF HER ATTORNEYS

(By Associated Press)
NEW BRAUNFELS, Sept. 13.—Otis Rogers, 27-year-old husband and chief of counsel for Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers, charged with robbing the Farmers National Bank of Buda, Tex., today outlined testimony he will give in behalf of his wife. He was to be the last non-expert witness to take the stand in her trial here.

He said he would detail circumstances of their college romance which culminated in their marriage. The marriage did not become known generally until after the defendant held up the bank with a pistol. He also said he would tell how she nursed him to health after he was stricken with tuberculosis.

Four Witnesses Agree
Four witnesses who knew the defendant intimately during her college days and since the robbery testified they believed Mrs. Rogers was insane.

In her early years she seemed an exceedingly bright but nervous child, Sterling Clark, former sheriff of Tarrant county, related.

"For the last year I have noticed that there was a peculiar stare in her eyes which reminded me of insane persons I have handled," the witness testified. "She is insane, there is no question about that."

Teacher Is Grilled
Thomas Rouse, teacher of public speaking at the University of Texas, was grilled severely by District Attorney Fred L. Blundell after he declared the defendant was insane.

"You didn't testify she was insane at the LaGrange trial, did you?" Blundell asked.

"No, I didn't," Rouse replied.

GRAIN CO-OP FORMED SOON

ORGANIZATION TO BE COMPLETED IN NEXT FEW DAYS

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Organization of the \$20,000,000 farmer-owned grain marketing corporation to operate under the terms of the new federal farm law, will be completed in the next week or ten days, it was said today at the meeting of the American Farm Bureau federation here.

With the committee of sixteen grain leaders sitting as its board of directors and with headquarters probably in Chicago, the corporation will establish sales agencies in principal grain centers of this and other countries and will operate on lines similar to those of the Canadian wheat pool, it was said.

Articles Are Drawn
Articles of incorporation were drawn recently. They are now being studied by the farm board's counsel, George Farrand.

Wool growers will have their turn in October at organizing to work under the new farm law, it was announced by L. B. Palmer, Ohio farm bureau president here to attend the meeting. Farmers' stock company officers and heads of wool cooperatives will be eligible to attend, Palmer said.

ALLEGED PLOT TO KILL SICHOFKY, POLISE COUNT, IN PRISON IS TOLD

(By Associated Press)
SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 12.—An alleged plot to kill Albert Sichofsky, Polish count, in Folsom prison for his money was related here today by James J. Smith, former warden of the prison, as the newest angle of the Count's involved, startling assertions that \$35,000 belonging to him disappeared after he was arrested in California on bunco charges.

Tells Story
"Smith's story, in effect, was as follows:
Sichofsky had been employed as assistant to George Jennings, a hired record clerk during the latter part of 1928. One day the warden found on his desk an anonymous letter advising him that Sichofsky was in the prison hospital and that he, the warden, should see if he is all right."

This letter, Smith stated, that Jennings would see Sichofsky in the hospital that night and have him sign a will.

Smith said he secreted himself behind a screen in the hospital and saw Jennings appear with papers in his hand.

"Well Count, are you ready to sign now?" Jennings asked.
"Sign what?" Smith said he asked as he stepped out from behind the screen.
Smith said that Jennings had a will providing that in case of Sichofsky's death Jennings was to receive \$2,500 and that provisions were made for the payment of \$200 to each of two convicts, Jennings

WINNINGS GOOD

Husband Charges Wife Won \$300 Or More On Poker

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—A wife's purported ability to earn \$300 a week playing poker entered the double header divorce litigation between Mr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Blondell today as proffered reason why Blondell should not pay \$100 a week alimony.

Mrs. Blondell, seeking separate maintenance pending disposition of divorce suits brought simultaneously in different courts by her husband and herself, said she had no money to pay her hotel bill and the hotel had attached her clothes.

This young woman could not be without money, Blondell's counsel interposed. "She used to come home with \$300 some weeks which she had picked up at poker parties."

Judge Michael J. Feinberg continued the hearing until Blondell's income—set by his wife at \$25,000 a year and by him at \$75 a week—could be determined.

Defense counsel placed their first four major witnesses on the stand to contest the state's charges. Prosecution witnesses uniformly had testified they believed Mrs. Pantages to have been intoxicated at the time of the crash.

Mrs. Bertha Jacobs, called for the defense, told the jury that to the best of her knowledge the theater man's wife was sober 15 minutes before the collision. She had spent the week-end of June 15 at the Pantages home in Venice, a beach suburb, had ridden into Los Angeles with Mrs. Pantages and left the car just before the accident.

MELVIN TRAYLOR ONE NAMED TO SERVE AT HAGUE CONFERENCE

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—The New York Times says today that Jackson E. Reynolds, president of the First National Bank of New York, and Melvin A. Traylor, president of the First National Bank of Chicago, have been appointed American representatives on the sub-committee created by The Hague Reparations conference to draft statutes of the Bank of International Settlements.

They were named by Owen D. Young, author of the reparations plan, of which the international bank is an important factor, and J. P. Morgan, delegate to the Paris experts conference, which adopted the Young plan.

Formal announcement of the appointments was withheld until the full list of committee members representing all the nations affected by the bank of international settlements was published.

Mr. Traylor was born in Kentucky and went to Texas as a boy. He studied law while clerking in a country store. After being admitted to the bar he became interested in the politics and served as city clerk of Hillsboro and later as assistant county attorney of Hill county.

His banking career began in a small bank in Malone, Texas, in 1905. After holding several other banking positions he moved to St. Louis and eventually to Chicago. His knowledge of livestock made

him useful to Chicago bankers and he was named president of the Livestock Exchange National bank in 1914. He became associated with the First Trust and Savings bank in 1919 and has been president of the First National Bank of Chicago since 1925.

Meanwhile, the crowd tried to break down the door, and a call for reserves was put in. Fire apparatus was also summoned.

NO CONFLICTS IN MANCHURIA

(By Associated Press)

MOSCOW, Sept. 13 (AP)—Soviet authorities insisted today no major elements had occurred on the Manchurian frontier, northeastern Asia, where large Chinese and Russian armies have faced each other for several weeks.

Chinese reports which depicted Manchurian hostilities as on a big scale were ridiculed, and it was said there would be no major activity unless the Chinese saw fit to launch a general offensive, regarded as extremely unlikely.

Could Defeat China
It was claimed there is no disposition on the part of the Soviet union to enter into anything like real warfare, but that in the event, such did materialize the Red army could annihilate the Chinese overnight if allowed a free hand by Japan and other powers.

There were some reports here on renewed fighting. A dispatch from Vladivostok said Chinese troops at Pogranichnaya attacked Soviet border detachments, but were forced to retreat after a 20 minute battle.

A Chinese dispatch to Tass, official Russian agency in the United States, said the Chinese had opened both artillery and rifle fire on Soviet frontier guards near Dalainor and station 86, five miles west of Manchuli station. A Vladivostok dispatch reported a similar raid as having taken place 35 miles south-west of Pogranichnaya where a large band of white Russians crossed the border and terrified the population.

BRIEF GIVES PLEA SUPPORT

BLALOCK GIVES BRIEF
ON LOWERING RATES
TO TEXAS PORTS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 13.—A brief in support of Texas ports and the railroad commission for adoption of the examiners report by the interstate commerce commission sustaining a parity of rates between points on Texas railroads and Texas ports and from Texas points to New Orleans was filed today. It was written by Assistant Attorney General Jack Blalock.

Under an order of the I. C. C. Texas ports were authorized to charge lower rates on certain commodities than points on the distance to New Orleans, but from New Orleans the rates were to be the same as those charged to New Orleans.

The Texas and Pacific railway and the Louisiana Railway and navigation company were exempted from the order, and they were permitted to charge the same rates to New Orleans as to Texas ports, even where the distance was shorter to Texas ports.

Exclusion from the order of these two railroads brought a protest from Texas interests and a few months ago the case was heard by an examiner for the I. C. C. He will recommend that the lines be not exempted.

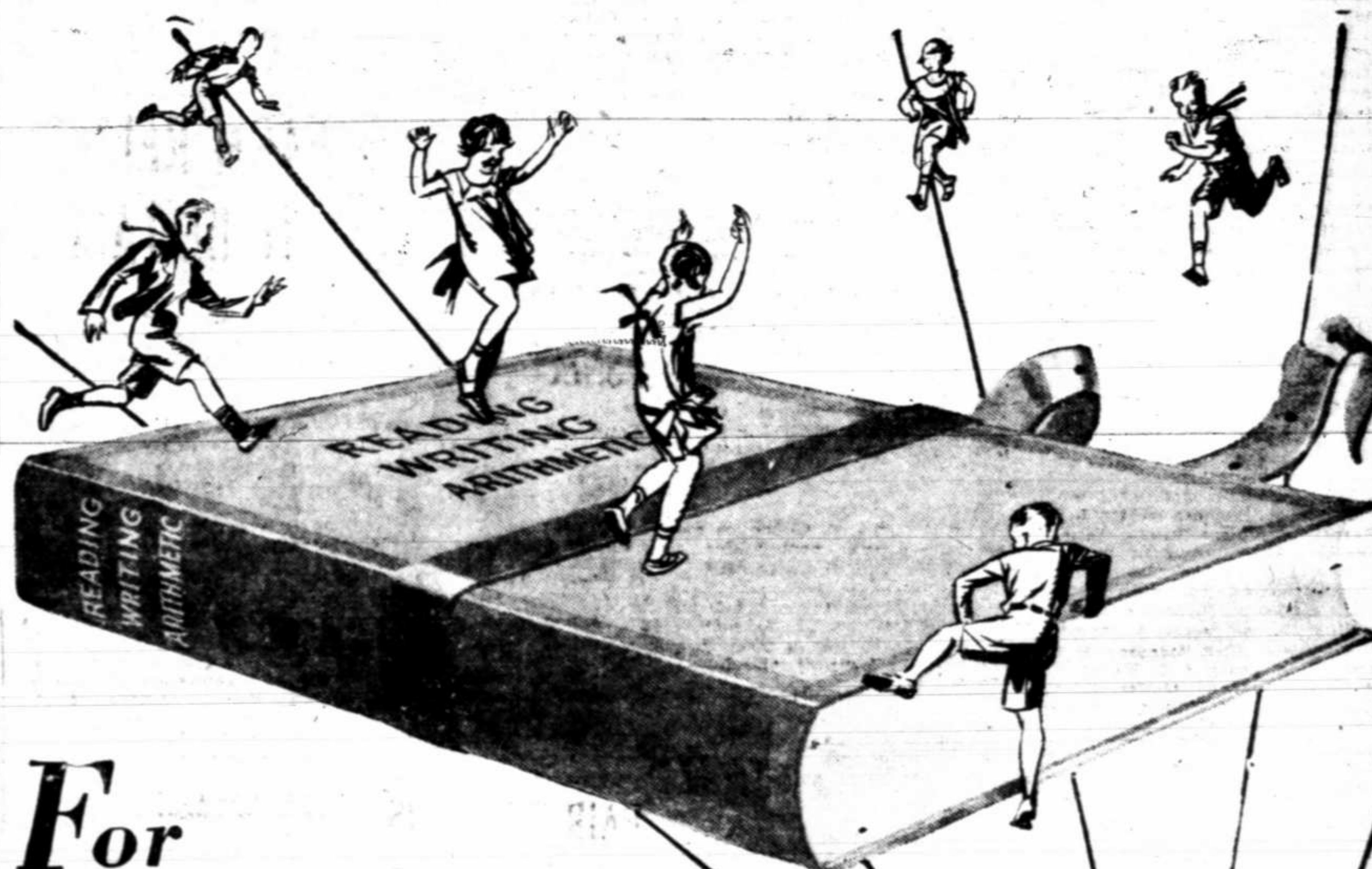

Brumbeles Guide Frogs

Lester Brumbeles, another big tackle, who was placed alongside Gordy Brown on numerous all-conference elevens last season, will be the guiding spirit of the Texas Christian Horned Frogs.

Bush Jones, a scrapping guard, will do the pre-game coin-flipping for Tech. Although playing with the conference "weak sister" last year, Jones was recognized as one of the circuit's outstanding players.

Columbia Will Cut Out Huddle System

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Columbia University's football team has decided to abandon the huddle system of calling signals and return to the old method of having the quarterback call that part of the job. Only in emergencies will the huddle be used, Coach Charley Crowley has announced.

Crowley believes the huddle has delayed the game and that it is not as effective as the old method. "With the quarterback calling signals," says Crowley, "he can see at a glance just where the defense is strong or weak. He has everything before his eyes and if the defense should shift he can call his signals off—without returning to the huddle—and shift his attack accordingly."

NATIONS ARE AGREED AGAIN

BOLIVIA, PARAGUAY SETTLE DISPUTE ON BOUNDARY LINE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Bolivia and Paraguay today agreed to resume diplomatic relations after a dispute since last December when war threatened to erupt between the two countries as a result of a boundary dispute.

With the signing of the agreement, the commission of inquiry and conciliation considering the controversy but one day off, the Paraguayan members today deposited with the commission their government's ratification of the conciliation formula agreed to Monday by Bolivia.

Although the conciliation program has been agreed to, neither nation has accepted arbitration terms for the definite settlement of the boundary question. Another plenary session is called for tomorrow when it is believed an attempt will be made to have the life of the commission extended to complete the agreement.

Approximately 300,000 square miles of wilderness known as the Chaco-Boreal is involved.

FARM BOARD CHAIRMAN SAYS HE WILL FACE ANY COMMITTEE

Co-operative associations that qualify for loans from the intermediate credit banks are qualified to receive the supplemental loans from the farm board."

Chairman Legge said wheat storage facilities, particularly at Galveston, Texas, Buffalo, N. Y., a number of Atlantic coast seaports and interior terminals were over-loaded with grain, but that he believed the peak had passed and better prices were in prospect.

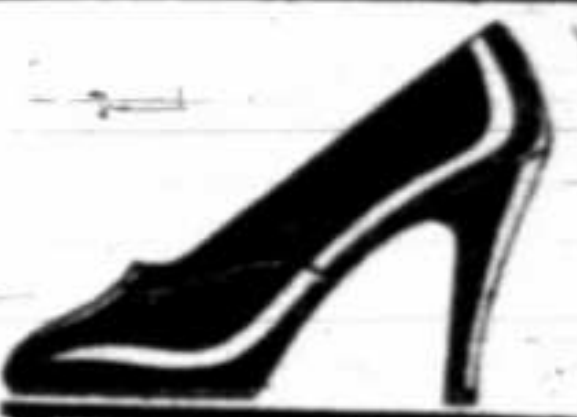

Common Sense
Everybody knows that common
sense is an extremely valuable
trait. But the ability to be foolish in
the right way sometimes, as
worth every bit as much.

Perhaps that needs a little ex-
plaining.
—A press story from Tokyo—
the other day remarked that it officers
and enlisted men of the Japanese
army have been committed suicide
if the Graf Zeppelin had not com-
pleted its flight across the Pacific
ocean.

These Japanese sailors were mem-
bers of the ground crew at the
Kauaijima air station near Tokyo.
They helped take the Graf Zeppelin
off the ground and on its way to
Japan, a tale which the ship
against the hangar entrance and
damaged a motor engine, and they
felt themselves to blame.

So if the ship had come to grief
on the next leg of its flight they
would have felt that the only way
for them to atone for their blunder
would be to kill themselves.

You can not possibly imagine a
group of Americans feeling that way
about it. Committing suicide to clear
one's honor is peculiarly a Japanese
custom. There is no common sense
to it. It is from our viewpoint, utterly
foolish.

Yet back of that custom there lies
one of the most commendable traits
in the Japanese character—loyalty.

In order to feel that way about
things, a man must have a code of
honor so high and so strict that
he does not care to keep on living
must be deeply convinced that it is
better not to live at all than to live
below his moral standard. He must
believe in other words, have an ideal
of conduct for which he is always
ready to die.

This works out with the Japanese
in a way that seems to us almost
insane sometimes.

Two or three years ago a Japanese
warship sank a landing party ashore
at a Chinese port to escort
Japanese civilians to safety. The
officer in charge was ordered under
no circumstances to fire on the
Chinese mob unless the mob fired
first.

The mob did not fire, but for two
days it looted and burned the
Japanese civilians to death. The
names of the Japanese civilians and
names of the Chinese mob were
handful of mud.

The officer carried out his mis-
sion and took the civilians to safety.
Then he went to his quarters and
died.

His crew and gunners died, too.
He had been ordered to endure
himself without hurting himself.

Now that of course was utterly
foolish. But it was also magnifi-
cent. It was a thing no American
would have done. But the high code
of honor that lay back of it was a
thing that every American might
envy.

It is just possible that we some-
times have a little bit too much
common sense to be really in-
telligent.

Your Auto
The importance of having the
family auto inspected frequently for
mechanical defects is a thing most
of us overlook. We take it for granted
that things are safe enough—and
sometimes discover that some-
thing is wrong only when it causes
disaster.

The Baltimore Automobile Club
and police recently stopped and in-
spected as many autos as they could
lay their hands on. Of 133,354 cars
inspected, more than 91,000 had
defects that needed brake adjustment
in order to be perfectly safe. Eight
thousand had unsuspended defects
in the steering gear and nearly 40,000
needed a new set of lights.

Those are small matters, perhaps,
but they are just the sort of things
that can cause a terrible accident.
It is a "little check" check the
operation of your car every so often
is essential to safe driving.

The Girl on Broadway says an

As The Plainsman sees it, the
city commission has taken a
forward step in deciding to put
Lubbock's police force in uni-
form. How we've gone this far
without making such a move is
more than this column has ever
been able to understand.

Sanctioning an ununiformed po-
lice force is just the approving
roast turkey without the "trim-
mings." There's just something
lacking that all if a stranger in
town tries to find a policeman he
has to go to the city hall or the
Tech cafe, or else get out a search
warrant providing there is not some
means of identification. The Plains-
man is glad to see the boys getting
fixed up and believes it should be
attended to immediately.

Incidentally, he believes the
psychology of the city's taking
some pride in the police force
will help the officers themselves to
do a better job. When the boys
get all dyked out in their new
suits they'll just naturally feel
more of a pride in their work. That's
true in any line. You wouldn't expect a
carpenter to do a very good job
without any tools or a printer to
turn out much of a print job
with an unsuitable typeface.

The same way with the cops. If
the city will take more interest
in them they'll just naturally
take more interest in the city—and
everybody will be better off.

Crucifying police officers is not
as the popular expression goes, "an
old Spanish custom." As a matter
of fact, it is decidedly an American
custom and holds good in practice
everywhere under the sun.

The Plainsman hears the policemen
ramped on verbally about once a
day by someone or another who has
crossed them up, or has put him-
self in a position to have some
trouble with them. From a personal
standpoint, this writer has never
had any trouble with any of them—
probably because they haven't had
any trouble with him—so he'll continue
to sympathize with men in a
tough job until we are placed in a
position to feel differently about
them if we ever do.

Regardless of all this, getting
uniforms for the policemen is a
good thing and is just another step
toward putting Lubbock in the city
class.

There's one other thing about
the recent rain rally—that is
it came before the annual Pan-
handle-South Plains fair opened.
Nearly every year, when
everybody is hoping and pray-
ing for fair weather, at fair
time, old man Jope Plovers
clouds up and rains on us. Of
course, he may do the same
thing this year but if you ask
The Plainsman, we don't see
how he has any moulture left
to dump on this particular section.

by the underpass, that's true. And
the Santa Fe, with its eye on ship-
ping figures, naturally hesitates to
take a stand against the packing
company for fear that such a stand
might cost the line some business—
that's natural. But the fact remains
that the underpass is a crying
necessity and the boys at log-
gerheads ought to get together as soon
as possible.

If somebody gets bumped off
at that crossing by one of John
Santa Fe's numerous trains,
which are in the habit of
switching around at the Avenue
H crossing, maybe we'll get
some action—particularly if a
logical suit is slapped in the
railroad's face. But it shouldn't
be necessary to wait until a life
has been snuffed out to get that
underpass. The Plainsman, per-
sonally, hopes the north side
folks will be able to bring
enough pressure to bear on the
Santa Fe to get some action in
the near future. He thinks the
people over there have been
patient enough and generous
enough all these years.

MacDonald's Visit To Our Shores Is A Cinch That U. S.
And England Have Reached An Agreement, Dutcher Says

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—One
of the most certain things about Pre-
mier Ramsay MacDonald's visit to
Washington is that the British
prime minister wouldn't be coming
unless he and President Hoover had
reached a complete naval under-
standing in advance.

His appearance here is planned
as a gesture of agreement between
the English-speaking peoples, a
felicitous move of probable great
moral effect toward world peace.

The agreement itself is just being
worked out and there is still just
a bare chance that no satisfactory
conclusion will be reached. In any
event, it should be understood that
MacDonald has had no thought of
coming over here to conclude the
unsettled negotiations in person.

MacDonald and Hoover both realize
that the British premier's "good
will" trip without an agreement
would be worse than no "good will"
trip at all. The political effect would
be bad in both countries and might
especially react against MacDonald,
whose position is none too strong.
The effect on British and American
psychology probably would be even
more serious.

Laurence Richey, the Hoover sec-
retary, captured a strange beast re-
cently on the Virginia estate where
the president goes fishing. Reclaim-
ing from a holiday devoted to fish-
fighting, Richey brought the animal
back in a nice clean tin can to find
out what it was and dumped it onto
Secretary George Akeron's desk for
the inspection of Secretary of Agri-
culture Arthur M. Hyde, who was
waiting for an audience with the
president.

inches long and less than an inch
thick, most fearsome in aspect. The
general color scheme was light green
with a red arched with horns, claws
and talons.

Who's Who in Timely Views
WOMEN'S LABOR SITUATION REVIEWED
BY MARY ANDERSON
Director of the Women's Bureau, Department of Labor

(Mary Anderson was born at Lidköping, Sweden, Aug. 27, 1872.
She came to the United States at sixteen and entered the garment
making industry in Chicago. Later she was in a shoe factory for
eighteen years. She has traveled throughout the United States in the
interests of women in industry, and has done much organization work
along these lines. In 1919 she was appointed director of the women's
bureau of the department of labor. She is a member of numerous labor
and social organizations.)

Although we can now say that
the outlook for labor is brighter
than at any time in history, we
must admit that we are still a long
way from satisfaction
factory labor stan-
dards, especial-
ly for women
workers, since
they are in a
weaker economic
position than are
men, and since
their energies
should be safe-
guarded to pre-
vent the strength
and welfare of
the race from
being jeopardized.

Our so-called
"better and bet-
ter" production
system is carrying us far forward
in some directions, but there is a
recoil from the machines tending
to drive us backward in others.

One of the first recoils in the
substitution of machines for hand-
work is increased unemployment,
due to workers being thrown out
of jobs. Mechanical labor-saving
devices making light work of jobs
formerly requiring the strength of
men are, to some extent, responsi-
ble for changes from men to wo-
men workers in some occupations.
In many other instances, however,
women have felt the effect of ma-
chines in a different way.

Industrialism endowed from sci-
ence and high ideals will be ready
to bridge the gulfs between em-
ployers and employees and seek
to greater heights of wisdom in re-
gard to the adjustment of human
relations through management and
labor through constructive co-opera-
tion, thus unfurling the banner of
democracy in the industrial realm.

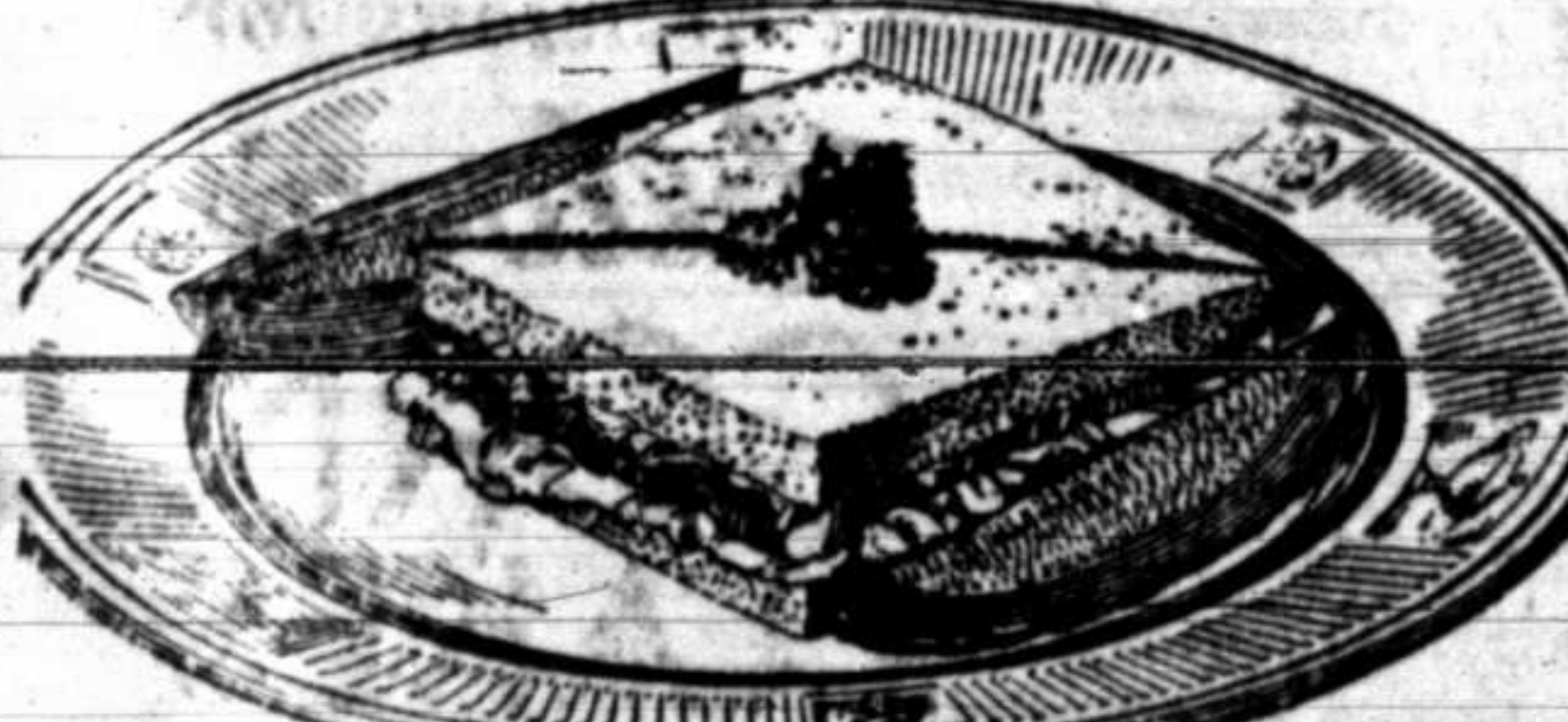

BANKER'S STENOGRAPHER IMPLICATES 'MYSTERY WOMAN' IN FINANCIAL COUP WHICH NETTED WAGGONER HUGE GAIN

(By Associated Press)
DENVER, Colo., Sept. 12.—E. B. Averill, special operative of a Denver investigating service, said today Miss Frances Carlson, 18, stenographer in the Bank of Telluride, told him that "unwittingly" she sent from Denver two of the six faked telegrams by which C. D. Waggoner sought to defraud six New York banks of \$500,000.

Miss Carlson is one of the persons subpoenaed by a federal grand jury in New York. Averill arrived here yesterday with Clarence E. Detschman, cashier of the Bank of Telluride, also subpoenaed.

Blames Woman
The young woman told the detective she had sent the telegrams from Denver at the request of a woman whom she did not know and who told her it was to be done for Waggoner.

In addition to a signed statement from Miss Carlson, Averill said he had in his possession a "practice sheet" on which the young woman had copied the faked telegrams dictated to her by Waggoner. The detective said the "practice sheet" bore the names of the six Denver banks signed to the telegrams that resulted in building up \$500,000 credit in New York.

On this sheet, the detective reported, Miss Carlson wrote the message dictated by Waggoner and when she had completed them without mistake, typed each separately. These were placed in sealed envelopes in the banker's desk at Telluride.

Took Girl To Denver
Waggoner asked Miss Carlson to accompany him to Denver to assist him in some business, according to Averill's information, and after having been met by Mrs. Waggoner, she spent some time at the home of a Denver relative.

Miss Carlson said that on August 30, a woman unknown to her, told her Waggoner wanted her to file two messages, contained in a sealed envelope, at a telegraph office here. She said she filed the messages without reading them and then returned the envelope to the woman who met her at a street intersection. Miss Carlson said she had not seen the woman before or since.

FOURTEEN ARE MOB SUSPECTS

POLICEMEN AND MILL BOSSES HELD AFTER LASHING BEE

(By Associated Press)
CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 13.—Fourteen men, including two Gastonia police officers and three textile mill superintendents, were under bond today on charges of kidnapping and assault with intent to kill in mob activities against union men in North Carolina textile centers.

Two organizers and six associates were held in jail. C. M. Lell, one of the three men abducted Monday night in Gastonia by the mob which lashed Ben Wells, organizer for the National Textile Workers union, was one of seven men arrested last night when police raided their residence here purportedly in search of liquor, and instead, they said, found three pump guns, two shotguns and 300 shells. Dewey Martin, and George Saul were the organizers held.

Third Man Jailed
The third victim of the mob, C. D. Saylor, was placed in jail some hours after discovery of the guns and shells, although he was not at the house. Police were holding an automobile they believed was used in hauling the arms to the residence.

Fourteen men named in a bench warrant issued yesterday by Judge Thomas J. Shaw, in connection with his investigation being conducted here in lieu of a grand jury, were arrested in Gastonia last night and each placed under bond of \$1,000 for appearance today before the judge, sitting as a magistrate.
