## School Sponsors Drug Workshop Here

A drug lab, the first of its kind in Olton, was conducted Monday night in the school cafeteria, under the supervision of the drug committee of Olton Public Schools.

Members of the committee include Coach Eddie Miller, Mrs. Ray Kinnison, Alvis Fuquay, Wandie Hutson, Carl McClure and Vic Allcorn.

The participants in the lab were mailed invitations to attend the session approximately two weeks prior to the meeting.

Registration began at 6 p. m. and seating arrangements by place cards enabled different age groups to convene at the same table for discussion.

Invocation was given by Doug Lawyer, minister of the Main Street Church of Christ. Welcome was given by Joe Turner, superintendent of Schools.

An overall preview of the program was given by Carl McClure, who stated that the purpose of the meeting was to find out whether Olton had a drug problem, provide information to those interested and to ask "What is your role? What do you expect Olton schools to do about it? and what are you going to do about it as individuals?"

McClure said that in the discussion of the evening that an attempt would be made to find out what drugs are, what the problem is and what can be done about it.

Mrs. Ray Kinnison was the first speaker of the evening. Copies of the words of popular music were provided each participant and following the reading of these words, they were asked to interpret the meaning of the songs. Two of the songs were "Don't Bogart That Joint" and "A Little Help From My Friends."

Each table was given an opportunity for discussion before Mrs. Kinnison asked one of the participants to give their interpretation.

Following the discussion of these songs, which the group decided had a definite message concerning dope, Alvis Fuquay passed out test sheets with questions about drugs. A 20-minute time period for answering and discussing the questions was given and then answers were given to the questions.

The questions pertained to the effects, consequences and uses of different drugs.

Coach Eddie Miller then reported to the group the results of a questionnaire which was given to students from grade five through 12.

With the assumption that if Olton did have a drug problem that it would be with marijuana, questions were based on the drug.

Approximately 240 high school students, 270 junior high and 80 to 90 fifth grade students answered questions on the questionnaire.

Results showed that 21 persons claimed to have used marijuana.

In high school 45 per cent claimed to know someone who smoked marijuana, 25 per cent said they knew where to get it, your friends see that you are happy and they want to be happy so he asks his friend to 'turn him on.'

"You want to know if your kid is using drugs?"

"You can't know unless you know your kid pretty well. There are no true physical symptoms."

"You may say this town is too small. Let me tell you it's the small towns that are using up to 300 pounds of grass per week. Right over here at Lockney, 2 to 3 hundred pounds of grass is shipped in there every week. It's going somewhere. Lubbock and Amarillo are getting more than that and they don't need it."

Also speaking was Jerry Carney and Les Burkham of Plainview, two ex-convicts who spend their time now working with young people.

Carney said that the youth are seeking recognition from his friends. "Either you get recognition for being an outstanding athlete, Boy Scout or church worker or you get recognition for bad-mouthing the teachers."

"It's the main thing, recognition."

The drug problem is a result of group pressures, according to Carney, who says that no one wants to be different.

"It's getting worse in Plainview."

### Olton Clinic To Be Closed On Wednesday

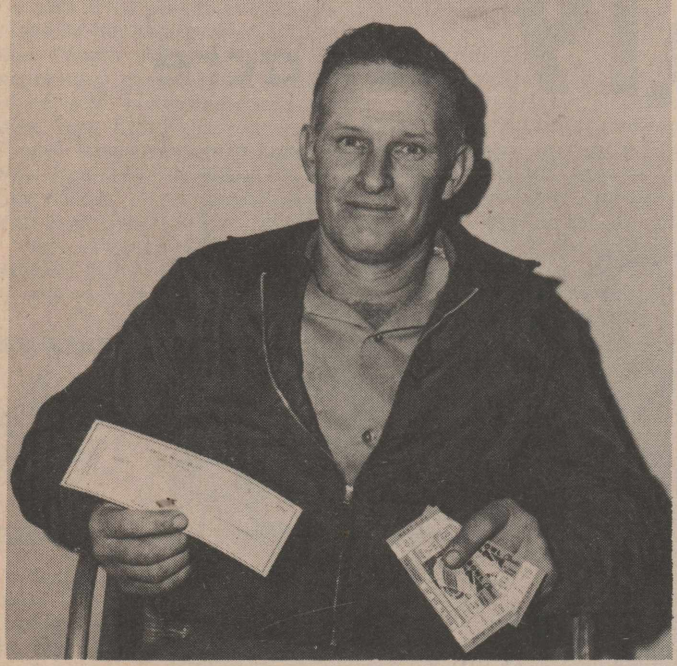
Dr. O. H. Jones announced this week that, effective Wednesday, Dec. 2, the Community Clinic will be closed Wednesday afternoons.

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## SENSING THE NEWS

The sign outside the college campus read "Help Us Advance Zero Growth For America." It was a shocker for a traveler who had grown up in the 1930's and remembered a time when the growth of the American economy was virtually zero. The traveler thought; what innocents are the college sign-painters, insulated from reality by present-day affluence.

Zero growth in the 1930's meant breadlines and unsuccessful searches for work. It meant fine, old-line companies that went under almost overnight. It meant desperation for fathers and mothers with sick or hungry children.

Now, in the 1970's, spoiled darlings in universities say that the nation must turn away from technological development. They demand a halt to construction of nuclear and fossil fuel power plants and express horror at the expansion of steel mills and other basic industrial operations. Some of the back-to-nature types urge a return to wilderness conditions and establish primitive communes in remote areas of the Southwest.

There's an air of unreality about these demands and moves. Certainly, thoughtful citizens are aware of the problems of pollution and want public agencies to take steps to abate smoke and fumes and to clean up industrial wastes before they enter rivers and streams. But that's a very different proposition from supporting "Zero Growth".

Industrial development can't be halted without depriving the American people of necessities and comforts, without turning the United States into a backward nation. The people who want to ban the automobile because of pollution forget that not much more than a generation ago many Americans were tragically lacking in mobility. They couldn't get to jobs outside their localities. The automobile and the highway, especially the interstate highway system, created jobs and opportunities and people gained new perspective.

The electric power generating plants are

a favorite target of the "Zero Growth" exponents. But the American way of life would be impossible without steady increases in power generating capacity. While a handful of commune-dwellers may be willing to return to the use of candles and kerosene lamps, it is ludicrous to expect the American people to do without electric lights or air-conditioners. Those who crusade against new power plants could bring on a real tragedy for entire communities -- critical power shortages.

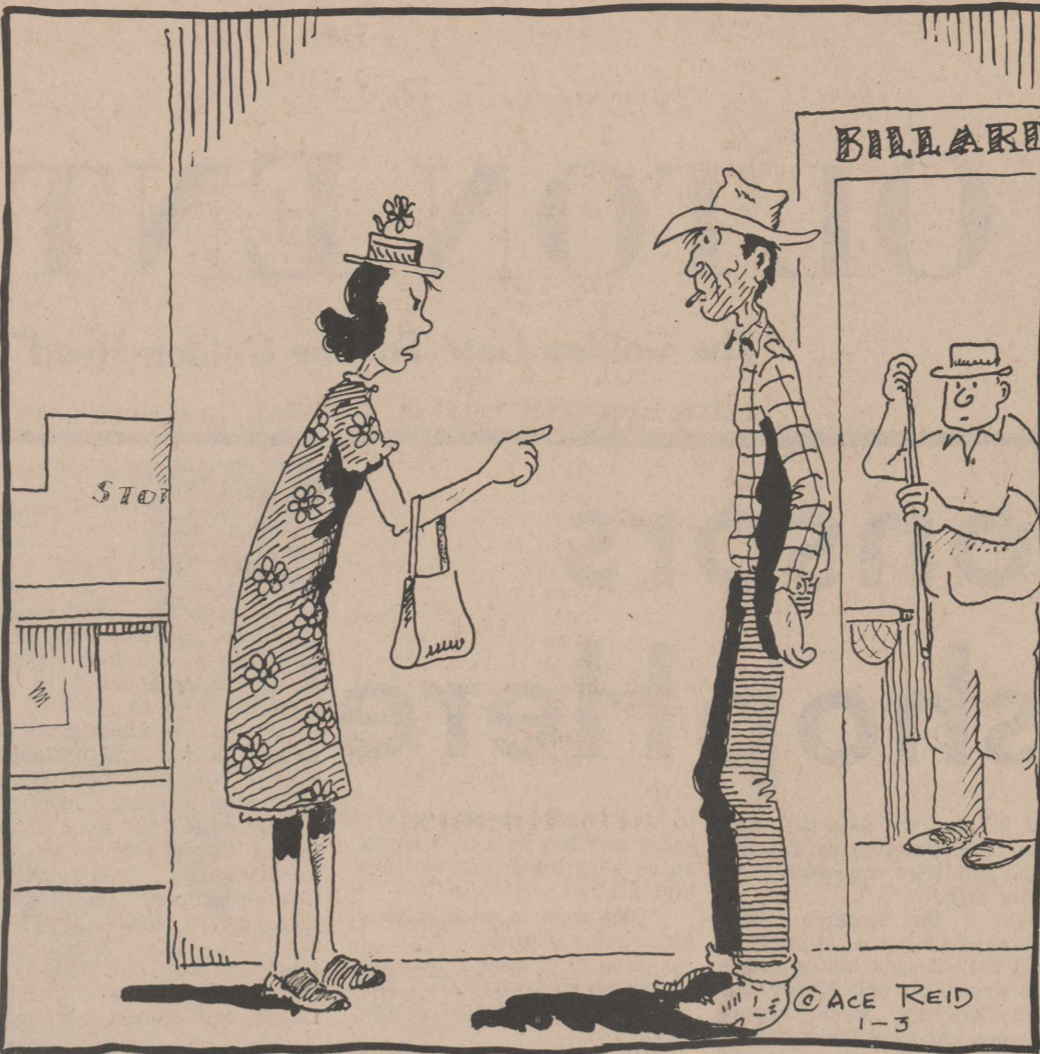
One wonders: would the proponents of "Zero Growth" extend this concept to medical science and health care? If so, how would they divorce this form of technological development from other forms? Progress in chemistry, for example, has made possible the survival of countless youngsters in the last quarter-century. Growing up before the era of "wonder drugs" meant experiencing terrible dangers from infection and communicable disease. Medical technology has made possible open-heart surgery and progress in the treatment of cancer. These advances are directly linked to overall progress in other forms of science and engineering and to the success of industrial operations.

Ironically, the modern college and university facilities which often house the "Zero Growth" enthusiasts, are the result of the expansion of the U. S. industrial base since the early 1940's. Without highly profitable industry, capable of paying corporate taxes, the country today would be without the libraries and classrooms of academic institutions. If industry were throttled as a result of hysteria directed at economic growth, one can be sure that there wouldn't be any new universities.

It's sad but true: American society is being condemned for its successes -- the very successes that are the envy of other nations and peoples. If the U. S. public understands this, the "Zero Growth" movement is likely to fade into the obscurity which is its proper fate!

view and will be getting worse here before it gets better," Carney commented.

He said that he felt that adults had given kids too much and not enough responsibility. He also said that kids today don't receive the love that they need.

"Kids want to know that someone cares. Some kids have told me that their parents don't care enough about them to ever discipline them."

Next on the agenda was a film, showing how a person can become addicted to heroin. First using marijuana, then going on to hard narcotics, the character in the film became dependent on heroin and was entered in a hospital for treatment.

Ray Bradshaw, a drug addict from Cotton Center, related to the group his personal experience with the use of drugs.

He began taking paregoric following a stomach operation and became addicted. He said that the end result of this addiction was the fact that he had to report each week to Lubbock and if he is proven to be using drugs, he will be sent back behind bars for treatment.

Of the 12 returnees in the program at Lubbock, Bradshaw said that he was the only one who hadn't returned to the use of drugs.

Ninety-nine percent of the cases treated at the narcotics hospitals in Fort Worth and Lexington, Ky., return.

Bradshaw said he didn't have the answer to the drug abuse problem.

"We've got to quit judging these kids and set a better example ourselves."

"People want to help, but don't know what to do. Maybe having meetings like this, we can learn some way to help. All we can do is try."

McClure then gave a summary of the night's discussion and asked that those in attendance to express their view points to the school authorities and to the drug committee and offer any suggestions as to how to cope with this problem.

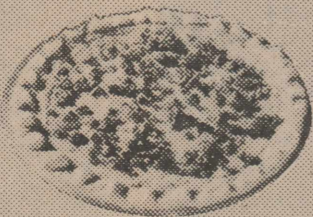

  - 1 level tsp. Dijon mustard
  - 1 tsp. dry mustard
  - 1/2 tsp. salt
  - 1/4 tsp. Cayenne pepper
  - 1/4 c. strained bacon fat
  - 1/2 c. grated Parmesan cheese
- Pour onto this mixture:
  - 2 1/4 c. scalded heavy cream

Stir well. Fill shell with mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. When custard is set, scatter 1/2 lb. crisp bacon pieces on top. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.
