ANSWERLINE

Q. Why are the "Ice on Bridge" signs up on the highways even though there is no "ice on bridge"?

A. All bridges and overpasses in Mitchell County are sporting their "Ice on Bridge" signs differently this year than in the past.

Previously the signs were posted by Texas Department of Transportation employees when icy weather was imminent and removed them from view when the bad weather ended.

This year is different. In order to get more personnel working on spreading material on bridges to increase safety, the department changed their schedule in displaying the signs.

The state is now using the State Climatologist's map to create a time frame for displaying the signs. The map provides the expected first and last days of freezing weather for every county and the Department is displaying the signs seven to fourteen days before the first freeze and the same time period for the last expected freeze.

It is expected that by leaving the signs on display throughout the icy weather will allow employees to concentrate more on roadway safety.

In Mitchell County, the signs went up prior to Nov. 9 and are scheduled to come down around April 7.

CED meeting expected to be lively

The final meeting of the year for the Mitchell County Education District will be Tuesday, December 29.

The meeting is scheduled to get underway at 7:30 p.m. at the Curriculum Room of the Administrative Center at 1132 Hickory.

Topping the agenda will be the approval of the method of Westbrook ISD's repayment of \$71,790.08 to the CED.

The apparent overpayment to Westbrook came to light in a July 30th report from the Texas Education Agency. In this report, the TEA noted there were only two ways to handle an overpayment-one was to have the school district refund the money and the other was to have the CED hold out the money in future payments.

At the August meeting when this topic was first brought up, CED member Warren Zant of Westbrook said "there is no way Westbrook is going to refund \$72,000."

Thomas Anderson, Executive Deputy Commissioner for School Support Services with the Texas Education Agency had said earlier that "Westbrook had apparently received funds from the CED in which they were not entitled to and it is perfectly in the rights of the CED to withhold these funds."

"There is no way Westbrook Schools are going to refund \$72,000!"

"The CED has two ways to recover an overpayment - either a refund from the school or to withhold the amount from future payments."

He did note that Westbrook had filed for a hearing before the TEA concerning this matter.

Sonny Hollis, superintendent of school at Westbrook said earlier this month that "as far as we are concerned, their (the CED's) authority is no longer. We have appealed the case to the Commissioner of the Texas Education Agency."

"We feel the authority is with the Commissioner or with

the courts...and the CED is totally negligent in this matter," added Hollis.

He went on to say that the only official notification he had received from the CED was a letter he received in late November and "there was no official word of any kind before that."

"I feel they are most negligent in bringing this up. If anything was going to be done about it-they should have done it before they (CED) closed the budget out last year," Hollis added.

When told that this matter would be on the agenda sometime in the month of December, Hollis said, "if that is what they're (the CED) planning-they are a shade too late."

Other items on the lengthy agenda, includes: an audit report from Joe Morren, CPA; payment of bills and approve the financial statement; approve a resolution of the 1992-93 school year for the percentage of distribution of funds back to the districts; approve the method of handling interest earned from the collector's account; approve amended guidelines for signing of checks, interest bearing accounts and operation funds and approve the method of payment for administration cost from Westbrook ISD.

For private prison

Commissioners to hear proposal

Representatives of a firm proposing to construct a private prison complex in Mitchell County will meet with the Commissioners' Court this coming Monday, Dec.

28. This called meeting of the court will begin at 9 a.m. in the county court room.

Private Prisons of America, Inc. is among many groups throughout

the country responding to the Texas Department of Corrections' request for proposal to have private firms design, finance, construct and manage a facility under a contract with the TDCJ.

Firms winning the approval of the TDCJ could be awarded one or more of the 500-bed units the TDCJ is asking for.

Expected to meet with the Court Monday is Sonny Emerson, project coordinator and Frank Powell and J.D. Williams of the firm.

Emerson and Powell have been involved in prison development plans twice before in the county-once in 1987 and again in 1990.

Emerson said this week that this meeting will simply be an information exchange and his firm "would appreciate a resolution of support from the county."

Emerson said that he had contacted William Barry, Director of Management Services with the TDCJ and asked if this proposal would be agreeable to them and would it have any negative effect on the 1,000 bed unit slated to begin construction in March. Emerson said the location and time frame was acceptable to Barry.

In Snyder last week, their economic development committee and Corrections Corporation of America agreed to submit an application to the TDCJ for a unit to be built just west of the Price Daniel Unit. The 500-bed prison they are proposing would employ 170 to 200 people and have an annual payroll of \$3 million.

Mitchell County benefits from state energy grant

People for Progress in Sweetwater has received a \$150,000 energy contract from the Governor's Energy Office to use in Mitchell, Scurry, Nolan and Fisher counties.

PPI is among eleven non-profit agencies receiving the contracts and the total state-wide is \$1.7 million.

It is designed to let the agencies weatherize the homes of low-to-moderate income citizens and to train community residents in marketable energy management skills. This money will be used to train 300 "at risk" residents in energy auditing and weatherization techniques and will weatherize 1,618 homes across the state. Facilities used by the agencies to serve their clients will also be weatherized according to the Governor's office.

PPI is required to match the dollars provided by the state. To make application to this program, call 235-2806 in Sweetwater or go by 1901 Lamar Street. You will need to bring proof of income, social security number, citizenship papers if applicable and other "award" letters.

Besides the agency in Sweetwater, non-profit groups in Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, Marshall and San Antonio are slated to receive the funds.

PPI is in the process of opening up a new day care facility here in Colorado City also.

Chamber banquet tickets on sale

Tickets for the annual Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Banquet will go on sale Monday, Dec. 28 according to Bob Reilly, banquet chairman.

The banquet is set for January 25 at the Civic Center and Speaker of the Texas House will deliver the keynote address.

Tickets are \$12.50 each and they may be purchased from several sources in the County including the Chamber office, all the banks, city hall and the courthouse and from individual board members.

Ag Dept. hit list does not include local offices

An Agriculture Department's hit list of field offices targeted for closure totals more than 1,200 but it is not expected to include the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Soil Conservation Service offices here in Colorado City.

Don Stewart, executive director of the local ASCS office said "I do not feel these offices are in any

danger of closing based on the amount of volume we do and the number of accounts we serve."

Currently, the ASCS serves over 1,600 producers from this office.

This is considered an "11" office based on volume and the highest is a "12"-such as ones in Lubbock, Dawson or Hale County.

USDA spokesman Roger Runnigen said the list, first obtained by the Associated Press, was only a draft and that USDA officials in each state were not expected to complete their recommendations on farm office closures until the end of the month.

"There could be some changes or there could be wholesale changes," Runnigen said.

But a congressional aide said the list represented the field offices that USDA and the White House Office of Management and Budget believed should be shut down or merged.

"These are the recommendations for closure, unless a state director can make a compelling case for keeping one open," said the aide, speaking only on condition of anonymity.

The decision to target an office was based on several factors, including overhead costs, the number of farmers and the size of the region served.

Agencies with offices at stake are the Soil Conservation Service, the Farmers Home Administration and the ASCS.

Colorado City at one time had a FmHA office but it was combined with the Sweetwater office.

The Snyder area is served by an office in Rotan.

"This is not the first time this has been done," said Stewart. "They have closed and combined offices before such as Brewster and Terrell in far West Texas and Coke and Sterling a little closer to home."

Locally, the ASCS office employs six people.

Unemployment rate stands at 8.1 percent

The county's unemployment rate increased slightly-up to 8.1 percent for the month of November.

According to figures from the Texas Employment Commission, 3,473 people were employed in Mitchell County in Nov, while 308 were looking for employment.

Construction of the 1,000 bed prison should start early this spring and the rate should take a drastic drop. Construction on the water and sewer lines should start this next week and contractors have stated that up to ten local people could be employed on this first phase of the project.

Hours will be from 9 a.m. till 4:30 p.m.

Applications may be made for children from birth to school age.

Twenty-six year olds no longer eligible for induction

Young men who will turn 26 in 1993 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on January 1, 1993, men who were born in 1967 and were required to register with Selective Service in 1985, will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstituted. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service officials warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs such as federal student aid, job training and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

Men ages 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of eligibility by registering promptly

at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison or both.

A man is exempt from registering while he is on full-time active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces. Cadets and midshipmen at the service academies are included in the exemption. Members of the National Guard and Reserve Forces not on full-time active duty must register unless they have reached age 26 or are already registered.

Those who are unable to register due to circumstances beyond their control - for example, those who are hospitalized, institutionalized or incarcerated - do not have to register until they are released. After release, they have 30 days in which to register. Handicapped men who live at home must register if they are reasonably able to leave the home and go into a public place. A friend or relative may help a handicapped man to fill out the form if he is unable to do so by himself.

Perry Ellwood

Perry Ellwood was born to Margery and I.L. Ellwood, II in San Angelo, Texas in 1935. His early years were spent growing up in the rock house on Renderbrook-Spade, the family ranch. He loved the freedom and space and the camaraderie of the cowboys, even though it could sometimes be lonely for a little boy.

He remembered climbing up onto the roof of the rock house when friends such as Bobby Richardson or Gaye and Connie Ainsworth, and others would be coming out to visit. He would watch for the dust trail, and know that they were on their way.

When Perry's Grandfather, Erwin Perry Ellwood, died in 1945, I.L., Marge and Perry moved across the road to Ellwood-Spade Ranch. Perry married Annie in the ranch house where they still live today.

E. P. Ellwood, Perry's Grandfather, was the second son of I. L. Ellwood, I, who lived in DeKalb, Illinois where he was the owner of a hardware store; but he was also a far-sighted man and somewhat of an inventor. He became known as one of the pioneers in "taming the

West" by his designing and mostly manufacturing of barbed wire. Due to the popularity of barbed wire, I.L. Ellwood, I, decided to ago to Texas and see for himself. He invested in the land and his eldest

son, W.L. Ellwood stayed in Texas to organize the ranching interests of the family. E. P. Ellwood, a banker, remained in Illinois where he managed the business side of the Ellwood interests.

If Perry's Great-Grandfather was a pioneer of change, then it can be said that Perry R. Ellwood was a pioneer of space and time. I think he still holds the record for how fast one can get from the ranch to town in a four-wheeled vehicle. Perry was an impatient, demanding man, but also very giving to his family and close friends. He was always in a hurry, so it seems fitting that at the age of 57, Perry has gone on to a new and different dimension.

The Family of Perry would like to invite all his friends and other family members to remember old times at a reception to be held at the West Texas Museum, in Colorado City at 2 p.m. on December 28, 1992.

1993 TEC tax rates announced

"Texas employers can breathe a sigh of relief because their tax rates are not going to escalate significantly," TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said today as the Texas Employment Commission released tax rates for 1993.

"This has been a trying year. The state's economic woes have caused thousands of businesses to downsize and the result has been massive layoffs throughout Texas. Employment prospects have been so bleak that unemployment benefits have been extended on an emergency basis numerous times. These factors have greatly concerned Texas employers about their 1993 TEX tax rates," Nabers said.

The maximum rate that could apply to any Texas employer in 1993 will be 6.35 percent according to Nabers. That is up only slightly from last year's maximum rate of 6.30 percent. The lowest rate any business will experience in 1993 will be .35 percent, up from .30 percent in 1992. The new rates become effective January 1, 1993.

Employers should begin receiving their individual tax rate notices the second week of February. Payment will be due for the first quarter of 1993 in April.

"Employers in Texas pay taxes for every employee's first \$9,000 in wages. Depending on an employer's tax rate, that amount could vary from a low of \$31.50 per person to a high of \$571.50 per person," Nabers said. There are more than 333,000 tax-paying employers in Texas.

The Texas Employment Commission administers the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act and provides services to both employers and employees statewide.

Hunting Accidents. They occur as a result of poor hunter judgement, careless handling or illegal practices. The most common is hunter judgement mistakes. A dove hunter swings out of his safe zone of fire, a turkey hunter mistakes a turkey caller for the real thing or a deer hunter making "sound shots" or simply shooting at any movement. The second most common accident is careless gun handling. Unsafe loading and unloading, pointing the muzzle in an unsafe direction and placing a loaded gun in or out of a vehicle...and the list goes on.

While some hunting accidents are fatal and some are not, they are all serious. In Mitchell County alone, we've had 3 in the last 12 months, 2 being near-fatal. In all three cases the gun was accidentally discharged inside the vehicle.

Across the state last year there were 81 accidents, 13 being fatal. Three fatalities were from hunters making "sound or movement" shots. Three more were mistaken for game and two others were a result of carelessly passing a loaded gun. In another case a loaded rifle was placed on the rear seat of the vehicle. Upon closing the door, the rifle butt was struck, causing it to discharge towards the victim standing on the other side of the vehicle. Also a victim pulled a loaded gun towards himself from

within a vehicle. The safety mechanism had been altered. In two other instances victims were entering and descending their blinds and accidentally shot and killed themselves. Lastly, a 55 year old woman was hunting in a stand when she was struck by a bullet fired from 450 yards away by a shooter who did not determine a safe background behind the deer.

Not a laughing matter, but there was one humorous incident that was non-fatal. A man and his grandson were hunting deer, they crossed the same trail yards apart, when the grandson fired and hit his grandfather. The man was shot in the lower buttocks and the bullet exited the front. OUCH!!

Now, what's the answer to this problem? Well part of the answer is the Texas Hunter Education Course, a course which was started in 1972 and became mandatory in 1988. Effective September 1, 1993 all persons born on or after September 2, 1971 must have passed the course to hunt in Texas. The only exemption is that hunters under 17 (that is not certified) must be accompanied by a licensed adult.

This course is a minimum 10 hours 2 day in depth course taught by Game Wardens, Volunteers and some school districts. Mr. Ray Ellis does an exceptional job teaching it at Colorado City High School. The course covers a broad range of subjects from gun safety,

survival, first aid, wildlife, game care, responsibility and sportsmanship, to name a few.

But even if you never attend a course, at least remember these three cardinal rules; be sure of your target, know where the muzzle is pointing at all times and treat all guns as if they're loaded.

Everything you see and hear in the woods should be considered a human until there's absolutely no doubt!

As responsible hunters we should police each other. Let your

friends or hunting companions know the instant they are unsafe or careless with their firearms. It is advice which may save their life or yours!

A big "thank you" to Perry's Guns for donating ammo and shooting glasses to our annual Game Warden Association Youth Hunt held in Nolan county. Thirteen underprivileged orphans and their sponsors (guides) harvested a total of 23 deer. A great time and learning experience was had by all.

Gramm calls for Texans to take special care

Alcohol-related driving deaths have declined steadily since 1982, according to U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who called for Texans to take special care on the highways during the holiday season.

"According to a nationwide study by the Center for Disease Control, drunk driving fatalities are declining and that's great news," Gramm said.

"But with the approach of New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, the two days each year which generate more drunk-driving deaths and injuries than any others, the time has come to take special care," he said.

Gramm and police officers from across Texas and Mothers Against Drunk Driving this year are repeating the successful public education campaign against drunk driving that they have staged annually.

The senator noted that while fatality rates are down nationwide and "while everybody can be proud of the progress that has been made, drunken driving remains a tragedy and a crime."

"Ultimately, the responsibility for stopping this menace falls to each of us as individuals," Gramm said.

Fire tips given to insure your safety

To help insure the safety of your family and your home, follow these fire safety tips from the experts at Actua:

TEXAS ANGLER

Winter time is when many non-boating Texas anglers are successful filling their stringers with easy limits of rainbow trout. The Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department stock numerous Texas rivers with hatchery raised trout this time of year. These trout are easy to catch and very plentiful immediately after the stocking.

Rainbow trout are not native to Texas rivers. They are a put and take fish. They will not reproduce in our waters and the fish that are caught have all been placed there by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Stockings for these tasty little fish are made on scheduled times. To determine when and where they will be stocked, you can contact the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. You should be aware that you need a Texas fishing license, and a freshwater trout stamp in order to be legal. And believe me, the game wardens will check you. Trout stamps cost \$7.00 each and the money generated from stamp sales goes directly to the cost of raising and stocking the fish.

One of the most popular areas in Texas for rainbows is the Guadalupe River below the Canyon Lake Dam. The water temperature is cold and it is a perfect habitat. Along the river are many private camps that will allow you access to the river for a nominal fee.

My wife, Debbie, and I decided we'd fish at Whitewater Sports located several miles down from the Dam. Tagging along with us on the trip was award winning journalist Pat Patton. Patton said the previous day's fishing (right after the stocking below Canyon Dam) produced some excellent artificial lure action. However, we found out that Whitewater Sports was one of the locations the trout had been dropped in the river, so we headed there.

According to Eddie Martin and Ellen of Whitewater Sports, the action had been excellent with virtually every fisherman catching an easy limit. They suggested we try an area about 300 yards up river from Highway 306. This private camping area is clean, lined with huge cypress trees, picnic tables, rest rooms, and on a good day, some eager biting fish.

Patton tried small spinners and meal worms, with no success. I baited Debbie up with an ultra light spinning outfit and cheese under a bobber and split shot sinker. Almost immediately she got a bite, then another and another. Meanwhile, I quickly got rigged up and started catching my share. Light line, 4 to 6 pound test, a high gear ratio spinning reel and light action rod should be used for river fishing. Our best results came from casting the cheese upstream, allowing the bobber to carry the cheese down. Once the bait gets downstream from you, reel it in and throw out again. The strikes were easy to detect, but occasionally difficult to set the hook because of

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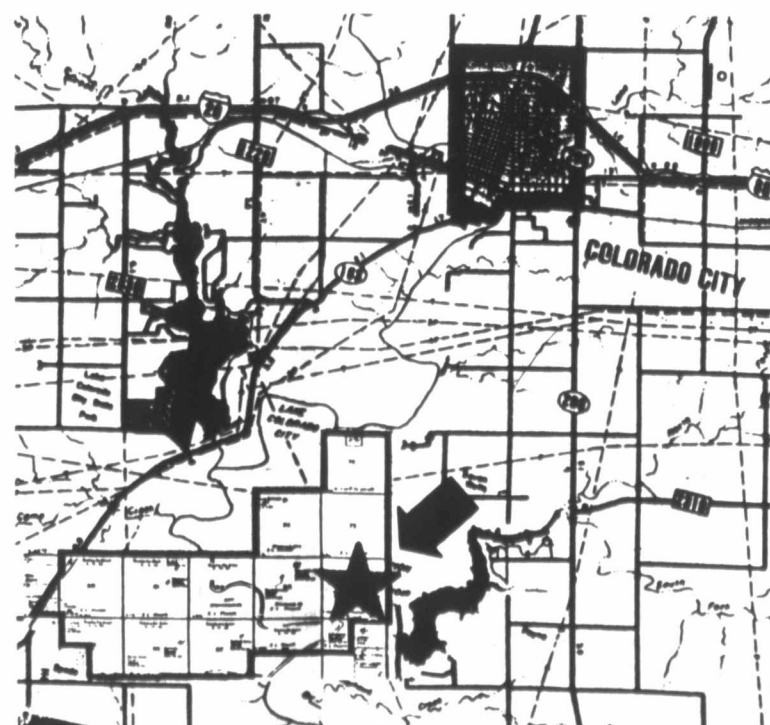

The nominees will now be contacted by the academies with additional information and instructions, and will be scheduled for medical and physical examinations. The academies will make appointment announcements by late spring.

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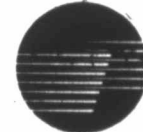
