Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Levrett-Steele Funeral Chapel for Sam Whitaker of Paris, who died Saturday at 7:45 p. m. at a Paris Hospital. Interment was made in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mr. Whitaker was the father of Doyle Whitaker, Deport rural mail carrier. Other survivors are his wife, the former Hallie Bow, whom he married in 1942; a son, Earl Whitaker, four daughters, Mrs. A. A. Treichler, Mrs. Ruth Ford, all of Greenville, Mrs. G. E. Thomas of Wills Point, and Mrs. J. L. Hilton of Wolfe City; one sister, Mrs. Ben Allen of Pasadena and 18 grandchildren.

Until recent illness Whitaker was director of the Boys' Club. For 12 years he coached city teams, including the American Legion team, East Paris in the Boys' Club league and was one of the charter coaches in Little League baseball and later coached in the Pony League. A post employee for 46 years, he was a rural carrier for 12 years, coming to Paris from Overton in 1940.

His parents were Clark M. and Vera (Terpin) Whitaker. He was born June 8, 1903 at Garden Valley, Texas.

He was honored recently as Optimist Man of the Year 1969.

Census Count Is Started April 1

Wednesday, April 1 was Census Day for the United States of America. From Aroostook County, Maine, to Niihau, the westernmost island of Hawaii; from Point Barrow, Alaska, to the Arctic Ocean to Key West, Florida, is was the day for all Americans to be counted.

Chuck Williams, Manager of the temporary census office in Longview, reports that 466 census takers, after being sworn in Wednesday morning, started visiting households throughout the following counties: Bowie, Camp, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Gregg, Harrison, Hopkins, Lamar, Marion, Morris, Panola, Red River, Rusk, Shelby, Titus, Upshur and Wood.

Census questionnaires were distributed to households in these places by the Post Office a few days ago. They are to be filled out and held for the census taker to pick up. The District Manager says it will probably take from three to five weeks for the census takers to get around to all the households.

It is possible that some households did not receive a questionnaire, but the District Manager says they need not fear they will be missed because a census taker will find them and have a questionnaire for them.

Rep. Pickle Asks Funds for Sewers

Washington. — Rep. J. J. Pickle of Austin has urged President Nixon to release \$22 million which has been appropriated for small town water and sewage plan development.

Declaring that pollution is not restricted to big cities, Pickle said in a letter to Nixon, "It is not enough to say we are going to stop pollution; we must put money into the program."

The Farmers Home Administration is designated to administer the funds which were appropriated to assist communities under 5,500 in population to develop comprehensive water and sewage plans, he explained.

Oct. 1, 1971, is the deadline for small cities to complete their sewage and water plans.

"It takes about 18 months to complete a comprehensive plan and this is all the more reason for the administration to release these funds now," Pickle said.

He said that more than one half the 130 communities in his 10th congressional district are under the 5,500 population figure and need financial assistance.

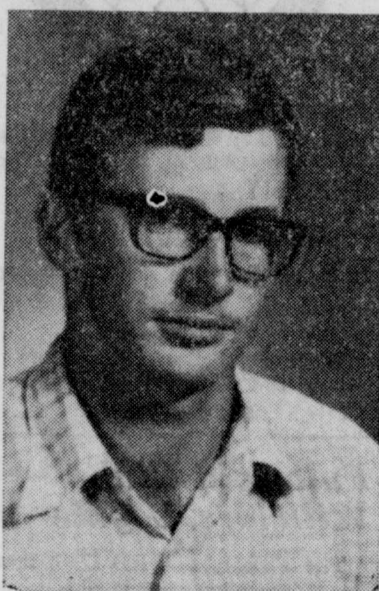

Austin. — New programs are in the works for job training and computerizing data on the industrial advantages offered by Texas communities.

Texas Industrial Commission announced its computer project will go into operation this summer with completion of data storage on cities across the state. Texas Municipal League, Chambers of Commerce and industrial developers are cooperating.

Commission plans to provide prospective industries with instant information on every town in Texas, listing natural and human resources available, economic potential and strong points in each place.

Program also is designed to show communities which industries most likely would be interested in their attractions.

Meanwhile, a three-year project to develop industry's ability to determine what training is needed and where was announced at the Governor's Conference on Technical - Vocational Education here.

Construction Industry Council for Education, Manpower and Research will receive \$90,000 from Texas Education Agency to help other industries plan training based on families, occupations or employment. Council will use the system to develop an environmental technology program expected to enroll between 9,000 and 10,000 students in 1972.

Students will get an introduction to the industries in the ninth grade, study plumbing basics in the tenth grade, heating and cooling in the eleventh. In their senior year, they will select jobs for part-time supervised training.

After high school, they can go directly to work in a trade or take advanced training in technology or engineering. Industry and education agencies cooperate in offering the training.

AIR BOARD - AG CLASH — Texas Air Control Board has accused the attorney general's office of demanding too much evidence before it will take pollution cases to court.

"You shouldn't have to kill anybody to get prosecution," emphasized Dr. Wendell H. Hambrick, Houston member of the Board. "I don't see how we can ever get any prosecution under conditions set out by the attorney general."

Protest broke open a long-standing conflict between the Board and state lawyers over how much evidence is necessary to support filing of air pollution violations against industries. It was provoked by an Austin furniture plant case, where the Attorney General declined to take action for lack of sufficient evidence.

Attorney General's representative said the Board's stringent regulations present the problem of proving danger to public health and welfare.

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court held that witnesses cannot be forced to present certain types of records when they are sought only to challenge their own testimony.

Fred Williams of Houston, candidate for land commissioner, has asked the Supreme Court to force Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler to make public a list of 43,000 voters who have state veteran land loans.

AG RULES — Out-of-state liquor may be used to stock airliners in Texas without paying any state tax unless the alcoholic beverages are sold while the plane is over Texas, says Attorney General Martin.

In another recent opinion, Martin held that the Sunnyvale Town Council, Dallas County, cannot act in the capacity of a school board for Sunnyvale Independent School District.

TB TEST REINSTATED — Tuberculosis tests have been reinstated at all border ports of entry for cattle imported from Mexico, reports the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Action was taken under terms of a Travis County district court order enjoining the commission from permitting entry into Texas of cattle from Mexico in violation of health regulations. Associated Milk Producers of Texas filed the suit.

Early this year the Health Commission put TB testing requirements into effect on the border but suspended them two weeks later at the request of Governor Smith pending a hearing in El Paso on objections to the order. Commission decided to exempt steers and spayed heifers after the hearing. Issue will be aired at an April 6 agency meeting here.

REGISTRATION LEADERS NAMED — Loving and Roberts Counties registered the highest percentage of voters in the small-county category. Loving county scored 258.3 per cent and Roberts county 232.4 per cent. Quotas were fixed by the State Democratic Executive Committee. Throckmorton County came in third in the same class.

Next group, population wise, was led by Rains County, followed closely by Stonewall, Strickland, Bandera, Zapata, Menard, Wickens, Mills, Coke, and Jim Hogg.

SHORT SNORTS National Aeronautics and Space Administration will provide the state data from its aircraft and satellites to deal with pollution problems and natural resource preservation.

An Office of Child Development grant of \$96,014 has been approved for Robertson County, Hearne, economic opportunities advancement unit.

No cases of psoroptic scabies were reported in Texas in February, according to the latest report of the State Animal Health Commission, but animal health officials started a complete inspection of feedlots in Castro County, where the state's last outbreak of the disease occurred in December.

Governor Smith urged the newly organized Mass Transportation Commission to pay special attention to the needs of the old, poor and handicapped who are not able to drive.

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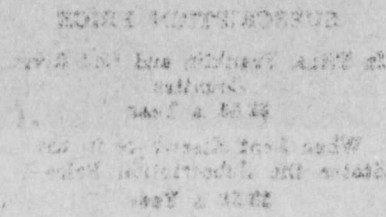
