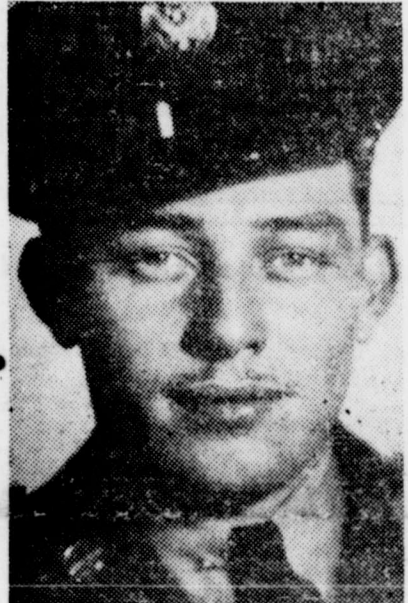

Oral began army training early in 1941 and was stationed at Seattle, Wash., before going to Pearl Harbor where he experienced the sneak attack on Dec. 7. When the publisher, J. C. Hurst, gave the order to send the Review free of charge to all men and women in the armed forces from here, we started with a mailing list of about 50—that was in April, 1942. The Review is now going to over 300 servicemen and women all over the world where Allied troops are stationed.

The Review staff, with the assistance of Ruby Joe Merritt, devotes many hours each week to making address changes, typing the addresses on individual wrappers in which the papers are mailed, printing the extra copies, folding them and wrapping them from mailing.
The ones who do this work thoroughly enjoy it when they know the Review is leaving here with the correct address. But those copies going out with the wrong address add up to wasted effort, because they are consigned to the wastebasket in some army or navy post office. And, last, but not least, the soldier, marine or sailor for whom the Review was intended, fails to receive his copy.

During the next seven days, from June 1-7, we plan to check every address card in our mailing files for servicemen and women. If you have a son, daughter, brother, sister, husband or friend in the service, please bring or mail to us his or her correct address. — Thanks.

WHEAT LOAN TO AVERAGE \$1.28

Wheat loans that will average \$1.28 a bushel at the farm will be made on the 1944 crop by the Commodity Credit Corporation of WFA. The average last year was \$1.23. Loans will vary from the basic national rate of \$1.28 to take into account location, grade and quality. Loans on farm-stored wheat will mature on demand, but not later than April 30, 1945. Any loan may be liquidated by payment in full, plus 3% interest, from date of note. Loans will be administered in counties by County Agricultural Adjustment Agency Committees under supervision of state committees.

NEW FIRE CHIEF ASKS CO-OPERATION

Marvin Struve, who recently was elected chief of Abernathy volunteer fire department, succeeding Dick Hughes, seeks the co-operation of all residents who use city water. The co-operation he asks is for every city water customer to shut off all hydrants when the fire alarm sounds. During the summer when water consumption is heavy, low water pressure would hamper the department in bringing fires under control. Even though the tank was full, pressure would be low if numerous outlets were open on the line leading to the fire plug to be used, it was explained.

RATIONING CALENDAR

On June 1 all B-2 and C-2 gasoline rations will become invalid for consumer use, OPA states. Motorists holding B-2 and C-2 rations which do not expire until after June 1 can present the coupons to the ration boards and exchange them for valid ones of equal value.

Meats, Fats: Red stamps A8 thru T8 in book 4, good indefinitely for 10 points each. On June 4, US, V8 & W8 become valid and are good indefinitely.

Processed Foods: Blue stamps A8 thru V8 in book 4, good for 10 points each are valid indefinitely.

Shoes: Airplane stamps 1 & 2 in book 3, good for one pair each indefinitely.

Sugar, Stamps 30 & 31, book 4 are good for 5 lbs. indefinitely.

Stamp No. 40 in book 4 is good for 5 lbs. of canned sugar through Feb. 28, 1945.

Gasoline—A-11 coupons good for 3 gals. ea. thru June 21.

The \$5 auto use tax stamps for the coming year will go on sale June 10 in postoffices. These will cover the tax for the fiscal year beginning July 1, and must be displayed on windshields after that date.

Dear Buford: Do I feel good! Plenty of sleep, lots to eat and a show every night. Good clothes to wear and a pack to carry. What a life! — Come in, the water's fine. L. H. Haley, S2c. (He's with the navy somewhere in the Pacific.)

Dear Buford: I have received two copies of the Review and surely was glad to get them. I have missed the last two copies. Say, tell the boys to get the Home Guard going again. The drill practice I received in the Guard surely helped me here. It has kept me off the awkward squad so far. Some of the boys have a lot of trouble learning. It is a lot easier to learn at a Guard drill than it is here. It's time for mail call, so I'd better close and make it. Lots of luck. Pvt. Robt. L. Parsons, 385th MAM Co., Camp McCain, Miss.

Hello, Buford: How is everything in Abernathy. I finished Ordnance school at Norman, Okla., and was sent to Norfolk, Va., to an advanced ordnance school. I've been getting the Review regularly, and real-

ly appreciate it. I have seen two of the boys from Abernathy since I have been in the navy. When I was in California, I read the Review and saw that Amos Miller was stationed about three miles from me so I contacted him and when I went to Norman, Dale Price looked me up there. Dear Folks and Friends: Time marches on. We do not know what will happen from day to day. We all know that we have a great task to perform. A great change in life can take place overnight. Yes, it surely can. Only four months ago a change came into my life. That was joining the U. S. Marine Corps. Of course, there was a task for me to perform. Each and everyone of us has a task to perform. My task was to leave home, leave my folks and friends, some of which I know I will not see any more. During my life in the service which has not been so long as I have already told you, I never dreamed of being so far away from home. But, I know the Lord is willing to help you if you

need help. You will change a lot when you come into the service, at least I did. You think of the past life—how you lived, then you start to think that the cause of the war was brought about by how the people were living—and it surely is. That is when you start to praying. For a long time I did not pray, but I can say now that 'most every night before I go to sleep, I say a prayer. — You people at home don't really know how much it means to go to church. 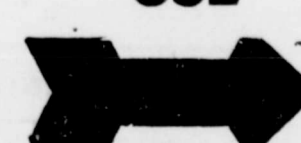
