

\$200,000 road bond vote in Precinct 1 set for Sept. 5

The Garza County commissioners' court has called a \$200,000 road bond election for Saturday, Sept. 5, in Commissioners' Precinct No. 1.

Part of the bond issue would be used as the county's part in purchasing right-of-way for the four-lane widening of U. S. Highway 84 from the top of the caprock to the Lynn County line near Southland, a distance of about 13 miles.

Bond money not used in purchase of the right-of-way would be used to improve county roads and city streets inside Precinct 1 and also for farm-to-market road construction within the precinct.

Commissioner Racy Robinson said the bond election was called following a public hearing Friday on a petition asking that the commissioners' order such an election.

Robinson said that the state will reimburse the county for one-half of its expense in acquiring the U. S. Highway 84 right-of-way. He said he could not venture an estimate on what the cost would be until after appraisals are made.

Also included in the proposition for issuance of bonds when Precinct 1 voters go to the polls Sept. 5 will be one for the "levying of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof."

Robinson said the proposed tax rate on the bond issue is 30 cents per \$100 property valuation and that plans are to retire the bonds in "about 13 years" at 5 per cent interest.

With an assessed valuation of \$6,519,443, Robinson said he and the other commissioners feel that Precinct 1 is in a good enough financial shape to float such a bond issue as the one proposed.

The Precinct 1 commissioner also pointed out that the precinct he represents has never had a road bond debt against it. Road bonds have been voted in the other three commissioners' precinct within the last few years.

Residents of Precinct 1 who have paid their poll tax and who own real or personal property which is on the tax rolls will be eligible to vote in the bond election. The bond issue will require a two-thirds majority of those voting to carry.

Voting places will be at Antelope Alley (old band hall) in Post, schoolhouse at Southland, schoolhouse at Close City and Baptist church at Pleasant Valley.

Presiding judges will be W. L. Crider, Post; Sam Ellis, Southland; L. H. Peel, Close City and Henry Wheatley, Pleasant Valley.

Trustees vote to accept plans on new high school

The board of trustees of Post Independent School District will open construction bids on the new high school building at 2 p. m. Sept. 9, Supt. R. T. Smith announced today following a board lunch meeting Tuesday.

The trustees set the bid-opening date after voting to accept the architects' final plans on the new building. Meeting with the board were two representatives of the Lubbock architectural firm of Atchison, Atkinson & Cartwright.

The only major change in the architects' plans, Smith said, is a decision by the board to use forced air instead of steam heat in the new building.

This change, the superintendent explained, makes it possible to do away with the space intended for a boiler room and use it instead for an additional classroom.

Smith said plans and specifications for the new high school will be mailed Monday to prospective bidders.

The board Tuesday also voted to employ Charles Hopkins as industrial arts teacher in the high school. He has had seven years experience in a woodworking shop and is completing work at North Texas State College on his master's degree in industrial arts.

The new teacher, his wife and daughter will move to Post about Aug. 25, Smith said.

Material arriving for mail delivery

Equipment necessary to institute city mail delivery has started arriving at the post office here, Assistant Postmaster O. V. McMahon said today.

"A definite date for starting city delivery will be set as soon as all the equipment is in," McMahon said.

The Post Office Department approved Post's request for city mail delivery several weeks ago.

Meanwhile, progress is reported on a City of Post project to get all unnumbered houses numbered before the mail delivery service starts.

Almon Martin is doing the house numbering for the city—putting up house numbers for 50 cents a set. Folks are not home at many houses where he calls to see about putting up the numbers. Since time is too short for "back-tracking," Martin asks folks who were not home when he called and who want house numbers to telephone him at 746 and leave their name and address.

City Supt. Henry Tate said this morning that unless water users immediately adopt conservation measures, the city may be out of water by Saturday night.

The threatened shortage has been building up for several days, but reached its peak Tuesday

when 1,335,000 gallons of water were used.

"That is 85,000 gallons a day more than we can put in the reservoir," Tate said.

It is believed to have set a new record for water use here over a 24-hour period.

Tate asks that water users guard against wasting water in air-conditioners and in watering lawns.

"Unless the people cooperate with us by conserving water, we just won't have any by Saturday night," the city superintendent said.

"We may get a break in the weather soon, but until we do, it is going to take water-saving measures to keep us from running out," he concluded.

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City council votes 'no assurance' on closing of street

The Post city council voted Monday night to advise the school board that it cannot at this time offer any assurance that the city will close one block on West Fifth Street, as requested by the school board.

Agreeing that a letter from the school board asking that the street be closed was "a pretty big request," the council and Mayor Powell Shytle said the city's water and sewage systems would be involved in closing the street, and that a number of property owners have registered protests against such a move since the school board announced last month that such a request would be made.

The mayor read a letter from the school board in which the city was told that it is not necessary to close the street at this time, but that the school board was requesting that it be closed when the need arises.

The block in question is between Blocks 127 and 140, just north of the new high school building site.

The mayor pointed out that West Fifth is the only through street in that area from the west part of town to across the railroad tracks and that many of those using it are people who work at the Post Mills.

The city council's action on the street-closing request came at its regular monthly meeting.

Officers arrest window peeper

Officers here caught a window peeper early Sunday morning.

Lincoln B. Simmons, about 35, who recently was released from prison after serving time on a check law violation conviction, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Red Floyd, City Marshal Otis G. Shepherd Jr. and Special Deputy Buford Finchum in the north part of town.

Deputy Floyd said a woman called radio dispatcher Byron Haynie not long after midnight Saturday to report that a man was peeping in a neighbor's window. The dispatcher relayed the message to officers, who received it while on their way to town from the rodeo arena.

The deputy said they arrested Simmons, who is a Negro, after he and Finchum blocked one end of the street and the city marshal the other end in their automobiles.

Simmons has been charged with attempted break-in and his bond set at \$750.

'Boiling down' the garbage ordinance

Except in a few isolated instances, it hasn't yet reached the explosive stage, but the City of Post's new garbage ordinance is proving just about the most controversial measure ever enacted here.

There are, of course, a few people who understand all the provisions of the new garbage ordinance and still don't like it. But many of those doing the most criticizing of city officials are doing so through a sense of frustration over not thoroughly understanding the ordinance. Perhaps they haven't read the measure in its entirety, or if they have, perhaps they still don't understand it—which in itself is understandable because the ordinance is a long one and contains enough provisions to lose many of us at the first left turn.

There is no doubt that the city—which is you and you and you, as well as us—stood in need of such an ordinance and will be able to do a much better job of garbage collection and disposal than was the case before it was enacted. It will require the people's cooperation though, and that "commodity" isn't going to be anywhere near 100 per cent available as long as there are so many of us who don't understand what we're supposed to do to comply with the ordinance. For that reason, we've decided to see if we can help matters any by wading back through the 2,968-word ordinance and outlining some of the things that seem to be troubling people the most. At the risk of having overlooked the very thing you're most in a tangle about, here is our brief outline of what we consider some of the more

important points:

1. Garbage cans not less than 5 nor more than 32-gallon capacity, with tight-fitting metal lids.

2. Cans to be placed inside property line at edge of alley. If there is an alley fence, cans to be placed against outside of fence. If there is no alley, cans to be placed in front of property between sidewalk and curb at place most accessible to collectors.

3. For business places, same type of cans, or receptacles to be placed in alleys; if there is no alley, to be placed on or near curb line. Boxes and cartons to be broken down and tied into bundles not exceeding 75 pounds in weight.

4. Total weight of garbage can and contents not to exceed 75 pounds. Trash and rubbish that cannot be put in receptacle, prepared in units or pieces under 75 pounds weight, and placed at most accessible point for collection and removal. Tree limbs, shrubs and hedge cuttings not to exceed 5 feet in length, prepared in units or bundles not exceeding 75 pounds in weight and placed at most accessible point for collection and removal.

5. No trash or garbage to be burned.

6. Trash or garbage mixed with water and liquids to be drained, well-wrapped in paper or other combustible material and deposited in can.

7. Contents of all cans and receptacles to be protected so wind cannot blow out and scatter.

8. All complaints to be made by telephoning City Hall—134—including name and correct address in complaint. No ruckus raising with workmen concerning garbage collection.—CD.

Agent gives tips on preservation of food supplies

By JESSIE PEARCE

Food preservation activities will be going on in most homes within the next few days. Before you start the preservation of the family's food supply for the next year, check your stock on hand, determine how much you need to preserve this year, be sure your equipment is in good working order, and that you have a supply of preservation needs on hand.

In freezing food, vegetables that go in the freezer must be blanched if you expect them to retain their fresh garden flavor. The shortest time possible from garden to freezer will give the best frozen, or canned, product. And never expect the product to be better after preservation than it was in the fresh state. Top quality fruits and vegetables are the only ones that will yield top quality frozen or canned ones.

Foods that are stored in the freezer must be sealed so that they are moisture and air tight. If you use plastic bags, they should be protected by cardboard boxes to prevent puncturing of the bags while in the freezer. The boxes also make the packages uniform in shape so that they store more easily and take up less room. When using plastic bags that have been used before, test them by blowing them up to see that there are no holes in them. Be sure to seal them tightly so that the moisture cannot escape and air enter the package. Freeze them quickly and store them below 0 degrees F. for long-time storage.

In getting ready to can, one of the items that needs checking is the gauge on your pressure cooker. There is a test gauge in the office that you may borrow to test your gauge, or I will test it for you if you will bring the cooker in to me. Check the gasket on your canner, if it is the type that has a gasket, and replace it if it is hard and worn, or lets steam escape.

Follow recommended procedures for freezing and canning. I have bulletins on the subject that give directions for all types of fruits and vegetables. If you would like one of the bulletins on canning, freezing, jelly and preserves, or pickles and relishes, just come by the office, call or write me. I will be glad to send you a copy.

Home preservation of the family food supply can assure you of an adequate diet for the family with a decreased food bill. Plan now to make the most of the vegetables and fruit available.

agriculture, an advanced equitation school in Germany, as well as the Swedish University of Agriculture, where she is presently studying. And all that in her 28 years! After she finishes her schooling, which will be soon after she returns home from her American trip, she plans either to teach or to work on a farm paper.

SHE HAS HAD farm practice on different Swedish farms, took part in a milk marketing survey in 1956, and is at present press agent for the University of Agriculture.

Miss Larn's father is managing editor of the evening edition of a daily newspaper in Goteborg, which is a city of about 400,000 population.

In her native Sweden, Miss Larn was a Girl Scout, treasurer of a sports organization, member of the student government body at her high school, secretary and president of the equitation club and treasurer of the international committee of the student body at the University of Agriculture.

Her hobbies include photography, sketching and arts, cooking and housekeeping and Swedish folk dances. Friday night, she will be a guest of Dr. and Mrs. B. E. Young at a camera club meeting in Lubbock.

Miss Larn says her first impressions of the United States are "wonderful." She has been looking forward to visiting a large cattle ranch while here and has been promised that that opportunity will be hers before she leaves Post.

SOON AFTER arriving in Slaton she attended the Post Stampede Rodeo, held early in July, and says she thoroughly enjoyed it. It was the first rodeo she'd ever seen.

"We don't have anything in Sweden even remotely resembling your rodeos," Miss Larn said.

Miss Larn expressed surprise at the fact that more foreign language study is not required in American high schools. In Sweden, she said, students in elementary and high schools are required to study English, French and German, with Latin being an optional study. She has had nine years of English, five each of French and German and four of Latin.

"We in Sweden feel that by studying the languages of other countries, you not only learn to discourse in them, but you also learn of the customs of the people of those countries whose languages you are studying," she said.

MISS LARN is enthusiastic on the subject of automobiles. She owns a Volkswagen and her parents drive a Volvo, which is a Swedish-made car.

"Because of the high price tags attached, there are relatively few American-made cars in Sweden," she said. "Because of their size, it is also harder to find parking places for them."

The main advantage of her Volkswagen, she said, is that it does not use water, therefore presents no freezing problem in Sweden's severe winters.

THE BICYCLE is also a popular means of transportation in Sweden, according to the visitor. Since children aren't allowed to drive automobiles until they are 18, most of them ride bicycles to school.

As the daughter of the managing editor of a daily newspaper, Miss Larn is especially proud of the fact that the Swedish press boasts of having the oldest legally protected guarantees of press freedom in the world. The present law definitely forbids government censorship even in wartime.

Miss Larn says she has enjoyed a variety of American foods since arriving in this country. "I'm especially fond of your watermelon, which I had never eaten before," she said. "We have cantaloupes in Sweden, but no watermelons."

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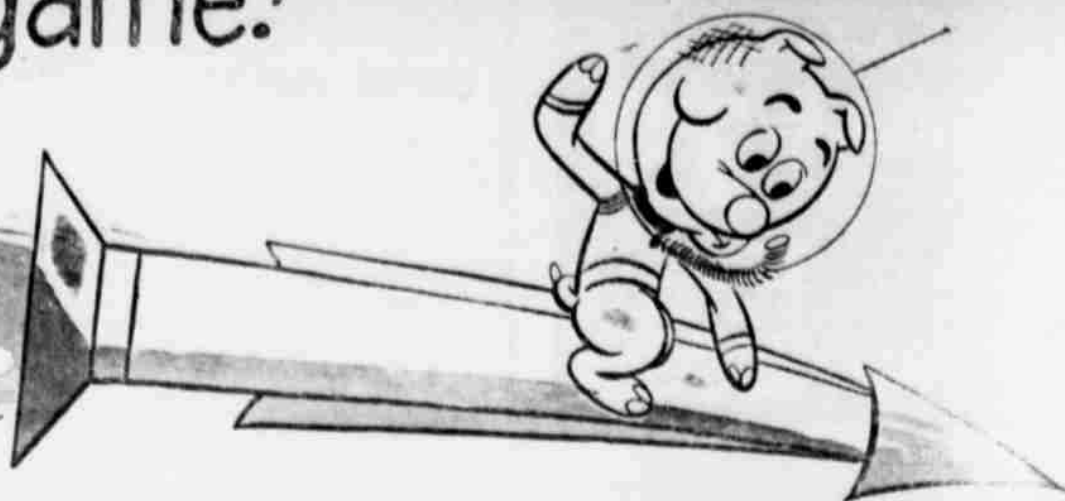
