Health Nurse Proposed For Dawson County

Dr. J. C. Loveless, Lamesa physician and County Health Officer, addressed the Lamesa Luncheon Club, Tuesday at noon on the subject of health. He mentioned the recent developments in researches which have made it possible to almost eradicate diphtheria, certain type of blood poisoning and the development in human knowledge concerning cancer. He called attention to the care exercised by citizens and officials of government in producing crops and livestock and caring for these and at the same time paying so little attention to the well-being of children and the general health of the people of the community.

The subject of a county Health Nurse for Dawson County was made a part of the discussion. A nurse can be obtained by the citizens of Dawson County paying one half the expense the State of Texas assuming the remainder. The duties of the nurse would be numerous, including, visiting schools and lecturing on health topics, co-operating with teachers and others in preventing the spread of contagious diseases, advising parents and others on the proper care of the sick, co-operating with physicians and health officials in spreading the gospel of disease prevention and enabling children to become immune to ailments which are costly, painful, and often fatal.

It developed that school officials are expected to carry on health programs in the respective school districts and this item is one of the budget questions for trustees to decide in the month of August. The County Commissioners Court, with the consent of the people, are enabled by law to spend funds for such services. The members of the Luncheon Club voted to ask co-operation of Dawson county school and county officials to the end that this modern and helpful service can be obtained for Dawson county. Practically every school district is visited each term with some form of ailment which assumes epidemic proportions. Measles, mumps, scarlet fever, smallpox and diphtheria appear in this county quite frequently and other ailments, mostly skin infections, are more common. Citizens who favor the employment of a full time, visiting nurse are invited to let their wishes be known to Dr. Loveless, W. D. Arnett, or V. Z. Rogers, who form the committee.

1936 Farm Program Checks Are Arriving

One hundred ninety-three checks in the amount of \$30,512.51 were received by County Agent Joe C. Williams, Wednesday. These are the first checks that have been received in this county and represent only a small part of the payments due farmers of this county. It is expected that more transmittals of checks will follow at intervals of a few days.

Drilling To Start On New Oil Test Soon

The E. L. Wilson No. 1 Texas Land & Mortgage Company oil test, located in the center of the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 45, Block M. E. L. & R. Ry. company survey, approximately 12 miles northwest of Lamesa, started running Tuesday morning of this week. The drilling crew has been rigging up and setting surface casing and actual drilling is to get under way in the next few days.

A rotary rig is to be used on this test and the well is expected to be drilled to the required depth in less than 60 days.

Hugh Corrigan, operator of Midland is this week moving drilling tools to the Lee Wright Pickett well, which was drilled several months ago, and is to be deepened in an effort to get production. Location of this well is the northeast corner of section 1, Block C-37, just across the line into Terry county.

Tubing was being pulled from the Albaugh et al No. 1 John Robinson Dawson county pool opener, preparatory to being conditioned and possibly shot. It has not been active since December, when it pumped 4.5 to 5 barrels of pipe line oil hourly. It is in section 46, block M. E. L. & R. Ry. company survey, 14 miles northwest of Lamesa. The well may be shot.

Distinguished Man Visits Relatives Here

Col. E. D. Nix, a noted author, actor, extensive traveler, and a former United States marshal, is here for a visit with his cousin, Dr. R. F. Nix and family.

Col. Nix was a United States marshal in Oklahoma when the Cherokee Indian strip was opened for settlement. He was also instrumental in ridding that territory of the famous outlaws of that time. He has written a book of his early years spent in the Oklahoma territory, called the "Oklahoma Book", which has been accepted by the schools of that state. This book is also to be filmed in Hollywood in the near future. He has recently returned from that place where he had parts in several pictures.

He held an important part in the "Calvacade" last season at the Texas Centennial and has accepted another part in the play to be given this summer at the Pan-American Exposition.

Col. Nix plans to be in Lamesa for about two weeks.

Work on Lamesa-Stanton Highway Progressing Nicely

Work on the Lamesa-Stanton highway from Lamesa to the Dawson county line is progressing nicely this week with all departments of the work well under way.

The old wooden bridge, the only one in Dawson county, across Sulphur Draw, just at the southwest city limits of Lamesa, has been torn down this week, and preparations have been begun for the building of the new concrete bridge. This bridge is expected to be completed within a month.

The laying of caliche on the road was also begun this week. This work is to be done in four mile units.

This is a Dawson county sponsored WPA project, and will give employment to a large number of local men for several months. As soon as this section of the road is completed, it is reported that work will be started on the north end of the road or the Lamesa-Brownfield division of this highway.

With the completion of this project and the completion of Highway 15, together with the already paved Highway 9 Dawson county will be served by three all-weather highways, running in every direction from Lamesa.

Final Date on Farm Program Sign-Up

The State Committee has set May 15th, 1937, as the final date for 1937 Work Sheet sign-up. The state office announced some time ago that there would be no extension of the sign-up date this year. All producers are urged to sign work sheets before the final date, for it will be impossible to qualify for payments in 1937 unless a work sheet is signed covering the farm before the time expires.

The county agents office requests that all producers who expect to sign up come to the office prepared to give (1) The total amount of cotton produced on the farm in 1936 and (2) the production of feed per acre in 1936. The operator of the farm in 1936 should be contacted by the 1937 operator, if there has been a change. It is absolutely necessary that these figures be on the 1937 work sheet.

For materials that will not ravel a plain or pinked seam is used and for materials that ravel the edge may be overcast, the edges stitched together on each edge turned and stitched. For sheer materials and slips a narrow french seam is used.

Mrs. Barnes gave instructions on making welt pockets, bound and double pearl button holes and the shell scallop.

In the afternoon Mrs. Barnes gave a demonstration on line and design. There were 34 club women present.

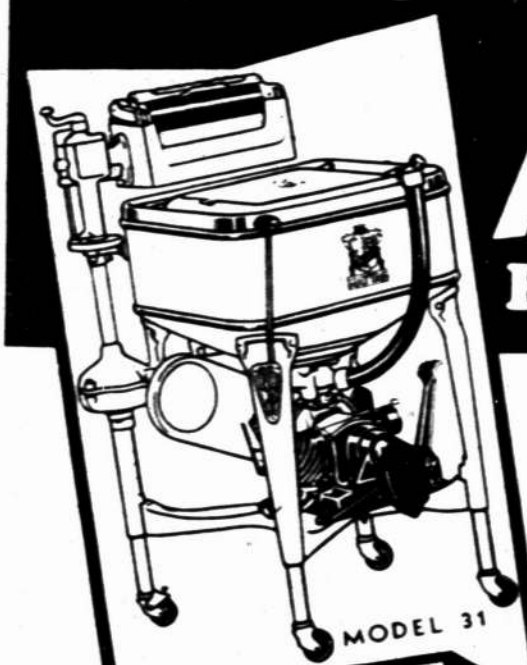

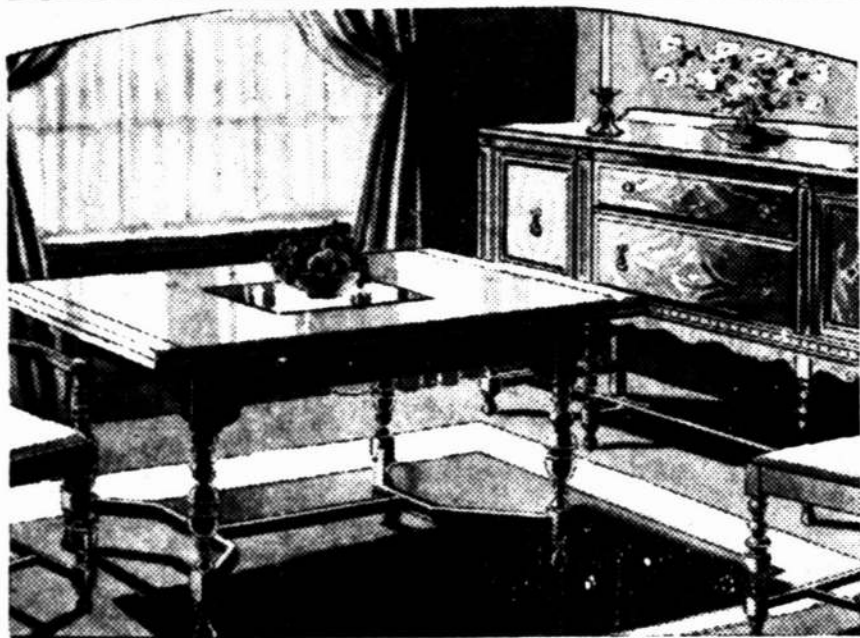

1937 Farm Program Questions and Answers

QUESTION: What is the final date for signing 1937 Work Sheets?

ANSWER: The State Committee has set May 15, 1937 as the final date for signing Work Sheets, and announced some time ago that there would be no extension of the time limit.

QUESTION: Is it possible for a producer to receive a payment on a farm for which a work sheet was not signed before the closing date?

ANSWER: No payment will be made

if a work sheet is not signed before the closing date.

QUESTION: Will all or any part of the acreage planted to two rows of grain sorghum and two rows of left fallow (not planted) be counted as diverted or reduced land?

ANSWER: Yes, half of the acreage will be counted as reduced land if double 40 or 42 inch rows of sorghum are alternated with 40 or 42 inch rows of fallow (not planted). If the rows are not at least 40 inches wide, it will not count.

QUESTION: What can be done about getting crop land which was idle in 1936 included in the 1937 acreage of the farm?

ANSWER: Cropland (all land from which a crop has been harvested since 1930) which was idle in 1936 and was not included in the measurements of the farm in 1936, can be included on the 1937 Work Sheet and will affect some increase in the soil-depleting bases, is this acreage is not normally idle.

QUESTION: How can errors in measurement on the 1936 program be corrected for 1937?

ANSWER: The producer must submit a map of the farm with the correct measurements which have been made by a committee member and certified to by another committee member, or must submit a corrected map made by the compliance supervisor who measured the land in 1936 and which has been certified by a committee member. Corrections must be made before May 15, 1937.

QUESTION: What is the best source of information concerning both the 1936 and 1937 programs?

ANSWER: The best source of information is the county agent's office. The county agent's office is the only agency having direct contact with the State office of the Agricultural Conservation Program therefore is the most authoritative source of information for producers.

QUESTION: What effect, if any, will non-compliance with a 1936 Work Sheet have on the operator in the 1937 program?

ANSWER: It will have no effect. There was no obligation connected with signing the Work Sheet, neither is there an obligation in 1937.

QUESTION: Was a base established for the farm covered by a Work Sheet in 1936 if the operator did not comply?

ANSWER: Bases were established for every farm covered by a 1936 Work Sheet whether or not the operator earned a payment.

QUESTION: What information must the operator have in order that his 1937 Work Sheet may be filled out?

ANSWER: He must be able to give the exact number of bales ginned and

total weight of cotton produced, and the feed production in pounds of heads per acre. In case of change this information must be obtained from the 1936 operator.

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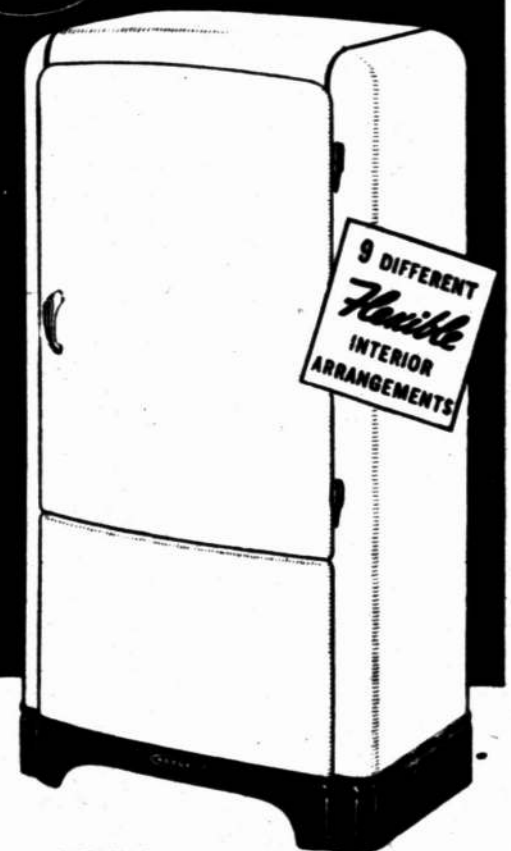

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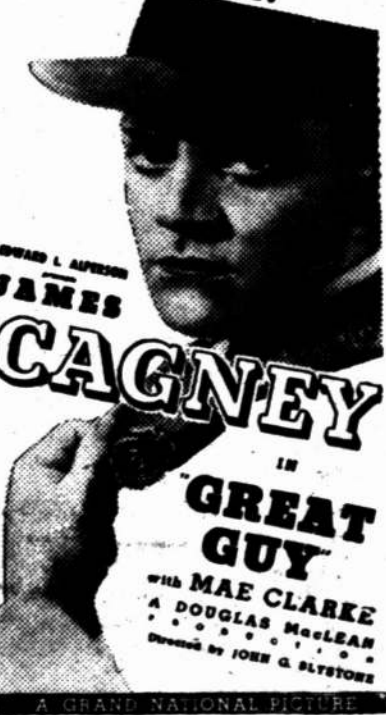

The "Swan Song" of the regular session of the 45th Legislature is just about to be sung. Very few days are left in this session, and there is still a large number of bills and important measures remaining on the calendar, which will possibly not reach consideration because of a lack of time. It is a sad state of affairs that our legislative system permits a small minority in either house to block legislation for a long enough period whereby it cannot be reached in the 120 days of a regular session.

Ever since the Senate will never reach a vote on the repeal of horse racing in this state this session. The opponents of the measure in the Senate have been successful in placing it in such a position on the calendar as to prevent its consideration at this time.

The same is true of all tax measures passed by the House of Representatives up to this time. The Senate delayed taking any action even in committee, except to postpone consideration of all tax measures.

The only tax measure the Senate has considered up to this time is a general sales tax, which is under debate now. It is proposed to submit to the people's vote on a two percent tax to pay everyone over 65 the pension in the full amount allowed by the constitutional amendment two years ago. No sales tax will be voted by this Legislature; however, this session may see

submitted to your vote the question whether you want a tax for this purpose. What is your reaction to this question? I would appreciate hearing from all my people on this subject.

Probably the most important piece of legislation passed this week was the Teachers' Retirement Bill. This legislation passed the House of Representatives, Thursday, by a vote of 125 for and 4 against. The chief provisions of the bill are as follows:

A person will have to teach twenty years and reach the age of sixty before he is eligible to retire. Between the ages of sixty and seventy retirement would be permissible but not required. The retirement age is set at seventy but a local school board can waive that requirement and permit a teacher to continue.

Teachers now in service who are now seventy would be required to teach at least two more years. Prior service would be considered in determining their pensions along with their contributions. Payment would be calculated on an actuarial and service basis.

Participation of teachers now in service is optional in an amendment adopted by the House. Participation of teachers entering the service would be mandatory of those entering after September 1, 1937.

It is not known what the Governor's attitude will be in regard to the bill if new revenue is not raised to meet the State's part. It will cost the State \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 a year to put the bill into operation.

A sufficient number of tax bills employing the Governor's views have been passed by the House of Representatives, but they are now sleeping peacefully in the Senate State Affairs Committee.

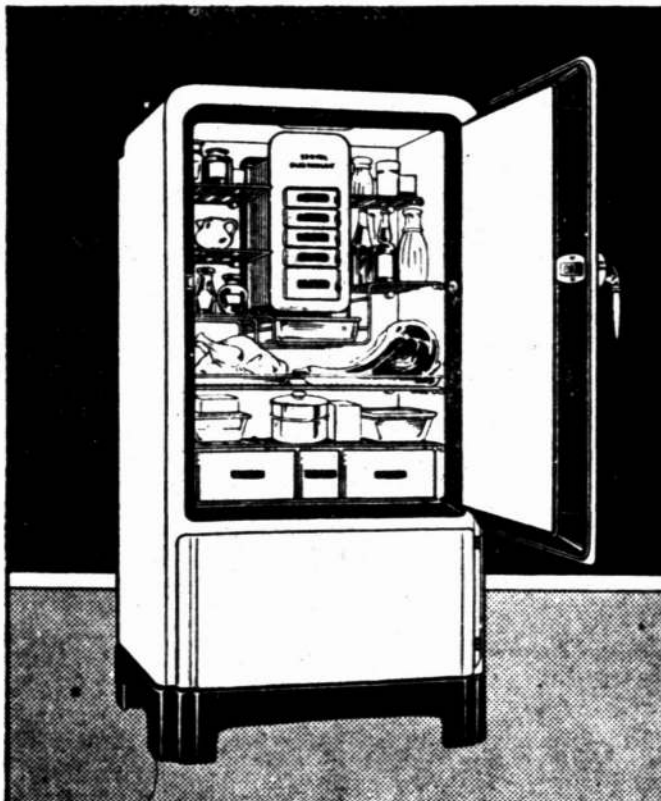

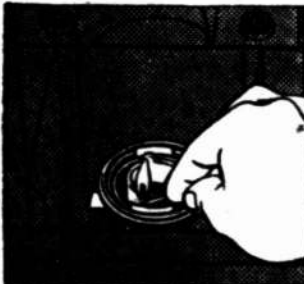

BOYS 4-H CLUBS

A meeting of the 4-H Club boys will be held at the county courthouse Saturday at 2 o'clock p. m. All club members should be present if possible, and any other person interested in 4-H club work will be welcome.

The cotton contest is attracting much attention among the club boys and among boys who are not already club members. Some forty boys are already signed up or have indicated that they expect to enter the contest. A boy to enter the contest must fill out the regular 4-H club membership card and the special contest application blank, have a parent or guardian sign both, then return to the county agent's office. All the necessary forms for keeping a record of his demonstration and instructions will be mailed to the boys from time to time as they are required. There is no expense incident to joining the club or entering the contest. All rules and the prize list for the contest are set out below:

PURPOSE: To promote the growing of better staple cotton and to stimulate a greater interest in efficient production.

BASIS OF CONTEST: County-wide with a minimum of 20 boys completing their demonstrations and each boy raising not less than five acres of cotton which will have a staple length of not less than 15-16 inch. The staple length shall be determined by the buyer at the time of purchase of the cotton or by a qualified cotton classer.

ELIGIBILITY: Any regularly enrolled 4-H Club boy between the ages of 10 and 20 is eligible for the county contest, but to win an out-of-the-state trip, a member must have reached his fifteenth birthday by December 1, 1937. Club experience prior to 1937 is not a requirement.

SPONSORSHIP: The county contest is sponsored by the girls of the county and funds for the prizes are to be supplied by the winners, the Dawson County Cotton Oil Mill, and the Lamesa Compress.

The State Awards are supplied by Anderson Clayton Company of Houston, Texas.

8. All reports and records shall be submitted on forms and blanks supplied by the County Agent.
9. The decision of the Contest Committee shall be final on all matters in connection with this contest.

PREDICT HIGHER POULTRY PRICES AS FARM FLOCKS ARE REDUCED BY RAISERS

Commenting on poultry conditions, based on reports from various agencies, Reese V. Hicks, Secretary of the International Baby Chick Association, Kansas City, Missouri, wrote J. H. Barron of the Barron's Electric Hatchery saying:

"There is a definite shortage of poultry on the farms. Many farmers have sold their flocks off and have not replaced them with chicks that will be pullets this Fall. Hatcheries are reporting fewer chicks sold for this year. This means that eggs will be needed for this Fall and the farmer who has flocks will be able to cash in on his flocks due to the outlook for good egg prices.

"Less poultry on farms also means that dressed poultry will be higher this Fall and the outlook is that price will be four or five cents a pound higher. Chicks bought in May and June can be raised for very little money and will be producing eggs, or can go to market next Fall when prices are best, thus increasing profits for poultry raisers who act on the present indications.

"In comparison with a few years ago, chick prices are considerable lower. In fact, good quality chicks, in most sections of the country, can now be purchased at a price ordinarily paid for common chicks. Reports from neighboring chick hatcheries show that good chicks are plentiful.

"Many poultry raisers have reduced flocks because of feed shortages. Others have trimmed flocks down by careful culling and are feeding only the egg producing birds. To have a plentiful supply of eggs this fall, many of these flocks should be replaced with pullets from chicks hatched in late April, May, and June.

"The poultry raiser planning to take advantage of the current situation is indeed in line for good profit this fall. His foresight in buying chicks now, when a majority are curtailing chick buying, will undoubtedly be rewarded in extra profits this Fall because he will have eggs to sell while his neighbor's flock remains small."

RANCH CONSERVATION EXHIBIT PLANNED FOR PLAINVIEW DAIRY SHOW

Plainview, April 13.—An exhibition featuring methods of proper range conservation will be a feature of the annual Plainview Dairy Show to be held April 21 to 24 inclusive. Arrangements for setting up of the display to be furnished by Region Six, Soil Conservation Service in Amarillo, have been completed by Pete Smith, manager of the Plainview Dairy Show.

The exhibit includes a group of wall pictures depicting conditions of range under good management. Several of these photographs are lighted transparencies in colors. These views illustrate methods in use in soil conservation work on restoring ranges. Maintenance of grass, and conservation of

soil. These methods, being practiced by the Soil Conservation Service in this area, are contour furrowing, management of grazing, and equal distribution of watering places over the range. Pictures illustrating these methods are arranged about the three walls of the exhibit.

The center of floor layout of the display contrasts range grasses under both good and bad management. On the left of the exhibit are shown the most valuable range grasses that prevail under good management; on the right are shown the undesirable vegetation that replaces good grasses under bad management, mainly overgrazing.

A representative of the Soil Conservation Service in Amarillo will accompany the exhibit to Plainview and will

be on hand during the four days of the dairy show to explain all details to the visitors.

"IMMUNIZE NOW — STAMP OUT DIPHTHERIA"

Austin, April 19.—A health slogan applicable to May Day-Child Health Day "Immunize Now — Stamp Out Diphtheria", is designed to intensify the campaign against one of the most deadly foes of children, diphtheria, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

If parents would have their family physician administer toxoid to their child soon after it reaches the age of six months as possible, much suffering and deaths could be prevented.

The administering of toxoid is a very simple procedure and causes the child little or no discomfort. In approximately ninety percent of the children receiving toxoid, there will be established a life long immunity to the disease.

TO BE SURE, four to six months after the final dose of toxoid, the child should be Schick tested so that parents will know definitely whether their child is immune. The test consists of just a few drops of diphtheria toxin between the layers of their skin. If the child is immune no reaction will be noticed. If not, there will appear redness at the site of the test that reaches its height the third or fourth day.

Uncle Jim Says



"You can't make a fair living, no matter how hard you work, when erosion has gullied your fields and washed away your soil."

Of the total of 35,500,000 acres of crop land in Texas, more than half, or approximately 19,500,000 acres, should be protected against erosion, according to M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer of the Extension Service. Of the area needing protection against loss of soil and water, 7,800,000 acres require terracing or contouring to prevent loss of rainfall, while the remainder suffer from loss of both soil and water.

Texas farmers and ranchmen have already terraced or contoured more than 12 million acres. Allowing for land which has been re-terraced or re-worked, Bentley estimates that some 6½ million acres have been terraced to conserve soil and rainfall and that an additional 4½ million acres have been terraced or contoured to hold water.

In 1936, under the supervision and leadership of county agricultural agents, more than 2,338,000 acres were terraced or contoured, more than twice the amount protected in any previous year. Other agencies and individuals accounted for almost an additional million acres in 1936.

While the above figures are only approximations, Bentley points out that much progress has been made and that the job is not finished. Some 16 million acres of unprotected land remain to be terraced or contoured.

FARMERS AND RANCHMEN CONSTRUCT SMALL DAMS AND EARTHEN TANKS

Construction of small dams and earthen tanks under the provisions of the range conservation section of the Agricultural Conservation Program are of special interest to Northwest Texas farmers, as indicated by requests for such help piling into the offices of county agricultural agents.

During the past month, dams were measured on six ranches in Hemphill county and other dams are now in the process of construction. Ranchmen there feel that getting the small dams well established and distributed will enable them, over a period of time to construct larger dams that will aid in putting up a reserve water supply on the ranch.

In cooperation with a machinery company two tank digging demonstrations were held in Taylor county recently and were attended by 285 farmers and ranchmen. These were demonstrations of digging tanks with a power shovel.

The first location for a farm pond or dam to be built in Moore county under the 1937 program was recently checked on the land of A. A. Stewart. The assistant county agricultural agent pointed out that the location was desirable because it provided the recommended number of acres in the watershed in relation to the amount of water that the dam will hold. Also the pasture of the watershed was contour furrowed which will produce enough grass to check the speed of the run-off water and help prevent washing and filling the dam with silt and top soil.

In the spring of 1936, Stewart did the first pasture furrowing in Moore county. The pasture furrows were run on the contour and retained the rainfall to such an extent that the contoured pasture produced about twice as much grass as the adjoining pasture which was not treated.
