ANSWERLINE

Q. If a school bus has its lights flashing and is stopped at the railroad tracks, do you have to wait for the bus to turn off its lights and move across the tracks before you can proceed in the opposite direction?

A. No. School buses are required to stop at all railroad tracks. Provided no train is coming, you may proceed in the opposite direction across the tracks. You may also proceed across the tracks in the same direction as the bus if another lane is available. It is illegal, however, to cross the center line to pass any vehicle within 100 feet of a railroad crossing.

Over \$5 million paid to welfare recipients

The state of Texas spent over \$5 million in 1992 for major welfare programs in Mitchell County according to figures released by the Texas Department of Human Services.

Medical assistance had the biggest impact in the county as \$544,289 was spent for children and families and \$602,942 for the aged and disabled for hospitals, physicians, laboratory work, x-ray and other services. Prescription medicines accounted for \$44,362 for families and children and \$278,724 for the aged and disabled.

Disproportionate-share hospital payments totaled \$813,820 while nursing home costs of approximately \$1,629,489 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$162,455 in 1992.

Food stamps worth \$914,265 were issued for the fiscal year that ended on August 31 of last year while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$154,960. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government while the department determines eligibility of the applicants and issues the food coupons.

TEC here Monday night to talk about local jobs

How to get a job during the construction of the 1000-bed prison to be built in Colorado City will be discussed this Monday night, Feb. 15, at the Civic Center as representatives of the Texas Employment Commission will be on hand to answer questions on the subject. Bid dates on the prison will close March 10 and contractor's trailers will begin setting up April 1 at the site.

Expected to be at the 7 p.m. meeting Monday are at least six representatives of the TEC including Linda Jones, area manager and Cecilia Rivera, first line supervisor. Those attending should bring proof of identity -- such as a driver's license and social security card.

The TDCJ has scheduled a meeting for March 16 at the Colorado High School auditorium for those interested in going to work for the prison system. All the procedures one needs to go through to start a career with TDCJ will be explained at this meeting.

Badly needed when built
Wallace School said
"dream come true"

This story is the first of two stories we will run about Black Americans in Colorado City during the month of February, which is Black History Month.

The Wallace Center -- located just south of Colorado City on Highway 208 -- was originally built for the black community here for their school building.

The Sept. 13, 1951 edition of the Record carried a report on the condition of the school it was built to replace -- and it apparently was way past due for replacement.

J. C. Bradley was the school board president and he said the "board had just obtained an option on some land for a modernistic building for the Negroes of

Colorado City." The option on the land was the result of an appeal to the City Council from Bradley and Frank Kelley. The land at that time was owned by the city.

The council discussed plans for a modern school structure and a restricted housing area around the school area -- with building codes.

The proponents for the new building, Kelley and Bradley, reportedly were outspoken in their condemnation of the facility that was being used for the school.

Z. W. Walker had served as the principal of the Wallace School for eight years and he stated the "new building would be a dream come true."

He stated the present facilities "had no sewage facilities, no hot water and outhouses served as restrooms." Carroll added that these were problems that should have been taken care of a long time ago.

A photograph along with the article showed two small elementary age students playing on the only piece of playground equipment that was available for the 121 students -- a see-saw.

There was no telephone service available at the school and messages had to be relayed from a home across the railroad tracks to the north.

Apparently the only convenience the school had was a cook stove that had replaced an outdated one about a year earlier.

Carroll had been an instructor in a college before taking the job at Wallace and he stated he "wanted to see a school that will do credit to the Negroes of the city."

Wallace served as the all-black school here until the school system was integrated back in 1966.

Young volunteers needed for work

Task Force good idea says police chief

The Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education has formed a task force to develop a model policy on police conduct for law enforcement agencies.

Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery said the task force will be composed of representatives from different ranks in law enforcement agencies across the state.

Representatives come from universities, large and small police departments, Texas Department of Public Safety, representatives of the Governor's office and religious and ethnic groups.

Montgomery said the mission of the task force is to develop a philosophy of law enforcement conduct which encourages the fair and equal treatment of all people and brings citizen's input into procedures for addressing complaints.

To accomplish this goal, the task force will hold public forums for citizen input, review existing policies, and finally, develop a model policy that will meet the needs of all communities and law enforcement agencies in the State.

"My feeling is that a police department is most effective with the cooperation of the citizens and in order to have that cooperation - we have to have a police department that they can be proud of and feel that they are a part of," said Montgomery.

Recycling topic of local meeting

Recycling was the topic of a meeting between state and local officials Thursday afternoon at City Hall.

Colorado City was named earlier as a recipient of a \$45,000 grant from the Texas Water Commission to do a feasibility study on recycling in this area and staff members from the state General Service Commission, Texas Department of Criminal Justice and the Department of Commerce were here to put together a proposal for consultants to bid on.

Meeting with representatives from the state were city manager, Buddy Foster, Nancy Sullivan of the Economic Development Board, mayor Jim Baum and chamber of commerce executive director, Jay McCollum.

The Post Office will work the lobby boxes only and there will be no local or rural mail deliveries.

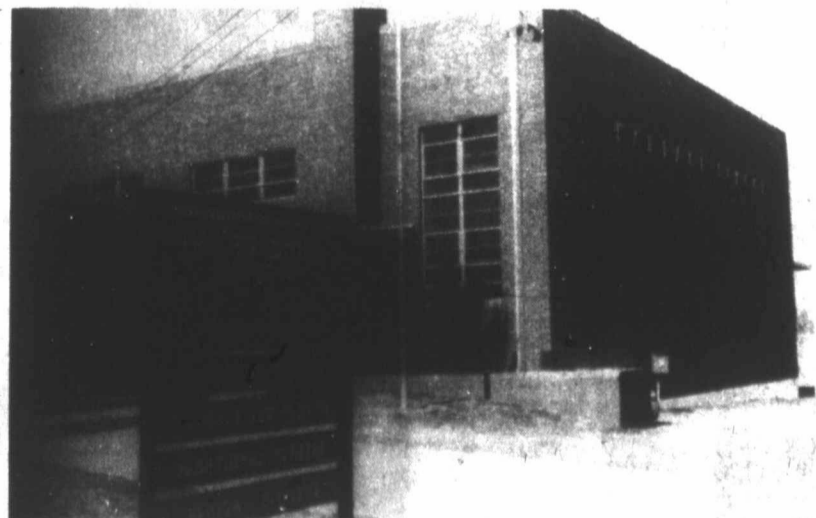

Nathan Hoyle of Colorado City has been selected as the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District's Conservation Farmer of the Year. Hoyle operates 1640

acres in Valley View, Buford and Lowe communities. The 1640 acres consist of 1053 acres of cropland, 312 acres of rangeland and 275 acres of CRP land. Major crops include cotton, small grain and haygrazer.

Two hundred and seventy five acres of Hoyle's marginal cropland was placed in the Conservation Reserve Program in 1987 for erosion control and land improvement.

mandatory requirements, every Texas hunter born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements," according to Gene Bowlin.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in firearms and archery handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; conservation; hunting traditions; wildlife identification; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival," Bowlin added.

Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certification. Cost of the course is \$5.00, which covers the cost of the classroom materials and the certificate.

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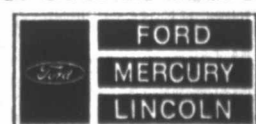
