Moody Announces Candidacy For Another Term Argentina Assails Monroe Doctrine In League Pact

Bare Mention Of American Policy Brings Reproach

South American Delegate Tells League Doctrine Is Declaration of But One Nation.

HAS NO PLACE, EVEN AS ARGUMENT, SAID

Declares Policy Has Never Been Explicitly Approved By Any Other Country In This Hemisphere.

(By The Associated Press)

GENEVA, Feb. 28.—Argentina through her delegate, Senor Castillo, took issue today at the sitting of the security committee of the league of nations over mention of the Monroe Doctrine in the league covenant. A deep impression was created by Senor Castillo's declaration.

The reference occurs in article 21, which says nothing in this covenant shall be deemed to affect the validity of international engagements, such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe Doctrine, for securing the maintenance of peace.

Senor Castillo asserted the doctrine constituted a unilateral political declaration by the United States and had never so far as he knew, been explicitly approved by the other American states. Therefore, it should not have been cited even in example as a regional agreement.

Today's discussion was on the Prague memorandum concerning the articles of the league covenant. Chile supported the conclusions set forth in the memorandum that it was undesirable to draw up rigid and complete procedure for the league in the event of emergency. It must be left to the council to act in full knowledge of the facts when the appropriate moment arrives.

Two Mine Leaders Shot From Ambush

Makes Four Murders In The Past Six Weeks With Miners Or Officials As The Victims.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Feb. 28.—Alex Campbell, of Pittston, leader of the United Mine Workers' faction at Nantuxy Six Colliery, Pennsylvania, and Peter Reddy, treasurer of the Local were slain today at Pittston.

The men were shot from ambush by unknown persons in Pittston. Their deaths make four murders committed in the last six weeks with mine workers or their officials as victims.

Campbell, check weighman at Number Six Colliery, and a former international board member of the United Mine Workers, has been vigorously opposing "contract" mining system in vogue in the Pittston district and at the same time has been at odds with the district administration of the union.

Missouri Votes

Reed Triumphant Return to Power

Action of Convention In Insuring 36 Votes for "Favorite Son" Contrasts Attitude 8 Years Ago.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Feb. 28.—Missouri democracy today voted Senator Jim Reed a triumphant return to leadership of the party in his home state on a platform assuring the veteran Missourian of a block of 36 votes in his fight for the democratic presidential nomination at Houston.

In striking contrast to the wave of anti-Reed bitterness which swept the state eight years ago, the name of Reed today dominated the platform adopted by the state convention. It instructed the state delegation to vote for the senator's platform as a unit so long as his name remains before the national convention.

Peace and harmony marked the meeting and there was none of the acrimony that sprang up against the senator in 1920 when he even was refused a place on the state delegation to the San Francisco national convention.

"His services in the United States senate have excited the admiration of all the people and we acclaim him a certain champion in the cause of good government," the platform declared.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 28.—An 18-year-old girl's ambition to set a new world record for a parachute jump was prevented from ending in tragedy here today by her quick-thinking pilot who brought his ship from an altitude of 15,000 feet to a landing on one wheel and a side tip while the plucky lass dangled from the undercarriage.

Jeanne Durand, the girl, went aloft with Dr. R. L. Ellis of Minneapolis, Minn., and when at 15,000 feet she went over the side but her parachute caught on the plane and left her dangling in mid-air, unable to climb back to the wing of the plane or to release herself.

Crowd Watched In Horror. Ellis, realizing what had happened, headed for the field while the crowd below stood helpless and horror-stricken, watching the slender form of the girl swinging from the wing. Coming down to the field, Ellis tipped his machine over to one side, but the girl was dragged 200 feet before the plane came to a stop.

Miss Durand was unconscious when taken into an ambulance, but regained consciousness when taken enroute to the hospital, and examination there showed her injuries to be a sprained wrist and bruises. As the plane struck the earth, dragging Miss Durand at the end of a rope which had prevented her parachute jump, women in the crowd turned their heads to avoid witnessing what they expected to be a tragedy.

Those who witnessed the landing said that but for Ellis' tipping the plane to the side opposite from that where Miss Durand dangled, she undoubtedly would have been injured seriously, if not killed.

Tells of Jump. "As I climbed over the wing I noticed the knot holding the chute loose, funny," Miss Durand said. "I usually tie the knot myself, but in the pretty things today, it was tied by another."

Efforts to Commit Group In Support of Dry Candidate Are Overwhelmed At Austin Meeting.

BEAUMONT IS GIVEN STATE CONVENTION

Moody Made Announcement In Letter Asking Friend To Halt Boom Seeking Him As Presidential Choice.

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—The state democratic executive committee today adopted strong measures against "bolting" from the party, overwhelmed efforts to commit it to support of "dry" presidential candidates, refused to advise instructions of precinct delegates, refused by compromise to endorse Governor Moody's administration, and elected as vice-chairman Charles I. Francis as vice-chairman of the Texas "unrestricted delegation" movement.

All this developed at a noisy, contentious afternoon session after the committee had awarded the May 22 state convention to Beaumont, one of six contenders.

Gov. Moody's definite announcement that he will be a candidate for reelection grew out of an abandoned plan to endorse him as a candidate for the presidency.

The committee adopted a resolution, by Steve Pinkney of Houston, to make the democratic party pledge a requirement for participation in precinct and county conventions. The main fireworks of the day developed over a further provision of the resolution that county delegations be not seated at the state convention if they failed to show adoption of the pledge by resolution, by county conventions selecting such delegations. This provision was withdrawn after a lengthy fight against it, mainly by George Purl.

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Scores of Planes Hunt Missing Trio

Fear Another Tragedy Is Added to Navy Aviation Annals; Think Brooks Body Is Sighted.

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—As dusk settled over the borders of Chesapeake Bay, nearly two score navy and marine aviators returned to the various stations weary from a futile all-day search for three missing naval aviators whose mysterious disappearance yesterday is believed to have added another tragedy to naval annals.

A report that an airplane was heard by a lighthouse keeper at Thomas Point Light, Md., two hours after an amphibian plane carrying Com. T. G. Elyson, Lieut. Com. Hugo Schmidt, and Lieut. Roger Ranschausen, left Hampton Roads, Va., for Norfolk, caused the navy department to shift the search to the northern regions of the bay. But the coast of Maryland, Virginia and North Carolina also came under the close scrutiny of fellow fliers until darkness prevented further observation.

Godfrey, Big Negro Wins Off Uzcudun

Referee Figures Terrific Smashes of Black Outweighed Body Rushes by Paulino.

WRIGHT FIELD, LOS ANGELES, Feb. 28.—George Godfrey, 236-1/2-pound negro heavyweight, took a ten-round decision from Paulino Uzcudun, 199-1/2 pounds, here tonight.

Paulino forced the fighting from going to come but Referee George Blake of Los Angeles figured that the terrific blows of the mammoth Godfrey outweighed the rushing body attack of Paulino.

Godfrey was slow to start and seemed content to try and tor with his man for the first three rounds, but Paulino's rushing, flailing blows stung his opponent into action.

Approximately 40,000 people piled into this outdoor arena, converted from a baseball field, tonight to watch Paulino Uzcudun, basque Spaniard, try to whittle down the mountainous George Godfrey, negro, in their ten-round heavyweight boxing match.

The field was packed to the lids and under those lids the spectators of Paulino's heartiest backers sat—thousands of the Mexican population of Southern California.

Holdout Lists Of Majors Shaved To Minimum, Reports

Opening of Training Season Brings Veterans Back Into Folds of Clubs In Spite of Usual Salary Pleas.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—As the spring training season gets under way, the holdout season is drawing to a close. Nearly every day brings word of additional players agreeing to terms with the clubs and several of the remaining holdouts have shown signs of coming around.

Brooklyn is one of the worst sufferers with Darryl Vance and Arnold Stutz reported unsigned. While still standing firm in his demands Vance is working out daily with the Robins and club officials say they expect to reach an agreement with him.

Stutz is asking for an increase in salary and a bonus for a 300 batting average which was a rarity last year in the Robins lineup.

Next, Hank Holdout. While Hank, who has not yet signed with the Yankees in Hot Springs, getting ready for the day he and Ed Barrow can agree. The only other Yankee holdout, Tony Lazzeri is maintaining complete silence.

The Giants still are without the services of Ed Adrian, recently acquired from Pittsburgh and Jess Doyle, in spite of Manager McGraw's ultimatum.

The Cincinnati Reds also are suffering seriously. Carl Mays and Rube Bressler are unsigned. Pete Donohue not only has refused the salary cut passed out all around him but has intimated he could find more pleasing surroundings outside of Cincinnati.

Cleveland Has One. Cleveland has reduced its holdout list to one with the appearance of Luke Sewell who, intimated brother Joe would soon be on hand to adjust any salary difficulties.

The St. Louis Cardinals and Washington have reduced the number of their holdouts to one each, pitchers Phil Rhee and Sam Jones respectively. The signing of Sammy Hale allows the Athletics to equal the proud boast of the White Sox and Pirates that all of the names on their rosters likewise appear contracts.

Caldwell came to Yale a highly touted scholar-athlete star, but, as is often the case, injuries and illness greatly handicapped him and he did not seem as if he was going to make good on the many laudatory notices that had been handed him.

Last fall Caldwell, in good health and free from injuries, began to play the game of football of which he was capable. He was the talk of the east. Coach Tad Jones pronounced him one of the greatest Yale backs of all time.

Then just before the Princeton and Harvard games, the two big events of the year for Yale, some one who didn't have much to do discovered that Caldwell at Brown as a freshman had played for something like 12 minutes more or less. He was declared ineligible, depriving him of the big thrill of his career, playing against Princeton and Harvard. Yale, however, was equal to the occasion and won both games despite his absence from the lineup.

Caldwell's football ballyhoo, because of his being declared ineligible, brought out the fact that he also was a baseball star. Immediately a number of major league clubs started a wild scramble for his services.

Since good ball players are much desired, acting as the agent for Caldwell's services and had made arrangements for him to come to Cleveland and talk over the possibility of the Indians signing him for 1928 since the graduates from Yale in June.

Then, just when it looked as if he had the inside track the athletic authorities at Yale informed Caldwell that he was to discontinue all relations with any major league club until he graduated from Yale or such action might affect his amateur standing and thereby prevent him from playing on the Yale varsity.

The clause has temporarily ended the activities of the major league clubs in quest of his service. Joe Wood, now head baseball coach at Yale, former big leaguer, as a member of the Boston Red Sox and Cleveland Indians.

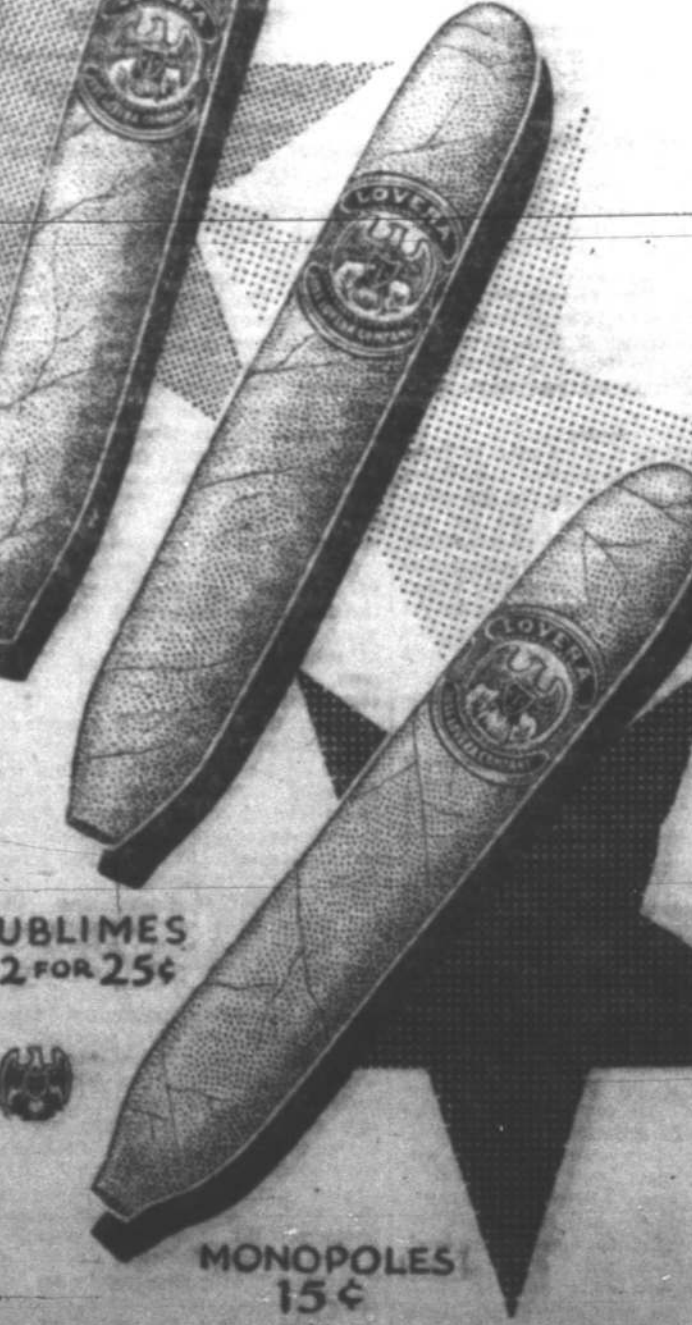

T. & P. President Answers Protest On T. & N. M. Road

Route Surveyed to "Miss" Wink Due to Shortness of Course, He Explains In State Hearing.

(By the Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—Replying to objection of delegations representing Wink and Prot, oil towns John L. Lancaster, president of the Texas and Pacific and Texas-New Mexico railroads was on the witness stand practically all afternoon Tuesday in railroad commission's hearing on the T. & N. M.'s application for permission to run a line from Monahans to the New Mexico state line.

Wink protests the proposed railroad because its route would miss the town by about four miles and would run through Kermit, which protesters described as a "wink" of 150 people as against Wink's reported 3,000. Kermit, they said, informally had promised to give the Texas and New Mexico about \$30,000.

Prote Opposes Project. The Prote faction opposed the route, no matter in what direction the road runs, because Wink county has voted a \$600,000 bond issue with which to improve roads leading into the surrounding fields and the town itself on the main line of the Texas and Pacific occupies an advantageous point as a city of all supply dealers. The city also plans a \$150,000 road issue, it was said.

Mr. Lancaster told the commission that the proposed extension which would connect with the T. & P. at Monahans, was surveyed to "miss" Wink because it planned to go as nearly in a straight line as possible to bear toward the north and east where the president said he had been informed future oil development probably would take place.

The hearing will be continued Wednesday.

However, Frame Buildings On Site for Auditorium Are Razed, Time Being Thus Utilized.

(By the Associated Press) HOUSTON, Feb. 28.—Houston's city fathers failed again today to let the contract for the Democratic national convention temporary auditorium.

Earlier testimony had developed that the Langstons and Mr. and Mrs. Wyatt had lived in a three room shack in the river bottoms near the mouth of the Padlock, Wyatt was killed after 7:30 p. m. on the night of November 17, 1927.

Report Tells Progress

Thornton of Dallas, and an emissary from the "dry" camp of Senator Tom Love, former national committeeman, to put the committee on record as favoring nomination of a "dry" candidate, was ruled out of order by Chairman D. W. Wilcox, of Georgetown. Purl appealed from the ruling but the committee upheld the chairman by vote of 28 to 2. The two were Purl and J. M. Simpson of Amarillo.

Rule Out Endorsement
A portion of a resolution by Mr. Henderson would have endorsed Governor Moody's administration but after objections from Mr. Pinckney and chairman Wilcox, the portion was stricken out. Mr. Pinckney recalled the endorsement of the Ferguson administration put over "steam roller" methods in the committee at the 1926 Wichita Falls meeting and said he did not think the governor would favor a vote on him. Mr. Wilcox expressed opinion that the committee is merely the "machinery of the party" and should not adopt resolutions favoring officeholders in view especially of the fact that Governor Moody seeks re-election.

Mr. Francis was elected vice-chairman by a vote of 19 to 7. Gov. Moody's intention to seek reelection was conveyed in a letter to Tom Paulk of Athens who planned an effort to have the Governor endorsed for president. The governor sent a letter to Mr. Paulk asking that he abandon the plan for two reasons. One was that he is a "candidate for reelection, and not a candidate for any national office," and the other is his expressed belief that the committee should not endorse anyone for national offices.

In debate on the Pinckney resolution, Mr. Purl said it might bar several delegations, and that he would "rather have negroes vote than bar any white man." He was referring to the general rule that political parties are the judges of their own members. Mr. Henderson said the resolution waived a "red flag" in the faces of the good people of the state. Mr. Pinckney's challenge to know how provoked a reference by Mr. Henderson to the "Butte bolters."

Beaumont won the convention, 20 to 10 over Austin on the fourth ballot, after Wichita Falls had been eliminated on the third ballot. Fort Worth and Amarillo went out on the second ballot and Galveston on the first.

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Miners Testify To Ban On Songs

Church Hymns Prohibited,
Allegedly Inflammatory,
Men Tell Committee Of
I. C. C.

(By Associated Press)
ROSSITER, Pa., Feb. 28.—Singing of church hymns on the ground that they were hostile and inflammatory was prohibited by a preliminary injunction recently granted by the Indiana county court to the Clearfield Bituminous Coal corporation, union miners and sympathizers told the senate interstate commerce sub-committee, investigating conditions in the coal fields of western Pennsylvania.

The committee, headed by Senator Gooding, Idaho, spent the entire day yesterday in this district inquiring into phases of the injunction, which also prohibited union miners from marching, advertising in newspapers and picketing.

Pastor Talks In Probe
The Rev. J. A. Phillips, pastor of the Maygar church here, told the senators that the injunction was issued when the miners gathered at the church on several occasions and sang "Onward Christian Soldiers" and other favorite hymns. Several union miners gave similar testimony. The church is located near the mine of the corporation, a subsidiary of the New York Central railroad.

While Phillips was testifying Senator Wheeler, Montana, remarked that "Onward Christian Soldiers" was also classed as hostile and inflammatory by "Mexico and Russia."

Before hearing the testimony of Mr. Phillips, who branded the sheriff of Indiana county, F. B. Welsh, superintendent of the Rossiter mine and "other officials" as "Pennsylvania pussyfoots," the senators joined in singing several hymns of the church.

Tear Bombs Found
Phillips also said that at one time a tear bomb was found in the church basement, intimating that company mine guards were responsible for placing the bomb.

LOSE GRAIN BUSINESS

K. C. S. Tells It Was Harmed
by Bad Rates

CHICAGO, Feb. 28. (AP).—The Kansas City Southern railway, once a large mover of export of grain, has lost much of that business because of the distortion of freight rates in the middle and southwest, said James P. Holden, vice-president of the road, before the Interstate Commerce commission here today.

The commission is conducting a hearing to determine if tariff relief can be effected through a change in rates.

More favorable rates on grain through the Great Lakes and Montreal and reduced rates for Oklahoma grain have taken the southern business, said Holden.

Borah In Answer To Questionnaire

Prominent Republican Gives
"No" In Reply to Query
About Attitude of Several
Issues.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Senator Borah reversed his usual procedure in the business of prohibition questionnaires today by getting on the receiving end and replying "no" to questions whether he favored "super-government," or religious dictatorship.

Answering a letter from Dr. Charles A. L. Reed of Cincinnati, Mr. Borah reiterated that he was not a candidate for president, and returned a brief "no" to queries asking him if he advocated such things.

"Assuming for the purposes of this letter that I am a candidate for president, which I am not, and assuming for the purposes of this letter that the implications and inferences and statements in your interrogatories are as follows."

Then the "no" to three questions which were:

Whether Mr. Borah favored the principles of super-government as exemplified by the Anti-Saloon league, by the board of prohibition, temperance and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church and by their auxiliary organization, the late unlamented Ku Klux Klan.

Whether he favored having any religious denomination established at Washington for the declared purpose of "exercising what the Methodist church now openly assumes to exercise, namely, the functions of censorship and dictatorship over all branches of our constitutional government."

Whether he favored the republican party being used as a stalking horse for any candidate who in the event of election would be "the agent of the super-government."

Mr. Humphrey, replying in a letter to the former Pennsylvania governor, said that for the "infinite relief of the country," Pinchot should have his "keeper lead you to a thistle patch." He added that his "idea of a perfectly useless thing was to waste time on Gifford Pinchot."

West Texas Field Ahead of Seminole

Daily Average In Lone Star
Field Is 310,669 For The
Week Compared to 306,910 For Oklahoma Pool.

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 28. (AP).—The sensational West Texas petroleum fields have leaped ahead of the Greater Seminole field of Oklahoma, for more than a year the leading producing area of the nation, figures published today by the Oil and Gas Journal show.

During the week ended February 25, daily average production in West Texas rose to 310,669 barrels, compared with 306,910 barrels for Seminole, the oil publication says.

This was an increase of 11,419 barrels in West Texas over the previous week, while the greater Seminole area showed a slump of 11,830 barrels in daily average production.

At its zenith, the Seminole area poured out petroleum at a rate of more than a half million barrels daily, causing the enforcement of restrictive measures to combat over

production.
Production in West Texas under intensive development has been soaring for several months.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 (P).—The cotton market yesterday became unbalanced today with May contracts selling off to 12.25, or 31 points lower, and 41 points below the high level of last week. They closed at 12.27, the general market closing barely steady at net declines of 27 to 32 points.

The opening was steady, unchanged to an advance of 5 points, but prices eased right after the call under near month liquidation, prompted by the circulation of notices estimated at 11,000 bales. After showing net losses of about 20 points the market headed up a few points on covering. Otherwise there appeared to be little demand and the lowest prices of the day were reached in the late trading, when March sold at 12.14 and October at 12.08. The close was a few points up from the lowest on March but at the lowest prices of the day to the later deliveries. Belief that talk of probable shipments out of local stock had been exaggerated may have been responsible for some local selling. The market appeared to be influenced also by fear the recent advance above 12.12 cents for October would encourage planting increases.

Further reports of India buying reached the trade during the day, but they appeared to be rather indefinite. The early cables from Liverpool were lower than due, but there were small rallies attributed to end-month trade selling and covering. Reports from Manchester said that business in cotton goods was improving.

Exports today 44,707, making 5,107,002 so far this season. Port receipts 14,616 U. S. port stocks 2,096,066.

WALL STREET

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 (P).—Speculation quieted down considerably in today's stock market, but prices displayed a stronger undertone. Most of the standard industrials and rails continued to move within rather narrow limits, but bullish demonstrations were staged in a select assortment of oil, motor, public utility, tobacco and metal shares, several of which ran up 2 to 4 points. With one exception trading was the smallest of any full session this year, total sales running just over 1,000,000 shares.

The renewal rate on call money was advanced from 41-4 to 41-3 per cent, but this was expected in view of the heavier month-end demand for funds and the approach of huge government financing and March 15 income tax payments. Banks called about \$15,000,000 in loans during the day.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 28 (P).—A decline of approximately \$2 a bale rather heavy selling in the cotton market today induced by ring traders selling on the theory that the market is about due for a decline following the recent advances.

March contracts after selling up to 12.42, eased off to 12.02 and closed at 12.04, compared with 12.37 at the previous close. The general market closed steady at net declines of 28 to 33 points.

Liverpool cables were about as due but the weather map continued dry. All year the local market covered steady, first trades showing gains of 3 to 7 points, with May contracts selling for 12.40, July 12.38 and October 12.01.

The higher prices soon induced realizing and the market turned on the downgrade the decline gaining in momentum as the morning progressed, due to the ring selling and on talk of increasing unemployment over the country. The lows of the season were made in the late trading when fears of further dull conditions prompted additional offerings and May dropped to 12.00, July 12.08 and October 12.07. The market closed within a point or two of the lowest.

Exports for the day totaled 44,707 bales.

Closing corn quotations were heavy at 1-2 to 1-4 net decline, with wheat 1-4 to 7-8c off, oats 1-4c down to 1-8c up, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 10c.

Evidence of an insufficiency of buying power to absorb offerings of wheat did a good deal to incite persistent selling from commission houses and to keep prices trending downward the greater part of the time.

Oats were influenced chiefly by the action of corn.

Provisions sympathized with declines in the hog market.

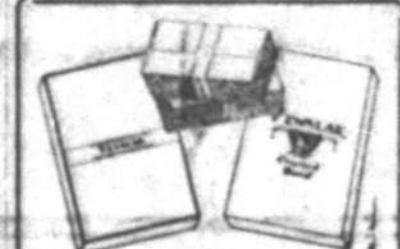

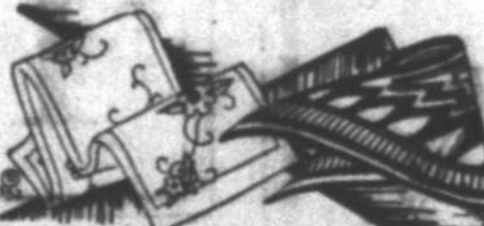

Dry Leaders Open Fight To Prevent Wet's Nomination

Drive Against Smith Launched and Plans Laid to Foster Dry Candidate Even to the Extent of Bolting.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Two movements—one designed to put a damper on the presidential aspirations of Governor Smith of New York, the other to force both the republican and democratic parties to toe the mark on prohibition in the coming campaign—got under way here today under the direction of a group of dry leaders.

The offensive directed at the two political parties was launched at a conference in which representatives of thirty or more national temperance organizations participated. Resolutions were adopted demanding clear-cut prohibition plans and standard bearers genuinely dry.

Another Meeting Set
While the meeting was in progress, plans were disclosed for an anti-saloon league conference next month in St. Petersburg, Fla., in which friends of prohibition in nine southeastern states will be invited to have a hand. At that time, those in charge of arrangements predicted a counter-offensive against Governor Smith will take definite form.

While reluctant to discuss for publication what will be done, they generally forecast a discussion of urging southern democrats to bolt their party in the event the New York Governor is nominated at Houston.

The announced purpose of the regional meeting at St. Petersburg, is to canvass the prohibition situation south of the Mason-Dixon line and east of the Mississippi, but a political airing also is regarded as inevitable by expected participants. The conference, which will continue for three days, will begin March 4.

Upchurch is Prominent
One of those here for today's general meeting and a leader in arrangements for the Florida conference is C. A. Upchurch, North Carolina state superintendent of the anti-saloon league. He minced no words in predicting southern dry leaders will do their utmost to keep the democratic presidential nomination away from Governor Smith, and in the event of his nomination to work against his election.

One of the men active in arranging for the St. Petersburg conference, who declined to permit his name to be used in connection with the prediction, said a decision might be reached to put in the field a presidential ticket which dry southerners could support if Smith, or anyone regarded as wet gets the Houston nomination.

There also were authentic reports that the Florida meeting might seek to "draft" William G. McAdoo either for the nomination to be made at Houston, despite his announcement that he is not a candidate, or to head a movement for the presidency on behalf of dry democrats.

Burrus People Buy Local Mill

Whaley Elevator Sold To Dallas Interests for \$100,000 Consideration Last Week.

Marking the entrance of the Burrus Mill and Elevator Company, one of the state's largest concerns of this kind, into Lubbock and the South Plains area announcement was made yesterday of the sale of the new 500,000 bushel grain elevator recently constructed here by J. C. Whaley, Texas capitalist, to the Burrus people whose headquarters are in Dallas.

Consideration was \$100,000 and this represents slightly less than the cost of the Whaley elevator, the latter being \$105,000. The sale was made because of the poor health of Mr. Whaley, who is now confined to a Dallas sanitarium.

The elevator is to become one of the units in the Burrus chain and will handle their business in this part of the state.

Associates of Mr. Whaley locally

stated yesterday that the elevator is complete in every way and is ready for immediate operation. One improvement is to be made, a double loading track being planned to replace the single track which has just been constructed.

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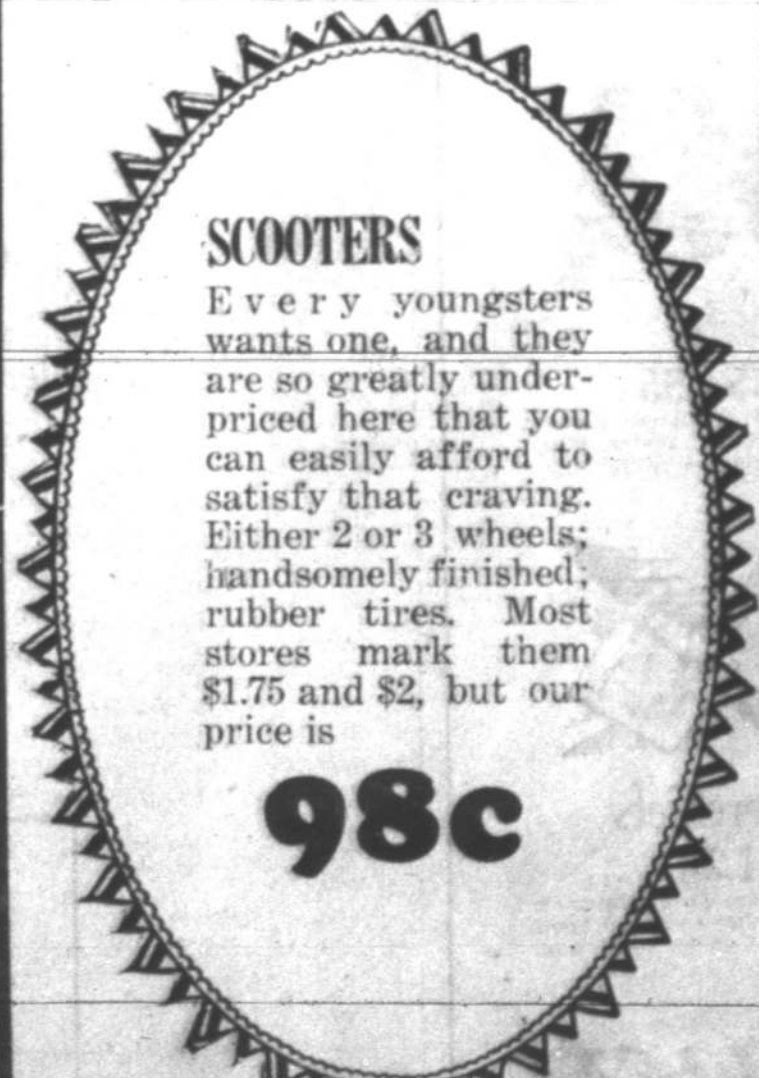
