

16 arrested in drug sweep

Sixteen people are in custody and arrest warrants issued for several others as a result of multi-agency drug sweep in Big Spring Friday.

A Big Spring Police Department news release stated that BSPD officers, assisted by personnel with the Howard County Sheriff's Office, Department of Homeland Security, Drug Enforcement Administration and the U.S. Marshalls, executed numerous arrest warrants throughout Howard County Friday.

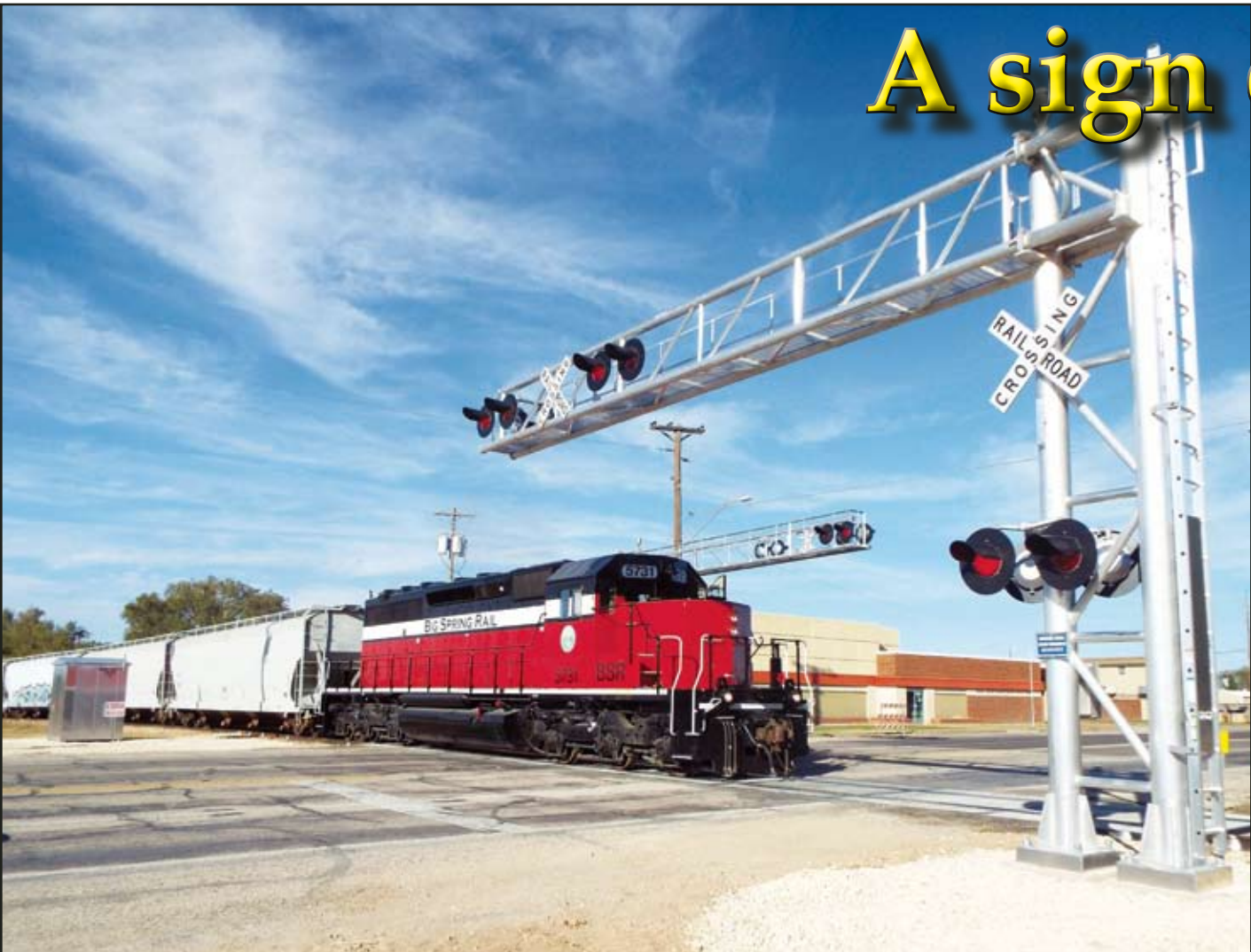
"The warrants were the result of an investigation conducted by the BSPD narcotics division," the release stated.

The following individuals have been arrested as a result of Friday's sweep:

With new warning system installed, train officials urge motorists to use caution on W. Business 20

Big Spring Rail Systems is notifying and alerting motorists along West Highway 80 and West Business 20 that the new railroad crossing lights are now in effect.

The tracks are located east of the law enforcement center and they run north and south across West Business 20.

"Motorists should be prepared to come to a complete stop and remain stopped until the red lights stop flashing and the bells have stopped ringing," Big Spring Rail engineer and conductor Melanie Gambrell said.

According to terminal manager Rick Boiles, the crossing guard that motorists are used to seeing along the tracks will no longer be

Operation Christmas Child collections hitting full stride

Allan's Furniture, the area's drop off site for Operation Christmas Child, will officially begin to collect boxes beginning Monday as volunteers shop and pack boxes so children across the world can receive a present for Christmas.

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international Christian relief and evangelism organization headed by Franklin Graham. The idea is for volunteers to pack a shoebox with items from toothbrushes to small stuffed animals to be delivered to more than 124 million children worldwide for Christmas.

Although the official collection week begins Monday, the site has been accepting pack-

ages for the last few weeks already, said Allan Johnson, coordinator.

Boxes can be dropped off at Allan's Furniture, 202 Scurry St., from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday; 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 21; 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 22; and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday, Nov. 23.

According to the Samaritan Purse website, gift ideas can include a soccer ball with pump, stuffed animals, toys, dolls, musical instruments, shoes, yo-yos, jump ropes, balls, and school supplies like pens, pencils, crayons, markers and notebooks.

Also, non-liquid hygiene items can be included such as toothbrushes, bar soap, combs, washcloths and acces-

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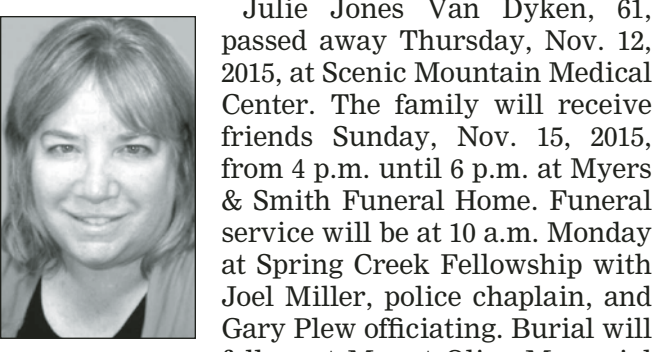

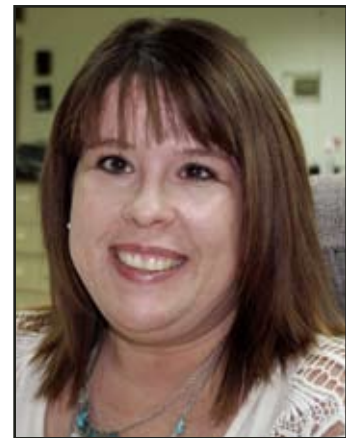

“We received the funding from TxDOT (Texas Department of Transportation) about a year ago to put up the railroad lights, but we have had trains crossing these tracks for the past three years,” Boiles said.

Although the lights have been up and running for about a week, according to Boiles and Gambrell, motorists are still driving through when the lights are flashing and the bells are ringing.

lights with extra batteries. Items not to be included are used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives, military figures, liquids or lotions, medications or vitamins, breakable items or aerosol cans, out of

day candy, food or chocolate, according to the web-site. A full list of present ideas can be found at samaritans-purse.org. For more information about the local drive, call Johnson at 267-6278.

“We have seen cars zip through while the lights are blinking,” Boiles said. “I’ve even been hit by a truck trying to run the lights while on crossing guard duty.”

Motorists that ignore the week old railroad lights could wind up paying traffic tickets in the future, according to Boiles.

“We have set up a camera to catch vehicles that drive through the tracks while the lights are blinking,” said Boiles. “Motorists need to stop and be alert along this crossing.”

According to TxDOT, Texas laws require motorists to yield the right of way to trains and prohibits crossing railroad tracks if a train is visible.

TxDOT recommends reducing speed when approaching crossings and looking both ways. Other recommendations include never stopping on the tracks, making sure all tracks are clear before crossing, and turning down one’s stereo when around a train crossing.

Big Spring Rail Systems said that trains will be occupying this crossing several times per day.

“We just want everyone to be safe,” said Gambrell. “The last thing we would want is an accident that could be easily prevented.”

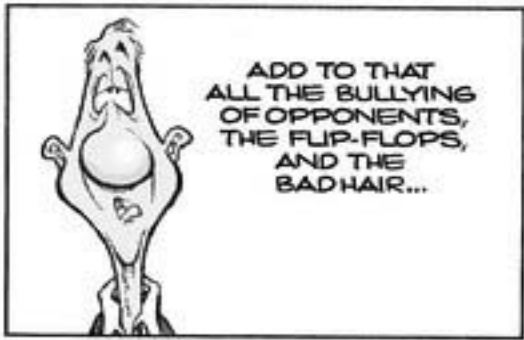
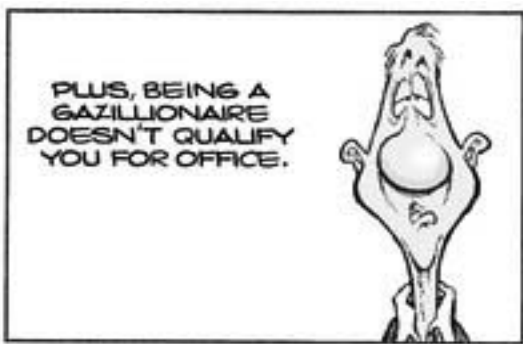
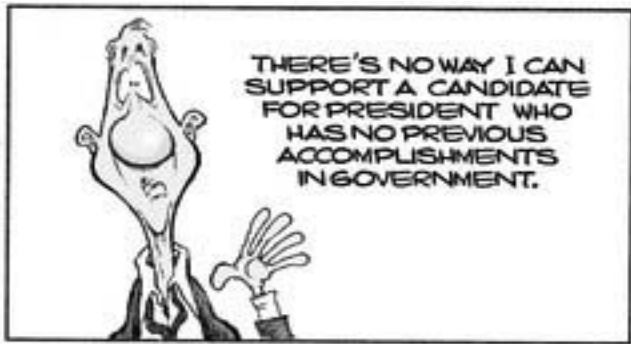
where. It is really a showcase of what he has done the past 55 years.

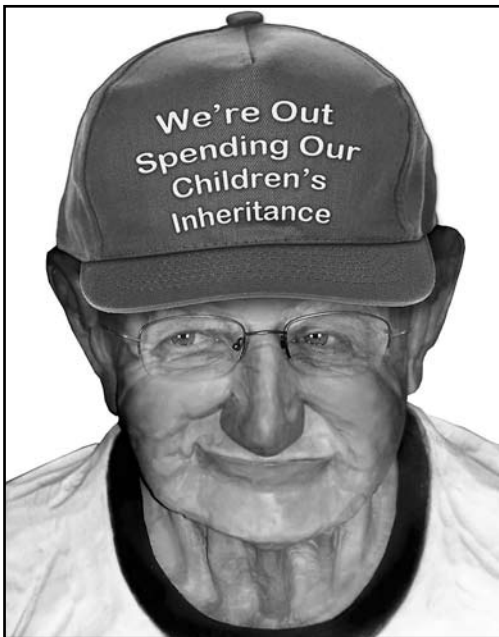

South Texas Children's Home deer hunt

Two boys and four girls from the Children's Home participated in the doe and spike hunt. A wet and cool morning, along with a very pleasant afternoon, was

the setting for the hunt.

These hunts are a management tool in controlling deer populations, but more importantly, they provide an opportunity to experience hunting, fellowship, and the great outdoors to those who would not normally get a chance to do so.

An anonymous donor from Nebraska and a local donor donated several gift cards for prizes. Gift cards were

awarded for harvest of the biggest doe, biggest spike, oldest deer, best shot at the shooting range and a luck of the draw prize.

"Biggest Doe" honors went to hunter Mary, who was guided by Joel. Mary, who showed everyone how to shoot with a score of 40 out of 50, also won the award for "Best Marksman." Joshua, who was guided by Mark Halfmann, harvested a 7 ½ year old

doe and won the prize for "Oldest Doe." Joshua also won the "Luck of the Draw" gift card. The "Biggest Spike" award went to young lady hunter Stormy, who was guided by Carol Sessom, with a spike weighting in at 65 pounds.

All the children also received a participant award for the weekend. For two of the hunters, this was their first deer ever.

Children especially vulnerable to ID theft

As an adult, discovering that your identity has been compromised is a scary occurrence. The survey also revealed that identity thieves most often steal children's Social Security numbers because children seldom have a credit history. Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin encourages parents to regularly monitor their children's credit report to prevent devastating damage to their future.

Since November is National Child Safety and Protection Month, your BBB advises parents to protect your child's identity by:

- Safeguarding your child's personal information. Keep your child's personal identifiable information in a safe place, such as his or her Social Security card, date of birth and birth certificate.
- Monitoring your child's credit report. As soon as you get your child's Social Security card, you should start monitoring his or her report. Request a free credit report from annualcreditreport.com.
- Keeping anti-virus software updated. Some identity thieves create viruses designed to search computers for documents containing your child's Social Security number. Try not to store important numbers or passwords in files or folders located on your computer.
- Safely disposing of personal documents. Shred all papers that include your child's personal information before you throw them out and delete computer files that you no longer need.

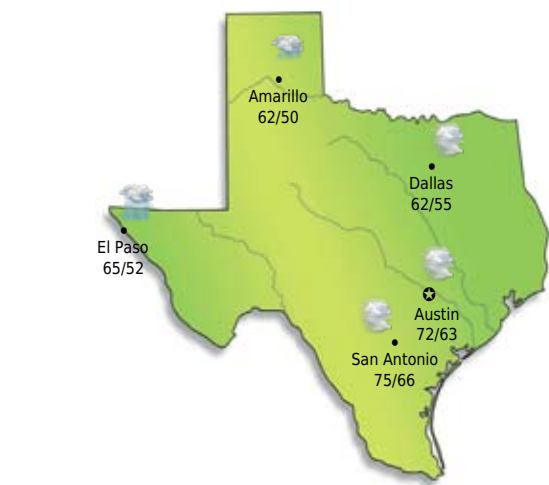

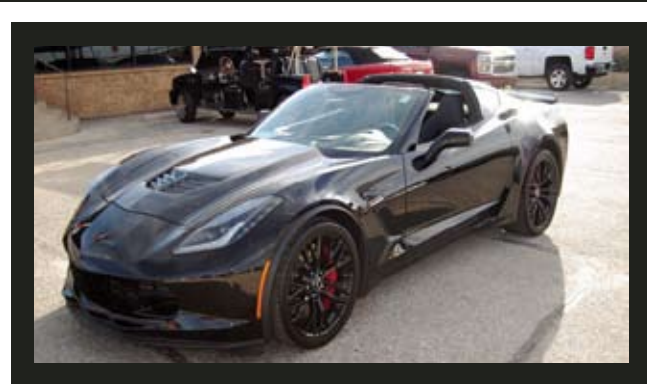

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France vows to punish IS for attacks that kill 127

PARIS (AP) — French President Francois Hollande vowed to attack the Islamic State group without mercy as the jihadist group admitted responsibility Saturday for orchestrating the deadliest attacks inflicted on France since World War II.

Hollande said at least 127 people died Friday night in shootings at Paris cafes, suicide bombings near France's national stadium and a hostage-taking slaughter inside a concert hall.

Hollande, who declared three days of national mourning and raised the nation's security to its highest level, called the carnage "an act of war that was prepared, organized, planned from abroad with internal help."

The Islamic State group's claim of responsibility appeared in Arabic and French in an online statement circulated by IS supporters. It was not immediately possible to confirm the authenticity of the admission, which bore the group's logo and resembled previous verified statements from the group.

As Hollande addressed the nation, French anti-terror police worked to identify potential accomplices to the attackers, who remained a mystery to the public: their nationalities, their motives, even their exact number.

Authorities said eight died, seven in suicide bombings, a new terror tactic in France. Police said they shot and killed the other assailant.

Prosecutor's office spokeswoman Agnes Thibault-Lecuvire said authorities couldn't rule out the possibility that other militants involved in the attack remained at large.

World leaders united in sympathy and indignation, New York police increased security measures, and people worldwide reached out to friends and loved ones in France.

The violence raised questions about security for the millions of tourists who come to Paris and for world events routinely hosted in the normally luminous capital, where troops were deployed to support police trying to restore order.

One of Europe's most heavily visited tourist

attractions, the Disneyland theme park east of the capital, announced it would not open for business Saturday, a rarity.

Hollande said France — which is already bombing IS targets in Syria and Iraq as part of the U.S.-led coalition, and has troops fighting militants in Africa — "will be merciless toward the barbarians of Islamic State group."

Reflecting fears in other European capitals of the risk of coordinated or copycat attacks, the British government scheduled a meeting of its own emergency COBRA intelligence committee overseen by Prime Minister David Cameron. Italy said it, too, was raising security levels on borders and major public places.

Friday night's militants launched at least six gun and bomb attacks in rapid succession on apparently indiscriminate civilian targets.

Three suicide bombs targeted spots around the national Stade de France stadium, north of the capital, where Hollande was watching an exhibition soccer match. Fans inside the stadium recoiled at the sound of explosions, but the match continued amid rising spectator fears.

Around the same time, fusillades of bullets shattered the clinking of wine glasses in a trendy Paris neighborhood as gunmen targeted a string of cafes, which were crowded on an unusually balmy November night. At least 37 people were killed, according to Paris Prosecutor Francois Molins.

The attackers next stormed a concert hall, the Bataclan, which was hosting the American rock band Eagles of Death Metal.

They opened fire on the panicked audience and took members hostage. As police closed in, three detonated explosive belts, killing themselves, according to Paris police chief Michel Cadot.

Another attacker detonated a suicide bomb on Boulevard Voltaire, near the music hall, the prosecutor's office said.

The Bataclan was the scene of the worst carnage.

Video shot from an apartment balcony and posted on the Le Monde

website Saturday captured some of that horror as dozens of people fled from gunfire outside the Bataclan down a passageway to a side street.

At least one person lies writhing on the ground as scores more stream past, some of them bloodied or limping. The camera pans down the street to reveal more fleeing people dragging two bodies along the ground. A woman and two others can be seen clinging to upper-floor balcony railings in an apparent desperate bid to stay out of the line of fire.

Le Monde said its reporter who filmed the scene from his apartment balcony, Daniel Psenney, was shot in the arm after he stopped filming, when he went downstairs to help someone who had collapsed in the alley.

Sylvain, a tall, sturdy 38-year-old concert-goer, collapsed in tears as he recounted the attack, the chaos and his escape during a lull in gunfire.

He was among dozens of survivors offered counseling and blankets in a municipal building set up as a crisis center.

Jihadis on Twitter immediately praised the attackers and criticized France's military operations against Islamic State extremists.

Hollande declared a state of emergency and announced renewed border checks along frontiers that are normally open under Europe's free-travel zone.

President Barack Obama, speaking to reporters in Washington, decried an "attack on all humanity."

A U.S. official briefed by the Justice Department says intelligence officials were not aware of any threats before Friday's attacks.

The Disneyland Paris theme park announced it would not open for business Saturday but billed the move as a matter of sympathy, not security.

Disney said in a statement it would remain closed "in light of the recent tragic events in France and in support of our community and the victims of these horrendous attacks." Some 14.2 million people visited the attraction last year.

Paris is expected to host 80 heads of state, including Obama, for a

climate summit in two weeks. In June, France is scheduled to host the European soccer championship — with the Stade de France a major venue.

And Paris-based UNESCO is expecting world leaders Monday for a forum about overcoming extremism. Iranian President Hassan Rouhani canceled a trip because of Friday's attacks. Hollande canceled a planned trip to this weekend's G-20 summit in Turkey.

France has been on edge since January, when Islamic extremists attacked the satirical newspaper Charlie

Hebdo, which had run cartoons of the Prophet Muhammad, and a kosher grocery. Twenty people died in those attacks, including three shooters.

On Friday night they targeted young people enjoying a rock concert and ordinary city residents celebrating the end of the work week and cheering their nation's soccer squad as it took on the defending World Cup champions.

France has seen several smaller-scale attacks or attempts this year, including on a high-speed train in August when American travelers overpowered a

heavily armed man.

French authorities are particularly concerned about the threat from hundreds of French Islamic radicals who have traveled to Syria and returned home with skills to mount attacks.

"The big question on everyone's mind is: Were these attackers — if they turn out to be connected to one of the groups in Syria — were they homegrown terrorists or were they returning fighters?" said Brian Michael Jenkins, a terrorism expert and senior adviser to the president of the Washington-based RAND Corporation.

I hope she continues to grow and get more confident."

Defensively Big Spring allowed just four points thanks to those adjustments by coach Smalley, and the Lady Steers went

into halftime with a manageable 14-21 deficit.

Big Spring came out of half-time hot, scoring the first six points of the half and pressing Odessa after makes. In just over four minute of game time the Steers scored 11 and allowed just four.

That's when Odessa ramped up their pressure on the Lady Steer perimeter players in their halfcourt defense. The sequence of a Big Spring turnover and an Odessa High player racing the other way for a layup or foul seemed like it was on a loop.

That 17-0 run put a comfortable enough distance between the two squads.

Big Spring did manage to score well in the fourth quarter, but they simply couldn't stop the inside presence of Odessa.

The Lady Steers finished the game with 26 turnovers, their second 20-plus turnover game in a row.

"We need to work on passing the ball and taking care of the ball as a group," Smalley said.

The Lady Steers will get to show off their improvement in that area when they take on Stanton next Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. on the road.

DALLAS (AP) — Zaza Pachulia was the Dallas Mavericks' contingency option when free agent DeAndre Jordan signed with the Los Angeles Clippers over the summer. He didn't play like a backup plan on Friday night. Pachulia notched his fifth double-double in nine games to help the Mavericks beat the Lakers 90-82 for Los Angeles' fourth straight loss. Pachulia led the team with season highs of 18 points and 16 rebounds. He was 5 for 7 from the floor and 8 for 11 at the free-throw line. "My numbers don't count; they don't matter without the win," Pachulia said. "Thank you to my teammates for finding me. Thank you to my teammates for missing some good shots offensively so that I could get some offensive rebounds." "He's been just tremendous," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said. Kobe Bryant returned to action after missing the Lakers' two previous games with a tight back. He hit his first three shots and finished with 19 points while playing a season-high 32:25. "I felt OK," said Bryant, who was also bothered by an upset stomach on Thursday. "It's frustrating ... but I thought we took a step in the right direction." "He's Kobe Bryant," Lakers coach Byron Scott said. "The first 5 or 6 minutes, I was sitting there thinking I can't believe this guy was sick the other day, back was hurting a couple days ago." Dallas extended its record winning streak in the series between the teams to nine. Jordan Clarkson led the Lakers

with 21 points and was 3 of 5 on 3-point shots. Deron Williams had 13 points and Dwight Powell collected 10 points and 12 rebounds for Dallas. The Lakers built a 19-9 lead midway through the first quarter but shot a season-low 33 percent for the game. The Mavericks led by as many as 10 in the third quarter. But the Lakers pulled within 71-70 with 8 minutes left in the fourth. With a chant of "Let's go Lakers!" building, Los Angeles had a chance to take the lead. But Lou Williams missed a jumper, and Wesley Matthews followed at the other end with a 3-pointer. The Mavericks came off a season-high 55.3 percent shooting game in their win over the Clippers on Wednesday night. They shot 36.6 percent compared to the Lakers' season-low 33.0. "The biggest thing was we couldn't finish in the paint," Scott said. Dirk Nowitzki, Dallas' leading scorer going into the game averaging 18.9 points, was held to nine on 4 for 13 shooting. MINUTE BY MINUTE Dallas' Chandler Parsons played a season-high 17:51 and saw action during both halves for the first time this season as he recovers from off-season knee surgery. "Take it game by game and see how the knee responds," Parsons said. NOT SWEET HOME The Lakers' Julius Randle, who grew up in suburban Plano, Texas, played his first NBA game in Dallas and scored six points, shooting 2 for 9. "Regardless of where we are, since we didn't get the win, it's upsetting," Randle said.

OLDIES BUT GOODIES Nowitzki and Bryant, both 37, exchanged smiles after Nowitzki spun under Bryant to score on an up-and-under layup during the second quarter. "It was just two old guys having fun," Bryant said. "I was trying to catch him before he got too high because he's too damn tall." Said Nowitzki: "It's always great to see him. He's a legend." TIP-INS Lakers: They outrebounded Dallas 42-41. Los Angeles entered last in the NBA in rebound margin. ... The Lak-

ers finished a five-game road trip 1-4. "We felt we should have won three of the five," Scott said. 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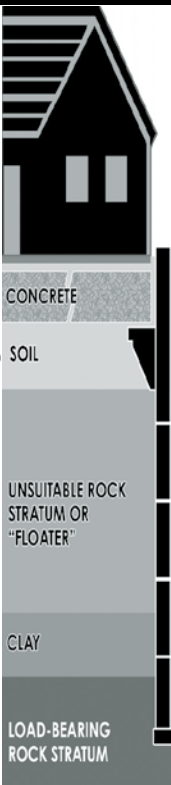
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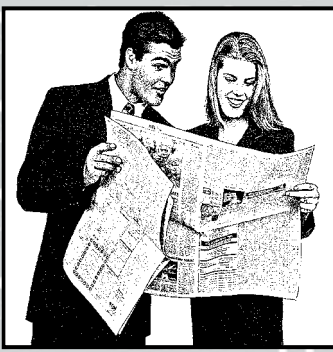

Washington holds off Texas 77-71 in historic game in China

SHANGHAI (AP) — Washington coach Lorenzo Romar has had important road victories in his basketball career, just never one quite this far away.

Andrew Andrews scored 23 points to lead the Huskies to a 77-71 victory over the Texas Longhorns on Saturday in the first-ever regular-season men's basketball game played in China.

Washington led by as many as 9 in the second half before the Longhorns rallied to take a 65-64 lead with two free throws by Javan Felix with 4:48 remaining.

After Andrews hit a 3-pointer to put the Huskies back up by 4, Texas pulled within 2 when Isaiah Taylor drove to the basket for a layup to make it 73-71 with 2 minutes remaining.

The Longhorns couldn't get another shot to fall, though, and Washington closed it out by making free throws down the stretch.

"It's something about Andrew when the big shot is needed, he has the ability to knock it down," Romar said of Andrews' final 3-pointer. "He's had a flair for the dramatic for a long, long time so he would be the one that we wanted to shoot that ball. Texas, they started to smell blood down the stretch, you could just see it."

Malik Dime added 10 points, 14 rebounds and three blocks for the Huskies, and freshmen Marquese Chriss scored 14 points and Noah Dickerson had 9 points and six rebounds.

"They didn't play like freshmen at all," An-

draws said of Chriss and Dickerson. "It's really big-time for us, especially with a young group that they weren't down on themselves, they just came back and we just started making plays when it mattered the most."

Taylor had 29 points and seven rebounds to lead Texas.

"I think we played not to make a mistake, not to miss a shot and that took away from our aggressiveness," Texas coach Shaka Smart said. "I didn't think we responded particularly well when stuff didn't go our way — foul trouble, the other team making a run. So we're kind of fighting from behind for most of the game."

Both teams arrived in China earlier this week and spent a day at the Hangzhou headquarters of Chinese tech giant Alibaba Group, which partnered with the Pac-12 Conference to organize the game.

Romar said his trainers got the team accustomed to the time difference by having them stay awake until 2 a.m. their first night in China, then 3 a.m. the second night and 4 a.m. the third night.

"It all paid off. I think we adjusted very quickly to the time difference and the travel. The pressure's on (the trainers) now to make sure we do it on the way back," he said with a smile.

There weren't a lot of purple or orange shirts in the crowd of 7,188 at Shanghai's Mercedes Benz Arena and not much loyalty to either team, aside from small

contingents of fans from either school behind the benches. The arena was extremely quiet when each team shot free throws, as well, with only a few people offering up the usual distractions or screams.

But the spectators seemed entertained by the game nonetheless, gasping with shot blocks and applauding scrambles for the ball on the court. Another American import, the Kiss-Cam, also got a big reaction from the crowd, as did retired Chinese NBA star Yao Ming, who posed for photographs with cheerleaders and the mascots for both teams on court.

"Maybe at the professional level, they can make more shots," said lawyer Huang Yiyun, who works for a Seattle-based law firm in Shanghai and was wearing a Washington T-shirt in the crowd. "But the game was really well-organized — better than Chinese Basketball Association games. We also got these free T-shirts!"

Stanford and Harvard have already been lined up to play each other next year in a regular-season game in Shanghai.

TIP-INS

Washington: The Huskies are now 12-2 in season openers under coach Lorenzo Romar. The team had not opened its season at a neutral site since the 1986-87 season when it faced Utah State in the Great Alaska Shootout. Washington's roster is the youngest in the Pac-12, with the most players under the age of 20 and 19.

The bidding:

Opening lead — six of spades.

Declarer frequently holds up an ace in notrump play, but there are times when it is much wiser to take the ace at once. The issue can be resolved only if declarer carefully weighs the merits of each case separately.

Consider this deal where West leads the spade six against three notrump. Should South play low from dummy at trick one, or should he play the ace?

When the deal occurred, declarer ducked, and East won the trick with the queen. Back came a spade, covered by the nine and ten, and declarer

ducked again. A third spade then drove out the ace.

South had no choice but to try the diamond finesse, and when West won the ten with the king and cashed his remaining two spades, the contract went down one.

Subsequent analysis revealed that declarer would have made the contract had he played the ace of spades at trick one and then tried the diamond finesse. With the spades blocked, East-West could not have run the suit, and South would have scored nine tricks. The question, therefore, is whether South erred by holding up the ace initially.

The answer lies in which play — going up with the ace or ducking it — offers the better chance for the contract in the long run.

South should reason that, assuming West's six is his fourth-best spade, East has only one card higher than that — the seven, ten, queen or king. Presumably it is not the seven, since with a combination including the K-Q-10, West would have led the king rather than the six. Therefore, East's high spade is either the ten, queen or king.

Declarer can gain by ducking at trick one only if East's high spade is the ten. But if East has either the queen or king, playing the ace assures the contract. The odds are thus 2-to-1 in favor of playing the ace, making it by far the better play.

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Pit bull police dog defies breed's savage stereotypes

STONE RIDGE, N.Y. (AP) — The new rookie at one New York police department weighs 60 pounds, has a big, lolling tongue, a soft caramel coat and a chance to fight stereotypes in addition to crime.

When she graduates Friday from K9 training school, Kiah will be one of just a few pit bulls to serve as a police dog. It's a job usually given to breeds that don't come with the pit bull's reputation — deserved or not — as a savage animal fit only for the company of criminals.

"The breed isn't important," said Brad Croft, who trains dogs for law enforcement and the military and found Kiah in a Texas animal shelter after her previous owner was arrested for animal cruelty. "It's what's inside of the dog that's important."

German shepherds and Belgian Malinois are most commonly employed as police and military dogs, trained to chase and detain suspects or find drugs, cadavers and missing people. Beagles, collies, retrievers and bloodhounds are also used. Pit bull police dogs are almost unheard of.

Kiah (pronounced KY'-uh) will be a sniffer for the Poughkeepsie Police

Department, used to detect drugs and track missing people. She's also a goodwill ambassador, for her breed and for the police.

"She wants to work," said Kiah's handler, Officer Justin Bruzgul. "She's high-energy. Affectionate. I couldn't ask for a better partner."

Croft often visits animal shelters looking for abandoned dogs that he thinks would make good police dogs. He selected Kiah after a worker at the shelter recognized something special in the dog.

Kiah was given to the department at no cost thanks to a partnership between Croft's company, San Antonio-based Universal K9, an Austin animal shelter and Animal Farm Foundation, a nonprofit based in New York's Dutchess County that works to ensure "equal treatment and opportunity" for pit bulls.

Traditional K9 breeds cost as much as \$15,000 per dog.

Despite frightening stories from around the country — a 9-year-old girl was fatally attacked by a pit bull this month on Long Island — advocates say the breed's reputation for violence is undeserved, the result of the breed's use in dogfighting and as

a status symbol for gang leaders.

Bernice Clifford, Animal Farm's director of training, noted that the term "pit bull" itself is misleading, since it is often applied to any dog with a muscular frame and block-shaped head. As a result, she said, many are condemned to shelters and euthanasia simply because they were labeled a pit bull.

According to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, there is no evidence that laws banning particular breeds reduce dog attacks. A 2014 report from the Animals and Society Institute reviewed several years of data on fatal dog bites and found no correlation between dog attacks and breeds.

There's also little connection between a dog's breed and their apti-



tude for police work, according to George Carlson, the Ulster County sheriff's deputy who trained Kiah in Stone Ridge, New York. He said a dog's drive, energy and eagerness to please are more important factors.

Kiah is the only pit bull police dog that he's heard of on the East Coast, Carlson said. He calls her a "sweet-heart" and expects her to excel in her new job.

"Dogs are individuals," he said. "They have their own personalities, just like people. And I'd rather train dogs than people."
