YMCA Programs Successful

This is a conclusion of Thursday's story, June 24, of "13-15 Year Olds Can't Play." The article was written to update the situation of 15 year olds not being able to play with the Women and to emphasize that so far, as of June 24, there has not been a resolution for the 13-15 year olds, who are not going to go to camp, and if there will be any league for them to play in.

Now there are a few things that must be cleared and explained. First of all, this has nothing to do with the YMCA. Some folks thought the YMCA was being put down, but not in the least. The only mention of the YMCA was when it was mentioned that since its existence, nothing could be done about 13-15 year olds playing--meaning simply, that the YMCA has been one organization, of many of Spearman, trying it's best to propose such a league. The YMCA, under the direction of Mr. Jim Benson,

has done a tremendous job with all kinds of activities for young and old alike and boys and girls. For example, Tee-ball was started for both boys and girls--never before had this been done so officially. Young Girls Softball Leagues was started; Junior and Senior Babe Ruths, Men's Softball League. Other activities--successful ones, have been the Soccer--oh how successful this was. Basketball for men, Volleyball for men. Still more activities, Aerobics, Karate, Fitness Program, the Fun Run, Swimming Aerobics--these are just a few of the successful programs Mr. Benson has brought to the Spearman area. I, Criselda Vela, apologize to all that were offended by the article. I would also like to point out that the women in the Women's Softball League have voted by being Official ASA League, which states that no one under 16 can play--who would go against the rules?!

"The YMCA Board is still trying to form a 13-15 year old League." When this was first mentioned--to have a 13-15 year old league--the YMCA had not yet been informed that this could not be done. So finally this little problem was brought up in a Board Meeting, and NOW the YMCA is trying to find some-kind of resolution for this little athletic problem. They have solved many a problem during their 3 or 4 years of existence. I personally, believe that they can and will solve this in time, of course.

Don't get me wrong, I believe some 15 year olds are good enough to play, B U T like the

League Rules state--16 year olds and older are permitted to play--O N L Y!!

Maybe now more women, 16 or older, will decide to play. Let's face it, Softball is fun, and with the YMCA behind it all the way, it is also a 1--only meaning that the League is by the ASA Rules.

IRRIGATION PIPELINE BEING INSTALLED: Irrigation pipeline will conserve water and improve efficiency of irrigation system. The pipeline will also reduce soil erosion. Water losses on a typical ditch runs about one gallon of hour per foot of ditch or about 2.12 acre inches of water in a half mile ditchline per day. Pipeline will make it easier to cultivate and to control weeds. For further information about pipelines contact the Soil Conservation Service in Spearman.

Chief of Police resigns

The resignation of the chief of police, assessment report of storm damage to city property, hot-mix for the airport and extension of certain sewer service were some of the items on the lengthy agenda and addendums of the regular city council meeting Tuesday night.

The resignation of Police Chief Ron Robinson came at the close of the meeting shortly after midnight and following an executive session for the discussion of police personnel.

Robinson gave personal reasons for his resignation. City Manager Jim Murray said the city would go through the regular channels of prescribed practice in advertising for candidates for the job. In the interim, D.J. Alberts will be in charge of the department.

The council voted to extend sewer services along the west side of county road number one to lots one through seven, Tract

A and to the tract adjacent to Tract A to the south. Property owners involved are Jim Noble, Tony Barrera, Del Baskin, Johnny Gaither, Don Cates, Wayne Ware and Tom Madison.

In addition to the regular service charges each month, there will be a 12 surcharge each month to each residence served.

Members of the panel also approved a table of tax discounts as incentive for early payment. The action Tuesday night makes possible a three percent discount to those paying their taxes in October each year, two percent for those paying in November and one percent for those paid in December each year.

A contract with Texas-New Mexico Power and Light Company for emergency paging service was authorized. The city

will pay the utilities company \$25 per month for up to six calls. Each additional call will be \$5.

The purchase of 15 additional individual paging units for members of the volunteer fire department was discussed and approved. The cost of \$3,960 is to be taken out of the volunteer firemen pension-retirement budget for 1981-82 of \$4,000.

It was noted that weather elements had made serious damage inroads into the investment at municipal airport. The excess of rain through the downspouts is undermining what paving there is plus other ravages from the weather.

Upon hearing this report, members of the council authorized expenditure not to exceed \$5,000 for hot-mix paving around the hangars. This would stop storm erosion and also remedy the problem of the "hump" in front of the hangars.

A part of this action on the airport was to authorize City Manager Murray to contact the city's legal counsel to learn if hot-mix paving in excess of the \$5,000 amount can be applied on an emergency basis. By statute, such expenditures of more than \$5,000 must be let for bidding.

This additional expense will be added to the full project cost. Grants and other funding will eventually pay most of the cost of this project once government agency red tape unwinds. In the meantime, physical condition of the project had to be protected. Being the second meeting for the month, there were no routine reports but the agenda and its addendums carried the proceedings well past midnight.

Regular meetings are scheduled each second and fourth Tuesday of each month. The public is invited.

Rain plagues harvest efforts

Rain, hail, and high winds continued to plague area farmers this week, as large thunderstorms dumped rain over the area every night. Believe it or not it is a point, that farmers want no more rain for a while.

Obviously, there has been considerable damage to wheat fields within the past several weeks due to the rain, hail and

high winds. Some fields have been completely wiped out and nearly everyone has had some damage.

Last week a few loads of wheat were received at the Holt and McKibben Equity elevators and one load of wheat was brought to Speartex Grain here, and then the heavy soaking rains began.

Farmers are not only nervous about whether or not they will be able to get in the fields to harvest wheat and have an added problem. Some of the feed grain crops have not been planted and if they have been the heavy rains may have damaged them to the point that they will have to be replanted and time is growing short to get these crops in the ground.

Rainfall in Spearman this past week has been 3.80 inches. As one farmer put it "I'm going to the golf course this afternoon and see if I can get my mind off of this mess."

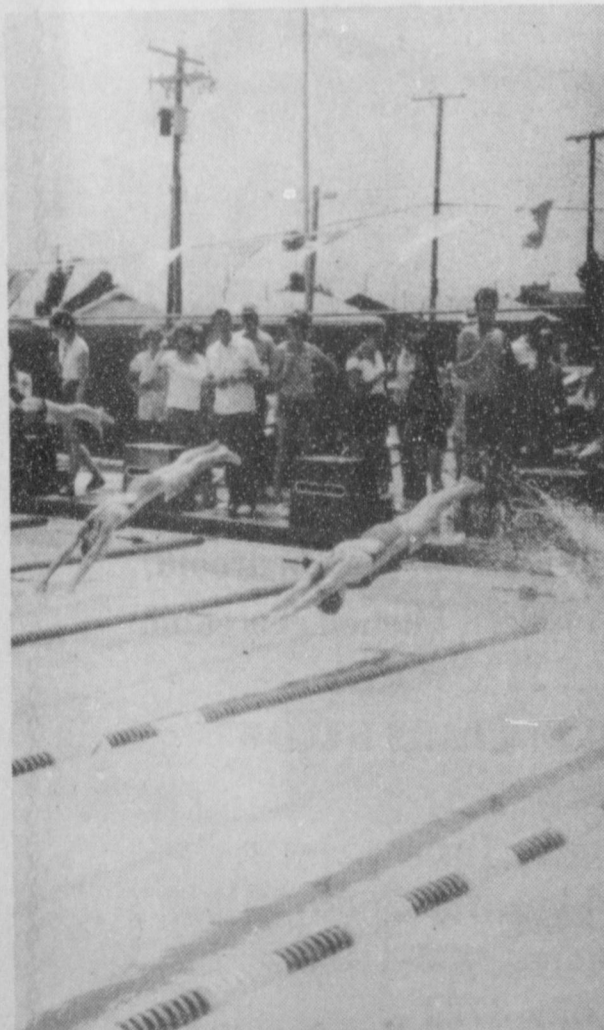

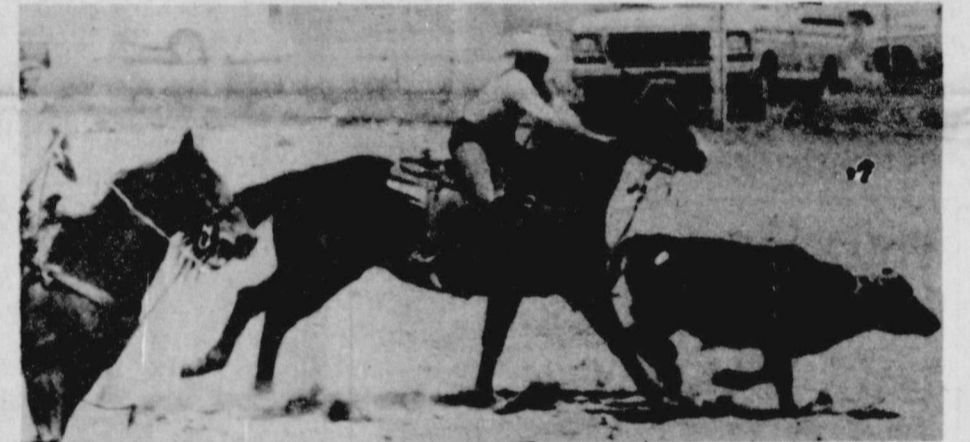

Beginning freshman students are eligible to participate in the unique retreat, but must make reservations by Sunday, Aug. 1. A fee of \$25 for each freshman student will include the Sunday evening meal, workshops and seminars, entertainment and a T-Shirt.

"We usually bring the freshmen in and the information we tell them is basic, but we don't tell them how to adjust to college life or how to cash a check and build pride," said Cindy Pearce, coordinator of residence hall programming.

"If we teach them from the very beginning, they'll be better students in our organization and better alumni later."

The fall retreat will be hosted in conjunction with an orientation session on Monday, Aug. 23, for beginning freshman students who did not attend any of five summer orientation sessions hosted by the University Counseling and Testing Center to pre-register for fall courses.

"The students do not have to be pre-registered to participate," said Pearce.

The new students will learn about WTSU history and traditions, student organizations and activities, church centers, university operation and participate in campus tours, meet members of the administration, faculty and staff and organize the Class of 1986.

Workshop topics will include discussion on campus and community resources career decisions, study skills, money management, "how to make your room like home", time management, library usage and adjusting to college life.

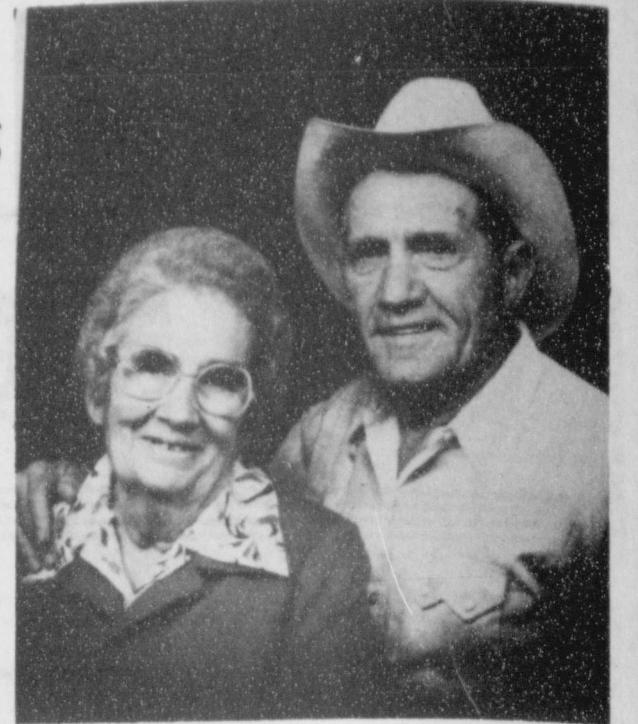
Activities will be devoted to dances, mixers, outdoor movies, picnics and an "Almost Anything Goes" competition.

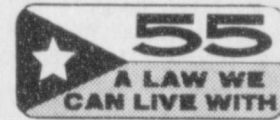

The couple are making their home at 1326 E. Pioneer Street in Irving, Texas.

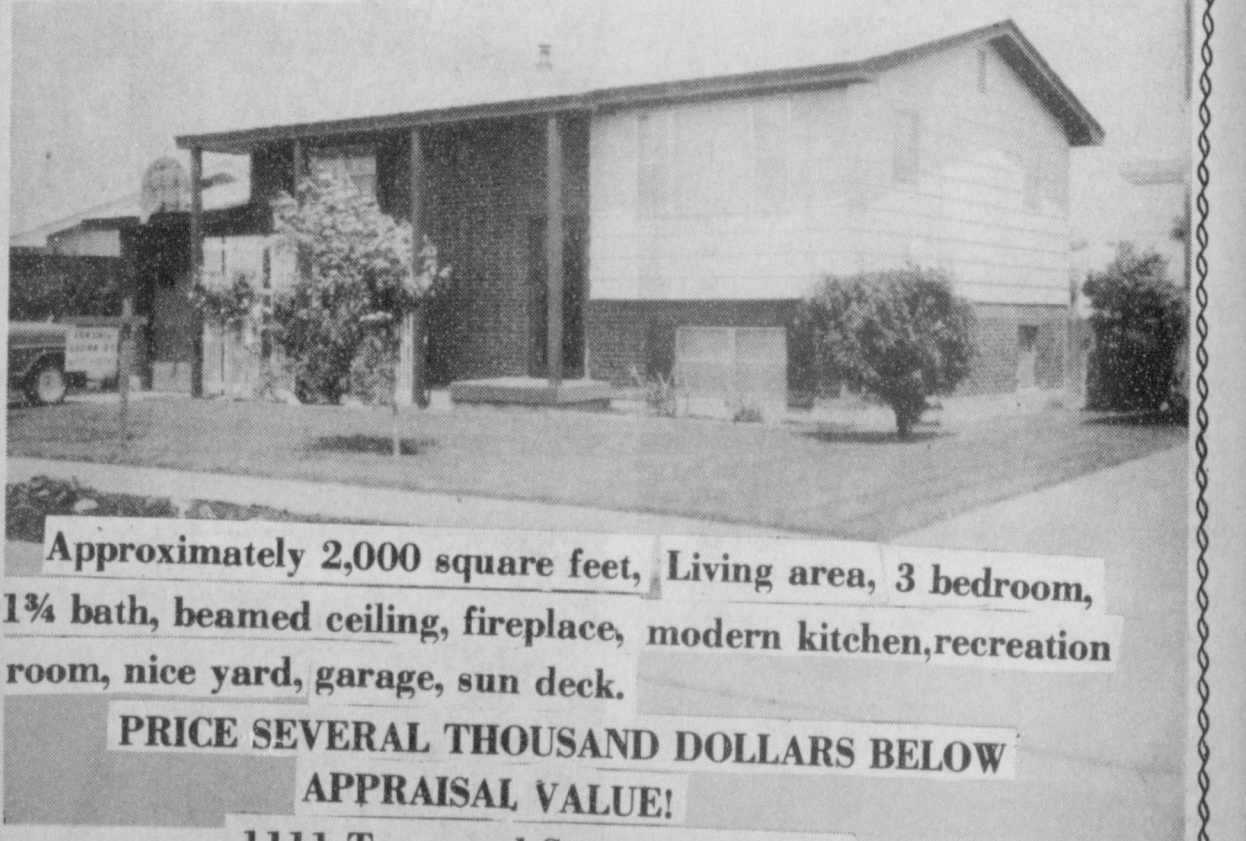

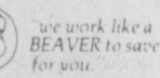

Make A Will

It's surprising, but legal spokesmen confirm that millions of married Americans have no will, that most single Americans have none.

Married couples and single men and women should make wills-to avoid inequities, complications and injustices, which occur daily in the United States.

Consider the case of a married couple killed in an automobile accident, only the breadwinner (the man in this example), having had a will. In many states if the wife survives a few hours longer than her husband, she has usually automatically inherited his assets. Her estate is then unnecessarily tied up. If there are minor children, they come under guardianship laws, involving complicated court orders, etc.

Single men and women also need wills. At death their assets go to parents, then blood relatives, in most states. But there are complications, delays and expenses even if this order of benefits is clear and accepted. A will eliminates such problems, and often taxes and expenses.

In many states one can execute his or her own will by having two witnesses, who understand that they are witnessing a will, sign a dated paper.

TV COMMENTARY

NBC's You Asked For It continues to compete for viewers with dangerous stunts. It almost seems as if network moguls care not whether impressionable children or weak-minded adults are influenced to try such things, which will result in injury or death.

In recent weeks the show included a scene in which a woman in Asia carried out a ritual of kissing a poisonous snake three times. She had to kiss the cobra three times and avoid a bite. If this was an honest scene (and one isn't sure) it was inexcusable to show it. The announcer reported that two of the woman's sisters had been killed trying this!

ANOTHER program showed a chap eating razor blades. The trouble with this is that some will try the same thing. Television shows little responsibility in this regard.

The more dangerous a stunt is, the more viewers and horror watchers the show draws. That seems to be the

total consideration of the commercial networks. NOT long ago some misguided daredevil trying to become famous on TV was physically smashed to pieces trying to jump over a number of buses on a motorcycle-on pavement, where if he missed he smashed into pavement, etc. He missed. That was ABC.

THERE are always people misguided enough, reckless enough, foolish enough to try to become famous, or make money, risking their lives. Children in American homes shouldn't be lured to watch this by networks vying for audiences.

TV's female news commentators, local and national, often didn't distinguish themselves as objective reporters in the past year dealing with the ERA ratification battle. Many gave only one side of the issue, were obviously emotionally caught up in the fight.

Canadians Fourth Of July Rodeo

CANADIAN-Canadian's Annual Fourth of July Rodeo, one of the nation's first & longest-running, is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 2-3-4, with the usual extra attractions including Old Timers Reunion and Fourth of July Parade sponsored by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

There will be three performances of the rodeo at the Canadian Rodeo Arena, at 8 p.m. on Friday, July 2, and at 2 p.m. on Saturday, July 3, and Sunday, July 4.

The annual celebration will be centered on Saturday, July 3, when the annual parade, the old timers reunion, and the Rodeo Association barbecue are scheduled at the Courthouse Square.

Farm Crisis Act Defeat A Disaster

WACO, TX: June 23, 1982-- "The Reagan Administration and the Congress sent notice to the American farmer they are willing to pull the life preserver away from a drowning man by failing to pass the Farm Crisis Act," charged Mike Moeller, President of the Texas Farmers Union.

The Farm Crisis Act, designed and supported by a bipartisan coalition in Congress, would have increased currently depressed commodity prices while reducing supplies of grains and cotton. However, the measure failed to pass the House Agriculture Committee last week in a 21 - 21 tie vote which saw several of the Republican co-sponsors of the bill against the legislation.

"Farmers are suffering more in 1982 than they have in any year since the Great Depression, that is well documented," noted Moeller. He commended Congressmen Tom Daschle (D-S.D.) and Kent Hance (D-TX) for sponsoring the bill and the other members who joined with them in the emergency legislation. The bill was opposed by the Reagan Administration and Agriculture Secretary John Block who personally appeared at the hearings to testify against the Farm Crisis Act.

The proposed legislation would have given wheat, cotton, rice and feed grain farmers the option through a national referendum to take acreage out of production and subsequently raise the price of their commodity. The Congressional Budget Office estimated the program would have actually saved about \$900 million in storage and price support payments over the next four years.

"The Reagan Administration talks about reducing supplies and increasing prices for farmers, but when we come up with a plan to do just that and actually save the government money, they oppose the measure," Moeller said. "They are going to have to come up with some alternative plan to the Farm Crisis Act if they expect family farmers to remain in business over the next few years."

The agriculture industry, along with other basic industries such as housing and automobiles, are going to have to improve if the nation is ever going to arouse from the economic doldrums. "Otherwise without rectifying legislation, we can look forward to another harvest of red ink this year and more family farmers going out of business in record numbers," Moeller concluded.

GTE Names GM For New Division

SAN ANGELO--Gerald Hamilton, Broken Arrow Division manager for General Telephone, has been named general manager of the newly formed Oklahoma Division Operations, with headquarters in Broken Arrow, effective July 4.

The new division operations, including all exchanges served by the current Broken Arrow, Purcell and Guyton Divisions, as well as those in the Perryton (Texas) District, located in the Texas Panhandle, will be one of 11 division operations in the four-state area served by General Telephone.

The changes in the company's organizational structure are being made to make the company more responsive to individual customer needs, according to E.L. "Buddy" Langley, General Telephone Company of the Southwest president.

FOCUS ON BREAKFAST

Breakfast-Eaters More Likely To Meet Nutritional Needs

Several studies indicate breakfast is the most frequently missed meal by Americans of all ages. Nutritionists, however, regard breakfast as the most important meal of the day since the longest period of time between any two meals is usually between the evening meal or snack and breakfast the next morning. The body needs the nutrients and energy from the breakfast meal to produce efficient late morning physical and mental performance.

With an increasing number of both parents working and changing lifestyles, there is a tendency "to eat on the run" or skip meals. This is not a good habit, because several studies suggest that inadequate or skipped breakfasts may result in dietary inadequacies. It is possible that nutrients lost by missing or eating inadequate breakfasts will not be obtained from the rest of the day's meals.

Most nutritionists agree that breakfast should provide one-fourth to one-third of an individual's total daily requirements for calories and many essential nutrients. An easy rule to follow is to include foods from at least three of the Basic Four Food Groups.

A study conducted in Cleveland, Ohio examined breakfast patterns of children 2-11 years old. The results showed that ready-to-eat cereal breakfasts which included either a breakfast-sweetened or non-ready-sweetened cereal had a similar nutritional content--both of these breakfast types provided 25% or more of the Recommended Dietary Allowances for many vitamins and minerals. When a breakfast including a ready-to-eat cereal was compared to other breakfast alternatives, the ready-to-eat cereal breakfast was found to be higher in vitamins, minerals and fiber and lower in calories, fat, cholesterol, sodium and protein. The total sugar content was similar. The study also indicated that when breakfast was skipped, less than two-thirds of the Recommended Dietary Allowances for vitamins B₆ and D, folic acid, magnesium and zinc was met.

A daily breakfast provides assurance that individual nutritional requirements will be met, a convincing reason to "break the fast" each and every day.

Tax Relief For Two-Paycheck Families

DALLAS, TEXAS--If you and your spouse both bring home a paycheck, you may be able to deduct up to \$1500 on next year's tax return. Differing rate schedules for single and married taxpayers gave rise to the so-called "marriage tax penalty" when two wage earners of relatively equal income are married.

The Economic Tax Recovery Act of 1981 will bring some relief to working couples who have been subject to the marriage tax penalty. The deduction from gross income is 5% of the qualified earned income of the spouse with the lower qualified-earned income, or \$1500, whichever is less.

For example, if you earn \$20,000 and your spouse earns \$8,000, you would be taxed on \$27,600 (\$8,000 X 5% subtracted from \$28,000) rather than the \$28,000 combined income. Although this new provision

should provide some relief for many two-earner families, you should continue to keep track of your withholding to avoid owing additional taxes at tax time.

If you find that you are falling behind during the year, the two most common remedies for underwithholding are estimated tax payments or revised Forms W-4, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate."

Estimated taxes are paid directly to your employer. If you choose, instead, to give your employer a revised Form W-4, you can claim fewer or no allowances, request that your employers withhold at the higher single rate even though you're married, or, if you're already at the single rate, request additional withholdings.

Besides the unpleasant surprise of a big tax bill, failing to have enough withheld can bring about an estimated tax penalty. Making sure that your current

year's withholding equals or exceeds your prior year's tax will insure that you avoid this penalty.

Additional information is available in IRS Publication 505, Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax. The free publication may be requested by using the handy order form in your tax package.

Elimination of the marriage tax penalty will provide relief for many two-earner families. But, a watchful eye to insure proper withholding is still important.

IRS in quarterly installments on vouchers that come with the Form 1040-ES, "Declaration of Estimated Tax for Individuals." The 1040-ES comes with instructions and a worksheet to help you determine how much additional tax you must pay to supplement the withholdings from your wages.

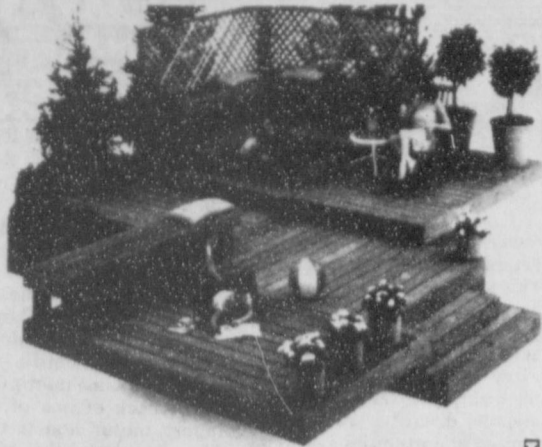

WINNING WAYS WITH WOOD

How to Build Your Deck — Start With a Plan



Knowing whether your deck will be used for dining or sunning is essential to a good work plan.

A new deck can do wonderful things for your home's appearance and your outdoor lifestyle, but before you dive into the project, take time out to do some thoughtful planning. Your project will go quicker in the long run, and you'll be happier with the results.

First, analyze your needs. What's the main purpose of the deck? Is it for sun worship or dining al fresco, to dress up an entry or provide a private getaway? Knowing the deck's function is essential to a good plan. You may find you need several areas or levels — one for entertainment and outdoor cooking, one for sunning. While rectangular and square decks are easiest to build, the simplest design may not be the best for you. Multiple levels can add more flair and function than one large platform in some situations.

Take inventory of factors that will affect your deck: noise, sun, wind, shade, traffic flow from house, neighbors, and views should all be considered.

When selecting materials, your first decision is what kind of wood to use. Pressure treated lumber is often recommended, for several reasons: low cost, low maintenance, resistance to decay and insects, handsome finish qualities, and workability. A process which forces preservatives deep into the cells of quality lumber makes Georgia-Pacific pressure treated lumber a solid choice for decking, joists and beams. It's essential to use only pressure treated lumber for posts to resist decay.

Always check the building code before beginning construction to be sure you meet its requirements, and be sure to follow manufacturer's instructions when using power tools.
