Mrs. Mary Clay, teacher of the Special Education classes of Hart School, has been actively engaged in teaching for twelve years. Five years of this time was spent in work with non-English speaking preschool children.

Voluntary Farm Programs Available To County Farmers

A total of 1050 farms in Castro County are eligible to benefit from one or more of the 1970 voluntary farm programs, according to Charley E. Hill, County Executive Director of the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

"The voluntary farm programs enable farmers to work together to strengthen farm prices and to bring production into line with needs," Hill said.

"American farmers are the world's most efficient crop producers. They provide an abundance of food and fiber for the nation and for the world. However, their very efficiency can be a mixed blessing for them if over-production results in a glut on the market and lower farm prices. The purpose of farm programs is to help provide a stable and prosperous agricultural economy by enabling farmers to cooperate voluntarily in obtaining the desired production," he added.

In Castro County, 1040 farms have feed grain bases totaling 245,112.0 acres; 991 farms have wheat allotments totaling 78,964.5 acres; and 984 farms

have cotton allotments totaling 56,134.0 acres. All farms with feed grain bases, cotton or wheat allotments are eligible for participating in the 1970 voluntary farm programs.

Sign-up period will be Feb. 2 through March 20 at the County ASCS Office.

As participants in the programs, feed grain farmers divert 20 percent of their base acres into conserving uses. If they choose, they may divert additional acreage for which they will receive payment. (provisions for farms with small feed grain bases are somewhat different and allow more diversion benefits.)

In return for program participation and compliance, feed grain producers will earn price-support payments and will be eligible for price-support loans.

Wheat allotments for 1970 are about 12 percent below 1969. A participant may grow his entire allotment if he wishes, but must divert to conserving use an acreage on his farm equal to 30.3 percent of his allotment. (This is the approx-

imate difference between the 1968 and 1970 allotments.)

In return for program participation and compliance, wheat growers will earn domestic marketing certificates which they may cash, and will be eligible for price-support loans. If they choose to, they may sign up and divert up to one half of their wheat allotment (more on small allotment farms) and earn diversion payments.

No diversion provisions have been made for cotton, since cotton is not in excess supply. In fact, cotton allotments were increased for 1970 over 1969 to obtain more production. Growers participating in the cotton program will earn price-support payments and will be eligible for price-support loans.

Hill said that in Castro County last year about 92.5 percent of eligible feed grain farms were signed up in the program, 94.3 percent of eligible wheat farms, and 98.9 percent of cotton farms.

Home Study Course Offered To Readers

The Castro County Family Living Committee is sponsoring a home study course on Management for all interested homemakers at no charge.

Lessons will be mailed each Monday for six weeks. Topics are Your Values, Your Guiding Stars; How Good An Executive Are You? Managing Your Bank Account; How to Live on What You Make; When You Use

Credit; and Be a Good Shopper.

The first lesson will be mailed Feb. 23. There is opportunity for thirty people to take this course and it will be offered again if necessary.

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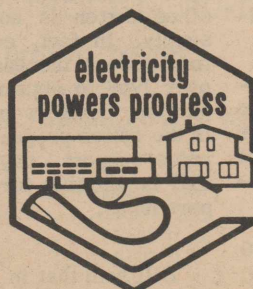

HAM CASSEROLE

1 1/2 c. scalded milk
1 c. bread broken in small pieces
1/4 c. melted butter
2 pimentos, chopped
1 1/2 T. minced onion
1 T. minced parsley
1 c. grated cheese
1/2 tsp. salt
3 eggs, well beaten
2 c. diced cooked ham
1 1/2 c. peas, drained

Pour milk over bread. Add butter, pimento, onion, parsley, cheese, and salt. Add eggs and mix all together. Put ham and peas in buttered baking dish and pour milk mixture slowly over them. Bake at 325 degrees for about 50 minutes. Serves 6 to 8.

VEGETABLE CASSEROLE

4 slices bacon
1 onion chopped
2 c. cooked green lima beans
2 c. cooked spaghetti
1 c. tomato juice
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 c. grated cheese
1/2 c. buttered crumbs

Moments OF Meditation

The curse of television is that so few families use selectivity in its use.

If there are nothing but poor, unappealing programs available at a certain time, nobody thinks to turn the set off- instead, their eyes will continue to be glued to whatever poor fare is being offered.

Finally comes the news, weather and sports- and then to bed. Thus there is "no time for meditation."

All of the Psalmist's meditations, as recorded in the Psalms, were about God.

He describes the righteous man as one who meditates, day and night, on God's law. (1:2)

He ponders, also, as he recalls all that God has done for him. "I will meditate also of all Thy work, and talk of Thy doings."

He thinks of God's instructions and teachings: "I will meditate in Thy precepts, and have respect unto Thy ways."

He seeks guidance in his meditation, "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in Thy sight, O Lord, my strength and my Redeemer." Then, he is sure, "The meditation

of my heart shall be of understanding." (49:3). But his meditations will not be confined to the "night watches: "It is my meditation all the day." (119:97).

You will notice, I am sure, that the Psalmist's meditations invariably were slanted toward God. To him, such periods of cogitation would be utterly meaningless were thoughts of his supreme Guide eliminated.

How many otherwise insurmountable problems would be solved if we would take time to take God into our calculations?

"Let go, and let God."

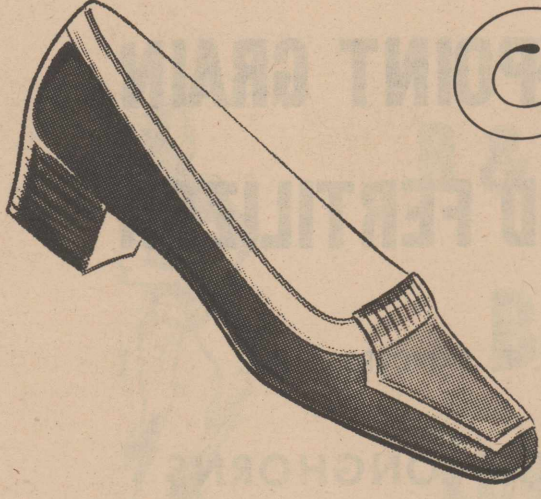
Make God a part of your life- your constant Guide.

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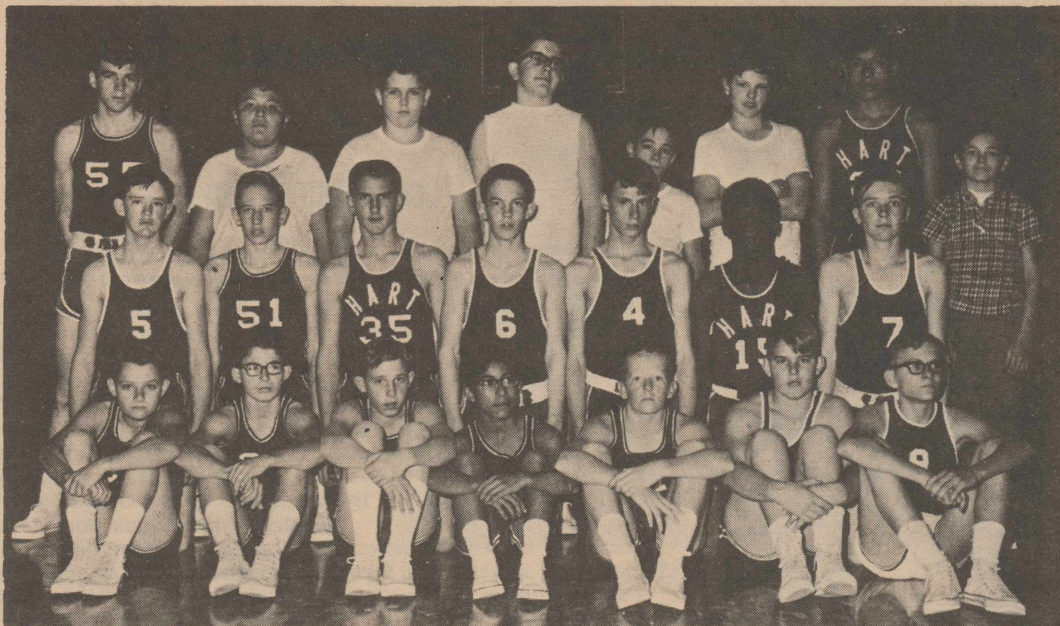

Local newspapers, wire services and radio and television stations picked up the march and coupons poured in from across the country. Response to the campaign has come from churches, communities, organizations and individuals.

deemable for cash have come in. On the day that the 600,000 coupons goal was reached, some \$1300 in cash and more than 1,000 books of green stamps had come in.

Response to the drive has been both rewarding and surprising to those who worked closely with it. The goal was reached faster than expected. Stories connected with the collection of the coupons have been heartwarming.

A small, West Texas town with a population of only 400 took the drive as a community project and raised some 37,000 coupons. A eighth grade history class from New Mexico gathered over 100,000 coupons. An eighteen year old home-bound student from Amarillo heard of the project and began collecting. She sent in her contribution of over 35,000.

A radio-television station in New Mexico took up the campaign and collected over 78,000 coupons from their listeners. Many more came directly to the college.
