## Weather-Eye Satellite Sends Back Cloud Shots

WASHINGTON (AP)—The little camera was outperforming the big camera aboard the orbiting Tiro II weather-eye satellite today. But space scientists were hopeful that the larger camera's pictures would improve.

The satellite itself was launched Wednesday into what scientists said was the most nearly perfect orbit yet achieved. It ranges from 406 to 431 miles above the earth.

National Aeronautics and Space

Administration officials still have not decided what's causing the trouble with the pictures from the larger camera. They said the difficulty could be in the equipment or a temporary result of an initial power drain.

If reduced power is to blame, there were hopes that the power supply for transmitting the pictures might build up as the drum-shaped satellite continues orbiting in the sunlight. Its batteries draw power from solar cells.

The large camera takes pictures covering an area about 800 miles square. The little camera snaps a 30-mile zone in the center of the area covered by the wider angle.

Photos enlarged from the little camera enable weathermen to identify cloud types. Such pictures are coming through in good form from Tiro II.

But with poor quality wide angle photos from the larger camera, scientists have trouble pinpointing the exact section of the earth photographed by the small camera.

The over-all photo gives the scientists the same advantage that the worker of a simple jigsaw puzzle gets at the outset by checking with the picture on the box cover to find where a particular piece belongs.

Tiro II's role is to provide cloud cover pictures which can be used in forecasting large weather systems such as snowstorms. Tiro I, orbited last April, sent back similar cloud pictures. But it was only an experimental satellite and no attempt was made to work out forecasts from its pictures.

There were indications that daily forecasts might have to await more advanced satellites. But major storm weather might be analyzed quickly with Tiro II photos.

If Tiro II proves successful, it could lead within four or five years to an operational network of six or seven polar-orbiting weather satellites. Twenty-one other nations have been invited to take part in the Tiro research program by comparing photos of clouds taken over their areas with surface observations at the time.

In an associated project, a high altitude balloon was launched Wednesday near Sioux Falls, S.D., about the same time Tiro II was fired aloft from Cape Canaveral, Fla., on the nose of a Thor-Delta rocket.

### Santa To Bring World's Biggest Sleigh To Snyder

The passing of Thanksgiving Day marks the beginning of the Christmas shopping season, and tomorrow Snyder area youngsters are scheduled to get their first look at Santa Claus in 1960.

### Congo Peace Efforts Hit Roadblock

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—U. N. efforts to bring peace to the Congo ran into another roadblock today after President Joseph Kasavubu persuaded a conciliation group to hold up its trip to the chaotic country.

The 15-nation Asia-African mission, slated to leave today for Leopoldville, suddenly canceled its trip Wednesday night when Kasavubu asked for time to prepare public opinion in the Congo to receive the U. N. delegation.

Delegates here had been apprehensive as to what kind of reception the group would receive from angry Congolese soldiers aroused over the killing of four of their men in a clash with U. N. troops.

The chief aim of the mission was to bring together rival forces backing Kasavubu and Patrice Lumumba, deposed Congo premier who has been supported by the Soviets.

Kasavubu, who opposed the mission for the past two weeks, changed his mind after winning the Congo's empty U. N. seat, and was reported doing what he could to try to smooth the way for the group.

His efforts apparently failed. He told Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld's advisory committee Wednesday night that it would not be wise to make the trip at this time.

High officials under Col. Joseph Mobutu, Congo army leader, had served notice earlier they would send out troops to prevent the mission from landing at Leopoldville airport.

Resentment against the United Nations reached a fury pitch this week after Lt. Col. Joseph Koko and three Congo soldiers were killed in a clash with U. N. Tunisian forces guarding the residence of a Ghana diplomat declared persona non grata by the Mobutu regime.

Fearing reprisals by aroused Congolese, the U. N. command in Leopoldville has ordered all U. N. employees living in outlying districts to move into the headquarters area in the capital.

In many cities are merry parades, a dancing dragon, and a gigantic gobbler.

For more than 2½ million men and women in the armed forces everywhere, turkey and all the trimmings is the dietary order of the day.

In the Western Pacific, where the time differential brought celebrations ahead of our date, thousands of servicemen and women already have attended church services to celebrate our solemn yet joyful holiday.

## Holiday Blighted By Road Mishaps

Thanksgiving holiday period. It says it is not the type of holiday which brings out the enormous number of motorists on other major holidays.

But The Associated Press in a survey for a period comparable to the Thanksgiving holiday found 433 persons killed in traffic accidents, 69 died in fires and 144 died in miscellaneous type accidents. The period was from 6 p.m. Wednesday Nov. 9 until midnight Sunday Nov. 13.

During last year's Thanksgiving holiday period, the AP count showed 445 traffic fatalities. The overall total of 650 accidental deaths included 70 in fires and 135 in miscellaneous accidents. In 1958 there were 434 killed in traffic, 54 in fires and 118 in miscellaneous accidents.

The early traffic death toll included 3 from Ohio, 2 each from California, Colorado and North Carolina and 1 each from Arizona, Arkansas, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Indiana, Tennessee, Texas and West Virginia.

Traffic accidents across the nation took a score of lives in the first hours of the extended hours of the extended Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

Since the count started at 6 p.m. (local time) Wednesday, 23 deaths on highways were reported. In addition, 3 persons lost their lives in an airplane crash in North Carolina and 2 children perished in a fire in Canastota, N.Y. The count will continue until midnight Sunday, covering a period of 102 hours.

Fair weather prevailed in most sections of the country but it was raining and foggy near Warren, in northeastern North Carolina Wednesday night when a light plane crashed in a wooded area killing two women and a man.

### Jury Hears Statement

HOUSTON (AP)—Judge Langston King let a jury trying Clarence "Sack" Collins for murder hear a statement signed by Collins about the slaying Wednesday.

Collins, a 300-pound Negro longshoreman, is on trial as the accused slayer of a man in the shooting of Mrs. Wilma Selby, 46, at her home here Nov. 16, 1959.

In his statement, Collins said Maggie Morgan, a Negro fortune teller, promised him \$1,500 for killing Mrs. Selby.

Relating that Mrs. Morgan and Patra Mae Bounds, a Negro masseuse, went with him to the Selby home and waited until Mrs. Selby arrived, Collins stated:

"As soon as I seen her, shot at her twice."

Joseph Selby, husband of the slain woman, is serving a life sentence for arranging the murder. The Morgan woman drew the death penalty.

## President-Elect Back With His Family For Thanksgiving

WASHINGTON (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy is back with his family today for the Thanksgiving holiday and an early celebration of his small daughter's birthday.

Kennedy flew in Wednesday night from Palm Beach, Fla., where for nearly two weeks he had been combining vacation and work in preparation for taking over direction of the government Jan. 20. He plans to return to Palm Beach tonight for another week or so.

But today is put aside for quiet observance of the holiday with his wife, Jacqueline, who is expecting their second child next month, and daughter Caroline, who will be three years old Sunday.

On advice of her doctor Mrs. Kennedy is avoiding travel and has been at the family's Georgetown home here during her husband's stay in Florida.

She and Caroline will remain when he returns, so the little girl's birthday is being celebrated three days early so her father can take part in the observance.

Kennedy brought several gaily wrapped gifts from Palm Beach, and two others in a cage—a pair of live white ducks which were presented to him for Caroline by Barbara Behm, 9, daughter of a West Palm Beach city councilman.

On the plane which brought him from Florida, Kennedy laughingly inquired of an aide whether there were any special instructions for feeding the ducks. All the aide could offer was that apparently they are fed about the same as chickens.

Also during the flight the president-elect disclosed to newsmen that the baby Mrs. Kennedy is expecting will be born here in Washington's Georgetown University Hospital, and not in New York as had been indicated earlier. The birth, which will be a caesarian, is expected about mid-December, Kennedy said.

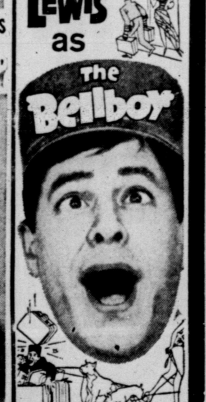

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# Finish Fashions For New First Lady

When the next First Lady moves into the White House in January, likely as not she'll take along some Finnish dresses with primitive lines and thundering color.

Mrs. John Kennedy bought nine not long ago in a small Finnish specialty shop in Cambridge, Mass. (Design Research, Inc.), the only place in the country handling Marimekko fashions.

By the time she's comfortably settled in her new Pennsylvania Avenue residence, the dresses should be available in New York shops.

They'll probably never replace her high fashion clothes for public appearances and entertaining. But for relaxing about the presidential mansion, the simple, uncluttered—sometimes tentlike—dresses can't be beat.

Up until now, Finland has been chiefly known to Americans for paying its World War I debt (600 million dollars) and for driving back the Russians—in 1918, 1939, 1943—But its fashion may become something to reckon with.

Marimekko clothes are the inspiration of Armi and Viljo Raita, a husband-and-wife whose 10-year-old firm in Helsinki, Marimekko Oy, makes textiles as well as clothes.

Finland's fashions differ from U. S. styles on two counts:

**COLOR** — They're brilliantly bold in combinations seldom seen here: red, pink and orange, blue, purple and orange, brown, purple and blue.

**SIMPLICITY** — They're pared down to the simplest form, completely unadorned, so that the amazing colors come through. Primitive, honest, pure and gutsy are words most often used in description.

Some of the dresses are freeform and straight-line. Others flare a little, looking like paper doll dresses. There are also housecoats, beachwear, children's dresses with matching bloomers. Many dresses have their own high-crowned hats and tote bags.

Fabric is mostly heavy canvas-like cotton in silk-screened patterns of irregular dots, stripes, checkerboards, Mondrian-like designs.

The original Marimekko dress (mekko) is the Finnish word for girl's dress) was a loose fitting coat, meant for women to wear while caring for children, doing housework or working in the garden.

Chief designer is Vuokko Eskolin-Nurmesniemi, who also is an international prize-winning designer in glasswork and silver.

Mrs. Raita, a woman of charm and forceful expression, visited New York the other day and her views of women and fashion are "not to be passed over lightly."

**WOMAN** — "The same with the rocks — stern, dreaming, harsh maybe, but often greatly individual and capable of winning. Ageless, proud, free, — modern women at her best."

**HER FASHIONS**: "Everyday dresses which look nothing and can be made very own-looking according to the bearer's individualism."

Versatile Mrs. Raita, who says she has "other products than ready-to-wear always dropping from my head," admits she doesn't really like fashion. And that's the point of her dresses:

"Marimekko fashions have something to give the modern, independent, intellectual woman—an unpretentious way of dressing to forget dresses, because she has other interests of children, home, books, music, career. Yet the colors thunder out of inspired pots and jars to give modern women a new personality too."

This perhaps explains their attraction for Mrs. Kennedy, with her many cultural interests and her love for bright color and simple line in clothes.

The serious side of the program was presented by Mrs. John Letwich who said, "In small things lie the great things of life. In all things charity." She also gave the objectives of the club: To elevate the standards for women in business and the professions. To promote the interests of business and professional women of the United States. "We must be spiritually, mentally, physically and emotionally prepared. Sponsor forums, panels and clinics under professional guidance.

"Let us do our very best in the service of our women, remembering the words from the scripture, 'As we therefore, have opportunity let us do good unto all men.' In this spirit, I pledge you my best efforts and fullest cooperation."

"Allow and also see that he does the jobs he is capable of doing. Show interest in problems he brings home from school. One of

the first things a child should learn is obedience. Other teachings should be in promptness in word, and respect for authority. Praise your child, make him feel successful and wanted, help them do their homework, but never criticize school or teachers before your child. Last but not least, show your interest by joining the P-TA and being an active member."

In taking the part of the child Mr. Fields pointed out that

"school exists for the child, the teacher should try to develop each child to their capacity and set goals, and make the child feel accepted by teacher and classmates."

In speaking of the teachers part, he encouraged the teachers to conduct a good personal life and mix with the community.

## Minister: Don't Adopt

Even with 13,000 children in 139 orphanages scattered over South Korea, Dr. Bob Pierce usually says "No" to American parents who want to adopt them.

The man who heads World Vision, Inc., an organization which pays for the parentless Korean youngsters' support, thinks it is important to the children and to Korea to keep them in their own country.

Dr. Bob, as he is called, worries about an Asian child's ability to be absorbed in Western culture, his acceptance by schoolmates, his later chances to marry.

"The country is suffering now from a lack of leadership," the ordained, Baptist minister adds. "We don't want to deprive Korea of the best kind of trained, civilized youngsters that Christian love can produce."

However, there ARE orphans in Korea to be adopted by Americans. One such baby, a blue-eyed, brown-haired GI-Korean child sitting in a garbage dump prompted Dr. Bob to start his work with orphans.

"I'm all for Americans adopting mix-blood children and taking them from countries where the cultural pattern means absolute rejection for the child," Dr. Bob says. "The GI children broke my heart. Koreans absolutely would not accept them."

Following wide publicity about the plight of the mix-blood children Americans adopted or are adopting them.

Those orphanages financed by the World Vision Inc. house full-blood Koreans. "We're raising them in their own culture," Dr. Bob says.

Dr. Bob became a servant of missionaries following a tour of China in 1947. Three years later he founded World Vision, Inc., to raise money for Protestant missionaries at work in places of need with little financial help. The orphanages are administered by Korean churches and staffed, except for nine Americans, by Koreans.

World Vision provides \$10 a month for each child through the contributions of some 12,000 persons in America. The children attend school in the villages or cities where they live.

Dr. Bob's story of World Vision and the people in 20 countries which it has helped was published recently in a book called, "Let My Heart Be Broken."

Crumb bread and mix with melted butter; sprinkle over macaroni. Bake in moderate (375 degrees) oven 25 minutes or until hot and bubbly; brown top under broiler. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

### Brown Sugar Coconut Cookies

- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup flaked coconut
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts.

Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Cream shortening and sugar; beat in egg. Stir in sifted dry ingredients, coconut and nuts. Drop a few inches apart, on ungreased baking sheet; flatten with tines of fork. Bake in moderate (375 degrees) oven until lightly browned—10 to 12 minutes. Makes 48.

## Europeans Suddenly Detect True Charm Of Americans

ROME — O frabjous day! Where breathed the American citizen so bold, 10-12 years ago, us to dream that he would ever see chalked on the walls of Europe the poignant plea: "YANKS DON'T GO."

Yet 15 miles out of Rome, almost at the end of the lovely, winding drive from Florence, this tender message, better scrawled in yellow chalk on an old, gray wall, leaped at us with the force of a Broadway neon spectacular.

"Well, I'll be damned!" said my husband in surprise, as he slammed on the brakes and reached for his camera, the better to immortalize this unexpected love letter.

Nor was that all. A half-mile farther down the road, there was another billet doux, equally as ardent. It read: "YANKS STAY HERE."

I suspect that these are but samples of graffiti appearing all over Europe at the moment, as this continent suddenly realizes how really lovable we Americans are. It is all part of the swift recognition, on this side of the Atlantic, of the true lovability of Americans—a revelation that is the outgrowth of Uncle Sam's long overdue decision to send home 204,000 dependents of military and civilian Defense Department personnel now stationed abroad.

That decision, which will shut down a gold mine in many parts of Western Europe, coupled with the U. S. order to all its diplomats to curtail drastically their travel abroad, is opening European eyes as never before to the rare charm and loveliness of Americans and their dollars.

On certain European boulevards the dollar may look a trifle shabby.

But to the average European in the street, the dollar looks as good as gold and he has a connoisseur's thirst to collect them.

So these two American steps, aimed at strengthening the dollar at home and making it scarcer abroad, is enough to make us Americans, in retrospect, seem very lovable, indeed. But what really makes us appear absolutely adorable is the persistent rumors in Europe that Uncle Sam, in yet another move to bolster the dollar, may clamp down forcefully on American tourists and their profligate spending.

The very thought that Uncle Sam could or would restrict the number of dollars that an American tourist can spend abroad is enough to transform us into all-out darlings. All those old, thoughtless, postwar scrawls, "YANK, GO HOME," makes Europeans squirm with embarrassment and rage at the gross clods among them capable of such gauche behavior.

A brief look at tourism and what it does for Italy—along (where, as in many other European countries, it is the largest single industry) explains why Americans are suddenly so attractive and charming. Italy estimates that one-tenth of all the real tourists (persons who stay from four days or more) who come here are Americans, but that the American one-tenth accounts for 25 per cent of all tourist spending.

For the past five years, tourist revenue has offset most of Italy's foreign trade deficit and kept the budget on a fairly even keel.

Tourists have already spent in excess of \$300,000,000 in Italy in 1960, and the country is still swarming with trappers of every nationality.

Nor does this whopping figure take into account what tourists spend on their eternal shopping jags. The above accounts only for travel, food, lodging, sightseeing and similar matters.

It is bad enough that Uncle Sam has ordered dependents home and diplomats to stay put. But if he should really restrict tourism! La! We Americans might yet be elected Miss Universe.

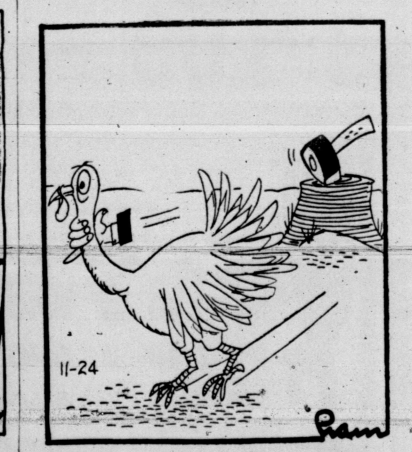

# Soviet-China Rift Likely To Continue

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top American experts predicted today the Communist summit meeting in Moscow will bring no basic solution to the deep rift between Communist China and the Soviet Union.

Some sort of declaration probably will be issued in Moscow within the next few days which may gloss over the differences within the Communist world on coexistence with the West, it is believed here.

But such a declaration is not expected to settle the fundamental struggle between Soviet Premier Khrushchev and the Chinese Communist party chairman, Mao Tse-tung.

The meeting of Communist leaders in Moscow started Nov. 9. Strong signs that the differences are basic and continuing appeared this week as first China, in its People's Daily, and then the Soviet Union, in Pravda, published sharply conflicting views of what lies ahead.

American sources consider the lengths of the continuing Moscow conference as a sign that the Soviet Union and Communist China cannot agree because their state interests are not identical. Which set of interests will dominate in the long run cannot be predicted at the present time.

According to this line of thinking the Soviet Union, armed with powerful nuclear weapons takes a different view toward disarmament than the Chinese Communists who may be three to five years away from possession of such arms.

Another difference is that Moscow has unsatisfied territorial claims while Peking wants the Nationalist Chinese stronghold of Formosa and would like more positive Soviet assistance in gaining it. Some sources here believe Moscow has deliberately tried to drive Chinese militarists from an attack on Formosa.

A third difference is in Communist China's desire to achieve rapid economic development for itself. Moscow has provided substantial assistance to neutralist nations such as India and Afghanistan and has complained that Communist China has wasted some of the development funds it has received from Moscow.

There are also reports in diplomatic circles here that a power struggle is under way between Peking and Moscow over which shall have the dominant voice in outer Mongolia.

Chinese Communists have long been attacking Communist Yugoslavia for what is called revisionism of Communist doctrine.

The Yugoslavs have criticized Communist China for preaching that a third world war would mean the end to all wars and would result in a Communist world.

The Yugoslavs contend that such a war would mean mass annihilation and would only delay the development of Communist countries. The Soviet Union has taken a similar line in insisting the West is the only solution.

U. S. authorities say that when Communist China lashes out at the Yugoslavs, they often are aiming their barbs at Khrushchev as well.

# Kennedy Electoral Count Holds Firm

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect John F. Kennedy's electoral vote count held firm at 306 today as Republicans lost preliminary efforts to overturn state results in Illinois and Texas.

Kennedy's slim popular vote margin also was increased as final returns from Georgia added more than enough to offset slight declines in official tabulations from Illinois, Missouri and Kentucky.

With more than 800 of the nation's 146,964 precincts still to report on Kennedy's race with Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the popular vote stood:

Kennedy—34,019,979  
Nixon—33,306,468

Kennedy's margin was 213,500 compared with the 174,827 shown at the same time Wednesday.

Republican challenges in Cook County (Chicago), Ill., and in Texas were beaten back even as a Republican party official expressed confidence that a recount in the Chicago area could swing Illinois' 27 electoral votes to Nixon. That opinion was expressed by Meade Alcorn, general counsel to the GOP National Committee.

But in Chicago the Board of Election Commissioners acted over protest of its lone Republican member to certify Cook County votes which gave Kennedy more than enough margin to offset Republican strength statewide.

Added to results elsewhere in the state, the Cook County returns gave Kennedy a statewide margin of 3,220 votes out of more than 4.7 million cast.

In Texas, Dist. Judge J. Harris Gardner ruled there is not enough evidence of criminal fraud in that state's election to justify a full-scale investigation by the state attorney general.

Republicans had alleged violations in throwing out ballots which were improperly marked. GOP State Chairman Thad Hutcheson said party leaders would confer on a possible further step. The state's official canvass is set for Friday. Kennedy won the state's 24 electoral votes by a margin of 45,264 votes.

# Junior Executive Top Heart Victim

LONDON (AP) — The junior executive striving for the top, rather than his boss, is the most likely candidate for heart trouble.

A panel of distinguished physicians, including President Eisenhower's heart doctor, Paul Dudley White of Boston, Mass., offered that and other conclusions today at a conference on the health of executives.

Dr. White said senior executives are singularly free from heart problems. Answering his own question as to who is a likely candidate for coronary thrombosis, he said:

"It's a junior executive, probably striving for the top, or a white collar worker surrounded by frustrations. He's short, stocky, muscular, large-boned, tending to be bald, often an athlete. His personality is vigorous, ambitious, aggressive."

Put all that together and add a

rich diet he can afford, sedentary habits without some wood-sawing or other outdoor exercise, any excess in alcohol and tobacco and there's the candidate, Dr. White said.

"The best antidote for nervous strain, tension and insomnia," he said, "is physical fatigue from work or exercise, which is more satisfactory than drugs for the same purpose."

The panel warned that the dangerous age is 45 and said men gunning to be executives should form better habits in their 20's and 30's.

A business executive, A. Desmond Bonham-Carter, director of Unilever, Ltd., said periodic medical checkups have a doubtful value.

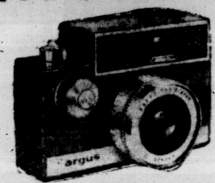
"They are encouragement for senior people," he said, "but we do not want to breed hypochondriacs. I question to what extent you can persuade the man with the drive to get to the top of a big business to take care while he still feels fit."

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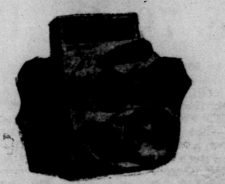
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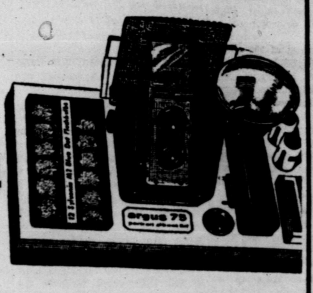

# Navy Line Faces Test

ANNAPOLIS (AP) - Navy's line will just have to play its best and not necessarily above its head to outscrap Army Saturday in Philadelphia, Coach Wayne Hardin believes.

The American League wants to determine to go ahead with its expansion to 10 teams next season. The National League, in the person of owner Walter O'Malley, of the Los Angeles Dodgers, wants the AL to stay out until the Dodgers' new park is completed.

And the mar, in the middle of the middle is baseball Commissioner Ford Frick, who wants a show of good faith, an agreement that is "fair and equitable," before either league moves into the other's front yard.

The AL, failing to reach agreement with O'Malley, offered its startling alternative Monday, to postpone entry into Los Angeles until 1962 and operate as a nine-team league next season—if the National also agreed to add a club and enter into an inter-league schedule. The National's expansion plans call for the addition of Houston and New York in 1962.

Even the American League admits it isn't likely the National, which turned down a similar plan a year ago, will approve the proposal.

That, Hardin says, is one of the major differences in preparing for this year's Army game and last year's when Navy stunned the Cadets 43-12.

Frick also indicated he thought there was little chance for the inter-league idea. The commissioner has set up a meeting here next Wednesday with AL president Joe Cronin and NL president Warren Giles to draft an amendment to the rule governing territorial rights. The amendment would be presented to the 16 club owners at the joint league meetings in St. Louis Dec. 8.

"Last year we felt Army had outmanned in the line," Hardin told a news conference Wednesday. "Our team had to perform above its capabilities and it did."

As the rule stands one major league can move into a city occupied by the other only with the unanimous approval of both.

"This year our lines are comparable, if we just play up to our ability." Then the win will be determined by the better overall team in contrast to many college games which are decided primarily in the line, Hardin said.

Even the American League admits it isn't likely the National, which turned down a similar plan a year ago, will approve the proposal.

The Navy coach said he would tab both center Frank Visted and guard John Hewitt as superior linemen to Army's All-American candidate Al Vanderbush, guard and co-captain.
