SAN ANTONIO BUSINESS MEN VISIT JUNCTION.

Sunday morning a party of business men, representing the wholesale houses of San Antonio left the city for a tour of the towns along the O. S. T. west, that are in the trade territory of the Alamo City.

They made no stops on the way up, except for a few minutes in Junction that afternoon before leaving the highway to go to Menard. From Menard they drove to Sonora Monday morning, arriving here about ten-thirty that night.

A meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce was planned, but the San Antonio men were delayed on the way from Sonora and arrived too late for a meeting that night.

The next morning the visitors were out early meeting the business men of the town. Practically every one in the party represented a wholesale house that has one or more customers in Junction. About ten o'clock the party, accompanied by J. A. Heyman, E. A. Loeffler, C. R. Stevenson, C. F. Hamer, John M. Hankins, and H. G. Perry, was taken to the head springs on Cedar Creek, the location of one of the proposed State parks.

Though the road up that way is rather rough since the recent rains, the trip was made with little difficulty and the visitors were good sports in negotiating roads that were quite a contrast to the city streets or the O. S. T. Highway, that they had been driving over. All had plenty of "pep" and their stay here was a most enjoyable occasion.

Those who had never visited this part of the country were agreeably surprised at the good roads and the wonderful scenery they found here, and most of them stated that they would be back sometime during the summer to spend several days camping and fishing along the L'anes.

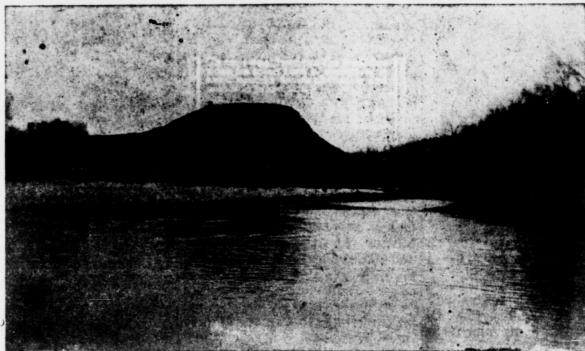
The party left in the afternoon and visited towns between here and San Antonio.

TICK ERADICATION WORK SATISFACTORY.

Three premises in this county have been recently released from quarantine. Only four other premises are now under quarantine in the county, and Inspector Willis Mason, states that they will likely be released soon, as no fever ticks have been found in the county this year.

There are quite a number of quarantined places in Kerr County, but the Commissioners are making every effort to speedily rid the county of ticks.

There are no quarantined places in Sutton County and only two in Menard. Edwards County is also about clear of ticks, but the inspectors are carefully watching the situation as Val Verde County is still badly infested.

IMPROVEMENTS AT THE FREE CAMP YARD.

The fence around the Tourists' free camp park will be completed this week. The heavy ornamental wire fencing along the north and west sides, facing the highway, have been built and a stock gap will be built to keep out all except autos.

The camp house built several weeks ago is being used every night. Steps are being taken to prevent thoughtless persons from monopolizing it. There are road hogs and there are camp site hogs. The latter are those who, without any consideration for the comfort or protection of others, try to monopolize the conveniences that have been supplied at considerable expense, for all the tourists camping in the park. They want to run their car under and then put a tent and other luggage on the part of the floor not occupied by the car.

The camp house was built for use of all persons camping in the park, so they may use it in time of rain or storms, for protection. When one family takes charge of it the others are prevented from using it.

EXCELLENT WORK BE- ING DONE ON STREETS.

During the past few days considerable work has been done on several of the streets of Junction by the county's regular road men.

The big tractor and grader have been used to a good advantage in leveling up and bringing the gravel back to the center of the streets.

The street from the Brown corner in the north part of town, on to the cross street east of the State Bank and the Hardware Co. garage has been greatly benefited.

Work was stopped Tuesday on account of the roadbed being too dry.

O. W. Cardwell was here Saturday from the Watson Divide country and takes the Eagle to task for previously calling him "sage and polo enthusiast." We have often doubted his ability to play polo, but we are going out some day to see if he can really play.

AN EXAMPLE OF PROGRESS

A few years ago Medina Lake was just an out-of-the-way place; no road leading to it; no one interested in it, and consequently very few people knew about it, and those who knew about it never thought of visiting it.

People who lived around it, grew accustomed to it and little dreamed that it would ever hold any more interest for others than it held for them.

They were a self-satisfied set. Time went on. A few men who had come from other sections of the country, where such wonders as Medina Lake were not to be found, and saw its possibilities. One of these men was W. H. Furlong, now with the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce. He had lived in the New England States, and had seen the development of the pleasure resorts in that country, and knew what people wanted in this line. He also knew that there was nothing in that country to compare favorably with what he saw in Medina Lake. He proposed to build a toll road to the Lake and to build cottages and camp conveniences around the Lake. He was laughed at. But finally he found a few people that would go in with him, and they "put it over." Today thousands of tourists are spending the summer, and winter too, at Medina Lake. The toll road is a paying proposition and the resort itself is a big institution.

Every ranchman and farmer in that whole section is benefited. They can find a ready sale at a good price, for milk, butter, eggs, chickens, etc., and are prospering on this account.

This is not written to advertise Medina Lake, but to call attention to what can be done with a lot of work and advertising. We don't have to exaggerate; the truth about this country will bring them out, and they will be satisfied, and the people here will be benefited.

CANDIDATES ANNOUNC- ING FOR GOVERNOR.

That there will be an interesting and hard fought race for the place now held by Pat M. Neff, is evidenced by the fact that candidates are already announcing, and others are deadening timber. A good deal will depend on whether Gov. Neff is elected president of the University. In the event he is elected and accepts, Lieutenant T. W. Davidson will automatically become Governor, and will be in a much better position to make the race for gubernatorial honors than any other who might run.

Gov. Neff is being considered by the Board of Regents, and it has been stated that all of the board except two, are favorable to him.

Lieut. Gov. Davidson made a formal statement last Sunday in which his announcement was incorporated. This week Lewis T. Carpenter, member of the House from Dallas, announced, and Joe Burkett, State Senator from Eastland, states that he expects to formally announce within the next two weeks.

NEW FIRM BEGINS BUS- INESS IN JUNCTION.

This week marks the opening of a new firm in Junction, under the name of Becker & Hardin. This firm is composed of R. L. Becker and Lee Hardin; the location is that formerly occupied by Becker & Son, blacksmiths.

In addition to continuing the blacksmith work and oxygen-acetylene welding and carbon burning and cutting, they will have a tin shop equipped for handling this kind of work.

The new firm is a partnership of the parties named, who have purchased the interests of R. Becker, who has been in the shop several years.

Part of their stock arrived this week and they are open for business, and more stock and equipment will come later. See their ad in this week's issue.

CHANGE GIVES DAILY MAIL TO KERRVILLE.

Communication to Postmaster Tracey Wednesday is to the effect that beginning on June 16, the Kerrville-Junction Mail line will be changed from a tri-weekly to a daily service, and the mail to Menard will be changed from a daily to a tri-weekly, running Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.

Some months ago a petition was drawn asking for a daily mail service from Kerrville. The Post Office Department granted this and were negotiating for the carrying of this daily mail, when another petition was drawn asking that the Menard daily mail be maintained. The Department then cancelled the order for the daily mail from Kerrville, and let things stand as they were. Nothing further was done until recently, W. H. Furlong, of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce came over the road from Kerrville here and made a log of it for the P. O. Department. The changes above mentioned are probably the result of his recommendation.

The roads towards Menard are very bad, and are becoming worse, while the one to Kerrville is open to travel every day in the year. Heretofore, probably 90 per cent of the freight to Junction came to Menard, but since the completion of the highway to Kerrville, the tide has changed and now the freight is probably about equally divided and is increasing in favor of Kerrville, and the truck rate to Kerrville is lower than to Menard.

Daily papers from Fort Worth and Dallas will doubtless be routed by San Antonio, and will arrive here about an hour later than they do now.

Efforts will likely be made to have the Menard line made a daily line. It would seem in investigation that Junction is entitled to a daily mail both from Menard and from Kerrville.

The contract with J. G. Ayala present Junction-Kerrville carrier, has been signed and the additional amount to be paid is \$850.00 per year.

RATES AGAIN REDUCED.

J. G. Ayala, owner of the passenger lines between Junction and Kerrville and Kerrville and San Antonio, and mail contractor on this end of the line, announces that he will reduce the fare between Junction and Kerrville to \$2.00 on the 15th of this month. He is adding two more big new cars to his fleet of big passenger cars, and is able to give the very best of service from Junction to San Antonio and intermediate points. The rate between Junction and San Antonio will be \$5.00 after the 15th, and cars will make connection at Kerrville, giving a quicker run from here into the city.

NEW BAKERY OPENS.

Another new concern to begin business in Junction this week is the Lone Star Bakery, owned by J. R. Pettitt. Mr. Pettitt is one of the old-timers here and is an experienced restaurant man and baker.

Several years ago he conducted a restaurant in the same building he is now in—the Nichols building, two doors south of the Junction State Bank.

He says he is going to bake the very best grade and will supply the local trade with fresh bread, individually wrapped, and fresh pies and cakes.

Local dealers are handling his bread now.



KERRVILLE TO HAVE MAIN STREET PAVED.

The paving of Water Street through the business section of Kerrville and of the Old Spanish Trail as far south as Silver Creek, 6.8 miles below the city, has been made possible through the liberality of Capt. Chas. Schreiner, retired financier and well-loved philanthropist of this city. His gift of \$26,000 cash to Kerr County to match an equal amount of Federal aid allowed on the project will enable the county to surface Section D of the Highway with asphalt for a distance of 6.8 miles, beginning at the Town Creek bridge and extending south.

The Highway Commission allotted Real County, at the same time it made the allowance for Section D, Federal Aid in the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of constructing the grade and drainage structures on eighteen miles of State Highway No. 41, beginning at the Kerr County line and extending west to the Edwards County line, to connect with the highway being built by the latter county.

The \$25,000 necessary to meet the Federal Aid in Real County has been donated by A. C. L. A., Gus F. Chas. Jr., and Walter Schreiner, and the resolutions passed by them, placing the sum in escrow in the Chas. Schreiner Bank subject to the order of the Commissioners' Court of Real County, has been accepted by the Highway Commission.

This gift of the Schreiner Brothers enables the building of a gravelled road across the corner of Real County towards Kerrville, which is almost impassable at present in wet weather, and will be of untold benefit in enlarging the trade territory of this place.—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

BRADY BAND GETS CHECK FOR \$150.00.

Director T. L. Calloway, of the Brady Municipal Band, now gaining fame as the "Liza Jane" band, received a check yesterday for \$150.00 from Walter E. Yaggy, secretary of the San Angelo Board of City Development, as payment of the premium for second prize in Class B bands at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention.

As explained in the letter the check was held up for few days on account of a protest being filed by the manager of the Colorado band, the protest growing out of the fact that a cornet player from another city was used to take the place of Cecil Striegler, who was prevented from making the trip at the last minute by an appendicitis operation.—Brady Sentinel.

TEXAS PECAN GROWERS RE-ELECT OFFICERS.

The Texas Pecan Growers Association which was in session three days here this week adjourned Wednesday afternoon after adopting the usual resolutions.

H. G. Lucas of Brownwood,

was re-elected president and Oscar Gray of Waxahachie was re-elected secretary. With one exception all the directors were re-elected. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the officers of the association for the faithful and efficient manner in which they had discharged their duties.

The entire association adjourned to the Capps farm following adjournment and accepted the hospitalities of President and Mrs. H. G. Lucas. Spraying demonstrations of an extensive nature were given at the Lucas farm late Wednesday evening.—Brownwood Banner-Bulletin.

SCHLEICHER COUNTY TO BUILD COURT HOUSE

The El Dorado Success gives the result of the recent election on bonds for a new court house for that county. The vote was about three to one for the bonds.

Schleicher County has been without a court house for several years, and the jail has been used by the county officers. No safe place for keeping the county records has been provided. The old court house burned several years ago, and the people there have twice voted to build a new one, but once the election was illegal and another time the rate of interest that the bonds were made for, was so low they could not be sold.

GOVERNOR NEFF VETOES APPROPRIATION BILLS.

On last Thursday, Governor Neff fulfilled his previous threat by vetoing the seven major appropriation bills passed by the third called session of the Texas Legislature.

The appropriations aggregated thirty-nine million and included the departmental, eleemosynary general education, rural school aid, emergency school, judiciary and miscellaneous claims.

Neff said he considered it his duty to veto the bills and give the Legislature an opportunity to reconsider to the end that the State be kept on a paying basis.

Immediately after the vetoes the Senate Finance Committee reported favorably the eleemosynary, judiciary, miscellaneous claims and departmental emergency bills as passed at the last session.

The Senate defeated the Patman pipe line tax bill, adopting the majority unfavorable report. The House passed two bills, appropriating \$70,000 for pink boll worm control and prescribing methods for collecting taxes.

It seems that the Senate is unilaterally opposed to enacting any new revenue producing measures and that the House, where all such bills must originate, is equally determined that

they will not cut much from the appropriation bills as passed at the previous session. In fact many of the House members are prophesying a long time to be spent at Austin and statements are being made that, if necessary, they will stay till frost or work out appropriation bills satisfactory to the House.

Coming from Medina, Mexico, many have noted the road for some miles that way had been marked as the Old Spanish Trail. It was said to be a junction or crossing of Spanish trails as to the location of the Old Spanish Trail, the local, interestingly, fact that it passed through the town.

It seems, however, that none of the highways in these parts have a patent on the pleasing sight of the Old Spanish Trail, and it is good that it is so. As we might want to call an Edwards County highway by the name—Edwards County Leader.

This was the original and for a time the only O. S. T. promenade. Most others wanted to make more money and consequently they marked O. S. T. wherever the people along the route would "pick up" for the promotion.

The O. S. T. formerly had many members in Junction, and all along the route originally marked out as the Old Spanish Trail, but since the promotion has been everybody's trail that will pay the promoters' membership have dropped to a very small number, and are going to drop to a still smaller number in the future. Sure, Edwards County can have the O. S. T. if they will pay for it.

There has been some discussion of a Fish Hatchery being established at or near Junction, to provide fish for the streams of this county, and it has been suggested that the land in the corner of the Court House square, outside the fence, be used for the purpose of housing ponds for propagating fish. The initial cost would not be any great amount and the maintenance would be very moderate. A few fine brood female bass would produce several thousand small fish each year that can be turned into the river and the supply kept up to normal.

At Medina Lake, the owners of that pleasure resort have built and equipped a fish hatchery which has been taken over by the Federal Bureau of Fisheries, and all operating expenses are paid by the government, and the fish propagated are only

used to keep the Medina Lake supplied. Probably some arrangement like that could be worked out here. At any rate, those interested should be thinking of the matter and before long a meeting should be called to discuss the matter thoroughly and decide on the proper steps to pursue. Some means must be provided to keep the streams of this county supplied with fish, at the present rate of catching them the streams will soon be "dried out."

Think it over and let's devise some means of supplying plenty of fish. Past experience has proved that it is impracticable to have small quantities shipped in for the hatcheries at Dallas and San Marcos.

AMENDMENT PROVIDES FOR STATE HIGHWAYS.

In this issue is reprinted the Resolution passed by the regular session of the 36th Legislature, which calls for an election in July to determine whether Texas is going to stand still or go forward in her highway program. A more correct statement of the case might be to see whether we are going to con-

tinue to waste thousands of dollars on roads, where no adequate provision is made for permanent maintenance, or whether we will provide a plan whereby the counties will have their own money to build and maintain lateral or county roads, and let the State and Federal governments maintain the State and interstate highways.

Next week we will present the case to the voters of this county in a plain and concrete manner. There are no catches or hidden conditions to this amendment. It's just a step forward, and will ultimately save money for all the tax payers.

ELECT SUPERINTENDENT.

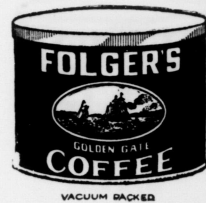
