The grand old autumn pastime, football, is in the air today as the citizens of Lubbock throw their doors wide open to the horde of Amarillo visitors who will be in the city to witness the outstanding grid clash of the current season between the Amarillo Golden Sandstems and the Lubbock high school Westerners. With approximately a thousand boosters from the Panhandle metropolis expected to arrive by special train this morning when the special train pulls in bearing 600 or more Sandie supporters. Joining the Amarillo high school band and pep squad at the Santa Fe station, the local high school group will stage a parade which will be led up Main street by the superintendents of the two schools. The demonstration will continue up Main to Avenue O, and from there it will proceed to the Tech stadium. Powers is leader of the Lubbock pep.

### Charges Made Of Malfeasance On Borger Officers

Chief of Police Cravtree and  
Two Policemen Are In-  
dicted by Grand Jury;  
Probe to Be Made

(By Associated Press)  
BORGER, Nov. 2. (AP)—Chief of Police  
J. W. Cravtree and two policemen  
were indicted today by the grand  
jury for malfeasance in office.

Chief Cravtree was charged with  
malfeasance by "willfully and  
knowingly permitting three men to  
escape from the city jail."

Formered Elmer Traffic  
Sam Jones, policeman, was charged  
on three counts, one alleging he  
confiscated 22 gallons of whiskey  
and did not turn it over to the  
sheriff or give proper receipt, and  
two claiming he permitted the sale  
of liquor when he had knowledge of  
possession and intent to sell.

Johnny Ford, policeman, was  
charged with accepting a bribe from  
a woman and promising her protection  
from arrest.

District Attorney J. H. Holmes  
declared the Borger police force was  
undergoing a thorough investigation  
and that other indictments probably  
would be returned.

### Freeze Descends On South Plains

Lubbock and the South Plains got  
their first touch of freezing weather  
early Thursday morning and again  
last night, the mercury dropping  
below the 30-degree mark on both  
occasions.

Drops 36 at Littlefield.

LITTLEFIELD, Nov. 2. (Special)  
The thermometer registered 36 de-  
grees above zero here last night as  
the first freezing weather of the  
year was recorded. Exactly 2.75  
inches of rainfall have been regis-  
tered here since Sunday night.

Lamesa Gets 25 Degrees.

LAMESA, Nov. 2. (Special)—The  
mercury slid down to 25 degrees and  
the first frost and freeze of the  
current season was recorded at La-  
mesa and over Dawson county this  
morning. Today's freeze came from  
15 to 20 days earlier than usual.

Light Freeze in Terry.

BROWNFIELD, Nov. 2. (Special)—  
A light freeze visited this section  
last night and probably reduced en-  
timed cotton production as much  
as 25 per cent. Bolls were wet from  
recent rains and full extent of dam-  
age will not be known for several  
days.

E. B. Speck is to speak at the  
Hoover headquarters, 215 Broadway,  
at 5 this afternoon.

Next Monday night the Hoover  
theater headquarters, at which time  
W. R. White will be the principal  
speaker. Seats for about 300 have  
been provided in the headquarters  
and the public is invited to attend  
according to Charles P. O'Neil, dis-  
trict chairman of the anti-Smith  
organization.

### Girl's Death Brings Greater Mystery As To How She Was Burned; Immolation Story Now Doubtful

LAKE BLUFF, Ill., Nov. 2. (AP)  
The words, "I didn't do it,"  
they did it," murmured shortly  
before she died today, made of  
Alfreda Knack, 20-year-old  
woman who confessed immola-  
tion by burning in a police sta-  
tion furnace, a greater mystery  
in death than she had been for  
three days while she fought for  
life in a hospital.

Whether she was conscious of  
what she said and whether the  
words were intended to contra-  
dict the fantastic story to which  
the affidavit-book agent and  
shining school teacher clung  
tentatively for three days,  
those at her bedside had no way  
of knowing.

New Search Started.  
Her words, however, sent  
Lake county authorities on a  
new search for others who  
might be involved in her death,  
after they virtually had accept-  
ed her story, repeated many  
times since she was found Tues-  
day morning in the basement of  
the Lake Bluff village hall.

made and with arms and legs  
burned to the bone.  
In her statement, to which  
she adhered for three days,  
even when told that she would  
die, Miss Knack, a former stu-  
dent of psychology, said she  
spent Monday night in the de-  
serted village hall and at dawn  
Tuesday morning, decided to  
burn herself in the basement  
furnace to prove her love and  
to attain "spiritual purity."

Story Seemingly A.

The story at first was scot-  
ched at by the authorities. Then,  
as it was told over and over,  
they came to believe it for want  
of any other explanation.  
Shortly before dawn today,  
however, from the swollen,  
cracked lips of the dying girl,  
came a mumbled, "I wonder—  
I wonder."

"You wonder what, Alfreda,"

### Pathfinder Plane Visits Lubbock On Jaunt

Proof of Lubbock's urgent need  
of a modern airport, properly mark-  
ed and designated, was given here  
Friday afternoon when the Texas  
& Pacific Coal & Oil company's  
Ryan biplane, the path-  
finder for the Fort Worth associa-  
tion of commerce's good-will air-  
tour of West Texas, failed to locate  
the city's temporary landing field  
north of town and came down on  
the Tech college football field in-  
stead.

Get Crossed Up.  
As the pathfinder plane, which  
has a Wright whirling motor, with  
its four occupants, was landing out  
at Tech, a group of Lubbock citi-  
zens in 30 or 40 automobiles were  
anxiously awaiting its descent at the  
field two miles north of town. This  
field had been graded and partly  
marked and was in fair shape for  
landing purposes, but lacking in the  
necessary outstanding characteris-  
tics that airports should have to be  
easily seen from the clouds.

### Clarksville Has \$100,000 Blaze

CLARKSVILLE, Nov. 2. (AP)—Fire  
last night swept through business  
block here, destroying five buildings  
in the west half of a block of Depot  
street, and damaging all but one, in  
the other half block, with an esti-  
mated property loss of \$150,000.

All the stores in the block had  
started at 3 a. m. It was under  
control, although a fire truck was  
summoned from Paris when it  
threatened to burst out anew.

### Party Expenses Total 9 Million

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. (AP)—Ap-  
proximately \$9,000,000 has been re-  
ceived by the two major political  
parties during the presidential race,  
of which \$4,811,744 went to the Re-  
publican national committee and  
\$4,088,252 to the Democratic na-  
tional committee, reports filed to-  
day with the house campaign funds  
committee, showed.

The committee accounting dis-  
closed that the funds have been  
used up almost entirely, with the  
October 31 balances being \$137,333  
for the Republicans and \$92,004 for  
the Democrats.

### Campaign Hinges On 4 Main Issues; Men Less Factors

Farm Relief, Tariff, Prohi-  
bition and Religion Form  
Real Body of Battle Of  
Votes

### Parties Confident

South to Play Big Part In  
Decision of Winner, Po-  
litical Writer Says; Old  
Heads Worried

As election day nears it seems  
certain that although the person-  
alities of Herbert Hoover and Al-  
fred E. Smith will be powerful fac-  
tors in the winning and losing of  
votes, the issue will turn largely on  
the four pivots of farm relief, tariff,  
prohibition and religion. That has  
been fairly definite since the be-  
ginning; what is not known and  
what the ballot markings will not  
reveal is the relative importance of  
each.

Openmouths Claimed.  
A greater degree of openness has  
been claimed for those who will  
vote for Hoover or Smith because  
of the tariff, prohibition and farm  
relief than for those who will decide  
because of religion. Although there  
has been some outspoken opposi-  
tion to Governor Smith because of  
his Catholicism, the Democratic  
has been that many of those who  
cite prohibition or something else  
as the basis of their decision  
respectively mean religion; that party  
also charged that a whispering  
campaign of intolerance has been  
used against the governor and it  
takes comfort from reports of a  
counter wave of sentiment.

There has been no disparaging of  
the unrest in the farm belt that  
normally Republican stronghold,  
some of whose Republican leaders  
are vigorously urging alliance with  
the Democratic party. Mr. Hoover  
and Governor Smith themselves  
have talked fervently to the farmers  
and kept their advocates on the ground  
day in and day out. Regardless of  
the persuasive powers exerted upon  
them, however, it is a foregone

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### Coolidge Praises Hoover's Ability

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. (AP)—  
President Coolidge tonight told  
Herbert Hoover, republican presi-  
dential candidate, "you have shown  
your fitness to be president. I wish  
to congratulate you on the high  
quality of your leadership."

The message was contained in a  
telegram the executive sent Hoover  
after he had listened on the radio  
to Hoover's St. Louis address.

"Your success in the campaign  
seems assured," President Coolidge  
continued, "and I shall turn over  
the great office of president of the  
United States of America to your  
keeping sure that it will be in com-  
petent hands in which the welfare  
of the people will be secure."

shortly after he was taken to a  
hospital.

### Jealousy Causes Man To Murder 3 And Self With Axe

Family of Three Are Slain  
By Fiend, Whom Girl  
Had Rejected; Set Fire to  
House and Kills Self

(By Associated Press)  
SANTA ROSA, Calif., Nov. 2. —  
Officers believed today that jealousy  
and desire for revenge caused a re-  
jected suitor to wipe out a family  
of three here this morning and then  
kill himself after setting fire to the  
family's dwelling.

An axe was used to kill C. J. Ber-  
tola, retired grocer and member of  
a prominent and wealthy California  
family, and his wife and young  
daughter, Camille. The man thought  
to have committed the murders and  
set the house afire was Charles  
Braker, 45. A body, identified as  
Braker's, was found with two of the  
deceased dwelling. It had a bullet  
wound in the head.

Had Divorced Wife.  
Braker had a divorced wife and  
son here. Sheriff Bille said the man  
rented an automobile and drove to  
the Bertola home. The car was  
standing in front of the house when  
neighbors discovered the fire.

It is known that Braker had  
sought the hand of Miss Bertola.  
The former Mrs. Braker told po-  
lice today she believed Braker had  
homicidal tendencies. She said that  
when he was on a hunting trip with  
her once he tried to get her to put  
her head on a stump and threaten-  
ed her with an axe.

### Agiculture Is Greatest Issue, Norris Declares

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 2. (AP)—So-  
lution of the agricultural problem,  
which he characterized the greatest  
issue of the campaign, depends on  
election of Governor Smith as presi-  
dent, George W. Norris, republican  
senator from Nebraska, said here  
tonight.

Speaking at a rally climaxed the  
Smith campaign in Minnesota, Sen-  
ator Norris, who last week announ-  
ced support of the New York gov-  
ernor, said the agricultural situa-  
tion "is too grave to be trifled with"  
and that Herbert Hoover's promise  
to call an extra session of Congress  
to consider farm legislation is "pure  
political bunk."

Senator Norris dealt  
with eight party issues.  
CHICAGO, Nov. 2. (AP)—Senator  
James J. Blaine of Wisconsin dealt  
with eight issues of the National  
campaign at a democratic rally here  
tonight.

### Not Right to Bolt

Party Pledge Must Be Up-  
held In Coming Election  
By All Members, State  
Chairman Rules

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—D. W. Wilcox,  
chairman of the state Democratic  
executive committee, declared in a  
statement here today that he has  
no doubt that the committee "can  
and will" bar all "bolters" from  
the 1930 Democratic primaries.

He referred to those who this year  
participated in either the Demo-  
cratic presidential primary con-  
ventions or the regular primary elec-  
tion, and then will vote the Republi-  
can ticket in next Tuesday's elec-  
tion.

Leaders Are Mistaken.  
"The leaders of the bolters in  
their efforts to persuade Democrats  
to desert the party assert that there  
is no precedent for such action by  
the state committee and that it  
lacks legal authority to disbar those  
who vote the Republican national  
ticket," Wilcox said. "They are in-  
correct in both contentions."

It is true that those who voted  
for Paddy in 1922 were allowed to  
vote in the primary in 1924, and  
those who voted for Butte in 1924,  
were allowed to participate in 1926.  
But they overlook the fact that in  
1922, when, under the statute, the  
authority to prescribe additional  
qualifications was vested in the  
county committees of the respective  
counties and not in the state com-  
mittee, the latter instructed each  
county committee to permit no one  
to vote in the primaries if he voted  
in the preceding general election for  
candidates of any party other than

### What They Said Last Night

Senator Robinson Says  
Hoover Not Acceptable

DAYTON, Ohio, Nov. 2. (AP)—In  
typical Al Smith fashion, Senator  
Joe T. Robinson "called the roll"  
of Republican leaders tonight in an  
attempt to show that Herbert  
Hoover was not acceptable to some  
Republicans, particularly those most  
closely associated with the farm re-  
lief fight in congress, prior to the  
Kansas City convention.

"This campaign," the Democratic  
vice presidential nominee said,  
"conducted under the leadership of  
Dr. Work has been designed to  
create a fictitious personality—a  
Hoover endowed with magical pow-  
ers and adorned by a halo. Some  
who are now extolling Mr. Hoover  
as a political paragon took quite  
a different view of his abilities be-  
fore his nomination."

Curtis Has Statement.  
"Let us see what Senator Curtis  
Hoover's resume, had to say,  
referring to Mr. Hoover," he de-  
clared. "The convention cannot af-  
ford to nominate anyone for whom  
the party will be on the defensive  
from the day he is named until the  
polls close."

Senator Curtis Hits  
Immigration Proposal

MOBERLY, Mo., Nov. 2. (AP)—Sen-  
ator Curtis, republican vice-presi-  
dential nominee, declared here to-  
day that Governor Smith, proposal  
to modify the immigration quota  
basis would defeat the objective of  
immigration restriction and would  
lead into this country thousands more  
immigrants annually than are ad-  
mitted today.

"Governor Smith said in his  
speech of acceptance that he favors  
restrictive immigration," Curtis de-  
clared. "But at the same time he  
alleged the basing of quota allo-  
cations on the census of 1920. And in  
this seemingly trivial statement he  
suggested the way by which the  
present restrictive immigration pol-  
icy could be easily destroyed if he  
were elected."

### Borah Sounds Keynote For Hoover's Fitness

BOSTON, Nov. 2. (AP)—The confi-  
dence of the voter in the capacity  
and fitness of Herbert Hoover for  
the presidency was the keynote  
sounded tonight by Senator William  
E. Borah in a speech which cumu-  
lated a huge demonstration by  
Massachusetts republicans for the  
Hoover-Curtis ticket.

"This confidence of the electorate  
was characterized by the Senator as  
the 'dominating, winning factor,  
pointing toward Hoover's victory.'"

The National Woman's Party is stirred and outraged by the Mrs. McCormick decision, as one of their juiciest bones of contention has ever been that a woman, even a wife, could have residence where she pleased, and that acceptance of the fact that a husband's residence must be a wife's residence is archaic and unjust in this modern world.

Which again must mean "better times," for blunt black and white statistics always prove that in good times not nearly so many women are employed as in "bad times."

## October's Fire Losses Are Low

Blazes Do \$12,707 Damages In Month Past; Nine Alarms Answered; 1928 Loss Total Is Low

Lubbock's fire loss during the month of October was only \$12,707, according to the monthly report of Fire Marshal L. H. Simpson. Of this loss, \$3,450 was to buildings involved and \$9,257 to contents.  
Actual fire loss for 1928, to date, is only \$41,000, although the records as reported by the state will show a total of \$54,000. This discrepancy is occasioned because of one fire which occurred last year, adjustment of claims on its loss not having been completed until after January 1, this year, involving \$13,000.  
Nine alarms answered  
During October nine alarms were answered by the city fire department, six of these resulting in losses. Property involved in buildings wherein fires were, totaled \$28,200, contents, \$36,000. Insurance on buildings involved in these fires amounted to \$22,150, and on contents, \$19,500.  
The fire department used total of 2,500 feet of hose in fighting the fires, and the pumpers were working for a total of six hours time. Inspections during the month numbered 535, with re-inspections numbered 161. This includes the unusual number of inspections made during fire prevention week, the first week of the month.

# Colorful Battle Promised Fans In Today's Encounter

## Westerners Grimly Determined To Stop Crushing Attack of Amarillo Sandstorm In Crucial Test Today

Both Teams Anxiously Await Opening Whistle to Start Classic Battle; Lubbock Has Fighting Chance, Coach Henry Frnka Said Yesterday

Two powerful high school football teams await the opening whistle that will send them to battle on the Tech gridiron this afternoon. The vaunted Amarillo Golden Sandstorm, rated as a certain winner of the district championship, and the Lubbock Westerners, famed for their fighting qualities and determined to prove that dope doesn't mean anything when ancient rivals meet, are keyed up to a high pitch for the football classic of the season which starts at 3 o'clock.

The Sandies landed in Lubbock at noon yesterday, 25 strong, together with their head coach, "Dutch" Smith and Marshall May, assistant coach. A light workout on the college arena to familiarize the gridirers with the scene of battle, put the Sandie aggregation on edge and the coaches announced that they were ready to meet the Westerners on the opening whistle.

Contrary to the general report that the Sandies were counting on another one-sided victory, Coach Smith said last night that his team realized they were up against a formidable foe in the game today. Having eliminated both Plainview and Quanah from the running in the district race by overwhelming scores, the Sandstorm eleven has pointed to the Lubbock array as their first dangerous opposition.

The attitude of the Amarillo mentor is not shared by the majority of the fans of the Panhandle metropolis. Odds as high as 35 and 40 points are being offered by supporters of the Golden Horde. The 77-point advantage held by the Sandies in comparative scores has caused the local team to be considered as decided underdogs.

Lubbock's determined aggregation took a final line practice yesterday afternoon and were ordered home for a good night's rest before their crucial test today. The Gold and Black gridirers went through their last workout with a snappy drill and appeared in high spirits as they donned their mole skins. Last minute reports indicated that Captain Barton, star Lubbock tackle, would be unable to fill his post in the line. Rex Wright was named by Coach Frnka as the likely substitute for the read-head-of-line captain.

Coaches Frnka and Morgan kept the hopes of their plucky warriors up to the set, holding grimly on to the belief that a super fighting unit can stop the vaunted Sandies. "We have a fighting chance to win," Coach Frnka said, "even though we are handicapped by injuries and a decided weight advantage. Our boys are prepared to give their best."

The backfield upon which Lubbock is pinning hopes today is composed of four hard-hitting backs who will be hard to stop. Capt. Ernest Dowell at quarter, George Pierce and Minor Watkins at halves, and W. D. Lawson at fullback, is the starting combination. Woody Smith and Joe Bailey, power, fleet-footed ball toters, are certain to see action before the game has progressed very far.

Pitted against the locals in the Amarillo backfield will be a host of galloping gazelles of the gridiron, who have dealt misery to the opposition in great gobs this season. Headlining the list of ball carriers is Bob Walker, the Sandie scoring ace and triple threat man de-luxe. Travis, acting captain and quarterback, is a shifty runner and smart field general. Dunham and Welch are the other Sandie backs, who are expected to share honors with Walker and Travis.

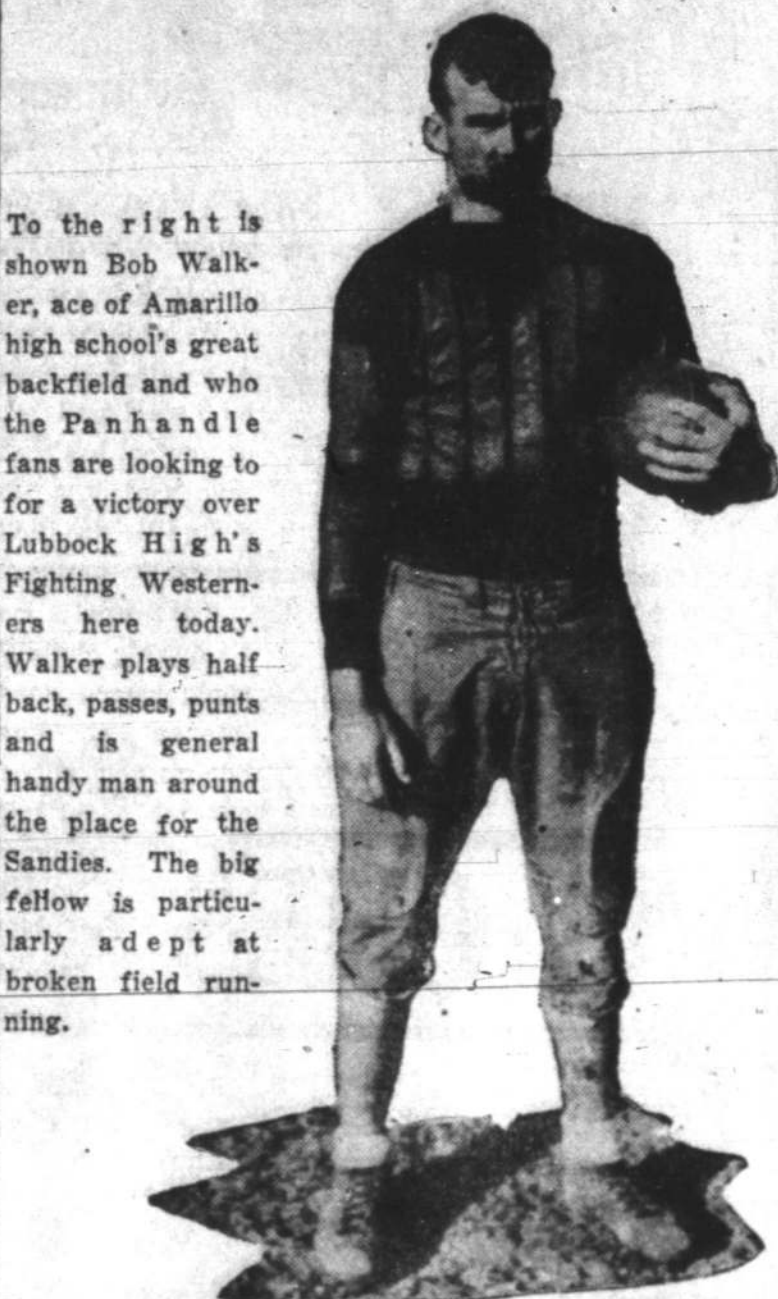

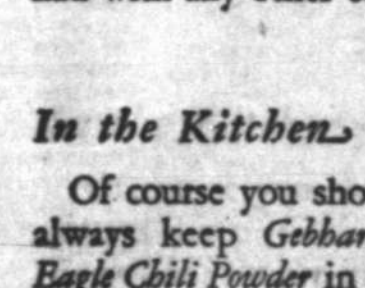

OVERALLS

Overall! Well, what of it? It is the word that brings to mind labor. It is a word that may cause our readers to think we are going to discuss the mode of dress. Some may think that we are going to give the world a certain lecture about wearing overalls. We will pause in our other thought long enough to write a sentence along that line and say that we do not believe that it is ever intended that women wear overalls, and then to our trend of thought that we started out on. Writing under the title "The Twilight of the American Mind," Walter Pittman has asked some very disquieting questions. The substance of his book seems to be the statement of a problem that we believe you will agree with us in. Not in the least discouraging the desire of young people to become educated, approach the question that this man has presented: "What can the best minds do with their best minds?" If the question is not clear to you, we will state it this way: How is the one per cent of the population of this nation to find work to do in keeping with their training? This is not a new question to some minds. Even college professors have debated this question. The college idea has so permeated the mass that a condition has arisen best stated in economic terms. Where are the vast horde of college students to fit in? Our time is one in which an increasing amount of man's work is done by machinery. Where are the men with degrees to find the work and station in life that their four years of college have led to expect? What will be the result of thwarted ambitions and unsatisfied tastes?

It costs about \$7,200 to get a college education, according to statistics. If the college man, after spending this, is only able to get work open to any intelligent person, years his junior, what is his advantage? Will his college training balance his disadvantage at having to begin where he will in most cases have to begin?

All these are intelligent questions. And it begins to appear that the magic of a college education has been overrated. "The American Mind" is not paying in most cases as much as the skilled trades. It is a matter of supply and demand. A few years ago a number of college men, disgusted with the wages of their class in New York, set about learning bricklaying. Bricklayers were receiving three times as much as college men. The young fellows studied their pride and went to work in overalls. Most of them said that they would not return to their former positions as long as the disparity in wages continued.

We believe they had the intelligence to recognize a fact now being disguised in a lot of rhetoric, and that their example was only a forerunner of a trend away from the college idea for everybody. The whole world can not wear white collars and sit at a desk.

THE LOUD SPEAKERS

It was not till we had the radios that we heard a great deal about loud speakers, but we have had them with us most of the time. From the time we can remember about people, and how they would talk about certain things of an improvement nature, we have noticed that we have had loud speakers. Most of them are those fellows, however, who have not done anything for the community in particular, but they are on the job continually with their chatter, and they are finding fault with this and that, while they are eating their thin dime.

It is these fellows that stand on the street corners and chew tobacco, and spit on the sidewalk, that do most of the howling, and the largest percent of them are of no benefit whatever to the community. They complain about everything that is going on in the community, nothing is ever done, and they claim that the fire department does not have sense enough to put the fire out, when they have plenty of water, and the same old guy complains of the rough streets, and never pays a nickel of taxes to help to smooth them down. He also finds fault with our public schools, and teachers, and the superintendents and the members of the school board, yet he does not turn a dime over to them to make the school better. We have a few of them in Lubbock. Not many, thank the Lord, but there are a few of them, and you can check up on this picture and see if you cannot recognize some of them on the street corners tomorrow.

ARE RODEOS CRUEL?

The San Angelo Standard raises the question whether or not rodeos are cruel. We cannot see that there is any question about it. We would answer it right off the reel, and say without successful contradiction that it is. It is cruel to the animals involved in the "sport," and we do not believe that it should be encouraged. Even if the officials have seen the true side of the game, and are seeking to pass laws prohibiting the practice, there should be no argument as to the cruelty side of the question. Anyone knows that when an animal is lassoed, and thrown violently to the ground, that there is nothing humane about that. We all know if we have ever fallen that there is pain connected with it, and we are not anxious that anyone throw a rope around our feet and trip us, to a violent fall to the ground. We have that the Anti-Rodeo Cruelty Association of California, succeeds in carrying their protest at the ball box, and that there is a restraining law on the statute to prevent such practice, and that it will spread from one state to another, until it will be driven from the United States.

## On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—All tongue wars are mysteries to the Caucasian race.

Every now and then an epidemic of killings breaks out among America's Chinese, usually in the Chinatowns of several cities at once—frequently far apart. Evidently there is some sort of system about it.

When this happens the police talk glibly of warfare between two "gangs"—even naming the gangs. In the government immigration service are experts who will testify that such talk is pure bluff—that it is doubtful if any white man really can define a "gang," much less explain a tongue war.

Some students of the subject think a tong, in America, is a branch of a bigger, main tong in China. Others believe that, like chop suey, the tong is an invention of the Chinese here—quite unknown to their brethren at home.

Perhaps the best guess is that the strife rages periodically in American Chinatowns simply in consequence of the Chinese form of warfare.

Be that as it may, its mortality rate is high. It is also a pest—not that the tong gunmen do not try to confine their activities to their own environment, but from the danger of stray shots—and from the general disorderliness of tong warfare, besides.

So every time there is a tong outbreak—recently, in Washington, New York, Chicago and elsewhere—up goes a yell for the immigration authorities to get busy, to weed out the Chinese who are in the United States illegally, and to deport them overseas.

Easy enough to demand.—rejoin the immigration authorities—but mighty difficult to go ahead and do.

It may not appear so hard. The oriental cast of countenance is not to be missed, mistaken or disguised. And a Chinese, from China, is subject to deportation unless he has credentials to show.

But suppose he was born here!

Theoretically, Chinese immigration into the United States has been prohibited since the early 80's. However, at first there were a good many exemptions, and a considerable infiltration continued for a number of years.

Gradually the law was strengthened until it began to look air tight.

At that point the Chinese, once in the country, bethought themselves of the expedient, whenever questioned, of claiming American citizenship.

There actually were then in America quite a few younger people of Chinese parentage but American birth. There are more now—and grandchildren.

In law they are as American as the pilgrims' progeny.

It would seem as if they must have become pretty thorough Americans in other respects too—but not so much so as one might imagine, the immigration folk say—the Chinese, even in America, keep so much to themselves that it is possible for a family of them to live here on into the generations and stay very Chinese—especially if each generation is sent to the home land to grow up.

YOUR HEALTH

X-RAY REVEALS FOREIGN MATTER IN STOMACH

The word "bexors" is generally applied to a collection of material found in the stomach and intestines of animals. Most frequently it consists of hair and is called a tricho-bexor.

Such hair balls are found frequently in the cow, the horse and the cat, especially during the hair shedding season. The material tends to be passed from the body or vomited and in general does not hurt.

Hair balls have been found in the stomachs of human beings as a result of pulling hairs and chewing them, and in the case of one man from chewing his beard. At least 116 cases of hair balls in the human stomach have been reported in medical literature. Probably there were hundreds of additional cases not reported because new information was not provided to medical science.

The largest hair ball reported weighed 6 1/2 pounds. Until the hair ball becomes so large as to block the passage of food, it is not likely to disturb the patient. Eventually, however, it results in general obstruction and, in some cases, death.

In addition to this type of substance, permanent masses are found on occasion in the stomach and intestines made up of indigestible material, such as the fibrous portions of fruit and vegetables; persimmon, prune, raisin skins, and seeds, and celery. When these things are insufficiently chewed, or when they are taken in large amounts, they may form a mass in the stomach which is acted on with difficulty by the gastric juice and eliminated only with the greatest of trouble.

Modern scientific medical diagnosis discovers these cases without great difficulty by the use of the X-Ray. The superstitious savages of the past used to attach great value to hair balls and bexors, using them in voodooism and in magic.

## Smith, Talking Strictly to New York Audience, Says Republicans Silent As Tomb On Question of Prohibition

Democratic Nominee Says He Will Take Care Of Subject With Aid Of American People

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 2.—Gov. Alfred E. Smith, in a speech tonight directed specifically to a New York state audience, declared that Albert Ottinger, Republican gubernatorial nominee, could cease to worry over prohibition, as "I will take care of that subject, by and with the advice of the American people."

The Democratic candidate said Mr. Ottinger, now attorney general of the Empire state, had been carrying "water on both shoulders."

"The attitude of the Republican candidate on the question of prohibition can be summed up in a few words," the governor declared. "He is a wet dry." He has attempted to be all things to all men.

"On this subject his party platform is as silent as the tomb. He is constantly worrying, day in and day out, as to how he can get over the campaign without being compelled to have anything to say about it."

"In one of his speeches he said that he would pass that whole question up until the commission appointed by Mr. Hoover had dealt with it."

"Well, I will relieve him of all doubt and worry about that by informing him here tonight in Brooklyn that Mr. Hoover will never have any opportunity to appoint any commission on that subject. I will take care of that subject, by and with the advice of the American people."

The governor's speech tonight, scheduled over a nationwide radio hookup, climaxed a busy day during which the nominee was escorted through the heart of New York's business district at the head of a long automobile procession.

The Democratic candidate, as the procession moved slowly through the canyon of skyscrapers, was cheered by thousands who lined Broadway and the other thoroughfares over which he passed.

A rain fell nearly all the time and through this and a storm of flying paper and ticker tape, the nominee smiled back at the people on the streets.

After all, the proper and orderly administration of state affairs," he said, "rests essentially upon the same basis as the handling of the business of the federal government."

He told his audience he had been traveling for six weeks throughout the nation and as long as he lived he would "always cherish the welcome I received from millions of my fellow countrymen."

"The warm and affectionate greeting in every city, village and hamlet," he continued, "will always be a treasured remembrance of the campaign of 1928."

Praises Robinson.  
"Closing the campaign in my own state, conscious that I am speaking to the nation, I desire to say a word of thanks to Senator Robinson. While I have not met him since last summer, I have followed his campaign closely, and I am deeply impressed by the fact that the Democratic national convention gave him a most worthy running mate, one who has demonstrated his character, his capacity and his ability during his long and distinguished public career."

He said that "no man in the history of the state has had as great reason to be grateful to its people as I have had."

"They have honored me even beyond my own hopes," he went on. "Actuated by a spirit of gratitude, I naturally feel a keen desire that the state continue to progress and that our people, from Buffalo to Montauk Point, have a responsive, intelligent and forward-looking government."

"I therefore welcomed with great satisfaction the nomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt. During my governorship I have had his vigorous and hearty support. I shall hand over the reins of the state government on January 1, and I know of no man to whom I would sooner turn them over than to Franklin D. Roosevelt."

On water power, the governor said the state of New York had been blessed with natural resources and the Democratic party had taken the position that these were the property of the people and should be developed by the state under state ownership and control.

"If you want the benefits of state water power development," he added, "you cannot look to the Republican candidate. You will have to look to Franklin Roosevelt."

Attacks Party's Record.  
The governor attacked the Republican state record on agriculture and said "this time every year the Republican party is busily engaged in explaining that it is the great friend of the farmer."

He charged the opposition party with failure to make any appropriations for the slaughter of tubercular cattle and said when he was returned to office in 1932 he had to make provision to make up a "deficit left over as a result of Republican neglect."

"The American farmer is awakening to the fact," he continued, "that the Republican party has been engaged in the political pastime of making promises to him. As Senator Norris of Nebraska said, 'What the farmer wants today is a little slice of fulfillment; he has been fed to death on broken Republican promises.'"

"In my speech at Sedalia, Mo., I pointed out to the American people that the cost of running the municipality at Washington operated by the federal government, has increased since 1914 a hundred per cent. The cost of the federal government between 1924 and 1928, has increased by two hundred million dollars."

Cost Will Increase.  
"And in keeping with the pledge that I made to the American people when I entered this campaign of talking out honestly and frankly and fearlessly to them, I make this prediction: No matter who is elected governor of New York state on November 6, the cost of the government will increase next year."

The governor also attacked the Republican state record on a number of other questions and wound up by saying that "for me this is not so much a question of party victory."

By making a fitting for a window strap in one part instead of two, thus using three screws instead of six, one English railway expects to save several thousands of dollars a year.

## Railroad Profits In Texas Increase

Increase Is 17.92 Per Cent  
Over 1927 Period; Ex-  
penses Are Cut, Also;  
Passengers Decrease

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—Net operating income of Texas railroads showed an increase of 17.92 per cent for the eight-month period ending August 31, over the same period in 1927, according to compilations of the Texas railroad commission, announced today. Net income for the present year was \$21,982,777, against \$18,642,200 for 1927.

Revenues fell off. The statement showed that both operating revenues and operating expenses decreased during the first eight months of 1928. Operating revenues fell 2.4 per cent and operating expenses were cut 7.24 per cent.

Operating revenues for the period totaled \$154,976,310, compared to \$160,766,577 for the same eight months in 1927. Operating expenses were \$117,040,562, as against \$126,171,392 for the same period in 1927.

Passenger revenue fell off 11.77 per cent, decreasing from \$31,142,717 in 1927, to \$18,696,670 this year.

## Daily Markets

### FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

FORT WORTH, Nov. 2 (P).—Generally steady conditions were noted on the cattle trade here today. Steers sold from \$15 to \$15.50, cows from 7.00 to 7.35, bulls from 6.50 to 7.50 and calves from 11.25 to 11.75.

Hog prices advanced from 10c to 25c. The top was 9.30, with the bulk trading from 8.00 to 9.25. Sows brought from 7.50 to 8.25 and pigs from 7.00 to 7.25.

In the sheep market, fat lambs were 25c higher, with choice kinds selling for 13.50. Other classes were steady. Yearlings sold for 10.50 and wethers for 7.50.

### KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 2 (P).—(U. S. R. A.)—Killing classes of the light cattle supply was generally plain with the low priced stock finding a draggy outlet at steady to weak prices, but no changes of consequence were registered on other classes; eastern dressed beef markets have been sluggish the past few days with prices weak to lower; trade interests expect light to moderate the fore part of next week due to the election which in past years has had a tendency to reduce the supply; the next two weeks will practically complete the marketing of grass fat cattle; receipts were around 10,000 as compared with 14,816 a week ago and 15,291 the same day last year.

Hog supplies around the 11-market circuit totaled around 13,800 a shortage of 22,800 from last Friday and 17,800 less than a year ago; trade was active at 10 to 25c higher prices with spots up more on underweights; the days top of 9.65 was paid at St. Louis while the best mark at Chicago was 9.00.

### NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (P).—The stock market generally held its ground today in the face of the second largest weekly increase in federal reserve brokers loans ever reported. Practically the only effect of the new record total of loans was a slackening of trading.

This bearish development was largely offset by a drop in the call money rate to 7 percent for the first time in a week. There was also a slight ease in time money, and the credit outlook was considerably improved as the month-end dividend and interest payments made their way back to the banks. Call money was available in the outside market at 6 1/2-7 percent.

Member loans as announced by the stock exchange for October after the close, usually substantially larger than the federal reserve total, were not as large as had been expected, only exceeded the October reserve figures of about \$37,000,000 by approximately \$30,000. This brought the stock exchange total to nearly \$5,500,000,000 while a figure in excess of \$6,000,000,000 had been rumored.

The market experienced a sharp rally during the afternoon, after some selling around mid-day, and again sold off somewhat in week-end profit taking in the last hour. Losses of a fraction to 2 points predominated at the close.

Oils were a strong feature. Sinclair selling up two points in a tremendous turnover, then falling back in the last transactions. The stock was heavily bought by the Outlets interests, which recently acquired a large block of the treasury stock. One bid for 100,000 shares at 49 was made. Marland and Pan-American B also attracted a large following on reports of improved earnings.

The action of General Motors was typical. It equalled its previous high at 224 1/2 in the afternoon, then fell back to 221 5/8, down about a point. Radio sold up two points, then receded for a net loss of 2 1/2. American Express mounted about 9 points to 287, then tumbled to 285.

Kelly Springfield common sold up 3 points to 24 1/2, within a fraction of its high on announcement of the 648,000 shares of stock recently offered to shareholders had been sold.

The preferred shares advanced 1 and 5 points. Kalmikoff responded to announcement of a large increase in October sales and the elimination of \$5,000,000 in bank loans in the last fiscal year.

There was slight response of the stocks to announcement that the New York Central had placed an order of \$5,000,000 for steel rails. U.

## Cotton Men Vote To Hold Meeting

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (P).—Members of the New York Cotton Exchange have been asked to meet November 14 to vote on amendments to the by-laws providing for establishment of Southern deliveries and limitation of contracts and appointment of a control committee. The amendments, are to be

put upon as a whole and, if approved, become effective at a date to be decided by the board of managers.

A committee of 15, after months of study, has proposed that Norfolk, Charleston, Galveston, Houston and New Orleans be designated points at which cotton may be delivered.

He retained those positions when he retired from the finance chairmanship. The Times says it is reported that he intends to sever all connection with the company, and his resignation will be submitted to the directors

next Thursday.  
**Differences Arise.**  
When Mr. Raskob resigned from his position with General Motors, Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., the president, wrote him a cordial letter which expressed hope that when the campaign was over Mr. Raskob would return to his finance post. Many rumors had been spread that considerable differences had developed between Mr. Raskob and other influential members of General Motors over politics. Mr. Sloan and others of the directors have expressed their support of Mr. Hoover.

### Republicans Use Nearly 5 Million

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. (P)—The Republican national committee today reported to the house receipts of \$4,911,744 and expenditures \$4,714,361 up to October 31, inclusive. During the last week of October the receipts of the committee were \$770,000 and it expended \$662,000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2. (P)—William Hamilton Childs, manufacturer and financier, died today at a New York hospital. He was born in Hartford, Conn., March 7, 1867.

## Hoover Promises New Institution In Government, Designed to Care For All Agricultural Problems, In St. Louis

Federal Farm Board of Vast  
Power Is Plan of Republican  
Candidate; Favors  
Adequate Tariff

(Associated Press Staff Writer)

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 2.—A new institution in government, designed to care for agricultural problems, present and future, was promised here tonight by Herbert Hoover in what he denominated as his final word to the American electorate on the issues of this campaign.

The institution would comprise a Federal farm board, he said, composed of men in sympathy with agriculture and clothed with the broadest powers to determine the facts, the causes, and the remedies which should be applied to the various problems affecting the basic industry of the nation.

**Proposes Adequate Tariff.**

This declaration formed the focal point around which the Republican presidential candidate built his prepared address. As a corollary to this formula for farm relief he proposed adequate tariff protection to agricultural products and the speedy development of a great system of inland waterways, which would give cheap transportation outlets both by the Mississippi River and its laterals and the Great Lakes through the St. Lawrence River.

"In addition to the tariff and cheaper waterway transportation in assistance to agriculture," Hoover said, "the Republican party proposes to go farther. It proposes to set up an institution which will be one of the most important institutions in our government, designed to not only the varied problems which confront us today, but those which may arise in the future."

**Board to Be Powerful.**

"We propose to create a Federal board composed of men of understanding and sympathy for the problems of agriculture," he proposed. "This board should have power to determine the facts, the causes, the remedies which should be applied to each and every one of the multitude of problems which we mass under the general term 'the agricultural problem.'"

"The program further provides that the board shall have a broad authority to act and be authorized to assist in the further development of co-operative marketing; that it shall assist in the development of adequate warehousing facilities; in the elimination of wastes in distribution and in the solution of other problems as they arise. In particular the board is to build up with initial advances of capital from the government, farmer-owned and farmer-controlled stabilization corporations which will protect the farmer from depressions and the demoralization of summer and periodic surpluses."

"It is proposed that this board should have placed at its disposal such resources, as are necessary, to make its action effective."

**Flexible and Adaptable.**

"Thus we give to the Federal Farm Board every arm with which to deal with the multitude of problems. This is an entirely different method of approach to solution from that of a general formula; it is flexible and adaptable. No such far-reaching and specific proposal has ever been made by a political party."

party on behalf of any industry in our history. It is a direct business proposition. It marks our desire for establishment of farmers' stability and at the same time maintain his independence and individuality.

"This plan is consonant with our American ideals to avoid the government operation of 'commercial business' for it places the operation on the farmer himself and not upon a bureaucracy. It puts the government in its real relation to the citizen—that of co-operation. Its object is to give equality of opportunity to the farmer."

"I would consider it the greatest honor I could have if it should become my privilege to aid in finally solving this, the most difficult of economic problems presented to our people, and the one in which by inheritance and through long contact I have my deepest interest."

**Reach Decision Quickly.**

"I am hopeful that in the December session of Congress, it will be possible to reach that solution. However, as I have already said, if this is not possible I would call a special session in order that we might speedily arrive at a determination of this question before the next harvest."

At one point in his address, Mr. Hoover said that "for us to adopt other special conceptions, such as Federal or State Government entry into commercial business in competition with its citizens, would undermine initiative and enterprise and destroy the very foundations of freedom and progress upon which the American system is based."

The Republican nominee said the Coolidge administration had recognized "the public necessity of Federal government contribution to the creation of a definite system of modern interstate highways," and that he stood for continuance of this program.

**Advocates Flood Control.**

Saying that he was an "advocate of adequate flood control," Hoover approved the enactment by Congress of authority to construct Mississippi flood control works. "The safety of over a million and a half people depends upon them," he said. "We have already witnessed the temporary shock that came to the prosperity of the whole nation through that great disaster."

"Government has the definite and manifest obligation of giving constructive leadership to the people," he said. "In doing so it must not lessen their initiative and enterprise upon which we must rely for the progress of the race and of the nation. Our system has been built upon the ideal of equality of opportunity. For perhaps a hundred years after the foundation of the republic the opportunities of a moving frontier preserved that equality of opportunity. Now with the settlement of the country and with the advancing speed and intricate complexity of industrial life, the preservation of equality of opportunity becomes yearly and yearly more difficult, and for that very reason is of higher and higher importance. If we maintain America as the land of opportunity, where chance to climb to that position to every boy and girl may have the which his ability and character entitle him, we shall need to be on increasing guard."

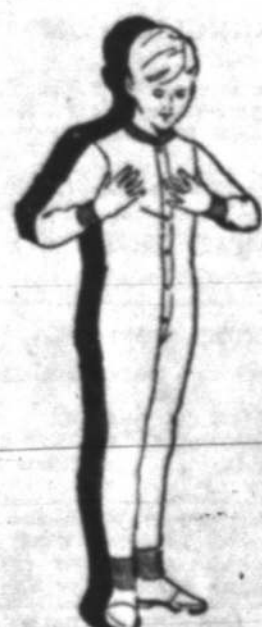
