

Bumper Peanut Crop Predicted for County

ROAMING THRU RANGER WITH RON...

THIS IS the summer slump. As usual — about this time of year every year in Ranger — nothing is going on. Nothing is even planned. Not much, anyway.

And this newspaper finds it has little to write about. People are going and coming on vacations. And that's about the extent of present activities.

About this time we begin to long for the busy, bustling months of September and December — when activities seem to be at a height.

Incidentally, the Times is printing on Thursday and Friday this week and closing all day Saturday for July 4th. Most of the other local businesses will also be closed Saturday.

Be sure to come back from that trip safe — not a statistic. (We hate to lose any subscribers.)

RANGER is mentioned in the latest issue of "Texas Oil and Gas", commemorating the 100th year of the American petroleum industry, printed by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In a story titled "Texas and the First 100 Years of American Oil", we find the following:

Ranger, Breckenridge and Desdemona were the three outstanding strikes in early West Central Texas oil development. All three brought the boom element — Ranger in 1917, Breckenridge and Desdemona in 1918.

The frenzied speculation that accompanied these discoveries paralleled activity at Spindletop. Flush production practices of an immature industry caused wells to drop back to a trickle due to loss of underground pressure.

The swirling crowds that churned through dusty roads one week and quagmires the next rode the oil flow. When production slumped the crowds left, leaving Ranger with cancelled businesses and cancelled credit ratings.

Elsewhere, in the same issue, we see that Eastland County had 97,036 barrels of crude production in the fiscal year 1957 and 115,212,519 barrels of total crude production to Aug. 31, 1957.

And this same issue contains an article on drilling — the "Billion Dollar Quest", on secondary recovery and refining. Some oil fields are kept alive thru pumping water under oil in the producing formation or injecting gas above the oil to increase pressure. One of both ways may be used.

Now — all of Ranger is awaiting the results of secondary recovery projects now underway in the area. A lot may be at stake.

STILL HEARING good comments on our 40th Anniversary progress edition.

C. E. May sent us a letter, letting us know how much he enjoyed it. And Mrs. Ethel Brooks Gilmore got a letter from J. E. T. Peters of Cisco, who says that he has known Ranger well since 1898. Peters read all of the edition (as did a lot of others) — including all ads. He also says that Mark Turner, who was first manager of the Chamber of Commerce, was also city manager of unincorporated Ranger.

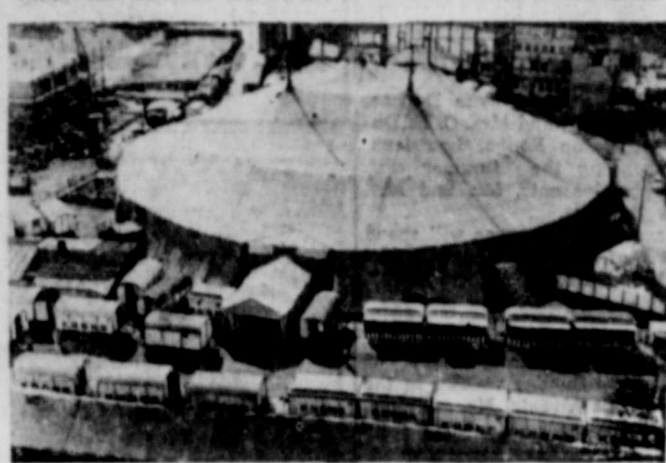
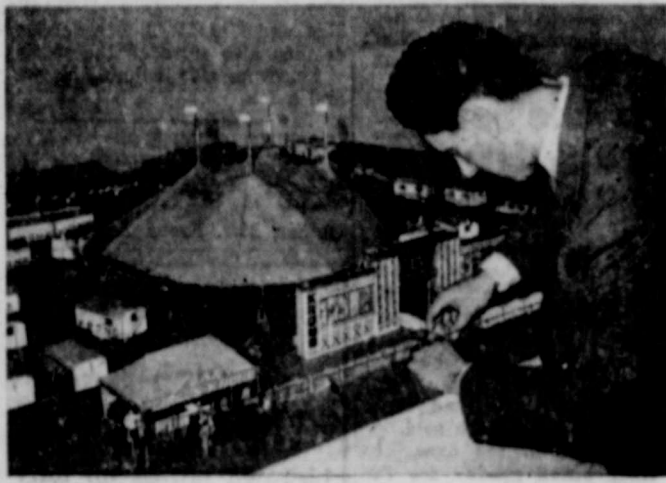

Area Drivers Can Help Reduce Death Toll

Governor Price Daniel said today that the official prediction of 26 traffic deaths during the 72-hour Fourth of July holiday "represents all over again the tragedies which are continuing daily on our streets and highways."

The Department of Public Safety's Statistical Services has advised the Governor that only Texas drivers can reduce the prospective toll by exercising unusual caution, obedience to the traffic laws, and common courtesy. In the meantime many Eastland County citizens are preparing and planning to take trips across the state on crowded and dangerous highways. They should take note of the following statement issued by the Governor.

"The highway patrol, sheriff's and police will do their part in halting the law violators with a statewide enforcement patrol, but only the drivers themselves can reduce the death toll below the predicted figure for the July 4 holidays.

"July 4 is a time to celebrate life, liberty and freedom, but it will mean death, destruction and sorrow if the people of Texas do not slow down and obey the traffic laws.

"I have appealed to every law enforcement agency in Texas, every Texas Radio and TV station, every newspaper publisher, every member of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission to do the utmost to help warn our people about highway dangers on this day."

Looks Better Than In '58

The Eastland County peanut crop outlook is better today than it was a year ago at this same time and prospects are for a bumper crop if the area can get "showers" during July and August.

That is the opinion of J. M. Cooper of Eastland, county agricultural agent, Ross Wilson of Gorman, director of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, T. C. Wylie of Ranger, president of the Southwestern Peanut Shellers Association, and almost all growers in the area.

Cooper said he is "very optimistic," and pointed out that feed and cotton prospects are outstanding too. He predicted that if the county can get "one good rain in July and another in August we will have a wonderful bumper crop made."

Last year's peanut crop was the best since 1950. At the end of the harvest last year it was estimated that the Eastland County crop brought farmers three million dollars.

Ennott Powell, head of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Eastland, said that his workers have measured approximately 20 percent of this year's crop, and have found that farmers are planting most of their allotments.

Wilson said that this year's planting will be the heaviest in at least five years, and Powell's report would tend to prove that statement. Wilson "conservative-

ly" estimated that this year's acreage would total about 28,000 acres. Powell "guessed" that planting would be nearer 22,000 acres. In 1958 some 27,000 acres were planted.

"Things are certainly looking good," Wilson stated. "We've had the best June rains in years, and possibly ever, giving us good moisture that we didn't get in the early Spring." He termed the outlook "considerably better" today than it was July 1, 1958. A year ago, he said, the county was in need of a rain, but ample moisture is available now.

Wilson recalled that last year's planting was earlier than this year's. He estimated that 95 percent of this year's peanut crop has been planted, however.

He went so far as to say that he believes that even if the county doesn't get a shower in July "our moisture will carry us."

County Agent Cooper said most county farmers are already back in the fields. They face some tall weeds and grass in many areas.

He said that corn and cotton, although minor crops in this county, should be real good. He warned that insects could heavily damage the cotton crop, though. Cooper said he had checked one corn field that was exceptional, and estimated that 60 to 70 bushels of corn would be harvested from the field.

Grain sorghum and other feed crops are also in excellent condition. Most stock tanks have filled up, or at least hold sufficient water to supply needs.

Wylie agreed with Wilson that "we have sufficient moisture to hold us to the first of August." He said that the crop will be good and earlier than last year if the county gets light showers.

The Ranger sheller said that normal rainfall will assure an early harvest in this country. Last year's harvest continued until late in December because of heavy rains during the harvest period. Wylie said the harvest could begin by Sept. 1.

"The grass is under control," he stated, "and the crops are growing perfectly."

About the only disappointing feature about the whole peanut situation is that this year's support price will be \$20 per ton less than it was last year, Wylie declared. Last year's support price was \$204 per ton. The 1953 support price was reduced to \$154 by Sec. of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson. That represents 75 percent of parity, which is the lowest support price Benson can set under existing laws.

Allman replaces Dan Whitaker, who earlier resigned in order to accept a position as band director at Floydada. Whitaker has directed bands in Ranger for the past three and a half years.

Prior to directing bands at Sunray, Allman was band director at St. Jo (Texas) for two years. He is a graduate of Howard Payne College in Brownwood with a B. S. degree in music. Allman also has a M. A. degree from North Texas State College in Denton. He played in the Brownwood High School band and in college bands.

Allman is married with two children. In another faculty change, announced in May, Harold (Ace) Prescott was named head football

coach at Ranger High School. For the past three years Prescott coached football at Raymondville in South Texas. He and his family have moved to Ranger.

Complete faculty assignments for the school year, beginning Aug. 31, will be announced at a later date.

Whitaker will direct a high school band of about 100 members in Floydada, a junior high school band of about 95 members and a beginner's band of about 50 members. He will also direct the major-ette program.

Whitaker replaces Maurice Jones who has accepted a position as salesman for Caldwell Music Co. in Abilene.

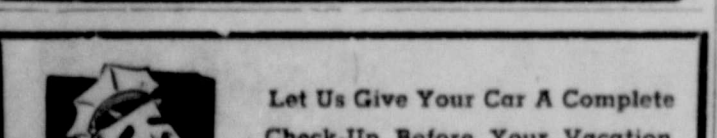

LEMON-COCOONUT CHIFFON PUDDING

1 package lemon pie filling Grated rind of 1 lemon
1/4 cup sugar 2 egg whites
2 1/2 cups cold water 1/4 cup sugar
2 egg yolks 1/2 cup shredded coconut
2 teaspoons lemon juice

Combine lemon pie filling with 1/4 cup sugar in saucepan. Gradually add water and slightly beaten egg yolks, stirring to keep smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a full boil. Break flavor capsule if undissolved; stir into filling. Remove from heat. Stir in juice and rind. Beat egg whites until foamy; gradually beat in sugar until mixture holds stiff peaks. Fold hot lemon mixture into egg whites; fold in coconut. Turn into dessert dishes. To serve, top with more coconut or with whipped cream. Makes 8 servings.

DATE BRAIDS

1/2 cup milk 3 packages or cakes yeast
1/2 cup sugar (active dry or compressed)
1/4 cup shortening 2 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 teaspoons salt About 5 cups sifted enriched flour
1/2 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)

Scald milk. Add sugar, shortening and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle or crumble yeast into water (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed yeast). Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and eggs. Stir in about 2 1/2 cups of the flour. Beat until smooth. Add enough of the remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn dough out on floured board and knead until smooth and satiny, about 5 minutes. Form dough into a smooth ball. Press top of dough ball into greased bowl, then turn dough over. (This greases the top.) Cover and let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 45 minutes. Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. While dough is rising, prepare Date Filling*. Use one-half of dough for each cake. Roll out each half into an oblong about 16 x 8 inches. Spread half the Date Filling the length of the center third of the oblong. Cut 15 slits in dough along each side of filling, making strips about 1 inch wide. Fold strips at an angle across filling, alternating from side to side. Place the braid on a greased baking sheet. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubled in bulk, about 50 minutes. Brush tops of braids with 1 egg yolk mixed with 2 tablespoons milk, then sprinkle each with 1 tablespoon sugar. Bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) about 35 minutes. Remove from baking sheet and cool on rack.

*DATE FILLING

Combine 1 cup chopped pitted dates, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup water 1/2 cup pecans, chopped and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Heat in saucepan until boiling, and continue boiling until thick enough to spread.

The Declaration of Independence was called a unanimous declaration when it was presented to the public on July 8, 1776. But it wasn't unanimous until July 19, when the New York delegation to the Continental Congress announced

ed that it favored the document.

The birthday of the U. S., the Fourth of July, did not become a legal public holiday until 1941.

Thomas Jefferson is remembered most as the author of the Declaration of Independence. However, he was also the foremost American architect of his time, a

translator of Greek plays, a violinist and the inventor of the dumbwaiter and the swivel chair.

Record Number Of Cattle In Nation Is Noted

COLLEGE STATION — There were 96,851,000 head of cattle in the United States on Jan. 1, 1959, said John G. McHaney, extension economist. This is a new record and three and one-half million more than on Jan. 1, 1958.

Most of this increase in the cattle inventory was in young beef stock, McHaney said. For example, beef heifers rose 750,000 head, steer numbers rose 750,000 also, and calf numbers were 1,300,000 higher. The beef cow herd increased 1.3 million, however, the number of milk cows were off 600,000 head, leaving the total cow increase at 700,000.

A big expansion in beef production for the market in 1959 or 1960 is not expected because cow numbers are not large, he said. They are still two million below 1955 and this is favorable from a price standpoint, because the calf crop this year will not be large enough to bring about a great increase in slaughter in 1959. Many of the heifers and heifer calves will be retained as breeding stock. However, many young cattle will go to slaughter this year or next, after a period of feeding.

The outlook for fairly stable slaughter and prices in 1959 is based upon favorable range and pasture conditions. Prices during the rest of 1959 should remain good, said the economist. A severe drought, however, would cause more cattle to move to market and you may want to be there first with the most. For this reason, he says, you should watch range conditions closely in 1959, not just in your local areas, but all over the

United States.

Chances are that prices of cattle will be lower in 1960 and 1961 as cow numbers increase. The break in cattle prices usually comes later on in the cattle cycle when breeding herds are built up and calf crops increase. It could come early in the 1960's.

California And Florida Ship Fruit To Texas

COLLEGE STATION — California and Florida shipped 260 carloads of citrus fruit to be unloaded in eight major Texas cities in 1957. This raises the question of how and why these states' production competes successfully with that of Texas.

The market area served by Texas wholesalers of fresh citrus includes Texas and parts of the surrounding states. The population served in this area is approximately 10 million—9 and 1-4 million in Texas and 3-4 million in the neighboring states.

A new report released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station presents marketing research in the area between the shippers and retailers. The objectives of this study were to determine competing sources of supply, area service from each wholesale center, quality, sizes, containers and transportation methods preferred by wholesalers, the point at which the decision is made as to what type of citrus to buy, and suggestions and recommendations of wholesalers.

It was found that 95 percent of the firms use telephones for purchasing citrus and 59 percent use telephones for selling. In 1954, 37 percent of citrus was purchased through brokers and in 1957, 55 percent. Of the 79 firms, 54 purchased all their fruit for delivery by truck.

The report covers general information concerning citrus firms, wholesale operations, relations with retailers and industry growth and problems.

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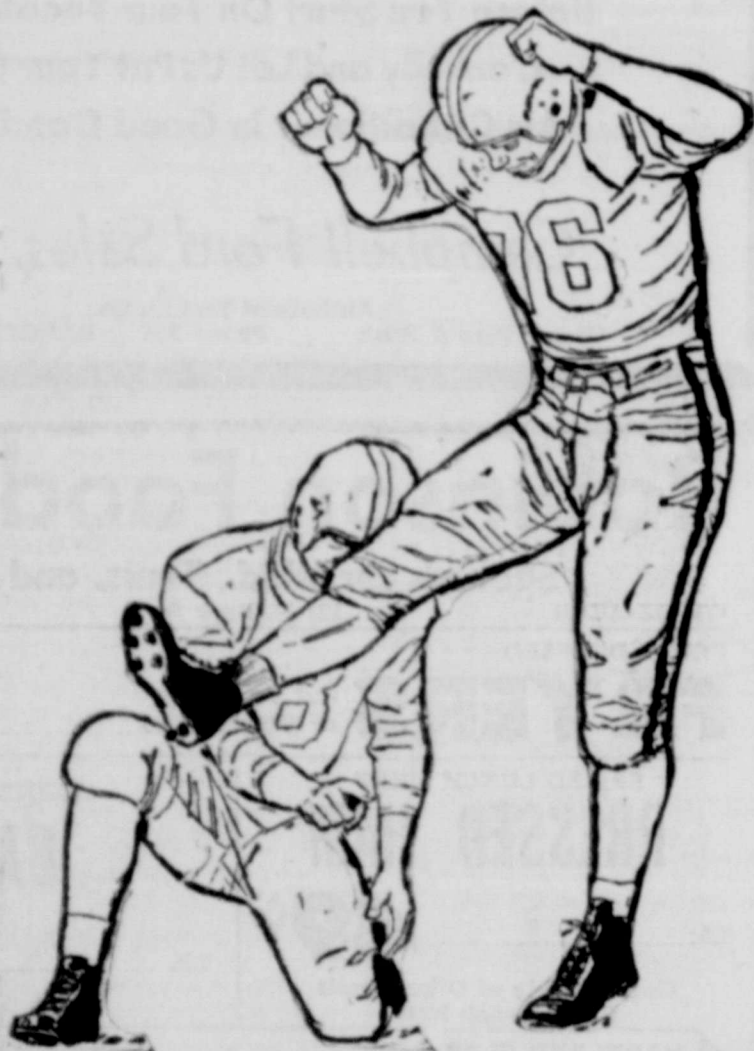

Without an offer, no acceptance,

still claimed that his belated "ac-
ceptance" had nevertheless sealed
the contract with Brown.
Was there a contract? No, the
offer had lapsed because it had
not been accepted in the circum-
stances within a reasonable time.
There are many ways to end an
offer. You may withdraw it, you
may say that the offer expires at
a given time, or you may die, or
the other party may turn it down
directly or by making a counter of-
fer.

Here Smith had failed to ac-
cept Brown's offer within a rea-
sonable time, which ended it just
as though it had been withdrawn.
What is a reasonable time? It var-
ies. The offer could expire in a
few minutes in the stock market
or last for quite a while, depend-
ing upon what a court would
think is a reasonable time.

But in Smith's case six months
was unreasonable.

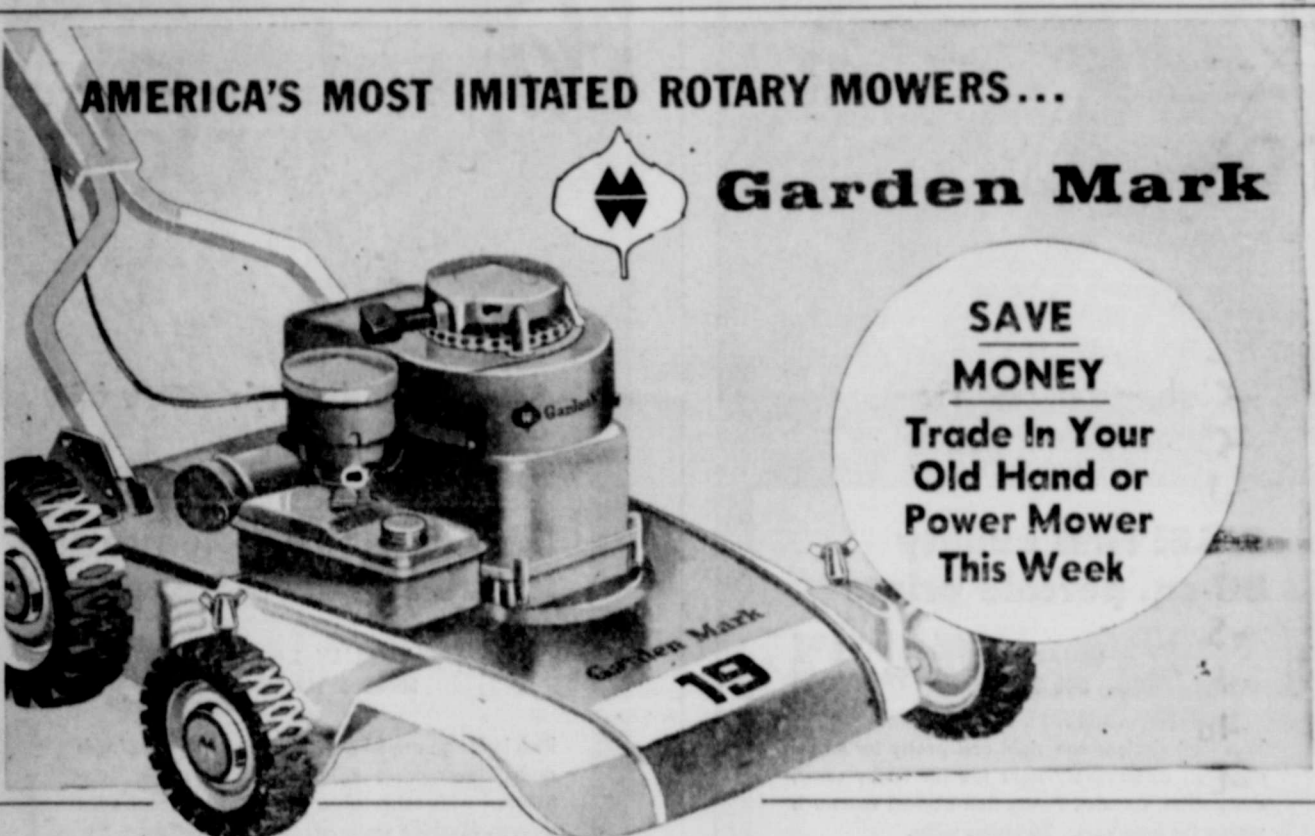
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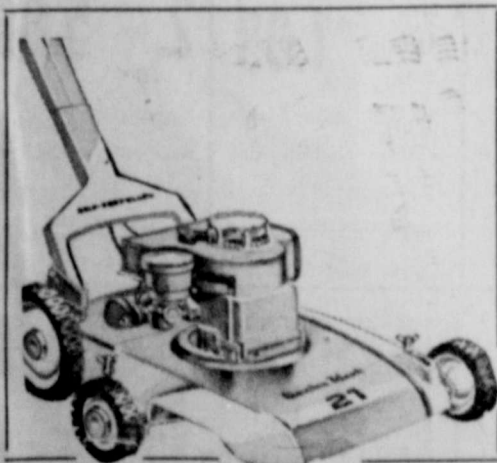

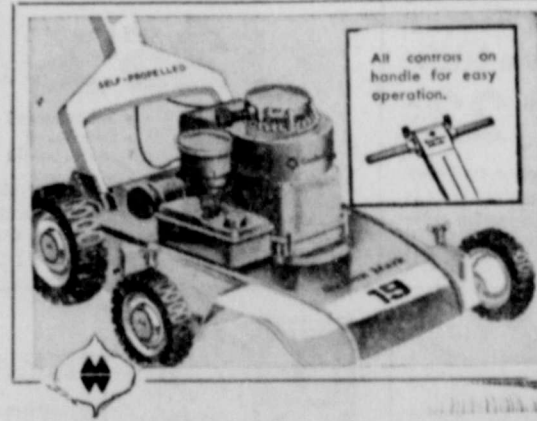

About 25 Percent Of Texas Cattle Are Branded

College Station. — Though Texas has a law requiring that cattle, hogs, sheep and goats must be branded or marked and the brand or mark recorded, brand inspectors estimate that 25 percent or fewer of the cattle and less of the other animals are branded.

However branding is still a common practice in some areas and the branding laws are still in force. Some of these brand laws are obsolete and the enforcement machinery is inadequate.

This information comes from a new publication released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station titled, "Analysis of Texas Laws and Regulations Controlling the Movement and Sale of Livestock."

The publication brings together many of the more important laws and regulations to that producers, selling agents, buyers and consumers may know the legal requirements to be observed and the protection provided.

The responsibility for prevention and control of livestock diseases in Texas rests with the Livestock Sanitary Commission. The steps being taken by the Commission and the U.S. Department of Agriculture to control and eradicate livestock diseases are discussed.

Auctioneers and how their profession is regulated and the testing of livestock scales at public auction markets and stockyards are among the other topics of discussion.
